

South Korea Hands United States Bill For Hundred Million

WASHINGTON—(AP)—South Korea has handed the United States a bill, and asked prompt payment of \$100,000,000 for goods and services supplied to American fighting forces. Ambassador Yoi Chan Yang told reporters Thursday he appealed for the money during a call on Assistant Secretary of State Dean Rusk. He added that the State Department favors the payment. Under agreement with nations fighting in Korea, Dr. Yang said bills for foodstuffs, material and labor furnished their troops were to have been presented after the war ended. But he explained his government needs the money now to help fight inflation.

Egyptian Officer, British Dancer, Are Channel Champions

Dover, England—(AP)—An Egyptian Army officer and a British ballroom dancing queen took top honors in Thursday's mass swimming assault on the treacherous English Channel. Hassan Hamad, 34-year-old Army officer from Cairo, won the London Daily Mail's cross-channel race from Cap Gris Nez, France, to Britain's Cliffs of Dover in a photo finish over Frenchman Roger Le Morvan, 37. Hamad's winning time was 12 hours and 18 minutes. Brenda Fisher of Britain was the first woman to touch shore, and apparently she set a new women's record of 13 hours, 45 minutes for the crossing. This tops the record established last year by Florence Chadwick of San Diego, Calif., who made it in 18 hours, 23 minutes. Miss Fisher's time, however, is subject to a re-check by the judges. Hamad and Miss Fisher both got a \$2,800 first prize. Le Morvan crawled ashore only one minute behind Hamad at a point five miles away. Of the 20 who started, 18 finished the grueling race. The Egyptian team held a firm grip on the honors. Two of Hamad's fellow officers were among the first five finishers. Last Year's event was won by Egypt's Hassan Abd El Behim, who placed third Thursday. The Egyptians said they had been training for weeks for the grind, eating a pound of raw onions daily to build up their strength. King Farouk sent the jubilant team congratulatory messages from France, where he is honeymooning. Winnie Frances Roach, 25, of Canada was second in the women's division. She and Le Morvan both got \$1,400. The other 14 who finished the swim get consolation prizes of \$700 each.

Rescuers Climb Volcano Toward Crashed Airplane

TOLUCA, MEXICO—(AP)—Rescuers climbed up snow-capped Toluca Volcano Friday toward an unidentified twin engine plane reported crashed near the crater. The volunteers, led by an experienced guide and a Mexican Red Cross official, started the climb up the 15,000-foot cone Thursday night. The Toluca party, which went part way up the volcano by auto, hoped to reach its goal Friday. A thick fog slowed the climb. The wrecked craft was sighted Thursday by pilots from the Puebla Civil Aviation School. The plane was near the perpetual snow line at the crater. There were no signs of life. The Mexico City airport tower, which controls all plane traffic in Central Mexico, said it had no record of a missing plane. All commercial and scheduled flights are accounted for.

Hearst Rites Held In San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Final tributes were paid Friday to William Randolph Hearst, the millionaire miner's son who founded one of the greatest publishing domains of the world has ever known. Public funeral rites for the 86-year-old publisher were held at 11 a.m. in Grace Episcopal Cathedral, atop Nob Hill, a few blocks from his birthplace. As he stipulated before death, he was to be interred in Cypress Lawn Cemetery, near the tombs of his parents, former U.S. Senator George Hearst and Phoebe Apperson Hearst. More than 80 honorary pallbearers were announced Thursday by the family. They included such leaders as former President Herbert Hoover, Gov. Earl Warren of California and Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

Legion Convention Reaches High Gear

SAN ANTONIO—(AP)—A. Schaif of Seguin and Charley Gibson of Amarillo were leading candidates Friday for state commander as the Texas American Legion's annual convention reached high gear. Officers will be elected Sunday. There were 3,000 legionnaires here. Speakers include Governor Shivers, Lieutenant Gen. Leroy Lutes, commander of the Fourth Army, and Donald R. Wilson, chairman of the Legion's National Foreign Relations Board. Shivers, Lutes and Attorney General Price Daniel speak Friday, Wilson Saturday.

FRANKFURT, GERMANY—(AP)—U.S. authorities Friday were holding Gustav Davidovic, a Czech, under 1,000,000 marks (\$238,000) bond on charges of shipping illegally almost half a million dollars worth of strategic materials from West Germany to Red-ruled Czechoslovakia. The U.S. District Court here set the bail at the highest figure ever asked in an American court in Germany and served notice it would investigate any who offered to put up the bond.

Detroit Honors Deceased Newsman

DETROIT—(AP)—The City of Detroit did something without precedent here Thursday night. A big park and playground was dedicated to the memory of a newspaper reporter. The late Arthur W. O'Shea, well known labor writer who died a little less than a year ago, was honored. For the last several years of his life, O'Shea was labor editor of the Detroit Free Press. WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government will provide \$75 a month to the widow of Adm. Forrest P. Sherman, late chief of Naval operations, according to Assistant Secretary of Defense Anna Rosenberg. HOF, GERMANY—(AP)—West German police Friday said one of three Slovaks fleeing Communist-ruled Czechoslovakia was shot fatally by Czech border guards while attempting to cross the Czech-German border near here Thursday night. The second used a herd of cattle as cover and succeeded in reaching West German territory, police said. Fate of the third was not known.

Man Who Claimed To Be Jesse James Dies At Granbury

GRANBURY, TEXAS—(AP)—Jesse James, the Missouri outlaw, is dead at last—if J. Frank Dalton actually was the man who terrorized the Midwest in the Eighties. Dalton, who said he was 107, died here Wednesday night. The aged man, who came here recently from Texas City, claimed three years ago, while living at Lawton, Okla., that he was James—that the man who was shot at St. Joseph, Mo., in 1862 by Bob Ford actually was Charlie Bigelow. But Jesse E. James of Los Angeles, son of the outlaw, and other members of the James family denied Dalton's claims.

He placed Pruitt under \$3,000 bond to return to jail at 10 a. m. Monday to finish out his sentence.

Private Builders Need Lures To Provide Defense Housing

WASHINGTON—The Atomic Energy Commission has had plenty of troubles in providing housing at its two huge plants near Aiken, S. C., and Paducah, Ky.

For the private home builders—in spite of all protests against government housing—have failed completely to do the job at these two sites.

Atomic Energy Commission is an old hand at this public housing business. AEC has three "company towns"—Los Alamos, N. M.; Richland (Hanford), Wash., and Oak Ridge, Tenn.

When South Carolina and Kentucky expansions were planned, AEC decided it wouldn't get caught this time by company towns.

First Housing and Home Finance Agency Administrator Raymond M. Foley was asked what he could do about it.

What this experience proves, if anything, is what men like Senator Sparkman of Alabama, Foley, and a few rugged individuals still left in the building game.

While the total need for defense housing has been estimated at 50,000 units, the Senate-passed bill now before the House of Representatives will meet only about half of this demand.

It would provide \$1,500,000,000 worth of mortgage insurance for defense housing. It would provide \$150,000,000 in direct housing loans to veterans.

A \$10,000,000 revolving fund would be created to acquire sites near defense plants and avoid land speculation like that in South Carolina.

Informality, Even Laughter, Replace Somber Formality At Kaesong Parleys

KAESONG, KOREA—(AP)—Informality and even laughter replaced somber military formality at the Korean truce talks Friday.

A four-man subcommittee brought the radical change. We could hear them laughing during their sessions. Before, it was something worth mention when a Chinese general smiled—or almost smiled—at an American admiral.

When they finished their day's work, Communist and United Nations delegates posed together. They never had done that before.

While posing, U. S. Maj. Gen. Henry I. Hodges put his arm around North Korean Maj. Gen. Lee Song Cho. Previously, a curt nod was considered a friendly gesture.

In this new atmosphere, the four delegates sought to solve the toughest problem—cease-fire negotiators yet have encountered—where to draw a military demarcation line for the armistice.

Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, chief UN delegate, proposed the subcommittee procedure, with the idea that a small group could accomplish in an air of informality what the full 10-man conference could not do in its formal sessions.

Around, Not Across
Joy suggested the subcommittee meet "around, rather than across" the table.

They did exactly that. They sat at a round table. It sits a few yards to the right of the long, rectangular conference table used by the delegations. The circular table is used by UN assistants at regular sessions.

General Hodges and Rear Adm. Arleigh Burke, other UN member of the subcommittee chatted amiably with the three UN correspondents at the conference site.

Four Face Arson Charges In Firing Of House In Dallas

DALLAS—(AP)—Arson charges were on file Friday against four men in the burning of a house in a Dallas area where negro houses have been bombed.

Officers did not link the cases with the bombings, but Ranger Captain E. J. Banks said "The arsonists are entirely the same racial case. This time they involve fire instead of bombs as a terror weapon."

Charged are T. D. Peacock, Jr., 24, of Fort Worth, a former convict; D. C. (Cotton) Bailey, 37, of Dallas; Burl Foster, 30, of Mesquite, who received a five-year suspended burglary sentence as a juvenile in 1935, and E. H. (Red) White, 42, of Dallas.

Assembly Of Youth Delegates Conclude Triennial Conclave

ITHACA, N. Y.—(AP)—Delegates to the World Assembly of Youth packed up Friday and headed over to their council the job of turning hopes into reality.

The 500 delegates from 64 nations ended their first triennial conference Thursday night on the Cornell University campus.

For 12 days they had weighed methods to help the youth of their countries live in peace and freedom.

Friday, their council was to forge an action program from the W.A.Y. resolutions, which ranged from promoting freedom of movement for young people to preventing juvenile prostitution.

The council, comprising four representatives from each member nation, governs way between meetings of the full assembly.

Praise For U. S.
As they adjourned Thursday night, the young people praised the U. S. for its hospitality, and forecast a bright future for the assembly.

Edmond Caleb of British Guiana, voicing a theme threaded through conference discussions, said:

"The world is our neighbor and we must cure rather than destroy it."

"Peace is something positive, translated in terms of proper dwellings, decent wages and respect for the individual."

Speaking for Africa, Gontran Maka of French Guinea told the host delegation:

"We are proud, we are happy that here we are treated with justice. Africa is happy to see that we are treated as free men, like the youth of all other continents."

Francis Potter of Amherst, Mass., speaking for the host group, said the delegates had gained "a new pride in our traditions—and at the same time, a very real humility."

As many as 20 correspondents for each side have been present at the Kaesong conference site. The Communist newsmen said they learned Thursday night the UN was limiting the number of correspondents during subcommittee sessions and decided to follow suit.

More of the women fliers were due in Friday, so the actual winner among 44 entries was yet to be determined.

Pert in a red and blue plaid cotton frock with matching cap, Mrs. Davis landed her 300-horsepower Cessna 195 "dream ship" at 6:23 p.m. after a two-stop, 1,600-mile hop from El Paso.

Attempt On Tito's Life Is Reported

Microwave System, Spanning Continent, Goes Into Operation

NEW YORK—(AP)—In a historic event in communications, a \$40,000,000 microwave radio beam system spanning the continent went into operation for long distance telephone service Friday.

Telephone calls—and later network television will travel through the air on invisible, finely focused microwave radio beams relayed from horizon to horizon by 107 towers spaced about 30 miles apart.

A group of notables gathered for an opening ceremony at the headquarters of the long lines department of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, which built the electronic communications superhighway.

The towers, some of steel and some of concrete, stretch across the continent from New York through Pittsburgh, Cleveland, Toledo, Chicago, Davenport and Des Moines, Iowa, Omaha, Denver, Salt Lake City and San Francisco.

Each tower has to be in line of sight of the other, as the microwave radio beams travel in straight lines and do not follow the earth's curvature. Each tower is equipped with horn-shaped antennas for sending and receiving the beams.

A beam coming over the horizon to a tower is picked up, amplified and then relayed to the next tower on the opposite horizon. A lens made of metal rather than glass does the focusing.

The beams that carry telephone calls and television programs consist of super high frequency radio waves—about 4,000,000 cycles a second compared with 1,000,000 cycles for those of a standard radio station received in the middle of your dial. The waves are only three inches in length compared with 1,000 feet for radio waves in the middle of the standard broadcast band.

The new microwave radio relay system, longest in the world, will be opened to television September 30 to provide the first coast-to-coast video hookup. Under construction since late 1947, it has been in use for television as far west as Omaha almost a year.

Dr. Perry E. Hewitt, Jr., brain specialist, was accused Thursday. The Berger woman was Mrs. Allene Shuler, 38, who was visiting here.

She died August 9. The doctor specifically is accused of administering drugs while intoxicated. Hewitt, 42, made \$5,000 bond.

County Attorney Ed Edmondson said charges were filed only "after a complete investigation and after reports had been received from Tulsa physicians who conducted the autopsy, as well as reports from the FBI laboratory in Washington." Mrs. Shuler's husband, Bob, is a post office worker.

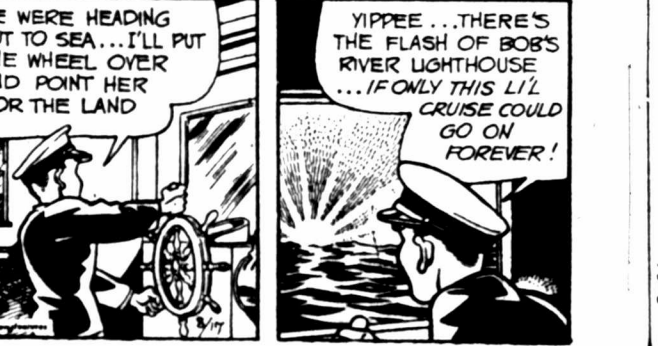

He's still got a year to serve. But Sheriff Alton feels he no longer honestly can keep Decker. He's "pale and sickly" from overwork. So the governor finally has been asked for a parole.

Still Decker says he'll stay on the job until the sheriff can find another night warden.

Churches Hit Hard By Recent Floods

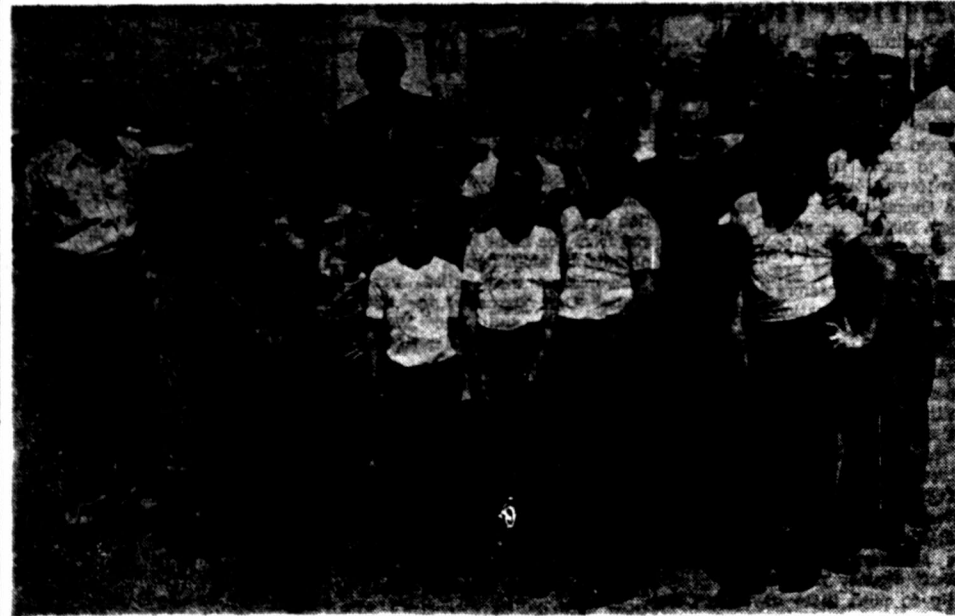
NEW YORK —(P)— A survey shows floods have left 50 church congregations in Kansas and Missouri without places of worship.

Two Women Killed, Another Wounded By Love-Crazed DP

LAKEWOOD, N. J. —(P)— Two women were shot to death Thursday night and a third wounded seriously by a love-crazed DP who later was killed when police cornered him, Ocean County Detective George Westervelt said.

Westervelt identified the dead women as Mrs. Anna Tulpan of Hillside, N. J., and her mother, Mrs. Anna Kaczmarek. Mrs. Alexandra Primpkoff of Passaic, N. J., said to be visiting the other women, was taken to Paul Kimball Hospital, where her condition was reported serious.

The assailant was identified as Pawel Yasiwicz, who police believed was from New York. Almost simultaneously, Westervelt said, Yasiwicz shot himself in the chest and police shot him as he emerged from nearby woods.

Westervelt gave this account of the tragedy:

Yasiwicz, believed to be a displaced person from Poland, was violently in love with Mrs. Tulpan, supposedly suing her husband for a divorce. Mrs. Tulpan was visiting her mother here.

Sets Fire To House

The suitor, who cleaned the grounds for Mrs. Kaczmarek, was at the home, where a get-together with the neighboring Primpkoffs was in progress. Mrs. Kaczmarek objected to Yasiwicz's attentions to her daughter and an argument ensued.

He became enraged, drew a revolver and shot Mrs. Tulpan and her mother dead. Mrs. Primpkoff was shot in the neck.

After the shootings, Yasiwicz set fire to the house, in an apparent attempt to destroy evidence. Firemen arriving on the scene discovered the bodies, and police threw a cordon around the wooded area.

Yasiwicz soon came stumbling out of the woods, brandishing a revolver in front of Lakewood Township Police Officer William Pool. He shot himself in the chest and at the same time Pool drew his revolver and shot Yasiwicz.

Official records show that the bite of the tarantula is not fatal.

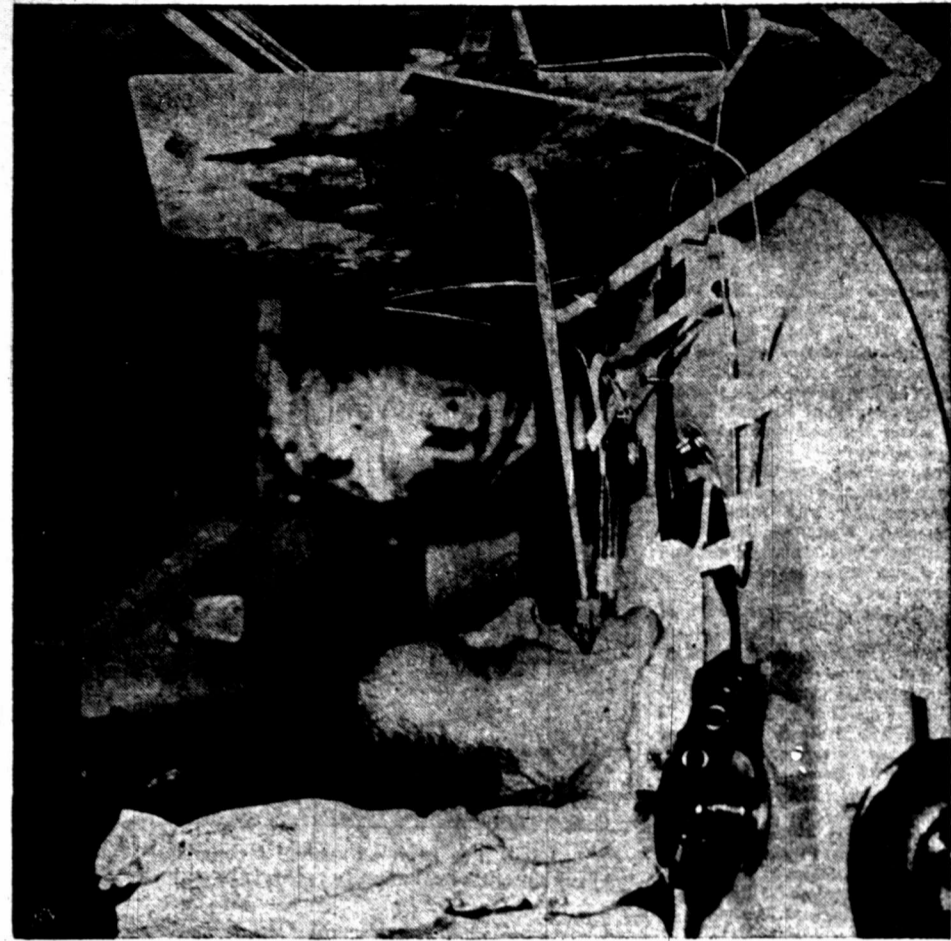

But with the bulk of the screening complete, the cases have only to be reviewed by the Academy superintendent.

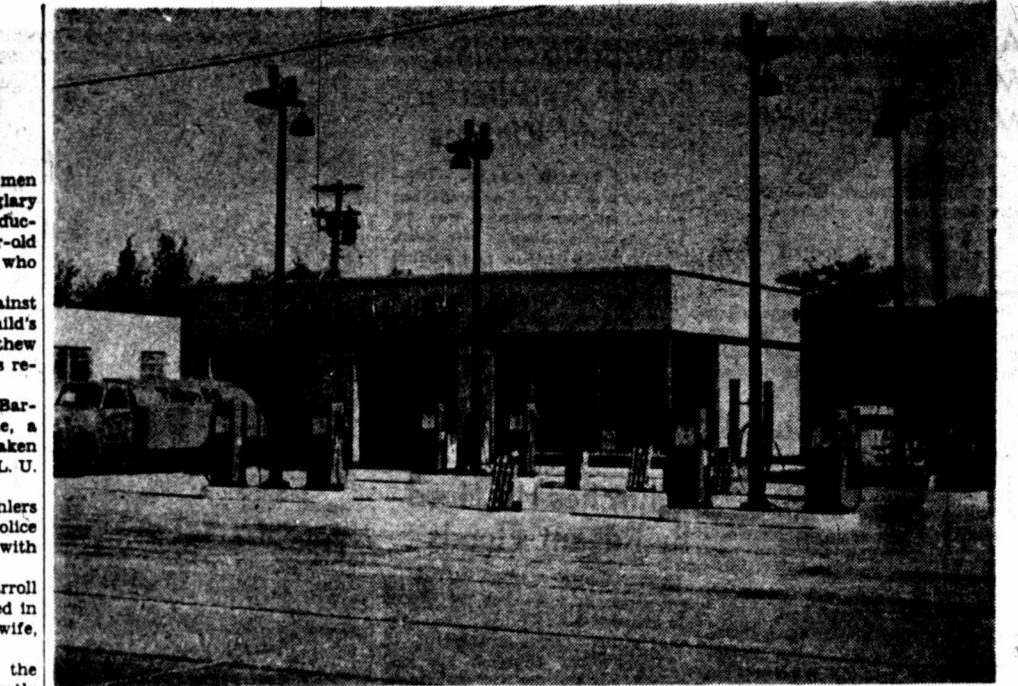

The committee refused to approve any civil defense funds for bomb shelters and other protective facilities and cut \$150,000,000 from the \$200,000,000 requested for the purchase of medical supplies and equipment.

The committee approved \$260,000,000 of the \$273,000,000 asked by the Atomic Energy Commission to speed up construction of new facilities, to test weapons and to develop new type of reactors.

Another big allotment recommended was \$790,216,000 for stockpiling strategic and critical material, for which the President had requested \$800,000,000.

In refusing to approve civil defense funds to buy firefighting equipment or to pay for warden services, the committee said local governments should take care of such programs.

Read The Classifiers

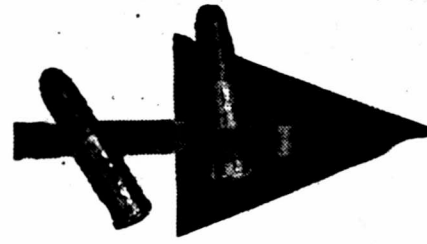

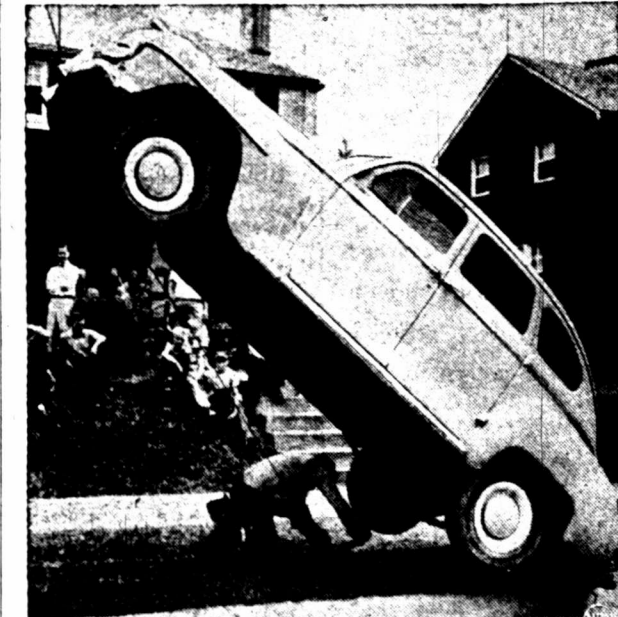

HONG KONG—(AP)—Fabled Tu Yueh-Sen, 83, who at times ruled Shanghai through his control of the underworld, died Friday in respectable semi-retirement in Hong Kong.
Tu, who had graduated from gang ruler to a wealthy banker, merchant and trader, fled to Hong Kong in April 1949 before Communists took over Shanghai.
In 1927 during the early days of struggle for power between Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and the Communists, Tu and his gang took over control of Shanghai, later turning the city over to Chiang.
When the Japanese captured Shanghai, Tu moved in again. He controlled the city of 5,000,000 when the Nationalists came back in 1945.
Chiang made him a major general.
