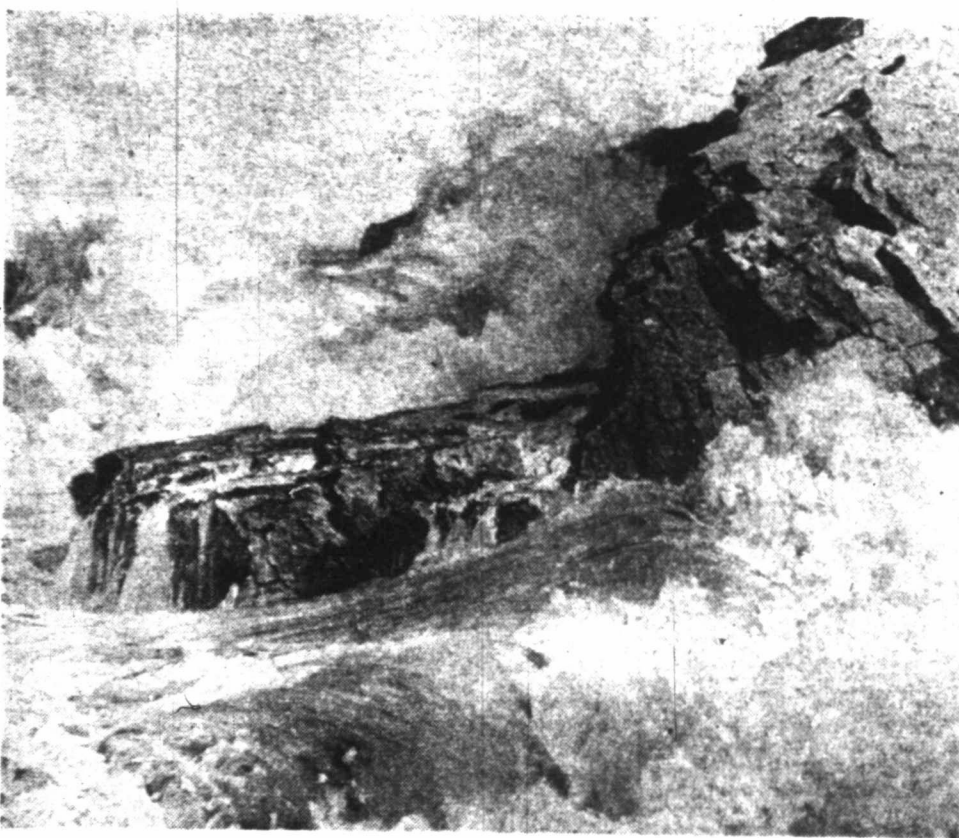

"A HEAVY SEA" — by Frederick Judd Waugh, N.A.

Frederick Judd Waugh, the most popular marine painter of the century, was born Sept. 13, 1861, in Bordentown, N. J., and studied at the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and the Julian Academy in Paris.

He wished to become a portrait painter as was his father, but once he tried his brush at depicting the rolling surf the public clamored for his marines and made him a painter of the sea. He won the coveted popular prize at the Carnegie International in Pittsburgh five consecutive years, and in 20 years one New York gallery sold a million dollars worth of his seascapes.

He painted the sea in every mood, his canvasses expressing the spirit, emotion, movement, drama and the romance of the big water. Yet, he never painted directly from nature, but created his marines in his Provincetown studio, with no view of the water. His greatest works were done from imagination, memory, feeling and his phenomenal knowledge of the "great deep."

"A Heavy Sea," the painting now on display, was Waugh's gift to the National Arts Club of New York for life membership 35 years ago.

It is a large study expressing the weight, force and volume of the sea against the solidity of a coastal rock.

# Fighting Comeback Of Eighth Army Represents Moral Victory Over Fear

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senators studying the ouster of Gen. Douglas MacArthur also should study "the miracle of Korea."

For in that great transformation of the U. S. 8th Army from the defeated to the victor lies a lesson that perhaps is more important than the answers to a lot of questions now puzzling the lawmakers.

Their miracle has to do with a victory over fear—and the dispute over whether General MacArthur or the joint chiefs of staff were the first to become alarmed about a possible evacuation of United Nations forces from Korea last winter.

The argument now has taken on overtones of accusation which imply some guilt for anyone who thought about quitting Korea in those dark days.

The truth is that neither MacArthur nor the joint chiefs were the first to become gloomy over the imperiled U. S. 8th Army.

The gloom sprang from the Army itself—the Army which at that time was in full retreat before charging hordes of Chinese Reds. And the top brass merely shared this gloom.

## Top-Level Conference

Here was the situation: In late November and early December, the Chinese had battered the 8th Army and 10th Corps into retreat. Both these forces had been hurt badly. Both had suffered losses in manpower and equipment—and they were isolated from each other. Neither was able to lend the other a helping hand.

I was in Korea at the time and the situation appeared hopeless. Evacuation seemed inevitable to me and to almost all the military men with whom I talked.

As soon as the great retreat began, MacArthur called his commanders — Lt. Gen. Walton H. Walker (now dead) and Lt. Gen. Edward Almond of 10th Corps—to a conference in Tokyo. That was on November 28.

No one yet has said what went on in that conference. But six days

## MacArthur Hearings Threaten Important Programs In Senate

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The month-old MacArthur hearings are threatening to tie up indefinitely the Senate's legislative business, including many key items carrying a June 30 deadline.

These items include all appropriation bills providing money to run the government in the fiscal year starting July 1; the Defense Production Act authorizing price, wage, rent and credit controls; and the \$8,500,000,000 foreign aid program.

Senate Democratic leaders express increasing concern over the log-jam. But, fearing a Republican "whitewash" cry, none has been willing to suggest that the investigation into Gen. Douglas MacArthur's dismissal be called off.

The plan of Senate Majority Leader McFarland (D-Aris) for a late Summer congressional recess starting August 1 and running two months seems definitely out the window.

The investigation is using up most of the time and energies of 26 senators on the Armed Services and Foreign Relations Committees — more than one-fourth of the Senate membership. Many of the 26 are veteran senators who have other important assignments.

For instance, four of the 26 serve on the Appropriations Committee. This group has not yet sent to the Senate floor a single bill carrying funds for the next fiscal year. The House has passed half a dozen of the bills.

As it has in the past, Congress probably will meet the problem of funds for the new year by passing a resolution permitting the government agencies to keep spending on their current basis until the new appropriations bills are acted on.

later, Army Chief of Staff J. Lawton Collins reported to Washington that MacArthur believed the best solution would be for the UN to "arrange an armistice on the best terms available as soon as possible."

And Collins later reported that MacArthur had been told by his field commanders they could evacuate their forces from Hungnam and Pusan without too much difficulty.

Evacuation Planned  
At the same time, Adm. Forrest Sherman has disclosed, the naval commander in the Far East quietly was assembling his ships for just such an emergency.

The testimony would indicate that Walker and Almond had discussed evacuation with MacArthur at the November 28 meeting—which MacArthur's public information officer described to reporters in Tokyo as "just a bull session."

And the talk of evacuation doesn't seem strange to anyone who was there.

At that time it didn't seem possible to a great many people—most of them military experts—that the two battered UN forces would pull themselves together, obtain replacements, get more equipment, and be in position to stem the Red advance.

It seemed then that only a miracle could save the Army from being driven from Korea. And in this age there aren't many who put their faith in the supernatural on the field of battle. The odds ride with the bigger army.

## Ridgway Steps In

But then a miracle did occur. Somehow, from some hidden depths of courage and determination, the Army achieved the miracle of defense that turned back the Red rush and wiped out the fears of an evacuation.

Many people give a big slice of the credit for this change in the Army's spirit to Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, who stepped into command of 8th Army after General Walker was killed in a tragic accident.

Ridgway arrived on the scene at the low ebb of Allied fortunes. He brought to Korea none of the heartbreaks suffered by those who had carried the burden of the fighting. He had no emotional involvement. He could survey the damage with the cold and detached view of a surgeon who must patch up a broken body and also give his patient the will to live.

In his favor was the fact that he had more authority than Walker or Almond ever had. Each of them had commanded in reality only half an Army—each had been responsible only for half of the fighting front.

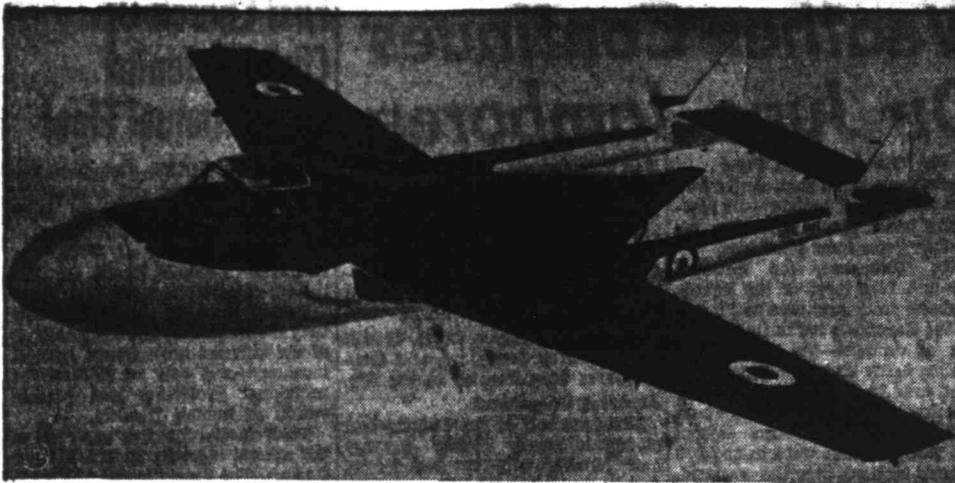
Ridgway put the two parts together for the first time. He helped instill in this Army the will to fight again. And his men came out slugging.

It's one of the greatest stories of

any American Army in history—this story of an Army that fought its way back from defeat through a fog of gloom that crept even into high places.

Looking back, it doesn't seem very important who was first to be "gloomy" over the prospect of an Army being destroyed. The wonder would have been if there had been a man who wasn't alarmed.

But the important thing is that the first United Nations Army battled its way from the depths to win a victory over its own fears. And that is "the miracle of Korea."
