Tone, Now Out Of Hospital, Still Top Hand With Barbara

HOLLYWOOD—P—Franchot Tone, who did the catching when actor Tom Neal was pitching punches in Barbara Payton's backyard September 14, quit California Hospital Wednesday and saw Miss Payton off for Duluth, Minn.
Apparently recovered from the beating Neal gave him over the affections of Miss Payton, Tone accompanied her to Los Angeles International Airport, talked to her briefly through the wire screen separating the field from American Airlines' office, and then hurried back to his car.
Miss Payton booked passage as "Mrs. Redfield." She wanted plane accommodations to Cloquet, Minn., which she called her hometown, 17 miles east of Duluth, but was told the line could take her only to Duluth.
Tone and Miss Payton declined to discuss their plans but there was speculation that Tone may follow her for a wedding soon. She said Tone proposed to her in his hospital room shortly after the fight, and he confirmed this when he appeared at the district attorney's office to discuss the advisability of seeking a felony complaint against Neal.
The district attorney, S. Ernest Roll, now has all the evidence at hand and must decide whether a complaint against Neal is warranted. He heard versions of the fight from Tone, Miss Payton, Neal and others, among them Judson O'Donnell, Miss Payton's next door neighbor.
O'Donnell told Roll he saw the fight and that Tone took quite a beating. He also said Neal used to be at Barbara's home much of the time.
"I used to see him washing his socks there," said O'Donnell. "I also used to see Miss Payton sunbathing in the patio. She'd be nude from the waist up. Neal would be beside her, exercising with his big bar bells. He was stripped to the waist and wore trunks.

Kentucky Newsman Raps Truman's New Censorship Ruling

SAN FRANCISCO—(P)—One of America's leading newspapermen Wednesday said President Truman's new clampdown on information is "ill advised and poorly executed."
James S. Pope, chairman of the American Society of Newspaper Editors' Committee on Freedom of Information, issued a statement questioning whether the order will aid security.
President Truman ordered civilian agencies handling matters affecting the defense program to classify certain matter as "security information"—top secret, secret, confidential or restricted.
Pope, managing editor of the Louisville Courier-Journal, said: "It is impossible for our committee to challenge a genuine effort to protect military security.
"However, we do not believe that the President's order will protect security as much as it will smother legitimate information about the operation of government."
The Kentucky editor, in San Francisco for the annual meeting of The Associated Press Managing Editors Association, added: "The greatest security of this country is full understanding and knowledge by the people who are intended—under our Constitution—to run it."
He said his Committee on Freedom of Information protested the order before it went into effect. The matter will be presented to ASNE's board of directors next month.
"Undoubtedly the matter will be reviewed and discussed at that time," Pope declared.
Pope listed these as his committee's chief objections to the presidential order:
"1. Every civilian who is the head of any sort of government bureau, department, or agency is encouraged to 'classify security material.'
"2. There is absolutely no definition of security and it is a very difficult technical subject for any civilian to comprehend.
"3. There is no authority constituted in this order to which the newspapers can appeal, except to these same government officials who created the order.
"4. In other words the entire government of the United States is being encouraged by this order to seal off so-called security information without any real education on what this is."

Refugees Release 'Freedom' Balloons Near Czechoslovakia

MUNICH, GERMANY—(P)—The engineer and the dispatcher of the "Freedom Train" that brought 21 Czechoslovak political refugees into West Germany released huge balloons early Wednesday, carrying messages to their Communist-controlled homeland.
The balloons were launched at 3 a.m. from a lonely spot in Northern Bavaria, only three miles from the Czechoslovak border.
They were released by engineer Jaroslav Konvalinka and dispatcher Karl Truka, the first of 4,000 carrying 2,500,000 messages to be sent up by Radio Free Europe to tell the people of Czechoslovakia the true story of the "Freedom Train" dash across the border September 11.
"Dear countrymen," say the messages, "don't believe that any American agents had anything to do with our escape."
The messages said Czechoslovak government charges U. S. agents aided in the plot were "more in a series of lies spread by the Communist government."
Thirty-one Czechoslovaks on the train declared themselves political refugees and were permitted to remain. Seventy-seven other passengers, who said they were unwilling participants, were returned to Czechoslovakia.
Freedom... Later
The Czechoslovak government demanded U. S. occupation authorities extradite the 21 refugees, charging them with kidnapping and threatening to kill the others.
The "Crusade for Freedom," an anti-Communist organization in the U. S., said it had found haven for the 21 in Canada.
Konvalinka and Truka were the only two of the group present at the balloon launching.
The messages, entitled "The Truth on the Freedom Train," will be sent up in winds blowing toward Czechoslovakia. Leaflets show pictures of the train and some of the refugees.
"I am happy to know that these messages will reach my friends," Konvalinka said as he released the first balloon.
In an interview recorded on the spot by Radio Free Europe for broadcast to Czechoslovakia, Truka said "We would prefer to send you freedom instead of freedom balloons. But the time will come when that will be possible."

JACOBY ON CANASTA
Your side has melded Joker-A-A-A, Joker-K-K-K and Q-Q-Q. You hold K-K-Q, 3, 2 (the three being black, of course), and you draw an ace from the stock. What should you do?
The answer may depend on the number of cards in your partner's hand, or on the way the melding has gone. If he has very few cards, you tend to meld out. If he has a large number of cards, you tend to play on. Somewhere between these extremes you ask for permission to meld out.
For example, assume that you made the initial meld with Joker-A-A and Joker-K-K. Your partner, at his next turn, added two aces, a king, and three queens. He then discarded, and was left with only five cards. This type of meld asks you to meld out as quickly as you can.
If your partner were interested in fighting for the pack he would meld nothing. If he were interested in making one canasta, but then staying in the game, he would meld the two aces but nothing else. In this situation, therefore, you meld out at once.
To take the other extreme, suppose that you have made the initial meld as in the last case but that your partner then picked up a large discard pile. He proceeded to meld the queens (which gave him the pile) and to add two aces and a king to your melds. He then discarded, and is left with more than twenty cards. You don't dream of melding out in this situation.
It can't be denied that you will have some trouble finding safe discards. Your black three is safe for the first play. At your next turn, you may have to discard the deuce. Your partner cannot be kept out for very long since he has room in his hand for practically all the pairs in the deck.
The odds are tremendous that he can pick up the pile before you have to give it away; and there is a chance that you will get the pile yourself sooner or later, in which case you and your partner will have a field day.

Acne May Cause Inferiority Complex In Teen-Agers

"My husband has acne over the upper part of his body on back and chest. What is the cause of this and can acne be cured? Should he take a blood tonic?" So writes Mrs. G. D.
Acne is considered to be a skin disease and largely confined to boys and girls of teen ages although older people, as in the case of Mrs. D.'s husband, sometimes are afflicted. Now the exact cause of acne still is unknown.
The pimples do contain one or more kinds of germs, but the "ripe" white head or pimple consists of a mixture of pus, germs, skin oil, and destroyed tissue cells. The pimples appear most commonly on the face, neck, upper part of the chest and shoulders, and are comparatively rare on other parts of the body.

The treatment of acne admittedly is not entirely satisfactory. Nevertheless many cases can be helped and many can be completely cured. Local treatment of the skin often can be extremely helpful. Just what preparation should be put on, however, should be left to the judgment of the doctor in charge, partly because what helps one person may not help another and indeed may be harmful.

Attention to the general health is equally important. It almost always is true that excessive eating of sweets or starches will make an acne condition worse.

Many of those who have acne notice that the condition is much better in the Summer when their skin is exposed to sunlight. By a combination of appropriate local and general measures a person with acne can be helped a great deal in most cases.

Affects Personality
One of the things about acne which always should be mentioned if pimples appear on the face is the effect of the disease on the personality of the youngster. Acne frequently comes when a youngster is in the middle teens and extremely sensitive to social contacts.

I have talked with some adults about this and some of them have told me that the disease gave them a permanent inferiority complex. It should be realized that acne generally is a temporary disease and will disappear after awhile. In the meanwhile a youngster should force himself or herself to take part in the usual social events and to go to parties, ignoring the condition as much as possible.

In an adult, such as Mrs. D.'s husband, the problem is somewhat different. Here the condition must be treated pretty much as a pure skin disease. The aid of a skin specialist should be obtained and his advice followed to the end that the condition will clear up entirely.

NO POCKETS IN HIS PANTS—
GOP Lawmaker Urges Congressional Pay Cut

WASHINGTON —(AP)— A congressman with no pockets in his pants Wednesday advocated a salary cut for the nation's lawmakers, rather than a raise.
It's not that Rep. Clare E. Hoffman (R-Mich.) couldn't find a place for extra money—he does have pockets in his coat.
He argued, however, that the sen-

ators and representatives would be doing the country a real service if they themselves took the first step toward getting back to what he called a "rational" price level.
Members of both houses now get \$12,500 a year plus a \$2,500 tax-free expense allowance.
With inflation, there has been considerable moaning in the cloakrooms that the \$15,000 total isn't enough.

Rep. John W. McCormack of Massachusetts, the Democratic leader, has come out openly for an increase to \$25,000 a year.
But Hoffman advocated:
"Cut us to \$10,000."

After bleeding the first economy dollars personally, he counseled, the congressman should start whacking away at other expenses of government, including the pay of its Civil Service employees. The goal, he told a reporter, should be to get the cost of living within reach of every individual.

Too Many Raises
"This business of raising wages and then raising them again won't do it," he said.
Hoffman said he is drawing twice as many dollars now for lawmaking as he did when he came here in 1935, and is worse off financially.
"And," he added, "I don't gamble, smoke, drink, or patronize the race tracks, and have virtually no social activities. I try to live the old-fashioned way."

The slender, sharp featured lawyer from Allegan, Mich., is confident there would be plenty of competition for seats in the House and Senate even at cut rates.
"Nobody drafted me," he recalled. Further, he doesn't think \$25,000 a year would hire better lawmakers. "All sorts of motives bring people here," he said. "I think the profit motive is the very least of all."

Oh, yes, about Hoffman's pocket-less pants. He's worn them many years, and explains:
"Pants pockets are kind of like the New Deal—a catch-all for all sorts of damn fool junk."

Two Pilots Killed In Crash Of Jets

WALLACEBURG, ONTARIO —(AP)—Two Sabrejet fighter planes from Wright-Patterson Field at Dayton, Ohio, scraped wings at 10,000 feet and crashed near here Tuesday. Both pilots died and a farm woman was injured as the planes exploded into bits on farms a mile apart.

The U. S. Air Force identified the pilots as Second Lt. Daniel A. Means, 24, of South Charleston, W. Va., and First Lt. Howard S. Godfrey, 26, of Unionville, Mo. Mrs. Fred Demester was hit by a piece of flying wreckage.

24 U. S. Sabre Jets Arrive In Scotland

STORNAWAY, SCOTLAND —(AP)—Twenty-four U. S. Air Force Sabre jet fighter planes, enroute to duty in England, struggled through bad flying weather from Iceland to Stornaway Airport Wednesday.

Another 26 which took off from Iceland at the same time were forced to turn back.
The 50 planes constitute two squadrons of the 51st Fighter Interceptor Wing.

VATICAN CITY —(AP)—Pope Pius XII sent a telegram Wednesday to Queen Elizabeth of England, assuring her of his prayers for the complete recovery of King George VI.

Import-Export Bank Bill Sent To Truman

WASHINGTON —(AP)—House passage by a 259 to 69 Tuesday vote sent to the White House a bill to raise by \$1,000,000,000 to \$4,500,000,000—lending authority of the Export-Import Bank.

The bank, set up 17 years ago to facilitate exchange of goods between the U. S. and other countries, said it needs the authority to help finance production of strategic materials abroad.

The bill also would extend the bank's life five years beyond June 30, 1953.

700 PILGRIMS DIE OF HEAT AT MECCA

CAIRO —(AP)—An Arab News Agency dispatch says temperatures reaching 125 degrees in the shade have caused the deaths of 700 pilgrims at Mecca.

The heat wave was at the peak of the yearly pilgrimage season.

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'Wonder' Weapons Near For U. S. Fighting Men But Infantry To Remain

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Americans had the word of top congressional and military authorities Wednesday that atomic wonder weapons are nearer the hands of U. S. fighting men, but that foot soldiers and bullets won't fade away.

There were expressions from Chairman Brien McMahon (D-Conn) of the Senate Atomic Energy Committee, Secretary of Defense Lovett and Secretary of the Army Pace.

They all agreed swift progress has been made. But there was a polite differing of emphasis. For his part, Pace cautiously let it be known that when the stuff is ready, the Army will want it in quantity.

McMahon, who in a Senate speech last week urged that the nation get started now on all-out atomic weapons production which he said would reduce the cost of conventional armament, renewed his plea Tuesday night in an address at a Federal Bar Association dinner.

Among other things, McMahon said the Atomic Energy Commission has in being or in development "literally dozens" of different types and kinds of special purpose atomic weapons models.

He said "the so-called wonder weapons" he was talking about weren't just a gleam in the eye of scientists but "down-to-earth" hardware, proven, demonstrated and confirmed—or proof-tested or about to be.

Before Statement Issued
McMahon had prepared his speech before Lovett issued, at a Pentagon news conference, a statement which the secretary explained was to answer misinterpretations of what McMahon had meant in his last week's Senate speech.

"Recent publicity about new weapons, new developments in warfare, and optimistic statements on the military application of atomic energy have given the exaggerated impression that a quick, easy and inexpensive security might now be at hand," Lovett said.

Over a seven-year period, he added, considerable progress has been made toward a "variety of new weapons" and particularly in the last year there have been marked results. The Pentagon has "geared" its requests for carriers of these weapons, "airborne and otherwise," to these developments. He explained that because aircraft "now and for some time will represent the most efficient method of delivery" of atomic weapons the Defense Department had asked for increased air power.

May Be Different
"Many future weapons may be dramatically different from our present armaments," Lovett stated. "Meanwhile, however, we must rely on the proved, tested, and available models to win today's battles with men presently trained to use them. x x x"

Even in view of these new developments, there is no new, inexpensive, or magic way to win wars in the near future.

McMahon, in his talk, took pains to point out some of the things he didn't say in his Senate speech. Like these:

"I did not say, for example, that we can ever afford to do without conventional forces. On the contrary, I expressly stated my belief that although conventional forces are far more expensive than the atomic weapon, we will always need them. x x x"

"Neither did I say that the atomic weapon can perform military miracles. x x x it is for the very reason that the atomic weapon is not magic that I called for its production on a huge scale, just as we would mass-produce a superb conventional weapon."

McMahon emphasized that work should start at once on building new atomic production facilities, that at least \$6,000,000,000 should be made available for this next year.

Pace went before McMahon's committee Tuesday and, the senator said, told the group the Army attached high significance to its work looking toward atomic energy use on the field of battle.

City Council Hears Proposal For More Swimming Facilities

A proposal to construct additional swimming pool facilities for Midland was laid before the City Council Tuesday night.

And the council agreed to study the situation in its planning of an overall recreation program for the city.

The proposal was submitted by a delegation from the Junior Chamber of Commerce, which this year sponsored a Summer swimming program in Midland.

With Chuck Heringer as spokesman, the JayCee group said it had made an extensive study of the swimming pool situation here.

"And," said Heringer, "we came up with the belief that Midland is sadly lacking in swimming pools." He said his group had heard the city planned to abandon the present pool at Pagoda Park.

The JayCee group suggested plans be made immediately for at least one large swimming pool and two smaller ones, urging that immediate application be made to the government for the necessary permits to provide critical materials.

Cost set at \$15,000. Possible cost of the program was set at \$125,000.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt said that "anything in the way of improvements on that large a scale will require a bond issue."

"We're going to need an additional bond issue, anyway, in the not-too-distant future," he said, adding that such funds could be included, along with those for fire protection and other municipal improvements.

"We are very cognizant of the need for these facilities," Mayor Perry Pickett told the group. "This is only one item in our recreational program and we've been making an overall study of our needs."

"We know the problem and hope to do something about it."

Corporal Killed In Korea Described As 'Great Compatriot'

IHLEN, MINN.—(AP)—A Minnesota Marine corporal killed in action last week in Korea was described by a Marine Corps general Tuesday night as "among the truly great compatriots of our country."

At the age of 12, Tommy Johnson of Ihlen had offered to join the Marines in 1942, saying "I am not afraid of danger."

"I am sure that Marines all over the world will be proud to stand with me tonight in saluting your son," Major General MacQueen told Mrs. Gerald Johnson of Ihlen by telephone.

Corporal Johnson had written his parents that he was injured by shrapnel on September 7. By September 14 he was back in action. The Defense Department informed his parents that Tommy was killed in action just three days later, on September 17.

Offers Services Early
Back in 1942, when Tommy was only 12 years old, he offered his services to the Marine Corps. Tommy wrote the commanding general of the Marine Corps Base at San Diego:

"I am 12 years old and not afraid of danger. When I heard how the Marines defended Wake Island, I decided to join them if I can."

Tommy was made an honorary corporal at the time and a complete Marine uniform was sent to him. Soon after he was 18 he became a Marine.

Mr. and Mrs. Johnson have received no details of their son's death.

Tuesday night Station WTCN of the twin cities arranged a telephone call from Marine Corps Headquarters in Washington to the parents of the boy who wanted to be a Marine at the age of 12.

Mrs. Johnson wept quietly as she talked with General MacQueen, top public information officer for the Marine Corps. The general promised to send the Johnsons further details about their son's death.

He's Off To Chat With Congo Bongo

NEW YORK—(NEA)—Commander Attilio Gatti is going back to Africa to strike up a few conversations. With animals.

The veteran explorer is of the opinion that wild animals speak to each other. Not just roars and trumpeting and mating calls, either. He says he's heard them carry on human-type discourses. What's more he's had a few chats with animals, himself.

This coming trip will be his twelfth expedition to Africa. He's going equipped with trailers and trucks and planes and jeeps. And a device he calls an "invisible ear," which is a small, powerful microphone. With that he hopes to record animal sounds convey intelligence from one beast to another.

Gatti, whenever he thinks about this pet theory of his, likes to remember the many pleasant talks he had with a Congo bongo. A bongo is a large, reddish, white-striped antelope that lives near the Congo. Talks a blue streak.

Decides To Try

There has never been a Congo bongo captured, and Gatti decided to try. It took him three years to do it. Finally, pygmy guides, discovered a dead manna Congo bongo, and they figured there was a baby around somewhere.

One of the pygmies was very expert at speaking Congo-bongoese, and began calling the baby, making like the mother. Sure enough, the baby gave out an answering murmur, and was captured.

"Later," recalls Gatti, "after hours and hours of daily practice, even I learned a bit of Congo bongo language. And Hrabi (the baby's name) and I had long heart-to-heart talks."

On another occasion, Gatti was shooting a close-up of a lion. Suddenly, he heard "a sound which I can only describe as an imploring whisper." It was a lioness, hidden behind the lion in the tall grass.

telling her mate to "take it easy, Mac, remember the wife and cubs." Gatti says the lion turned around, and murmured a reply. Probably, "Relax, Sadie. I know what I'm doing." Then the lion turned back to Gatti and grumbled warningly. "I knew exactly the significance of the deep grumble," Gatti says. "Not another step. My family is here. I'm going to defend them."

After the picture was taken, Gatti says, he retreated slowly. So did the lion, and the lioness and two cubs got up and followed him away. But the lion had one parting comment for Gatti.

Smile On Face

"He expressed his feelings for my intrusion," Gatti recalls with a smile on his bronze face. "It was just a comment, and I understood its meaning perfectly—even though I do not care to translate it."

The expedition will stay in Africa for eight to 10 months. Most of the time will be spent shooting movies and recording animal sounds. Gatti is hopeful that the records will be a milestone in the study of wild animals. He thinks even animals without vocal chords, like gir-

raffes, have secret languages he can learn. But only wild animals—once captured and put in cages, they clam up.

The next time you get to the jungle, just go up to the first gorilla you see and say, "What's new, Henry?" If you don't get an intelligent answer, that probably wasn't Henry.

Rubber For Subs Is No Small Item

AKRON, OHIO—Ten per cent of the total weight of a United States Navy submarine is rubber.

Perhaps the largest amount is used in the vessel's 252 hard rubber storage batteries, a rubber company (B. F. Goodrich) estimates. The bulkheads and decks of each of the two battery rooms which house the huge cells are completely covered with rubber for protection against acids.

Rubber also can be found in the gaskets that make hatch covers and compartment doors watertight, in flood and vent valves on ballast and trim tanks, in shock mountings for heavy machinery and other equipment, and in electric cables, water and oil hose.

LAID TO POSTMASTER

WASHINGTON—The National Geographic Society notes that William Shakespeare's birthplace now is designated on its maps as "Stratford On Avon," but recalls that the town once had a postmaster who insisted that the proper name was "Stratford Upon Avon." CHICAGO—One day Trudy's classmate in grade school asked her what she wanted to be when she grew up.

"A grand opera singer, of course," Trudy replied. Although Trudy Gerini, 30, hasn't quite achieved her goal, she's knocking on the door to success as a singer. She recently made her stage debut as a member of the cast of the Chicago company of "South Pacific."

After she graduated from a Chicago high school, she entered the University of Illinois at Champaign on a music scholarship. In May, 1948 she won the annual Smith Scholarship Award for voice study. She was going nicely, with the prospect of a renewal of her scholarship, when she happened to enter a state beauty contest in May, 1949. Then she met Logan.

Trudy became "Miss Illinois." By September she was in Atlantic City representing Illinois in the "Miss America" beauty pageant. She placed third and claimed a \$2,500 scholarship. It would permit her to study voice wherever she pleased.

"Of course, my ambition was to become a grand opera singer," Trudy said enthusiastically. Lenora Slaughter, executive director of the "Miss America Pageant," granted Trudy permission to study in Europe.

"I was a sort of a test case," Trudy shyly confessed. "I was the first 'Miss America' contestant to use her scholarship in Europe."

Worked As Photo Model

But Trudy needed more funds to study all she had planned. So she

spent a year working as a professional model. She posed for hundreds of publicity and advertising photographs.

By Spring of 1950, she was in Rome. She studied voice, classical ballet and drama, with practical experience in the theater. Maestro Adolfo Baruti directed her voice instruction.

Last December she had the lead of Susie in the Rome Playhouse production of "Boy Meets Girl." She worked in two Italian movies. One, "The Love of Norma," is an Italian speaking film. Trudy said her lines in Italian.

Honey blonde Trudy traveled in Egypt, Switzerland, Greece, Portugal, Italy, England and France. At San Tropez, on the French Riviera, she chanced to meet Frederick Wacker, Jr., a Chicago friend. Then she met Logan.

Wacker introduced her to Mr. and Mrs. Joshua Logan. Logan is playwright and co-producer of "South Pacific."

He asked Trudy what she was doing in Europe. She replied, "Studying voice."

"He asked me if I had ever considered musical comedy. I frankly told him 'no.' I had always had visions of grand opera."

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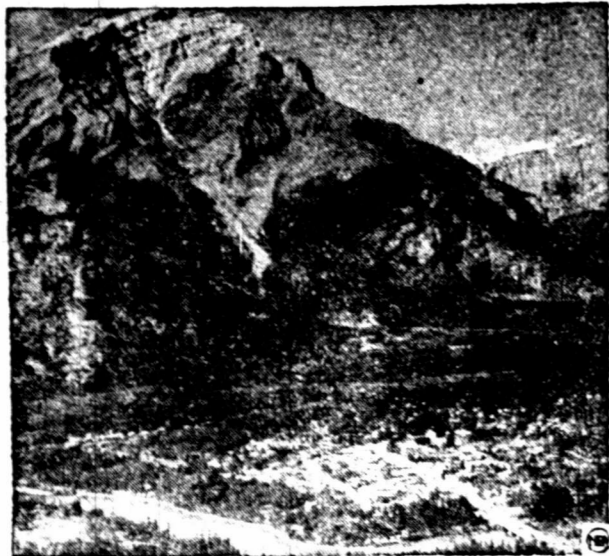

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Royal Couple To See Grown-Up Canada In 10,000-Mile Jaunt

TORONTO, CANADA—(NEA)—If Princess Elizabeth believes everything her mother and father tell her, she's in for a shock. For the Canada she'll see on her visit in October is a country that has dramatically changed from the Canada King George and Queen Elizabeth saw in 1939.

The Princess is making her first visit to North America. It's also her first foreign tour on her own. She and her husband, Prince Philip, will cover 10,000 miles in the five weeks beginning October 2. They'll go from the Atlantic Coast to the Pacific Coast and back again, with a side trip down to Washington.

They'll see all of Canada, except the vast wilderness of the north. They'll see modern industrial cities and picturesque French-Canadian villages; they'll see fisheries, wheat fields, mines and timber forests; they'll see the old Canada and the new Canada, the growing giant that has sprung up since the last royal visit 12 years ago.

Their trip has been arranged so that Elizabeth and Philip will understand the Canada of 1951. It is a nation that has grown from under 11,000,000 to over 14,000,000 people in a dozen years. Much of that growth is new immigration thousands of farmers and a liberal sprinkling of scientists and craftsmen.

Frontier Pushed Back

The Royal couple will see how Canada's northern frontier is gradually being pushed back. Flying over northern Manitoba, they'll see the new railroads pushing over northern Manitoba, they'll see the new railroads pushing through the bush to serve strategic metal mines discovered only in the past two years.

In northern Ontario, they'll stop off at the model pulp and paper mill town of Kapuskasing.

They'll be shown how Canada is forging ahead industrially. From the air, they'll be able to see mushrooming developments of post-war

Mountains will come at Calgary. For the next 36 hours, as they travel west, they will hardly ever be out of sight of one of the innumerable snowcapped peaks.

There is a two-day holiday scheduled after they reach the Pacific. It is expected they will spend it somewhere on or near Vancouver Island, before they begin the eastward trip.

Typical tourist attractions await them at Canada's largest city, Montreal. They'll see the magnificent view of Canada's biggest harbor from historic Mount Royal. And they'll see the wide St. Lawrence River, over 1,000 miles inland from the Atlantic, where ocean-going vessels dock.

Another Schedule

There is another two-day holiday scheduled for them at this point, when they will probably spend at a resort near Montreal. Then they'll make a two-day visit to Washington, the only time they will be on U.S. soil. The skyline of the U.S. will be visible at other points, however, notably the skyline of Detroit from Windsor, Ontario.

The last stops of the trip will be the beautiful Maritime Provinces. They'll see the small fishing villages of Nova Scotia, the smallest Canadian province, Prince Edward Island, and the oldest British overseas territory at St. John's Newfoundland, discovered in 1497 and continuously British ever since.

The only part of the dominion they'll miss will be the far north, the land of Eskimos and Indians. But that area will be well into Winter when they arrive. And Canada would rather show off the glories of a Canadian Autumn.

That's radarman talk in one of the nation's most exclusive schools. Known only in Navy circles since it was opened four years ago at Glendale Naval Air Station, the secret radar school has trained hundreds of officer specialists. They are responsible for training seaman teams who man Combat Information Centers aboard cruisers, subs, destroyers, aircraft carriers and other combat vessels.

The public is permitted a glimpse of the school for the first time. When the U. S. Navy combined its various radar schools at the close of World War II, the Glendale school became its air control training center. Here students practice actual interception of enemy aircraft.

A Secret Operation

Capt. Wallace B. Meehling, in charge, and his executive officer, Comdr. Wilson G. Wright, III, guard the school's secrets like hens mothering chicks. Much of the training program must be kept under wraps

for national security.

The magic of radar enables the Navy radarmen to reach out into space, see invisible enemy ships and planes, tell their direction and speed, and direct counter attack. It permits the fleet officer to know where his own ships are during heavy weather.

The Combat Information Center has become the nerve center of a Navy ship. Men who man the "CIC" directly serve the high command. These officers coordinate radar information with visual observations from planes and ships and from intelligence reports.

Mock Battles Staged

The training center for the eyes and ears of the Navy operates under simulated combat conditions.

Lt. Comdr. H. S. Foote, Jr., is our guide. He points to the radar towers rising high above the front of the school. On top of the towers, radar antenna rotate slowly and silently, day and night. They are the radio-beam "searchlights." They can detect aircraft movements in excess of 100 miles from the radar station. A fleet of Navy jet interceptors is parked on the airfield. Inside the school, in windowless rooms, is a world of low lights,
