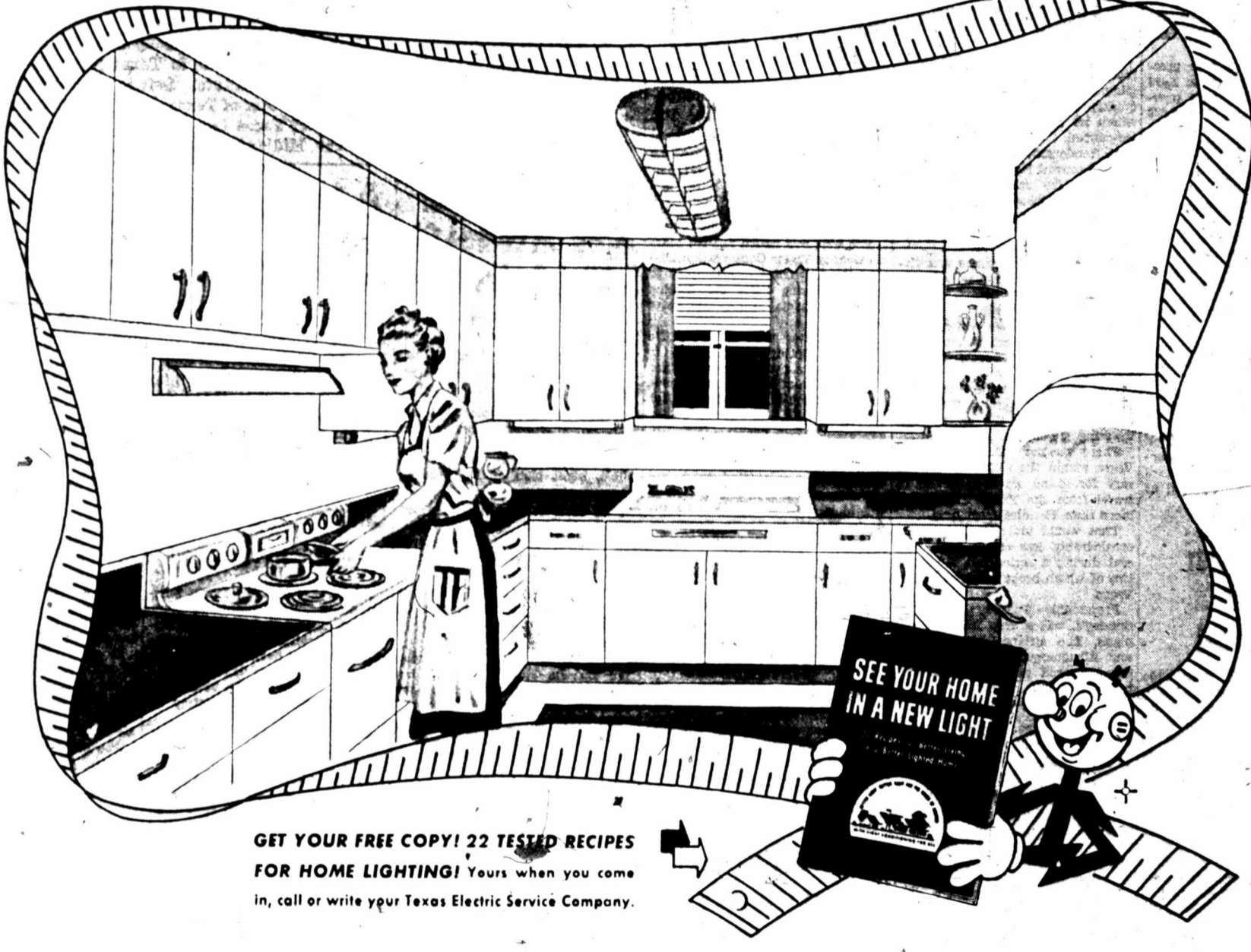
Mechanic Held On Narcotics Charge

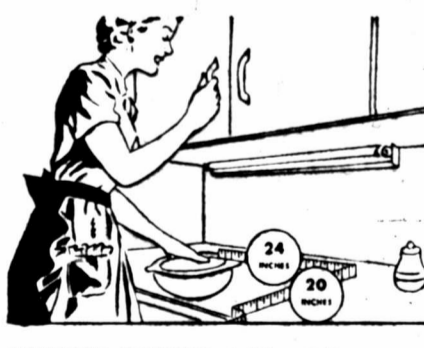

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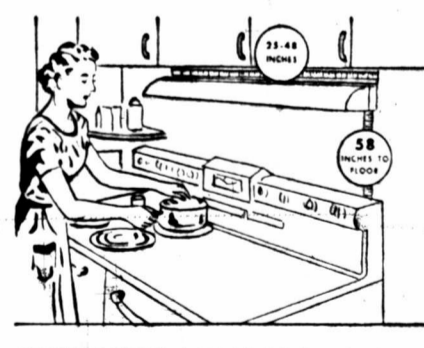

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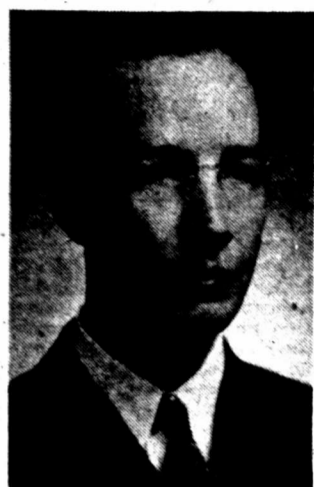

"The United Nations" and "The Work Which the Council Has Done to Relieve War Suffering" were the dual topics of a panel discussion led by Mrs. Chapman. Panel members were Mrs. A. E. Patterson, Mrs. Terry Tidwell and Mrs. George F. Yarnham.

"It is time," the panel declared, "for the United Church Women to throw the spotlight on the building of peace."

One of the basic causes of fears leading to war, they said, "is the lack of understanding among people, both as nations and as individuals."

They discussed the six most pressing problems of people in all parts of the world, designating them as follows: hunger, ignorance, poverty, disease, fear and lack of human dignity. United Nations agencies which have been useful in combating these ills, they said, are the UN International Children's Emergency Fund, World Health Organization, Food and Agriculture Organization and UN Economic, Social and Cultural Organization.

To these, they added the Council's efforts to help, chiefly through the sending of relief packages and the granting of ecumenical scholarships to foreign students.

It was brought out that the condition of four million refugees behind the UN lines is almost as bitter as the conditions of those at the front. Of these, at least 100,000 are

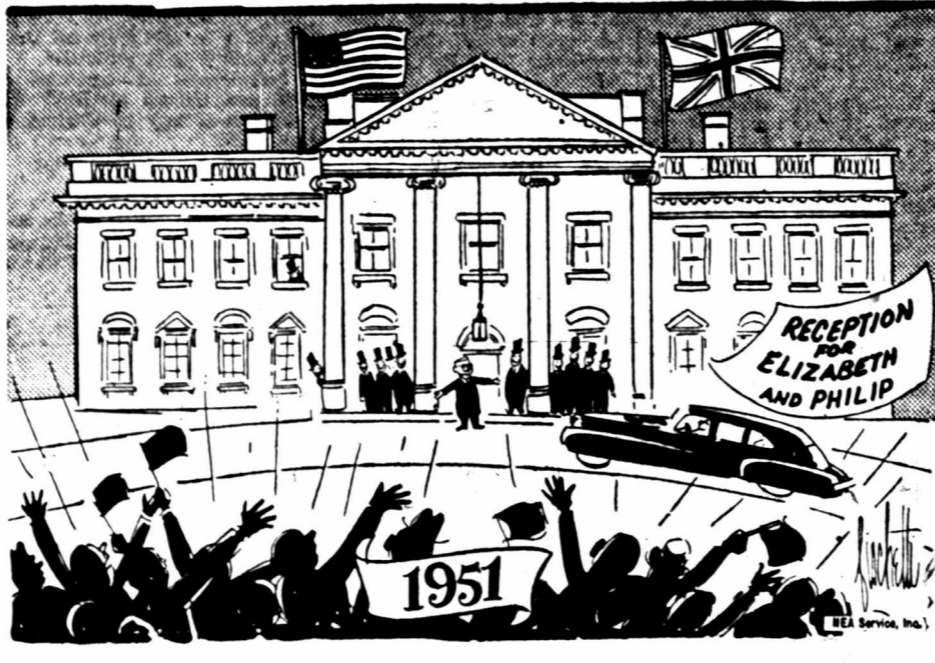
Symbol Of Respect

WASHINGTON — It now looks as if senators' secretaries might be put on the investigating griddle. If so, this column has turned up a letter pertaining to the office of Nevada's Senator "Molly" Malone that makes Flo Bratton, secretary to Vice President Barkley, look like a sandwich-smith after a Sunday School picnic.

The letter was written by Senator Malone's administrative assistant, Ben Whitehurst, and proposed that he work for the Long Beach, Calif., harbor commissioners against federal ownership of tidelands oil—for fifty grand plus expenses and plus taxes. The funny thing about the letter is that Whitehurst's boss, the senator from Nevada, now is for federal ownership of tidelands oil.

"If the general principles of this proposal are acceptable to you, or if you prefer to suggest a counter proposal, will you kindly have a contract drawn up for my consideration."

"Whereas," read the Malone resolution, "Certain lands have been authorized upon through certain 'script' filed under prior prior successive congressional acts . . . etc . . . resolved, that the Senate of the United States through its proper committee investigate such applications under the National Oil and Gas Leasing Act and filings made under the 'script' authorized by prior congressional acts . . ."

U. S. Got Bargain By Settling British Firm's Patent-Infringement Charges

WASHINGTON (NEA)— Uncle Sam finally has ended up giving the British firm, Power Jets, Ltd., \$3,200,000 as a settlement on jet engine patent-infringement charges. The original demand was for \$10,000,000.

Upset by the acute shortage of stenographers and typists in Washington, Rep. Roy W. Wier (D-Minn.) has introduced a bill which would create more recreation for the girls who come from all over the country to work for Uncle Sam. He would have the government pattern this program after those of various big firms which sponsor dances, ping-pong tournaments, hay rides, beauty contests and corn roasts.

Highest-paid female lobbyist is Mrs. Leone Baxter Whitaker, working for the American Medical Association. Her salary and expenses are reported as \$50,000 a year. Next to her in size of income is Mrs. Margaret K. Taylor, education director for the National Milk Producers Association, with a salary of \$9,000 a year.

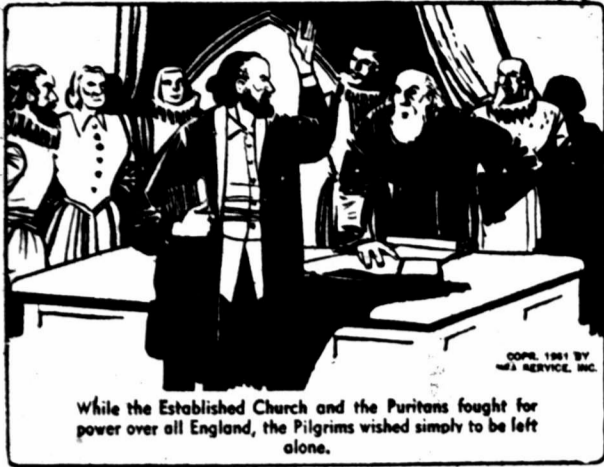

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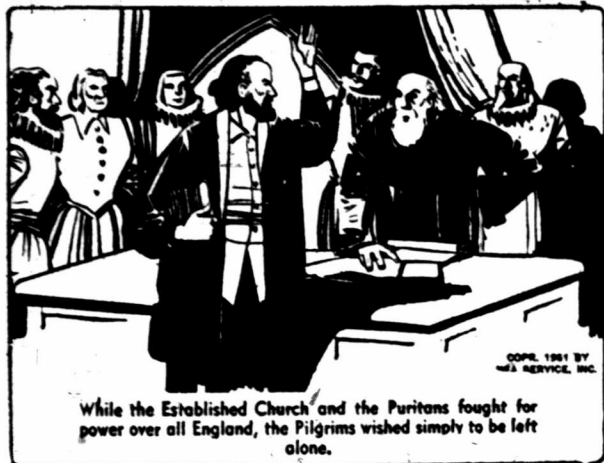

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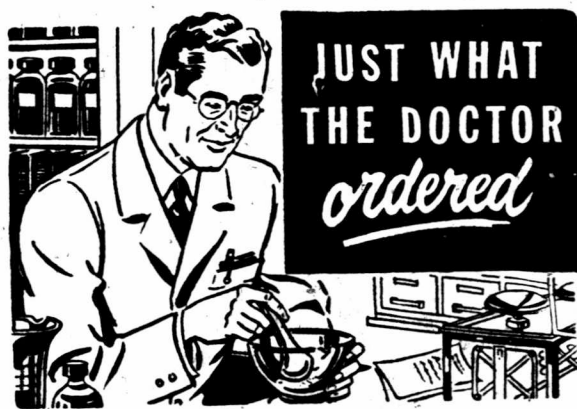

Crude Oil Production Drops 5,915 Barrels

TULSA, OKLA.—(AP)—The nation's crude oil production slipped during the week ended October 27 by an average of 5,915 barrels daily to 6,263,500 barrels. The Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

Kansas was the largest loser, dropping 3,650 barrels to 318,850 barrels.

Others with minus reports included: Mississippi, off 3,555 barrels to 101,200; Illinois, down 3,000 to 168,100; Indiana, 2,800 to 32,500; Arkansas, 1,610 to 76,350; Louisiana

900 to 617,950; Montana, 500 to 24,500; Wyoming, 300 to 185,700; and Nebraska, 100 to 7,400.

The greatest gain was in Michigan, which jumped 3,500 barrels to 40,200.

Major increases also were registered in the Eastern fields, up 3,300 barrels to 63,150; Colorado, up 1,700 to 79,400; and Kentucky, 1,200 to 34,200.

Oklahoma added 300 barrels to 508,600; California and Florida each gained 200 to 987,300 and 1,750 respectively; and Alabama inched ahead 100 to 3,100.

Production was unchanged in Texas, 2,865,475 barrels; New Mexico, 144,875; and Utah, 3,900.
