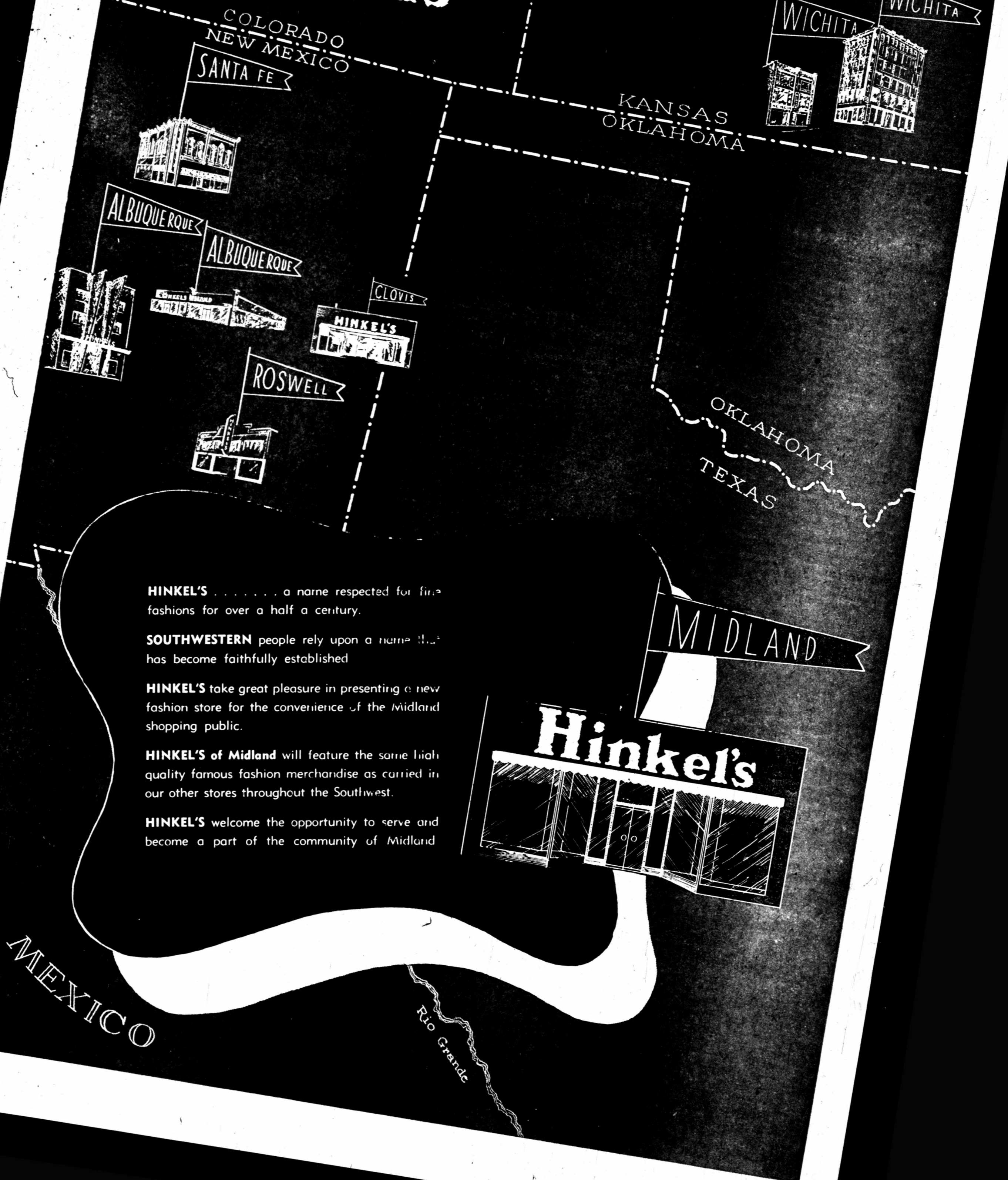

Almost 6,000 GI's To Bring Japanese Brides Back To U. S.

TOKYO—(AP)—Almost 6,000 American enlisted men have announced their intention of taking Japanese wives to the United States.

Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway's headquarters said that up to October 20 it had approved 5,437 applications of military personnel to marry Japanese. They include 772 airmen and 108 sailors.

Hundreds of others have been granted since or are in the mill. Authorization is granted under two laws passed by congress.

No military personnel or civilian employe in the Far East Command is eligible to marry without the approval of his commanding general.

He continued to say that if the colors of the room are cool—like green, blue or grey—then the pictures should have warm colors such as red, yellow or gold.

PAD To Make Public Tonnage Allotments Of Oil Field Steel

 WASHINGTON—A decision to make public tonnages of oil country tubular goods allotted each quarter to 153 of the nation's largest oil producing companies was announced Thursday by Deputy Director Bruce K. Brown of the Petroleum Administration for Defense. The publication would be designed to "allay questions as to equitable treatment," Brown said in telegrams to the 153 companies. Brown also asked the companies—those drilling 40 or more wells a year—for permission to publish, in addition, information on individual well drilling programs and inventories of oil country tubular goods pertaining to each of the companies. He would make public the past and forward well drilling program information "only by total wells and footages," he explained in the telegram. "We will not voluntarily publish any figures except actual tonnage allocations without your telegraphic permission," the telegram said. The 153 operators were informed, in identical telegrams sent out Thursday, that PAD already has made public the standards used in distributing oil country tubular goods. "We also believe it desirable for policy reasons to publish quarterly allocations to individual operators," the telegrams state. Publication of this information "would allay questions as to equitable treatment" as between larger and smaller operators. Larger operators only However, since there are more than 3,000 individual operators, "practical considerations make it necessary to publish only the individual allocations to the 153 class B operators who, historically drill 40 or more wells per year and merely the totals for the smaller groups." PAD's system for equitable distribution of casing, tubing and drill pipe among individual operators is based on their previous drilling histories, their planned drilling programs, and the amount of tubular goods held in their inventories. Hence publication of figures showing merely the tonnage allotted to each operator. Without information on past and future drilling programs and inventories, would mean little, the telegram pointed out. "Request you consider whether you have any objection to PAD publishing that part of its records that relate solely to your past and forward drilling program but only by total wells and footages; also your oil country tubular goods inventory positions as reported to us."

Kefauver Is Willing, But Not Campaigning

NASHVILLE, TENN.—Sen. Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) said in a television broadcast here Thursday night that he "is not running for president" but is not "running from the opportunity of running." Kefauver made the statement during a 30-minute press interview. Earlier in the day, he made similar statements at Crossville, Tenn., when asked if he would seek a place on the Democratic ticket next year.

Atrocities Announcement Strips Veil Of Mystery From Truce Talk Stalling

By ROBERT EUNSON
 TOKYO (AP)—A highly placed officer Friday said the uncheduled announcement that Red troops murdered more than 5,000 American prisoners has stripped the veil of mystery from what has been holding up Korean armistice talks. The general officer, who is exceptionally well informed on truce negotiations, said: "The Communists don't want to have to answer questions about what happened to their prisoners." Since the talks began July 10, both the Communist and United Nations delegations have done several abrupt about faces. Each change has been explained by thousands of words of propaganda. Tired mimeograph machines have given up tiresome communiques. But every time the UN reversed itself, or the Reds either, the same basic problem still was to blame. Different Objectives The problem is in the objectives of the two delegations. The Reds want a cease-fire. The UN wants an armistice. In fact, the UN delegation, led by Vice Adm. C. Turner Joy, almost got itself mouse-trapped into agreeing on a buffer zone which would divide the opposing forces before the other armistice details were agreed upon. The tricky open field running Joy and his chief assistant, Maj. Gen. Henry I. Hodges have been doing lately was to get them out of the trap they almost got caught in. That would have given the Reds exactly what they wanted—a cease-fire and freedom from UN guns, planes and battleships without having to agree to a full armistice. The difference in a cease-fire and an armistice is this: A cease-fire is only part of an armistice. In addition to a cease-fighting, exchange of prisoners and recommendations for the withdrawal of all foreign troops from Korea. From the very start the Reds indicated they didn't want anything but a cease-fire. The UN delegation won the first round when it got the Reds to adopt an agenda. This seemed to guarantee an armistice and not a cease-fire. But the Reds won the second round when the items on the agenda were listed. UN Team Mouse-Trapped The first item for discussion was effecting a cease-fire and drawing a buffer zone between the opposing forces. This is where they Joy team got mouse-trapped. They had agreed to discuss the point where the shooting would stop. But they didn't want to stop shooting until the armistice was signed. You can forget the unending political arguments over the 38th parallel and other points. The only argument, the ultimate goal of every argument, has been over the fact that the Reds wanted a cease-fire. Given that, the UN delegates say, the Reds will want to stall. The buffer zone, all hands have agreed, should be related to the present battle line. Anybody can see you can't draw a buffer zone along the present battle line and then keep right on shooting across it. The startling information that almost 6,000 American soldiers have been shot down after their surrender may cost Col. James M. Hanley his job. There is a red hot Army investigation going on as to what prompted the Seattle lawyer to reveal the figures. But what he said hit the nail right on the head. The famed security that shrouded early truce talks long has kept veiled the fate of American prisoners of war—a key question in the final armistice, if one ever is reached. There probably will be a lot more maneuvering at Panmunjom before the truce talks end, if they ever end. Right now it looks as if they might go on forever.

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Two Killed, 21 Hurt As Passenger Train Sideswipes Freight

NAHUNTA, GA.—Two persons were killed and 21 others injured Thursday night when the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad's "Havana Special" sideswiped a freight train and demolished the depot at nearby Hortense crossing. Sheriff J. Walter Crews of Brantley County said A. H. Byington, engineer of the passenger train, jumped at the instant of impact and was killed by the fall. James Strickland, 24-year-old Hortense station agent, died beneath the wreckage when the passenger train's three diesel units were hurled almost 100 feet from the tracks, the sheriff reported. None of the injured was hurt seriously. General Manager L. T. Andrews of the ACL said at Wilmington, N. C., that the cause of the wreck has not been determined. A railroad official at the scene said nine passenger cars left the tracks in addition to the three locomotive units. Witnesses said the freight was entering a siding when the passenger train sideswiped it.



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Glasscock Venture To Plug Back, Test Wichita-Albany Zone
Argo Oil Corporation No. 1 M. E. Cook, wildcat in Central Glasscock County, is plugging back for a completion attempt in the Wichita-Albany where production possibilities were indicated on a drillstem test.

Johnston To Retire From Stabilization Post November 30

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Eric Johnston has resigned as head of the Economic Stabilization Agency (ESA) to return to his job as president of the Motion Picture Association. A search, so far unfruitful, is on for a successor.

President Truman announced acceptance of the resignation Thursday at his vacation headquarters in Key West, Fla. He did so with "real regret" and "extreme reluctance," Truman said.

In an exchange of letters, the President thanked Johnston for building ESA into an "efficient and going concern to cope with the problems that lie ahead."

Johnston wrote that as a private citizen he would "continue to do everything within my power to promote a national policy to prevent inflation."

Johnston will leave the government November 30. He already has overstayed the nine-month leave of absence he took from his motion picture post to head up ESA.

Charles E. Wilson, director of the Office of Defense Mobilization, has the task of finding a man to replace Johnston. Speculation as to a successor has been widespread.

Texas Confederate Veteran Plans Fete For 109th Birthday

FRANKLIN, TEXAS — (AP) — Col. Walter W. Williams, the oldest Texas veteran of the Civil War, will celebrate his 109th birthday Sunday.

His birthday actually is November 14, but the party was scheduled Sunday so many of his 125 direct descendants could help him celebrate.

A barbecue and a basket lunch will be served at his ranch home 14 miles south of here.

Williams and his wife live on the farm alone. They raise a few cattle and turkeys.

The Confederate veteran claims his long life is due to the results of living simply and spending as much time as possible in the open.

There are only three Confederate veterans living in Texas. Williams is the oldest.

J. M. Hays, 70, Dies At Crane

Hays had been hospitalized since September.

Young Paratrooper Saves Buddy's Life In Midair Rescue

FORT BENNING, GA. — (AP) — A young paratrooper, floating to earth after a 90-man drop, grabbed the suspension lines of a deflated chute and saved a buddy's life Thursday.

When his parachute collapsed, Pfc. James F. Fernandez of Providence, R. I., plunged head first toward the earth.

Frank Elliott, 21-year-old private first class from Coates, N. C., saw his buddy's plight and reached out for the suspension lines in a quick, quiet rescue 500 feet above ground.

Both soldiers landed on Elliott's chute. Fernandez, 20, sought to use his auxiliary chute but it failed to open until about 40 feet from the ground.

More than 80 mayors from throughout the United States witnessed the spectacular rescue.

The mayors were here for an orientation conference.
