U. S. Casualties In Korea Now 66,816

WASHINGTON -(A)- Annou U. S. casualties in Korea now total 66,816, up 1,293 over a week ago. The latest figures, released Wednesday, cover casualties whose families were notified through May 18.

Future Of Iran's Oil

While American lawmakers focus on the future of war-torn Korea, a struggle of potentially much greater strategic importance is taking place in Iran.

No thoughtful western observers were happy when Premier Razmara of Iran was assassinated a few months ago. They foresaw a period of economic and political strife-Communist-inspired-which could disrupt Iran's heavy oil shipments to Britain and other Western countries.

Their worst fears are being realized. Razmara's death has been followed by internal turbulence that bodes ill for the West.

The properties of the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company, in which Britain was the majority stockholder, have been mationalized. Strikes in the field and other difficulties have slowed the oil flow to a trickle. Premier Mossadegh, successor to Razmara, has revealed the insecurity of his government by publicly expressing fears for his life.

How serious all this is for the West can be seen by resort to a few elemental statistics... Iran's annual oil output of more than 30,000,000 tons represents more than a third of the Middle East's total production. Anglo-Iranian's Abadan refinery, largest in the world, itself turns out 25,000,000 tons of refined oil.

These properties supply 25 per cent of Britain's total petroleum products, and they also fuel a substantial part of the industrial and military machine in other western



Living Cost Spurt Is Dying Down, Index Discloses

WASHINGTON-(AP)-The sharp 10-month living cost spurt is dying down and a government expert Thursday forecast a period of at least temporary stability.

"We'll probably have a stable situation for a while, at least until we see what food prices are going to do as the new crops come in." That would indicate little change for the next lew months, but Clague would make no predictions on how long living costs may stay pegged. He did say there has been a general leveling of prices, and added that the government's price wage controls have helped stall the living cost spiral.



Some Folks Are Sensitive To Caffeine In Beverages

It is not unusual perhaps particor even more. This must be quite a strain on the budget today, and toms. those who drink so much also should consider the possible effect

on their health. Coffee, tea, and some other beverages contain an active drug known as caffeine. This drug has known actions on the heart, the blood vessels, and the nervous system.

Indeed caffeine is sometimes used in medicine to produce some specially desired effects on these organs or systems. It seems strange, then, that it can be taken so freely in drinks without having more pro-

Coffee (or tea) as ordinarily conumed acts as a mild stimulant. It increases the physical and mental energy and makes a person feel less tired. Perhaps other ingredients of coffee aid in this comforting effect -the heat for example-but it is coffee drinking so particularly pleas-

There seems to be a good deal of individual variation between the ability of different people to tolerate the drug-like action of coffee. Some, especially those who live vigorous

outdoor lives, can drink almost unlimited amounts without noticing it. Others, especially those of a "ner

of us can drink a reasonable amount of coffee without harm. It makes us feel better for a while and often serves as a sociable occasion. But coffee contains an active drug to which some people are more sensitive than others.

There also is a form of chronic poisoning against which coffee drinkers should be on the alert; if the signs develop the amount of caffeine consumed should sharply reduced.



The biggest single pitfall for mos ambitious young singers with talent is, of course, New York. But it's also a must.
