Laughter Is Encouraging

". . . occasional laughter drifting through the hot. muggy air from the Kaesong conference room indicated the four-man armistice subcommittee had met again in a spirit of friendly informality."

That statement in an Associated Press dispatch from Munsan, Korea, Sunday perhaps is the most encouraging bit of news to come out of the long drawn-out Korean cease-fire talks.

And the word "laughter" is the key to the whole situation.

It compares with the words "somber," "formal," "firm" and so forth which have described previous sessions of the entire peace negotiating teams. In several of the deadlocked meetings, Communist negotiators sat for hours without saying a word and certainly without cracking a smile. It is no wonder the talks bogged down.

But progress is reported in the informal meetings of the smaller groups. Laughter even has been heard.

Something yet may come out of the Kaesong talks, and surely the "spirit of friendly informality" must be credited to a large extent if and when the cease-fire order is issued.

Nothing can compare with a sense of humor in working out a tough problem, and certainly the Korean problem is no exception. Both sides, however, must be willing and able to smile, at least a little, if the problem is to be solved satisfactorily and in the shortest possible time. The AP news story indicated the laughter came from members of both the UN and Red negotating teams. That is the encouraging factor.

A sense of humor, a smile, and a willingness to give and to take work wonders at meetings and conferences of all kinds, whether in Kaesong, in Midland, in Austin or in Washington. From the City Council meeting in Midland to the conference of world powers in Washington, Paris or London, a sense of humor is essential if our and where, if you flash a White at night, put up with the poor Comproblems, local or international, are to be solved satisfactorily.

The very same thing, too, applies in our home life, our business life, or in anything in which problems and differences of opinion arise.

Let's smile, or even better, laugh when the going is toughest. It will pay dividends.







At three no-trump South would have no problems. He would need a simple diamond finesse to make his contract. The finesse would succeed, and that would be that. At four hearts, life was not so simple. South needed either a good break in clubs or a very good break in diamonds. What's more, he had to play the hand very carefully to take advantage of whatever good fortune might come his

West opened the ten of spades, and South won in his own hand. He next drew three rounds of trumps and cashed the rest of the spades, ending in dummy. Then he could afford to lead a club to

try the finesse of the club ten. West won with the jack of clubs and found himself up a tree.

If he led the last spade dummy could ruff while South discarded a loser. (That's why declarer stripped out the spades before tackling the clubs.)

If he led a diamond, South needed only the jack to win three tricks in the suit. West therefore gritted his teeth and laid down the king of clubs.


