A deep-voiced, hearty blonde, Harriet's been turning croakers into larks ever since Dorothy Lamour put her under contract to hone up the Lamour tonils back in the days when she was a jungle queen.

Here's Harriet's breakdown on some of the stars she's taught during and since her days as vocal coach at Paramount and MGM:

She tells about the time Gloria Grahame, "who's lone deaf and can't carry a tune," rushed into her studio and asked if Harriet

could teach her to sing "I'm a Gal Who Can't Say No" for an audition for a New York show.

"How much time do we have?" asked Harriet.

"Forty-five minutes," dead-panned Gloria.

Harriet's explanation of why movie stars like Yvonne de Carlo and Deanna Durbin never, in spite of their ambitions, make the grade as opera luminaries:

"To be in opera, you go in training like a prize fighter. You eat, sleep and breathe opera. Movie stars won't do it, that's all."

Movies are better than ever and heroines are more battling.

On the way are Maureen O'Hara as a sword-jabbing doll in "Sons of the Musketeers," and Jean Peters as a busy pirate in "Anne of the Indies."

"I'm an uneducated animal," Jean, her face stained mahogany and her hair oiled, told me. "And I don't know anything about sex."

The original script had her roaring lines like, "Pity the poor devil who crosses my path," but now Jean's speeches have been stripped of pomp. "I'm sorry, too," she shrugged. "I loved that corn."

John Barrymore, Jr. is following the family footsteps in straight dramatic roles, but close pals insist he'd be great as a Jerry Lewis type comic. His impersonations of Humphrey Bogart, Gary Cooper and Jimmy Stewart are the talk of the Hollywood younger set.

Overheard about a big star: "He's a two-expression actor — hat off and hat on." Go ahead, make a guess.

Switch: When "Distant Drums," Gary Cooper's next, was produced on Broadway, it had a western background and the time was in the covered-wagon days. Now the story's been twisted around and the locale will be the Florida swamps.

Drastic Topping May Shorten Life Expectancy Of Tree

Each year thousands of trees are killed or mutilated by clumsy pruning and topping, a Midland nursery operator said Saturday. Especially at this time of year, every community is invaded by self-styled "tree-experts."

These "tree-trimmers"—out to get some cash—may know little care less about the fate of your trees, the Midlander stated. But they convince unwary property owners their trees should not be allowed to grow as nature intended and an epidemic of amputations begin.

Within a couple of hours beautiful trees, that have taken years to mature, are hacked ruthlessly and saved into weird skeletons of their former selves. When a tree undergoes drastic topping, its life expectancy is shortened 18-22 per cent.

Any fear that injured trees will suffer unless pruned before the sap rises is unfounded, according to tree experts of national fame.

If a professional tree-surgeon cannot attend the trees at this time it is best to give "first-aid" and wait until he can.

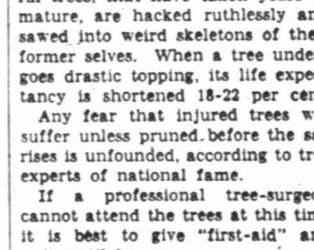

Winkler County's 'First Farmers' Seek Disposal Plant Water Deal

KERMIT—For many years Winkler has been a farmless county due to blowing sand and lack of rainfall.

But now two enterprising young men have approached the Kermit city commission with a proposed contract for water rights from the new disposal lagoons south of town. They want to irrigate a 50-acre tract with effluent from the lagoons.

They claim they could successfully become the first farmers of Winkler County.

The two applicants are Eddie Edwards, formerly of Monahans and now of Jal. N. M., and Royce Howard of Midland.

Edwards told the council that he has experimented with irrigation of

crops from city disposal plants and the effluent would change soil in two years' time from blown sand to sandy loam. At Monahans, he said, a certain type of grain without water did not sprout in 30 days. With tap water it grew to 15 inches in 30, and with effluent irrigation it grew to 42 inches in that period.

They said they plan to first grow cotton, which, with this type of irrigation, produces four bales to the acre. Edwards estimated that initial cost of the project would be \$18,000. It was estimated that 500,000 gallons of water each 24-hour period is pumped into the disposal plant.

City commissioners said they favored the plan but added permission of the owner of the site of the plant would first have to be obtained.

Three Firms Will Assist Military On Big Spring Project

PORT WORTH—(AP)—Three architectural and engineering firms will aid Army engineers in the multimillion dollar project of reopening and expanding Big Spring's Air Force Base.

Col. Delbert B. Freeman, Fort Worth District Army engineer, made the announcement Friday.

The firms are Freese and Nichols, Fort Worth consulting engineers, and two groups or combination firms, one in Big Spring and the other in Abilene.

The Big Spring firm will be Brasher, Butler, French, James, Mulvaney and Puckett. The Abilene firm is Castle, Castle, Olds, Yeatts, Allen, Knato, Tucker, Lindberg and Collier.

Big Spring's base was used for bombardier training during World War II. After deactivation, it was turned over to the city for use as a municipal airport. Most of the buildings were removed.

What the field will be used for by the Air Force when it is reactivated has not been announced.

Eleven Air Force officers and civilian engineers Friday inspected the base. Part of the group came from Scott Air Force Base, Ill., and others from Goodfellow Air Force base at San Angelo.

King Size Hailstones Batter New Orleans

NEW ORLEANS—(AP)—Huge hailstones pelted parts of New Orleans Saturday, smashing greenhouse windows, damaging signs and stripping trees of foliage.

The Weather Bureau said it received reports some of the hailstones were as large as three to four inches in diameter. Other reports compared them in size to chicken eggs, golf balls and ice cubes.

Heaviest damage was in the uptown area bounded roughly by Washington Avenue, South Claiborne, Carrollton and the Mississippi River.

Fourth Atom Spy Defendant Assessed 15-Year Prison Term

NEW YORK—(AP)—Four convicted atom spies for Russia were held in various prisons here Saturday pending a Washington decision on where they will pay their penalties.

David Greenglass, the spy who talked, drew the mildest term. He was sentenced to 15 years.

This compared with sentences of death the previous day for Mr. and Mrs. Julius Rosenberg and 30 years for Morton Sobell.

Federal Judge Irving R. Kaufman described the spying activities of Greenglass as loathsome but said the aid he gave in convicting the others must be recognized with a lighter sentence.

The Rosenbergs are expected to be sent to Sing Sing Prison in Ossining, N. Y., for execution in the electric chair.

Greenglass and Sobell are slated to serve their terms in a federal prison, as yet unidentified.

The Rosenbergs are scheduled to die the week of May 31, but they have filed notice of appeal for a new trial.

This action serves as a virtual automatic stay of execution pending the decision of the U. S. Court of Appeals. Defense counsel has indicated the case will be carried to the U. S. Supreme Court if the appeals court rejects their plea.

Fred F. Adair, Jr., Convicted Rapist, Is Judged Insane

DALLAS—(AP)—Fred Felix Adair, Jr., sentenced to die for rape, Friday was judged insane. He will be sent to a state mental institution.

A jury deliberated about an hour before returning the verdict. It was the second sanity trial for the 27-year-old Adair. The first ended in a hung jury, 11 to one for a verdict of sane.

Adair, who had dozed, apparently indifferent, during both hearings showed, his first emotion when the verdict was read. He jumped from his chair and embraced his pretty, blonde wife who cried with joy at the word "insane."

The verdict means Adair cannot be electrocuted now but may be executed if, in the future, he is found sane.

Adair is under indictments for two other rapings and three burglaries.

He was convicted of the raping of an attractive Vickery housewife as her two children watched.

Before Adair's arrest, a phantom rapist had terrorized Dallas women for almost a year. He was arrested on Thanksgiving Day, 1949.

Truman's Migratory Labor Panel Declares No Braceros Needed

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman's Migratory Labor Commission Saturday said importation of Mexican and other foreign farm workers is unnecessary.

The report made public by the President contends the domestic labor supply would be entirely adequate if wages and living standards of agricultural workers were improved.

The five-man commission, appointed June 3, 1950, by Truman, gave its findings and recommendations based on 12 public hearings held throughout the nation.

It urged changes in "administration and legislation" to solve the problem, including more federal aid to the states.

Entry of foreign agricultural workers, largely Mexican, has depressed wages of competing American citizens and created serious health situations, the commission asserted.

It added that many of the aliens drifted into non-farm jobs, lowering average pay in those occupations.

Truman noted that the commission's recommendations now are up to "Congress, the executive agencies and the general public" for action.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla.—(AP)—Mrs. E. Biermer Saturday complained to police her little boy was stolen sometime during the night.

The last time she saw him, she said, he was standing by the walk in front of her home, holding a light. He was dressed in black pants and a yellow shirt with black polka dots. He weighed about 75 pounds and was worth about \$200. He was made of cast iron.

Martial Law Ends Sunday In Tehran

TEHRAN, Iran—(AP)—Premier Hussein Ala announced Saturday that martial law in Tehran, imposed March 20 following the assassination of Premier Gen. Ali Razmara, would end at 6 a.m. Sunday.

The decision to lift military rule from Iran's capital was made at a special meeting of the cabinet Saturday. Its end was decided, Ala said, because law and order had been restored to Tehran.

Martial law is to continue, however, in the seven areas of Iran's southern oil fields, where workers for the British-controlled Anglo-Iranian Oil Company still are on strike for higher wages and better living conditions.

Cafe Installs Bulletin Board For Benefit Of Oil Workers

Messages were so numerous a bulletin board was erected at the Jomac Cafe, where many oil field workers eat in Midland.

It's known as the "call" board.

Any customer may use it. Notifications range from "roughnecks wanted" to private telephone numbers to call.

Mrs. Fay Trantham, manager of the cafe, said she and her employees were flooded with messages to deliver to customers, most of them oil field workers, and something had to be done.

Rayford Hurley, morning shift manager, kept urging the boss to put up some kind of a bulletin

board.

"One of my drillers got the ball rolling," Mrs. Trantham said. "He got the blackboard and we painted it."

"We got chalk for the messages to be written with and then we were in the message business. We had a call board."

The cafe is not in competition with the Texas Employment Commission. The board was installed as customer service. Its use in locating vitally-needed oil field workers just came naturally.

Messages on the board are two-way—worker or employer.

The growth of the oil industry

near Midland can be gauged with the increase of business at the cafe where the call board is kept.

More and more roughnecks, floor-men, motormen, drillers and others began to drop in to eat. And the last two weeks have seen the greatest call for food by hungry oil men in history here.

"Will you give this note to Johnny Jones, driller for Tex-Harvey," a customer would ask the waitress or cashier?

"Will you tell Smitty we need a derrickman, bud," another customer would ask of the manager?

More notes, more requests, more messages!

Clearing House

Jomac wanted to oblige its heavy-eating oilfield worker trade. So the cafe served as a clearing house for the notes, messages and requests.

The call board idea was born.

It stays pretty full of entries and is praised by the oil field trade. It is a popular customer-service, winning friends and more customers for the cafe.

Mrs. Trantham, the manager, finds the oil field workers' trade interesting as she learns about the cafe business in West Texas. She formerly operated a resort in the Ozarks.

The preliminary scholastic census report also is the highest ever recorded.

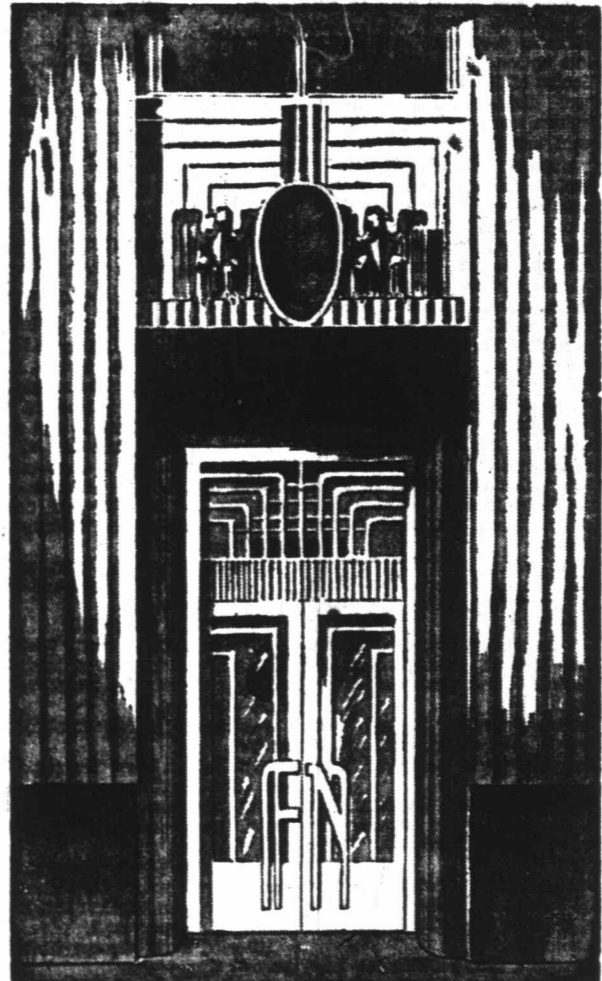

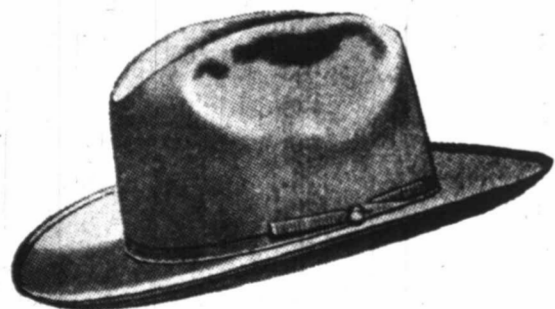

Midland Women In Service

Along with other American communities, Midland has its share of women in the service. From an exclusively war-time basis the women's services—the WAVES, WAC's, SPARS, WAF's and Marines—have grown into organizations which operate in peace-time as well. National emergencies and the resulting need for military preparedness gradually have converted women's military organizations into careers rather than emergency measures.

The feminine branches of the service are operated similarly. The WAF's will serve as an example. Entrance requirements here are simple but strict. A prospective WAF must be somewhere between 18 and 34 inclusive, must be single at the time of enlistment and must be a high school graduate and a citizen of the United States. Also, she must pass her physical examination and I. Q. test. Enlistments are for four, five or six years.

Once accepted, a woman entering the Air Force is assigned to Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio for indoctrination training designed to orient her into the ways of the organization. She will not receive any form of combat training, of course, but otherwise her training parallels that of the men recruits.

Throughout the basic training course, films, maps, charts and other training aids are used extensively and field trips are taken regularly. Leisure time activities include tennis, volley ball, softball, swimming, organized teams, singing and dramatic groups.

After basic training, the recruit is sent to a school for technical training in some special type of work. Lowry

Air Force Base in Denver, Colo., instructs photographers, supply technicians, intelligence specialists, finance technical clerks, statistical clerks and tabulating machine operators. Weather observers, parachute riggers and instrument mechanics are assigned to Chanute Air Force Base in Rantoul, Ill., while Keesler Air Force Base in Biloxi, Miss., trains control tower operators, radio operators and mechanics and radar mechanics. Lastly, the Francis E. Warren Base in Cheyenne, Wyo., is the training ground for clerk-typists, stenographers and teletype operators. Recruits with leadership ability and good educational background may be sent instead to the Officer Candidate School at Lackland, graduating with commissions as second lieutenants.

Following graduation from her technical training or officer candidate school, the recruit is ready to begin her "career" as a member of the service.

Three preliminary steps for prospective service members are shown below. June Higdon, the service-woman-to-be, is a Midlander of several years standing. She is the program chairman of Nu Phi Mu Sorority and a member of the legislative and finance committee of the Business and Professional Women's Club.

Another service-minded Midlander, not pictured, is Joyce Beasley. Miss Beasley will leave Tuesday for Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio to begin training as a WAF. At present she is employed by the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

West Texas Pioneer Proves 'Young As You Feel' Saying

Mrs. Mary Butler is 80 years young. And to prove it "the grandmother of West Texas art" is going to have her first one-woman exhibit beginning April 15 in the Palette Club Studio.

Mrs. Butler is a true Texas pioneer. As she puts it, "I've been going west and growing up with the country."

She was born in a schoolhouse near Dallas while her parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Card, were enroute with 30 other families from Tennessee to Springtown, near Weatherford. Mary's birth forced the Cards and the company physician to drop out of the group. The other families moved on, but the Cards forgot about Springtown. They stayed where they were until Mary was two years old, when they moved to Fort Worth.

Fort Worth in those days, Mrs. Butler said, was far from being a city. There was no railroad and no lumber yard and her father had to hew the logs for their house.

But Fort Worth was Mary's home until she was 13 years old. One of her earliest memories was of walking up the bed of the Trinity River to get to the town three miles away. Educational facilities were not lacking though. Mr. Card and three other families hired a teacher to live in the community and instruct the neighborhood children.

In 1884, the family moved to Abilene which was then half the size of Stanton. Mary's father started a dairy and engaged Harry Butler to help run it. In 1889 Mary and Harry were married and moved to Lynn County to take up ranching.

The ranch was 84 miles from town and Mrs. Butler was one of three women in the county, but life was never dull. She and her husband made wire fences, built tanks and pull pumps and took care of all the cattle. One day a week, with Harry's help, she did the washing and ironing.

She remembers getting up many a night to entertain strangers. In that day, she explained, no one thought of locking a house. It was left open to help the stranger in need. Often people would drop in, fire up the wood cook stove, eat, clean up the dishes and then cut enough wood to replace what they had used before going their way.

The Butler's first son was born after three and one-half years and the second son was born when the Butlers moved to Scurry County.

Builds One Of First Houses

Later the family moved to Lubbock County where they built one of the first houses and helped organize the town, partly so they wouldn't have to go to El Paso for all legal matters.

Lubbock developed rapidly when two early leaders, Frank Wheelock and Jim Bandy, offered five busi-
