Friona Teenager Is Rescued By Firemen

THE ENTIRE NATION has been in a state of shock this week, due to the untimely explosion during the launch of the space shuttle *Challenger*, which cost the lives of the six astronauts and the teacher.

The tragedy seemed to have been compounded somewhat due to the extra attention given this particular launch, with the inclusion of Christa McAuliffe, who was the first teacher included on a shuttle launch.

The mishap was witnessed by millions of Americans on live television, including youngsters in Mrs. McAuliffe's school in New Hampshire. This proved to be quite a traumatic experience for not only these youngsters, but for others across the country.

And as the investigation into the cause of the explosion continues, the debate has been raised as to the need for manned space probes, when the loss of life is a distinct possibility.

Personally, we have always admired the space program and realized the countless benefits that our nation has derived from the program, in the case of advanced technology which has given us everything from micro-computers to solid-state television which rarely ever needs a repairman. Medical technology has also been a great beneficiary of the technological advancements stemming from the space program.

Have you thought about the Voyager II Spacecraft, now in its ninth year since launch? The TV cameras aboard Voyager have sent back our most comprehensive photos of the planets Jupiter, Saturn and Uranus.

Not only do you have to applaud the technology which brought about the spacecraft's rendezvous with Uranus, a distance of three billion miles, but the very fact that the space probe's television camera is still clicking away, and that the Jet Propulsion Laboratory's "TV receivers" from this great distance, have functioned with such perfection.

Of course, the Voyager's success speaks well for the unmanned portion of our space program, but there have been many experiments and discoveries connected with the program which would not have been possible without the Manned Space Program.

If we had let the earlier tragedy of 1967, in which three astronauts were killed on the launch pad, to have ended the manned program, our nation never would have landed men on the moon. This success was a springboard to the nation's current impressive space record.

We would hope that NASA officials will soon be able to pinpoint the cause of the explosion so the shuttle program can be resumed quickly.

One of the side affects of the current "hold" on the launches will be that we will miss the chance for the shuttle astronauts to study and photograph Halley's Comet, which was to have been a project of a March launch.

This would have given the world its best pictures and data on the comet, which is yet to reach its zenith, with the addition of its tail after it circles the sun.

Participants in the space program are well aware of the dangers involved. They know that for a mission to succeed, everything must function like clockwork. Various members of the program have mentioned the fact that they had been "prepared" for such a tragedy as happened this week, due to the fact that they work so close to the "edge" throughout the program.

The involvement of civilians may be curtailed somewhat, due to this week's accident. But this should not affect the overall space program.

A Friona teenager, Lisa DeWeese, 13, has been hospitalized in Amarillo this week following an early-morning fire which trapped her in her bedroom for several minutes Monday.

Miss DeWeese suffered second degree burns over 20 per cent of her body. She also suffered smoke inhalation, which gave her 25 per cent carbon monoxide poisoning.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glendel Jones of 806 Woodland.

Jones, who is the distributor for the Amarillo Globe-News in Friona, said he had just got up, at about 3:30 a.m., and plugged in his coffee pot.

"I went back and laid down in bed for a few minutes, when suddenly I heard Lisa scream. (Her room is off the kitchen, across the house from the adults' bedroom.) When I got to the kitchen, there was a big ball of fire in the room. It just hit me in the face," Jones said.

He said he went outside and around to the girl's bedroom window and broke out the glass with his fist. He had Lisa by the arm, but could not pull her through the window due to a small board which had held the glass in place.

At about this point, Jones, who was still in his underwear, decided to turn in the fire alarm. Since the Jones' telephone was in the kitchen, he jumped in his pickup and drove the five blocks to the police station and gave the alarm.

Friona patrolman Robert Stalhut returned to the Jones residence with Glendel and helped him until the fire department responded, which was in just a matter of minutes.

"I took the garden hose and started to spray water into the bedroom window. Lisa had rolled herself up in a blanket and was lying on the floor. She said she felt the water spraying on her. I think the fact that she wrapped up was what saved her," Jones said.

Members of the Friona Fire Department arrived, and with their smoke masks, were able to extricate Miss DeWeese and placed her on a stretcher. She was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital where Dr. Paul Spring treated her and sent her on to Amarillo.

Lisa was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital, where she was placed in the intensive care unit.

Jones said that Lisa's burns, a few of which may approach third degree status, will not require skin grafting. However, she will require therapy, since skin which grows back must be exercised if on an arm or leg. Her burns were on her face, hands, arms and legs.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Jones were able to get out without suffering any burns. Glendel did suffer some cuts on his hands and arms, from breaking out the window and attempting to extricate the youngster.

Several things worked in favor of getting the youth out. One was

the fact that the warm weather allowed Jones to be able to use his garden hose until the firemen arrived. Another was the quick response by members of the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

Jones said the only thing he could blame the fire on was an extension cord which was plugged into the coffee pot, which must have caught fire. The fire quickly spread to ceiling tiles in the girl's bedroom, which were made of a styrofoam-material and were highly flammable.

Some of the ceiling tiles fell onto the girl's bed, and this was the cause of some of her burns.

As of late Wednesday, Lisa was moved out of intensive care and into a room at Northwest Texas Hospital. Glendel said that she had improved tremendously, and that her doctor felt that her lungs were clearing up pretty well.

"We feel that we are extremely lucky. We also are real grateful for all the prayers and concern shown by the folks of Friona. Friona is just one big family, and you forget that most people are concerned about their neighbors until something like this happens. I'll try to get around to thanking everyone in person, but if I miss them, please understand how grateful we are," Jones said.

On a very short notice, Slade Clark did the delivery of Jones' Amarillo papers on Monday morning, and has continued to fill in for him in this regard.

Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie had the reserve champion in the sheep show, also a Suffolk.

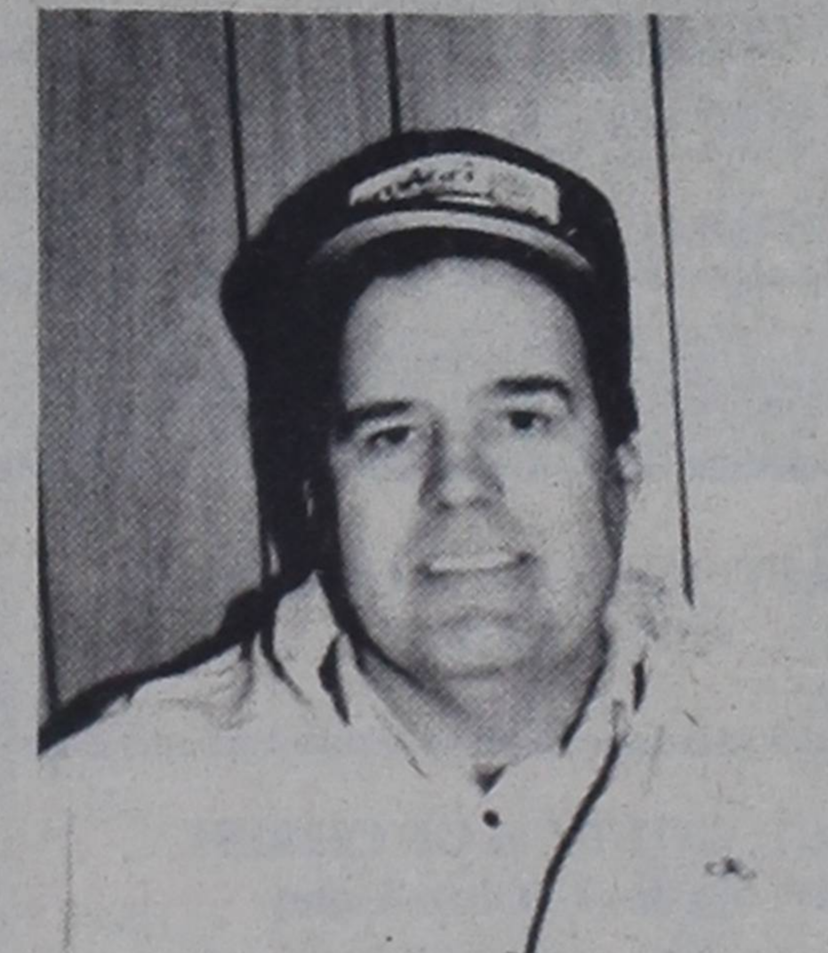
Don Murphy of Bovina has authorized this newspaper to announce his candidacy for the office of Parmer County Commissioner.

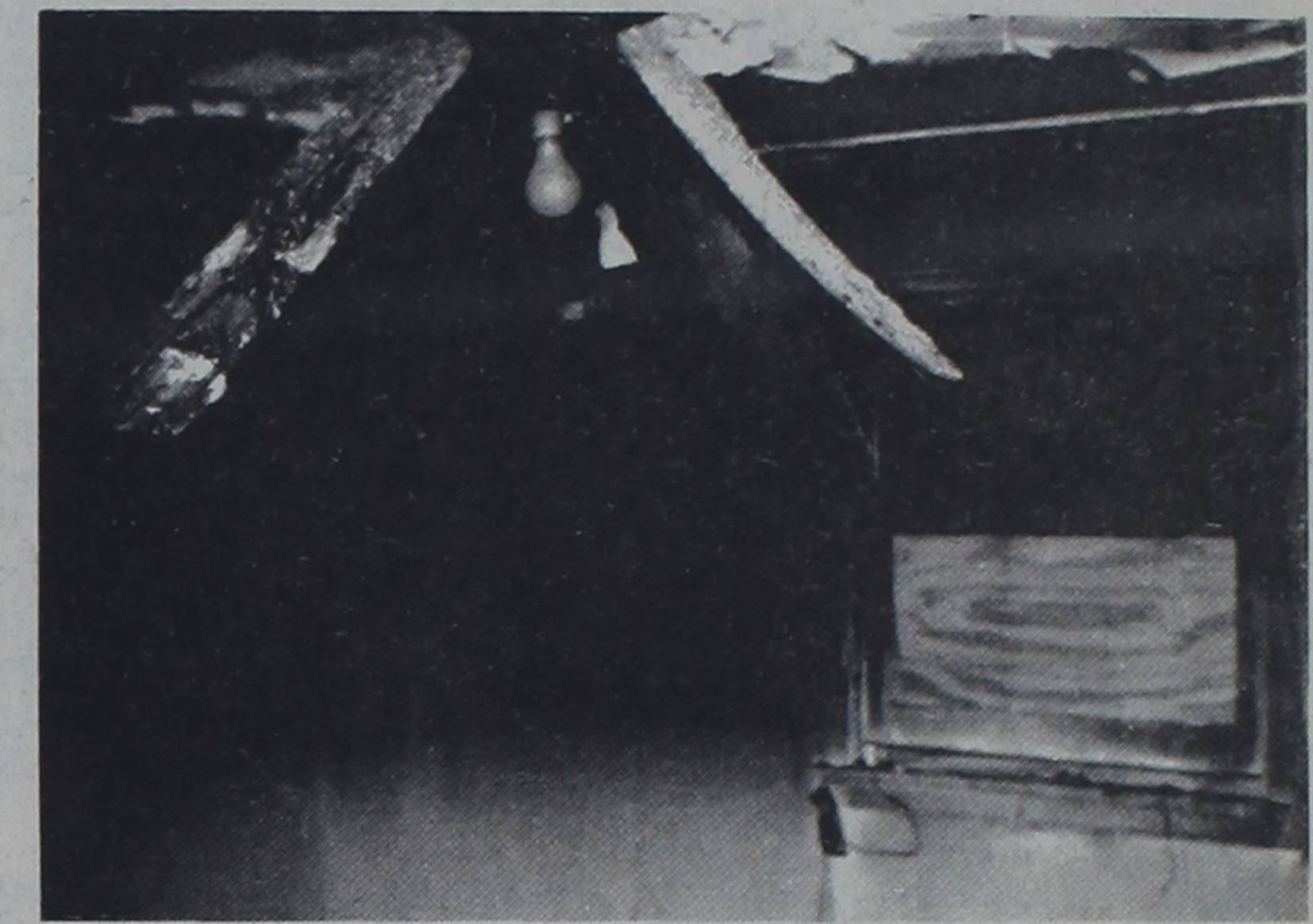
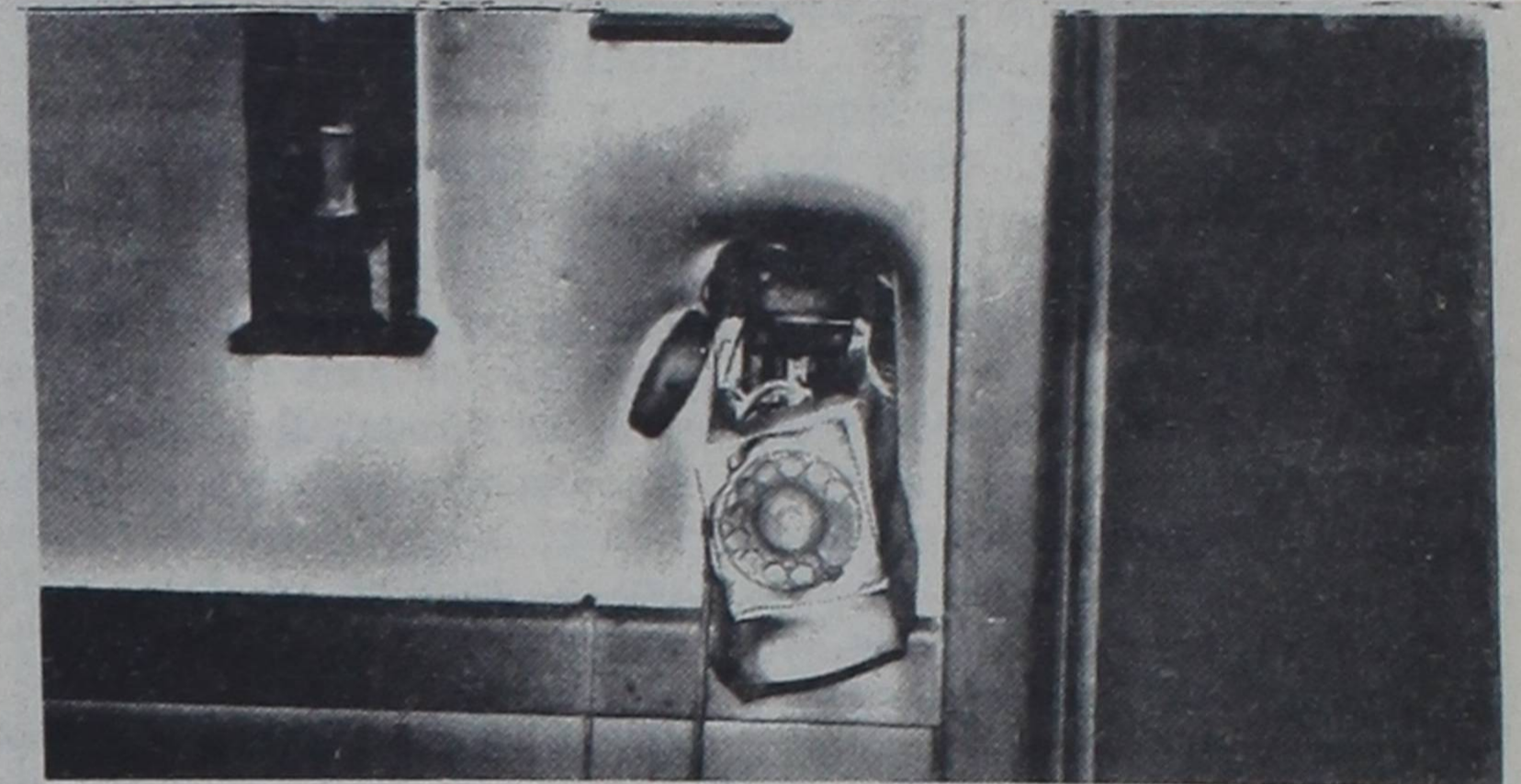
Tom has lived all of his life in Bovina and he and his wife Sandy have three children, Kim, Pat and Todd.

A.T. (BUSTER) MORGAN

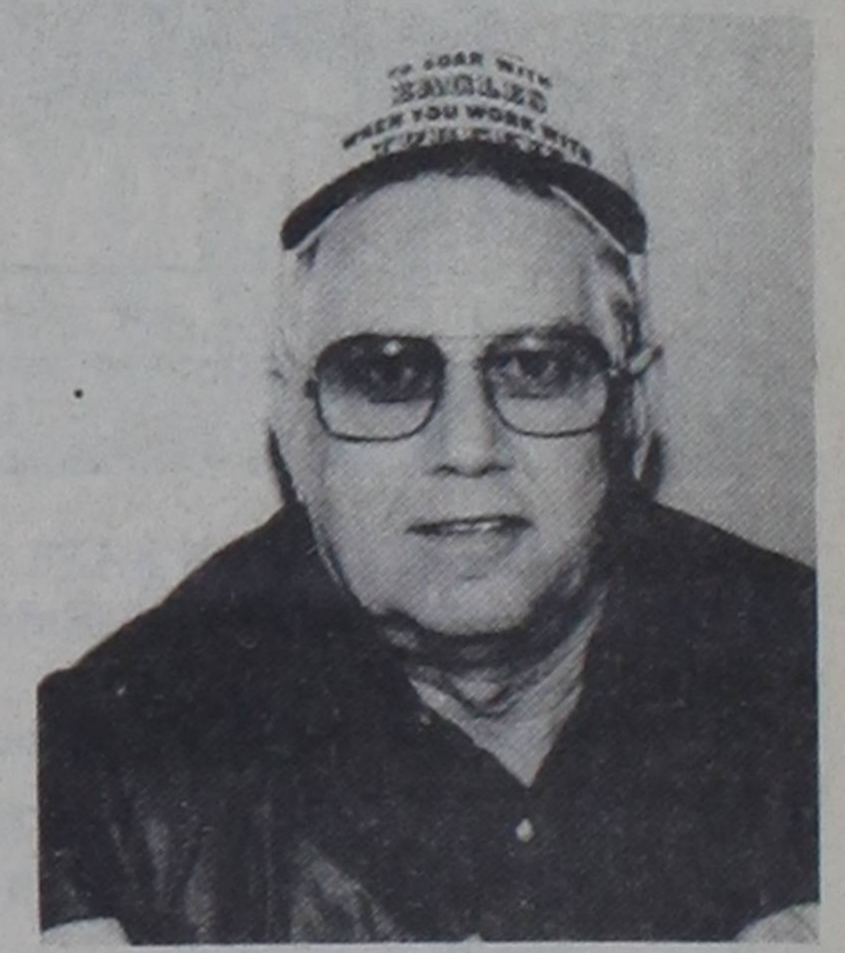

10 YEARS AGO--JAN. 25, 1976

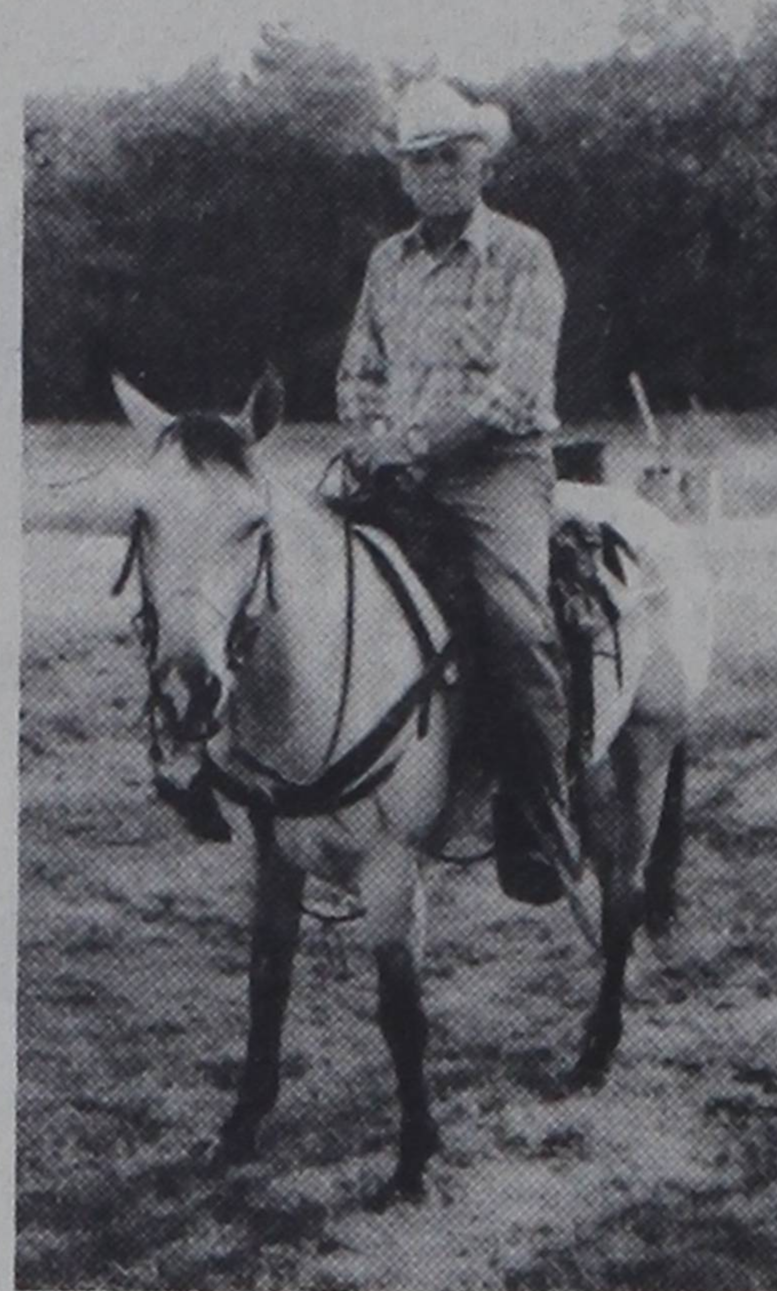

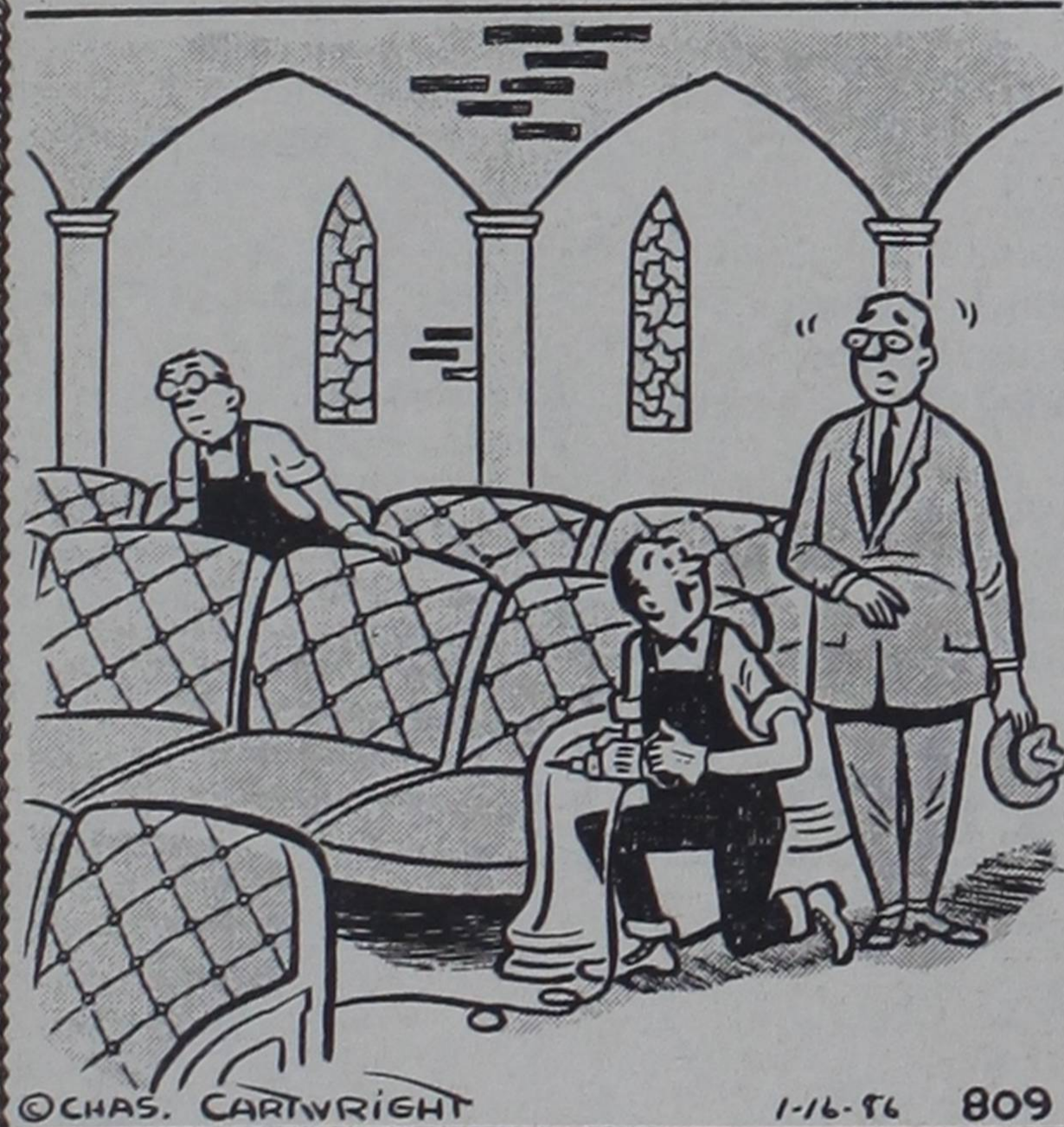

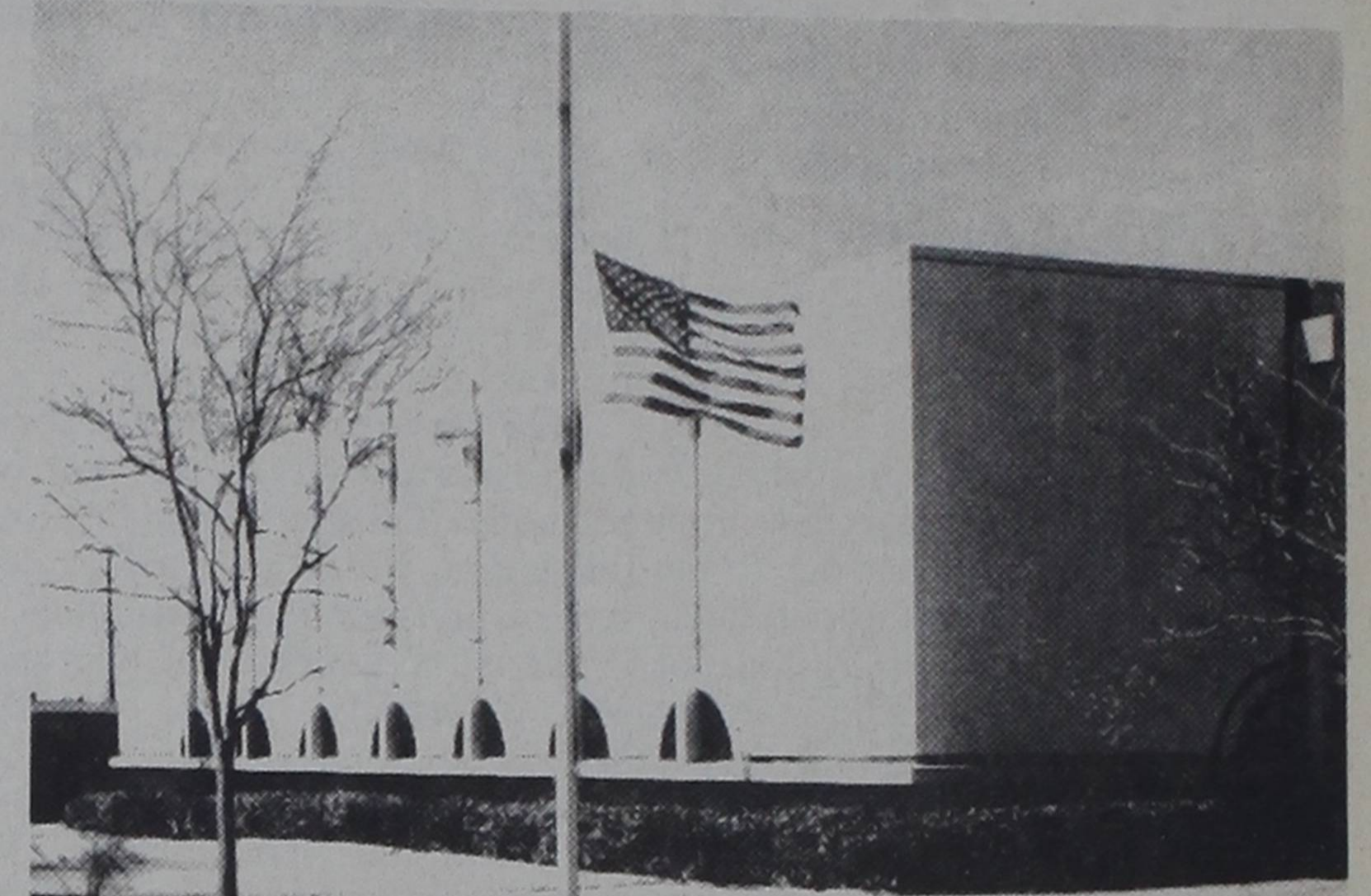

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Squaws Take Over Second Half Lead

The Friona Squaws scored a pair of super wins during the past week, over first half district champion Dimmitt and runnerup Tulia, to take the lead in the race for the second-half title.

The Squaws made a great comeback and then had to hang on for dear life to down Dimmitt here last Friday, 43-42. Then on Tuesday, the team defeated Tulia on the Hornets' home court, 49-44.

The wins left the Squaws with a 14-8 season record, and 3-0 in second-half district play. The team has three district games remaining, two at home and one on the road.

Speaking of comebacks, the team made one Tuesday night at Tulia, trailing the Hornets by six points at one point before their big fourth-quarter rally.

The Squaws trailed, 35-31 at the end of the third quarter, and later it was 39-33 before the team made its rally. Mika Maddox, Lacye Osborn and Kelly Wied made some timely free throws for the Squaws as they came from behind and took the lead in the final minutes.

Friona hit 17 of 27 free throws in the game, and connected on 15 of 20 free throws in the second half. The Squaws outscored the Hornets, 18-9 during the pressure-packed fourth quarter for the win. Friona made an even 50 per cent of its shots from the field, another big factor in the win.

"Our players went to the line time after time in the fourth quarter, and the crowd noise was terrific. But they came through in the clutch by making the free throws," said Squaw coach Vicki Hatton, who called the win a "total team effort."

The Squaws were not able to use their pressing defense to their benefit on Tuesday, because two players, Kerry Cain and Ronda Ratcliff, got into foul trouble. Both managed to finish without fouling out of the game, however.

Mika Maddox was the scoring leader for the Squaws with 14 points. Kerry Cain scored 12 and Lacye Osborn 11. Teresa Tinner led Tulia with 15 points.

The Squaws found themselves trailing visiting Dimmitt, 16-4 early in the second quarter of their game here last Friday, before starting another rally.

In an unusual scoring sequence, Dimmitt outscored the Squaws, 14-4 in the first quarter, and then Friona outscored the Bobbies, 19-9 in the second quarter, to leave the game all tied at 23-all at halftime.

Lacye Osborn came in to score six second-quarter points, including four of four free throws. Her final pair of free throws tied the score 15 seconds before halftime.

Misses Osborn, Cain, Shannon Atwell, Wied and Maddox each scored baskets in the third quarter, as the Squaws built a 33-29 lead over the Bobbies. Friona's good defensive play held Dimmitt to just six points in the quarter.

At one point in the fourth quarter, it appeared that the Squaws might put the game on ice. Miss Wied sank a jump shot, and then made a layup on a fast break for a 37-29 Friona lead, its longest of the game, with 5:29 left to play.

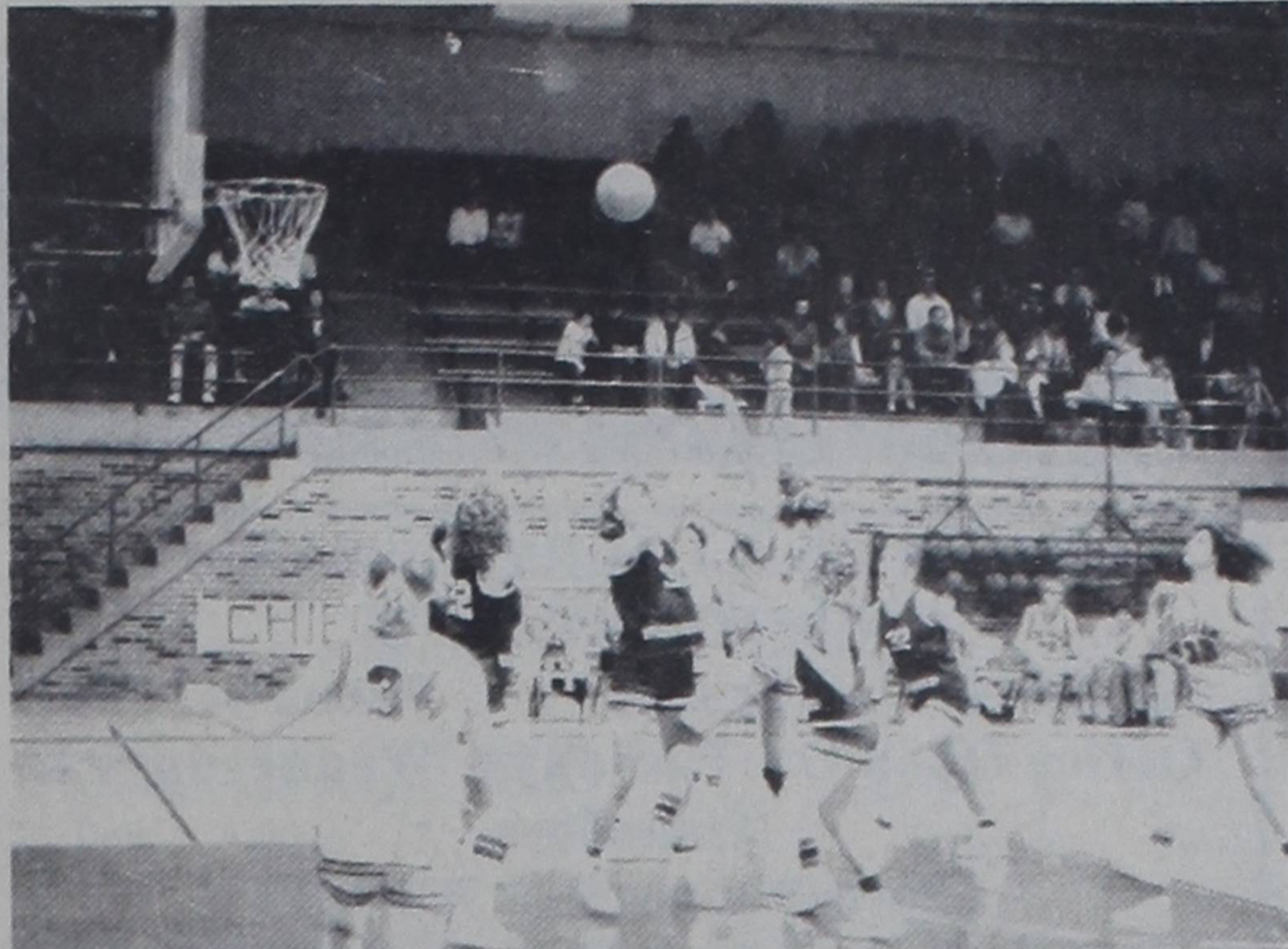
But during the next three minutes of clock time, the team missed some good chances to score, when they could have put Dimmitt further down. The Bobbies, meanwhile, chopped away at the lead, tying the game at 37-all with 2:12 to play.

Ronda Ratcliff's jump shot had given Friona a 39-37 lead at the 1:45 mark, but Dimmitt countered to tie the score.

Miss Ratcliff came back with a short jump shot off the assist by Miss Wied for a 41-39 Friona lead, and with just 45 seconds left, she made a follow shot of a missed layup on a fast break, for a 43-39 lead.

But the game was far from over. Dimmitt scored a quick basket for a 43-41 score, and with four seconds left, the Bobbies drew a foul from Friona and Becky Schroeder went to the line.

Miss Schroeder made her first shot, but then after Dimmitt called a time out, she missed the tying

first recipient of the Top Hand Award in November, 1976, presented by the Amarillo Chamber for leadership in Golden Spread agriculture.

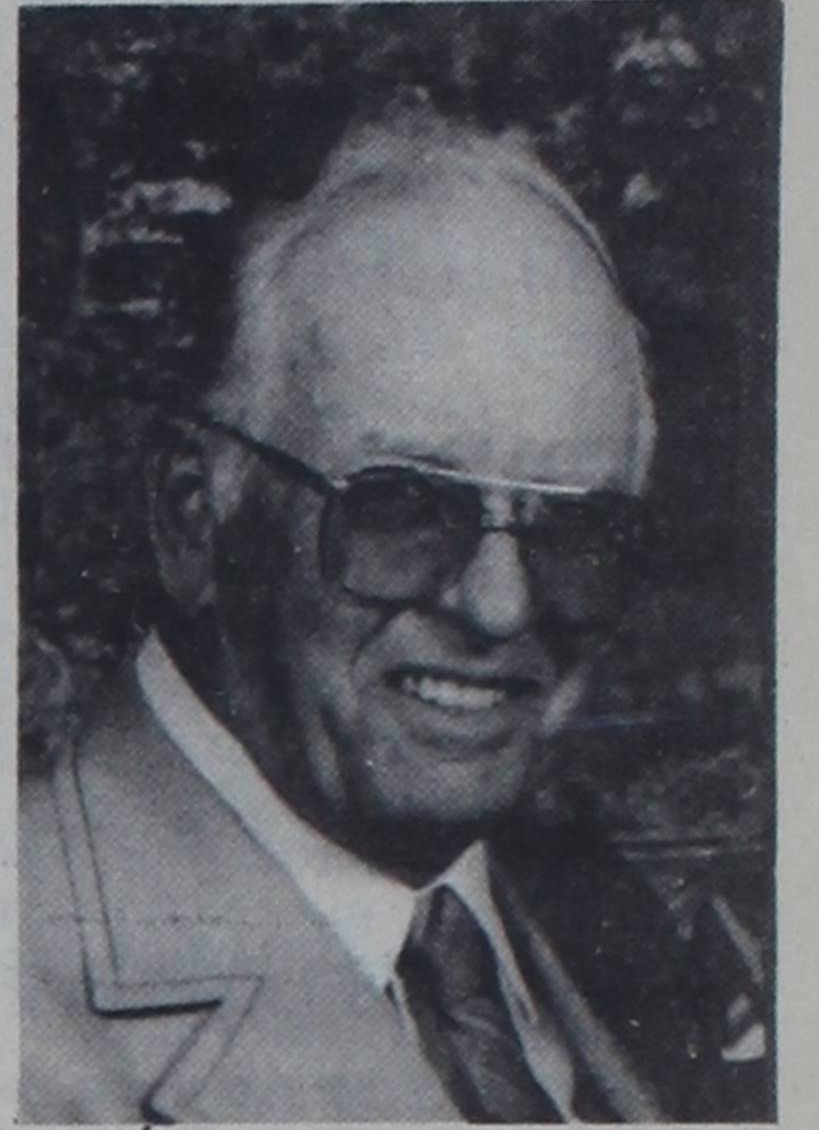

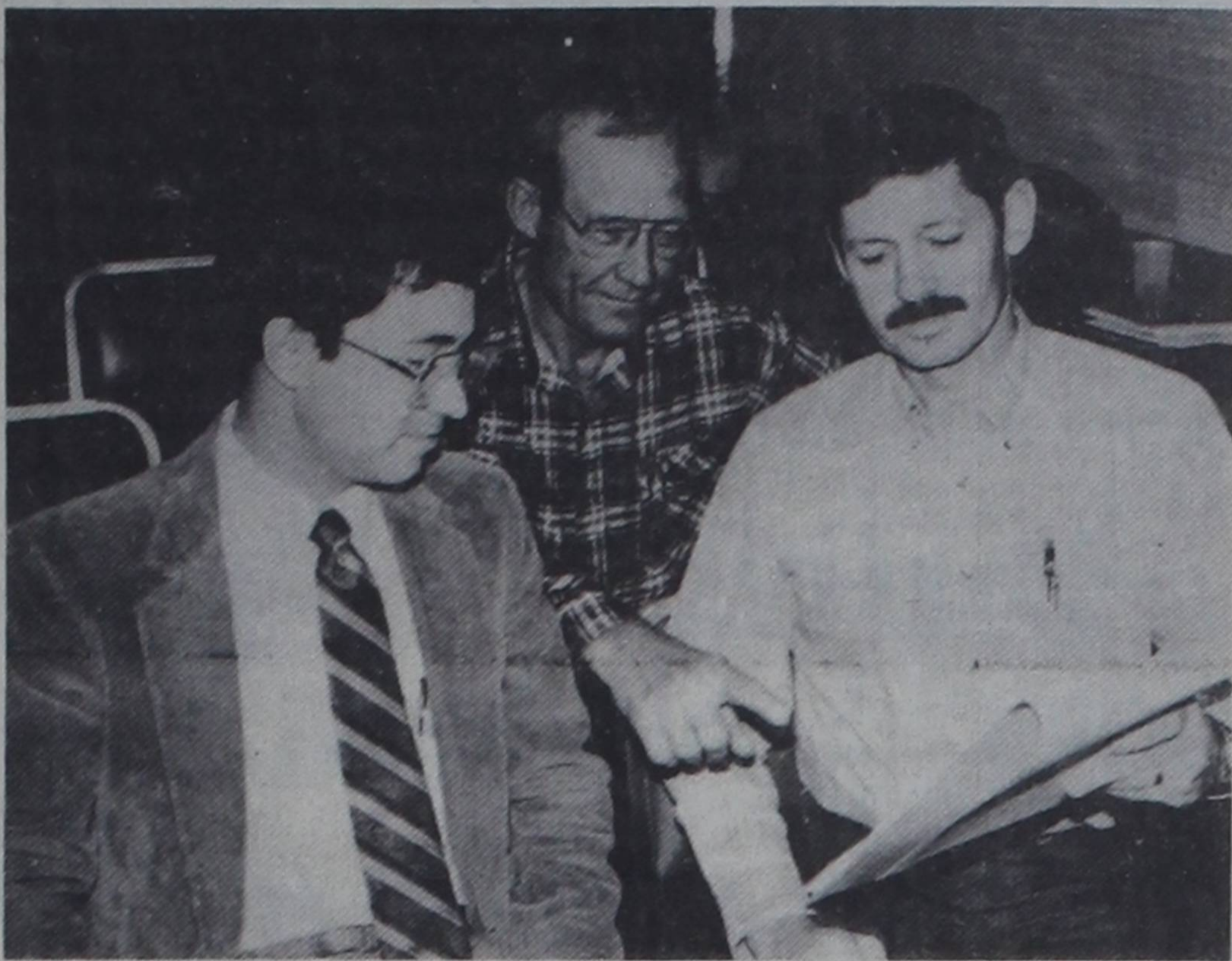


A.W. (DUB) ANTHONY, JR.
