## Morton Man Is Wreck Victim

WITH ALL THE TALK about the threatened closing of two of our Parmer County post offices, we found the following editorial in the Sunday edition of the Amarillo Globe-News of interest:

### END POSTAL MONOPOLY?

Postal deregulation seems like a good idea. But it has some drawbacks, so Congress should act carefully—if it acts at all—on James C. Miller's proposal.

Miller, the president's nominee to become federal budget director, said last week that the Postal Service is riddled with inefficiencies and pays its workers "more than necessary to retain their services." Americans would be better off, Miller asserted, if private companies were allowed to deliver first-class mail.

There is some strong evidence to support that position. The cost of a first-class stamp has more than doubled—from 10 cents to 22 cents—in the past 10 years. And while late-delivery "horror stories" are surfacing less frequently these days, they do still occasionally crop up.

Perhaps private enterprise indeed could do a better job. Labor costs account for 86 percent of the Postal Service's budget, and there is a well-founded suspicion that a for-profit business would hold the line on them better than a government institution.

But the flip side of this argument is that ending the Postal Service's monopoly would forever alter the way first-class mail is handled. And there would be losers, as well as winners.

First, understand that high-volume Post Offices can handle mail at less cost per piece than those in small towns. And it costs the Postal Service less to carry a letter across town than across the country. But the charge is the same.

In other words, the Postal Service overprices intra-city deliveries so it can underprice those involving small communities and great distances. These subsidies are justified on the belief that affordable mail service should be available to everyone.

With completion, these subsidies would end. Private companies would charge less than 22 cents per letter, but they would specialize in short-distance deliveries in high-volume areas. This is called "skimming the cream off the top." The Postal Service then would have to charge the full cost of providing small town and longer-distance service.

What is wrong with each piece of mail paying its own way? Nothing inherently. But it would be a political can of worms once small-town residents realized they had to pay more than city dwellers for mail service.

There would be other problems. For example, the Postal Service forwards a person's mail when he moves. But what would happen if a person moved from a city served by one private company to a city served by another? It would not be reasonable to expect a business to provide free forwarding service for someone who is no longer a paying customer.

Granted this is not in itself cause to reject the idea of postal competition; but it is a drawback to be considered.

Postal competition is not a new idea. A bill to implement it was introduced four years ago by Sens. Steve Symms of Idaho, Paula Hawkins of Florida, Alan Simpson of Wyoming and Jesse Helms of North Carolina. All are Republicans.

Nor is it necessarily a bad idea. Much depends on how much cheaper local service would be in large cities and how much more expensive small town and longer-distance deliveries would become. So far, there are no answers.

In fact, neither the Postal Service nor the Postal Rate Commission (Continued on Page 9)

A Morton man, Falvin Harvey, 63, was killed in a two-vehicle crash at 12:45 last Saturday afternoon at the Hub intersection.

Harvey, driving a 1967 Chevrolet flatbed truck, was westbound on U.S. Highway 86, attempting to turn south on Highway 214, when he was struck by a 1980 International Friona Industries truck northbound on Highway 214, driven by Reynaldo Gonzalez, 46.

Witnesses to the crash said that Harvey's vehicle caught fire on impact. He was hauling a John Deere tractor on the truck, which may have pinned him into the cab, as the tractor slid forward and crushed the cab of the vehicle.

Harvey was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Frances Euler of Friona.

Gonzales was taken to Parmer County Community Hospital with severe injuries including facial

lacerations and an eye injury. He was transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, and was expected to be released in a few days.

Investigating officer Richard Diegelman said that no seat belts were being worn by either party in the accident.

# Chiefs Open 1985 Football Season

The Friona Chieftains and their coaches were on the brink of opening their 1985 season Friday, and "anxious" would probably describe the team's attitude.

Two starters, tackles Mendan Dixon and Todd Southward, were doubtful starters against River Road, due to suffering from knee sprains.

Dixon, a two-way starter, had only a slight sprain, and Coach Tommy Moss said he could play if the need arose, but he was planning to start Shane Hand on offense and Jerry McDowell on defense. Jeff Chaney will replace Southward at tackle when the defensive team is on the field.

As to the battle for starting quarterback, senior Jeff Brown was to get the nod as starting quarterback against River Road. "Jeff is a steady young man, and has a good head on his shoulders," Moss said.

The Chieftain gridmaster said it was a good feeling to have more than one quarterback ready to come into the game at an instant's notice.

Juniors Shy Burney and Patches Fleming are the other candidates, and Moss has alternated all three of these varsity aspirants every six or seven plays during the team's scrimmage sessions.

"The nice thing about it is that we have not had a fumbled snap regardless of changing the quarterback," Moss said.

Given the fact that a quarterback is likely to be shaken up at times during a game, it will be good to have a couple on the sideline ready to come in if need be, or if the situation calls for a certain type of play, Moss says.

The Chieftains will visit Boys Ranch next Friday for their second game of the season, facing the Roughriders. The Chiefs saddled the 'Riders, 26-0 here last year, and 20-7 at Boys Ranch in 1983.

## Enrollment Totals Told By School

Friona's school enrollment stood at 1,291 as of Thursday, September 5, it was announced by Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The number includes 36 four-year-olds enrolled in the new pre-kindergarten program. Without the four-year-olds, the total enrollment would be 1,253, compared to 1,255 on the first Thursday of the 1984 school year.

Superintendent Jarboe pointed out that it's difficult to compare enrollment totals with last year's, due to the different factors, including the later start of school this year.

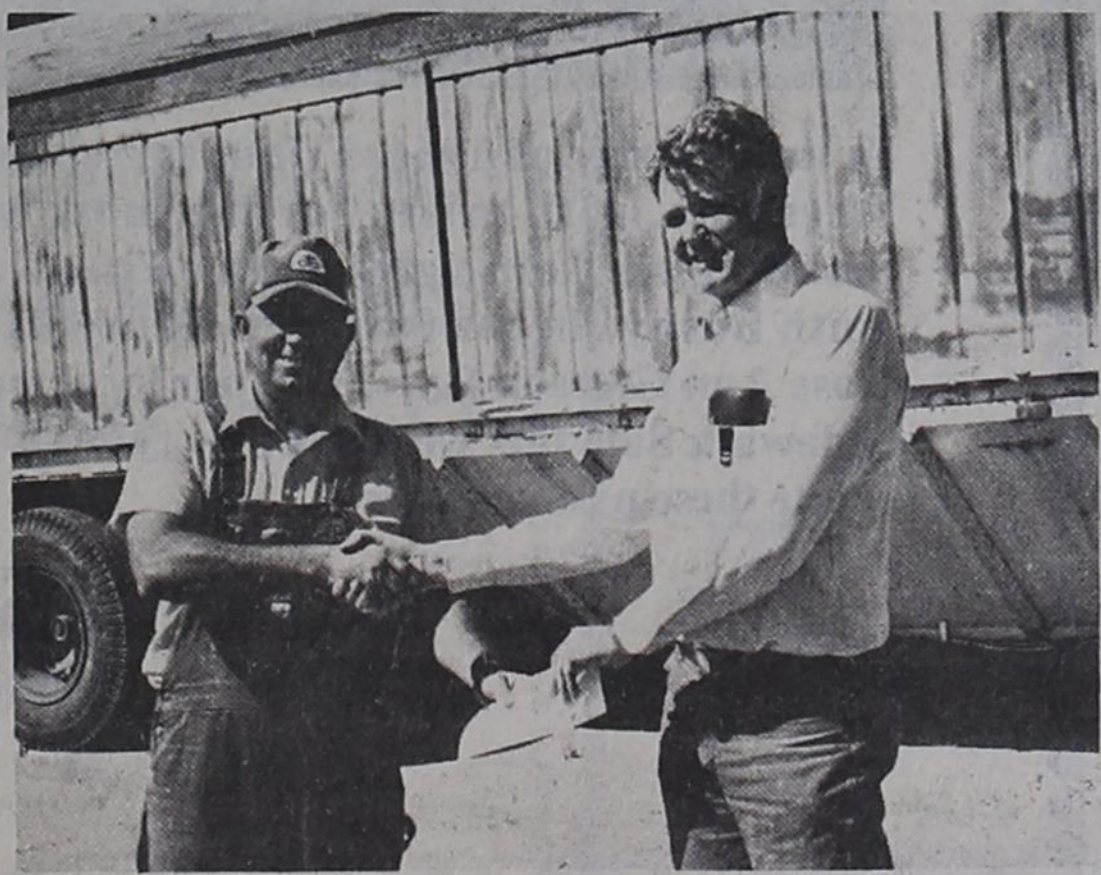
"Due to our later start, I do not anticipate the growth we normally have during our first two weeks of school. Our first week's total probably represents a better percentage of the students than we would have had before," Jarboe said.

The Friona school chief said that last year the school's enrollment grew to a peak of 1,305 on September 12.

The September 5 enrollment was broken down as follows: pre-kindergarten: 36; early childhood and special education: 8; kindergarten: 100; first grade: 110; second grade: 95; third grade: 93; fourth grade: 97; fifth grade: 92. Elementary total: 631.

Sixth grade: 105; seventh grade: 104; eighth grade: 106. Junior high total: 315.

Ninth grade: 92; tenth grade: 91; eleventh grade: 83; twelfth grade: 79. High school total: 345. Grand total: 1291.

Douglas passed away Sunday, September 1 at High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo.

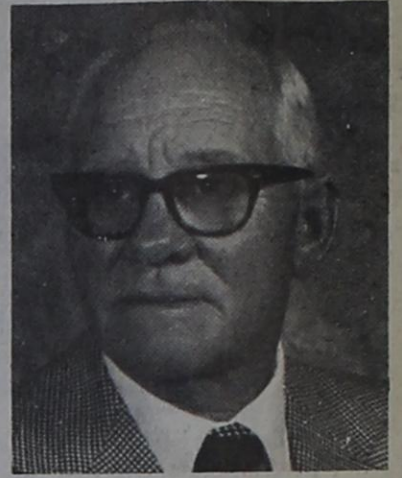

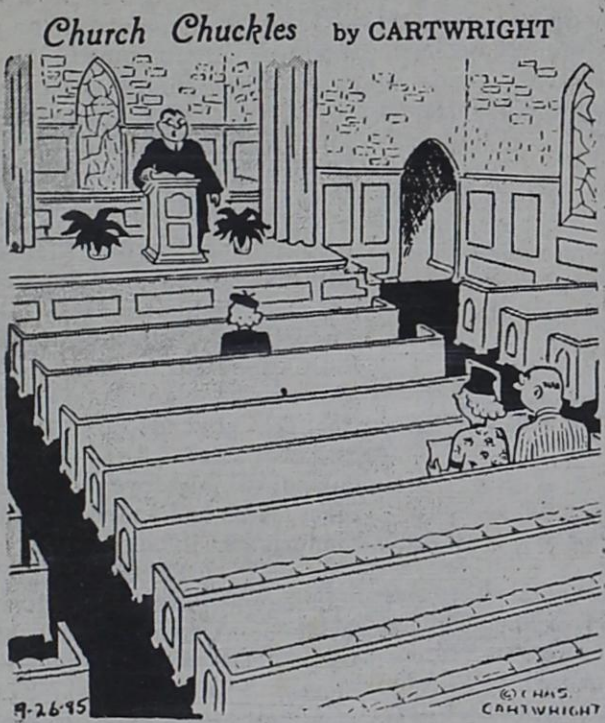

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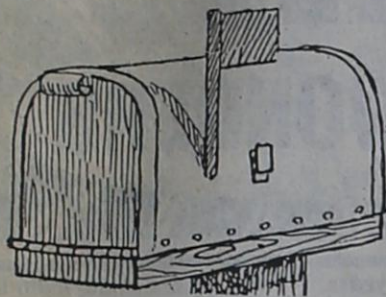

## Roots & Branches

This has nothing to do with gardening and **GENEALOGY** is not the study of interesting rock formations...that's geology.

Family tree research is one of the fastest growing hobbies in this country today, second only to photography. The "Genealogy Digest" says there are over 35 million active amateur and professional genealogists in the U.S. today. We certainly keep the post office busy, as the largest part of genealogical "research" is done through correspondence.

Then there are the impatient researchers such as Bill Ellis and Chick Burney who do most of their research by telephone. But that is the expensive method. Actually, the initial expenses of "getting

into" this hobby are nil, especially when compared to the expense of taking up something like golf or ceramics.

Later on, when you are "hooked" on this hobby, the expenses begin to mount up when you decide to take a trip back to visit the "old home place" and the old cemeteries in the areas where your people were located before they moved "out west."

Everyone who does family history research eventually gets around to making the trek to Salt Lake City, which is the "mecca" of genealogists all over the world. The Mormons have gathered just about all the family records available anywhere and put them into one large library which is made available free of charge to people of all faiths.

Unless you are a full-blooded American Indian, you have ancestors who came to the U.S. from somewhere else. The ultimate goal of every genealogist is to find that immigrant ancestor. He is the fellow who came over in the boat and first established the American branch of your family.

Then some lucky folks like the local Spring family, even get to make trips to England to tour the little villages and churches where their ancestors lived and worshipped in the 1600s. Now there's a goal to work toward!

The popularity of genealogy and the upswing in the number of family reunions certainly speaks well for the future of the extended family. In the sixties and seventies, the trend seemed to be toward no families at all. Whether they realize it or not, every person has a natural need for an established family background. This is where today's family researcher differs from the one of several decades ago, when family lineage was established in order to become a member of Colonial Dames, Daughters of the American Revolution, Sons of the Confederacy, etc. The modern family history buff is just as tickled at the prospect of finding a convicted horse-thief hanging on the family tree, as finding a famous statesman or person of royalty.

Your editor has agreed to give over a small space for a genealogy column in this paper on the weeks when there is not a "news over-set." Friona is a very new little town with lots of active people doing lots of interesting things. So this column will not appear every week. In future articles, I will discuss getting started in family research, where to find your family records, and what to do with them when you find them. 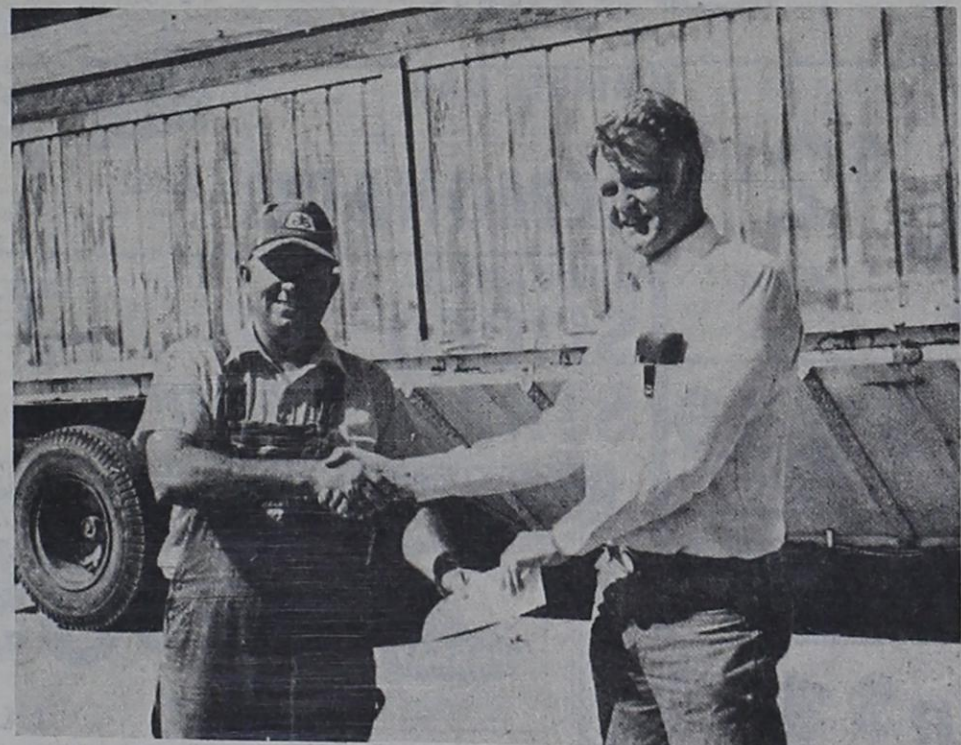

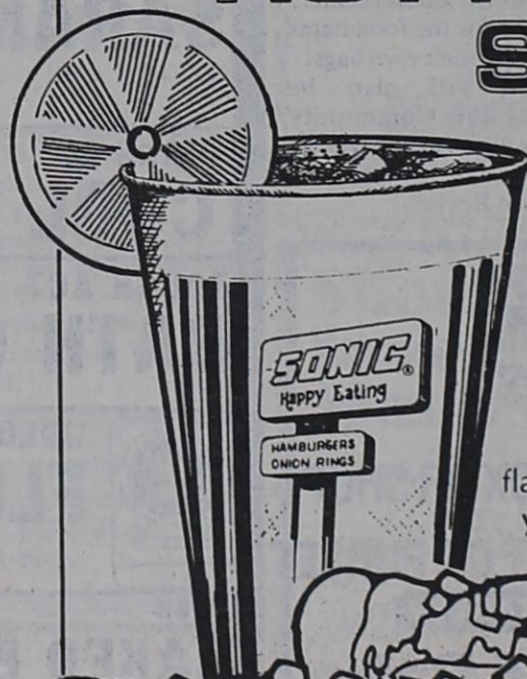

# SWPS Announces Executive Changes

The board of directors of Southwestern Public Service (SPS) has announced key executive changes in the electric utility's leadership in preparation for the pending retirement on August 31, 1985, of board chairman and chief executive officer, Berl M. Springer.

Bert Ballengee, president, was named the chief executive officer of SPS, and W.R. "Bill" Esler, executive vice president, became the company's chief operating officer.

Effective September 1, 1985, the first day of Southwestern's next fiscal year, Ballengee will become board chairman and chief executive officer, and Esler will begin serving as president and chief operating officer.

Springer joined SPS as a draftsman in 1946, and progressed through engineering, rate and budget assignments before being named executive vice president in 1972. He became president in 1976, and was elected board chairman in 1982. Springer, a native of Lakeview, Texas, is an industrial engineering graduate of Texas Tech University. In 1975, the university named him a distinguished engineer.

Ballengee began his SPS career as an accounting clerk in 1949, and served in personnel, data processing and financial management positions until he was promoted to executive vice

president in 1979. He was elected president in 1982. Ballengee was born in Trinidad, Colorado, and earned a business administration degree at the University of Texas.

Esler began work with the utility in 1948 as an engineer, and moved through division superintendent, executive management, engineering and construction responsibilities prior to his selection as executive vice president in 1983. He is a native of Denison, Texas, and was graduated from the University of Texas with an electrical engineering degree.

Southwestern primarily provides electric service in a 52,000-square-mile area in eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the South Plains and Panhandle of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

## On The Farm

By GARY PATTERSON

Texas summers are usually hot and dry, and that means homeowners must give careful attention to watering their yards and gardens.

Gary Patterson, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, offers some tips on getting the most from irrigation water so as to keep plants and lawns healthy while keeping water costs down.

1. Practice slow, deep watering to allow roots to penetrate deeper so that plants become more stress-resistant.

2. Soaker hoses and drip irrigation systems work well on trees and shrubs. It's more efficient to water at night or early in the morning because evaporation is less. However, night-time watering can promote disease problems.

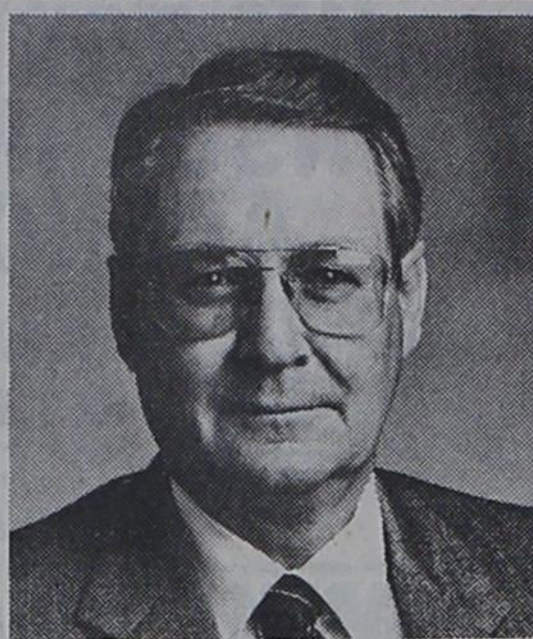
3. Too much water can be as detrimental or even worse than not enough. The rate at which water is applied should be no more than the rate at which the soil can absorb it. Never fertilize landscape plants when the soil is dry. It's best to water the area one day, apply fertilizer the next day, and then water again. Fertilizer will do no good unless it is dissolved and moved down into the soil.

4. Shrubs and trees near foundations, under eaves or on southern and western exposures need frequent watering because they often get less benefit from rainfall and have to deal with heat reflected from walls.

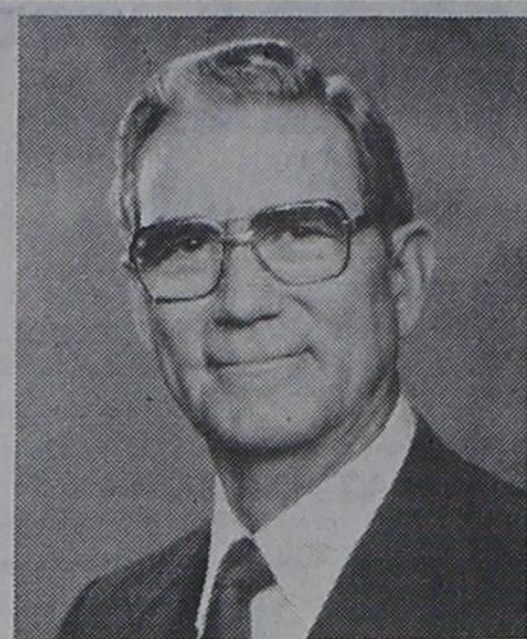
5. Plants on mounds or slopes suffer from drought stress more easily than those on level areas, so these require more frequent watering.

6. Use an organic mulch of pine bark, chopped straw, hay or similar material to reduce irrigation needs.

7. Treat water as a valuable resource. Use it to water plants when needed but do not waste water. Although considered a renewable resource, good water supplies are becoming scarce in Texas.

## New Board Holds Lubbock Meeting

The recently expanded Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board has set the Texas grain sorghum checkoff assessment at .8 cent per hundredweight. The assessment will be collected on grain when it is purchased from producers by elevators, livestock feeders, seed companies and others. ASCS will collect the assessment on grain which enters the government loan program.

Processors will be notified by letter of the effective date of the assessment. Grain which has been sold or placed in the government loan prior to that notification will not be subject to the assessment. Producers who do not wish to participate in the checkoff will have their money refunded upon their written request, accompanied by proof that the assessment was paid.

The statewide sorghum checkoff was established in a recent referendum to expand the Texas High Plains program which has existed in twenty-nine counties of the Panhandle since 1969. In the recent election, the state's sorghum producers named seven directors to fill positions on a fifteen-member board.

The board held its first meeting in Lubbock on August 23-24. New directors who were sworn in at the meeting are: James Dyer, Weslaco; J.W. Bauer, Refugio; Howard Salge, Skidmore; Richard H. Perry, Robstown; Weldon Shelton, Lamesa; Albert Scheele, Lockney; and Dennis Anthony, Friona.

In order to have better representation of all sorghum producers of the state, the board named six representatives from areas which do not have directors. Nominees from those regions who received the highest number of votes were appointed as representatives. The representatives will attend all meetings, speak for the producers of their region, serve on committees and relate the decisions and policies of the board to the region they represent. They are Mark Lamon, La Coste; Joe Pennington, Raymondville; Wilbert Vorwerk, Taylor; Dale K. Spurgin, McKinney; Ernest Michalewicz, San Angelo and Larry Smith, Munday.

The board will meet again in the last week of September to elect officers, consider projects and draft a budget.

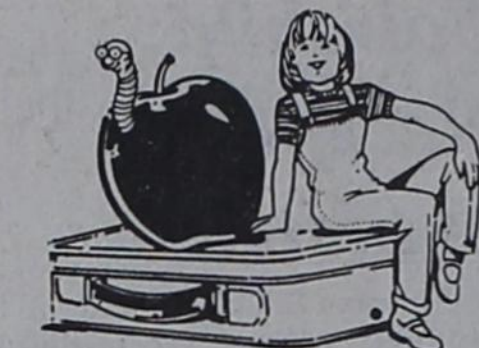

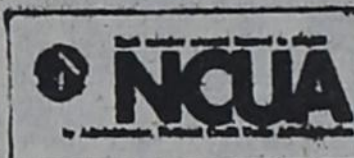

### PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1985

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalination. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalination, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

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propositions Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction and terms of court of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for:

(1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;

(2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

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
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
