Grid Practice Begins Monday For Chiefs

WITH THE ANNIVERSARY this week of the dropping of the first atomic bomb on the Japanese city of Hiroshima, television is making a big deal about posing the question "Should the atomic bomb have been dropped?"

We watched one of the network's newscasts on Monday, which originated from Japan, and one would almost have gotten the idea that the United States was the aggressor, if not the perpetrator, of World War II.

It is unfortunate that a generation of news people, whose knowledge of World War II is so limited that they take up the nuclear activist role, and try to make out the late President Truman as a heartless heathen.

Many of these news reports fail to mention the fact that it was the Japanese who had launched on a proposed campaign to rule the world. And, by the Japanese's religious beliefs, human lives meant very little.

After all, it was Japan who made the first strike, with their sneak attack on Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. Over 2,300 United States servicemen were killed, and another 1,100 were wounded.

Even in Japan today, the average resident, especially the young folks, don't know that their country was the one which started the war with the U.S., by this unprovoked attack.

Perhaps they also have failed to enlighten their residents to the atrocities committed by the Japanese in China, the Philippines, Singapore, Korea, and elsewhere during the war.

Almost everyone knows about the fanatical kamikaze pilots, whose very mission was one of suicidal nature. To die in battle would make them a martyr, thus they fought with an unrelenting zeal.

It was this attitude that President Truman and his advisors were considering, when they decided for the big strike, rather than making the invasion by troops, in which it has been estimated that up to a million men, both Americans and Japanese, would have been killed.

The "Enola Gay," the aircraft which carried the first bomb, is being readied for a museum near Washington, D.C. One commentator said that the aircraft can be visited by hundreds of thousands of fathers and their children and grandchildren who would not be alive had not the two atomic bombs been dropped on Japan.

If the use of the A-bomb was so inhuman, looking back from today's perspective, why, then, immediately after Hiroshima, did the Japanese leaders not react? With their disregard for their own people, they waited, until the U.S. was obliged to drop the second bomb on Nagasaki, before making overtures of surrender, to call off the war.

It took the Japanese leaders of 1945 SIX DAYS after Hiroshima to decide that the A-bomb was really that bad. They could have saved hundreds of thousands of their own people, if they had had any regard for human life themselves.

The irony of the situation is that the United States, after the war, spent millions of dollars rebuilding Japan, restoring their country and helping them develop industry. Today, with no protection for our own manufacturers, Japanese-made goods are putting American industry out of business, and costing thousands of jobs.

But to debate at this late time (and especially with the debaters not privileged to the situation that existed) is only helping those who would tear down our country.

As President Reagan stated this week, in direct response to this debate: "To question the decision (on dropping the atomic bomb) at this time is absurd." Enough said.

School may be starting later this year (September 3), but the summer is all but over for high school youngsters who will be taking part in the 1985 football program.

Coach Tommy Moss announced this week that workouts would begin on Monday, August 12. Moss has scheduled only a single workout each day for the first week, in a departure from the time-honored two-a-day workout schedule.

"I thought that might allow some guys to keep their jobs an extra week, and to tell the truth, I don't enjoy the two-a-day workouts any better than the players do," Moss said.

The Chieftain gridmaster said that the double workout schedule would be held for three days--August 19, 20 and 21.

Moss stressed the need for every boy who intends to participate in football to have their physical examination, and to report to the athletic department, if they have not already done so.

Moss has 21 lettermen, five offensive starters and eight defensive starters on his "returning" list, but has been obliged to mark off one of the returning two-way starters, as two-year letterman Daniel Gowens will not be able to play football his senior year.

Gowens, who sustained knee

injuries last school year, had corrective surgery during the off season, and due to complications, will be out of football this year.

Those expected to be among the 90 to 95 boys reporting Monday will be offensive starters Brad Moyer, Leroy Mercado, Mendan Dixon and Brent Gatlin. The seven remaining defensive starters coming back are Dixon, Tony Day, Gatlin, Moyer, Kevin Trimmell, Mercado and Lonnie Phillips.

Moyer played tailback on offense and linebacker on defense. Leroy Mercado played split end on offense and cornerback on defense. Dixon played tackle both on offense and defense. Gatlin played fullback on offense and linebacker on defense.

Day played defensive end, and Trimmell played linebacker.

"We will be lacking speed--we don't have the breakaway runner--but we have good quickness," Moss predicted.

Pre-season polls have established playoff veteran Littlefield as the favorite to win the district title. Moss expects his Chieftains, along with Tulia and Idalou, to battle it out for the other playoff spot.

Only a smaller than average freshman class will keep Friona's high school football participation under 100. There are only 20 to 23 boys expected for the freshman team, which is eight or ten less than usual.

Last year, Friona's football numbers were as good or better than anyone else's in this region, for AAA-sized schools.

"We're going to be young again, with a lot of juniors on our squad and on the starting lineup," said Moss, but quickly added that the talent included in the junior class would not make this much of a drawback.

Moss also is smiling about the sophomore class, with such performers as quarterback Daniel Echols and split-end Rusty Rainey among its ranks.

The team's first scrimmage game will be at Springlake-Earth on Friday, August 23 at 5 p.m. Their second scrimmage game will be against Olton here on August 30, also starting at 5 p.m.

The Chieftains will kick off their regular season on Friday, September 6 by hosting the River Road Wildcats. And, given the fact that the team has almost a month to prepare for its opener, Moss says, "We ought to be ready."

Council Agrees To Accept Depot Gift

Responding to a request by a group of Friona women, the Friona City Council agreed Monday night to accept the old Santa Fe depot as a gift to the city.

Mayor Clarence Monroe explained to the group that the city would hold the depot until such time as it will turn it back over to the Community Heritage Society.

Beth Thompson served as spokesperson for the committee. She explained that they had received a bid of \$5,000 to move the depot, and that a fund drive has been started. Modern Study Club has agreed to contribute \$1,000 to the fund, she said.

Mrs. Thompson explained that the committee would like to relocate the depot to the City Park, and use it for museum purposes, as well as a meeting place for civic projects.

In other business, a request for siting a mobile home at the corner of 10th and Pierce Streets was denied after considerable discussion, due to the objection by an adjacent property owner.

Jo Blackwell, administrator for Prairie Acres, told the city council that there are two places on the board of directors of Prairie Acres which will be expiring at the end of the current year.

One spot is currently held by Nelson Welch, and the other by Connie Neelley. Welch, a six-year member of the board, has indicated his desire to retire from the board. Mrs. Neelley was appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Nora O'Brian.

A committee is being formed to secure names of nominees for the board. Holdover members of the board are John Baca, Jim Johnston and Dr. Lee Spring.

John Kelley, representing Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, engineers, presented the council with the three bids received on the city's wastewater project, which is to receive federal funding on an 85-15 per cent basis, with the city paying approximately 15 per cent of the cost.

On Kelley's recommendation, the council voted to award the contract on the project to Carrothers Construction Co., contingent on the approval by the Texas Department of Water Resources.

Kelley said it is thought that construction can begin on the project within 60 days, and could be completed within six months.

The needed improvements to the sewer system are designed to serve a city population of 4,700, and should be adequate for a 20-year period. It was pointed out that the present system was built in the early 1960s, and also were designed to serve the city for 20 years.

Also discussed was the city's position regarding overtime for its employees, in light of the controversial "Garcia decision" affecting Texas municipalities.

"This is going to cause a headache for cities. A lot of people are opposed to it, strictly due to the additional bookkeeping it will require," said City Manager Beelee Goodwin.

Goodwin discussed the city's preliminary budget for 1985-86, and the group set a special meeting for August 26, at which time the budget will be hammered out.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Monroe, aldermen Mike Hanes, Joe Tongate, Bill Denney, Jim Zorns and Goodwin.

Wreck Kills Pampa Man

Abraham Hildenbrand, 66, was killed instantly in a two-vehicle accident at the intersection of Highway 214 with Fifth Street Thursday at about 11:30 a.m.

Hildenbrand was a passenger in a 1978 Buick driven by Eva Hildenbrand, 63. The couple's home address is 1505 Rosewood Lane, Pampa.

The Hildenbrand vehicle was hit broadside by a delivery truck driven by Chuck Rector, 30. Rector was driving his 1976 Chevrolet truck west and the car pulled in front of him, headed north across the intersection.

Hildenbrand was pronounced dead at the scene by Friona Justice of the Peace Frances Euler. It took members of the Friona Emergency Medical team some time to get the car opened, due to the passenger side being caved in from the impact. Rescue workers used a Jaws of Life to get the door open.

It was reported that the Hildenbrands had been to Hobbs, N.M., and were returning to their home in Pampa.

Rector is the Borden's Milk distributor in the Friona area.

The accident is the second fatal wreck at the same intersection in the past two years.

Department of Public Safety officers Frank Ellis III and Jim Bishop, assisted by the Friona Police Department, handled the investigation. At press time, the DPS officers were studying the evidence and measurements, and had not made determination as to fault in the accident or issued a ticket.

It was reported that the Hildenbrands had been to Hobbs, N.M., and were returning to their home in Pampa.

Heritage Group To Target Old Depot

A group is currently forming with its main goal preservation of the old Santa Fe depot, with the idea of relocating the facility.

The group's idea is to use the old depot for possibly a museum, and for community activities, etc. They are proposing that it be re-located to the City Park in downtown Friona.

Santa Fe had indicated that the company would donate the old depot to the city, provided that it be moved.

The group, which is calling itself the "Community Heritage Society of Friona," met with the city council on Monday, and secured an agreement from the council to accept the depot. The group has launched a campaign to raise the money which will be needed to move the depot.

After accepting the depot from Santa Fe, mayor Clarence Monroe indicated to members of the group that the city would then turn it over to the Heritage Society, as the city did not feel that it could be obligated for the costs of moving and refurbishing the depot.

The original idea for the preservation of the Santa Fe Depot came from the "Beautification Committee" of the Chamber of Commerce.

On February 22, 1984 a letter was sent to D.P. Valentine of Santa Fe Railroad requesting the donation of the Santa Fe Depot for the city of Friona. A reply to that request was received in April of 1984 saying that this action would have to be approved in Chicago.

A letter was received in June of 1985 stating that the depot was no longer in use and that Friona could have it for civic use. A decision was requested by August 1, 1985.

The Chamber of Commerce indicated it no longer feels they can finance this project. The Sesquicentennial Committee met and voted to meet with the City Council to request that the City of Friona accept the gift of the Santa Fe Depot for the city of Friona.

A splinter group from the Sesquicentennial Committee and other interested citizens are forming a permanent group to continue the pursuit of the preservation of the depot. Modern Study Club has indicated their interest in the project and has guaranteed \$1,000 toward the moving of the building fund.

The permanent group to be formed, "the Community Heritage Society of Friona" has set as its first project the "preservation of our train station."

55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 15, 1930

The new brick and tile "flat iron" building owned by R.L. Hicks has been completed and is now in readiness to be occupied by various interests that will occupy it. The building contains five commodious rooms and faces on both Main Street and the State Highway. The central part of the building will be used as a storage room for cars, while the front part of the west side will be used by W.L. Beasley's filling station. The top of the building, being concrete, is to be used as a public skating rink.

50 YEARS AGO--AUG. 9, 1935

The temperature here during the greater part of last week was unusually high for this altitude and one thermometer registered 110 in the shade one afternoon after hanging in the hot sun all the forenoon and still hanging against the sun-heated brick wall. However, the nights have been cool enough for sleeping, and the mornings have been nice and cool.

45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 16, 1940

It now seems quite obvious that the Eighteenth Congressional District of Texas will have a candidate for Congress, in the person of our esteemed Mayor F.W. Reeve. The mayor has consented to run for that office at the solicitation of many Republicans of the district. Republican County Chairman George McLean has circulated a letter around the district calling attention to this fact.

35 YEARS AGO--AUG. 10, 1950

Lone Star Farmer awards were presented recently to three Friona boys for outstanding FFA achievement. They were Jimmie Gore, Tommy Jones and Keith Brock. Investigating officers said the driver apparently went to sleep at the wheel, since there were no skid marks before the crash, which occurred about 4 a.m.

20 YEARS AGO--AUG. 12, 1965

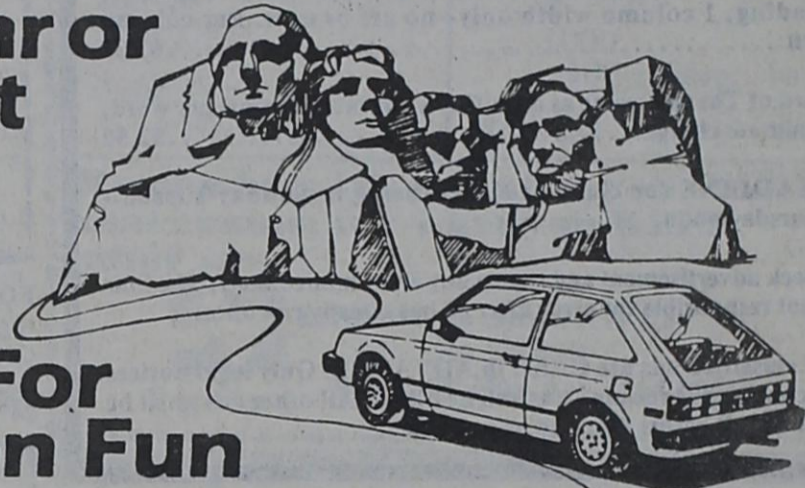

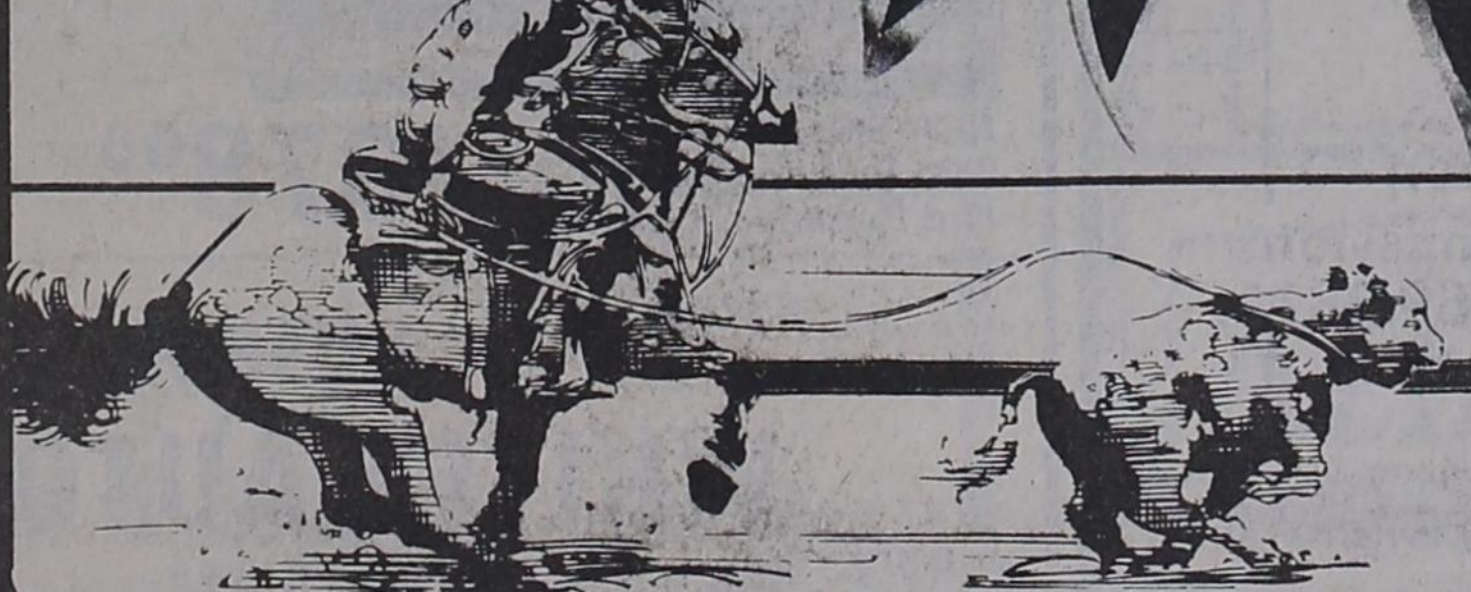

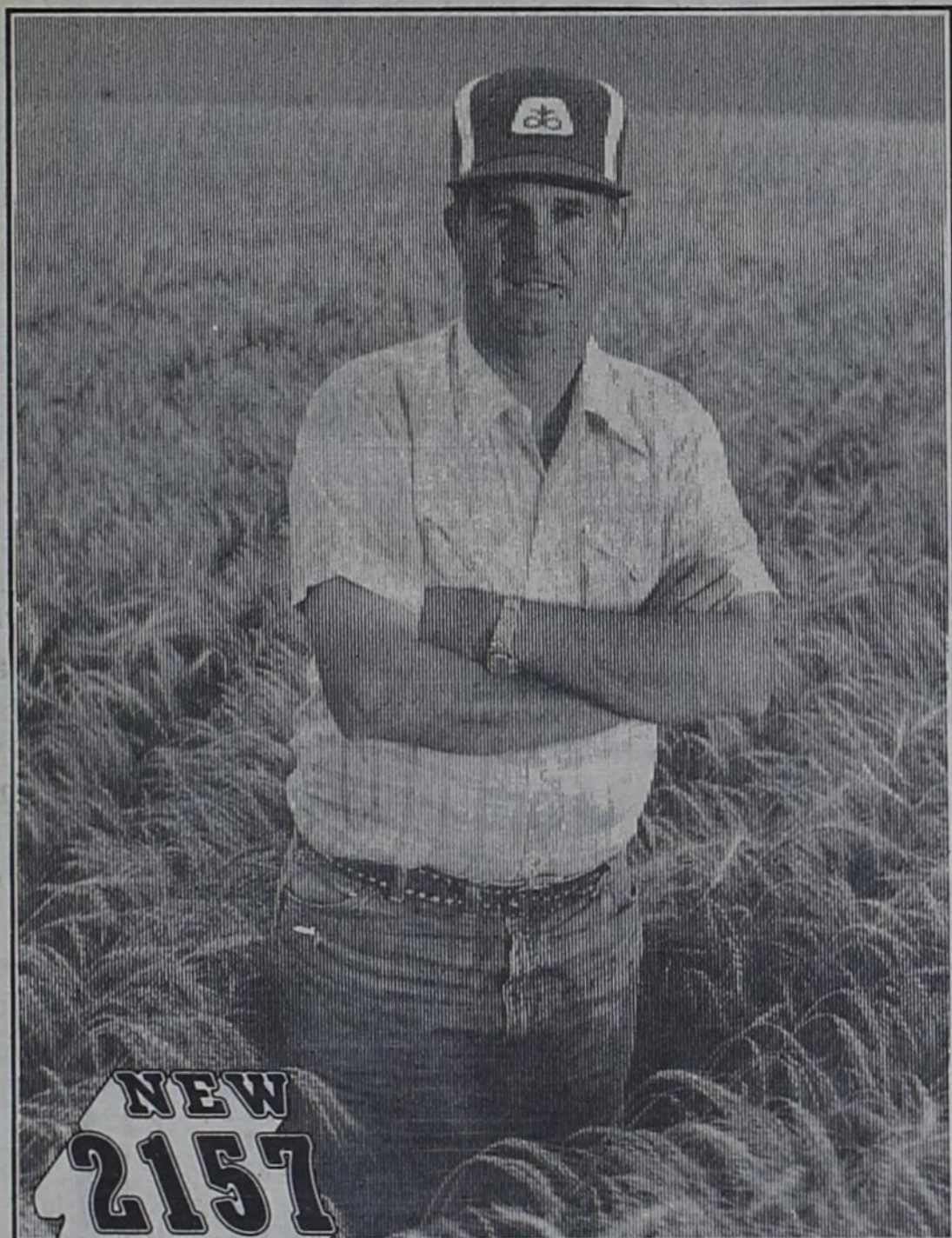
