The project had flowed and swab hed some oil and some drilling mud during an extended drillstem test on perforated section at 10.957-967

Gas surfaced in one hour and 30 minutes. The drill pipe started head-ing out oil and water blanket in seven hours. The fluid was run to pits for an unreported length of time and then the flow was gauged for 12 hours.

The prospect produced a total of 38 barrels of oil during that 12 hours. The flow was through a fiveeighth inch bottom hole choke.

At the end of the 13 hours the wildcat started slugging mud. Operator went in with the swab and recovered 9.38 barrels of oil in 60 minutes and then it started making mud

again. When the last mud started appearing the project was shutin to allow operators to decide how to eliminate the mud.

Probably the perforated zone at 10,957-967 feet will be washed with acid and then the zone will be tested further.

Location is in the southeast corner of section 132, block M. EL&RR survey, and 13 miles west of Lamesa.

New Soviet Atomic Blast

When the White House announcement of the first Russian atomic explosion was made two years ago, it was greeted with some skepticism.

There were those who doubted we could tell at this distance whether or not the Russians had exploded anything involving atomic energy. Others felt that if there had been an explosion it might have been accidental.

Many months later, when the story of our detection methods finally was told, it became clear that the skepticism was unwarranted. The techniques employed by top U. S. scientists in detecting atomic activity anywhere on earth are regarded as virtually foolproof. They felt their 1949 tests were conclusive.

The scientists neatly had disposed of the "accidental explosion" theory right at the start. They had staked their reputations on the statement that "if this (Russian) explosion was not an atomic bomb, then none of us can conceive what it might have been."
