

## Star Lites

WE UNDERSTAND that a number of the so-called giants of the music industry are planning another one of those benefit concerts in the near future.

But, before you say "ho, hum," here's the difference. The coming concert will benefit the sagging farm industry, according to its organizers. Just how the money will be spent is not known, but it's good news that the performers will put on a concert to help a segment of our economy right here in the good old U.S. of A.

It is admirable to want to help the starving masses of Ethiopia, but the fact is that there are hungry people right here in our homeland. And there are definitely segments of our population—very definitely including our farmers—who could use some type of a helping hand.

The sad part about attempts by Americans and others to help the starving people in Ethiopia is that the country's Marxist government seems to have adopted a completely indifferent attitude toward the situation.

An editorial in the Amarillo Globe-News this past week pointed out that 60,000 tons of food shipped to Ethiopia is rotting on the docks because the trucks needed to transport it inland are being used to forcibly resettle Ethiopians from rebellious areas.

The Ethiopian government has imposed an import entry fee of \$12.50 per ton for shipments of food already donated and shipped to that country.

The editorial went on to point out that the Ethiopian government spent \$200 million recently—enough to feed plenty of starving people for a long time—celebrating the 10th anniversary of coming to power. Some 480,000 bottles of scotch were purchased for the ruling elite.

Adding insult to injury, about \$35 million was also spent by the government on color television sets for the ruling elite.

And, when the United States donated tents for 20,000 Ethiopian civilians, their army took them for their own use.

Of course, we perhaps should not expect Marxist governments to care about human suffering. They have caused plenty of it in the past, and no doubt will continue to do so.

So, it's refreshing to see the music industry celebrities decide to hold a benefit concert to help a segment of our population where they might expect the aid to be given to those for which it will be intended, without so much bureaucratic waste as is being evidenced in Ethiopia, where those desperately needing the help only get what manages to sift down from above.

For decades, the American farmer has proven that he is the most productive farmer on earth today, only to see his hard work and research rewarded by market conditions that have forced his sons and grandsons out of the farming business.

America is probably the only nation which is content to let its farmers (and other industries) slowly go out of business, without protective measures on imports of foreign goods.

The sad part of all this is that if and when the large corporate farm owners take over all of the countries farms, they will be able to set their market prices at whatever level they want, whereas today's farmers are forced to beg—without results—for whatever market prices they can get.

Somehow or other, this just does not make good sense.

## Court Has Mostly Routine Business

Payment of boarding care bills for foster children in Parmer County highlighted the meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners on August 12.

The boarding care bills amounted to \$1,519, which amount will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

Otherwise, a bill was approved from a pathologist ordered by a county Justice of the Peace, in the amount of \$595.

Charles Turner was appointed to the board of directors of the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center for a two-year term.

A bill was approved from Parmer County Community Hospital for a blood-alcohol test requested by the Department of Public Safety.

The court had received a letter from Mrs. Frances Euler, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2, and met with Albert Smith, Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1, requesting substantial salary increases for county justices of the peace.

After much discussion, no action was taken on the requests, and it was stated that these officials would be given the same consideration as other county employees in reference to pay raises.

A discussion was held concerning a new death benefit supplement to the retirement fund by Bonnie Warren, County Clerk. The matter was tabled pending further study.

A county citizen asked the court for assistance in purchasing medicine. Motion was passed to help the citizen on a one-time basis.

Patrolman Craig Hunt met with the court discussing the paper work involved in the DPS routine operation. He asked the court's consideration in the possibility of paying part-time workers to do this paper work. This item was tabled for further study.

Motion was passed to advertise for bids for a used 70 horsepower tractor with mower attachment to be used by Precinct 4.

Auditor Bernie Gowens met with the court to go over the proposed budget for the county for 1986. Motion was passed accepting the proposed budget, which provides for a five per cent increase in salaries for county employees, and an overall tax decrease of just under one per cent.

Motion was approved for soil work on the land of Parmer County Spraying Service, Kim Rundell, Thomas Rhodes and Mary Kaminski, all in Precinct 2.

## School Schedule Is Given By Jarboe

The schedule for the beginning of school was announced this week by Tom Jarboe, Friona Superintendent of Schools.

Teachers will report on Monday, August 26, at 8:30 a.m. to the Friona High School Cafeteria. They will have in-service the entire week.

High School students will register on Friday, August 30, with juniors and seniors reporting to the High School Auditorium at 9 a.m. and grades nine and ten reporting at 10 a.m.

The first day of school will be Tuesday, September 3, with buses running their regular routes. School hours will again be 8:20 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

"It will be helpful for students to arrive at school at 8:05 a.m., but they don't need to arrive before that time, as it causes a problem," Jarboe said.

Kindergarten students and first grades are asked to report to the Primary Building. Grades two and three report to the Grade School building through the west doors on Cleveland Street. Grades four and five should report to the south wing of the Grade School building. Assistance will be provided to help students get to their proper rooms.

Grades six, seven and eight will need to report to the Junior High building.

Sixth grade students are asked to report to the west entrance of the

junior high. Seventh graders are to report to the east entrance. Homeroom lists will be posted, and students are to report to the assigned rooms.

High School students, having registered the previous Friday, will report to their regular classes.

All new students to the Friona system, or kindergarten students that did not pre-register, are urged to report to their respective principals immediately, Jarboe reported.

Kindergarten and new first grade students will need to bring birth certificates or acceptable birth records. Also new students should bring report cards or information from their prior school and immunization records, when they register.

Parents of kindergarten students are also reminded that their child must be picked up from school at 12 noon for the first week. Letters will be mailed to the parents of kindergarten students who pre-registered, before September 3, with more complete details.

Lunch prices will be the same as last year: K through fifth grade, \$1.10 per meal; six through eight, \$1.15; high school, \$1.25 per meal. Breakfast prices are 50 cents for all students. Applications for free or reduced lunches will be made available during the first week of school.

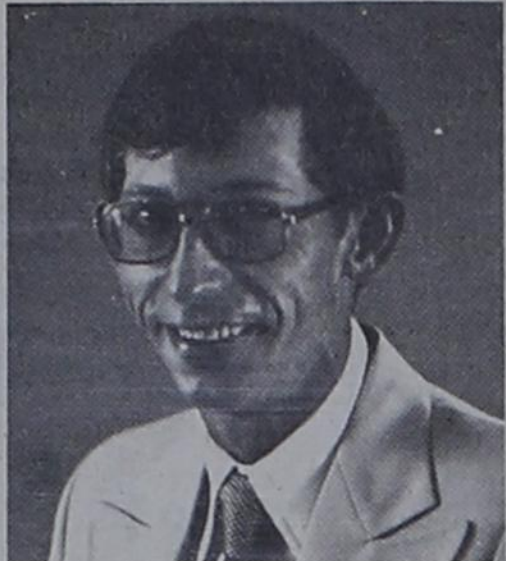
## Shelton's Rites Held

The program is for children who have limited English proficiency, and/or are from a family whose income is below the subsistence level.

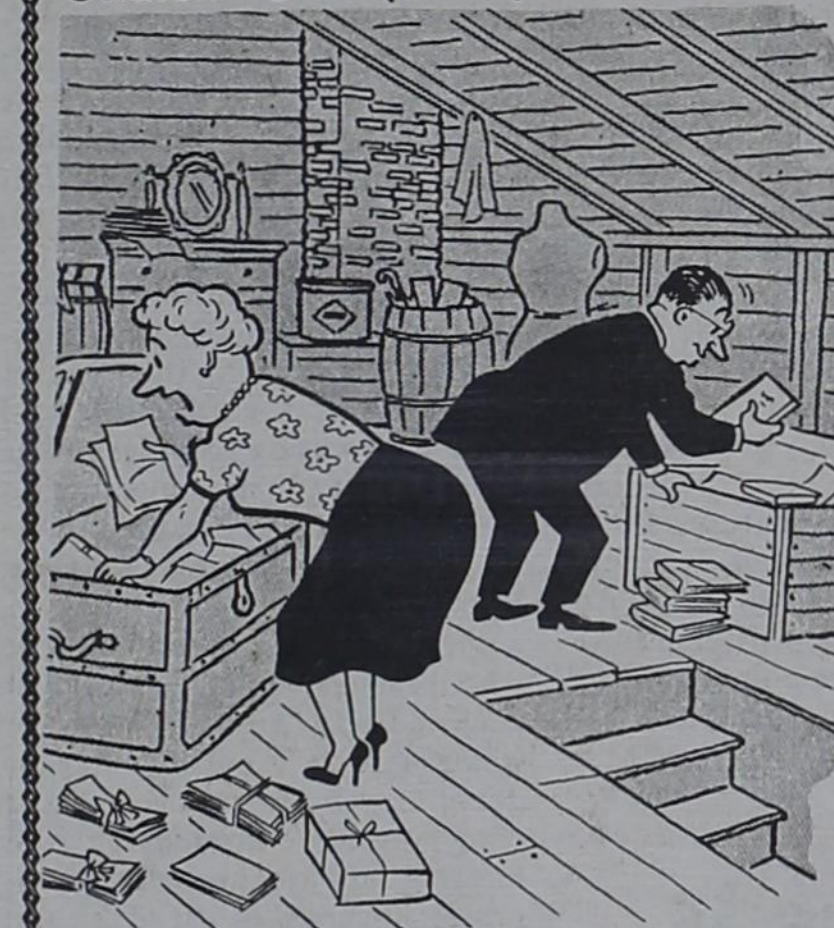

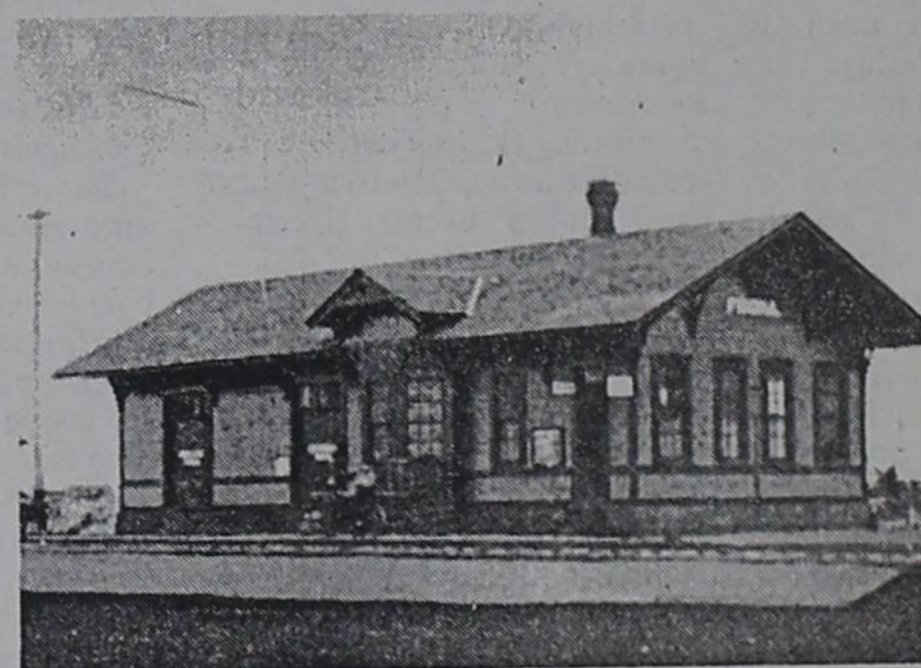

Not only Dimmitt and Castro County, but the entire Texas Panhandle lost an irreplaceable friend and ardent supporter of every good cause when Edwin Ramey, who was best known as "Goose" died Friday, August 16 at Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt.

My acquaintance and friendship with this naturalist and philosopher dates back more than half a century.

Soon after I moved to Castro County with my parents, the late Albert and Lucy McCown, and five brothers and sisters in January of 1930, my older sister, Ola, and I were so impressed with a large earth tank that we wanted some geese.

Most farmers in this section of the country at that time were also traders, so when we learned that the Ramey farm, which wasn't too far from where we lived, had geese, we talked Daddy into going over there. We were delighted

when he came home with a pair of big geese and hoped the Ramey family was happy with the hand turned cream separator they had.

Of course, there was no electricity on farms at that time, but when the time came that it was available, Edwin Ramey probably put in more hours than anyone else in the county to get the project going in Castro County.

Edwin and his twin brother, Edgar, were born January 14, 1890 in Alto, Texas, and moved to Dimmitt in 1904. They were pioneer farmers in the true sense of the word and planted Castro County's first wheat crop in 1907. Two years later they bought the first mechanical header ever operated in the county. Then, in 1919 they bought the county's first combine.

Edwin acquired his nickname, "Goose" from his inquisitive nature and desire to learn all he could about geese. From his observation about geese--both wild and tame--he developed a very interesting talk, which he was called upon many times to deliver at lodge, civic and community gatherings.

Later he turned his attention to bees and the last time I saw him, which was less than two weeks ago, he asked, "Did you know that bees produce more honey during the month of August than during the other eleven months of the year?"

Of course, I had never heard that before, but when Goose said it, I believed it.

Although Goose considered himself an ordinary nester-farmer-sheep raiser-cattle raiser through the years, he was much more than that and was keenly interested in what was going on up until his final hospitalization.

Two weeks ago, after he had heard about the 450 acre flower project in the southwestern part of Castro County and the southeastern part of Parmer County, his desire to see it led to a very pleasant afternoon for me when I accompanied his daughter, Decimae Beene, and Edith Johnson, both of Friona to the flower patch by way of Dimmitt

and Flag.

Ramey observed and recorded the weather for the U.S. Weather Bureau from 1911 until his death and was the recipient of the John C. Holm Award in 1969 and again in 1974.

He and Lena Tate, who died in 1973, were married in 1916. Their only son, Robert Jordan Ramey, died August 12, 1984.

Survivors, besides his daughter, Decimae Beene, who lives here, include a daughter-in-law, Emily Ramey of Amarillo; four grandsons, Jay Beene of Friona, Ramey Beene of Corpus Christi, Edgar Ramey of Dallas and Edwin Ramey of Chicago; three great-grandchildren, Ann Marie and Lenora Ramey of Amarillo and Brent Beene of Friona.

Also several nieces and nephews survive.

The family is requesting that memorials be made to Masonic Children's Home and School or favorite charity.

#### READY FOR WHITE

How long does it take before a wine will taste its best? It depends on the kind of wine and how it is stored. Most wines, especially white, are ready to drink when they are purchased. Muscadet, Macon, Sauvignon Blanc, Chenin Blanc, Dry Riesling, Gewurztraminer, Pinot Grigio, lighter-style Chardonnay, sparkling wine and roses are best when they are fresh and fruity. They rarely improve with age. Sweet wines, such as sauternes, can be enjoyed right away. However, they will also age and improve for approximately eight to ten years after the vintage date. If wines are stored at temperatures over 70°, they will age more quickly than these guidelines suggest, and not always gracefully.

For a wedding trip to Dallas, the bride chose a blue silk suit with white silk blouse.

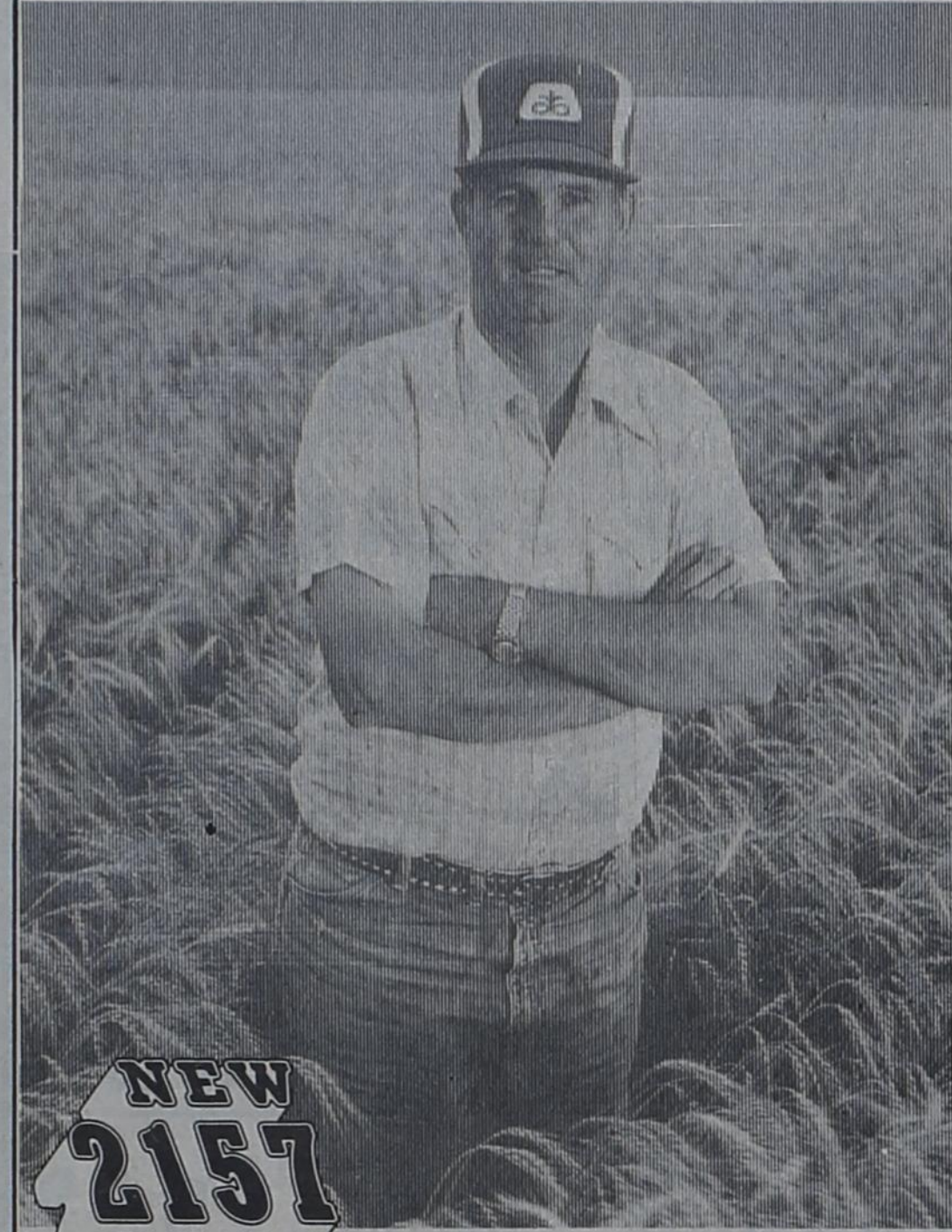

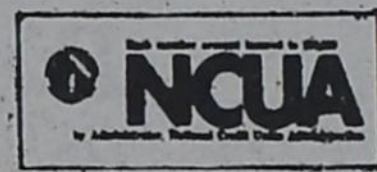

## Ramey's Rites Held August 18

Funeral services for Edwin "Goose" Ramey, 95, of Dimmitt were held Sunday, August 18, in the First United Methodist Church in Dimmitt with Rev. Vernon O'Kelly, pastor, and Rev. Ed Freeman of the First Presbyterian Church of Dimmitt officiating.

Masonic graveside services followed at Castro Memorial Gardens.

Born January 14, 1890 in Alto, he moved to Castro County on February 2, 1904 from Madill, Oklahoma. He married Lena Tate April 17, 1916. She died in 1974.

Ramey, his twin brother Edgar, three of his older brothers, two sisters and his mother moved to Castro County to farm 662 acres that had been purchased by his oldest brother, Bunyon, in 1902. They planted the first-ever wheat crop in Castro County.

Ramey received most of his formal education at home and attended Clarendon College for one year. He became a profound expert on geese after nursing a wounded goose back to health after the goose broke its wing on a shock of sorghum. He received his nickname, Goose, from Amarillo reporter Harry Ansley, who covered a talk Ramey gave about geese at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society in 1926.

In 1970, he was named Dimmitt's Man of the Year and he received the John C. Holm award in 1969 for 50 years service as an official observer for the U.S. Weather Bureau. He was a 50-year Mason and had served as the Grand Lodge of the State of Texas.

He was preceded in death by one son, Robert J. Beene.

## Sales Tax Check Received Locally

The City of Friona received a check for \$14,496.21 from the State Comptroller this week for its one per cent city sales tax for the disbursement period of August 2.

The check was an increase of \$2,954, or 25.5 per cent, over the same period of 1984, when the city's check was for \$11,542.95.

For the calendar year, the city has now received checks totalling \$78,901.48. This is up by \$10,276 or 15 per cent over the figure for the same time period in 1984, when payments amounted to \$68,625.51.

Overall, the three Parmer County municipalities received \$20,353.63 for the current period, an increase from \$17,239.34 a year ago. For the year, the county's receipts totalled \$113,392.25, up 12 per cent from \$101,203.91 at the same time a year ago.

The August checks represented taxes collected on sales made in June and the second quarter of 1985, and reported to the State Comptroller by July 20.

The county's yearly increase is consistent with other counties in this area. Neighboring Bailey
