During Planning Stage

is the time to decide on house heating



Building a new home or bringing an old one up to date with a remodeling job requires many decisions in the planning stage. Probably none is more important than deciding on the method of heating the house since heat is so essential to comfort and health.





The chief causes of constipation are (a) lack of vigorous outdoor exercise, (b) not enough water or other liquids, (c) eating soft cooked foods, (d) concentrated meat diet, and (e) neglect of urge of the low bowel. That exercise will help to make bowels move is shown by the use of x-rays. There are "mass" movements of the large bowel several times a day which help send wastes through the large intestine, but where exer-cise is taken these movements are stronger and occur oftener.

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

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
