Investigators Urge War On Crime

Gambling, Drugs, Corrupt Officials Scored In Report

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Senate Crime Investigating Committee Friday called on cities to band together in a war on organized crime and grafting politicians.

In a final report to the Senate on its 15-month inquiry, the committee told of "captive communities" held in bondage by the twin evils.

The committee goes out of existence at midnight. It urged strongly that Congress carry on the crusade and that, with federal help only at the start, a privately-financed National Crime Coordinating Council be created to keep "the searchlight of public vigilance turned upon crime and corruption."

The committee aimed stinging thrusts at Florida's Gov. Fuller Warren and, by indirection, at William O'Dwyer, ambassador to Mexico and former mayor of New York.

The report pictured Washington as a possible "pivot point for gambling operation of considerable size." There is evidence, too, the committee said, "of widespread traffic in narcotic drugs" in the District of Columbia.

The group recommended a new Senate committee make a "thorough investigation" of crime conditions here, especially any tieups between criminal elements in the capital and adjoining areas.

The committee denounced a "startling increase" in drug addiction among the nation's teen-age youth. It placed the blame on the same gangland which, it charged, runs "the lucrative field of illegal gambling, often operating under corrupt official sanction."

Allies Say Truce Hopes Still Alive

TOKYO—(P)—An Allied spokesman Friday said "There is no indication that there will be a permanent breakdown" in truce talks to end the Korean war.

The spokesman made the statement amid a welter of new Communist charges that United Nations forces violated the Kaesong neutral zone in Korea.

The UN command began an immediate investigation of the new complaints. There were three of them. All previous charges have been denied.

At Munsan, advance headquarters in Korea of UN truce negotiators, Maj. James MacMaster said there was no sign of a final breakdown in the talks.

Reds Maintain Contact
The Allied spokesman referred to the announced UN willingness to resume talks whenever the Reds are ready. Communists broke them off eight days ago.

Other sources observed that neither side wants to assume responsibility for renewing full scale warfare.

While the Reds have not answered Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's offer to resume negotiations, they maintained official contact between truce delegations by the mere act of filing new protests.

North Korean Gen. Nam Il, chief Communist negotiator, protested to Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, head of the UN delegation, that an Allied plane dropped a flare over Kaesong Wednesday morning.

Nam Il called it an "unbridled, unrepentant, provocative act." He demanded that "the culprits be severely punished." The Red general told Joy "the record x x x proves that you are the reckless and unscrupulous breaker of agreements."

Truman Invokes Taft-Hartley Act In Copper Walkout

WASHINGTON—(P)—Efforts to settle the wage dispute which has shut down most of the nation's copper industry continued Friday despite an initial step by President Truman to obtain a back-to-work order from the courts.

The President's late Thursday night issued an executive order to put the emergency machinery of the Taft-Hartley Labor Act in motion in a strike for the first time in 20 months.

The strike, which Truman earlier termed a serious threat to the national defense program because copper is a scarce and critical metal, started Monday.

New Wage Increase Round Gets Rolling

NEW YORK—(P)—A new wave of wage increases is starting to roll.

It follows revision by Congress last month of the wage-price control law. The Administration interprets the new law as permitting both wages and prices to rise, within limits.

At least \$60,000,000 a year is being added to the purchasing power of some three million workers whose pay moves up as the government's cost of living index rises. And this summer it went up enough to give them one cent more an hour. The government has approved the tying of pay to the escalator of living costs, and more such wage contracts may follow. The escalator contract is aimed at offsetting any drop in the amount of goods a dollar will buy.

Considerably more millions are being added to the purchasing power of other workers under negotiated wage increases announced this week. The government approves these under its policy of thawing out the original wage freeze. And some 100,000 non-ferrous metal workers are expecting negotiators to end the copper strike soon—perhaps with a 16-cent-an-hour pay boost. Cefings Start Upward

This week, too, the government has been lifting ceilings on the prices of various items—making a further rise in the cost of living index possible.

This could mean, of course, another round of inflation. But not all of these millions of dollars will flow into the channels of trade. Texas will take some. Paris will go into savings.

Millions of workers will have more money to spend, however, on better food, better clothes, household appliances, the education of their children. (Continued On Page Seven)

Mother Finds, Talks To Long-Lost Son After Weary Search Through 20 States

HOUSTON—(P)—After a weary 18-year search through some 20 states, a Houston mother Friday found her 22-year-old son who was kidnaped when he was 19 months old.

"I just never gave up hope and my prayers were finally answered," Mrs. Annabelle Linton said through misty eyes.

The long search, in which Mrs. Linton wrote "to every police chief and postmaster in every major city," finally ended at 6 p.m. Thursday when she heard her son's voice the first time in 18 years.

"I had recently written to all the armed services, but had received word from three of them that he was not in their troops," she said. "I was almost ready to give up when

a letter came from the Army Thursday." The letter was from Fort Riley, and they said a Peter McCullen Cooper was attending officer candidate school there.

Story Starts In Pampa
The story began in 1929, just 19 months after her son was born in Pampa, Texas.

"My husband, Roy Porter, was working in an oil field then and was seriously injured while working. While he was in the hospital one day, I went to get Peter and my daughter, Joy, who was four, an ice cream cone."

"When I got back, Joy told me a man had come and taken little brother away."

"I was ill and had to go to the hospital myself after my baby was

Early Decision On Proposed Gas Rate Increase Promised

An early decision was promised by the City Council Thursday afternoon on a proposal to increase natural gas rates to Midland consumers by an average of approximately 14 per cent.

The promise came after C. I. (Stony) Wall, Lubbock, president of the West Texas Gas Company, appeared personally before the council to explain the request for the system-wide rate increase.

Present at the meeting were Mayor Perry Pickett and Councilmen J. W. McMillen, Johnny Starr, J. B. McCoy and R. B. (Bum) Cowden.

"We don't like the idea of raising our rates," said Wall, "but it has become a necessity."

He said the need for a rate increase could be blamed on two principal factors—the increased cost of purchasing gas and increased federal taxes which his company will pay next year.

Figures compiled by City Manager W. H. Oswalt showed that under the proposed rate the monthly bill for the average consumer using 6,500 cubic feet would be \$3.72, compared to the present bill of \$3.27. Past Reductions Cited

Wall explained that the Railroad Commission of Texas first had set the rate in 1935, after an evaluation of the system.

"In 1937," he said, "we reduced our rate voluntarily and the Railroad Commission approved the new rate and said its docket would be held open for further orders."

"In 1940 we made another voluntary reduction and again the commission said its docket would be held open for further orders."

Growth Of Midland Amazing To Former C. Of C. Manager

Paul T. Vickers of McAllen, familiar red necktie and all, was "receiving" old friends and making new acquaintances in the lobby of Hotel Scharbauer and in the Chamber of Commerce Friday.

Vickers was manager of the Midland Chamber of Commerce from 1924 to 1934 and generally is credited with having founded the successful Chamber of Commerce movement in Midland. He has been manager of the McAllen Chamber of Commerce since leaving here Aug. 28, 1934.

Mrs. Vickers, who was prominent in civic and club affairs in Midland and who is one of the best-known and most popular women in the Rio Grande Valley today, accompanied her husband to Midland. They are guests in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Covington. Mrs. Covington for a number of years was Vickers' secretary in the C. of C. here.

"I have had but one continuous mouthful of 'Ohs' and 'Ahs' since arriving in Midland Thursday," Vickers declared. "Never have I seen anything like the growth of this city in the last 15 years. It is remarkable, and the changes which have come about are marvelous."

Extraordinary City
"I don't believe there is another city anywhere whose citizens do things as do the people of Midland."

"The cattlemen and the oil men have combined to build a great and extraordinary city here in West Texas. But even in the early days, the residents of Midland were interested in building a fine city. Why, back in the late 20's and early 30's we had a Chamber of Commerce budget of \$18,000 in this city of less than 5,000 population."

But while lauding Midland, Vickers, dean of Rio Grande Valley C. of C. managers, was getting in grapefruit propaganda plugs here and there. He will tell one pretty quick that McAllen in the Rio Grande valley is a pretty good place to live, too.

He would have said a lot more, but old friends kept coming up to shake hands with Mr. and Mrs. Vickers and to welcome them back to Ever-Growing Midland.

SAN ANTONIO—(P)—Raymond Donnell, 34, Lubbock clothing salesman, was indicted Friday in the July 2 pistol slaying of Dr. Clyde C. Craig in the Alamo Heights apartment of Mrs. Ruby Donnell. The Donnells had been married only three weeks.

The grand jury took no action on an assault to murder charge against Donnell in the shooting of his stepdaughter, Jean Roberts, 11. She was struck by a bullet in the right arm in the flurry of shots.

Donnell had been out on a \$2,500 bond signed by Wayne Kelly and Homer H. Smith, both of Lubbock. Dr. Craig, 58, was a prominent Lubbock dentist.

Cancer Complications Are Not Common In Fibroids

Some interesting questions about fibroids have been sent by M. A. P. "I have a sister," she writes, "who is having trouble with a fibroid about the size of a golf ball. Since I have had trouble of the same sort which was treated successfully with X-ray, she has asked my advice."

"Could a fibroid the size of a golf ball be diagnosed accurately in a woman around 40 years old who has had several children? Is there a simple test to determine whether cancer is present in the fibroid? Could a small fibroid cause loss of weight and general run-down condition? How are such fibroids treated?"

These questions cover practically the entire subject. It is possible for a skilled physician to make a rather accurate diagnosis of the presence of a fibroid. The size, too, can be quite exactly noted. If there are several fibroids present—which is not unusual—the exact number and their size cannot always be discovered quite as accurately before an operation.

There is no simple test to determine whether there is cancer present in a fibroid. But, and this is important, cancer is not an important complication and occurs infrequently in fibroids. As to the effects of fibroids, it certainly can be said they may and often do cause a person to be run-down in health. They frequently are associated with symptoms which do cause the victim to become anemic or otherwise reduced from a state of good health.

Three Treatments
As to treatment, there is this to say. A fibroid, or several of them, cannot be dissolved or made to disappear by any drug. In fact the tendency is for them to grow in size.

EL SEGUNDO, CALIF.—(AP)—A Navy rocket-powered airplane has shattered all altitude records, climbing to what aviation experts unofficially believe was 77,874 feet more than 14 1/2 miles. It leveled off at 13,000 miles an hour.

The supersonic flight in the needle-nosed Douglas Skyrocket ship was made August 15 from Edwards Air Force Base. The exact altitude reached by the Douglas test pilot, Bill Bridgeman, was not disclosed.

Marvin Miles, Los Angeles Times aviation editor, estimated the altitude at 77,874 feet. He said that at a "planned altitude, Bridgeman leveled the Skyrocket off to obtain high speed performance data that may have sent the research craft whipping through space at speeds faster than 1,300 MPH."

The officially recognized world altitude record is 72,395 feet, set in 1935 by two balloonists, Army Capt. Albert W. Stevens and Capt. Orville A. Anderson. The officially accepted speed record is 670.981 MPH, set in 1948 by a North American F-86. The accepted piloted aircraft altitude record is 59,445 feet, set March 23, 1948, by British Test Pilot John Cunningham in a Vampire jet.

Bridgeman's plane was dropped from the bomb bay of a Superfortress at 35,000 feet.

Hungarian Reds Taking Children Away From Parents
ROME—(AP)—Communist Hungarian refugee said Friday. The refugee, who asked that his name be withheld because his family still is in Hungary, said the parents then are sent to forced labor camps for "political unreliability."

The children, he said, are given new names and reared as Communist children's homes. All records of their parents are destroyed so the families never can be reunited.

VFW Resolution Calls For Ouster Of Dean Acheson

NEW YORK—(AP)—The Veterans of Foreign Wars have demanded the ouster of Secretary of State Dean Acheson and other "policy-making" officials of his department.

A resolution adopted at the VFW's 52nd national encampment calls for the removal of all persons in the State Department "whose loyalty to American ideals is questionable."

The VFW aimed its blast also at those State Department officials "whose ignorance, misfeasance and non-feasance have resulted in failure in the field of diplomatic relations."

State Department policy, the resolutions said, has created "intolerable international and internal situations that can only be solved by instituting a new and American-like leadership in the Department of State."

Senator McCarthy (R-Wis.), in a speech to the delegates, suggested a jury trial of his accusations against Acheson and Ambassador-at-Large Philip C. Jessup.

McCarthy offered to resign from the Senate if the jury ruled against him and found Acheson and Jessup innocent of his charges of coddling Communists.

The senator demanded the resignations of Acheson, Jessup and "that whole motley crowd" if the jury upheld the accusations.

Housing Groups Study Rental Unit Needs

Each roll call takes about 20 minutes.

Often the call merely is routine. No action is pending, but some senator is disturbed because the audience for his dull remarks is small.

Each year the Senate drags on later and later in getting through its necessary business.

The 81st Congress didn't adjourn until early January, 1951, although its successor was due to begin work at that very time.

There are lots of reasons for this increasing delay. But surely one of them is the outdated roll call and voting procedure which makes the Senate sound like a bus station half the time.

The clerk stops just short of shouting "all points West."

On, Wisconsin!

In New York Harbor the other morning, the 45,000-ton battleship Wisconsin was driven aground by the outgoing tide when a stern cable snapped.

Fortunately, this didn't turn out to be a repetition of the USS Missouri's humiliating encampment on the sands of Hampton Roads for many days.

If the Wisconsin had stuck in the mud for long, Senator McCarthy probably would have had an investigation under way—looking for Reds aboard ship, in the Navy, even perhaps in his happiest hunting ground, the State Department.

But as it happened a railroad tug shoved the big vessel back into the water in fairly short order, and the honor of Wisconsin was saved.

Millard Caldwell says: Cracker-box strategists fumble civil defense; America must face a new concept of war; We have no time for fantasy.

(Ed. Note: While Drew Pearson is on a brief vacation, the Washington Merry-Go-Round is being written by several distinguished guest columnists, today's being by Millard Caldwell, Federal Civil Defense Administrator.)

WASHINGTON—While time is running out, the cracker-box strategists fumble civil defense.

Some of them know that air power at its best can stop only 30 out of 100 attacking enemy bombers.

Others blow hot and cold. One day they think the situation is so hopeless that civil defense could do no good.

Still others insist that retaliation is the answer. What we can do to the enemy blinds them to what the enemy can do to us.

Then, another group, the ostrich thinkers, insist that no nation would dare attack this country, because nobody ever has, and besides we're too strong.

Some, bored with crisis after crisis, wake up now and then, say "It can happen here," and doze off again.

The timid pin their hope on Russian backwardness and say, "That atomic explosion in Russia wasn't really the bomb."

While the pseudo-strategists grope in a smog of truth, half-truth and fantasy, time is running out. We stand in the danger of war.

Too many seem unable to grasp that fact that we can lose a war. Their stock answers are: If it takes production, we'll outproduce the enemy.

These prevalent American beliefs are ingrained, basic but, unfortunately, stop short of an adequate answer to the sharp question aired by reality.

These three things—Red imperialism, the global bomber and the atomic bomb. This trio has forced on Americans a whole new concept of war.

Today or any day, America itself can become a battleground. Civilian are the first target in this new kind of war.

If the enemy first smashes the home front, the military may have little left to fight for and less to fight with.

The Kremlin knows that our American home front must be knocked out quickly, if it is to be knocked out at all.

Those who doubt the likelihood of war on the home front should heed what Rep. Clarence Cannon, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee had to say on the floor April 8. He said: "If war comes—which God forbid—it will be fought in this country as well as abroad."

General Vandenberg, (speaking for the Air Force) said that: "In spite of all our radar fences, our walls of shipping, our networks of communication and our clouds of interceptor planes, 70 per cent of the enemy planes carrying atomic bombs would get through.

We might as well face the fact. Every center of production, every cent of wealth and population and

civilization would be devastated. We have only to look at the cities in Germany to see how the cities of America would look within one week after war started."

W. Stuart Symington, while chairman of NSRB, said, "Who can be a bigger fool than the fool who continues to fool himself, especially when his own existence is at stake."

Those who will read the record must see where the 30 year pattern of Russian imperialism leads.

The retaliationists have an empty answer. To devastate Russian cities would not restore our own.

Unrealistic thinking has sapped our strength and robbed us of precious time. No American city is prepared to cope with an enemy attack. We must use our time wisely and well. There is no time for fatalism or fantasy.

U. S. Air Force Plans Radar Screen For Foreign Bases

WASHINGTON—The U. S. Air Force is planning a "radar screen" for its bases in Britain, Western Europe and the Mediterranean area.

An Air Force spokesman Friday confirmed that a "sizeable part" of the \$1,071,000,000 requested of Congress for "classified" Air Force patrol system.

Authorization for the spending is part of \$5,788,000,000 military construction bill approved by the House and now pending in the Senate.

Three-Day Reprieve For Doomed Slayer

AUSTIN—A three-day reprieve was granted Bob Wall Thursday to keep his scheduled execution from falling on Sunday.

Gov. Allan Shivers changed the date from September 19 to September 18.

Wall was convicted in the slaying of 65-year-old Jacob Coleman, a Waco guard, in his hotel room a year ago. Coleman's body, bound and gagged, was found the day following the slaying. His money and most of his valuables were missing.

Two Frenchmen Fail In Try At Channel

CAPE GRIS NEZ, FRANCE—Two Frenchmen who tried to swim the English Channel in a storm gave up Thursday after covering only a small part of the watery grind.

Tides and cold forced Paul Senchal to pull himself out of the water an hour and a half. Robert Rebyrou, 48, kept going but after battling heavy waves and an upset stomach three hours, he threw in the sponge.

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When does the average man work hardest? When he can hear the wolf scratching away at the door. It may sound silly, but that's true of the squeeze play also. It works when the wolf is at the door.

Let's take today's hand as an example. South has 11 tricks in top cards. If he takes them all right off the bat, the squeeze won't work. The wolf isn't close enough. West can save a spade and a heart as his last two cards, while East saves two clubs or perhaps a club and a heart.

There's a different story to tell if South gives away one trick during the bidding.

WEST: ♠1098, ♥J653, ♦73, ♣332. SOUTH (D): ♠AK3, ♥A92, ♦AK4, ♣A764. Both sides vul.

South West North East 2N-T. Pass 6N-T. Pass Pass Pass Opening lead—♠J

Let's see how it goes. South wins the first trick with the ace of spades and finessees dummy's nine of clubs. He expects to lose this trick, so he isn't disappointed when East wins with the ten of clubs.

East can't do anything spectacular, so let's suppose he returns a spade. Dummy wins with the queen of spades and cashes the king of clubs. Declarer then runs the four diamonds, discarding the deuce of hearts from his own hand.

Then he gets to his hand with the king of spades to cash the ace of hearts and the ace of clubs.

What South leads the ace of clubs everybody has to come down to two cards. West and dummy have saved a spade and two hearts. East has saved two clubs and a heart. East has had to give up his heart-stopper in order to prevent South from winning a trick with hthe seven of clubs.

What does West discard on the ace of clubs? If he discards a spade, dummy's six of spades will win a trick. If he discards a heart, dummy gets rid of the six of spades, and now dummy wins the last two tricks with the king and ten of hearts.

The moral is quite clear: Every wolf must have his day.

Q—The bidding has been: North—East South West ♠Spade Pass 2Diamonds Pass 2Hearts Pass ?

Y. South, hold: Spade 4, Hearts K-6-4-3, Diamonds A-Q-J-6-3, Clubs A-7-2. What do you do?

WASHINGTON COLUMN

Kohlberg, New York Importer, Out-McCarthy's McCarthy

WASHINGTON—Alfred Kohlberg, New York importer sometimes referred to as head of the so-called Nationalist "China lobby," came to Washington the other day to deny again that he was any such thing.

Then, in one of the freest of free-style press conferences, he proceeded to out-McCarthy Wisconsin's own Senator Joseph R. McCarthy.

A round, bald little man with snapping brown eyes, Kohlberg stood in his shirt-sleeves before the dummy fireplace of his hotel suite sitting room and explained everything about communism. He had all the answers. A room full of Washington newspaper and radio guys and gals who may have thought they had seen and heard everything, sat around and listened in amazement.

Kohlberg had the Korean war and peace all figured out. It was his "informed guess," he said, that the political deal to settle the Korean war already had been made. All this yelling in Kasong about the cease-fire line was shadow boxing.

This whole business was going to end up eventually by the entry of Red China into the United Nations, said Kohlberg.

Where had all this deal been made, a reporter wanted to know? With Russia's Jacob Malik in New York? He had been the one who first had broadcast the idea that a Korean peace settlement was possible.

Deal Was Made in Paris? No, Kohlberg said, it was with Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in Paris, during the conference of Big Four Foreign Ministers' deputies. Dr. Philip C. Jessup was the American conferee. That, to Kohlberg, seemed to explain everything.

The general impression had been that the Paris meeting had been a complete bust. The deputies had met 74 times between March 4 and June 21 without being able to agree on what their chiefs could talk about at a full dress Council of Foreign Ministers meeting. They had so announced.

The last act up this show had been a two-hour speech by Gromyko in which he had accused the West of breaking off the talks so they could pursue aggression against Soviet Russia.

But according to Kohlberg, Jessup had made a secret deal with Russia. It was too bad, but Korea was going to go.

What evidence did Kohlberg have of this deal? He emphasized that it was just an informed guess.

He said he based it on a few things he had read in Newsweek and in the New York Times dispatches of Thomas J. Hamilton and James B. Reston. He didn't specify just what it was they had said.

In copies of a letter he passed out, however, Kohlberg declared that "with men like Jessup running our affairs, it is no wonder that the signs on the parkways leading out of New York read, 'In case of enemy attack on New York City this parkway will be closed to all except military and civil defense vehicles.'"

On Aug. 6, 1945, the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima, Japan. Three days later, a second atomic bomb was dropped on Nagasaki. Forty-three thousand were killed. The two history-shaking explosions ended a military nation's bid for world conquest, for on Aug. 14, 1945, the Japanese surrendered unconditionally.

The atom bomb killed Japan's will to war. Then, soon after, another—even mightier—force blasted the feudal foundations of the Japan we all know. This force was democracy—a way of life new to Japan's 80,000,000 people, governing people.

The devastation of World War II is the story of the most successful occupation in history. It began with demilitarization. Every remaining vestige of militarism and ultra-nationalism was stamped out. Shintoism, a religion professing Japan's divine right to rule the world, was expunged and Shinto shrines removed from public display.

During the production of grain and cotton, the U. S. found Japan's mighty war-machine on the camp fire. The demilitarization phase of the occupation was completed with the trial of 24 major war criminals in April, 1946. On September 23, Hiroshi Tojo and six other war lords mounted the gallows.

said, were found as deeply rooted in the medium sized cities as in the big ones, and named some names to back its point.
The report rapped Warren of Florida for "persistent refusal" to testify under oath in the committee's inquiry into the Florida underworld. The committee charged Florida gambling "is controlled by interstate syndicates and unsavory associates of men in high office."
Unlike an earlier report, aimed directly at O'Dwyer in biting language, this one referred to him impersonally in reciting testimony that mentioned names of gangsters as among the friends of the former mayor.
Calling for war on the underworld, the committee said the proposed national crime council could be "great contribution."
Time is ripe
The time for the step is ripe, it declared, because "everywhere an aroused American populace is 'rising up to demand that police and prosecutors exert greater vigilance in tracking down and convicting the criminals who thrive under the protective umbrella of official corruption."
The committee suggested Congress grant \$100,000 to help organize the council.
As other weapons against crime, the committee recommended:
1. A careful overhauling of laws to make them more effective.
2. A high geared attack on the narcotics traffic, in which officials would form a team with the federal authorities who now carry the bulk of the load.
The committee called for creation of a special squad in the Federal Narcotics Bureau to train local police in the specialized techniques of narcotics law enforcement.

All of this is good news to the millions getting more pay. What it will do to their—and everyone's—cost of living, we'll have to wait and see.

The gimmick was that Zeke Bonura said Grove failed to touch first base on the way to second. Umpire Ryan called him out, after Bonura took a toss and stepped on the bag. Grove deposited himself on second and sat there while a group of players haseled with the ump.

Bonura took another toss, and the ump's again ruled safe. After more bickering, Grove was waved back to first base. He came back, touched the bag and then was sent to second.

The umpire then called for us as official scorer, asking where the base runner was when Grove collected his "double-out." By this time we were so dizzy we don't know if we told him East or West.

Probably he doesn't either.

Anyway, it was a fitting touch to a wacky game.

Twelve Sites, Six Producers Given Spraberry Trend

Twelve more explorations and six more completed producers have been added to the Spraberry Trend areas of Midland, Upton, Reagan and Glasscock Counties.

Midland County, with eight new tests and three more oilers, topped the other three areas in activity.

Reagan County gained the only wildcat staked in the four-county area and Midland County received location for a one and one-half mile outpost to production. A one-mile outpost was spotted in Upton County.

Wildcat Site
Six miles west of Stiles and in Northwest-Central Reagan County, Havenstrite Oil Company and William L. Rawn, both of Midland, staked site for their No. 1 Susan Belcher Patterson, an 8,000-foot wildcat to test the Ellenburger four and one-half miles southwest of the Weddell-Spraberry field.

Exact location is 600 feet from north and east lines of section 1947, SA&GRB survey.

The Driver-Spraberry field of Southeast Midland County gained four of the new locations, two by a firm's No. 2 William Shackelford will be drilled 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 8, block 37, T-4-S, T&P survey.

Bowles Land
Magnolia No. 3 D. T. Bowles will be dug 660 feet from south and west lines of section 40, block 37, T-4-S, T&P survey.
