Richardson & Bass Mitchell Wildcat Is Flowing To Test

Richardson & Bass No. 1 McCabe, West and discovery in Southeast Mitchell County, is flowing to clean out, test and complete. The last 24-hour gauge reported was 55.3 barrels of fluid through a three-eighths-inch choke. It was 93 per cent new oil and seven per cent water. A previous 24-hour flow through the same size choke was 52 barrels of fluid. It was 92.3 per cent new oil and seven and seven-tenths per cent water.

Smith Discovery In NE Howard Is Shutin To Final

Lloyd H. Smith, Inc. No. 1 John Boyd, indicated Pennsylvania reef line discovery in extreme Northeast Howard County, is reported by unofficial sources to have perforated with 120 shots at 7,850-70 feet. The well kicked off after swabbing and flowed 13 1/2 hours and made 18 barrels of oil and no water, natural. Tubing pressure ranged from 475 pounds down to 130 pounds. The well is now shutin to take potential test and complete.

San Andres Makes Water In Atlantic Wildcat In Gaines

The Atlantic Refining Company No. 1 R. L. Burkson, wildcat in Central-East Gaines County, is drilling below 5,010 feet after a 30-minute drillstem test in the San Andres. The test was taken from 4,952 feet to 4,997 feet. Recovery was 2,100 feet of drilling mud and 600 feet of sulphur water. Projected depth is 13,000 feet for a test of the Ellenburger. It is located 23 miles southeast of Seminole and 660 feet from north and west lines of labor 10, league 286, Schleicher County School Land survey.

Schleicher Wildcat Plugged, Abandoned

Grey-Wolfe Company has plugged and abandoned its No. 1 Mrs. W. F. Edmiston, wildcat in Northeast Schleicher County, 16 miles northeast of Eldorado. The project was quit on total depth of 4,888 feet. The last drill-

stem test in the failure was from 4,864 to 4,888 feet in the lower Strawn. It recovered 120 feet of free gas, 120 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud and 420 feet of oil-cut salt water. The lower Strawn was topped at 4,770 feet, elevation 2,356 feet. Location was at the center of the northwest quarter of the northeast quarter of section 34, block K, GHS&A survey.

DST Is Reported For Pecos Tester

Unofficial sources have reported another drillstem test for Nelson Bunker Hunt Trust Estate of Dallas No. 1 W. A. Stroman, "tight" wildcat in Central Pecos County. Location is 1,320 feet from south and west lines of the lease in section 526, Comanche Creek Irrigation Company survey and seven miles east of Fort Stockton.

Spraberry Operators Kill 80-Acre Plan-

(Continued From Page One) kind word to offer in support of the recommended rules presented by Howard Marshall of Abilene, Ky., chairman of the committee representing independent oil operators and major oil companies. Rowan said it on the line when the meeting opened. "I'm sincere in my convictions when I tell you that we have an emergency," he told the more than 300 men who had gathered for the session. "Something must be done because of the scarcity of steel so we can spread out the available supply. The FAD doesn't want to step in but they have recommended that we settle this thing on a local level. If all of us can't drill all the wells we want to, the steel should be spread out so that each operator can get his proportionate share. I'm not one who thinks we have to run to Washington with all our problems. I think we can work this thing out locally." Marshall Presents Report Marshall then presented his report, explaining that "while this is a report of the committee, I don't think any member is in favor of all of it." "And," he added, "I don't want any operator to labor under the illusion that this will solve all your pipe problems. It probably will not. But if the spacing is broadened, we feel the supply will be broadened." The proposed rules would apply only to the Spraberry area in Midland, Glasscock, Upton, Crockett and Reagan Counties, lying south of the south line of Township 3 South in Midland and Glasscock Counties. Essentially, it set the proration unit at 80 acres. The allocation formula would be 50 per cent to acreage and 50 per cent to the well. The order would be only for six months' duration to permit any changes or even its revocation, if necessary. Kiss Of Death "If there is no serious objection," said Rowan, "and no better plan is offered, this plan probably will be presented to the Railroad Commission." Then came the kiss of death. Attorney Jack Blalock of Houston arose and announced that he represented Operators Ed Pauley, E. E. Fogelson and a number of others, including the Midkiff family. "They hold around 50,000 acres in this area," said Blalock, "and they are opposed to the recommendations—pardon me, the suggestions—of the committee. They believe the question has already been settled since the Railroad Commission has issued its orders after nine separate hearings. They are satisfied with the 40-acre spacing and with the present allocation formula." Rowan then invited comments from anyone in favor of the proposed rules. The invitation was greeted only by silence. "It looks like," laughed Rowan, "I have no proponents for the plan." "Then, Mr. Chairman," spoke up Blalock, "I move we adjourn." Discussion Continues But the motion was ignored and the discussion continued. "On what basis," asked one oil company representative, who did not identify himself, "could the Railroad Commission possibly issue an order based simply on the shortage of steel?" "I'll try to answer that," said Ira Butler of Fort Worth, one of the committee members. "I do not believe the commission has the right to disregard the physical properties of the Spraberry and regulate purely on the basis of the lack of steel. "But I'm just as convinced as Mr. Rowan that if we don't do something out here, the PAD will issue an order." Blalock arose again, shaking his head. "Let them issue any order attempting to allocate production and regulate spacing," he shouted. "We will fight it and beat it as we always have." He then pointed out the proposed rules would apply only to the south half of the Spraberry area. "It is inconceivable to me," he added, "that the Railroad Commis-

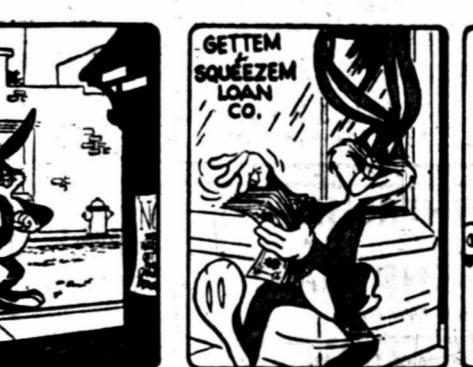

Carver High School football squad meets the dangerous Tigers of Hobbs, N.M., at 8 p.m. Friday in Memorial Stadium.

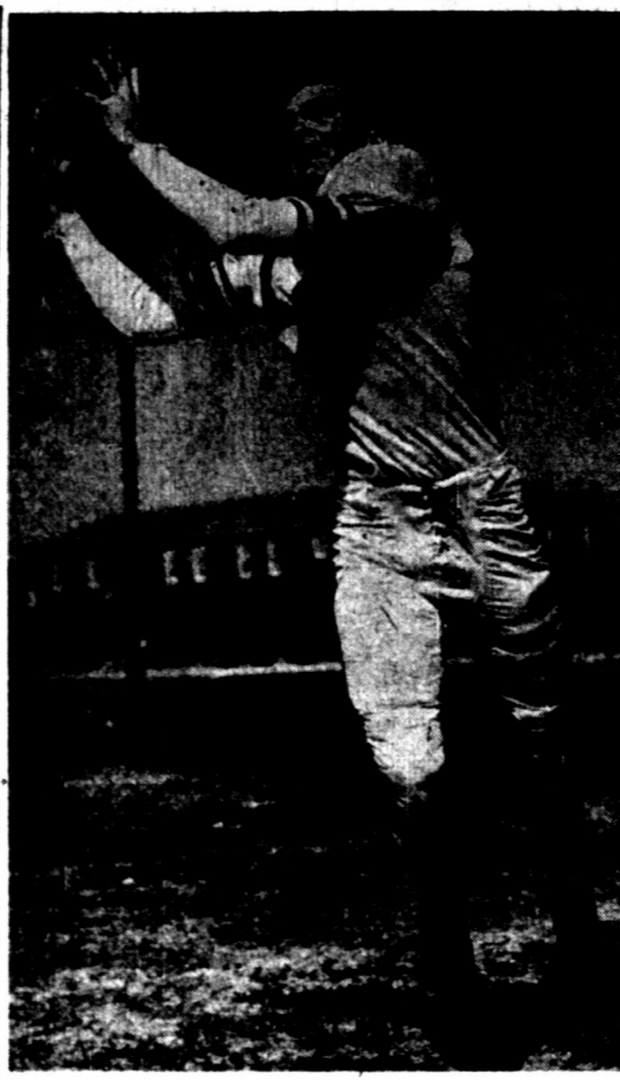
Coach Johnny Williams said his team is in good condition for the tilt, and hopes to go ahead in the games-won column. The Hornets have split even in four contests this year.
