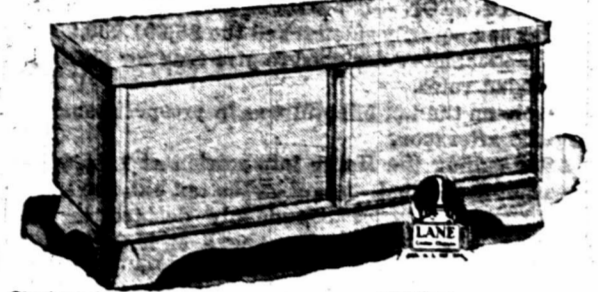


WESTERN STAR FINED FOR DRUNKEN DRIVING

LONG BEACH, CALIF.—More than 10,000 striking aircraft workers, out since September 5, will return to work Monday at Douglas Aircraft Company here.

CIO United Auto Workers officials Thursday said 83.6 per cent of the strikers voted in favor of returning.

Workers, who struck for higher pay, will go back to their jobs at the same rate, but the federal Wage Stabilization Board will investigate the dispute.

DALLAS—(AP)—The United Texas Drys Thursday reelected Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University, its president and named Dr. Harold G. Cooke of Abilene first vice president.

Bergen No Dummy In Pushing Dummies Out Of Limelight

HOLLYWOOD—Behind The Screen: Edgar Bergen slipped me the flash that a new live character and not a dummy named Charlie McCarthy will be in the spotlight when he invades television as a regular in late 1952.

The new live character: Edgar Bergen!

"I'll do a lot of characters myself," he announced. "I once did a Joe Jackson-type tramp character in vaudeville. I'm going to do him—and some others I have in mind. Yes, in makeup and in the wardrobe to go with the character."

No, Bergen won't be barbequeing steaks over the coals of Charlie, Mortimer and his other wooden dummies. They'll all be in his TV act as supporting characters. There even will be a couple of new ones, including his life-size glamour girl, Podine Puffington, and a grizzled old Swedish fisherman.

But as Bergen walled it to me: "I've been too good to Charlie. A lot of people don't know who I am until someone mentions that I'm the father of Charlie. He'll still be with me on television but he won't be hogging the limelight."

Why hasn't Bergen taken the big TV plunge as a regular? He grinned and said: "I'm having more trouble staying out of television than getting in. I walk down the street and guys trip me. But a comedian is more vulnerable than any type of entertainer."

"He has to gamble on two things—prolonging his career for tax purposes and wearing out his welcome. After you've worn out your welcome on television there's no other place to go."

"I'm tooling up this year. I'm going to do 15 or 20 personal appearances. I need the work. Television requires a standout personality or else you're through. Thank God I've got a lot of dummies. And I'll fire 'em as fast as they don't stand out."

The new million-dollar, four-lane, divided highway—the finest, best-engineered and most modern of the day and age—was opened to traffic last weekend, and will be dedicated officially at a formal ceremony scheduled at 3 p.m. Saturday at the Midland-Ector county line.

The four-lane, divided highway long has been needed, and that need has become more urgent by the day as traffic between the oil cities of Midland and Odessa has become heavier and heavier.

The old two-lane highway was recognized widely as one of the most dangerous highway segments in the state. It has been the scene of hundreds of automotive accidents, which have taken the lives of scores of victims.

The new road, according to Cabiness, was designed and constructed for the purpose and intent of moving the large volume of traffic between Midland and Odessa safely and expeditiously, and there is no question as to its capacity to adequately handle the load.

The possibility of head-on collisions has been reduced by dividing the roadways; pavement markings and signs indicate clearly the proper use of the road—yet these features will be of little value unless they are observed, heeded and followed.

Disregard of these features not only jeopardizes the lives and property of those drivers who fail to observe them, but also endangers others who may be exercising every caution.

Let us, as we enjoy using this fine, modern highway, dedicate ourselves individually and collectively to the ideal of safe and sane driving at all times—keeping the important Midland-Odessa road free of fatal accidents as long as possible.

Marshall Plan Due To Go Out Of Business January 1, 1952

WASHINGTON—For all practical purposes, the Marshall Plan will go out of business January 1, six months ahead of the originally scheduled end.

Incompleted Marshall Plan reconstruction projects will, of course, be finished. But by January 1, the new Mutual Security Act just passed by Congress provides that ECA—the Economic Cooperation Administration which ran the Marshall Plan—must cease all economic aid to foreign countries by June 30, 1952, except where it is tied in with military assistance.

Biggest is, of course, direct military assistance. That will get approximately \$6,000,000,000 out of the \$7,500,000,000 total foreign aid authorized. This military assistance will be administered by Department of Defense. Its allocations to various countries and areas are secret.

The remaining \$1,500,000,000 for economic aid in support of military assistance is divided half a dozen ways.

Europe again gets the biggest share—\$1,023,000,000. Of this \$55,000,000 may be used to buy strategic materials. Of the \$97,000,000 balance, a part still will be economic aid for the countries whose recovery has been slowest.

not include Greece and Turkey, which are in the European program. Also, two big chunks of the \$190,000,000 could be transferred to special accounts by MSA Coordinator Harriman.

Latin America Included
Latin America is brought into this worldwide aid program for the first time with an authorization of \$21,000,000. All of this will be the so-called "Point Four" aid for underdeveloped countries. It will be under State Department Administration, and it will be divided several ways.

Three million of the amount may be transferred to the United Nations for its programs to aid underdeveloped countries. Of the \$18,000,000 remaining, more than \$8,000,000 will go to the Institute of Inter-American Affairs. This is the U. S. government corporation which, since early World War II days, has been operating agricultural, health, educational and other technical development projects on a shared cost basis with various Latin American countries. Its present head is Kenneth Iverson.

It is anticipated that the IIAA and the Point Four program will be continued more or less permanently even after the Mutual Security Administration is liquidated in 1954.

Point Four is expected to grow. Under the present MSA authorization, Point Four is allocated a total of \$147,000,000.


The \$90,000,000 for the Middle East will be largely Point Four projects. Ethiopia, Lybia and Liberia in North Africa will get from \$1,000,000 to \$1,500,000 apiece out of this category.

For the Far East, the Department of State had asked \$375,000,000 for the present fiscal year. Congress approved \$237,000,000. Much of this is straight economic recovery aid.

It does not include economic assistance for Korea. The Marshall Plan ceased to function there some time ago. A separate \$45,000,000 authorization for economic assistance to Korea has been approved. For the Middle East, \$190,000,000 has been authorized. But this does anything more you would have bid one spade independently instead of passing at your first turn.

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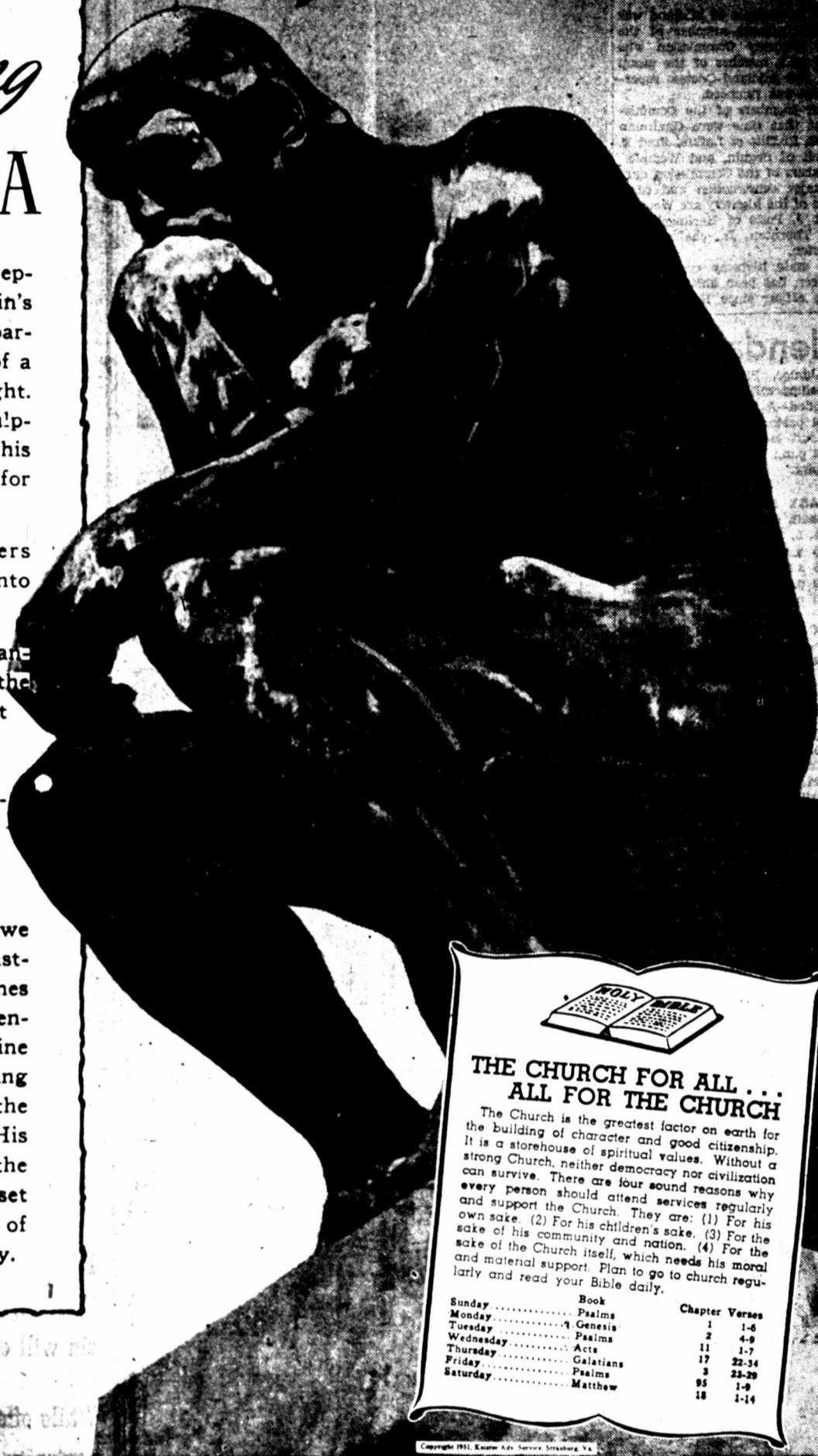

Texas Drouth Near Disaster Category, Says Soil Authority

DALLAS (AP)—Texas' 16-month drouth is just 30 days short of disastrous dry spell that hit the state in 1947, a federal soil expert believes.

"It is beginning to move, too, toward the length of the often-talked-about drouth of 1886, which lasted 23 months," said Louis P. Merrill, southwestern director of the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

"It's a spotted situation," he explained. "Here and there are spots that got enough moisture, but for most of Texas x x x the situation is bad."

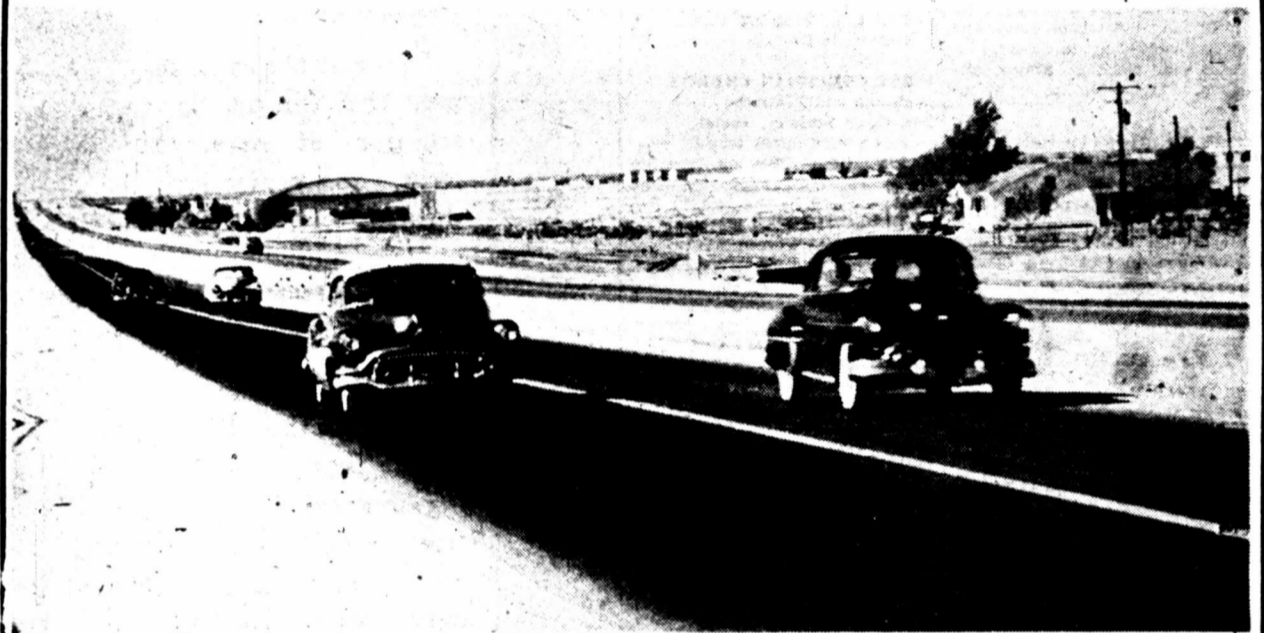

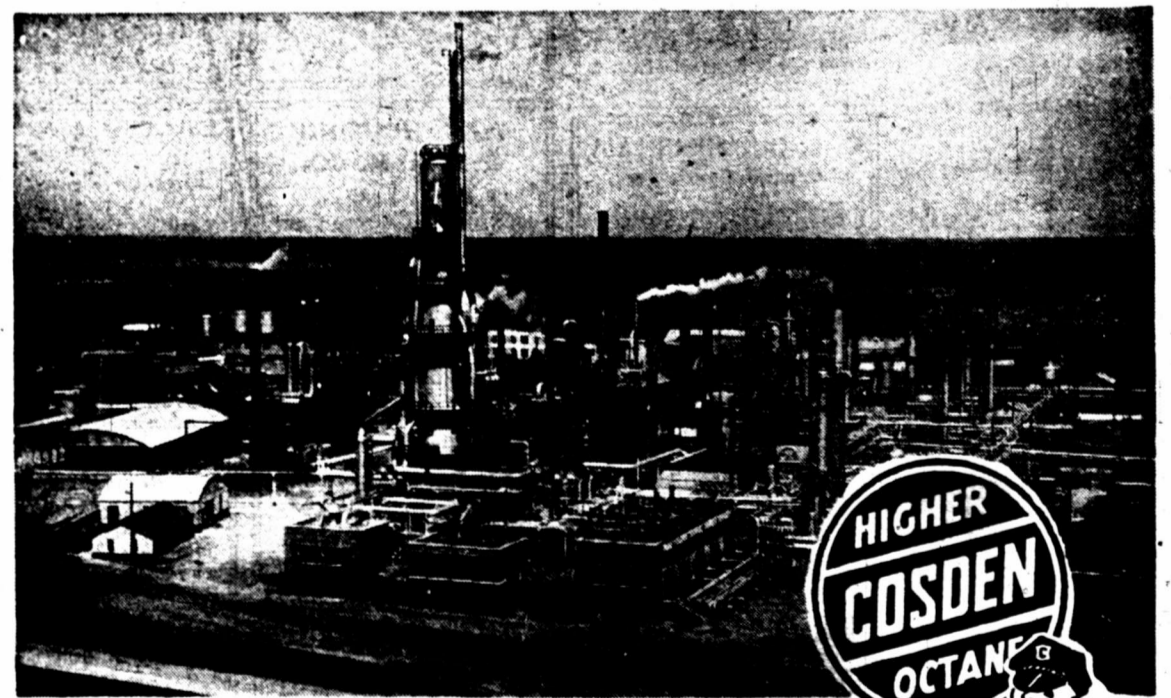

Once it was grimly called the "ribbon of death"—so many persons had been killed on it in automobile accidents. Highway 80, the new four-lane and divided million-dollar super-strip between Midland and Odessa, is a beautiful thing.

There it is, stretching for 18 miles between the two cities and before the motorists. Straight and true and with promise of smooth transportation, it is indeed an example of what Texans are proud of—their highways.

On the eve of the cutting of ribbons to open the great artery, the men who patrol it have made an appeal for safety by all who may use it.

Making this appeal are Highway Patrolmen Mac Stout and B. L. Warren of Midland, John White and Fred Marshall of Odessa.

They all have earnestly and sincerely expressed the hope that motorists on the newly-open super-highway will practice safety and will save lives by doing so.

One Of Most Dangerous

They realize what Highway 80 between Midland and Odessa has been in the past—one of the most deadly and danger-laden drives in the nation.

Why?

Highway 80 between Midland and Odessa is straight and practically level.

The reason for such a high casualty toll has been attributed to many reasons. Chief of these is high speed.

And high speed is one of the dangers the patrolmen are warning motorists about just before the official use of the highway begins Saturday.

There are other rules to observe, the patrolmen point out. These include: abiding by the signs, correct usage of the lanes, making of proper signals for maneuvers, and road-courtesy in general.

Actually, the highway has been open for traffic a week and already

DALLAS—(P)—You couldn't play bingo at the State Fair Friday—and there were 43 other games missing from the midway after the fair's executive board decided they constituted gambling.

The action came Thursday as many women attended the fair for Women's Christian Temperance Union Day.

A furor over the concessions started Monday when State Rep. Doyle Willis, Sr., of Fort Worth, declared, "There are more gambling devices per square foot (on the midway) than there are in Reno, Nev."

City Manager Charles C. Ford ordered the closing.

McCracken Must Die For Slaying 10-Year-Old Girl

SANTA ANA, CALIF.—(P)—Henry Ford McCracken will be sentenced October 26 to death in the San Quentin gas chamber for the murder of 10-year-old Patricia Jean Hull.

A jury found him legally sane Thursday night after deliberating less than an hour.

The sentence is subject to review by the State Supreme Court.

McCracken, 34-year-old guitar player described by his attorney as a moron, was convicted of first degree murder September 20. He has been on trial the last two weeks on his plea of innocent by reason of insanity.

McCracken was convicted of hurting the girl from a theater last May, beating her to death in his motel cabin, and burying the body in a grave in a nearby canyon.

Lie Detector Tests To Be Given Family Of Kidnaped Baby

MICHIGAN CITY, IND.—(P)—The trail of the "woman in white" grew cold Friday, and hope dimmed for the safe return of a baby who disappeared from his hospital crib six days ago.

Police ran down two leads Thursday in their search for the mysterious woman and reported both were false.

A former employe of the Beatty Mental Hospital at nearby Westville had been sought. She and her husband, an Indian, factory worker, had been missing from their Michigan City home.

However, a supervisor at Beatty Hospital received a letter from the woman postmarked Saturday, the day the baby disappeared, in Sioux City, Iowa, 550 miles away.

Nurse Held Released

A registered nurse with a baby was detained a short time in Chicago, but it was established quickly that she was taking the child from a Hammond, Ind., hospital to an infant's home in Indianapolis.

The missing baby, Lawrence James Lyons, who was born October 9, disappeared from his crib in the fourth floor nursery at St. Anthony Hospital. The search for a woman in white was based on a report by a machinist, John Boehnlein, that he saw such a woman carry a baby out of the nursery.

Police planned to give lie detector tests to the parents, Mr. and Mrs. James Lyons, to Lyon's 19-year-old daughter by a previous marriage and to neighbors and friends of the family. They said the purpose was to "fully corroborate everything we have learned so far in investigation."

Red Ticket Means Nothing To Tyke

Texas Pays \$80,000 For Half Interest In Hereford Bull

GROVE, OKLA.—(P)—J. S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls, Texas, established a new record price of \$160,000 for a bull of any breed Thursday when he paid \$80,000 for half interest in an animal owned by Alan Feeney of the Milky Way Hereford Ranch in Phoenix, Ariz.

The Hereford bull, M. W. Larry Domino 107th, was in the Honey Creek Ranch dispersion auction.

Feeney owns the other half of the bull. He said he would not sell his interest for any price.

Disaster Again Hits Flagler, Colo.

FLAGLER, COLO.—(P)—Fire destroyed the Flagler High School building early Friday in the second disaster in a little over a month for the small Eastern Colorado farming center.

On September 15, a plane crashed at the Flagler air show and caused the deaths of 20 persons, including the pilot.

Truman Vetoes 'Cars For Amputees' Bill

WASHINGTON—(P)—President Truman has vetoed a bill under which the government would have paid up to \$1,000 on the price of an automobile for any World War II or Korean veteran who has lost a leg or an arm, or is blind or almost so.

In taking this action Thursday, Truman told the Senate he gladly would approve legislation which limited such aid to veterans who have lost use of one or both legs at or above the ankle.

County Bond Issue Vote Overwhelming

Midland County residents on March 26, 1949, overwhelmingly voted bonds for \$150,000 which included financing the right-of-way costs for widening U.S. Highway 80 between Midland and Odessa.

The vote was 425 for the issuance of the bonds and only 25 against.

The bond issue also included funds for improving lateral roads in the county's road system and the purchase of road machinery for the county's part in a proposed underpass on Big Spring Street in Midland.

Voting of the bonds came after the Texas Highway Commission announced it had appropriated \$997,000 for making the highway a four-lane, divided strip between the two cities. The Commissioner's appropriation, of course, was dependent on Midland and Ector Counties providing the additional right-of-way needed.

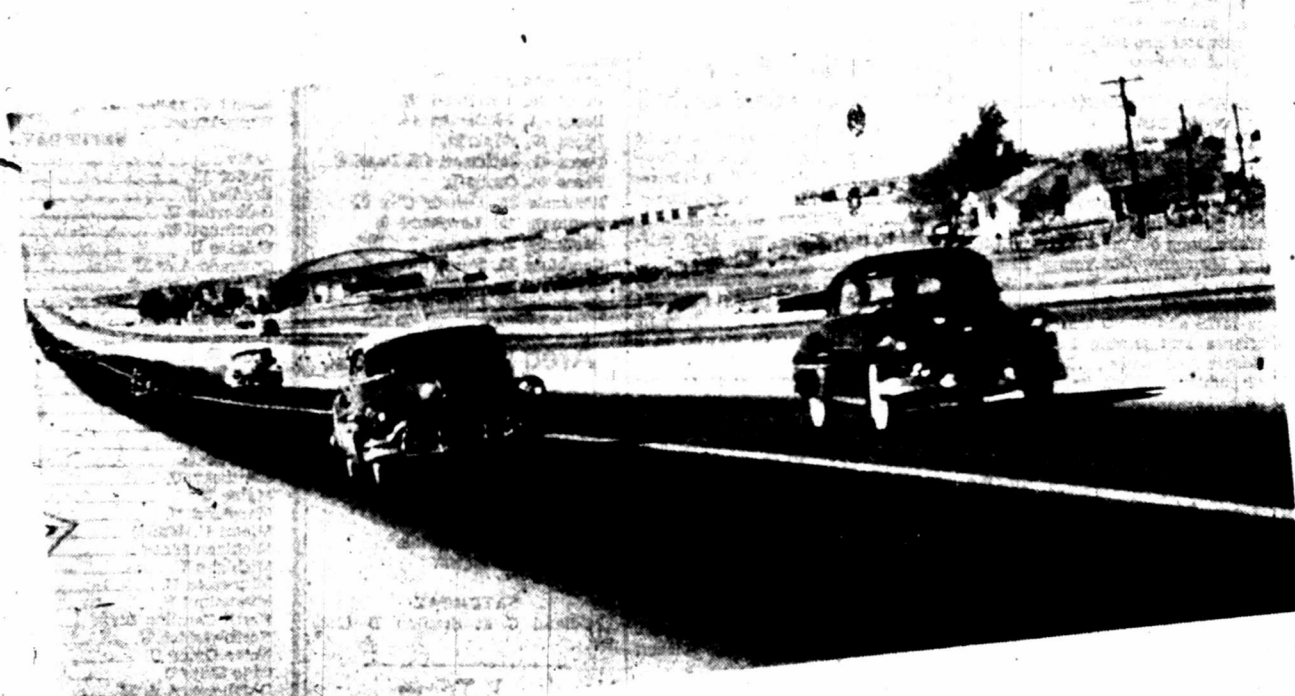
