SATELLITE SIGNALS

Is Satellite T.V. legal? Definitely! In October, 1984, President Reagan signed the Satellite Television Viewing Rights Act that unquestionably legalized the operation of home earth stations, as long as they are for personal, non-profit use. A few cable TV operators have cried "foul," claiming the unauthorized reception of their programs is signal piracy, and thus should be compensated. On the other hand, some Americans feel free reception is justified by the fact that their taxes have long supported NASA, the organization that helped make satellite TV possible in the first place. Complicating the issue is the fact that some 31 million rural Americans can essentially be served only by satellite. Thus, until a fair system of compensation is devised for certain programmers, the free reception of all unscrambled satellite TV programs is most assuredly legal.

Then there's the issue of scrambling. Despite the stories you may have heard, scrambling does not mean that satellite TV owners will lose access to free programming. On the contrary, the vast majority of programmers have no intention of scrambling their signals. The few that are planning to scramble, like HBO, will become premium options for dish owners to choose from.

Presently, the cable and satellite TV industries are working to ensure a smooth and fair introduction of scrambled programming. As with cable TV, you will be asked to pay a small monthly fee to receive these premium services. In addition, you will need to rent or purchase a decoder provided by the programmer especially for satellite TV viewers.

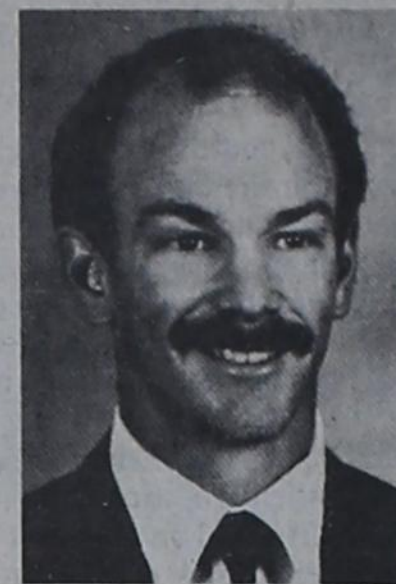

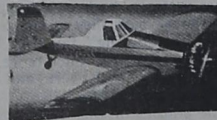

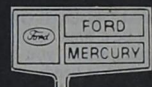

For a wedding trip to Oklahoma, the bride wore taupe slacks and jacket with a red corsage.

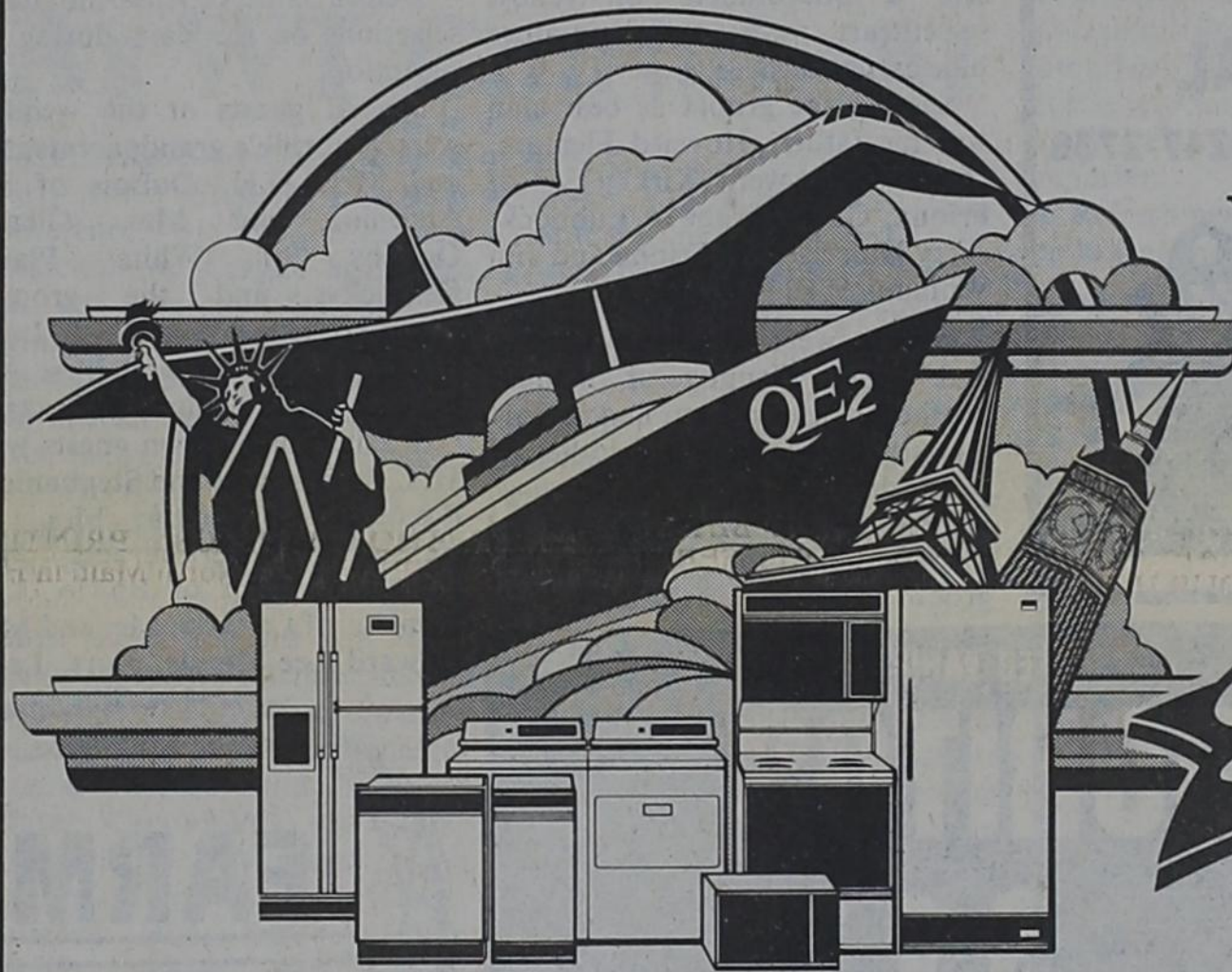
