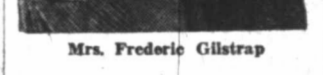

### Author-Expert Ridicules Home Furnishing Hokum

NEW YORK—When you go out to look for home furnishings, do you know what you want? Or, do you wait for a salesman to leap from behind a Regency sofa and start telling you what to buy?

If the opinion of Richard Gump, San Francisco merchant-designer, the most people are terrified by the prospects of picking home furnishings. In his recently published book, "Good Taste Costs No More," Gump establishes some common-sense guides to good taste. At the same time, he has a good deal of fun pointing out the hokum in home furnishings.

Because Richard Gump presently heads his own store, Gump's of San Francisco, he knows his field. The public, he says, is confused by the labels attached to furniture: "Classic Victorian," "Gorgeous Provincial," "Southern Romance," "Flexi-Head."

Period furniture, he points out, was contemporary yesterday. If a friend dropped over one evening wearing knee breeches and a lace

it doesn't necessarily follow that it's a good value. The only consideration here is why it is made. If its reason for being is reinforced by its attractiveness, it's a buy.

A foreign stamp is no criterion of value. Americans generally tend to overrate imports. Any old import will do. But any object, whether an import or a product of home manufacture, is worth having only if it's desirable in itself.

Costliness, contrary to what most people think, does not assure comeliness, says Gump, and the latest thing is not the best thing per se. And finally, it's crazy to try to live beyond your means—financially, culturally or physically.

There are many worth-while things and many worthless ones on the market, Gump points out. But the advertisements won't tell you which is which. Good-looking things, he says, are no more difficult to manufacture than eyesores. So using good taste in the selection of home furnishings is an aid in keeping your hard-earned money in your bank account.

### Rubber Estate Man Killed By Mistake

KUANTAN, PAHANG, MALAYA —P—Rubber planters in this troubled area stand a good chance of getting shot—either by friend or foe.

Not long ago S. Peter James, a Ceylonese estate conductor, went out to chase off a herd of elephants. Sharpshooters of a Malay jungle squad, thinking that he might be a Red terrorist, shot him dead from ambush.

An investigation was ordered into this case, the latest in a series resulting from nervous security forces acting on the pretext that in this kind of warfare it is better to shoot first and ask questions later.

### Cigarette Lighter Saves Owner's Life

SAN FRANCISCO —(P)—A cable showed police his cigarette lighter, fused with a .38 caliber bullet, and said it had cost him \$25, but saved his life.

Joseph Falkovich's story, as verified by police:

A holdup man, dressed as a be-ribboned Army captain, robbed him of \$25 early Friday, then drew: "I'm sorry, but I'm going to have to put you to sleep."

At a range of only 18 inches, he fired. The bullet crashed into the lighter in Falkovich's shirt pocket; stunned him.

The robber shoved the cable into the street; fled in the taxi.

### Women Motorists Saved From Train

HIGHLAND PARK, ILL. —(P)—With the emphasis on the millionth traffic fatality, these two didn't quite make the list.

Mrs. Irene Prior, driver of a brand new automobile, and her companion, Mrs. C. V. Nichols, were stalled on the Chicago, Northwestern Railroad tracks.

As the speeding "400" approached, a motorist, J. Dwight Evans, and a gateman, John J. Janusik, tried to push the car off the tracks. They couldn't move the car. The tires were wedged in an icy rut.

With the train a short distance away, both men pulled the women from the car to safety. The impact of the crash threw the car 300 feet against the depot platform.

### Korean War Gives Up 1,800 American 'Unknown Soldiers'

TOKYO —(P)—Korean battlefields have given up bodies of 1,800 American "unknown soldiers."

They lie in Army mausoleums on Kyushu, Southern Japanese island. Each day a few are identified—from birthmarks, tattoos, fingerprints, dental work, old fractures.

Some of the unidentified dead are carried on war lists as missing. The Defense Department has listed about 11,000 missing in the Korean war. The Communists have listed 3,196 Americans as prisoners. They said 570 other Americans had died after capture.

Others may be listed as killed in action. The military accepts the word of two or more witnesses as verification of death, even though the body may not be recovered immediately.

Major Robert J. Beauchamp, chief of the Far East Command quartermaster's memorial division, Friday said there was "no way in the world to estimate the percentage of unknowns that would be on the missing-in-action list."

Modern, Scientific Methods

At Camp Kokura, on Kyushu, the most modern, scientific detection methods are used to link each boy with a name.

The bodies of all Americans killed in battle—not just the unknowns—are sent from Korea to Camp Kokura for recheck and positive identification before they are returned to the United States for interment. The "unknowns" remain at Kokura.

The identification effort embraces the work of chemists, X-ray technicians, morticians, doctors, dentists, fingerprint experts, anthropologists and clerks.

Beauchamp said 800 bodies received at Camp Kokura as "unknowns" have been identified.

### Warmer Weather Returns To Texas

Mrs. R. P. Stone, a neighbor of the Simpsons, said the child was bruised and scratched "practically all the time" and seldom played with other children.

Stepfather Also Charged

Mrs. Stone's 15-year-old daughter, Joan, testified the child always was nervous. She also testified, "Mr. Simpson usually did what Diana (Mrs. Simpson) said."

Simpson, stepfather of the child, was not in the courtroom. He is being held in jail here under a similar charge of assault with intent to murder in the beating, but has not been indicted.

A fifth witness for the state was Dr. W. C. Coleman, who treated the child on Christmas Eve night.

The trial started at 10 a.m. and was over at 11:55 a.m.

Prosecuting attorneys asked for the maximum sentence of 15 years, but the judge assessed 10.

### Concrete Is Poured For Sewage Plant

The first concrete was poured Friday for Midland's new sewage disposal plant and contractors said it would be in operation by July 1.

City Manager W. H. Oswald said he had been informed that work on the project, which began last month, is ahead of schedule.

The plant is being constructed southeast of Midland by the N. and M. Construction Company at a cost of \$215,114.

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### Father Refuses To Accept Honor Medal Awarded Dead Son

WASHINGTON —(P)—A Washington father Friday refused to accept the Medal of Honor awarded his son for gallantry in Korea because he was quoted as saying, "President Truman is not 'worthy to confer' it."

It was the first time in history anyone has turned down the nation's highest military award.

The father is Halsey McGovern, identified by his brother, Paul, as a former employe of the RFC. He also rejected the Silver Star, which was bestowed on another of his sons.

Both were killed in action in Korea.

The Defense Department would say officially only that it had held correspondence with McGovern. A spokesman acknowledged that the medals had been rejected.

Closed Chapter

McGovern was not available immediately, but the Washington Times-Herald quoted him as saying:

"Accepting these medals would imply that I think Truman is worthy to confer those honors. And I don't think that fellow is worthy to confer honors on my boys, or anyone's boys."

"As far as I'm concerned, this whole thing is a closed chapter. No presentations are going to be made because I don't intend to accept anything."

The White House declined any comment.

The Medal of Honor was awarded First Lt. Robert M. McGovern, 23, of the First Cavalry Division and the Silver Star to his brother, Second Lt. Jerome F. McGovern, 21, of the Second Division.

Robert was killed Jan. 30, 1951, and his brother fell in battle 12 days later. Both were interred in Arlington National Cemetery November 15.

### Three Children Die In Fire At Mabank

MABANK, TEXAS —(P)—Three small children burned to death near here Thursday night while their parents were at a neighbor's house watching television.

The victims were the children of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Shumaker. The family's home, located in Goose Creek Community about five miles from Mabank, is presumed to have caught fire from a stove.

### R. L. Ogle Services Held At McCamey

MCCAMEY—Funeral services for Robert L. Ogle, 55, were held Monday in the First Baptist Church here, with the Rev. G. O. Rowell officiating. Interment was in the McCamey Cemetery. He died late Saturday in a McCamey hospital.

Ogle was born Nov. 14, 1896, in Sutton County, and had resided in McCamey the last five years.

Survivors include a son, three daughters, two brothers, including E. D. Ogle of McCamey; a nephew and a niece.

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### TIPRO President Appointed To NPC

WASHINGTON —(P)—Charles E. Spahr of Cleveland is the new deputy director of the supply and transportation division of the Petroleum Administration for Defense. Spahr, appointed Thursday by Secretary of Interior Chapman, will succeed George A. Wilson who is leaving February 1 to resume his position as president of Interstate Natural Gas Company, Inc. Spahr will serve without compensation.

Chapman also announced appointment of Bryan W. Fane, Tyler, Texas, as a member of the National Petroleum Council for this year. Fane was named to the council in his capacity as president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association.

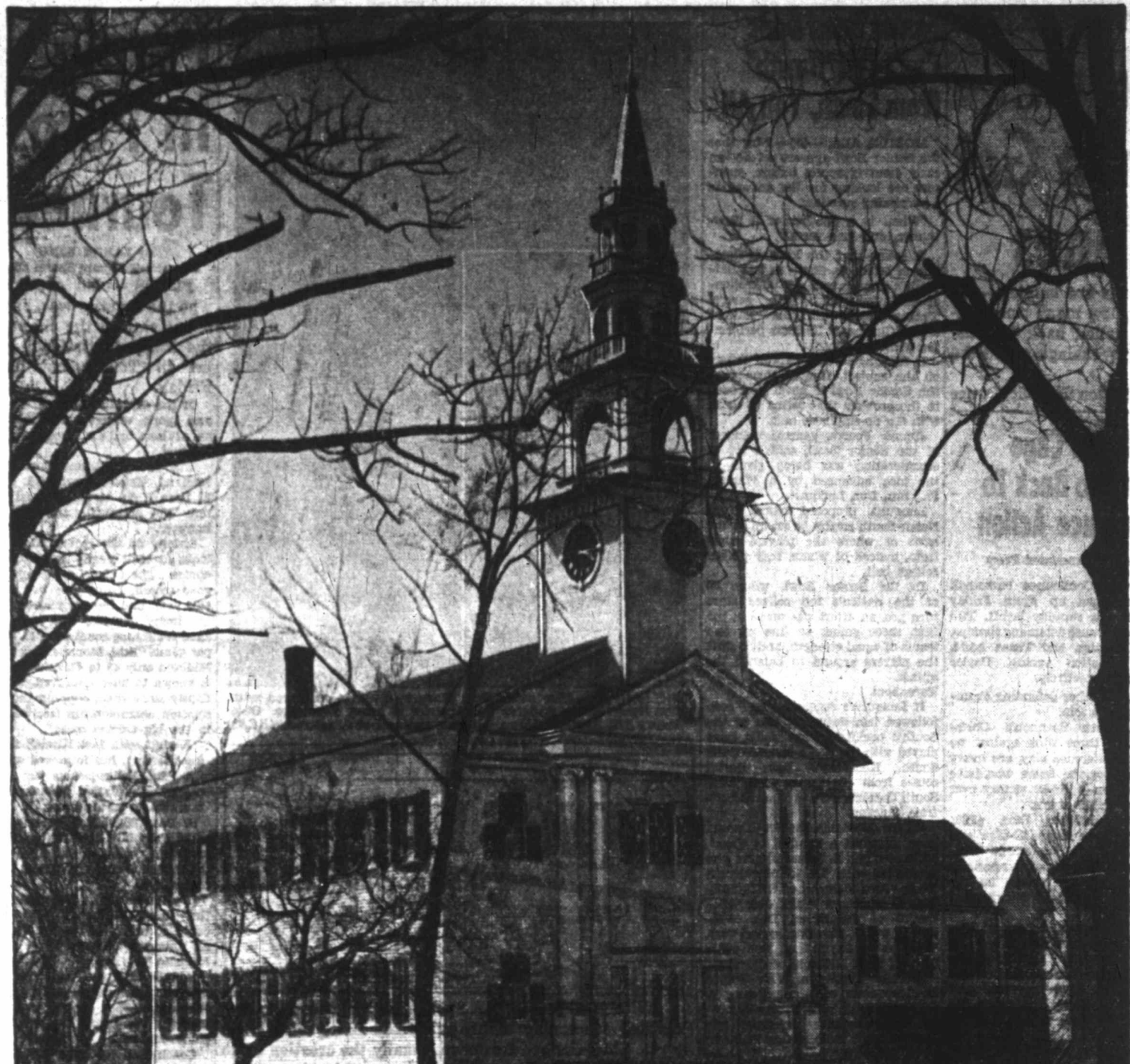
