He uttered his final warning: The free world is "doomed to destruction" if it fails to crush completely the Communist threat in Korea.

The five-star general wound up three days of virtu-

ally constant testimony at 6 p. m. with a blast at President Truman, denying he ever violated a presidential order **Decision On** and declaring he never got a firm, workable plan from Washington to carry on the Korean war.



Such things as change-over from one reel in a projector to a succeeding reel in another projector, without the audience having an inkling that it's being done, requires hand action and coordination faster than a gnat can bat an eye. Threaded Through Machine

There are 16 image frames to foot of the 35-millimeter film. races through two projector heads at 90 feet a minute and is threaded through the machine, upside down

Eighteen frames of film separate the projector head that emits the sound and the head above that throws the image to the screen. These are coordinated perfectly as

they meet at the screen The projectionist's first cue for a reel change-over is a bell that rings in the booth while 120 feet of film remain on the spool. Then, with hands on switches, the projectionst watches the upper right corner of the screen to watch for another ue that audiences seldom see. For four frames of film a dot appears in that corner. Quickly, almost a reflex action, the projectionist makes the change-over to another reel in another projector.

Reserve Strength Is Vital

Not long ago somebody likened the U.S. preparedseas effort to a boxer whipping himself into shape.

Normally the boxer knows he'll have the fight he's training for, unless something unforeseen turns up. But would he be able to get and keep a fine fighting edge if he was told that reaching that peak might be the very thing which would cause the fight to be put off or canceled?

The chances are he would not. Yet that latter situation almost exactly parallels America's defense effort. We are in the process of steeling ourselves for a fight in the hope that by doing so we may never have to make that

Not too surprisingly, we don't apply ourselves to this muscle-toughening job with constant fervor. When the battle goes against us in Korea, we get worried and show signs we're ready for any sacrifice-higher taxes, stiffer military draft, economic controls. When things are brighter, we relax in the sun of our continuing prosperity and try to slough off the world's ills.

But in our hearts we must know that the essential immaturity of this approach to our dilemma is an advantage to our potential enemy-the Russians. If it is true, as our best experts believe, that the Soviet Union is impressed only by a posture of genuine strength, then we must present that posture to them in order to have any hope of averting war.

The example of the boxer is not quite a perfect parallel. We need not acquire that final fighting edge to impress the Russians with our power. We need not have many millions of men under arms and tens of thousands of tanks, planes and guns ready for instant use.



Roster By 40,000

WASHINGTON -(P)- The Air Force will add more than 40,000 women by June of next year.

This will raise the Women's Air Force strength from the present 7,000 level to about 48,000, of whom 4,000 will be officers and 44,000 enlisted air women.

The Air Force plans to commission 200 officers monthly beginning in June. At the same time the enlistment quota will be jumped from 480 each month to 1,700. Thereafter enlistments will rise to a projected level of some 4,000 monthly during the first half of 1952.

Commissions in the WAF will be offered to women whether or not they have previous military service Applicants must be at least 24 and not more than 32 years old. They must have a college degree and three years of business or professional experience, preferably in a supervisory


