Tide Water Testing Ellenburger Top In Dickenson Wildcat

Tide Water Associated Oil Company No. 1 E. B. Dickenson, Central-South Martin County wildcat, nine miles west of Stanton and 12 miles north and slightly east of Midland is bottomed at 12,115 feet in the top of the Ellenburger and is taking a drilistem test.

Top of the Ellenburger has been tentatively picked to be 12,090 feet. Elevation is 2,478 feet.

Samples through the zone at 12,090-115 feet did not log any appreciable shows of oil or gas. Had Oil In Devonian.

This wildcat had a section in the Devonian at 11,740-780 feet which developed some free oil. The zone at 11,780-801 feet made water. That shows that the Devonian pay is extra thin.

However, should the project fail to produce in the Ellenburger it might plug back and test the Devonian pay and try to make a well from the interval above the water.

Location is 680 feet from north and east lines of section 44, block 37, T-1-N, T&P survey.

The Tide Water No. 1 Dickenson had some interesting shows of oil in the Spraberry, but extended testing failed to develop a commercial oil well from that formation.

Mid-Co Wildcat In NE Runnels Shows Petroleum In Tests

Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation appears to have a new discovery at its No. 1 B. R. Thetford, Northeast Runnels County wildcat, two miles north of the Sykes-Morris sand field.

This prospector, located 10 miles northeast of Winters and 330 feet from south and east lines of the 407-acre Thetford lease in section 499, Wharton County School Land survey, topped the Morris sand pay at 3,883 feet.

Big Gas Volume
It cored to 3,703 feet and took a 70-minute drilistem test with the packer at 3,883 feet. Gas surfaced in two minutes. The gas volume was estimated to be at the rate of 3-800,000 cubic feet per day.

Recovery was three gallons of distillate. Open flowing bottom hole pressure was from 1,100 pounds to 1,200 pounds.

Shut-in bottom hole pressure, after 15 minutes, was 1,450 pounds. Mere Fluid Recovered
The project was then cored to 3,721 feet and a 45-minute drilistem test was taken at 3,703-21 feet. Gas surfaced in two minutes. The gas volume was estimated at the rate of 4,000,000 cubic feet per day.

Recovery was 50 feet of 48.8 gravity petroleum fluid. There were no signs of formation water. There was an additional recovery of 10 feet of drilling fluid.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 1,300 pounds. No shut-in pressure was taken. The project is coring deeper.

Dual Producer Is Finaled In Gaines

Samedan Oil Corporation, W. D. Anderson & Sons and R. S. Anderson No. 1-D-E Andrews has been completed as the second producer from the Devonian and Ellenburger at the northwest side of the Robertson-multipay field of Central-South Gaines County.

Operators finalized the well from the Devonian for a daily flowing potential of 232 barrels of 37.7-gravity oil and no water.

Completion was natural through an 11/64-inch choke and on perforations at 10,203-040 and 10,046-066 feet. Pay was topped at 10,028 feet. Seven-inch oil string is cemented at 11,855 feet.

The Ellenburger potential for a daily flow of 310 barrels of 28.3-gravity oil and no water.

This completion was from open hole, natural, from 11,950 to 11,995 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 378-1. That figure was too small to measure for the Devonian completion.

The new dual producer is 690 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 18, block A-24, pal survey and 13 miles southwest of Seminole.

Wolfcamp Opener Appears Assured In NE Lea Area

Another deep flowing oil and gas discovery appears assured for Northeast Lea County, New Mexico, at Forest Oil Corporation and Houston Oil Company of Texas No. 1 H. L. Lowe.

This wildcat is located seven and one-half miles north of the Denton multipay field and about the same distance south of the Gladolia field.

Midland Acquires Vast Water Field Options

Red Negotiators Tone Down Troop Demands

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Communists were reported Wednesday to have offered a compromise in the Korean cease-fire talks under which withdrawal of foreign troops would not be discussed until after an armistice.

Indications are that this proposal will prove acceptable to the United Nations command.

UN ADVANCE HEADQUARTERS, KOREA—(AP)—Communist cease-fire negotiators Wednesday advanced a new proposal on withdrawal of foreign troops from Korea. A United Nations spokesman called it "reasonable in content and phraseology."

Brig. Gen. William Nuckols, who attended Wednesday's sessions, said the new Red proposition was "more temperate and reasonable in tone" than previous Communist demands.

Officially, the UN said the new Chinese and North Korean suggestion on troop withdrawal was "sufficiently interesting" for Allied delegates to propose a long overnight recess for further study.

Neither Nuckols nor the UN communique indicated exactly how the Reds had modified their demand.

But Nuckols said it required 25 minutes to read.

The five Communist generals brought out their new plan after a three-day recess. They had asked for the recess Saturday to consult with their governments on the troop withdrawal demand, which had threatened to break up discussions.

Before presenting his revised suggestion at the ninth meeting, Korean Gen. Nam II asked for an recess for a further clarification of (Continued On Page Seven)

Split GOP Approves 'Get-Acheson' Drive

WASHINGTON—(AP)—At a sharply split party meeting, a majority of House Republicans present Wednesday agreed to support a plan aimed at striking Secretary of State Acheson off the federal payroll.

The decision to pursue the "Get-Acheson" drive through the medium of the State Department appropriation bill was taken by a standing vote of 71 to 33.

More than 90 Republicans either did not attend or refrained from voting.

The majority approved a motion to support an amendment to the State Department money bill.

Party leaders said the amendment, still to be drafted, would not designate Acheson by name but could specify that no federal pay could go to any "policy-making" department head who, at any time during the five years preceding appointment, belonged to a business or law firm that represented a foreign government.

Decision Not Binding
Acheson's law firm once represented Poland.

Representative Phillips (R-Calif.), sponsor of the amendment, told newsmen it would be offered late Wednesday or Thursday. He said it would embody the principle that the policy-making heads of a major department "should be perfectly clear of any suspicion of previous obligation to or representation of a foreign government."

The decision of the GOP conference is not binding on the members. Individuals still can vote the way they feel.

But refusal of so many of them to support the amendment made it doubtful the "Get-Acheson" drive would succeed unless it gained heavy Democratic support.

Democratic leaders were confident they could beat it.

Field Described As 'Sugar Daddy' Of Pacific Institute

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Frederick Vanderbilt Field, leftist New York millionaire, was described as a one-time "sugar daddy" for the Institute of Pacific Relations (IPR) at Senate hearings Wednesday.

Edward C. Carter of New York, a trustee of the IPR, used the term in relating that field's contributions to the institute totaled "around \$60,000."

Carter testified at public hearings by the Senate Internal Security Committee, which Chairman McCarran (D-Nev.) said have the aim of determining whether "subversive influences" have affected the United States Far Eastern policy.

Field, "angel" of many left-wing causes, now is under jail sentence in New York for contempt of court. He was held in contempt for refusing to tell who contributed to a ball fund the Civil Rights Congress put up for four Communist leaders who skipped after conviction of conspiracy to advocate overthrow of the government by violence.

Despite Field's jail sentence, the senators have arranged for him to come here to testify. He is to take the witness chair Thursday.

Grand Jury Indicts Trio For Contempt

NEW YORK—(AP)—Frank Costello, named by the Senate Crime Committee as the top man in the nation's underworld, was indicted by a federal grand jury Wednesday on a charge of contempt of the Senate.

Gambler Joe Adonis (Joseph Doto) and confessed bookmaker Frank Erickson were indicted on the same charge.

The indictments stemmed from their refusal to answer questions at the widely-publicized crime committee hearings in New York last March.

Costello was indicted on nine counts, Adonis on 16, and Erickson on 74.

The maximum penalty on each count is a year in prison and a \$1,000 fine.

U. S. Attorney Irving H. Saypol said the charges against the three men were certified to the Senate by the committee and by the Senate to him as prosecutor in the federal district where the alleged contempt occurred.

Two Now In Prison
Saypol said a warrant would be issued for Costello's arrest.

Both Adonis and Erickson already are serving sentences for violation of gambling laws, Adonis in New Jersey and Erickson in New York.

Costello held the rapt attention of one of history's largest television audiences last March as he jousted with the efforts of Rudolph Halley, then the committee's chief counsel, to pry information from him.

The expensively-dressed, 60-year-old gambler objected that television would present him as a spectacle.

Thereafter, the cameras focused on his hands. Millions of persons watched the hands clasp and twist while listening to his raspy "voice from nowhere."

At one stage, Costello stalked from the hearing, complaining that he was suffering from laryngitis.

He returned after a few days, but declined to disclose his net worth.

"I refuse to answer on constitutional grounds," he said.

He said he kept \$40,000 to \$50,000 in a strong box in his palatial apartment overlooking Manhattan's Central Park.

He estimated he had another \$100,000 or so in banks.

But he declined to give details.

Southern Baptist Gains Pace U. S. Church Memberships To New Record

NEW YORK—(AP)—Church membership in the United States rose to 85,705,280 in 1950, a record-making 55.2 per cent of the population.

The total membership was up 2,950,287 over the previous year.

The figures were reported Tuesday night in an annual survey compiled by the Christian Herald magazine.

Testing To Start Immediately On 17-Section Area

Seventeen sections of Northwest Midland County land, recommended by geologists as a likely source of an adequate ground water supply for Midland, were taken under option Tuesday night by the City Council.

Exploration work will begin immediately to test the more than 10,000 acres at a cost of \$10,000.

Under terms of the option contract, the city will have the right to purchase the perpetual water rights to any "selected portions of the area."

"This may well prove to have been an historic meeting tonight," said Mayor Perry Pickett after the session attended by Councilmen J. W. McMillen, Jack Wilkinson and J. B. McCoy.

"It may prove the answer to Midland's water supply problem, and geologists are optimistic concerning the possibility."

"We are shooting at something that will take care of Midland as far as we can see in the future," said McMillen, who represented the council in the negotiations with the property owners for the water rights options.

City May Choose
The tracks of land placed under option include 12 sections from the Midland Farms and five sections from the property owned by Forrest King.

If exploration confirms the indications reported by a committee of the West Texas Geological Society, the city can select that portion of the 17 sections on which it desires water rights.

If any land is selected, the city must take a minimum of two sections of the Midland Farm property and a like amount from the King property.

For the water rights, the city will pay, under terms of the contract approved Tuesday night, \$75 an acre for the Midland Farms land and \$100 an acre for the King property.

The difference was explained by the fact that some agricultural improvements have been made on the latter acreage.

The city has 90 days in which to complete its exploration work on the King property and six months on the other. An additional 30 days will (Continued On Page Seven)

Attorney General's Office Rules On Treasurer's Salary

AUSTIN—(AP)—The Midland County Commissioners' Court may pay the county treasurer "any reasonable sum" after September 7; but not less than \$2,400 per year, the attorney general ruled Wednesday.

At present, the maximum compensation of the Midland County treasurer is \$3,800, the attorney general said in an opinion requested by Midland County Auditor Netteye C. Romer.

An increase will be permissible when a law passed by the 52nd Legislature goes into effect September 7. It allows the fixing of a "reasonable" salary for counties of 20,000 to 50,000 population.

Midland County's auditor had asked if the treasurer's salary could be hiked to \$6,750 per year.

Assistant Attorney General Burnell Waldrep wrote the opinion.

In Midland, Mrs. Romer said the county treasurer, Mrs. Minnie Doster, is being paid an annual salary of \$6,750, along with other elected officers.

The present \$6,750 salary rate for elected officials was authorized June 11 by Midland County Commissioners' Court under a state law which provides an additional 25 per cent increase over the statutory salary.

The salaries were raised to the maximum of \$5,400 last Fall.

About 1947, Mrs. Romer said, the elected officials, including the county treasurer, received salary increases to \$4,500. At that time the county treasurer's salary hike to a par with the other officials was authorized by a ruling from the attorney general's office, Mrs. Romer said.

Public hearing on a 125-block paving project will be held at 3 p. m. Thursday in the City Council Chamber at City Hall.

The signing-up of affected property owners will begin following the hearing and paving work will be started next month. It will include the paving of all unpaved alleys in the business district.

Pressure Group Threatens To Kill Price Control Law

WASHINGTON—It didn't get in the papers or on the air at the time, but several weeks ago, Allan B. Kline, Iowa farmer, banker and president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, called on Eric Johnston, Economic Stabilization administrator.

All right, Kline replied, if that was the answer, he would have to take his demand right over Johnston's head, to Charles E. Wilson, as director of the Office of Defense Mobilization, is Johnston's immediate superior.

Kline spoke his piece, Wilson listened. When it was ended, Wilson, in effect, told Kline what Maj. Gen. Anthony C. McAuliffe told the Nazis at the Battle of the Bulge: "Nuts!"

Wilson, however, amplified his remarks considerably. He was a free enterprise man himself, and always had been. But in time of emergency, like the present, it was necessary to exercise some restraints on the economy.

Kline replied that if that was the way Wilson felt about it, there was no use wasting any more time there. Then the farm leader pulled his Sunday punch. He would beat Wilson in Congress, he threatened.

Even of the last weeks have proved that Kline was only half right. He had the votes in Congress to cripple, but not to kill completely, all controls on meat. Kline and the farm block have given Wilson and Johnston the beating of their lives.

It has been one of the slickest lobbying jobs ever done on any legislation. Kline wasn't even in town. Neither were the heads of the American National Cattlemen's Association, Independent Livestock Marketing Association and almost 20 national, regional and state farmers and livestock raisers' groups.

They operated in Washington through their second and third string officials and their Washington legislative representatives—in plainer language—their professional lobbyists.

Out in the field, however, the heads of all these organizations worked like beavers, organizing local protest meetings. They were held all over the farm belt and in the cattle-raising range states. They wired and telephoned and otherwise put the pressure on their local congressmen.

This furnished the "ground swell" of support for terminating all price and wage controls, which Rep. Jesse Wolcott of Michigan talks about.

Rangers Seek 'Top Echelon' In Series Of Dallas Bombings

DALLAS — Texas Rangers Wednesday continued their hunt for the person Capt. Bob Crowder said "planned" the bombings of negro property in South Dallas.

Crowder said Tuesday the arrest of two men in connection with the bombings was "only the beginning."

"These definitely are not the leaders of these bombings," Crowder said.

"We intend to keep investigating until we find the person planning the bombings."

Claude Thomas Wright, an ex-convict, said in a signed statement Tuesday he "had a part" in bombing three buildings in South Dallas and in placing two other bombs that didn't explode.

Wright and a half-brother, Arthur Eugene Young, 62, a farm hand in Hunt County, near Greenville, were arrested and charged Tuesday with arson by explosion.

Young denied guilt.

A few hours after the two men were charged in "lamplight" proceedings before Justice of the Peace Bill Richburg, a "blue ribbon" grand jury of Dallas business and civic leaders started a special investigation into the bombings, 11 in South Dallas during the last 18 months.

Ray L. Hubbard, an oil man, is foreman of the special panel. The managing editors of both Dallas newspapers are on the jury, Felix R. McNight of The Dallas Morning News and James F. Chambers of The Daily Time Herald.

Open Arab Clashes Reported In Jordan

be allowed for exercising the option. The approval of the contract came after a five-hour Tuesday afternoon conference between McMillen, King, Ed Reed of the geological society, Richard Brooks, attorney representing the owner of the Midland Farms land, and Attorney Joe Mims, representing the city.

Option Costs Nothing
"We have studied this carefully," reported McMillen, "and I feel that it is the best deal the City of Midland can get."

The option cost the city nothing, he said, and the only exploration cost will be that of drilling the test wells.

Data from existing wells on the property will be made available for exploration studies. However, the windmill wells on the Midland Farms land and all the existing wells on the land owners.

An additional provision reserves the city two acres of surface rights to a section for the location of employees houses, pump stations and other installations.

Negotiations for the property were started several weeks ago on recommendation of a special committee, headed by Reed, which the geological society appointed to study the water problem for the city.

This committee had spotted several likely water production areas but cited the area northwest of the city as the most logical spot.

\$1,000,000-Plus Project
The size of the area taken under option can be compared to the present one and three-quarter sections from which the city now gets its entire water supply. Even if the city should acquire only two sections from each owner, it still would have more than twice the area which now furnishes the city its water.

While no analysis has been made, it has been reported that the water now being pumped from the area is of a quality superior to the city's present supply.

If tests prove the water reservoir indications, the city probably will launch a program of development costing more than \$1,000,000, and which would have to be financed through a bond issue.

And, if the program is undertaken, it will not be completed, according to city officials, in time to be used next summer.

The proving of an adequate supply of water in this area, too, probably will eliminate the possibility of Midland joining the Colorado River Municipal Water District, although city officials still are considering it.

IRAN: Cockpit for Conquest

Persia's continuous relationship with the British, climaxed by the current trouble over oil, began in 1598 when two British adventurers, Sir Robert and Anthony Shirley, helped train Shah Abbas' army. In 1611 a British trading ship visited Persia. Portugal, fearing a Persian monopoly of trade, attacked a second British expedition.

Aided by the Persian army, the British fleet put a quick end to Portugal's supremacy on the Persian Gulf. But 100 years after Shah Abbas' death, Persia was again decadent. The Afghans invaded the kingdom in 1722. Then Russia made the first of many moves to dominate Iran by sending troops into the country. Turkey quickly followed suit.

It was Afshar tribesman Nadir Kuli who expelled the Afghans from Persia in 1729, battled the Turks to defeat, and recovered Persia's provinces from Russia. Thirsting for vengeance on the Afghans, Kuli then supervised the construction of a fortified wall around the Afghan stronghold of Kandahar.

In 1738, after the successful siege of Kandahar, the Shah's troops followed in the footsteps of Alexander the Great to invade India. Delhi was sacked and Kiva conquered. Shah Nadir died in 1747 at the hands of his own bodyguard.

Persia was then drawn further into the orbit of European politics. In 1807, Napoleon unsuccessfully tried to interest Persia in his plan for attacking the British in India.

"Each county has a vital interest in maintaining home ties with its young men and women in military service," Wooten said, "and each will be asked to assume its proportionate share of the USO budget to assure that morale in the armed forces is maintained on a high level."

FBI Adds Arkansas Gunman To List Of 'Most Wanted Men'

WASHINGTON—A 22-year-old gunman wanted for bank robbery was added by the FBI Wednesday to its list of 10 top fugitives. He is Ollie Gene Embry, also known as Gene Craig, a native of Harrisburg, Ark., who has been in trouble with the police since he was 15. He now is sought for the daylight holdup of the Monroe National Bank at Columbia, Ill., last February 6.

Dick Contino Pleads Guilty To Charge Of Draft Evasion

SAN FRANCISCO—A pacifist, Dick Contino, who got "panic claustrophobia" on 28,800-acre Fort Ord, Calif., spent Tuesday night in a 5x8-foot county jail cell. Contino, at 21 a \$4,000-a-week entertainer, entered a surprise plea of guilty at his draft evasion trial Tuesday. He told Federal Judge Michael J. Roche he now is ready to go into the Army.

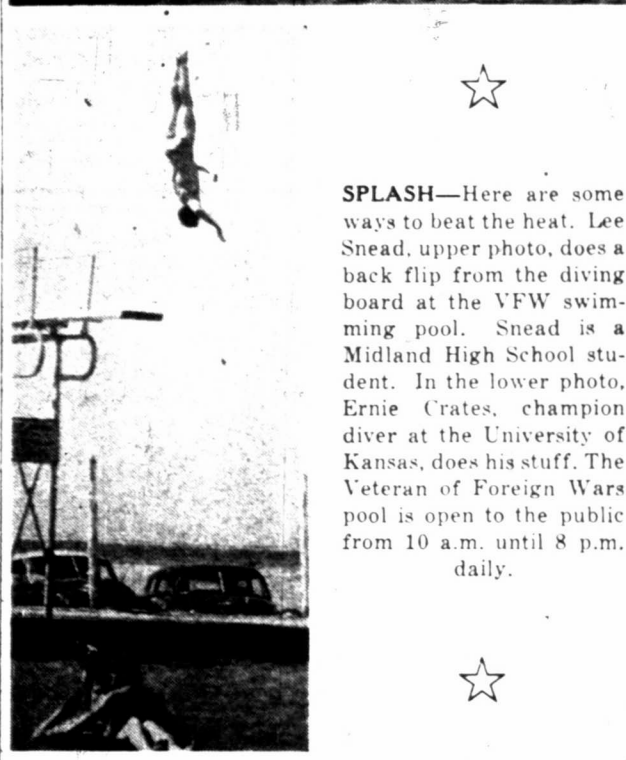
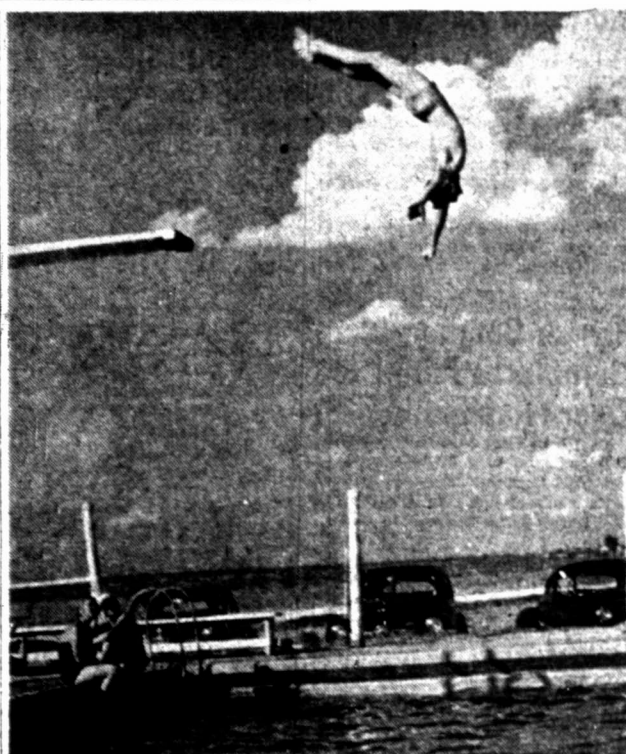

DDT Is Effective Weapon If It Is Used Properly

From the standpoint of human beings, insects are both beneficial and harmful. Some, like bees, help to pollinate fruit trees so they will bear more of what we eat and even supply a food of their own—honey. The harmful or annoying aspects of insect life are, however, more apparent a good part of the time: the diseases or irritations spread by lice, mosquitoes, or flies.

It would be ideal if we had some poison which would destroy the dangerous or unpleasant insects and not harm the others, but this happy prospect seems rather dim. Also some of the insects have qualities which are consider both good and bad.

During the war, however, an insect poison—DDT—was developed which has remarkable qualities and which now is so widely used that many questions have been raised not only about its use against insects but also its possible harmful action on human beings.

DDT undoubtedly has been responsible already for the prevention of many cases of disease and death. It has been used extensively against mosquitoes and therefore is to be credited with bringing such diseases as malaria and yellow fever under control to a certain extent. It also has been most effective in killing lice on hundreds of thousands of people when this was needed quickly to stamp out typhus.

Is there any danger to human beings? For the person constantly exposed to heavy doses there are precautions. So far as ordinary household use is concerned I can do no better than quote the statement of the committee which recently studied the subject and reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association:

"DDT is a highly effective and useful insecticide and it is not likely to cause poisoning unless carelessly used. DDT insecticides should never be stored in food cupboards or medicine chests where there is likelihood of contamination or mistaken use.

"All exposed foods, utensils and working areas must be covered when kitchen and dining areas are being sprayed. Children's toys or cribs and rooms occupied by sick people should not be sprayed. Use of oil solutions on household pets should be avoided and DDT powders should be used only where they cannot be licked off.

"Intimate skin contact with aerosol discharge is to be avoided. Plants and aquariums in the home should be removed or covered before applying DDT sprays or aerosols. The use of oil solutions in the vicinity of open fires should be avoided because of the inflammability of such mixtures."

Three-Month-Old Girl Sole Survivor Of Family Tragedy

CHARLOTTESVILLE, VA. —(AP)—Tiny Linda Sue Conley clung to life Wednesday, the sole survivor of her father's violent assault on his three infant children.

Doctors hoped the three-month-old girl would escape the fate that befell her two brothers when Raymond W. Conley, 39, tried in a fit of rage Monday to kill all three.

William Emery Conley, 18 months old, died instantly then from a throat slash. Tuesday night, death claimed the second of the children, Wilson Lee, aged three, whom Conley shot in the stomach.

Linda Sue was cut about the throat during the assault.

Conley, a shipping clerk estranged from his wife, told police he assaulted the youngsters after he was forced to stay home from work to tend them. A baby-sitter, scheduled to arrive, never did.

Conley is charged with murder and Tuesday was ordered held for grand jury action after a preliminary hearing.

Conley's mother, Mrs. Clemmie Hawley, with whom he and the children lived, said Tuesday Conley "hasn't been himself" since suffering a head injury in World War II. He was a Seabee in the Pacific Theater.

Negro Sentenced In Divorce Racket

LOS ANGELES —(AP)—William Hawkins, 38-year-old negro, was under a year jail sentence Wednesday for running a quickie divorce racket in Texas and Los Angeles. Hawkins admitted getting divorces by proxy in Dallas and Fort-Worth for \$120 fees.

He hired Texans to represent themselves as California couples seeking divorces.
