Tide Water Associated Oil Com any No. 1 E. B. Dickenson, Ellendiscovery in Central-South wartin County, at last report was nowing at the calculated rate of 432 arrels of oil per day.

After washing perforations at 12,087 to 12,105 feet with 500 gallons of mud acid, operator went in the hole to drillstem test on those perforations with packer set at

TOKYO -(P)- A sharp message from the Communist command Thursday night told Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway there would be no new violations of the Korean conference site "unless you should deliberately fabricate incidents as an excuse to terminate armistice negotiations."

The armistice talks have been suspended since Saturday on General Ridgway's complaint that armed Chinese Communist troops entered the neutral conference

zone of Kaesong. The Reds promised Sunday not to let it happen again, but the supreme United Nations commander demanded a Threat Made firm guarantee before agreeing to resume the negotiations. The Reds have accused the Al-

lies of violating the sone.



From the howling that set up, you'd think Army was the very, first team to decide it would be nice to have athletes enrolled in its nallowed walls.

But, says Bob Winslow, coach at Arizona, Texas Tech is going out and recruiting football players.

My! What a surprise. And all this time we thought the Tech coaches were traveling around the country only as an outlet for surplus energy. We wouldn't have dreamed the Texas Tech coaches were going so far as to "invite" gridders to the Lubbock school.

Actually, the Arizona coach is exhibiting a short memory as he cries because Tech is lining up football talent. Two years ago, Arizona U's freshman football team averaged more than 60 points per contest for the entire season, and allowed but two opposing touchdowns over the route. Now, as juniors, they have been touted as ready to tear up the Border Conference

Winslow, naturally, is upset because Tech may throw a monkey wrench into his plans for a great team at Arizona. A couple of years back, it didn't look as if Tech's style of play-three off-tackle bucks and a punt-would endanger Winslow's array of grid skill. Now, however, he's growing mighty restless as Tech tries to surge to the front.

We'd just like to ask Mr. Winslow one question: Whereinhell did he get the players who formed the devastating freshman team two seasons ago

We'll wager they just didn't drop in out of the clear, blue Arizona

sky and decide to play football. Winslow has charged Texas Tech with having an athletic fund of \$400,000 to land football players.

He's wrong. But, Texas Tech Coach DeWitt Weaver flatly stated here in Midland recently: "We at Tech believe it will cost about \$25,000 per game to field a strong football team."

That's \$250,000 for a 10-game schedule. We don't know if Tech has the money raised or not, but one thing we'll wager-if it takes that amount of greenbacks, the Red Raiders will get it.
