Abell Completes McKee Discovery In SW Crane Area

George T. Abell of Midland No. 1 State-Brunson has been completed as a new pay discovery in the Tucker field of Southwest Crane County.

The new opener was completed from the McKee sand for a daily flowing potential of 220.25 barrels of 42-gravity oil through a 12 1/4-inch tubing choke.

Production was from open hole at 5,440-5,527 feet, and was natural. Gas-oil ratio was 550-1 and tubing pressure was 825 pounds. Pressure on casing was 825 pounds.

No. 1 State-Brunson is approximately one mile north of McKee production in the Abell Northwest field of Northwest Pecos County. It also is three-quarters of one mile south and slightly west of Waddell production in the Tucker field.

Exact location is 320 feet from north and east lines of the lease in section 26, block 1, H&TC survey.

Pennsylvanian Lime Opener In Prospect In NE King Sector

Ard Drilling Company is preparing to drill plug from oil string cemented on top of the Pennsylvanian Canyon reef at its No. 1 R. B. Masterson, Jr., indicated flowing discovery from that formation in Northeast King County.

The latest drillstem test was taken in the interval from 4,365 to 4,371 feet. Tool was open 20 minutes. Gas surfaced in eight minutes and oil rose to the top in 13 minutes, however it did not flow out. Interested observers said it probably would have if the tool had been left open longer.

Recovery was 3,570 feet of clean oil and 300 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut mud. No formation water was made.

The reef was topped at 4,266 feet, elevation 1,821 feet.

This wildcat indicated as a discovery on a drillstem test in the Cisco sand from 4,055 to 4,065 feet. Tool was open one hour and 10 minutes. Gas surfaced in 17 minutes. Recovery was 1,320 feet of oil and 300 feet of heavily oil and gas-cut drilling mud.

Two subsequent drillstem tests in the same formation, one from 4,199 to 4,296 feet and the other from 4,285 to 4,376 feet developed salt water.

Location is 1,980 feet from south and west lines of section 1, TW&NG survey and 12 miles northeast of Guthrie.

Tex-Harvey Wildcat In Washington County Is Flowing Discovery

Tex-Harvey Oil Company of Midland has a discovery for flowing oil production from the Wilcox sand at its No. 1 Fred W. Dallas in Central Washington County of Southeast Texas.

This development is flowing between seven and eight barrels of high gravity oil per hour through a one-eighth inch tubing choke from two feet of pay at 7,611-13 feet. The flow is natural.

To Complete Soon

Operator will continue testing for a few days and will then take potential test and complete as the opener of a new oil field.

The new producer is on a block of 5,000 acres of leases which Tex-Harvey Oil Company holds in that region.

It is six miles north of Brenham and 467 miles from northwest and southwest lines of the Fred W. Dallas 300.45 acre tract in the Nestor Clay league of the Stephen F. Austin #3 1 1/2 labor grant in Washington County.

Wilshire Completes Big Producer Of Oil In C-W Upton Field

The Wilshire Oil Company No. 14-116 Windham on the east side of the Wilshire-Ellenburger field in Central-West Upton County, has been completed for one of the largest potentials so far reported in the field.

The well flowed 1,826 barrels of oil in 12 hours through a three-quarter inch tubing choke to make a calculated 24-hour potential of 3,656 barrels of 52.9-gravity oil.

Shakedown was 1/100 of one per cent.

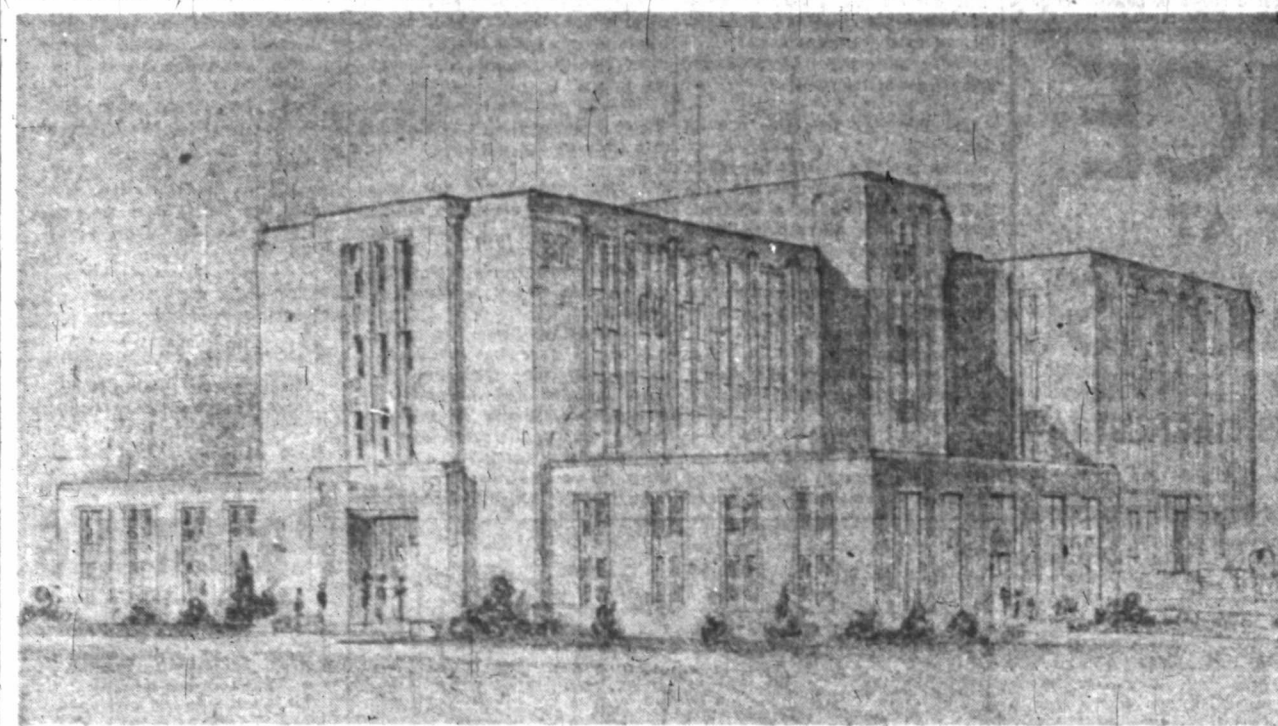

Preliminary Plans For Expansion Of Courthouse Ready

Preliminary plans for an addition to the Midland County Courthouse—designed to more than double the available space—were completed this week.

The entire project, which includes remodeling of much of the present structure as well as the installation of an air-conditioning system, will cost an estimated \$800,000.

While no formal plans have been made to proceed with the project, the plans were submitted by an architectural firm at the request of Commissioners Court.

The addition will be a four-story wing, extending out from the north side of the present courthouse, with the first floor spreading out on each side to provide a new home for the crowded Midland County Library.

"While these plans, of course, will be subject to change," said County Judge Clifford C. Keith, "they are a starting point toward providing additional needed office space in the courthouse."

The project would be financed with a county-wide bond issue.

Additional Elevators

Included in the preliminary drawings are plans for two additional elevators. The courthouse now has only one automatic elevator.

The first floor of the addition would be occupied entirely by the library, which now is housed in the crowded quarters of one corner of the building.

Two For A Nickel, Three For A Dime Also Makes Sense

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The man who made postal cards cost more when bought in quantity lots than when purchased singly says critics don't understand the purpose of the plan.

The reason, said Representative Hagen (R-Minn.) Friday, is to keep the government from competing with commercial print shops that turn out picture post cards, and throwing men out of work.

Hagen was sponsor of a law that went into effect January 1.

It has come under attack by half a dozen congressmen who have introduced repeal bills.

Under the new law the price of postal cards—the government printed kind sold at post offices—went up from one to two cents if bought in lots of less than 50. On 50 or more, there is a 10 per cent surcharge. This you can buy 49 cards for two cents apiece, but the bill for 50 is \$1.10, making the fiftieth card cost 13 cents.

Six Also-Rans Back Kennon In Louisiana Fight Against Spaht

NEW ORLEANS —(AP)—Six of the eight candidates who opposed Carlos Spaht, Gov. Earl K. Long's choice for governor, in Tuesday's Democratic primary combined Friday in an anti-Long coalition backing Judge Robert F. Kennon for the February 19 runoff.

The combined total of the six anti-Longites in Tuesday's election, including Kennon's 154,813 votes, was 595,000. Long received 2,112,000 votes.

Arrayed against Spaht, who received 159,239 votes, were Kennon; Rep. Hale Boggs of New Orleans, who polled 136,666 votes; James McEmore, Alexandria cattleman, with 109,942; Lt. Gov. William Dodd with 84,527; Dudley LeBlanc, former Hadaool manufacturer, with 66,922; and Lucille May Grace, first woman to run for governor of the state, with 5,677 votes.

Unheard from yet were Kermit Parker, New Orleans pharmacist and the first negro since reconstruction days to seek the governorship, who polled 5,158 votes; and Cliff Liles of Lake Charles, only candidate advocating legalized gambling, who received 1,422. Liles said he would announce late Friday whom he will back.

Texas Enjoys Good Fishing Weather

LATE NEWS FLASHES

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The arrest of seven persons and the seizure of hundreds of costly gambling machines, valued at \$351,800, in Kentucky Friday was announced here by FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover.

PARIS —(AP)—Edgar Faure, 43, confirmed Thursday night by the National Assembly as France's youngest premier since 1875, worked Friday to put together another center-coalition cabinet that would end his nation's political crisis, now in its eleventh day.

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The government Friday approved boosts in the wholesale prices of General Motors automobiles ranging from about \$60 on Chevrolets to \$103 on Cadillacs.

SHREVEPORT, LA. —(AP)—Harvey L. Carey, U. S. attorney for the Western District of Louisiana who late Thursday was acquitted by a federal court jury on charges that he solicited a \$60,000 bribe, sent his resignation to President Truman Friday.

AUSTIN —(AP)—Governor Shivers Friday said he would not call a special legislative session even though a state representative's poll of House members showed considerable sentiment against the car inspection law.

Winnie, Lovett Confer

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Prime Minister Churchill had a talk Friday with Secretary of Defense Lovett as a preliminary to his final formal conference with President Truman. The British leader ends his Washington visit Saturday.

The Churchill-Truman meeting was scheduled at 2 p.m.

British officials said Churchill went to see Lovett in his capacity as British minister of defense. They said it was possible he wanted to talk about such questions as American assistance to Communist-threatened Southeast Asia, and British objections to the plan to make an American admiral supreme naval commander for the Atlantic under the Atlantic treaty.

Suez Issue Touchy

Still another military matter was raised by Churchill in his address to Congress Thursday. This was his suggestion that "token forces" from the U. S. and other nations be sent to the Suez Canal area.

It apparently took U. S. officials by surprise and brought wide repercussions. In Paris, an Egyptian spokesman said the proposal "constitutes a new attack on the sovereignty of Egypt."

In London, Lord Beaverbrook's Daily Express protested it would mean "intolerable" interference in Britain's conduct of operations in the canal zone, but the Daily Telegraph termed it an "imaginative suggestion."

Most Congress members shied away from it although praising generally Churchill's theme that Britain and the U. S. must "tread the same path."

Full Probe Ordered In Grain Snafu

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Comptroller General Lindsay C. Warren Friday told Senators he had ordered a "full and complete investigation" of shortages in the Agriculture Department's grain storage program, after his auditors found shortages of more than \$3,800,000 in a single office at Dallas, Texas.

Warren testified before the Senate Agriculture Committee. Secretary of Agriculture Brannan and a dozen assistants waited their turn to explain the cases under probe.

Stealing, Embezzlement

Senator Anderson (D-NM), former secretary of Agriculture, closely questioned Warren and his auditors on why there had not been prosecution of the shortages, or why there had been delays in prosecutions.

Involved in the inquiry was government owned grain and other farm commodities, obtained in the farm price support program.

It was stored in elevators and other storage centers and the shortages or "conversions" are blamed by Brannan on "individuals of the grain trade," not Agriculture Department employees.

Both Anderson and Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) referred to the shortages as "stealing" and "embezzlement."

Spokesman for the Agriculture Department and Brannan previously had disclosed some of these shortages and said prosecutions had been started in some of them.

They indicated that the shortages represented a relatively small amount in the widespread, \$10,000,000 farm loan program.

Defebach Elected President Of Buffalo Trail Scout Council

Lyle Defebach of Snyder was elected president of the Buffalo Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America, at its annual meeting Thursday night in Odessa. He succeeds Dr. W. B. Hardy of Big Spring, who had served as president the last two years.

Other officers are Dr. Hardy, Emmett Beauchamp, Pecos; H. L. Wren, Snyder; J. M. Waddell, Kermit; G. W. Breneman, Midland; and J. L. Rhoades, Odessa, vice presidents; J. T. Baker, Midland, treasurer, and C. V. Kelly, Midland, assistant treasurer.

Dr. H. Roe Bartle of Kansas City, Mo., nationally-known Boy Scout leader, educator, churchman and business leader, was the principal speaker at the banquet.

"If you carve upon marble it eventually will turn to dust; work upon brass and it will tarnish; build mighty temples and they will crumble, but if you work at the molding of character of a boy, you build something which will last through eternity," Dr. Bartle told the large crowd which packed the Lincoln Hotel banquet hall.

"The day has arrived in America when we must give the spirit of Scouting to the entire nation," he declared.

Silver Beaver awards were presented to Rhoades, Joe Pickle of Big Spring, and Harold Scott of Pecos.

Polio Incidence In Texas Returns To Record Levels

AUSTIN —(AP)—Polio was back up to record smashing levels this week. For the week ended January 12, 37 new cases were counted statewide, the State Health Department reported Friday. In the preceding week, 21 cases were reported, bringing the total for the first two weeks of the year to 58.

It's the highest incidence on record for this time of year.

It seems inevitable that the state is headed for one of the worst polio years in history, State Health Officer George W. Cox said.

Last week's polio was scattered among 15 counties, including Andrews, Bexar, Brazoria, Dallas, Ector, Galveston, Harris, Hays, Hockley, Jefferson, McCulloch, Nueces, Smith, Tom Green and Travis.

Four Crewmen Hurt When B-29 Crashes

HOUSTON —(AP)—Four crewmen of a B-29 were hospitalized Friday after their giant plane crashed into a ditch, smashing its nose and splitting in several segments.

Nose of the hospitalized were hurt seriously. There were 14 persons aboard the Air Force plane coming in for a landing in thick fog at Ellington Air Force Base.

Names of the injured were not released immediately by base officials.

High Waters Cut All Rail, Road Traffic

LOS ANGELES —(AP)—Two thousand families were ordered evacuated Friday as a night of deluging rain poured floods into flatlands south of here.

The Sheriff's substation at Norwalk announced the Coast Guard would undertake to move the 6,000 or more persons from the path of rising waters.

The emergency centered in the communities of Norwalk, Artesia and Hawaiian Gardens, southeast of here.

The Coast Guard moved up from its bases at Long Beach and San Pedro with boats and amphibious equipment of all types.

Another critical situation in the San Fernando Valley north of Los Angeles proper apparently was well in hand, although some 200 families had been taken from their homes in the Reseda area.

As welcome sunshine broke through the clouds shortly after dawn, the picture through much of Southern California was one of rushing torrents, mud-closed highways and stalled cars.

By 8 a.m., the storm had brought 4.17 inches of rain in Los Angeles in 18 hours. Higher amounts fell on foothill communities which ring the city and despite flood control channels and spreading basins, the immense volume of water was ripping out roads and cutting into canyon banks as it rushed toward the Pacific.

Livestock Sabotage Peril Cited

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The Agriculture Department Friday reported it is on guard against possible enemy sabotage of the nation's livestock and meat industry.

Meat is such an important part of the American diet one of the first things an enemy might do, the department said, would be to try to get animal diseases and plagues started on farms.

"If foot-and-mouth disease, rinderpest, fowl pest or foreign types of Newcastle disease should be allowed to develop undetected, they could menace our livestock industry from coast to coast and from border to border within weeks," the department said in an annual report of its Bureau of Animal Industry.

Start At Front Lines

"In view of the possibility that diseases could be introduced intentionally at any time, the planners of our civilian defense have asked that the bureau be prepared to meet that emergency if it should arise."

In carrying out this assignment, the bureau said it has started at the "front lines"—the borders and ports of entry. It said inspection and quarantine efforts have been intensified in regard to animal imports.

City Moves To Put All Trailer Houses Into Licensed Parks

The City Council Thursday afternoon moved to drive hundreds of trailer houses into licensed trailer parks or out of the city limits.

An ordinance banning such trailers outside of properly-operated parks was read before the council for the first time Thursday and will come up for final passage at the next regular meeting of the group.

A reasonable length of time—probably two months—will be allowed before the provisions of the ordinance are enforced. Such a delay was suggested to permit arrangements to be made for moving trailer facilities.

The ordinance was introduced at the request of Senior Sanitarian A. E. Cass of the City-County Health Unit.

The action was designed to fit into an overall clean-up program being directed by Cass—a program to eliminate unsanitary conditions within the city.

Hazards To Community

Cass said the lone-wolf trailers were, in many cases, health hazards to the community.

"Some of them make their own sewer connections," said the sanitarian, "simply by digging a hole, punching through a sewer line and sticking a four-inch hose into it, connecting with the trailer."

Licensed trailer parks must provide sanitary sewage facilities.

The proposed new ordinance, actually, is a revision of one already on the city's statute books.

Cass pointed out the present law prohibits trailer parking except in licensed parks—and then provides loopholes which makes the ordinance difficult to enforce.

He estimated there are some 1,000 trailer houses which will be affected.

City And School Elections First On 1952 Calendar

The election of three school board members and two city councilmen will give Midland voters their first taste of 1952 politics.

The year will be crowded with political attractions and the season ticket—a \$1.75 poll tax receipt—now is on sale.

The city election will lead off the calendar of events, which includes county, state and presidential elections.

It is set for April 1, and the two terms expiring are those of Councilmen Jack Wilkinson and J. W. McMillen, neither of whom have announced publicly their future political intentions.

Four days later—on April 5—the voters will name three school board members for the expired terms of Cooper Hyde, J. Holt Jewell and Mrs. Ernest Sidwell.

Deadline for the payment of the poll tax or for obtaining an exemption certificate is January 31.

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Disposal Of City Bonds Discussed

The sale of unsold water revenue, street paving and jailhouse bonds was to be discussed here Friday afternoon.

City Manager W. H. Oswald said he had scheduled a conference at that time with W. C. Jackson of Dallas, president of the First Southwest Company, the city's fiscal agent.

The unsold bonds from an issue approved in an election in 1950 include \$1,000,000 in water revenue bonds, \$175,000 in street paving bonds and \$50,000 in jailhouse bonds.

Young Organist Will Present Concert Here

William Teague, a young concert organist and minister of music for Saint Mark's Episcopal Church in Shreveport, La., will present a concert Monday in the First Presbyterian Church.

The program, which is being sponsored by the Midland branch of the American Guild of Organists, will begin at 8:15 p. m.

Teague achieved musical distinction at the age of 12 when he became the youngest church organist in the Southwest. At this time he played for one of the Methodist churches in his hometown of Gainesville. Three years earlier, he had made his debut as a pianist. He attended Southern Methodist University as the scholarship student of Dora Potet Barclay, head of the organ department, and later received his degree from the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia.

One of the triumphs of his career as a recitalist was the series of concerts he played on the John Wanamaker organ in Philadelphia. A concert on this organ, reputed to be the largest in the world, is said to be the goal of every concert organist.

Teague made his orchestral debut in 1948 when he appeared as soloist with the Shreveport Symphony Orchestra. This year he made a New York debut in St. Paul's Chapel at Columbia University.

Of this performance, Seth Bingham, noted organist, said: "Mr. Teague plays with an assurance based on a fluent technique which makes an older recitalist might envy. With it goes a high degree of musicianship, revealing a keen sense of color and balance and firm rhythmic control."

Ike's Position Is Clear

General Eisenhower's Paris political statement means this is not to be 1948 all over again. This time he definitely is available as a presidential candidate and openly welcomes the efforts of his supporters to bring about his nomination next July.

Furthermore, he at last has established publicly that he is a Republican by conviction and voting record.

Thus it immediately is clear he will not withdraw his name from the New Hampshire primary, first in the nation, when it is entered by Senator Lodge and his other campaign managers. Nor, presumably, will he block any other primary activities initiated in his behalf.

This much is on the positive side. Negatively, however, he has made it equally evident he will not ask to be relieved of his NATO command to seek the nomination, and will not take part in any pre-convention activities.

He is insistent upon sticking at his present job in the absence of a "clear-cut call to political duty." Yet this does not mean he holds himself aloof from politics.

The tenor of his statement shows that he feels so deep an allegiance to present responsibilities that no half-hearted command from people and party could tear him away.

Nor does it mean he demands that he be truly "drafted." The mere act of endorsing the campaign efforts of his backers wipes away any notion, we here are being asked to draft Eisenhower for the presidency.

A draft assumes neither approval of nor participation in campaign activities.

To ask that a call to duty be clear-cut is something else. It seems a fair request from a man who occupies such a key position in the Western defense structure. The general is reluctant to abandon this vital post to chase a political will o' the wisp.

What would constitute a clear call only Eisenhower can define. Public opinion polls long have shown him the most popular choice for the presidency.

But other polls indicate Senator Taft is the great favorite of the established Republican organization.

A realist, Eisenhower undoubtedly does not believe this amounts to an unmistakable demand for his political services.

Possibly only a strong showing in several key primaries would turn the trick. To a skeptic on polls, popular sentiment expressed in primaries might be more convincing. And such evidence, if sufficiently dramatic, might win over substantial elements of the GOP organization wedded to Taft.

Certainly the burden now is heavily upon Eisenhower's supporters to use the primaries or any other means to convert his present availability into an active candidacy.

Yesterday is over—tomorrow is still to come—today is the day to buy more government bonds.

The best reply to those who want to argue about politics is, "Did you vote?"

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

Draw Pearson says: No solution of Britain's dollar drains and Iranian crisis during Churchill visit; U. S. taxpayers will have to make up loss from Abadan refinery; Rita Hayworth's husband shocks Mohammedans.

WASHINGTON — One unpleasant shadow lurking over the Churchill-Truman conversations is that American taxpayers are to be called upon to pick up the tab for the closing down of the Abadan oil refinery.

While this has not been spelled out in so many words during the Churchill visit, it remains a fact that the U. S. government has been entrusted into a position where it is going to pay for British mistakes in Iran and the closing of an oil refinery which produced 20 per cent of all refined products outside the U. S. A.

No real steps to solve this situation have been taken during the prime minister's visit.

Meanwhile, although the American people do not realize it, the United States is helping supply to the Anglo-Iranian Oil Company 500,000 barrels of refined oil products daily in order to make up for the loss at Abadan.

Meanwhile also, dollars are being drained out of Britain at the rate of \$600,000,000 annually to pay for this oil. Reports from London have told of the alarming exit of British dollar reserves in the last few months, but they have not fully explained the reason for this increased drain. Chief reason for the increase is the shutdown of the Abadan refinery.

Previously the oil sold by the Anglo-Iranian Company—owned and operated by the British government—represented important revenue for Britain. But, with the refinery closed, Anglo-Iranian has had to buy 300,000 barrels of oil daily from the Caribbean and the United States, plus 300,000 barrels from other sources. This has to be paid for in dollars.

American companies have formed a foreign petroleum supply committee under the sponsorship of the State Department and the Interior Department, to step in and make up the Iranian oil deficit. This means that we are not only drawing on our own oil reserves, despite a national policy to discourage exports, but simultaneously we are put in the position of soon having to make up Britain's cash reserves now being exhausted because of the Anglo-Iranian oil crisis.

So They Say

Mr. Vishinsky's speech indicates that this fanciful fear of "spies" and "espionage" is growing behind the Iron Curtain.

"Here's an interesting hand for your column," writes C. M. Smith, of Madison, Wisconsin.

"West opens the deuce of diamonds, and East wins with the ace. East returns the queen of diamonds, and South must play low.

"East is then unable to find a way to defeat the contract. If East leads the jack of diamonds, South can cover with the king and let West ruff. Dummy's ten will later supply the one diamond trick that South needs for his contract.

"East does no better by returning the nine of diamonds, since South can let this ride to dummy's ten.

WEST: ♠ 10 7 6 5, ♥ 8 7 6, ♦ 10 7 6 4, ♣ K 8 5. EAST: ♠ J 8, ♥ 4 3, ♦ A 2, ♣ J 7 5 3.

SOUTH: ♠ K 4 3, ♥ A Q J 6, ♦ K 5 3, ♣ A 6. Neither side vul.

North East South West Pass Pass 1 ♣ Pass 3 ♣ Pass 4 ♣ Pass

Opening lead—♠ 3

West can ruff, of course, but South still has the king of diamonds safely tucked away for later use.

"If East shifts to a different suit, South can draw three rounds of trumps and cash his king of diamonds at leisure.

"How about that?" Very, very neat. As the reader can see for himself, South loses his contract if he puts up the king of diamonds at the second trick.

West ruffs triumphantly, and now South must still lose two more diamond tricks.

I hope some expert in Madison actually made this elegant play. If he did, it's worth remembering for a few years.

CARD Sense

Q—The bidding has been: East South West North 1 Heart Double Pass 1 Spade ?

You, South, hold: Spades K-Q-7-4, Hearts A-K-3, Diamonds K-Q-8-6-2, Clubs A-K-3. What do you do?

A—Bid four spades. There is probably a reasonable play for game if your partner has four spades of some description and nothing else of value.

Moreover, the game is a near certainty if your partner has as little as the jack of spades and the jack of diamonds or perhaps the queen of clubs. If you fail to bid the game you cannot expect your partner to be optimistic with a hand that contains only one or two jacks.

State Of The Union Message Promises Everybody Everything

WASHINGTON—Up to now, the United States may have thought it had a choice between Guns OR Butter. Today, following delivery of President Truman's State of the Union message to Congress, his program is revealed as Guns AND Butter AND Welfare.

It is impossible to look at the President's message as anything else than an election-year political document. And if promising everybody everything is good politics—well, President Truman has promised everybody everything.

As an indicator on whether President Truman intends to run for reelection, the message can and probably will be interpreted both ways. If the President does intend to run, this is his platform.

If the President doesn't intend to run, this is a first draft of his political last will and testament, in which he wants to leave everybody everything he ever asked for.

As a political document, the President's message puts the issues right up to the Republicans. The GOP can't possibly promise the peep-ul as much as President Truman would like to give them. Nobody could.

GOP Has Two Choices The choice of the Republicans, therefore, is to offer what has come to be known as "me-too-ism," which is decidedly unpopular among the old guard, or to offer a program of strict austerity, cutting out all the welfare state stuff.

How General Eisenhower would accept the latter program, nobody knows. It might be hard for men like Governor Warren of California and ex-Governor Stassen of Minnesota to accept.

Senator Taft might take to it with all the ease of a duck on a pond.

Elimination of the welfare state idea in fact has been an ambition of conservative business leaders and politicians for a long time.

Just before Christmas for instance, when everyone should have kindly feelings for his fellow men and be interested in aid to the needy, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce put out a leaflet with a headline: "300 Welfare Plans Take a Third Of All Government Tax Dollars."

Figures which the Chamber cited were that for some 300 federal, state and local government welfare plans, social insurance cost \$4,700,000,000, public assistance \$2,500,000,000, health and medical services \$2,200,000,000, veterans' programs \$6,200,000,000, education \$6,500,000,000, housing, the Indians, school lunches and other welfare programs \$700,000,000.

This was for 1950, last year on which complete data was available. The total is \$22,800,000,000, which is 34 per cent of all government spending for that year.

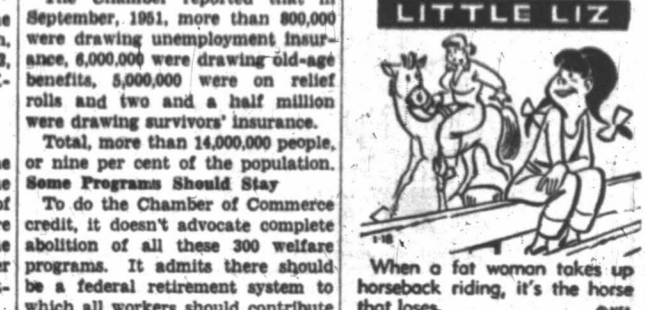
The Chamber reported that in September, 1951, more than 600,000 were drawing unemployment insurance, 4,000,000 were drawing old-age benefits, 5,000,000 were on relief rolls and two and a half million were drawing survivors' insurance.

Pioneer Air Lines Transports Record Number Passengers

DALLAS —(AP)—Pioneer Air Lines transported 161,856 passengers aboard its planes in Texas and New Mexico in 1951, a gain of 26 per cent over the 128,171 persons carried in 1950, Harding L. Lawrence, vice president of traffic and sales for the company announced.

Passenger miles (passengers times miles traveled) increased from 34,450,521 in 1950 to 42,103,352 in 1951, a gain of more than 22 per cent.

In 1950, Pioneer transported 99,388 ton miles of U. S. mail while in 1951, this increased to 108,428 miles, a gain of nine per cent over the previous year.

Air cargo, including both air freight and air express, grew from 182,890 ton miles in 1950 to 204,936 ton miles in 1951 or 11 per cent, while Pioneer actually ended 1951 serving five less cities than it did in the previous year.

The company's present system includes 20 cities in Texas and New Mexico served through 19 airports. Service has been suspended at Mineral Wells and Las Vegas due to airport conditions and in El Paso, Roswell and Las Cruces due to a Civil Aeronautics Board order.

Biologist's Slaying Accident, Says Negro

PALESTINE —(AP)—The trial of Alton Paris, 36-year-old negro father of 13 children, continued here Friday after Paris claimed the shooting of Gus Engeling was accidental.

Engeling, state game biologist, was shot to death December 13 after he entered a swamp thicket to investigate shots heard in a game refuge.

Paris testified Thursday he was running through the underbrush with a shotgun in his right hand when it accidentally was discharged. "I wouldn't have killed him for nothing in the world," the negro said.

Sweden To Double Trade With Russia

STOCKHOLM, SWEDEN —(AP)—Sweden and Russia plan to double their trade—largely Russian wheat for Swedish machinery and metal goods—under a new trade agreement announced Thursday night by the Swedish Foreign Office.

Sweden will send the Soviet Union steam turbines, electricity generators, iron, steel, metal products, machinery, instruments and butter worth about 23 million dollars. About one-third of this will be in electrical goods which the Russians previously bought on credit but now will pay for in cash.

Sweden will send the Soviet between 17 and 19 million dollars. Two-thirds of that total will be for 100,000 tons of wheat. The rest will include asbestos, kerosene, and such alloy metals for steel-making as chromium, manganese and ferromanganese.

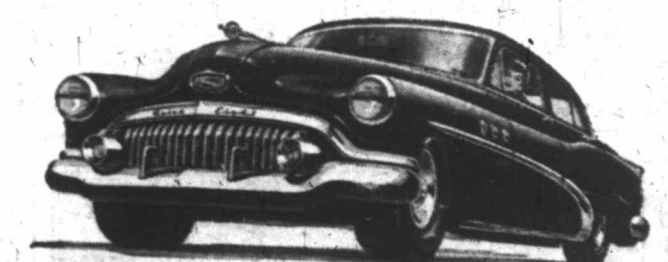

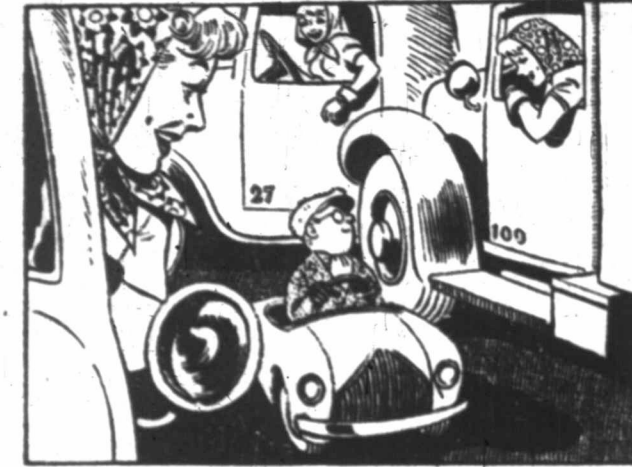

Lodge Offers Ike's Bid For Nomination To GOP Gathering

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Senator Lodge (R-Mass.) Friday offered Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower to the Republicans as one presidential candidate "who could bring the world durable peace."

Lodge took sharp—if indirect—issue with Taft supporters, who said the party would be risking its political future if it nominates a "glamour candidate" in Chicago next July. Lodge is national chairman of the GOP Eisenhower-for-President Committee.

David S. Ingalls, campaign manager for Ohio's Senator Robert A. Taft, said the party should not "select a good looking martinet, to preside over its death as a political organization. He urged the GOP National Committee, in a speech Thursday night, to aid in the nomination of a "militant republican" such as Taft.

Former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota put in his bid for presidential nominating support at a committee dinner Friday night.

California's Gov. Earl Warren made his appeal at Thursday's opening luncheon.

Lodge told National Committee members the Republicans can't win in November unless they attract some Democratic votes. He said Eisenhower would not do that.

Windjammer Rides Out North Sea Gale; Many Ships Broken

DEAL ENGLAND—(AP)—The German bark Pamir, one of the last of the big sea-going windjammers, Friday rode out a North Sea gale which had sent lifeboats scudding to her rescue.

The four-masted vessel with 45 sea cadets—40 crewmen aboard had radioed an urgent call for help after heavy seas pounded off one of her anchors.

Later she messaged the weather had moderated and she was able to resume her voyage without help. Lifeboats from two English Channel ports battled through a blizzard to the scene 20 miles offshore.

The 5,506-ton British steamer Empire Parkerton had stood by to help if needed.

The lifeboats began their rugged trip after Capt. Paul Grief radioed he thought the young cadets should be taken off his buffeted ship at once. With rescuers standing by, he decided to keep everyone aboard and finally was able to go on his way.

Cases raging around and over the British Isles drove shipping to shelter Friday and a number of vessels set out SOS calls.

Coast Guardsmen fired a breeches buoy from a cliff top to the Liferian ship Liberty after it went around in a gale Thursday night near Cape Cornwall. All 38 crewmen were hauled safely off the stranded vessel.

Three seamen were missing from a 400-ton Dutch motor ship, adrift about 25 miles off Lowestoft in the North Sea. The rest of the crew were taken off by lifeboats but the captain stayed aboard to help rig a towline from a tug.

The towline snapped early Friday and the captain was removed by a lifeboat.

Off Redcar, in the North Sea, lifeboats Thursday night completed removal of 27 men from the 4,221-ton Greek freighter Taxiarchis. She went aground in a gale Monday. The Greek skipper said continuing foul weather made it likely his ship would break in two.

A 60-mile-an-hour gale blew in the Straits of Dover. On land there were gusts up to 65 miles an hour. A light snow was general. Ice made roads dangerous.

East Texan Urges Prompt Repeal Of Car Inspection Law

AUSTIN—(AP)—An East Texas state representative urged repeal of the car inspection law Friday after his poll of House members found strong sentiment against the measure.

Rep. Jack Wiesner of Wells said he would leave the question of a special session up to Gov. Allan Shivers after showing him the results of the poll.

Of 150 House members queried by Wiesner, 88 considered it "advisable in the public interest" to ask Shivers to call the Legislature into special session.

Forty-two opposed a special session. Two others said it was the governor's responsibility, and they didn't want to put pressure on him.

Wiesner said the majority of the opposition to the car inspection law came from rural areas.

Fifty-seven representatives wanted a special session to consider repeal of the inspection law, he said. Sixty-two favored immediate legislative action to repeal the drivers financial responsibility law, which requires motorists to show ability to pay up to \$15,000 in case of a serious accident.

Wiesner denounced the inspection statute as "impractical."

"The inspection is much too rigorous and includes things that are not related to safety," he declared, citing requirements for check of tailpipes, exhaust mufflers, and windshield cracks.

"If anyone ever has been killed in an accident caused by a defective muffler, I don't know anything about it," he said.

(Continued From Page One) hardly 24 hours respite from the Tuesday-Wednesday storm when the downpour began again Thursday. This sudden storm which developed off the coast surprised the weather forecasters. Nine new deaths were reported, bringing the known storm toll to 13.

Schools in Los Angeles, Pasadena, Norwalk and El Monte were ordered closed Friday because of the heavy rain, many flooded streets and intersections. There were 40,000 absentees in Los Angeles Thursday.

Southern Pacific trains, north and southbound between Los Angeles and San Francisco, were blocked by washouts or high water.

All Highways Closed. The California Highway Patrol said that by 3:30 a.m. all main highways into or out of Los Angeles County were closed by flood water, earth slides or snow. These included U. S. Highway 101, the coast route, blocked north in the Malibu area and at Newberry near Ventura, and south toward San Diego at Corona Del Mar and Laguna Beach; U. S. 99, the ridge route to Bakerfield, blocked by 18 inches of snow at Gorman; U. S. 6 to Palmdale in the Mojave Desert, blocked by snow; and U. S. 66 where it leaves Los Angeles via the Ramona Freeway, blocked by high water.

Patrol Sgt. Walter Wortendyke said, "Any traffic is a distinct hazard. We are advising people at home of as early as they can if possible." He said all patrolmen have been ordered on 24-hour duty.

Attempts to clear the Southern Pacific's overland route across the Sierra, where the streamliner City of San Francisco and a trainload of passengers almost met disaster this week, had made little progress. Railroadmen said it will take days to open the line.

Many Still Trapped. A relief train engineer caught in a slide near Yuba Pass Monday state was missing. It was feared he lost his life under the drifts after his engine and a rotary snowplow overturned.

Relief supplies were sent by Army truck to 40 persons trapped since last Friday at a construction camp in isolated Bear River Canyon, about 100 miles east of San Francisco.

No word has been received from these persons for a week. It was believed they had plenty of food, but might be short of fuel and medical supplies.

The town of Washington, in Nevada County, was reported out of bread and milk. Other foodstuffs were being rationed. Highway crews were trying to reopen state Route 20, closed at Nevada City.

State Route 36, from Red Bluff to Susanville, was cleared Thursday afternoon. It was the first highway to be reopened to Nevada from northeastern California.

WOODBRIDGE N. J.—(AP)—Capt. Hendrik Kurt Carlsen, and his family relaxed Friday in their modest home, protected from admirers by a police guard.

The unassuming skipper of the doomed freighter, the Flying Enterprise, rested up from the tumultuous reception given him by more than a quarter-million New Yorkers in that city Thursday.

But that's not the only welcome-home celebration for the valiant sea captain who spent two weeks aboard his broken freighter, braving the fury of the storm-tossed Atlantic.

His home town prepared for its own ceremonies Saturday to honor Carlsen and promised that it will be "one of the greatest in New Jersey history."

Meanwhile, "Stay-Put" Carlsen, as he has come to be known, and his wife and two daughters enjoyed a belated Christmas.

When he arrived at his home Thursday, he found a Christmas tree, still decorated, standing in one of the rooms. And there were presents marked "For Daddy."

A 24-hour police guard was ordered set up around the Carlsen home by Police Chief George A. Keating because, he said, the family is "obviously badly in need of rest."

Rebel Wives Again Face Tax Troubles. MARSHALL—(AP)—Notices against seven housewives who refused to pay domestic taxes have been received here.

The women Thursday reported the notices for the second and third quarters of 1951.

The housewives, who contend it is unconstitutional for the government to require them to collect taxes from their domestic help's pay, have refused to pay the taxes.

The Treasury Department last August used the same seizure procedure to collect taxes for the first 1951 quarter. A total of \$44.23 was taken from 10 women in two days and more was collected from at least three others in the next three weeks.

Suspended U. S. Attorney Acquitted On Bribery Charge

SHREVEPORT, LA.—(AP)—Whether suspended U. S. Attorney Harvey L. Carey, acquitted on bribery charges, will be allowed to resume his duties remains a question that only U. S. Attorney General J. Howard McGrath can answer.

Carey, accused of soliciting a \$60,000 bribe from Texas oil man Lewis Hart, was acquitted Thursday night by a Federal District Court jury after seven hours of deliberation.

McGrath suspended Carey from office in December, 1949, after an investigation by the Justice Department.

Carey technically has held the title as U. S. attorney for Western Louisiana although he was under suspension without salary.

He was indicted by a federal grand jury in March on charges he asked a \$60,000 bribe from Hart to "settle" 30 perjury counts pending against Hart and four of his employees.

This first floor would be 168 feet in width and would extend 97 feet north from the present building to within a few feet of the sidewalk along Texas Street.

The library would have a large area for the book stacks, a staff lounge, office for the librarian and a work room.

The high-ceilinged room would have a balcony running along one side.

The second, third and fourth floors would be only 57 feet in width and rise upward from the center of the first floor.

Clerk's Office On Second. The county clerk's office would occupy most of the second floor.

With the heavy activity in city real estate as well as record-breaking traffic in oil and gas leases, the present office of the county clerk is just about crowded to the limit.

A stairway would extend upward to a records storage room on the third floor.

The third floor also would be used for offices of the county agent and the home demonstration agent with a large assembly room and a kitchen. The third floor plans also include space for a county engineer's office.

The fourth floor of the addition would be an enlargement of the present court jail. This additional jail space would permit separate and larger wards for women prisoners as well as an adequate juvenile detention ward.

With the drafting of 360 college players out of the way, the first order of business was the airing of the grievances of the dapper television and radio producer and they give promise of producing a bigger show than any of his TV or radio programs.

Now what are Collins' grievances? "I simply want what any club owner in the league is entitled to," Collins declared. "I want my share of playable home dates, the same as any other team. I've never had them."

"You can say this is it," he continued. "I am going to get six home dates—or else. There are a lot of other people in this league who are behind me because they believe in fair play."

Asked whether his "or else" ultimatum meant he was prepared to sell the Yanks' franchise if he demands were not met, Collins merely shrugged his shoulders and replied: "I'm doing pretty well in television."

The Yanks lost approximately \$350,000 last year. They pay a \$50,000 rental to the baseball Yankees for use of Yankee Stadium, plus another \$25,000 to the football Giants for permission to play in New York.

By BOB ADAMS, Pinch-Hitting A group of Springfield College students re-enacted the first basketball game, with the original rules, Thursday night between halves of the Holy Cross-St. Louis game.

Curiosity about the origin of the game forced us to dip lightly into its history. It was originated in 1892 by Dr. James A. Naismith who was told by the college which employed him to "find a new sport which would save the gymnasium from becoming extinct."

They suggested that he try to originate a sport which could be played during the lull which exists between football and baseball seasons and which could be played inside.

It is listed as the only truly American sport—that is to say—the only one which had its origin in this country without any outside influence. Dr. Naismith listed 13 original rules which the players were to abide by and many of them still are applicable today.

Included in the original rules were: A foul is striking at the ball with the fist; if either side makes three consecutive fouls, it shall count as a goal for the opponents.

Others were: When two fouls are committed by a person, he is disqualified until the next goal is made or if there was an evident attempt to injure the person the player was disqualified for the whole game and no substitute was permitted.

The game was originally played with seven men on each side, then nine, then eight and now five. The sport formerly consisted of three periods of 20 minutes each and field goals once counted three points instead of the present two.

Also, once upon a time, when a foul was committed, the injured team was allowed to call upon a specialist to do the foul shooting much the same as the extra point kicker is employed in football.

And with the sport boasting a higher attendance record than any of the others, it looks like it is here to stay.

Speaking of basketball, did you know that Gerald Tucker, who plays with the Phillips 66 team here and is a former All-American? He was named to the team in 1947.

Four strokes back at 69, were six men, including the dangerous Lloyd Mangrum.
