New Wildcats Set In Pecos, Dawson, Glasscock, Garza

New wildcat projects for four West Texas counties have been reported. Operations are to start at each of them at once.

They are to be in Pecos, Dawson, Glasscock and Garza Counties. The deepest of the explorations is to be Deep Rock Oil Corporation No. 1 Slaughter in East-Central Pecos County.

To Go To 12,000 Feet
It is slated to dig to 12,000 feet to try to develop production in the Ellenburger.

The drills are 600 feet from south and east lines of section 31, block 129, T&STL survey.

That makes it 23 miles southwest of Bakersfield and about eight miles south of Phillips Petrol 'm Company No. 1 Glenna, a deep wildcat which had reached 11,119 feet in a lime and shale, at last reports, and was due to drill on until it reaches and explores the Ellenburger.

In Northwest Dawson
Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1 Roberts Bayou, and others, is to be a 10,800-foot project in Northwest Dawson County.

It will try for production in the Silurian-Devonian zone which is making the oil in Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Adcock, recently completed wildcat discovery two and one-half miles to the west and one and one-half miles to the north.

Gulf No. 1 Reeves will be 600 feet from south and 1,900 feet from east lines of section 6, block 1, J. Potters survey. That makes it approximately 15 miles northwest of Lamesa.

Southwest of Garden City
Mendota Oil Company of Fort Worth No. 1 J. T. Daniels is to be the Glasscock County prospect. It is in the southwest part of the county and 12 miles northwest of Garden City.

It is projected to 8,000 feet, which should allow a test of the Spraberry.

Location is 600 feet from south and west lines of section 10, block 35, T-4-S, T&P survey.

It is about six miles east of Paul F. Brantner No. 1 Bigby, a recently completed flowing discovery from the Spraberry.

Another Try By Callihan
George Callihan of Abilene is to dig the Garza County wildcat. It will be one and one-half miles east and one-half of a mile north of the nearest production in the Dargatzis field.

It is 330 feet from south and east lines of section 107, block 5, H&GN survey, and six miles northeast of the town of Justiceburg.

It is in Southeast Garza County and is to drill to 2,750 feet to hunt oil in the San Andres, the pay section in the Dorward field.

More Pay Indicated At Ellenburger Test In SW Midland Area

Fifty more feet of pay has been indicated in Sinclair Oil & Gas Company No. 3 June Tippett, possible Ellenburger discovery in Southwest Midland County.

Operator ran a drillstem test from 12,993 to 13,043 feet. Tool was open three hours. There was a strong blow of air at the surface as soon as the tool was opened. No gas or fluid surfaced.

Recovery was 1,980 feet of clean oil and 180 feet of oil-cut drilling mud.

Operator cored fifty feet, in two 25-foot stages, below 13,043 feet and is now coring below 13,093 feet. No description was reported on the cores already cut.

The Ellenburger was topped at 12,930 feet, elevation 2,864 feet. That gives it a datum of minus 10,096 feet.

A drillstem test from 12,918 to 12,993 feet developed 165 feet of free oil and 15 feet of oil and gas-cut drilling mud on the recovery. No. 3 Tippett is 1,980 feet from north and west lines of section 17, block 40, T-4-S, T&P survey.

Deep Rock Shows In Spraberry Zone In Martin Project

Deep Rock Oil Corporation has developed some interesting shows of possible production in the top of the Spraberry at its No. 1 A. C. Woodward, North-Central Martin County wildcat.

This prospect, located 23 miles northwest of Stanton, and six miles northwest of Lenora, topped the Spraberry at 7,632 feet. Elevation is 2,841 feet.

It drilled to 7,679 feet and took a two hour drillstem test with the packer at 7,608 feet.

There was a strong blow of air through the period. Recovery was 165 feet of gas cut drilling mud. The project was deepened to 7,717 (Continued On Page Nine)

Three Men Killed In Traffic Crash

White Troops, 1,000 Planes Join Ko-Reds

TOKYO —(AP)—United Nations headquarters said Tuesday Red strength for the Korean war has been augmented by "large numbers of Caucasian Soviet puppet troops" and by a "puppet air force" of 1,000 planes.

It said Red troops from East Germany and other Soviet satellite areas have been pouring into North Korea for months.

The "puppet air force" is in the "Manchurian sanctuary" across the Yalu River border from Korea, headquarters said.

Headquarters of Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway, UN commander, said the Reds have 70 divisions available on the battle line and in reserve—and may be preparing a new offensive with this force.

Forty divisions, about 400,000 men, have been identified as on the battle line.

They would be supported by the "puppet air force" and by artillery, tanks and armored cars brought to Korea by the European volunteers. Ridgway's headquarters described the Caucasian units as "specialists and technical personnel contributed by the Soviet satellite nations, including East Germany."

The statement was the first official recognition of a long current rumor that the Reds have been organizing an international brigade of white volunteers.

One officer said he had heard from high authority that Caucasian Communist soldiers have been coming into Korea at the rate of 3,000 a day for two months.

Nation's Crude Oil Production Again Near All-Time High

TULSA —(AP)—The United States' daily average crude oil production in the week ended September 1 climbed to within 1,000 barrels daily of the all-time record established earlier in August. The Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

The daily average was 6,157,675 barrels, an increase of 6,400. With a higher September allowable in effect the last day of the period, Texas' production jumped 7,850 barrels to 3,780,475 for the biggest gain.

Sizeable increases were reported also for Illinois, up 4,000 to 188,100; Louisiana, up 2,125 to 612,300; and California, 1,400 to 977,600.

Other gains were in Indiana, up 700 to 32,400; Arkansas, up 250 to 76,150; Colorado, 200 to 77,700; Kentucky, 300 to 31,700; Montana, 200 to 24,600; Oklahoma, 300 to 506,500; and Florida, 50 to 1,525.

Major decrease was in Mississippi, which fell 2,950 to 99,700. Losses were recorded also in Kansas, down 2,150 to 322,050; New Mexico, off 1,725 to 145,575; Michigan, 1,500 to 38,800; the Eastern area 1,200 to 59,750; Wyoming, 1,100 to 190,100; Alabama, 100 to 2,900; Nebraska, 150 to 6,050; and Utah, 100 to 3,900.

Midland Negro Stabbed Fatally In Street Affray

A negro man identified by police as Tom Lanier was stabbed fatally shortly before noon Tuesday at Lee and East Wall Streets.

Police Lt. Chester Sprague said a 42-year-old negro man is being held in connection with the stabbing.

Lanier, he said, was stabbed as an outgrowth of an argument with the other man and was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital.

School Enrollment Hits 5,759 In First Half-Day Of Term

Tuesday was "B" day for thousands of Midland youngsters—"B" for "back to school."

Enrollment in the city's public school system edged toward a record with 5,759 students in schools at noon. This is compared with 4,288 at noon on opening day last year—an increase of 1,473.

The enrollment processes were continuing at 10 plants Tuesday afternoon and the expected total was more than 6,000.

Here is a breakdown of the Tuesday morning enrollments at various public schools: senior high, 1,066; junior high, 846; North elementary, 348; South elementary, 865; West elementary, 418; Crockett elementary, 472; San Houston elementary, 755; Terminal, 226; DeZavala, 252; Carver, 505.

Also opening its doors Tuesday was St. Ann's Catholic School. And the Greenwood District School in Midland County started its 1951-52 term Tuesday.

It is noted that 755 students showed up at San Houston, a new elementary school in the northwest sector of the city.

Another enrollment count was to be made at 5 p.m., Supt. Frank Monroe said.

Fort Worth Has Largest Run Of Cattle Since 1949

FORT WORTH —(AP)—The largest run of cattle since the Fall of 1949 flowed through stockyards Tuesday.

Cattle and calves totaled 9,536 at mid-morning, and a number of trucks were waiting to unload.

The dry, hot weather causing water to become scarce caused the run, Ted Gouley, manager of the Market Institute here, said, adding that this is the normal time of year for heavy movement.

Several out-of-state buyers were on hand, some representing Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado and others from the corn belt.

Stocker and feeder classes were moving out early at steady prices because of the broad demand.

The run will exceed any day last year, Gouley said.

Negro Gang Robs Two San Angeloans

A three-man gang of negro youths Monday night attacked two San Angelo men, who had stopped to ask one of them how to find the highway out of Midland, and robbed them of \$35.

The two visitors, both in their early twenties, told Police Capt. Jim Wilkerson they had become lost, and asked a negro youth the way to the highway.

He said he got in the car with them to show them the way. Along the way, he asked them to stop. When they did two other negroes appeared and they robbed the pair at the point of a knife.

An 18-year-old negro, arrested a short time later, was being held Tuesday for questioning.

Odessan And Two Negroes Die Instantly

Three men met instant death Monday night when a passenger automobile and a pick-up truck crashed head-on 11 miles southeast of Midland on the Garden City highway.

The dead: Claude W. Fenton, Sr., 57, driver of the pick-up and a well-known Odessa contractor of service station equipment.

S/Sgt. Kenneth Hicks, 26, negro, Goodfellow Air Force Base, San Angelo, driver of the automobile.

E. C. Smith, age undetermined, negro, San Angelo, a passenger in Hicks' car.

The bodies of the three men were mangled badly and the two vehicles were crushed by the impact of the collision.

"They never knew what happened," said State Highway Patrolman Mac Stout. "Their bodies were torn up worse than any I have ever seen."

The accident marked the first Labor Day weekend fatalities for Midland County and brought a tragic close to a weekend trip made by Fenton to visit his sick wife.

Friends in Odessa said Tuesday Mrs. Fenton recently underwent surgery in a Temple hospital and Fenton was returning from a visit with her.

At Least One Witness
He was driving toward Midland when the tragedy occurred.

There was at least one witness. "One motorist told me Fenton's truck had passed him just a few seconds before the collision," said the highway patrolman.

"He said Fenton passed properly and pulled back into his lane of traffic. He said he could see the truck without it in the lights of the approaching car when the two vehicles collided."

Stout said the two negro men apparently had spent Labor Day in Midland.

Identification of Smith was made through a telephone number on the lone piece of paper found in his clothing.

Officers checked the telephone numbers, which belonged to a negro woman in Midland, and she identified one of the victims as Smith.

Funeral arrangements in Odessa have not been completed for Fenton.

He is survived by the widow; a son, Claude Fenton, Jr., and a daughter, Mrs. C. C. Vans Evers of Puerto Rico.

Texas Adds Up 74 Dead In Holidays

Forty-five persons died in traffic mishaps in Texas during the extended Labor Day weekend for what apparently was an all-time state record for the holiday.

Other violent deaths—drownings, shootings, and so forth—brought the over-all Texas total to 74.

The director of the Department of Public Safety, Homer Garrison, Jr., said that if all 45 fatalities were on public roads and property, it is a new state record. The grimest Labor Day death toll previously went into the books last year, when 38 persons lost their lives on streets and highways.

Besides the 45 traffic deaths, three persons drowned and 26 died in miscellaneous accidents and acts of violence.

One accident killed eight members of a negro family. Seven died instantly Sunday night, when their automobile hit a truck near Fort Worth. The eighth victim, Tommy Price, 25, died Monday.

Stabbings, shootings, drownings, plane crashes, heat and falls accounted for the other Texas deaths during the weekend.

Nation's Labor Day Fatalities Set New All-Time High Mark

Accidents killed at least 650 persons during the nation's Labor Day weekend. It was a grim new record for the holiday.

A Labor Day record was set in highway traffic—456 killed. Drownings claimed 97 dead, including 37 lost in the capsizing of a single fishing boat off Mantauk, N. Y. The rest of the grand total were victims of a variety of mishaps, including plane crashes, fires and falls. The miscellaneous accident toll was 97.

The National Safety Council had predicted 390 traffic fatalities for the 72-hour holiday period, but revised its estimate to 500 on the basis of early weekend death reports.

The former record for Labor Day traffic deaths was 410 in 1949. The overall accident toll record for Labor Day shattered this year was 559 set a year ago.

Cave Blast Kills One, Injures Two

ARTESIA, N. M.—(AP)—An explosion in a cave in the oil fields three miles east of here Monday killed a holiday explorer and injured two others. One of those injured was in serious condition.

The dead man was Sidney Johnson, 28, of Brownfield, Texas. Injured were his wife and Thelma Madron, 30, Artesia. A physician said Mrs. Madron's chances of survival were slight.

Police said someone dumped crude oil in the cave and the oil was touched off when the three entered.

Burglars Got \$1,620 From Wilson Bank

LUBBOCK—(AP)—The FBI and Texas Rangers hunted Tuesday for clues that might lead them to the burglars who robbed the Wilson State Bank of \$1,620. The bank, 17 miles southeast of here, was robbed Sunday night or early Monday. The burglars chopped a hole in the roof of the one-story building and lowered a man into the bank. After the bank door was opened by this man, the burglars wheeled a heavy torch unit into the bank and cut a hole in the main vault. Most of the cash—\$1,620—was in silver, nickels, dimes and quarters. The robbery was discovered by a bank teller.

AFL Will Protest Hiring Of Brocceros

WASHINGTON—(AP)—AFL labor leaders have called a meeting in El Paso Thursday to protest importation of Mexican labor in the states bordering Mexico. H. L. Mitchell, president of the AFL's National Farm Labor Union, said American labor standards, particularly in the border states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California, are being threatened by a campaign to exploit cheap imported Mexican labor, "legally or illegally."

+ Jacoby On Bridge +

If you were playing rubber bridge with today's South hand, and if you were doubled at one no-trump, you would probably take your sure tricks and give the opponents 500 points. When Dr. Seward H. Transue held the South hand in this year's national championships, he knew that a loss of 500 points would probably cost his team the match. He therefore played it daringly, hoping the enemy would fail to find the best defense.

West opened the king of clubs, holding the trick. He continued with the queen of clubs, and East discarded the deuce of hearts. Transue won and returned the queen of hearts, thus giving the defenders the chance to take 10 tricks on the run. East couldn't decide what to lead back and therefore declined to take the queen of hearts. This gave declarer a fifth trick, so that he was now in position to settle for a penalty of only 500 points. Still not satisfied, Dr. Transue returned his last club, allowing West to take his long suit. This made East squirm miserably, just as declarer had hoped. East began by discarding two diamonds, then parted with a spade, and finally released the queen of diamonds. Meanwhile, South discarded a diamond, a spade, and then the 10 of diamonds and a heart. West now had to find an exit, and chose to get out with a heart. This gave declarer a free finesse, and dummy's 10 was allowed to hold the trick. Business was decidedly picking up; declarer was now sure of six tricks. Still not satisfied, Transue led the 10 of spades from dummy. East covered with the jack and South won with the ace. Declarer next cashed the ace of hearts, eliminating that suit from all hands; and then he put East in with the ace of diamonds (now blank). East had to return a spade away from the queen-small, allowing declarer to take two spade tricks and thus make the contract.

VENICE—(AP)—A Mexican millionaire gave a \$200,000 party in this historic city of lovers and assassins Monday night. It was the biggest blowout in half-century for Venice, a favorite gathering place for lovers of luxury. The host was Don Carlos de Belategui y de Iturbide—known in international society circles as a warm admirer of royalty. Dukes and counts came by the score for the party and rubbed shoulders with the wealthy of three continents. The guests wore everything from lion skins to shroubs. Many of the top notables invited by the dapper, monocolored host did not come, but those who did danced and wined the night away.

Truman Kicks Off Defense Bond Drive

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—President Truman Monday night kicked off the nation's biggest defense bond selling drive since World War II with a warning that the Reds may strike anywhere in the world at any time. The President said they might resume the offensive in Korea, or launch attacks in Europe, the Middle East or elsewhere in Asia. "Whenever it suits them," he said. The drive actually started Monday in Grand Rapids, Mich., where representatives of the AFL, CIO and Railway Brotherhoods joined in urging bond purchases. No specific goal has been announced. The President was introduced over the radio by Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder.

Doomed Negro Hangs Self In Prison Cell

SANTA FE, N. M.—(AP)—Burness Neal, slated to die in the electric chair November 1, was found hanged from his cell door in the death-house Monday. 

New Virus Strains May Make Vaccines Against Human Polio

COPENHAGEN, DENMARK—(AP)—Creation of new strains of polio virus that may furnish vaccines against infantile paralysis was announced here Tuesday.

The announcement was given at the second session of the second International Poliomyelitis Conference. Sponsors of the conference are the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, U. S. A., and the Danish National Association for Infantile Paralysis.

The viruses were created by a new method of cultivation discovered at Harvard Medical School by Dr. John F. Enders, Dr. Frederick C. Robbins and Dr. Thomas H. Weller. For many years polio virus could be grown only in nerve tissues.

Children Embark On Test To Stop Polio Paralysis

PROVO, UTAH—(AP)—The little children Tuesday embarked on a test which may stop polio paralysis. Scientists hope to inoculate 5,000 youngsters in the three-to-eight age group in this polio-ridden county by Saturday.

The close relationship between the mind and the body now is well known. What leads toward contentment tends to produce good physical as well as mental health. Few human contacts are more important in causing distress or contentment than those between parents and children; both are affected.

If this principle applies to natural parents, it works with equal force for children who are adopted and for the adopting parents as well. The difference is that something can be done about the situation at the time of adoption; the importance of careful adoption practices has been demonstrated many times by both happy and unhappy results.

The detective chief said Patrolman Lawrence Michel was chasing Richard D. Boyer when the fatal shooting occurred in a cemetery. The youth dropped dead about 50 feet from where the policeman said he stumbled. A bullet entered Boyer's back and emerged through his chest.

THE DOCTOR SAYS Secret Of Adopting Children Is To Find Proper Match

The picture is by no means dark, however. There are many couples who desire children but cannot have any of their own, who make excellent parents for the right child. There also are many infants or children who are deprived of normal family life for one reason or another and who need a desirable home. The problem is to match the adoptive parents and the adopted children so that both sides may receive a good break towards happiness, contentment and health.

To do this successfully is no easy task. It requires the understanding of the prospective adoptive parents, study of their backgrounds and interests, and investigation of the parentage and mental and physical health of the prospective adopted child. Adoption itself, is, of course, a legal matter for the courts, but the preliminary work is best done through authorized agencies rather than independent individuals. The health and welfare of thousands of parents and children would be better protected if all adoptions were made in this manner.





Because her average farm is only 2.5 acres in size, Japan has had to harvest the sea. At the end of the war, however, her fishing industry, world's largest, suffered critical shortages of petroleum, fishing nets and ropes, as well as large boats. SCAP's medical program, however, restored the industry to pre-war levels by 1948.

In the years before the war, Japanese fishermen hauled an average of 8,500,000 pounds of fish aboard their vessels. Almost 1,500,000,000 pounds, however, were caught in areas now controlled by Russia. A recent decrease in arid and herring runs works still another hardship on the one million Japanese exploiting the deep.

One solution seems to be in increasing the yield in the authorized fishing area. SCAP-directed whaling expeditions have boosted the productive yield per blue whale from 18 to 48 tons. Another is to give the fishermen more incentive. A step toward this has been the revision of feudalistic laws governing the industry and the formation of free cooperatives.

Japan's biggest hope for topping pre-war production lies in the removal of restrictions on the SCAP-authorized fishing area shown above. In September, 1949, the area was extended east to the international date line (left), indicating that the Japanese have at last corrected those abuses which led neighboring nations to cry "Pirate!"

SE Nolan Prospect Gets Water; To Go On To Ellenburger
Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware and Continental Oil Company are drilling ahead below 4,770 feet in Pennsylvanian lime and shale at their No. 1 Hanks, Southeast Nolan County wildcat.
This project developed salty, sulphur water in a drillstem test in the lower part of the Canyon lime at 4,609-34 feet. The tool was open two hours.
Made Only Water
The recovery was 3,420 feet of salty, sulphur water. There were no shows of oil or gas. Operators plan to carry the project down to try to locate and test the Ellenburger.
It showed possibilities of producing in the top of the Canyon lime in a drillstem test at 4,584-4,609 feet. It flowed oil at the estimated rate of 15 barrels per hour from that zone and did not show any appreciable amount of water.
Location is seven miles north and slightly east of Blackwell and 1,980 feet from north and west line of section 28, block 2, T&P survey.

Mitchell Wildcat Gets Oil And Water On Dst, Runs Logs
S. F. Hurlbut of Corpus Christi and associates No. 1 E. H. Winn, Southeast Mitchell County wildcat, about 15 miles southeast of Colorado City recovered free oil and sulphur water on a drillstem test.
The test was taken from 7,487 to 7,505 feet. Tool was open two hours. Recovery was 130 feet of free oil, 220 feet of heavily oil cut mud and 90 feet of sulphur water.
Flowing pressure was 178 pounds and 15-minute shutin pressure was 2,700 pounds.
On a previous drillstem test at 7,447-87 feet, with tool open three hours, recovery was 70 feet of heavily oil and gas cut mud and 20 feet of free oil.
Both tests were taken in the Ellenburger which was topped by samples at 7,436 feet. Elevation is 2,022 feet, derrick floor.
Operators are now taking electric log surveys at total depth of 7,505 feet.
Location is 720 feet from north and 683 feet from east lines of the E. C. Bartlett survey No. 2.

S-C Iron Prospector Has Slight Gas Signs
Moore Exploration Company of Midland developed a slight show of gas in a drillstem test of a Pennsylvanian sand section at 6,987-7,028 feet in its No. 1 W. N. Noelke, South-Central Iron County wildcat.
The test was run after samples had shown some slight signs of petroleum. The tool was open one hour. Recovery was 300 feet of slightly gas cut drilling mud. There were no shows of oil or of formation water.
The prospector is making hole below 7,126 feet in hard sand which is carrying no signs of oil or gas. The wildcat is projected to about 8,000 feet to try to find and test the Ellenburger.
Location is 600 feet from south and west lines of section 1150, TCR survey. It is 10 miles southwest of Mertzon.

Gulf Takes Lease On 271,000-Acre Brewster Ranch
Gulf Oil Corporation has taken ten-year commercial lease on the 271,000-acre 0-2 Ranch in West Brewster County and along the east line of Presidio County.
The acreage, leased from Lykes Steamship Company, formerly was owned by W. W. Turney of El Paso. It is approximately 30 miles south of Alpine.
It is understood the large block carries 25 cents per acre annual rental.

Toddler, Trapped 12 Feet Down In Narrow Well Shaft, Is Rescued After Four Hours

NEWBERG, Ore. (AP)—Rescuers late Monday brought two-year-old Marie Anne Payne back up into the sunlight, four hours after she tumbled into the darkness of a narrow well shaft.

Workers, digging frantically, sank another hole alongside the well and reached her at 8:13 p.m. (PDT). She fell in at 2 p.m. while playing in the yard of her home.

She was conscious when brought up, but in a state of shock.

Early Tuesday, Dr. C. A. Bump reported she apparently had suffered no ill effects other than being chilled and shocked.

She was waist deep in thick mud when rescuers got to her.

Through the ordeal her father, Elvin Payne, stayed at the top of the hole. He reassured her: "You'll be okay now in a few minutes."

The distraught mother looked into the well hole just once as the digging progressed. "All I saw was her hand," she said.

The little girl had fallen in feet first, her hands over her head.

Oxygen was pumped down the narrow hole—only eight inches in diameter—as the crew sank the rescue shaft two feet away.

The digger would drill only 10 feet. She was 12 feet down. State police rushed to Sheridan, 23 miles away, for another driller to complete the job.

Marie, whose cries weakened as the digging progressed, sank slowly into the mud as workers went deeper in the three-by-four-foot rescue shaft.

When the shaft was down 14 feet, rescuers carefully shoved a steel rod across into the well hole at the point where they thought the child was lodged.

She called to her father that the rod had touched her and he relayed the word to the rescue crew. They tunneled across to the well shaft to reach her.

When she was brought to the surface by Newberg Fireman Ralph Staley, the bottom half of her body was covered with a thick heavy mud.

Payne said he had dug the 22-foot hole only a few days ago. Mrs. Payne explained: "The water bill is so high. That's why we were digging our own well."

The mishap recalled the case of Kathy Fiscus, three, who died of suffocation in a well pipe in San Marino, Calif., in April, 1949. Rescuers worked 52 hours in a futile attempt to save her. She was trapped 96 feet down in a steel-encased pipe, 14 inches in diameter.

Midlander's Kin Top Troubleshooter In U. S. Defense Setup

Clay Bedford, 48, recognized as one of the top "bottleneck breakers" and troubleshooters in the nation's defense production program, is a nephew of H. G. Bedford, veteran Midland rancher.

The troubleshooting activities of Clay Bedford are cited in the current issue of Time magazine, along with a picture of the production engineering expert, who has visited in Midland on several occasions.

Bedford, according to the magazine article, is credited with breaking the worst bottleneck in the defense production program—that of machine tools.

He was called to Washington last May by Defense Mobilizer Charles E. Wilson as his chief troubleshooter, at no salary. Recently, Bedford was sworn in by Wilson as head of the Production Executive Committee.

Bedford is on loan to the government from the Kaiser-Fraser Corporation. He has been with the Kaiser firm more than 25 years, and has supervised many of K-F's largest and toughest construction jobs.

S. E. Nolley, 72, Pioneer Andrews Rancher, Is Dead

ANDREWS—Samuel E. Nolley, 72, pioneer Andrews County rancher and former Eastland County sheriff, died suddenly Sunday enroute to a hospital here after having suffered a heart ailment while at the wheel of his automobile, which was parked at a farm home in the Florey community.

Mrs. Nolley, who was with her husband at the time, summoned a passerby, Fronis E. Jones, who drove the stricken man to the hospital. Doctors pronounced him dead upon arrival at the hospital.

Nolley had resided in the vicinity of Florey the last 27 years. He was sheriff of Eastland County during the Ranger boom.

Funeral services will be held at 4 p.m. Wednesday at the Church of Christ here, with the Rev. Sam Malone, pastor of the South Seminoe Baptist Church, officiating. Interment will be in the Andrews Cemetery.

Survivors include the widow; two sons, L. H. of Jayton and S. E. Nolley, Jr. of Tyler, and four daughters. Mrs. Walter Stewart of Gilmer, Mrs. C. C. Curtis, Jr. of Tyler, Mrs. E. M. Moore of Fort Worth, and Mrs. Clifford Miffleton of Greenwood, Calif.

Earthquake Shocks Frighten Residents Of Tri-State Area

NEW YORK (AP)—An earthquake shook and frightened thousands of residents Monday in a three-state region near New York, but there were no injuries and damage apparently was limited chiefly to cracked windows and broken chinaware.

Manhattan, with its skyscraper buildings, did not feel the quake, which occurred at 4:26 p.m. EST.

A Columbia University seismologist described the quake as "a very large local earthquake" but could not determine its exact center.

The tremor shook a long but fairly narrow sector of several hundred square miles from Southern Connecticut, through Southern New York State, and into Northern New Jersey. Minor trembling was reported in the Bronx, New York City's northern suburb.

Fearful citizens flooded police with telephone calls. Some thought it was a gigantic explosion. Others said they first thought the "water heater in the basement blew up."

Earth tremors are felt from time to time in this area, usually on Long Island, but Monday's shock was the heaviest in a long while. Seismographs as far away as Boston picked it up.

Seismographers here said the tremors are caused by the settling of the earth along a number of "fault lines" in the earth's crust. A Fordham University seismographer said it was a "readjustment quake" and nothing to worry about.

MacArthur Missing As Notables Gather To Sign Jap Treaty

NEW YORK (AP)—Gen. Douglas MacArthur—and the Japanese peace treaty.

Once they seemed synonymous. Friends have said the old soldier who fought the Japanese, took their surrender in Tokyo Bay and guided their post-war rebuilding, expected the signing of the treaty to climax his career. Then he would retire.

That was before President Truman ousted him as Far East commander last Spring for his outspoken views on policy.

Tuesday, as delegates from many nations gathered around a San Francisco conference table to conclude the Japanese pact, MacArthur worked at his desk in New York.

He appeared outwardly unperturbed at the lack of an invitation to the ceremonies. An aide has said the general felt ignored, but MacArthur has not commented.

At his desk, he composed a speech he will deliver Thursday in Cleveland.

While figures from many nations convened in San Francisco—Acheson, Gromyko, Schuman, Morrison—it was just another day in the new routine of the general who told Congress last April that old soldiers just fade away.

That routine has been to go to his New York office, travel about the country making speeches, and to attend as many sports events as possible. Sometimes he goes to the baseball parks as often as three times a week.
