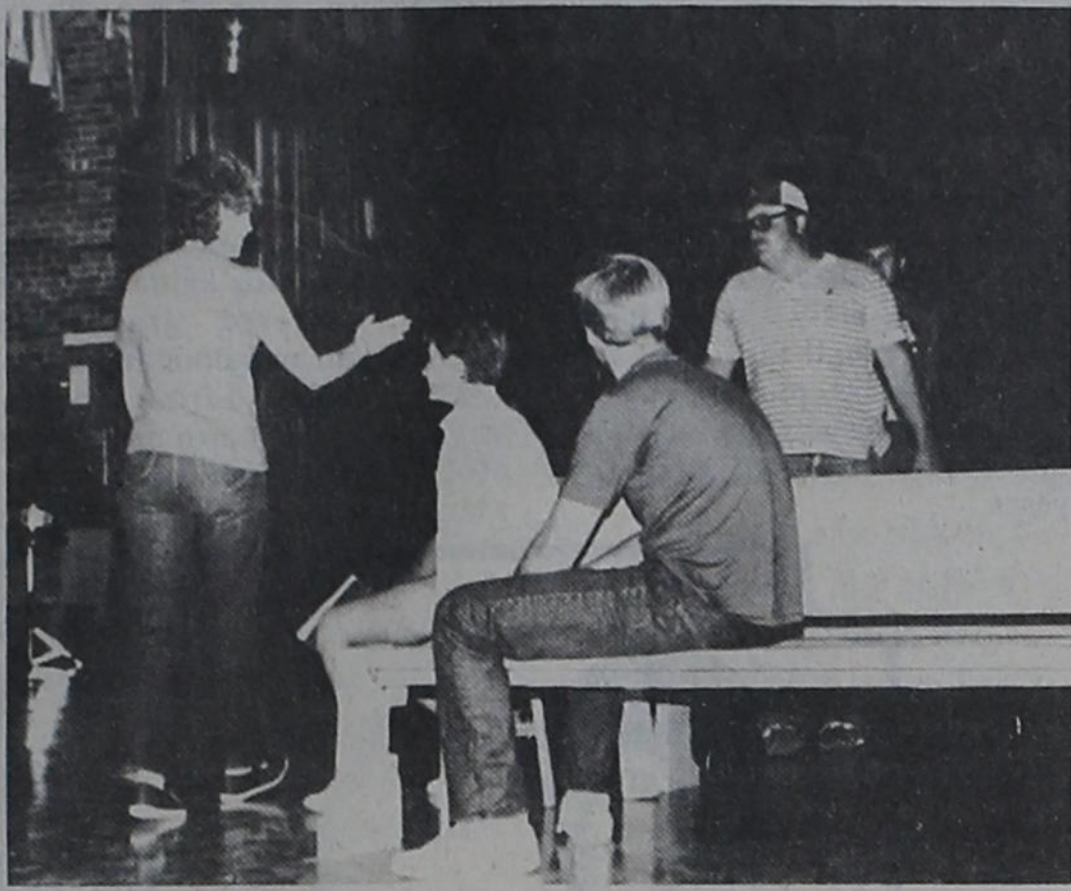
INTEREST HAS BEEN indicated for a movement to get one of Friona's all-time top athletes inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

Rhea Church Observing 75th Anniversary Sunday

Guest speaker for the 75th anniversary of Immanuel Lutheran Church in the Rhea community, will be Rev. Wayne A. Schueler, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church in Albany, Texas.

He's the son of Walter and Martha Schueler; the grandson of Herman and Emma Gallmeier Schueler; and the great-grandson of C.W.C. and Sophia Gallmeier, who was a charter member of the church.

There will be a regular church service beginning at 10 a.m. Sunday, July 28. Dinner will be served at noon, then the anniversary services will begin at 3 p.m.

This church, although it was not organized until 1910, had its beginning in March of 1908, when Henry F. Reinkin and his brother, Martin, and two other brothers, Henry and Fred, and Fred Heckman, all from Decatur, Adams County, Indiana, accompanied a group of farmers

Reinkin, who was sixty years old at the time, carried a spade with him and carefully inspected the depth of fertile soil every place he went. After a great deal of consideration, he and his associates decided upon the area, which has been known as the Rhea community for many years.

Ruling Is Pending In Death Here

A ruling in the cause of death of 32-year-old Linda Lou Cargle was being withheld pending lab investigation on samples of the woman's blood.

Mrs. Cargle was discovered at her apartment at the Saratoga Gardens Apartments, North Walnut Street, Monday night, and the Friona Emergency Medical Service was summoned.

Members of the EMS worked with Mrs. Cargle and brought her to Parmer County Community Hospital, where she was pronounced dead at about 10 p.m. Monday.

Justice of the Peace Albert (Blackie) Smith of Farwell said there was not enough evidence present Monday for he or Dr. Paul Spring to determine the cause of death, so the decision was made to send samples of the woman's blood for lab testing. Results are expected to be known in about a week.

Mrs. Cargle had lived in Friona for about two and one-half years, moving here from Manchester, Iowa. She was born in Independence, Iowa. She was a waitress locally, and was a member of the Lutheran Church.

Services were conducted Thursday at Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home, with Rev. Leonard E. Riddle of Immanuel Lutheran Church of Rhea officiating.

The body was to be cremated, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Survivors include a daughter, Patrice Rathburn of Manchester, Iowa; her mother, Lovetta Voltz of Manchester; and a grandmother, Charlotte Matthiesen, also of Manchester.

Good Rainfall Received Here

The Friona area received some timely rains the past few days, ranging all the way from .2 inch at Hub to 2.5 inches in the Black-Summerfield area.

The official measurement in Friona showed .57 inch of rain Wednesday evening, and another .48 inch on Thursday, for a two-day total of 1.05 inches.

However, the northeast section of town received about an extra half-inch of rain the first evening, according to rain gauges. A shower hit that section of town about 6 p.m. Wednesday that was not registered to the west of Main Street.

Jim Taylor indicated that his gauge on Maple Street showed 1.2 inches of rain on Wednesday, and another .75 inch on Thursday, for a two-day total of 1.95 inches.

June Floyd, who lives on Columbia Street, said she has two gauges, both of which were empty prior to Wednesday's thunderstorm. One registered .7 inch, and the other slightly over an inch after the first day's rain. Wednesday's rain was accompanied by high winds and some lightning, making accurate measurements hard to come by.

Jim Dixon said he had received from .9 inch of rain at his house to over two inches at other points on his farm land in the Rhea Community. "We got 1.7 inches on the southeast corner of the place Wednesday night," Dixon said.

Dixon said the rain would be a big boost to his milo and grassland, and that the cool weather would be a big boost to the crop, which may have suffered in recent weeks. "I think we're through with our hottest weather," Dixon said.

It was still looking rainy Friday morning, and Dixon, perhaps auditioning for a weatherman's position, said, "It's definitely going to rain some more today--probably about an inch and a half!"

In other directions, Tri-County Elevator at Black reported 1.6 inches Wednesday and another half inch Thursday, for a two-day total of 2.1 inches. Bruegel Bros. Gin & Elevator reported .8 inch for the two days, and indicated that two miles south of their location the report was 1.7 inches, and at Summerfield it was 2.5 inches.

Meryle Massie, just north of Friona, reported 1.9 inches on Wednesday and .6 inch Thursday, or 2.5 inches; Dave Thompson said he received .5 inch Wednesday evening; and Von Edelman reported a half inch on one of his places, and over an inch on another.

At Bruegel & White Elevator, the report was .2 inch on Wednesday and .8 on Thursday; Hub Grain reported .3 inch each night, or .6 inch altogether.

However, Clyde Woodard, whose farm is right at the Hub intersection, said he had only received .2 inch altogether, and a spokesman at the Sherley-Anderson Elevator at Lazbuddie said they received only .1 inch of rain on Wednesday and none on Thursday.

Friona's official reading of 1.05 for the two days, added to the 1.38 inches which had been measured earlier in the month, brings the official total for the month of July to 2.43 inches.

It had been quite some time since as much as a half inch of moisture had fallen at one time, and farmers were exuberant at the change in the weather pattern. Those in the irrigation business had been running their wells continuously in recent weeks, and this adds considerably to the expense of making a crop.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--JULY 25, 1930

The report to the effect that Friona State Bank has changed ownership was verified here Wednesday morning, and came as a surprise to the people of Friona. The new owners, who took control of the bank on Wednesday are Bruce McLean and Ester Nobles, both of Dimmitt. McLean will assume the presidency of the bank, and Nobles will be vice-president of the institution.

50 YEARS AGO--JULY 26, 1935

Whether it is generally known by the majority of our citizens or not, it is nevertheless a fact that our city commission has levied what it calls a street tax on all citizens between the ages of 21 and 60 years, of \$1.00 each. Purpose of the tax is to make an effort to keep our streets and gutters in passable and presentable conditions. It is also provided that this tax may be paid in labor if the citizen so desires, rather than cash, and the rate of pay shall be \$2 per day, so that a married man may pay for himself and his wife with a day's labor.

45 YEARS AGO--JULY 26, 1940

The political rally and pie supper at the grade school building last Thursday sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary was pronounced a successful affair, except that the attendance could have been better. Five of the

candidates for Congress were present. They were Louis Goodrich, Deskins Wells, Henry S. Bishop, James O. Cade and Lewis Fields. The three candidates for state legislature also were present and spoke.

35 YEARS AGO--JULY 21, 1950

Announcement of construction of a 200,000 bushel elevator addition to the local Santa Fe Grain Company was made jointly in Fort Worth and Friona Tuesday morning. The new unit, comprised of six bins, will raise the capacity of the local elevator to 715,000 bushels, and will be built just to the east of the present elevator. G. Preach Cranfill is the local manager of Santa Fe Grain.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 22, 1955

The Mabry Building, now under construction at 901-903 Main, will house five office buildings, according to James D. Mabry, owner.

Second polio shots for Parmer County's first and second graders will be available next week, with Dr. Paul Spring having announced the times and dates for these shots.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 23, 1960

Interested farmers in the Hub community have set a meeting to discuss possibilities of a community or co-op gin in that area. All interested parties are urged to attend.

15 YEARS AGO--JULY 23, 1970

Plans for a new post office building for Friona, to more than double the floor space at the present office, were announced this week by Postmaster General Wilson M. Blount. No decision has been announced concerning the site as the official release from the Post Office Department stated that a 22,400 square foot site was being sought.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 20, 1975

A raise in school taxes was approved for the Friona Independent School District for 1975-76, due to the new Public

School Financing Law and the reduction of the assessed evaluation of district property for the current year. The board, after much study and discussion, voted to raise the ratio on real estate from 37.5 per cent of the evaluation to 50 per cent, and reduce the tax rate from \$1.80 to \$1.55. This would bring about an increase in real estate taxes of approximately 14 per cent, it was pointed out.

Deposits at Friona State Bank set a record for mid-year, it was revealed this week. The bank's June 30 statement revealed that Friona State Bank had deposits of \$20,842,645.42. This was a healthy 12.5 per cent increase over the total of \$18,526,573.11 which the bank had on deposit at the same time a year earlier.

Graveside services for Michael B. (Shorty) Burch, 83, of Las Cruces, New Mexico, were held Wednesday, July 24, at 2 p.m. (MDT) in the Texico, New Mexico Cemetery with Rev. Gary Smith, pastor of Union Congregational Church of Friona, officiating. Arrangements were by Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home of Friona.

Born December 8, 1901 in Texas, Burch was a long time resident of Clovis, New Mexico. He worked for Santa Fe Railroad for many years and had lived in Las Cruces for the past three months. He died Sunday, July 21 in Las Cruces.

Survivors include three sons, Paul Burch of Thrapston, England, Michael Benjamin Burch of La Mirada, California, and Coy Burch of Friona; three daughters, Mary Davis of Roswell, New Mexico, Shirley Jarrett of Lubbock and Mollie Jean Stacy of Clovis, New Mexico; one brother Coy Burch of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; seventeen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

New Facility Hosts Free Roping Event

Over 300 entries from coast to coast are expected at the El Cid Ranch this weekend for one of the largest cutting horse competitions in the area.

Lonnie and Barbara Allsup, owners and operators of El Cid, located just north of Farwell, and east of Clovis, said this week that some of the top cutting horses in the nation have entered the three day competition. The El Cid is a newly constructed facility which features complete horse training facilities including lighted outdoor arenas, covered grandstand, parking, and an indoor arena.

To reach El Cid from Clovis go to Farwell, then north on Highway 60 toward Amarillo to Farm to Market Road 2396, then north for

approximately 1 1/2 miles. Signs will be located on the major highways showing the route.

The public is invited to attend any of the competition, which gets underway at 7 a.m. (CDT) and runs to completion late in the evening.

A \$45,000 estimated purse is being offered for the National Cutting Horse Association approved event which includes classes for both the non-pro, novice, youth and open.



Church Observes 75th Anniversary...

financial assistance in the form of loans for those who did.

By this time, not only was Mr. Reinkin a spokesman for the colony, but men like Charles Gallmeier, Ferdinand Bultemeier, Carl Bultemeier, Carl Schroeder, Conrad Droese, Jacob Schueler, Carl Dettins, Henry Heckman, Fred Heckman and Charles Lavall worked hard to accomplish their

mission.

Since there was no housing nor water on any of the land, a place to stay while these were being developed was a real problem. Funds for a four inch well and a colony house were raised by a free will offering and when these were completed, early day colony settlers had a place to stay.

In March of 1909, Henry F. Reinkin chartered freight cars to move three horses, one cow, one sow, two dozen hens, farm implements and feed for the livestock from Decatur, Indiana, to Friona, Texas.

He and his son, Herman, rode the freight train six days.

Soon, Charles Gallmeier, Conrad Droese, Charles Schroeder, Ernest Schroeder, William Schumm, George Sachs, Charles Lavall and others arrived with members of their families and began anew in the colony. These families formed the nucleus of the new church, which was organized one year later.

The organizational meeting was held June 18, 1910 and plans were initiated for the building of the first chapel. The building fund of \$1,000, which had been donated by Wright Brothers, was added to by members as funds were needed and the building was finished later that year.

Charter members of the church

were Mr. and Mrs. Charles Gallmeier and their children, Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Droese, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Schroeder, George Sachs, William Schumm, Ida and Herma Reinkin, Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Schroeder and their children, Charley Lavall and Henry and Jacob Tiefel.

From its humble beginning this church grew to be a great influence in the community.

The first colony house, which had been built onto, was used for the parsonage until a new one was built in 1954. Then, about ten years later a new church building was erected and Herbert Schueler purchased the old one for a storage building.

The following pastors served Immanuel Lutheran Church since its organization: Pastor Lohmann, June 1910-September 1911; Pastor Ottomar E. Schmidt, September 1911-October 1915; students (Vicars) R.F.H. Pralle and John Oppliger, 1915-1917; The Rev. R.G. Deffner, 1917-1921; The

Rev. Theo. Evers and The Rev. W. Seidel, 1921-1924; The Rev. A. Groeschel, 1924-1931; The Rev. A.R. Allmann, 1931-1941; The Rev. Herbert H. Ries, October 1942-January 1946; Pastor E.W. Lichtsinn, September 1946-November 1952; Pastor George Pullman, August 1953-January 1955; Pastor H.A. Stroebel, 1955-1961; Pastor E.A. Binger, 1962-1966; Pastor O.A. Kretzman, 1966-1971; Pastor Duane Kirchner, 1972-1975; Pastor Wm. Rumpel, 1977-1978; Pastor Reuben Haase, 1980; Pastor Leonard Riddle, 1984-present.

At the present time, Chris Drager, who is 75, is the oldest member and Amy Beth Terry, who was born February 16, 1984, is the youngest member. She is the daughter of Mitch and Kathy Schueler Terry, the granddaughter of Raymond and Lorna Schueler and the great-granddaughter of C.W.C. (Charles) and Sophia Gallmeier.

In their second outing in the double-elimination tournament, Friona faced Plainview, and absorbed a 26-0 drubbing.

The Plainview team went on to win the tournament and advance in the playoffs.
