One More Resolution

Probably no brave New Year's resolutions have been forgotten this early in 1952. And perhaps it isn't too late to add one more to the list, one that seems like a fine creed for all of us in a year that promises to ring loud with the sound and fury of a presidential election.

The architect for such a resolution is John Foster Dulles, American ambassador-at-large and also the architect of the Japanese Peace Treaty.

That treaty was founded on moral law, and Dulles, who has just returned from another look at Japan and Korea, has some strong ideas about our own regard for moral law in this new year.

What Dulles is afraid of is that we very likely are to lose sight of our role in the free world because of our preoccupation with the election at home.

"Internal unity, no doubt, will be strained," Dulles said. "It is right that these national elections should bring about a full and fair debate of domestic and foreign policies. But such debates need not-indeed we must not let them-paralyze the capacity of this nation to provide the free world with leadership.

"The forces of despotism are too evenly balanced to permit the most powerful of the free nations to retire from the world arena for a year."

Cure For Commies Monks Carry Tradition In Remote Village

Written for NEA Service HAKODATE, JAPAN—(NEA) at 2 a.m., there is not much acivity in the tiny fishing village of Oshima-tobetsu. But far up on the hill overlooking the village, the day already has begun in the brick nastery of Our Lady of the Light-

Trappist monks, who begin their day of work and devotion at 2 a.m. Our Lady of the Lighthouse is one of two Trappist monastries in Japan: the other is in southern Japan. This one is on the rugged, cold, remote north island, Hokkaido, only 50 miles east of Siberia.

Like Trappists in Europe, Africa and the U.S., the Japanese monks keep a strict regime. At 2 a.m., they arise to sing in Latin the ancient chants of devotion of Roman Catholicism. In the unheated caninical hours.

The monastery was founded in 1896 by seven monks from France. Two years later, they were joined by the first Japanese Trappist monks. By 1940, there were 50 monks. Then came the war, which broke through the cloistered walls.

Fourteen monks were forced into military service, and four killed. The Japanese Army used the monastery as a billet. When the war ended, there were only 35 members. Today, it is back to 53, including a monk from France and one from Germany.

The Japanese monks are a young group, mostly between 21 and the Father Thomas Takashima, the monastery's father superior, is 43. Many were born into Buddhism and Shinteism, the religions that embrace most of Japan's 80 --

Lead ores found in the newly explored areas of the island rose from 708 tons in 1950 to 4.137 tons in the first 11 months of 1951. In the same period zinc rose from 1,348 tons in 1950 to 8,097 tons in the first 11 months of 1951. The ore yielded 52 per cent of pure zinc.
