



House Sub-Panel Again Considers **Tidelands Control**

WASHINGTON -(P)- Four govrnment officials, including two cabinet members, were invited to tell reportedly unsympathetic House Judiciary subcommittee Wednesday why they want federal control of the oil-rich lands beneath the marginal seas.

Attorney General J. Howard Mc Grath and Solicitor Philip B. Perlnan of the Justice Department and Secretary Oscar Chapman and Solicitor Mastin G. White of the Interior Department were the scheduled witnesses. The subcommittee was expected

to reject the government's position as outlined by the witness and approve legislation to give the states control of the Tidelands.

Representative Gossett (D-Texas) a subcommittee member, said: "We have heard all the points at issue many times, and are hearing

the government's side again simply as a matter of courtesy.' He flatly predicted the subcom mittee would recommend that the full committee approve the state ownership bill.

The Senate Interior Committee has voted to approve a resolution to give the states tentative control of the oil operations in the Tidelands pending final settlement of the controversy by either the courts or Congress. The committee however. never has reported the measure to the Senate for action.

Up on the "roof of the world," Tibetans must be dancing with joy. Their "peaceful liberation" by the Chinese Communists has been achieved.

See what benefits they'll gain from association with the "people's republic:"

The Chinese Red Army, long famed as a missionary for peace, with a few embarrassing exceptions, will enter Tibet to strengthen the national defense.

Tibet's own troops will be reorganized and absorbed by the "liberation" army, which will take over the burdensome chore of defending Tibet against its "imperialist

To assist in these tasks, the Chinese Reds graciously consent to send a military command and a political and military commission into the country.

The people's republic, so-called, also promises to relieve Tibet of the onerous responsibility for conducting its own foreign affairs.

In lending all this "help," the Communist rulers say they'll let the Tibetans run their own internal affairs, will preserve religious freedom, protect the present position of the young Dalai Lama, undertake a development program and let reforms be carried out by Lhasa rather than Peiping.

It all sounds wonderful, doesn't it? But what does it really mean?



As it happened, South could just about muster up a bid of five spades. It was a risky bid, and South came literally within an ace of losing his contract.

West opened the eight of diamonds, and East won the first two tricks with the tack and queen of diamonds. East then led the ace of diamonds, and a very remarkable trick developed.

What should South play on the ace of diamonds? Decide on the correct play before you read on. Right you are. South must discard the ace of hearts and ruff with dummy's ace of spades. Now declarer can safely ruff a heart, draw trumps, and re-enter dummy to discard his losing club on a top

If South fails to discard the ace a consonant. Gradually this form of hearts at the third trick he loses his contract. For example, suppose South discards a club. West discards his singleton heart, and he leads a heart. West ruffs: if he leads clubs, East ruffs.

It does South no good to ruff in his own hand. West still discards his heart. Now South must lead a trump to dummy's ace and still cannot get out of dummy to draw the rest of the trumps.



TORYO — (P) — While United Nations troops battle to destroy the Communist forces, Army medi hind the lines are waging a relent-less fight against drug addiction.

They say they are winning.
The medical authorities deny published stories that use of drugs has become a major problem among roops in Japan and Korea. Mai. Gen. Edgar H. Hume, sur-

mand, expressed surprise when informed such stories had been circulated. "No such major problem exists," he said. Provost marshal statistics show

drug violations far down the list lations for which soldiers are arrested in Japan. For example, between Oct. 1, 1950, and March 1, there were 173 cases involving possession of narcotics. The fact that there is some use of drugs by Allied soldiers is not considered surprising. The Far East has long been notorious for its widespread use of optum, heroin, cocaine and other drugs. But Army criminal investigation agents, working closely with Korean and Japanese police, say they have succeeded in chopping off major supply channels to UN troops.

"From time immemorial, there has been drug addiction in the Orient.' one high Eighth Army officer said. "This is especially true in port cities, and anyone is susceptible.
