NETHERLANDS - (P) -Britain and the billion-dollar Anglo-Iranian Oil Company Saturday asked the International Court of Justice to force Iran to submit to arbitration in the neace-threatening dispute over nationalization of oil.

The United States plainly was worried that the situation might lead to the intervention of troops from both Britain and Russia.

Dispatches from Tehran told of inconfirmed reports that some of Premier Mohammed Mossadegh's Nationalist bloc at last were willing to sit down with the British for

Mrs. Allen said her husband walked into their garage apartment near the tavern and told her. "I have just shot and killed Reg Montgomery." Then, she said, he fired shot into his own chest before she could reply.

Allen was an all-state end for Temple High School in 1941. Montgomery was acquitted in July, 1947, by a district court jury in Llano on a charge that he murdered Mrs. Relen Degraffenreid of Shore Drive at Buchanan Lake in Pebruary, 1947. Montgomery's defense was that Mrs. Degraffenreid was killed when she jumped from his automobile and struck her head on

New Rules Posted For Behavior Of Moscow Children

MOSCOW—(P)—Strict new rules governing the public behavior of Moscow's youngsters have been posted by the city fathers. And parents can be fined up to 200 ru-ples. (\$50 at the official rate) for ce if their children run foul of the law.

Boys and girls up to 16 years old no longer can be on the streets aft-er 10 o'clock at night during the chool year unless they are a school year unless they are accom-panied by their parents. During the Summer months the curfew is set up to 11 o'clock.

The rules also prohibit the sale of liquor and tobacco to kids und-er 16; forbid youngsters to go to public markets alone or to engage in trade. They also ban skating and skooter riding on the streets. And no more hitching rides on the backs of streetcars or buses.

Besides all that, Moscow's you sters can go only to those movies isted as suitable for children. The decrees, signed by Moscow city chairman, calls on house managers, militia and all citizens to help enforce the rules.





WASRINGTON-If animal husbandry scientists could do as much for the human race as they have done in improving livestock and poultry down on the farm, there might be some hope for mankind in the future. For science now has made a good start on completely redesigning farm animals to meet modern age food requirements.

As the melder's partner it is up to you to add natural cards to his meld if possible. It is also advisable to put down a meld or two of your own. Do all you can to help your partner go out, but preserve one or two safe discards just in case your partner still needs a few plays before he can finish the

If an opponent melds in this situation your course depends en our position. When the melder is at your right you must discard with great caution. The opponent who follows you has his full hand (for at least one play) and has no wor-ries about making the count.

When the melder is at your left, you should make the initial meld if possible. This is especially true if the opponent has used six or more cards in his meld. In this situation you are very

unlikely to give away the pile to the melder. He has only a few cards and probably has only one othe pair in his hand. Hence it does not hurt you particularly to deplete your own hand.
Your meld relieves your partner

of the necessity of acquiring or keeping the count. It gives him information about safe discards. It gives your side credit for red threes and protects you against a complete defeat if the opponents meld out in a hurry. Finally, in rare cases, it may fit your partner's hand so beautifully that he can meld out

Wage rates for farm workers may go up to 95 cents an hour or the equivalent to that amount at piece rates without becoming the concern of the Wage Stabilization Board.

That is the gist of General Wag Regulation 11 which the Wage Stabilization Board in Washington unanimously adopted last week, according to William J. Rogers, regional director of the Wage-Hour Labor at Dallas, Wage-Hour offices of the Labor Department all over the country have been designated as field contact offices for the National Wage Stabilization Board.

Under Regulation 11, farm wage rates below 25 cents an hour or the piece rates paid for farm operations may be increased to 95 hour or the equivalent monetary wage without approval of the board. However, in those instances in base period of 1950 were greater than 95 cents or the equivalent an hour they can be increased only 10 per cent without board approval Examples Cited

The base rate pay is the wage rate paid during the applicable crop season of 1950. For example, if cotton is picked during September on a particular farm, then wages paid September 1950 would be base for any increases above 95

Increases also may be given to month. Where only a cash wage is paid, the wage can be \$225 a month Where the year-round use of a house is given along with the usual incidentals \$195 a month can be paid. You're Wrong If You Envy Judges

Contrary to opinion, the officials up in the judges' stand at the Midland Rodeo don't have much chance to enjoy the show. The odds are that you, as spectator, are seeing more of the show than the judges even though you occupy a seat far back in the stands.

The judges must concentrate on one particular phase of each contest. They must not relax or look away from the arena lest they miss that which they are supposed watch.
