UN Refuses To Budge **On Buffer Zone Issue**

MUNSAN, KOREA - AP -Truce negotiators returned to the conference tent at Panmuniom Sunday with the Allies standing pat in refusal to swap hard-won their ground for peace in Korea.

United Nations representatives told the Reds Saturday no further consideration could be given to the Communist proposal for a buffer zone which would cost the Allies a strip of hard-won territory as much as 15 miles wide.

The Allied negotiators said, however, their own proposal for a cease-fire line generally following the present battlefront was "not a flat take-it-or-leave-it position." The UN is prepared to make adjustments, but only minor ones. Another meeting was held at 11

Low Fares For Tourists

Next month at Nice, France, the international airlines will meet to discuss the proposed 1952 inauguration of air tourist class service between Europe and America.

In Bermuda last Spring, the principle of tourist service was accepted by these lines. But they set Autumn of 1952 as a starting date, and left to subcommittees such details as fares, seating densities, and flight frequencies.

The U.S. Civil Aeronautics Board was on record for the general proposal. But it found itself unable to approve the ultimate recommendations of the International Air Transport Association. It argued that suggested flight frequencies and seating densities were inadequate to promote the kind of traffic volume needed to make the service pay.

In September the lines met once more in London. And here 10 carriers, while still voicing adherence to the "principle" of tourist flights, blocked action on the pending plan. It was a renewal of opposition they had exhibited continuously until the Bermuda session.

World Oil Production Climbs In August In Spite Of Iran Shutdown

TULSA-World crude-oil production climbed upward in August in spite of a further dropping-off of production in Iran.

Oil-producing nations of the world reached a level of 11,710,800 barrels per day during August, a gain of 47,000 berrels over July but still almost 300,000 barrels per day under the all-time record of 12.003,900 barrels daily produced in June.

The August gain was in spite of a drop in Iranian output from 116,000 barrels per day in July to a dribble of 9,300 barrels. Normal producing operations ceased in July, but Anglo-Iranian Oil Company, Ltd., inced that a total of 38,000 long tons was run from the fields in August.

Offsetting the Iranian loss were gains of 90,000 barrels daily in the United States, 40,000 barrels in Kuwait, and 18,000 barrels in Saudi Arabia. In addition to Iran, small losses were shown in Venezuela and Mexico.

While August's production of 11,710,800 barrels daily above the August production of a year ago of 10.821,500 barrels per day.

A further increase in world production is expected to be shown for September as a result of a planned step-up of production in Middle East countries, notably Kuwait and Saudi Arabia, and a continuation of the upward trend in Canada. CRUDE-OIL PRODUCTION, DAILY AVERAGE

Are Cause Of Much Winter Discomfort Although great progress has been

made in bringing beauty and convenience to the bathroom, it is still often the most uncomfortable room in the house. It is too cold in Winter and too hot in Summer.

Winter discomfort sometimes is caused by lack of sufficient radiation, but more often is due to loose-fitting windows and cold walls which lack insulation. The cure is to weatherstrip the window and to blow the concealed wall spaces full of mineral wool, which will bring the walls to within two or three degrees of room air temperature. Oppressive heat in Summer also is usually caused by lack of insulation.

STREAMLINING DUE FOR DIPLOMATTC CORPS TOKYO-(P)-The Japanese for-eign office is drafting legislation to give this country a streamlined diplomatic corps when she regains international status.

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
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
