## UN Gains Two Miles On East Front

### Badger Is Against Bombing Of Supply Lines In Manchuria

WASHINGTON—(P)—Vice Adm. Oscar C. Badger said Tuesday he thinks bombing of Red China's supply lines should be confined to Korea "for the time being."

Testifying at the Senate's MacArthur inquiry, Badger said he does not think it would be wise now to adopt the step urged by Gen. Douglas MacArthur and bomb bases and supply routes in Chinese Manchuria.

### AP Correspondent, Held By Czechs, To Be Tried In Few Days

LONDON—(P)—Reports from Prague Tuesday said the Czech Foreign Ministry has informed the U. S. Embassy that Associated Press Correspondent William Oatis will be placed on trial within a few days.

Oatis, 37, was arrested April 23 on charges of hostile activities toward the Czechoslovak government.

### U. S. Pilots Defeat Red Airmen Again

TOKYO—(P)—For the third straight day American pilots Tuesday beat Red airmen in a big jet battle over Northwestern Korea.

U. S. Sabre jets damaged four Russian-type MIG-15's Tuesday as Allied infantrymen knocked North Koreans off key bridges on the eastern battlefield. On the sea fronts United Nations warships silenced a challenge by accurate Communist shore batteries.

### British Move To Curb Red Shipments

LONDON—(P)—Britain announced Tuesday she is taking steps to block all shipments of strategic goods to Red China through the crown colony of Hong Kong.

Sir Hartley Shawcross, president of the Board of Trade, said all exports from the United Kingdom to Hong Kong and China will go under licensing control next Tuesday. No licenses will be granted for "goods which in the present circumstances could be of strategic and military importance."

### Draft Bill Is Signed By HST

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman Tuesday signed the new draft law.

The measure lowers the draft age, extends the Selective Service System four years and lays the foundation for universal military training.

Truman signed the bill in a White House ceremony at 10:15 a.m. (CST).

### Committee Votes For Ban On Further Price Rollbacks

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Senate Banking Committee voted Tuesday for a ban on further price rollbacks—including beef—below average price levels between Jan. 24 and Feb. 24, 1951.

The committee, completing a revision of the Economic Controls Bill, also amended the measure to provide more liberal installment credit terms for the purchase of automobiles only. It then scheduled a vote for 8:30 a.m. (EST) Thursday on whether to approve the bill in its present form.

### Council Plans Study Of Water Situation As Capacity Reached

Midland reached the capacity of its water production Monday.

The pumps at the city's three water fields sucked a record-breaking 9,011,000 gallons of water out of the ground during the day.

Additional demands will mean the adoption of "some methods of conservation" by Midland water users.

### Four Oil Field Workers Burned In Gas Explosion

Four oil field workers were burned, one of them seriously, in a butane explosion Monday afternoon at a rig in the Driver Field, 23 miles southeast of Midland.

Brought to Western Clinic-Hospital here for emergency treatment were C. R. Wolfe, 25; W. P. O'Shields, 32; L. C. Permenter, 23; and Fred Nordman, about 30, all of Midland.

### 107 Degrees Here Is Record For Year

Midland Monday sweltered through the hottest day so far of the year.

Monday's highest temperature was recorded at 1:30 p.m. when the mercury skyrocketed to 107 degrees, the Civil Aeronautics Administration reported.

The CAA forecast another 100 degree-plus temperature Tuesday.

### Expanded Express Delivery Zone Aim Of Chamber Project

Chamber of Commerce sponsorship of a move to interest the Railway Express Agency, Inc., in expanding its delivery zone here was voted by Chamber directors at their June meeting held Monday afternoon in Hotel Scharbauer.

The action followed acceptance of a report submitted by the C. of C.'s Transportation Committee, of which Paul McHargue is chairman. It was recommended that the express company be requested to conduct a survey here to determine the urgent need for expanding its delivery zone to fast-growing city. The Chamber will take the lead in the project.

Jury Foreman C. R. Steinburger handed the verdict to the court at 9:45 p.m. The jury had deliberated 45 minutes.

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### Superior Completes Mississippian Lime Opener In Borden

The Superior Oil Company and Intex Oil Company have reported the completion of their No. 15-535 Wallace H. Jones as a natural flowing discovery from a Mississippian lime in Northeast Borden County.

A potential of 298 barrels of 41.3-gravity oil was filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas.

### Tide Water Gets More Shows Of Oil In No. 1 Dickenson

Tide Water Associated Oil Company No. 1 E. B. Dickenson, Central-South Martin County possible discovery from the Siluro-Devonian dolomite from the zone at 11,740-780 feet had more shows of oil in a core at 11,785-792 feet.

Recovery from that cutting was four feet of fractured dolomite with good porosity and with a good oil stain and a slight bleeding oil.

### E-C Pecos Sector Gets Drillsite For 12,000-Footer

In East-Central Pecos County and 23 miles east of Fort Stockton, the Superior Oil Company staked location for a 12,000-foot wildcat.

It will be drilled as the firm's No. 1-4 J. L. Nutt, 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from east lines of section 4, block 144, T&S.L. survey.

### NE Reagan Wildcat Logs More Pay Zone

G. H. Caughn Production Company and T. H. Atlantic Refining Company No. 1 Calvin Sugg, Northeast Reagan County wildcat, 15 miles northeast of Stiles has found more possible pay section in the lower Spraberry at 7,505-38 feet.

A three hour drillstem test was taken on that interval. Gas surfaced in 50 minutes. No fluid came to the top while the tool was open.

from north and west lines of section 4, block O, O&M survey.

Rotary tools will be used to drill to projected depth of 8,500 feet beginning at once.

The project is one mile south and slightly east of The Blackwood & Nichols Company No. 1. Mrs. Sadie Weddell, which was completed as a Spraberry discovery in May for a 24-hour potential of 209.33 barrels of oil plus 48 barrels of water.

### Oil Shows Found In Crockett Prospect

Continental Oil Company No. 1-A Shannon, wildcat in Northeast Crockett County, has found oil possibilities in the Ellenburger.

No. 1-A Shannon entered the Ellenburger at 6,940 feet. There was a show of the oil on a two-hour drillstem test from 7,100 to 7,190 feet. Gas was at the surface in 19 minutes, but there was no estimate as to the volume.

Estimated recovery was 2,200 feet of clean oil and 510 feet of oil and gas-cut mud, with the drillog partially unloading while being pulled. Flowing pressure ranged from 75 to 400 pounds, with bottomhole pressure of 2,875 pounds.

Two previous drillstem tests of the Ellenburger had shown gas. These tests were from 6,950 to 7,000 feet. Operator is now coring ahead.

The wildcat is 2,000 feet from south and 2,088 feet from east lines of section 22, block UV, GC&SP survey. It is two and one-half miles northwest of the shallow Vaughn field.

In the Midland County side of the field the same operator staked location for its No. 1-A Beth.

Drillate is 663 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 35, block 37, T-3-S, T&P survey.

No. 1 Campbell, discovery of the field, was completed for a 24-hour flowing potential of 76.8 barrels of oil.

Projected depth is 5,500 feet. Rotary tools will be moved in and drilling will begin immediately.

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### Spraberry Explorer Staked In E-C Upton

James H. Snowden and Associates are to start drilling at once on an 8,000-foot Spraberry wildcat between the Pembroke and Pembroke North fields of East-Central Upton County.

The project will be dug one and one-half miles south and slightly west of the Pembroke, North field and four miles north of the Pembroke pool. Both fields get their production from the Spraberry above 8,000 feet.

The Snowden and Associates project will be the No. 1-V. P. Tippet. Drillate is at the center of the southeast quarter of the northeast quarter of section 1, block M, HE&WT survey.

Rock Hill Oil Company of San Antonio has staked location for a shallow Northeast Concho County wildcat seven miles southeast of Paint Rock.

No. 1 B. McIver will be 330 feet from south and 3,000 feet from east lines of section 338, T&NORR (Steinbrink) survey.

Cable tools will be used to 1,600 feet beginning at once.

Operators reported a daily flowing potential of 184.92 barrels of 36-gravity oil and trace of water. The well was completed on a one-half-inch tubing choke and from open hole between 6,940 and 7,210 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 710-1. The well is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 29, block 37, T-5-S, T&P survey.

One of the new projects will be drilled by American Republics Corporation as its No. 1 V. P. Tippet and others. It is to be dug as a west offset to Paul F. Barnhart No. 1 Tippet, opener of the Pembroke, North field.

Exact location is 1,980 feet from east and 660 feet from north lines of section 46, block 38, T-5-S, T&P survey. It will go to around 8,230 feet.

A north offset to Ashland Oil & Refining Company No. 1-42 Elkins, recently completed Spraberry opener, will be drilled by Amerasia Petroleum Corporation as the No. 1 Lula B. Elkins.

Location has been staked 1,980 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 42, block 37, T-5-S, T&P survey. The 7,500-foot test will start at once.

The third new Upton exploration will be a re-drill project. Fred Turner, Jr., of Midland No. 1 Rosa Half Barnett, Benedum field project which was plugged and abandoned in February of 1948 at 12,367 feet, will be re-entered a nd tested above 7,650 feet.

Location is at the center of the northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of section 4, block Y, GC and SP survey.

### NE Upton Sector Gets Oiler, Tests

Three more Spraberry tests have been scheduled in Northeast Upton County and the completion of another producer from that formation in the same section has been reported.

The new oler is A. A. Cameron and Jay Simmons No. 1-29 F. F. Elkins. It was completed as a one and one-half mile south extension to the Weiner-Floyd field.

Operators reported a daily flowing potential of 184.92 barrels of 36-gravity oil and trace of water. The well was completed on a one-half-inch tubing choke and from open hole between 6,940 and 7,210 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 710-1. The well is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 29, block 37, T-5-S, T&P survey.

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A north offset to Ashland Oil & Refining Company No. 1-42 Elkins, recently completed Spraberry opener, will be drilled by Amerasia Petroleum Corporation as the No. 1 Lula B. Elkins.

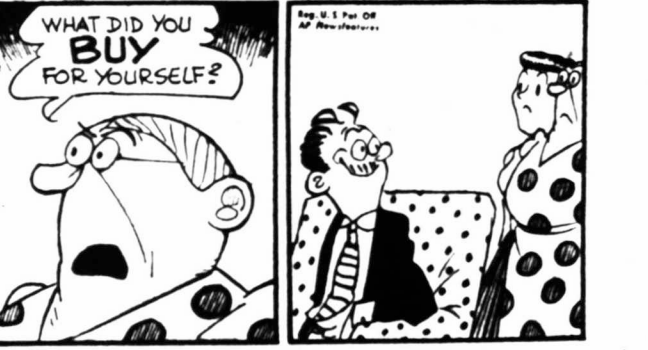

**Locking Yourself In A Closet Won't Chase Lightning Away**

Occasionally one encounters a person who is so afraid of thunder and lightning that she (it is usually "she") shuts herself in a closet whenever a "summer" storm blows up. This fear borders on the abnormal because while a person can be struck by lightning, this accident is rare and not worth worrying about, although a few minor precautions can be taken.

Another thing which seems a bit risky is to shelter under a tree during a thunderstorm. The tree also may act as a conductor of electricity and almost every year there are likely to be a few (often golfers) who are hit in this manner. In a thunderstorm it is therefore safer to get wet than to shelter under something which may bring the lightning to that particular spot.

But not all of those who are struck by lightning die from the effects. The most remarkable story of its kind which I have heard dealt with a 13-year-old boy in South Africa. This boy was struck while driving sheep and his hat and boots were torn to pieces.

He also was burned on one side from head to groin and knocked unconscious for a short time. Walks 50 Miles His father found him in the rain and carried him home. Being primitive people, his father decided that the boy needed some medicine to drive out the lightning and consequently they set out to walk to the doctor—only 50 miles away. This was accomplished with the patient apparently none the worse.

Excessive fear of lightning goes by the unpronounceable name of keraunophobia and it is hoped that no reader of this column has or will develop such a difficult thing to tell one's friends about. There is little basis for this fear since the chances of being hit by lightning are slight and even if it does happen recovery often results.

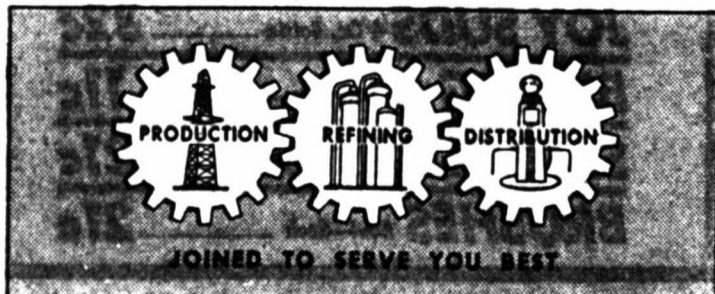

**Army Plans To Begin Releasing 100,000 Reservists In July**

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Army plans to start releasing the volunteer and inactive enlisted Reserves in July and hopes to complete the program by December, Army Secretary Pace announced Monday.

About 100,000 men who were called to active service after the start of hostilities in Korea are involved in the program, which was originally scheduled to get under way in September.

Pace emphasized that the release schedule does not apply to members of the organized reserve, the National Guard or to Regular Army volunteers.

The program calls for the release of a small group in July and greater numbers each month until the end of the year.

No iron-clad point system will be used to determine the order of release. The Army said, however, that first consideration will be given to men in the following order of precedence:

(1) World War II veterans; (2) Men with other prior military service; (3) Those with no previous military service.

Further preference will be given to individuals with longer service on the current tour of duty. The number of dependents and the age of individuals also will be considered.

Officers in the inactive and volunteer categories will be eligible for release within 17 months of being called to duty under terms of the new military service and training law, if they have had at least 18 months' service in World War II.

Monday's announcement brings the Army's program for the release of reserves into line with schedules previously announced by the other services.

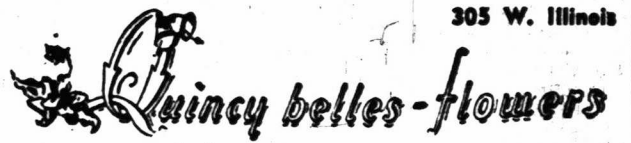

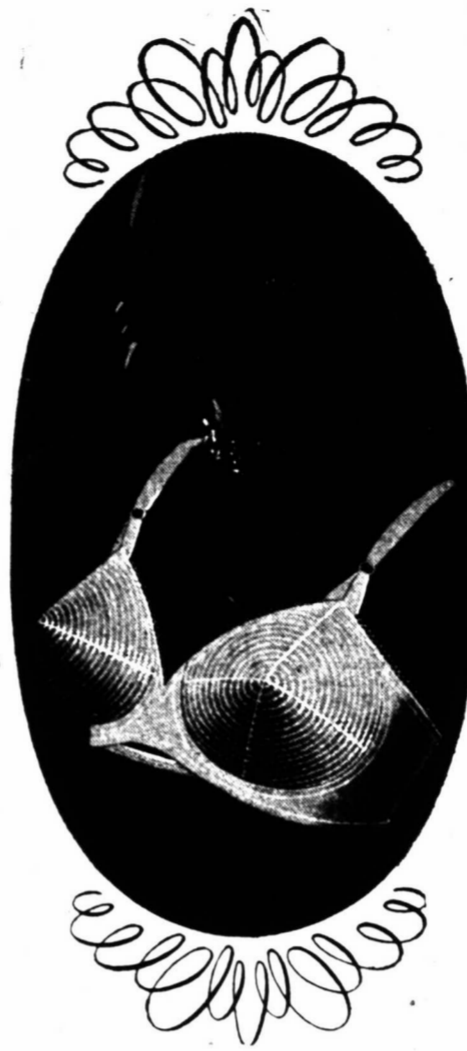

TULSA — The nation's daily average crude oil production rallied slightly during the week ended June 16, totaling 6,102,100 barrels, the Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

This was a gain, the Journal said, of 550 barrels over the preceding week.

Gainers included Oklahoma, up 1,250 to 505,600.

Louisiana was down 50 to 615,200.

Production was unchanged in New Mexico, 143,075, and Texas, 2,754,175.

## Trolley Cars, City Buses Rolling Again On Detroit Streets

DETROIT — Trolley cars and city buses rolled on Detroit's streets again Tuesday for the first time in two months.

An end came Monday night to the nation's longest major municipal transit strike in history.

Without their demanded wage increase the AFL's 3,500 street car and bus drivers came back to work Tuesday morning after a walkout of 59 days.

Mediation or arbitration will settle the wage issue.

A fight still apparently remains over Michigan's anti-strike law affecting public employees, a major element in the transit dispute.

Defense-busy Detroit returned to normalcy. Actually, however, it had never been greatly disturbed production-wise by the long strike.

At no time had there been any serious impairment to factories employing hundreds of thousands of men.

Striking drivers, at a mass meeting Monday night, roared acceptance of their leaders' recommendation that they quit the walkout.

The strike had denied municipal transportation to a metropolitan area of approximately two and a half million population.

Union heads gave up the battle grudgingly.
