S. F. Hurlbut is to run casing and make production tests of the Mississippian lime at his No. 1-A Ellwood, Central-South Mitchel County wildcat. That section to be tested showed

Outnumbered U. S. Jets Win Air Panel To End Six Russian-Type Craft Destroyed, **Others Damaged** TOKYO --- (AP)--- Outnumbered American Sabre jets

destroyed six Russian-type jets and damaged eight others in two big air battles over Korea Sunday and Monday.

A total of 118 planes were involved in the sudden revival of jet warfare.

Sixteen Red jets made a third stab at four Sabre jets Monday afternoon-but kept at a safe distance. They fired twice on the F-86's, then streaked back across the Yalu River into the safety of

> Manchuria. All American planes returned safely, Far East Air Forces said.

Reappearance of the Red jets in force coincided with indications the Chinese may be preparing a new ground offensive.

Red troops suddenly appeared in territory they had previously de-serted. Replacements steadily filtered down from the north for holding troops all along the front.

Fierce Red defenses checked Allied moves in the center of the line. But Allied patrols Monday drove more than three miles into Red territory in the west and gained slightly more than a mile in the east.


HAVANA, CUBA: -(P)- A U. S. Marine guard and a janitor were found shot to death Monday in the U. S. Embassy.

Policy Conferences On Wage Increases **To Resume Tuesday**

WASHINGTON - (AP) - The Wage Stabilization Board will resume conferences Tuesday on a new general policy to hold the line on wage increases.

Though members of the board insist they are not close to a decision, talk is reported to be centering around allowing an advance in the line from 10 per cent above January, 1950, levels to approximately 13 per cent-including annual productivity improvement bonuses generally figured at two per cent a year, and other "fringes" amounting to another one-half per cent

The cost of living index, to which most industrial contracts with escalator clauses are hinged, has advanced 10.5 per cent between Jan. 15, 1950, and April 15, 1951.

The present ceiling of 10 per cent was fixed in January by the first Wage Stabilization Board, headed by Conciliation Director Cyrus S. Ching. That percentage did not allow for the productivity bonus but the board promised to take another look at the cost of living index of April 15 with a view of revising the 10 per cent celling if that should be warranted.

Draft Bill Has Weak Spot

On the positive side, the new draft bill finally approved by Congress offers these gains:

It lowers the draft age from 19 to 181 2 years, lengthens the term of service to two years, and reduces physical and mental requirements for draftees. All these measures will contribute to the necessary expansion of the nation's military manpower pool.

The bill also runs four years, thus assuring the armed forces of a certain continuity in manpower policies.

Finally, it endorses the principle of universal military training. Since that principle never before has gained approval in Congress, its acceptance must be rated as progress.

But, on the negative side, the great disappointment is that this measure did not in fact set up a UMT program but put it off to a future date.

The bill establishes a five-member commission, of whom three are to be civilians, to frame a program to give six months' military training to all youths between the ages of 18 and 19. After appointment by the President and confirmation by the Senate, the commission must bring in its report within four months. If Congress approves the plan, the President can start it any time he likes.

The chief weakness of this arrangement is the element of delay. Congress has enough information from the armed services to have shaped a UMT program itself at this time. The issue has been kicking around Capitol Hill ever since World War II ended.

The deferring of decision into the future is in a very real sense a putting off of duty by the lawmakers. Inasmuch as the Senate's original bill did set up a UMT plan, influencing our foreign policy. 
