CONGRATULATIONS TO Coach Tommy Moss and the Friona Chieftains on a successful season just ended.

We felt that the Chieftains, given their 'horsepower' as measured against the talent in potent District 2-AAA, "went about as far as they could go" in the 1985 season.

In five years as head coach at Friona High School, Coach Moss has not failed to have a winning record, or at least a break-even record, as in his first year.

That's remarkable when you consider that the year before he came, the Chieftains failed to win a single game, and had won only one game in 20 the previous two years.

In five seasons, Moss has become the third-winningest coach in the history of FHS. It's a dubious honor, because teams which formerly used Friona as a doormat are now wanting off the schedule.

We make these remarks because in our contacts we hear some people disgruntled because Moss didn't get the Chieftains into the playoffs this year. How soon they forget. We didn't have to worry about the playoffs in 1980, when the team was 0-10, or in 1979, when it was 1-8-1.

Fans can be pretty fickle, as Coach Jerry Moore discovered at Texas Tech this week. Except for a couple of last-minute school record field goals, and a tipped pass or two, Tech could have had an 8-3 season record, and Moore would have been the toast of the town.

I personally hope that Friona fans are more loyal than this, and will appreciate the good job that Coach Tommy has done with the Chieftains. Those who aspire to be coaches have our admiration. It's the only profession that turns their fate over to a group of young teenagers every Friday night.

OUR WORLD HAS been experiencing what seems like an unusual amount of natural disasters this year.

Just to name a few, and limited to our own hemisphere--the devastating earthquakes in Mexico, the equally destructive and deadly volcano eruption in Columbia, South America, and the unusual number of bad hurricanes which have threatened--and hit--our coastal areas.

It sort of set ye editor to wondering "Maybe there is something to the ancients' warning after all, in regard to Halley's comet being a sign of doom and destruction."

Not that we're overly superstitious (although most of us are, to some extent), but it made us wonder as to the possibility that the appearance of the comet in the earth's vicinity could shift the cosmic "pull" to cause any of these things to happen.

Astronomers and meteorologists would probably reply "hogwash," to the suggestion that a mere "dirty snowball" could affect the earth's weather to any degree--especially in light of the fact that the comet isn't even in plain sight yet.

Morgan Edges Moss For Honors As Score Hits 23

Coach Tommy Moss and one of his former star pupils, Charlie Morgan, turned in not only the highest score of the season, but the best score ever registered in the eleventh week of the Friona Star football contest.

After consulting the tie-breaker score, the former pupil was the winner of first place in the weekly contest, and the teacher had to settle for second place. Both Morgan and Moss soared with scores of 23.

It was the first time since the Star has had its format of 24 contest games for anyone to pick as many as 23 winners in a week.

Morgan claimed first place by missing the Dallas-Chicago score by ONLY 45 points. He picked the Cowboys to edge the Bears, 21-20. Moss' score was 57 points away (23-10), after the Bears blasted Dallas at Texas Stadium, 44-0.

Four contestants posted what would have been the best scores of the season--22--and one of those, Ron Cain, snared third place in the weekly contest. Cain had a feeling

the Bears might upend Dallas, to the tune of 27-13.

Others correctly picking 22 games were Jack Clark, Leo Escalante and Clint Mears.

Morgan's only miss was the Arkansas-Texas A&M game. Moss mis-fired only on the Tullia-Perryton game, thinking the pesky

Hospital Chief Refutes Rumor

Elda Hart, administrator of Parmer County Community Hospital, said this week that contrary to the story, or rumor, that people may have heard, that the hospital is not planning to close, and that it's "business as usual."

"We are in a lot better condition than a lot of hospitals our size. We know we face some problems, but there are absolutely no plans to close the hospital," Miss Hart said.

The hospital administrator said she had been called by several residents, especially in the older age bracket, who were concerned about the rumor they had heard.

She pointed out that recently the hospital completed an arrangement with Dr. D.S. Patel from Hereford, who now comes to Friona and performs surgery on a regular basis, and that this has been a big help.

The Hospital Auxiliary recently helped the hospital purchase a new piece of equipment, a flexible sigmoidoscope, used in colon examinations. The total cost of the machine was \$3,950, and the auxiliary paid \$2,000 of the cost. The balance was paid from donations to the hospital's memorial fund.

Another piece of equipment has been secured for the operating room, an electro-cautery machine, which is used in surgery to help check bleeding. The unit helps speed up surgery, Miss Hart points out. This machine costs \$1,450, and also was paid for through the memorial fund.

"We continue to be deluged by rules and regulations, with which we have to comply, but this is just part of operating a hospital," the administrator said.

For a time this month, Dr. Paul Spring was at home recuperating from pneumonia, but he returned to work this week.

The hospital's board of directors had scheduled a meeting with the Chamber of Commerce board on Friday, and one of the items expected to be discussed was ways and means to attract another full-time doctor to the Friona hospital.

Ministerial Alliance.

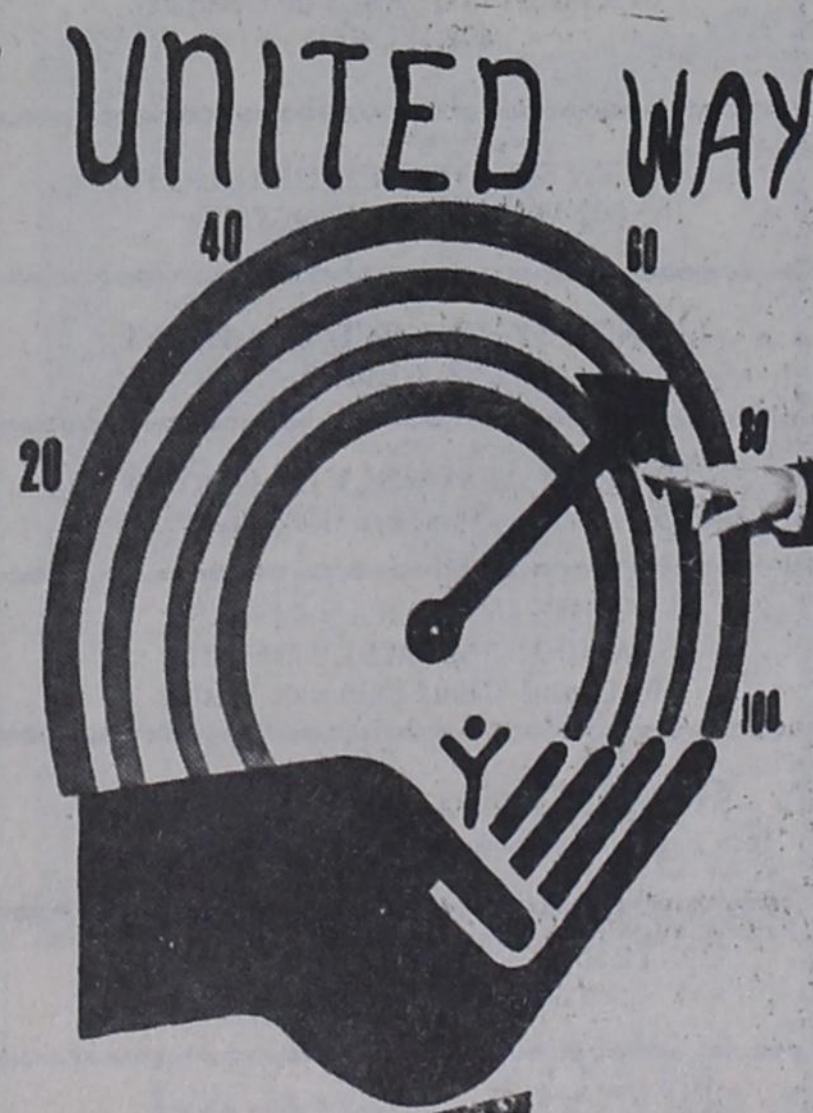
A fellowship will follow the special service, in the church's Fellowship Hall.

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 14, 1930
The Friona Star will join the other newspapers of the state in an effort to help those who are out of work. After this issue of the paper and until further notice the Friona Star will run want ads for any man or woman who wishes to advertise for work free of charge. If you are looking for a job come and see the editor. If there are any little odd jobs you want done around the house put a want ad in the Star, someone needs that work and perhaps needs it badly.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1935
Friona and surrounding territory received a light fall of snow, beginning in the early hours of Monday morning and continuing intermittently until nearly noon. Considerable portion of the fall was in the form of fine hail and consequently did not reach a depth of more than half an inch, but produced about one sixteenth of an inch of moisture, most of the snow disappeared during the afternoon.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 15, 1940
The machinery seems now to be getting underway for the calling of an election in Parmer County, for the issuing of a sufficient amount of County Bonds, for the hardsurfacing of State Highway No. 86, and State Highway No. 214, across the county as stated in last week's issue of the Star. The necessary petitions have been circulated, and will be presented to the County Commissioners Court, this week or at its next regular meeting. If these petitions receive favorable consideration by the Court, the election will be called for the earliest date possible, and if the results of the election are favorable to the bond issue, the bonds will be issued with the provision that they are not to be sold, unless the State is in a position to absorb these bonds with the one cent gasoline tax, as provided for in House Bill No. 688, passed at the regular session of the 46th Legislature.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1950
"Years are but days, and days are but moments in Thy sight, Lord," spoke Rev. Jimmie Tidwell Tuesday as he gave thanks before a birthday cake bearing one hundred candles at the table of beloved Grandmother Thornton, centerian and Christian worker for near ten decades. Grandmother Thornton now living at the home of her grandson, Morey Bussell, northwest of Friona, time and again stepped across the floor Tuesday to greet her children, grandchildren and old friends many of whom she had not seen in a half century. There are 87 descendants in the family. Present to honor their mother were all four of her children. She has been widowed for sixty years, more than the lifetime of most of those paying their respects and sending gifts Tuesday.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1955
Smoldering fire in the 50,000 bushel wood and iron unit of the Bovina Wheat Growers elevator early this morning broke into the open to destroy most of the milo and kafir stored in that structure. A.C. Teter, firm manager, said that damage to the grain could reach a \$75,000 figure, with the building loss probably passing the \$50,000 mark. The fire started from unknown sources in the headhouse of the old structure, blazing into the open only when the elevator doors were opened, admitting air.

The annual meeting of the Parmer County Community Hospital stockholders was held Tuesday evening in Friona, with about 40 people present to hear the brightest financial report yet enabled in the local operation. Total assets of the hospital were revealed at \$167,546.02, with a net profit in 1955 more than doubling the previous three-year average, and some \$13,000 more than the 1954 report. Operating expenses were up, also, topping the \$100,000 mark before the end of the audit period ending September

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 10, 1960
Sale of the Mobil Petroleum Agency here was announced this week by seller Keith Blackburn and buyer Gerald Wright. Blackburn, who has operated the business for the past eight years, will move with his wife to Albuquerque. Wright has farmed and been employed by several business firms since coming to the Friona area about three years ago. His wife Laurie will help operate the business. The transaction was effective Tuesday.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 11, 1965
A Friona group has received approval of their application to operate a daytime radio station in Friona, it was announced this week by the Federal Communications Commission. The new station, which will have a frequency of 1070 kilocycles, 250 watts, will be owned by a partnership of H.K. (Pudge) Kendrick, Bill McDonnell, Frank Spring and Joe Shields. The group, which will do business as "Parmer County Broadcasting Company," will locate its transmitter three miles southwest of Friona, just off U.S. Highway 60. It is not known where the studio will be located.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 12, 1970
Friona Consumers will hold open house for its recently-completed building on Saturday, November 14. Consumers' new facility is located at Ninth and Main. The new building is 70x90 feet. It houses the company's offices, its retail floor for automotive and farm accessories and the tire department. Lewellen and Matlock Construction were general contractors on the building.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1975
Girlstown already had three mother cows, three calves and a pair of heifers, but didn't have the "male lead" they needed to start a cow-calf operation. Last Saturday they got him--a three

year old Hereford bull--from George, Kenneth and Harlan Frye, who farm southeast of Friona. The Fryes also donated a mother cow to go with the young bull. The donation brought Girlstown's new beef-cattle herd to ten animals. Receiving the gift for Girlstown at the Frye farm were sisters Joan and Betsy Toney and Girlstown Administrator Marshall Cooper.

5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 30, 1980
Two Friona couples were in Las Vegas, Nevada last week, and missed the tragic fire at the MGM Grand Hotel by a matter of hours. Mr. and Mrs. Leland Gustin and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Myers had been in the hotel the night before, until a late hour, attending the show's headline attraction--The Mac Davis Show. At least 85 people were killed in the fire.

For the second time in a two-week period, the local area was hit by an early season snowstorm, which once again slowed outside activity considerably. Residents awoke on Tuesday morning, November 25 to find four to five inches of snow on the ground, with some drifts up to three feet.

Lloyd of Floydada, Parker Wetsel of Roby, Dwight Hutchison of Spearman, Booby G. Green of Hartley, Tommy Joines of Cotton Center and Larry Hodges of Forgan, Oklahoma.

The Golden Spread member systems serve more than 90,000 electric consumers in the Panhandle and on the South Plains of Texas and in the Panhandle of Oklahoma.

Golden Spread Electric Cooperative provides long-range planning services to meet the future power supply needs of the cooperatives' consumers, and provides administration for the rates to be paid for wholesale electricity under the cooperatives' power purchase contracts.

Each member cooperative purchases electricity at wholesale from Southwestern Public Service Company of Amarillo. The rates for wholesale electric service are subject to the jurisdiction of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.

Bryant joined Golden Spread Electric Cooperative in May 1984 as general manager. He previously served as vice president of Colorado-Ute Electric Association, a cooperative providing electricity to fourteen member systems and more than 175,000 consumers.

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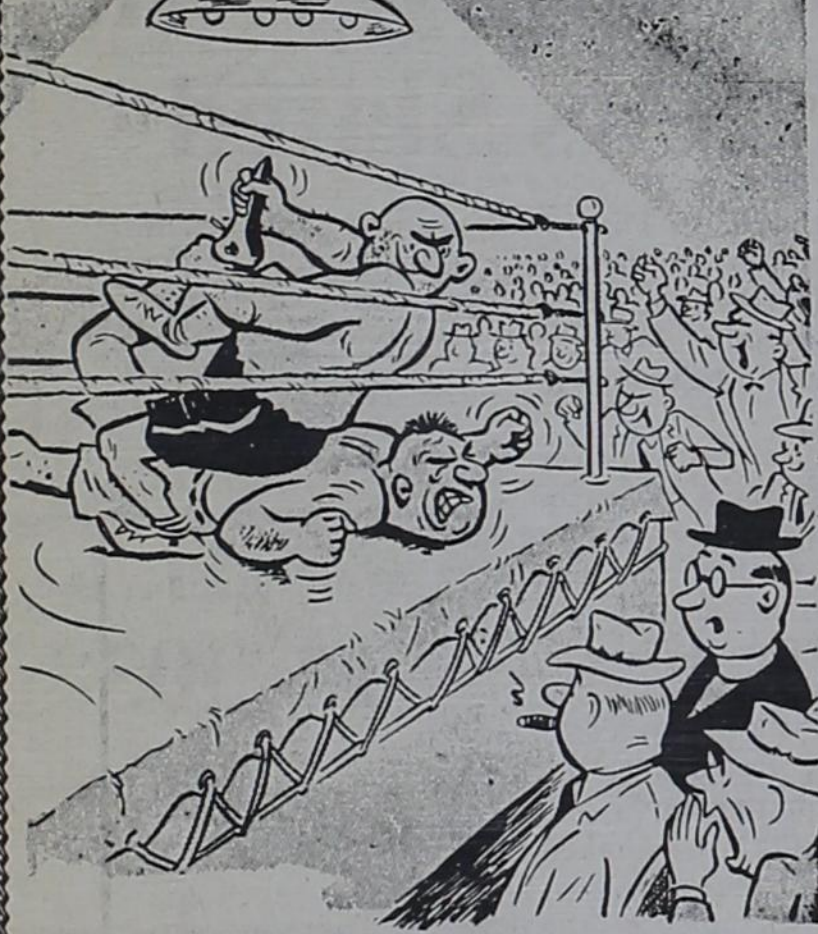

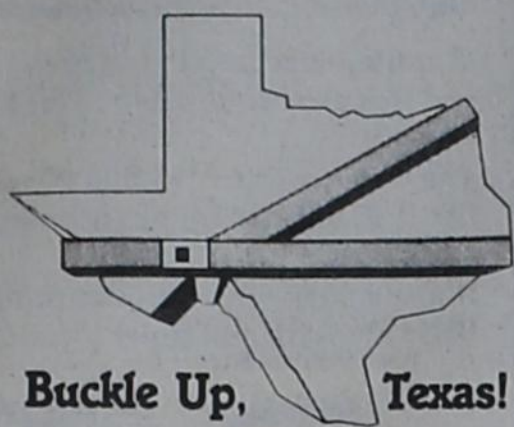

Law Officers To Enforce Seat Belts

Law enforcement officials across the state are working with the Texas Coalition for Safety Belts in supporting the new mandatory safety belt law as the December 1 penalty enforcement phase approaches, according to coalition spokesperson George R. Gustafson, Executive Vice President, Texas Safety Association.



Buckle Up, Texas!

Fines begin December 1, 1985

Law enforcement departments and associations working with the coalition include the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Police Chiefs Association, the Department of Public Safety Officers Association, the Combined Law Enforcement Association of Texas, the State Troopers Association, and the Sheriffs Association of Texas.

Department of Public Safety Director Jim Adams has confirmed that the department will begin issuing citations on December 1.

"In conjunction with our efforts to reduce traffic fatalities and injuries through our enforcement activities, the Department of Public Safety will vigorously enforce the safety belt law to gain maximum usage of this proven lifesaving device," Adams said.

The recent decision for a rate reduction on automobile insurance based on an assumed 65 per cent compliance is another signal from public officials that safety belts do save lives and money, according to Gustafson.

"We appreciate the public policy commitment made by Texas leaders to this lifesaving law. Members of the coalition will continue to work with law enforcement personnel and other local, county and state officials to help citizens understand and comply with this new law," said Gustafson.

"We know that it is a law that will prove itself in terms of human and economic benefits," he said.



Roots & Branches

As you progress in your family history work, you'll no doubt run across other researchers who are working on various branches of your family tree. You'll find some interesting family stories which have been handed down through the generations. These are known in genealogy as "family traditional stories." They are excellent as clues for future research but they simply cannot be taken at face value as actual fact.

Stories become garbled with the telling. Many times an elderly relative will relate something which was told to them during their childhood. While this is an excellent link with the past, it still should be checked with available records if at all possible. Oldsters have been known to become confused about which side of the family the story belonged to...paternal or maternal side.

One favorite story which appears in almost every family is the old great grandfather, or great uncle who lived to be 120 years old. A check of census records and estate settlements in the area where the old fellow died will most likely reveal that he was actually in his 70s or 80s when he met his demise.

Your people have not given intentionally misleading information in these cases. Elderly folks simply got confused about their ages in the days before birth certificates. Age 78 may have gotten turned around to age 87, and years may have been added as the person reached senility. Then descendants and relatives would perpetuate the story, not realizing it was in error.

There is one old story which abounds in every family from Abbott to Zwinger and it is always the same. You'll probably find it at the beginning of a small xeroxed family history which some relative had written about your family back in the 1930s or 40s. It goes like this... "In the early days of this country, before the Revolutionary War, three brothers sailed from the old country to North America. One settled in the North, one went to the South and one went out West and was never heard from again. The one who went to the South was the father of our great great grandfather."

Or sometimes it was five brothers. I have often wondered

Shy Burney was Friona's leading scorer with 14 points, and Daniel Echols had 12. They were the only Chieftains in double-figures.

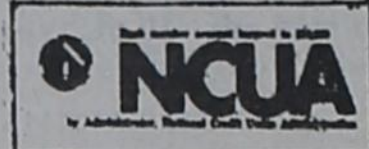
River Road also won the junior varsity game, 45-28. Rick Hutcheson was Friona's leading scorer with eight points.

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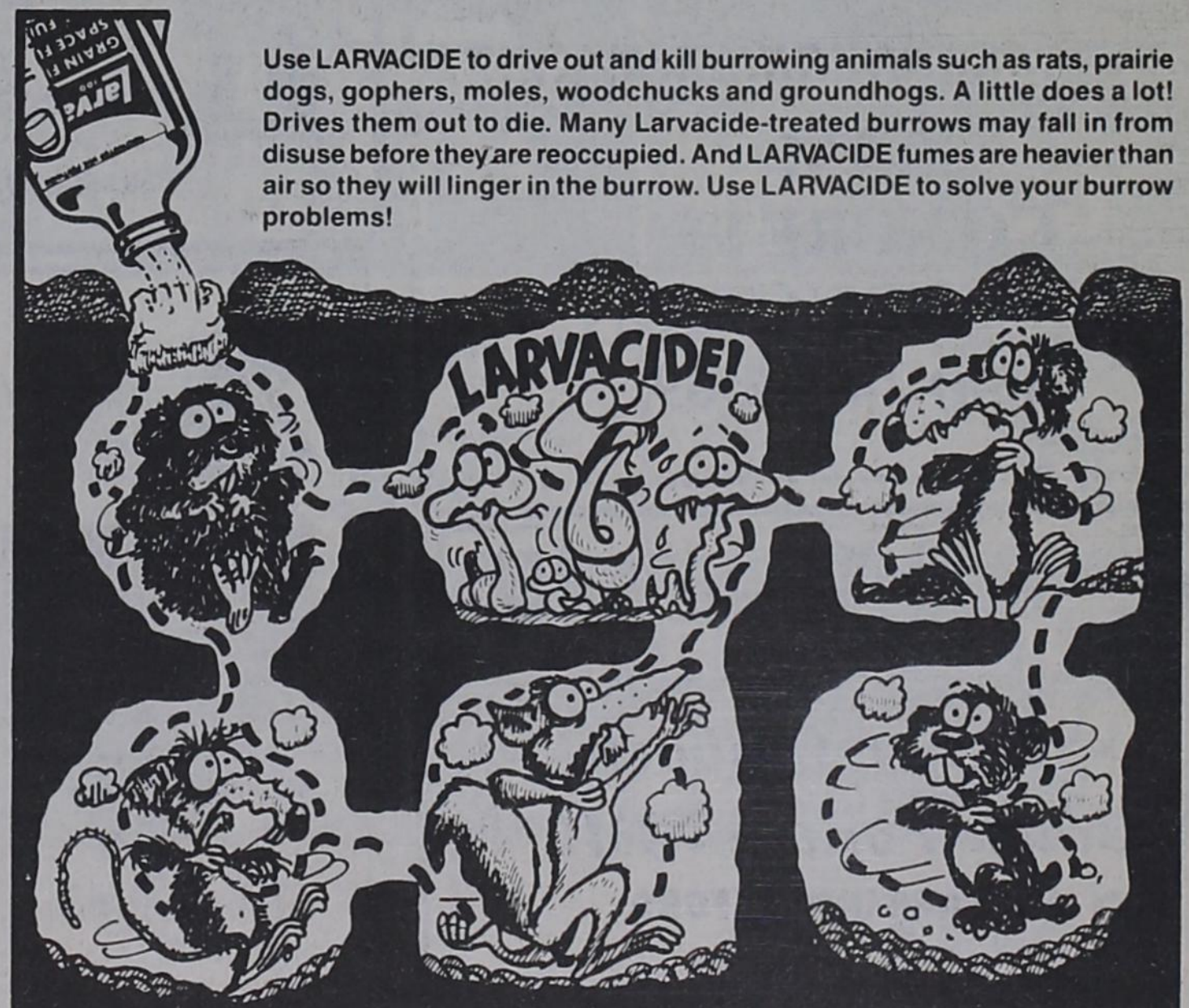

Parmer County Commissioners handled mostly routine business in their regular meeting November 8.

In voting for a member of the board of directors of the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District, the court voted to cast the county's allotted 1,026 votes for Larry Jesko of Lazbuddie.

Boarding care bills for county foster children, in the amount of

\$2,225 were approved. The money will be reimbursed to the county by the state.

Motion was passed to pay the county's dues to the Texas Assn. of Counties in the amount of \$820.

At the suggestion of the County Treasurer, the court voted to renew a general fund certificate of deposit in the amount of \$100,000. The C.D. had been maturing November 22, and was extended to May 30, 1986.

The court heard requests from citizens asking for assistance in paying for medicine and surgery costs they were unable to pay.

One request was approved for medicine amounting to a limit of \$65, plus the doctor's fees, and another request resulted in the court agreeing to pay \$264 toward the cost of a person's surgical expenses.

Ballots from the county's constitutional election were canvassed and approved.

Motion was passed to purchase a typewriter for the Adult Probation Department, in the amount of \$399.00.

Another motion was passed to advertise for bids for a front-end loader and backhoe for use in Precinct 1, with two machines to be traded.

WTSU Has Annual Blood Campaign

It's time once again for the annual West Texas State University Blood Drive. WT blood drives began in the early seventies.

They were originally organized by the faculty and staff. During the early blood drives, WT donated approximately fifty pints. In the late seventies, blood banks stopped paying for the blood they received. As a result of this action, it became necessary to recruit volunteer donors.

In an effort to meet the new need of the community, WTSU Residence Halls and Coffee Memorial Blood Center got together. In 1979, the first large scale blood drive took place. It was organized over a one week time. Much to the surprise of everyone involved the donations surpassed the goal of 500 pints.

After the 1979 Blood Drive, the goal for each semester increased rapidly. Currently, as many as 75 per cent of the on-campus students donate each semester. In the fall of 1983, the blood drive set an all time high of 1,447 pints collected. Although the on-campus population has gone down in recent years the enthusiasm of the students hasn't.

Last fall, 74 per cent of the men on campus donated blood and 79 per cent of the women donated. Still a sufficient number to supply the 21 area hospitals with enough blood for one month. These figures say alot about WTSU generosity. Nationally, only five per cent of all eligible donors actually give each year.

Each semester, a local business helps Coffee Memorial and the Residence Halls to sponsor the Blood Drive. In return they receive publicity and recognition for helping a worthwhile cause. This fall the blood drive sponsor is Mr. Gatti's of Canyon. Every donor will receive a t-shirt with the two color blood drive logo printed on it and a soft drink. Each hall may also give a gift but these gifts are strictly for that hall's residents. To keep the competitive spirit alive, Coffee Memorial also gives a \$200.00 gift certificate to the top men's hall and the top women's hall. The flyers also include a coupon from Mr. Gatti's offering a two liter bottle of Coke with a medium or large pizza.

There was also a smaller scale competition for the faculty and staff. They competed to be the top

Academic School. A special faculty/staff day was held October 24. Snacks were provided as well as the t-shirts and soft drinks. Faculty and staff members were allowed to donate at any location and donate their credit to the school of their choice. The Academic School with the smallest percentage receives the less than prestigious "You can't get blood from a turnip award."

The Blood Drive Committee set the fall goal at 1050 pints. They hope to keep up the tradition of beating their goal. Each dorm will be recruiting donors in the hope of being the top dorm or at least improving on last semester's performance. The main goal as a committee is to get all the previous donors back and recruit lots of new donors. They plan to continue in the giving tradition established at WT. Not only do they sponsor one of the largest university blood drives and the largest blood drive in the Panhandle, the students go on to become community leaders for the blood center. It's fun to win the competition and the prizes but more importantly we want to supply the 21 area hospitals with life saving blood.

Final season statistics for the 1985 Friona Chieftains were tabulated this week by the Friona Star, showing that the team compiles some good "numbers" for the season.

The team finished as the top-ranked defensive team in the South Plains for class AAA teams, as ranked by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal. In fact, only one team, Sweetwater in class AAAA, gave up fewer yards for the season than Friona, which allowed opponents an average of just 149.6 yards per game.

Although the team's accomplishment has come under criticism by some due to its light early schedule, Friona still held potent Morton to only eight yards rushing, and held district rushing

champ Paul Wayne Jones of Dalou to one of his lowest totals.

The 204 points scored by the team were the most since the 1973 Chieftains scored 255 points.

Brad Moyer was the leading scorer and rusher on the team. Moyer scored 15 touchdowns for 90 points. Place-kicker Sam Montoya finished second in scoring with 40 points. He kicked 22 points-after, four field goals, and scored one touchdown rushing. Montoya has accounted for 56 kicking points in two seasons.

Moyer gained 712 yards rushing on 195 attempts, to be the team's workhorse. Jimmy Williams was second with 406 yards on 92 tries, and Lonnie Phillips, who missed two games with an injury, had 387 yards on just 58 carries.

Senior Leroy Mercado led the team in two categories. Mercado caught the most passes, ten, for 153 yards. He also led in kickoff returns, ten for 244 yards.

Junior Shy Burney also led in two departments. Burney had ten pass interceptions, with returns of 118 yards. He returned ten punts a total of 98 yards. Mercado was runnerup in pass interceptions, four for 80 yards. Sophomore Daniel Echols, appearing in just the Bovina game, had two returns for 88 yards, both producing touchdowns.

Montoya punted 42 times for 1612 yards, a season average of 38.4 yards per kick. He lacked just 148 yards punting the ball a mile for the season.

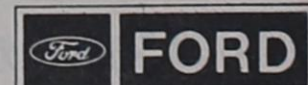

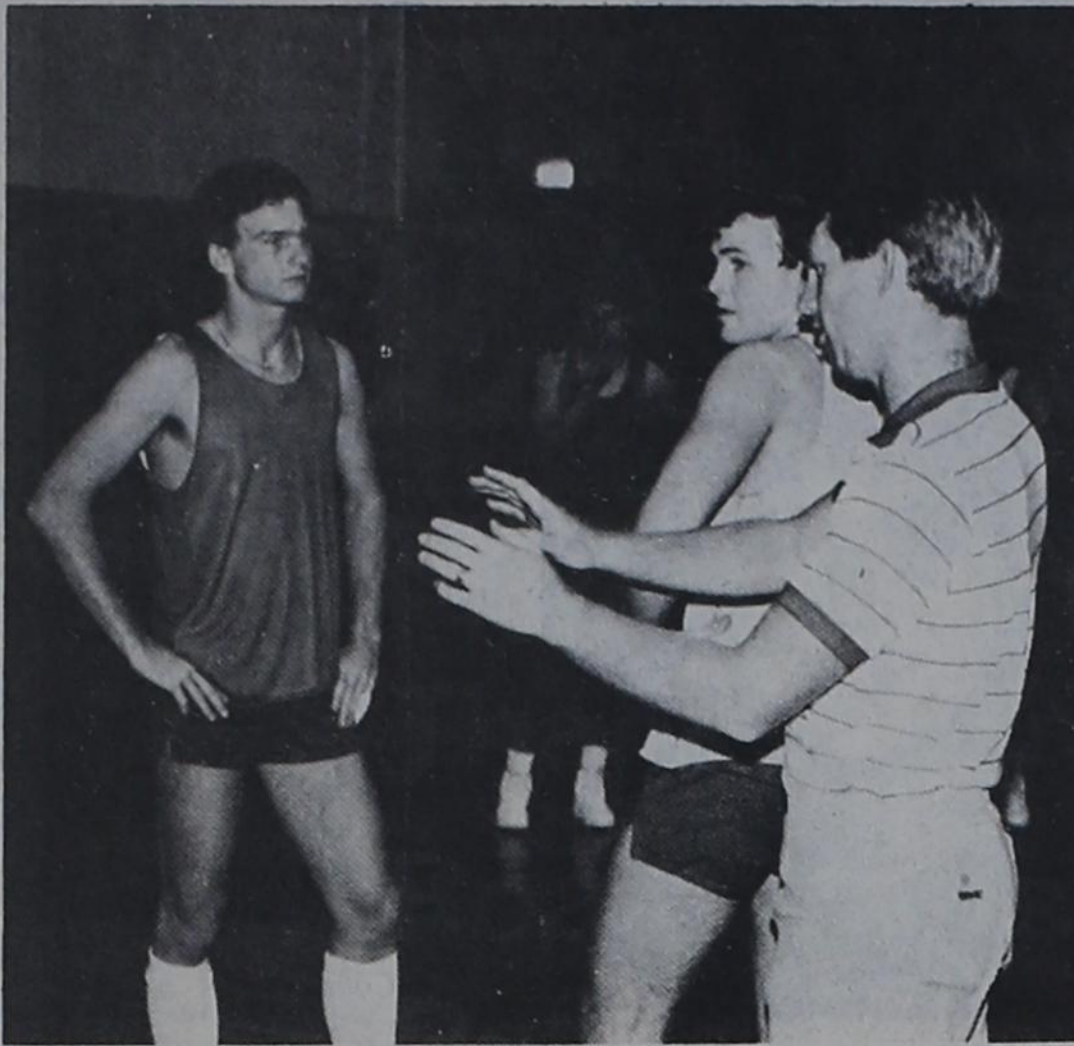

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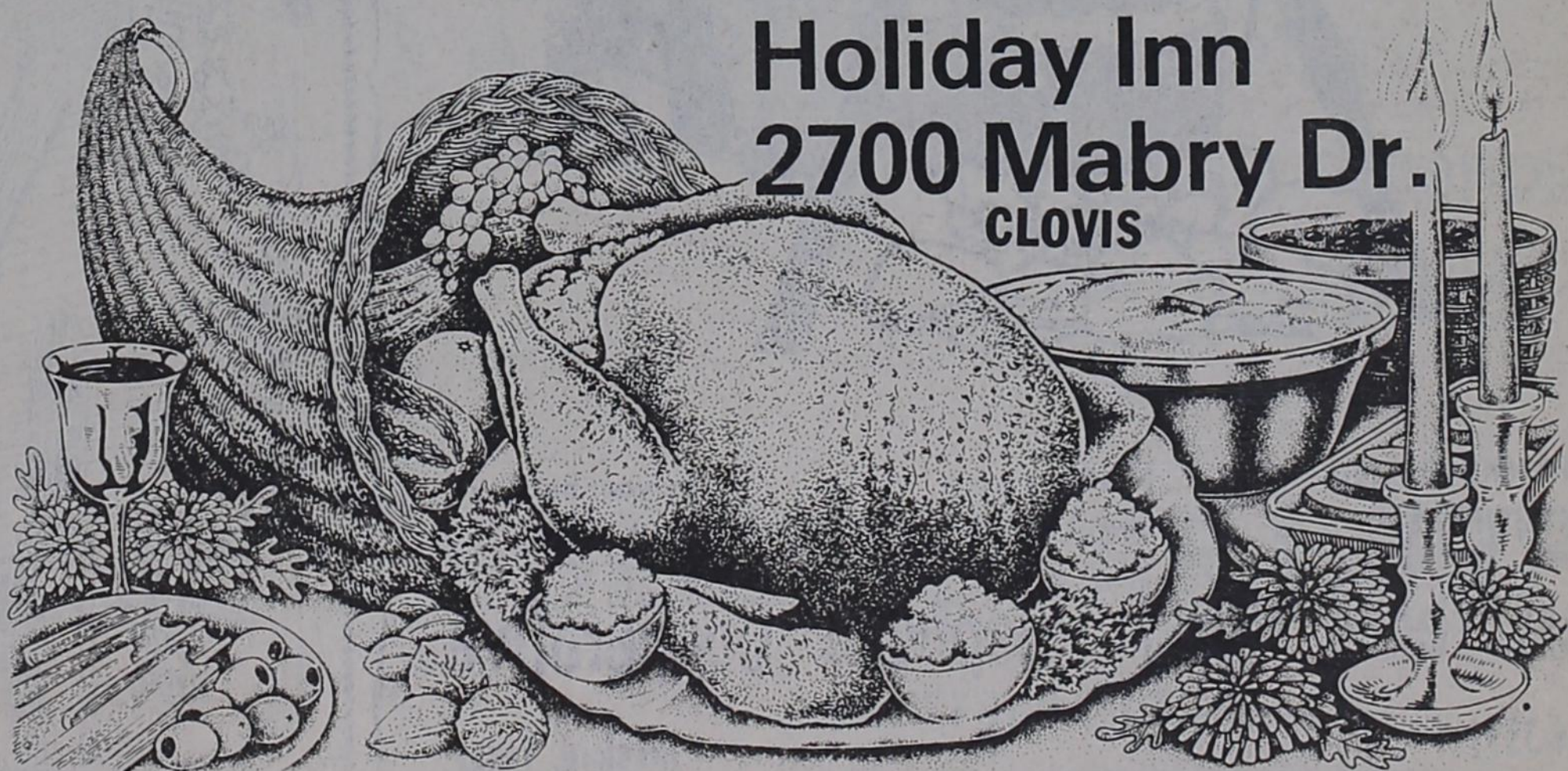

CP Association Is Aided By UW Here

(Editor's note: The Cerebral Palsy Assn. is helped by the local United Way Campaign. It is one of the many agencies which benefit from the local drive, now in progress.)

Cerebral Palsy is our nation's leading child crippler! Approximately 40,000 individuals in Texas alone are affected by Cerebral Palsy, approximately one-half of these people are children.

At our present birth rate it is estimated that 15,000 babies are born with Cerebral Palsy every year. There are approximately four Cerebral Palsy individuals per 1,000 population. Twelve to sixteen of these victims live in Friona.

A popular dis-belief is that Cerebral Palsy is a disease--which is untrue.

Cerebral Palsy is not a single disorder. It is a group of ailments having quite a variety of symptoms. All are brain-centered and all effect muscular control.

"Cerebral" means brain centered and "Palsy" describes lack of muscle control.

Brain damage usually occurs during birth and people live with it all their lives. Cerebral Palsy cannot be cured but often it can be managed so that people affected can function productively and enjoy life.

Local donations made to Cerebral Palsy through the United Fund Drive are retained in Friona and its immediate area for the needs of those qualifying for aid.

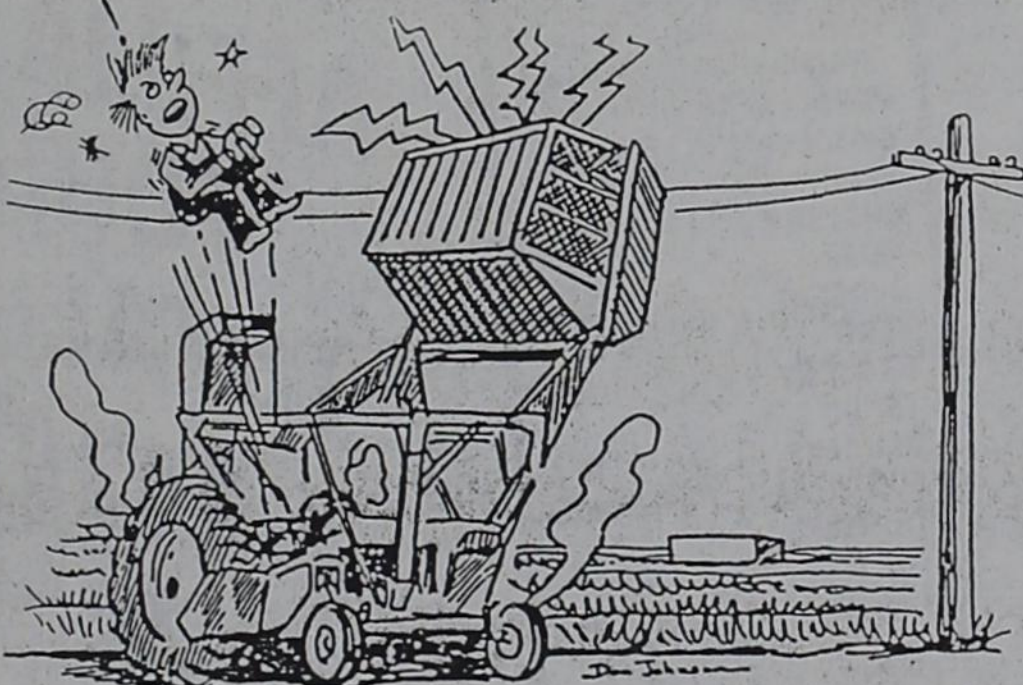
At the present time he is receiving one session of physical therapy and one of occupational therapy then two of speech therapy daily.

DON'T TAKE A CHANCE LOOK UP FIRST

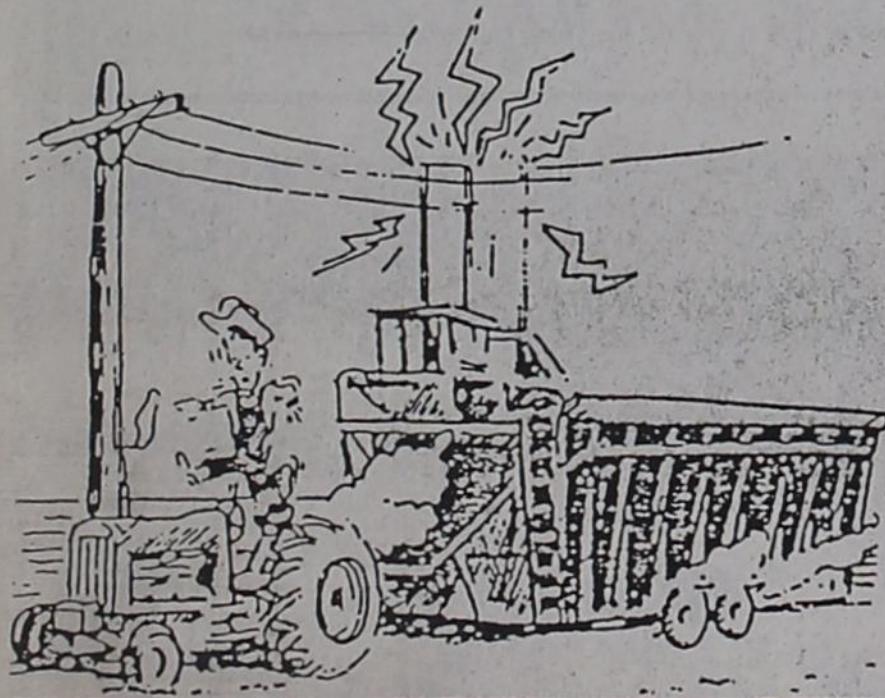
Cotton harvest is here and the Coop urges extreme caution when operating farm equipment near electric lines.

In recent years, many incidents have involved cotton module builders. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can easily come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not careful. The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.



We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury or death. When moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowered as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.

If some piece of equipment does contact these 7200 volt overhead lines, it's important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger.


















Lower packer arm as far as it will go before moving module builder.

Jump clear of the machine, being sure not to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call Bailey County Electric Cooperative at (Area Code 806) 272-4504 whether the line is broken or not.
