lawbreakers. This is a problem which confronts not only residents of our state, but every state in the union. A cost of crime not often considered by the general public is the drain on society that occurs after the crime has been committed, and the violator has been sentenced.

Not only does society lose these people as full-time members of the work force, and contributors to the tax-paying flow, but the general public must also foot the ever-increasing bill for their imprisonment.

Prison numbers are growing much more rapidly than the population. general nationwide prison population doubled between 1973 and 1983, and has risen another 25 per cent since 1983.

In 1983, the rate of incarceration was 177 per 100,000. This was the highest rate since the government began keeping prison records in 1925.

The increase in prison population may seem strange in light of the fact that the national crime rate has shown a decline since 1980, but most authorities attribute the increase to changes by many state legislatures in regard to sentencing of criminals. Nearly all states now require some sort of mandatory sentencing, and this has caused the number of people to upcoming Christmas shopping be incarcerated to grow.

The number of people in Texas prisons, compared to the number of cells needed, caused authorities to release a certain number of inmates within the past few years. Those released had served only a turned out so the correctional facilities could be used for those who had committed more violent

crimes. The same tough stance by the judiciary that has contributed to prison over-crowding has also been translated in a greater willingness by juries to impose the death penalty.

In May of 1984 there were 1,351 inmates awaiting execution in the United States, a 27 per cent increase from 1982, and the largest number ever.

Almost two-thirds of those on death row in 1984 were in southern prisons. Florida had the most, 214, followed by Texas, 172, and Georgia, 115.

If society continues to demand tougher prison sentencing, then it also may have to dig deeper into its pockets, in order to pay for its prison system.




### **Commodities** Distributed Here Nov. 14


