LAFAYETTE, ALA. -(AP)- J. Thomas "Cotton Tom" Heffin, 82, former U. S. senator and one of Alabama's most story political figures, died at his home here Sunday.

The former senator and congressman, whose political career ended in 1930 after his break with the Democratic Party two years earlier over the presidential nomination of Al Smith, had been in declining, health several years. 
