**Phillips Schedules  
Spraberry Wildcat  
In SW Martin Area**

Thirteen miles north of the city of Midland and 19 miles northwest of the town of Stanton, Phillips Petroleum Company spotted location in Southwest Martin County for a 9,000-foot Spraberry wildcat.

It will be dug at the corner of No. 1-O Schar (Scharbauer Cattle Company), 1,320 feet from south and 7,000 feet from west lines of league 334, La Salle County School land survey.

Drill site is four and one-half miles north of the discovery well of the Glass-Spraberry field and four miles east of the shallow Mabey pool.

**Ashmun & Hilliard  
Complete Discovery  
From Tubb In Crane**

Ashmun & Hilliard of Midland have completed their No. 1 Evan B. Jones as a Tubb discovery in Southwest Crane County.

The well was completed for 172 barrels of 30.4-gravity oil per day flowing through a one-quarter inch choke.

Gas-oil ratio was 1,800-1. Flowing tubing pressure was 250 pounds and pressure on the casing was 700 pounds.

Production was from pay section between 4,095 feet and 4,129 feet after a 2,000-gallon acid treatment.

Location of the new field opener is 1,998 feet from northwest and 1,993 feet from southwest lines of section 12, block 3, H&TC survey and 20 miles west of Crane.

That makes it one and one-half miles east of the Tucker-Waddell sand area.

**Wolfcamp DST  
Develops Oil In  
Central Howard**

A drillstem test in upper Wolfcamp lime developed 245 feet of free oil in Standford Oil & Gas Company No. 1-D TXL, west of Central Howard County, four miles south-southwest of Big Spring.

The interval tested was from 7,230 to 7,288 feet. Tool was open six hours. Gas surfaced in one hour and 30 minutes. Recovery was the 245 feet of free oil and 180 feet of slightly mud-out oil. No water was present.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was from 100 up to 175 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure after one hour was 2,300 pounds.

The project was to be drilled deeper.

A previous test in the same interval, with tool open one hour, developed 145 feet of slightly mud-out oil on the recovery. No gas or fluid surfaced.

Location is 2,194 feet from north and 690 feet from east lines of the west half of section 23, block 32, T-1-S, T&P survey.

**Three New Wells  
Finaled In Trend  
Areas Of Midland**

Three more new oilers and seven new projects have been reported for the Spraberry Trend. The new oilers were completed in Midland County, two in the Tex-Harvey field and one in the Four Corners area.

Lomax Brothers Production Company No. 2 Judkins-Walton-Limpia, 680 feet from east and south lines of section 48, block 37, T-3-S, T&P survey, and in the Tex-Harvey field, was finalized for a daily flowing potential of 390 barrels of 30-gravity oil through a one-half-inch tubing choke and from open hole at 650-7,135 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 850-1 and tubing pressure was 200 pounds.

Four Corners

In the Four Corners area of southeast Midland County, Texas Crude Company No. 1-15-D J. W. Driver, 680 feet from south and west lines of the lease in section 15, block 37, T-4-S, T&P survey, was finalized for a 24-hour flowing potential of 594 barrels of 37.3-gravity oil through a 7/16-inch tubing choke and from open hole at 7,051-7,290 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 785-1 and tubing pressure was 200 pounds.

Barnett & Rector

Barnett & Rector, No. 2-11 J. H. & L. B. Floyd, Tex-Harvey field test, was completed for a daily flowing potential of 404 barrels of 30.3-gravity oil through a one-quarter-inch tubing choke and from open hole at 7,065-7,290 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 450-1 and tubing pressure was 50 pounds. Location is 1,980 feet from east and south lines of section 11, block 37, T-3-S, T&P survey.

**UN Vole Condemns  
Soviet Pact Breach**

PARIS — (AP) — With almost half the member nations declining to vote, the UN Political Committee Tuesday condemned the Soviet Union as having failed to honor its 1945 treaty of friendship with the Chinese government of Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

The vote, 24 to 9, with 25 abstentions, came shortly after Soviet Delegate Jacob A. Malik charged that under the direction of two American generals, there is being built up in Burma a Chinese Nationalist "shock force, armed to the teeth, which at any moment can provoke aggression." The U. S. repeatedly has denied similar charges raised by the Chinese Reds. Before Malik spoke, the U. S. again had rejected such charges and implied it would not aid the Chinese Nationalists in Burma.

**Death Toll In Cairo Mounts To 67**

**City Rushes  
Improved Fire  
Combat Plans**

Plans for an extensive gridiron of water lines for fire-fighting purposes and to replace the present "very inadequate" water distribution system in the business district were being rushed to completion Tuesday by the City of Midland.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt said the program included the construction of two miles of eight-inch and 12-inch lines in the city's commercial district.

The announcement of the project came after a meeting Monday afternoon of city department heads to discuss coordination of the efforts of the fire, police and water departments in case of fires in the business area.

The meeting came on the heels of a fire which Friday afternoon gutted the building of the Mid-West Motor Company and destroyed 11 automobiles, along with hundreds of dollars worth of spare parts.

Firemen had complained their efforts in battling the fire were hampered by hundreds of spectators who crowded close to the burning building and clambered aboard the fire-fighting equipment itself to watch the excitement.

"The incident," said Oswalt, "clearly indicated the need for close coordination between the fire and police departments, along with the water department."

He explained, for instance, that when firemen attempted to make one hose connection with a plug at Wall and Colorado Streets, they found the opening so close to the sidewalk they were unable to complete the connection.

Workers have been instructed to correct this particular situation immediately, said the manager.

But the biggest need, he said, is the replacement of water distribution lines.

**Chinese Reds Hint  
At Hands-Off Policy  
On Supervising Truce**

MUNSAN, KOREA — (AP) — The Communists Tuesday hinted Red China would wash its hands of direct participation in administering a Korean armistice.

The hint was cryptic and indirect. It came during a meeting of staff officers on truce supervision at which the UN Command reported "progress was being made."

In another truce meeting, however, Reds flatly rejected an Allied plan for exchanging prisoners. The Communists promptly were told they "must contribute something" if an agreement is to be reached.

The Chinese hands-off hint was made by a North Korean during discussion of an 18-page UN program for supervising the truce. The Allied plan provided that civil administration of the Red half of a demilitarized zone would be the joint responsibility of the supreme commander of the Korean Peoples Army and the commander of the Chinese Peoples Volunteers.

North Korean Col. Chang Chun San, principal Red staff officer, asked that the word "joint" and the phrase "commander of the Chinese Peoples Volunteers" be stricken. This would leave administration of the area exclusively in the hands of North Koreans.

There was no implication that the Chinese considered withdrawing their troops during an armistice.

**Selection Of Jury  
In Welch Murder  
Trial Starts Tuesday**

PECOS — Jury selection started Tuesday morning in the murder trial of John E. Welch. A special venire of 125 members had been summoned by District Judge G. C. Olsen.

Judge Olsen set aside a ruling on the defense motion for continuance of the trial. His decision is expected by the time the jury is selected.

District Attorney Walker Means Monday asked for a second delay of the trial on the grounds that three California witnesses and one Pecoc witness, Ray Green, bus driver, were out of the state.

The defense claims Green, now a resident of Abilene, was driving a bus Jan. 24, 1951, when a man showing evidence of a fight boarded his bus with a ticket to Los Angeles.

Means contends the passenger was Welch and is attempting to prove there was a fight between Welch and Cpl. Dennis E. Miller.

Welch is charged in the slaying of Miller, who was stationed at Fort Bliss. The soldier's beaten body was found Feb. 15, 1951, in a gravel pit near Toyah. Welch reportedly had been riding with the soldier a few hours before the slaying occurred January 23 of last year.

Welch, 24, ex-Marine, was arrested in Butte, Montana, after a widespread manhunt.

Judge Olsen dismissed witnesses until Wednesday.

**13 Crewmen Leap  
To Safety Before  
Bomber Explodes**

TOKYO — (AP) — The 13-man crew of a bomb-laden U. S. B-29 parachuted safely Tuesday just before the big bomber blew up in mid-air with a force that shook parts of Tokyo like an earthquake.

The Korea-bound bomber, abandoned when it developed trouble shortly after the takeoff, disintegrated in a giant flash witnessed by thousands of homeward bound Tokyo workers.

The wreckage fell in flames in an open area south of Tokyo.

An information officer at the bomber's base said several of the 13 crewmen suffered slight injuries from jumping. The last man was reported safe almost four hours later.

The crash scene was not far from the place where a Navy Privateer patrol bomber crashed and burned three weeks ago.

**Texas' March Draft  
Call Set At 1,858**

AUSTIN — (AP) — A draft call for 1,858 Texans in March was announced Tuesday by State Selective Service.

The figure compares with 2,027 for February and 1,471 for January. Only men 20 or older will be used to fill the March call.

**Bitter Cold Eases  
Ohio Flood Threat**

MARIETTA, OHIO — (AP) — Bitter Winter weather Tuesday eased the ponderous sweep of a three-state Ohio River flood—but 7,000 still were homeless and nine were dead.

Sub-freezing temperatures caused raging Ohio River tributaries to crest 12 hours ahead of time and two to three feet below the expected top.

This reduced the flood threat to down-river communities. The Weather Bureau at Cincinnati said it was cutting down the depths it expected the Ohio to reach at cities westward toward the Mississippi River.

Authorities said hardships from the weather were not pronounced at Marietta a few hours ahead of the 44-foot crest rolling down from Wheeling, W. Va.

Marietta's 166th Infantry, Company F, Ohio National Guard, patrolled flooded downtown and residential streets to prevent looting. The guardsmen used rowboats.

The river stood at 43.6 feet early Tuesday and rose less than one-tenth of a foot an hour. Flood stage is 35 feet.

Snow flurries swirled over flood-plagued Ohio during the night and early Tuesday. The mercury stood well below freezing.

This caused the Scioto River to crest at Chillicothe 12 hours ahead of schedule at 26.75 feet. Rivermen had predicted 28 feet.

The Hocking River crested Monday night at Athens at 18.3 feet, about eight inches under the anticipated crest, and then began falling. Scores of Ohio roads still were inundated, however.

The cold weather added to general misery in the flood area.

**March Of Dimes  
Total Is \$6,000**

Still two-thirds short of the goal, Midland County's March of Dimes reached the \$6,000 mark Tuesday.

Chairman James L. Daugherty continued his appeal for contributions through the mails in citing the \$18,500 quota. The March of Dimes post office box is 3008.

Midland Mothers' March on Polio is scheduled from 6 to 7 p.m. Thursday. Midlanders were urged to give unselfishly in this porch light campaign.

**Britain Calls For  
New Imports Slash**

LONDON — (AP) — The Conservative government Tuesday declared Britain must slash her imports by another 150 million pounds (430 million dollars) a year to help head off national bankruptcy.

The cut, which comes on top of another 350 million pounds ordered two months ago, was announced by the House of Commons by Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler.

**Fire Losses  
Estimated At  
288 Millions**

CAIRO — (AP) — Five more bodies were found Tuesday in the ruins of the British Turf Club and Shepherd's Hotel, high police sources said, bringing to at least 67 the total dead in Saturday's rioting and burning by mobs.

Fire brigades still played hoses on smouldering ruins of some fires. Flames still were flaring from Shepherd's. There were no reports yet that any Americans were casualties.

**Delaney  
Draws Fine,  
Prison Term**

BOSTON — (AP) — Denis W. Delaney, ousted collector of Internal Revenue for Massachusetts, was sentenced Tuesday to two years' imprisonment and fined \$10,500 on convictions of receiving \$7,500 in bribes and falsifying that \$180,000 in tax liens had been satisfied.

Federal Judge Charles E. Wyanski, Jr., sentenced Delaney to two years in prison on each of three counts in an indictment which charged he received \$7,500 to influence tax decisions. The court ordered that the terms be served concurrently.

He also fined Delaney \$2,500 on each count—the amounts he was accused of soliciting and receiving.

The sentence also included disqualification of Delaney to "hold any position of honor and profit" in the U. S. government.

Judge Wyanski said he had no alternative but to pronounce sentence on a second indictment under which Delaney was convicted in three counts of falsifying tax liens, although he said to Delaney:

"In my view it is quite different and shows you received no advantage of any kind for signing these false certificates or that the government was damaged in any way."

He went on to fine Delaney the minimum of \$1,000 on each of these three counts and to sentence him to six months on each count, the sentences to be served concurrently with the other sentences.

He then suspended the six months' sentences.

Delaney won, in effect, a stay of sentence—pending appeals—when the judge allowed continuation of \$2,500 bail under which he has been at liberty.

**26 Draft Rejects  
Go For New Tests**

Twenty-six area men who previously were rejected as being physically unfit for service in the Army, left Midland Tuesday morning for Abilene, where they will be re-examined.

Appelled by the high rejection rate among the draftees, the Army is screening many of the men who previously were classified as 4-F.

The men were the first to leave Midland in compliance with a directive issued December 13 by national headquarters of Selective Service in Washington, D. C.

**WASHINGTON — (AP) —** The House Judiciary Committee Tuesday ordered an investigation of the administration of the Justice Department and the office of Attorney General J. Howard McGrath.

**WASHINGTON — (AP) —** A House Ways and Means subcommittee Tuesday started contempt proceedings against Henry W. Grunewald and his attorney, William Power Maloney, after Maloney was removed forcibly from a committee hearing and Grunewald, sometimes called "The Dutchman," then refused to answer a single question asked him by tax scandal investigators.

**TOKYO — (AP) —** American and Japanese officials opened negotiations Tuesday for an agreement to keep American troops in Japan after the peace treaty is signed.

**WASHINGTON — (AP) —** President Truman Tuesday sent to the Senate for confirmation the nomination of Lincoln MacVeagh, now ambassador to Portugal, to the post of ambassador to Spain. MacVeagh succeeds Stanton Griffis, who resigned last week.

**Britain Still Wants  
Accord With Egypt  
On Defense Of Suez**

LONDON — (AP) — Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden Tuesday said Britain wants to reach agreement on defense of the Suez Canal Zone which "would meet Egyptian aspirations."

The foreign secretary told the House of Commons Britain's offer to negotiate with Egypt still stands.

"I have always believed that it should be possible to find a solution of the differences between this country and Egypt which satisfies the legitimate national aspirations of the Egyptian people, and at the same time does not jeopardize the security of the free world," Eden said.

Eden came to the House of Commons from a cabinet meeting presided over by Prime Minister Churchill and devoted to the grave situation in Egypt.

International Responsibility

Egypt has been demanding the removal of British troops from the vital canal area and the placing of the Anglo-Egyptian Sudan under King Farouk's rule.

Eden said the defense of the Suez Canal zone was not "exclusively an Anglo-Egyptian interest but one in which we have an international responsibility." His statement added:

"In these last weeks there have been many violent episodes with their accompanying loss of life. Memory of them, bitter though it must be in both countries, should not prevent us from looking and working toward a better future."

Texas Hereford  
Association Board**

### Jacoby On Bridge

The approach of the Vanderbilt Cup Tournament which will begin in New York the night before Washington's birthday, reminds me of several hundred hands played in this tournament in other years. One of the most amusing of these hands played several years ago, is shown today.

West opened the deck of hearts. East put up the queen, and South won with the king. Declarer saw

enough. And now South couldn't make a second diamond trick even if he stood on his head.

The defenders had all the time in the world to develop five defensive tricks—two hearts, two diamonds, and a club. South had eight easy tricks but no play at all for a ninth.

South could have made his contract, of course, if he had played the king of diamonds from dummy on the second round of that suit. At least a dozen of his friends pointed out this fact to him at the end of the evening's play.

South's exasperated reply was a neat example of the left-handed compliment: "When they're young and pretty," he snorted, "I don't figure them to be smart too."

By the way, if you want to see exactly how smart it was to refuse the contract if East taken the queen of diamonds at once, the defenders can win two hearts and two diamonds, but they cannot stop South from developing the two diamond tricks he needs for his contract.

So South fell for the trap. He led another diamond from his hand and finessed again. This time Mrs. Hazen won with the queen, naturally

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## Midland Drive-In Theaters Find Speakers Disappearing

Midland Drive-In theater owners have reason to believe that some of their patrons are pre-occupied with business other than show business.

The reason for their concern is the disappearance of an increasing number of speakers from the theaters.

In seven months time, one of the theaters reported that it has lost more than \$400 in speakers.

Mrs. Taylor Jones, a co-owner in the Texan Drive-In theater with her son, Carroll, said they plan to post a \$50 reward soon for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the thieves.

"And a lot of times they don't even wait the speakers," Mrs. Jones said. "We have found several which were thrown out of cars between here and town."

Some people accidentally pull the speakers loose when they leave and are then ashamed to return them, she said.

"If those people who accidentally break one would just leave it on the ground, we would be more than glad to repair and replace them," she said.

She said they have tried taking license number of persons who take the speakers and have managed to catch a few this way.

Howard Hodge, owner-manager of the Chief Drive-In Theater, reports the same trouble.

"It's just malicious vandalism," he said. "Some of these kids cut them off with a knife or pliers and take off."

"We can't maintain the kind of entertainment the public demands when the vandals are constantly costing us money by destroying our property," he said.

Hodge said he, too, had plans to post a reward for information leading to the arrest of the vandals.

"The thefts are spasmodic," he said. "Sometimes we lose as many as five in one week and then we don't incur any losses for a whole week."

Speakers cost from \$12 to \$15 when they are available. However, owners report that present shortages have resulted in a scarcity of speakers and associated equipment.

Hodge said that scarcity of metal used in the speakers is so acute that the National Production Authority has banned the manufacture of them except for replacement purposes.

Both theater owners said that some people who take the speakers accidentally return them and sometimes even offer to pay for the damages.

### Ford's New Truck Line For 1952 Will Be Shown Friday

Ford's new truck line for 1952 offers the widest range of engines and power combinations in Ford Motor history, with models designed to fill 97 per cent of all modern hauling needs, according to officials of the Murray-Young Motors, Ltd., here.

The new trucks will be introduced to the public Friday.

The 1952 Ford truck line introduces a new sedan-delivery model called the "Courier" and offers five completely new high-compression, low-friction overhead valve units.

In addition to the Courier, series F-1 through F-8 Ford trucks range from light pickup units of 114-inch wheelbase and 4,700 pounds gross weight up to extra heavy-duty trucks with a maximum 195-inch wheelbase and gross combination weight ratings up to 41,000 pounds.

"In addition to the three all-new engines, the horsepower and torque of the famous Ford 239 cubic-inch V-8 and the Ford Big Six engines have been increased to complete a five-engine power package for our eight basic truck series," Ford officials said.

**Low-Friction Engines**  
The 239- V-8's horsepower was raised to 106 and its torque was increased to 194 pounds feet. The Big Six's new rating is 112 horsepower and torque of 217 pounds feet. All Ford engines are designed to operate on regular gasolines.

The three new low-friction truck engines are the Coast Clipper Six, a 101-horsepower unit, and the new Cargo King 145-horsepower and 135-horsepower V-8's.

All regular truck units are available with 5-Star cabs or with 5-Star Extra cabs which feature such extras as foam rubber seat padding, insulated headlining, key locks on both doors, cigar lighter, dome light with automatic door switches, arm rests and interior insulation.

### U. S. Trades Atom Data With Canadians

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States has given some hitherto secret atomic information to Canada and has received some in return under an arrangement declared "beneficial" to the United States.

Chairman Gordon Dean of the U. S. Atomic Energy Commission, announcing this late Monday, did not disclose the nature of the information given by either country.

He said only that "it's classified 'secret'" and "within an area" of atomic development.

But there are grounds for speculation the United States may be getting new details on Canada's unique "heavy water" atomic reactor—a device which conceivably could be the model for explosives-producing reactors now in prospect at the projected American H-bomb plant.

American atomic experts publicly have rated the Canadian device as the "most advanced" in design and performance among all known reactors.

And, while the Canadians say their present reactor can not make plutonium—an A-bomb explosive—"production" quantities, the Canadians have claimed plutonium can be produced at a faster rate from a given amount of uranium in a reactor of the "heavy water" type than it can be produced in reactors employing graphite in conjunction with the uranium.

American reactors for producing plutonium employ graphite instead of "heavy water."

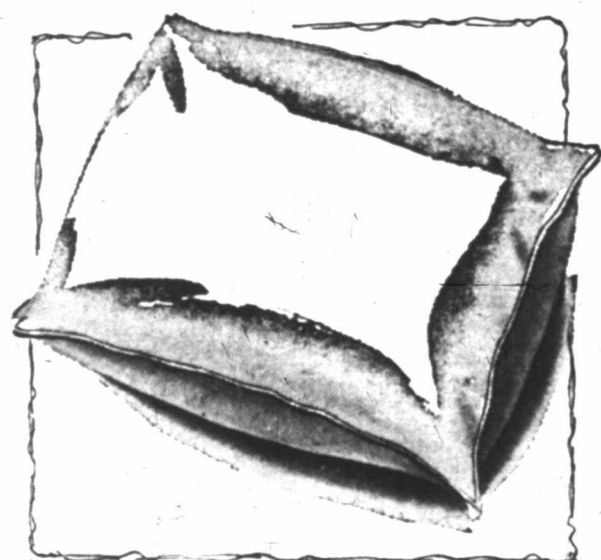

Some Democrats Think Change Is Due, Even If It Means Four Years Of Taft

WASHINGTON (NEA)—Some prominent Washington Democrats—former New Deal officials now in private life—are saying privately to each other that the Truman Administration ought to be relieved of power and retired in the coming election.

They say this even though it might mean having to take four years of Taft.

Reasons given are that the Democrats now in office are puny and tired. They've been in office too long. A new broom and a thorough housecleaning are in order.

In time the changes would work to the advantage of the Democratic Party as a whole.

Four years out of power would allow a number of the old fossils in the party to retire quietly from public life.

Newer, fresher and younger men would step up to take their places.

They think an invigorated party would emerge to sweep back into power in 1956, and carry on the traditional program of the party of Jefferson, Jackson, Wilson and Franklin Roosevelt.

They May Not Like This Dr. E. U. Condon, former director of the National Bureau of Standards, is writing a book, "I Was Investigated." It will ridicule many of the procedures used by loyalty investigators in probing Dr. Condon's past.

Churchill's Gallant Gesture There is nothing the matter with Prime Minister Winston Churchill's eyesight. He showed this as he entered the Mayflower Hotel banquet room to speak off-the-record to more than a thousand press and radio correspondents in a luncheon meeting.

Is Statehood Nearer? High priority given the Hawaii and Alaska statehood bills in the new Congress is due to a commitment made by Senate Majority Leader Ernest W. McFarland of Arizona, plus pressure by Vice President Alben W. Barkley.

When he passed Vera Clay, Newsweek correspondent, the prime minister stopped and smiled. "She was dressed in a gray suit, with a bright red Scotch plaid tam and matching scarf."

With her blonde hair falling over her shoulders she made a striking and pretty picture that would make

any prime minister look twice. But it obviously fussed Vera and she blushed.

She was even more fussed when the gallant Winnie stooped, picked up her napkin which had fallen to the floor as she had risen from her chair, and handed it back to her with a big smile. The crowd cheered and Vera turned as red as her tam.

Later, her colleagues kidded her a little bit and asked her for her life story, to be titled, "I Dropped My Hanky at Winnie's Feet." But she swears she didn't do it on purpose, and that it was an accident.

Who Represented Whom? E. N. Rousseau, Washington representative of Olin Industries, has called attention to an error in a item appearing recently in this column. It said that Washington lawyer Thomas G. Corcoran represented Olin in its application for government approval to build an aluminum plant. Rousseau denies that Corcoran ever represented Olin.

Secretary of Interior Oscar W. Chapman says, however, that both Corcoran and his law partner, James H. Rowe, Jr., visited his office and told him that they represented Olin in seeking approval for an allocation of government power to be used in the manufacture of aluminum.

Rowe explains for himself and Corcoran that they were representing a Montana group primarily. At one stage in the negotiations, they tried to get Olin, Apex Smelting of Chicago and a New York group together in applying for the power. But they could not meet the economic requirements, so the deal was dropped.

Hawaii already has adopted its "state" constitution. There has been some talk in the islands of going ahead and electing their two senators and one representative, this November, even though Congress hadn't as yet voted their statehood.

Four other states—Michigan, Tennessee, Oregon and California took matters into their own hands in this way when Congress was dilly-dallying over admitting them to the Union.

Statehood bills are not expected to have much trouble in the Senate. Republican Senator Hugh Butler of Nebraska, who had opposed admitting Hawaii on the grounds that Communists had control of the island labor unions, reportedly has been satisfied that the situation has improved. Both statehood bills passed the House last year.

Alaska doesn't have a state constitution yet, and whether it could adopt one in time to take part in November elections is doubtful, even after Congress approves statehood. When both Hawaii and Alaska are admitted, the U. S. Senate will have an even 100 members, the House 437.

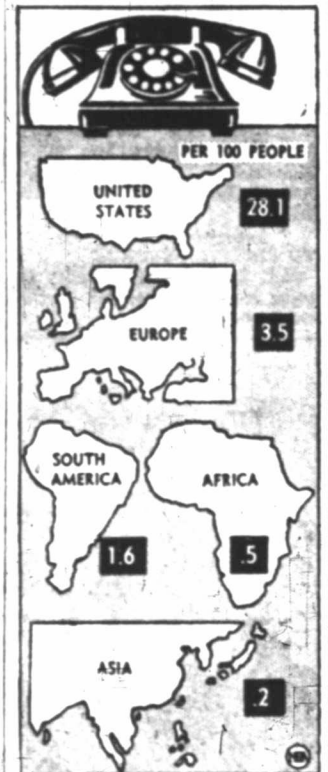

### Couple Confesses Slaying Young Child For Refusal To Pray

WINNIPEG, MANITOBA—(AP)—Police Monday night read a statement to a jury in which a middle-aged couple said they beat and strangled their seven-year-old foster daughter to death because she mocked God and refused to pray.

"Now she's safe in the arms of the Lord," the statement given city police by Gavin McCullough, 51, said.

McCullough, former office manager of the Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce, and his wife, Lillian, 52, have been charged with murder. They were arrested Friday after the body of the child, Martha Louise, was found lying among an assortment of religious pamphlets in the McCullough suburban home.

After the killing, police said, the couple went to a vacant lot and, in sub-zero weather, prayed all night. McCullough said they were waiting "for the coming of God, who was going to establish a second kingdom in Winnipeg."

Neither the man nor his wife, who had adopted the child when she was three months old, appeared at the inquest. Mrs. McCullough was transferred Sunday to the psychiatric ward of the Winnipeg General Hospital after guards reported her "hard to handle."

Husband's statement in the statement read at the inquest, gave this account of the slaying.

He and his wife were praying when the little girl entered the room. They asked her to join them in prayer. She smiled and paid no attention.

Mrs. McCullough slapped the child and struck her with a cleaning fluid bottle. Then the woman gave the child a notch higher in the peering than his present title.

## Wemple Praises Integrity, Loyalty Of Highway Employees

Loyal and devoted employees of the Texas Highway Department Tuesday had a heavy pat on the back from Midland's Fred Wemple, who gave them the credit for a system recognized as the best in the nation.

The state highway commissioner reviewed the 33-year history of the department in connection with Highway Appreciation Week and found integrity, faithfulness and spirit more than sufficient to overcome handicaps such as limited funds.

More than 40,000 miles of highways are now maintained by the department, including only 200 unpaved. Farm-to-market highways total 21,000 miles.

Yet this massive program is carried on over great distances and through sparsely settled areas with only two cents net per gallon from the gasoline tax.

The national average is five cents and six cents in some states. Wemple pointed out "This means we get less than half of what most states derive from the gasoline tax for highway construction and main-

tenance." The Texas System is cited as a model by the Bureau of Public Roads in Washington, which must approve all projects receiving federal expenditures for roads. In its comparatively short history, the department has had three presidents of the American Association of State Highway Officials. They were Gibbs Gilchrist, Brady Gentry and D. C. Greer, present state highway engineer. Wemple broke down the financial picture further to emphasize the splendid job performed by his department.

The highway system operates on a cash basis. There are no bonds on which to pay interest. Contractors do not have to see certain persons in exerting influence to better their positions. Bids are opened on specific dates and money is available to pay contractors as a project progresses.

"This brings lower bids and results in a saving," Wemple showed. High-Caliber Men

Such a business-like operation has resulted through the years from leadership which came in for the

highest praise from Wemple.

"The integrity of the commission attracts high-caliber men, who serve unselfishly and conscientiously," Wemple assured. "No political pressure is exerted and they act in good faith and for the best interests of the state."

Texas also has had the finest highway engineers, said Wemple, a former president of the Texas Good Roads Association.

The highway departments gets \$120,000,000 yearly from all sources. With \$41,000,000 designated by the Legislature for new farm-to-market roads, only \$46,000,000 may be used for light and heavy maintenance and engineers figure it costs \$5 per mile per year to maintain Texas roads. Urban expressways for relieving traffic pressure points are allotted \$6,000,000.

"This leaves only \$27,000,000 for maintaining the primary highways, or the main trunk of the system, which carry 71 per cent of the state's traffic."

Since World War II, the highway department has built 20,000 miles of

farm-to-market roads, Wemple reported.

### Four-Lane Highways

Engineers recommend for economy and safety reasons that four-lane highways be built to accommodate stretches carrying more than 4,000 vehicles daily.

"We have 1,000 miles of road with such traffic where four lanes should be built," the commissioner said.

The Odessa-Midland highway now carries 14,500 vehicles daily, more than the Fort Worth-Dallas Thoroughfare.

E. H. Thornton, Jr. is chairman of the Highway Commission, which includes R. H. Potts of Harlingen and Wemple. The Midland good roads champion has one more year to serve and he isn't seeking reappointment, which would set a precedent for recent years.

Wemple realizes the current needs of the highway department. He knows 12 1/2 per cent of the 16,000-mile primary road total in Texas has passed its normal 20-year life expectancy and that fully half is more than 10 years old. Ten per cent of the bridges in the primary system are too weak to hold legal loads and half either are too narrow or spanned too low to accommodate modern traffic.

But Midland's Fred Wemple is grateful for the department's 9,000 employees and the excellent job done despite limitations.

For Fred Wemple, it's Highway Appreciation Week—not as he put it, "Highway Apprehension Week."

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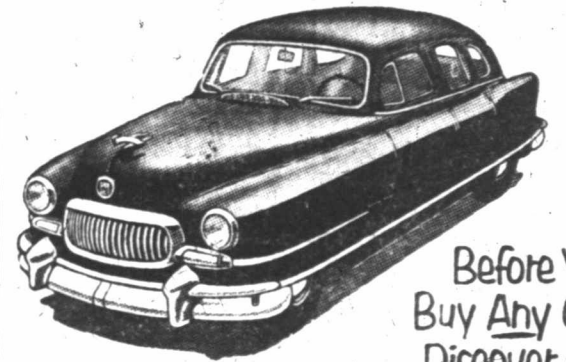

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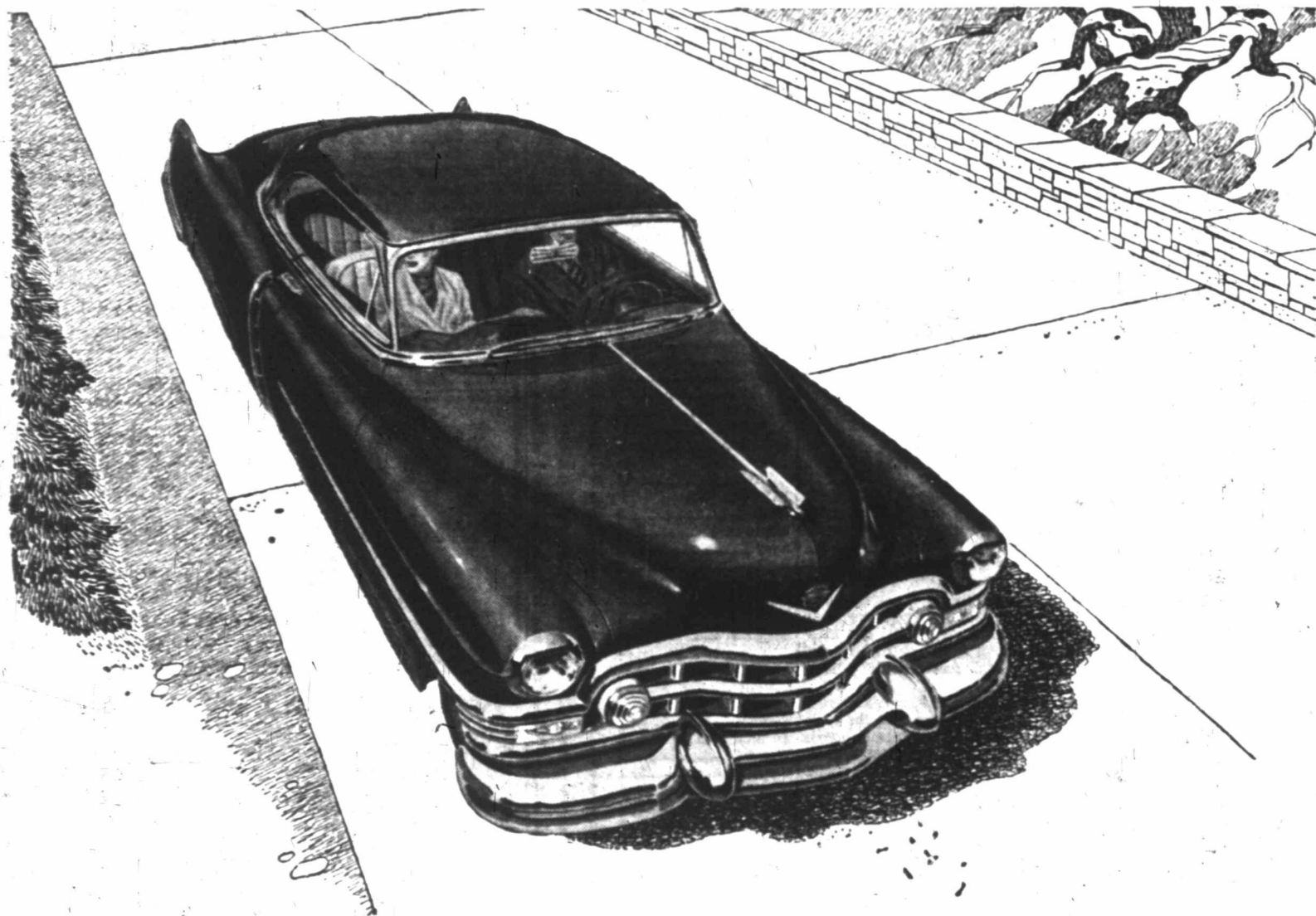

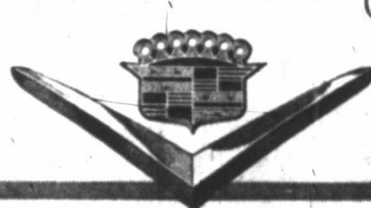

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# Kentucky Rated Top Hoop Outfit; K-State Is Second

NEW YORK—(P)—Kentucky climbed into the No. 1 spot in the weekly Associated Press basketball poll Tuesday—but the Wildcats had only narrow margins over Kansas State and Illinois.

Adolph Rupp's bluegrass quintet totaled 790 points to 755 for Kansas State and 745 for third-place Illinois. These three were far out front. Fourth-place Kansas had 523 points and fifth-place St. Bonaventure, one of the two major undefeated teams left, had 457.

Kentucky, which was on top in two of the first three polls of the season, lured 32 first-place votes from the nation's sports writers and sports casters. Each first-place vote counted 10 points, second place nine, and so on down the line.

Rounding out the first 10, in order, were St. Louis, Dequesne (the other undefeated team) with a 12-0 mark, Iowa, Washington and West Virginia.

The most impressive jump was made by Kansas State, which was seventh a week ago. The K-Staters Saturday hung the first defeat of the season on Kansas, which had been in the No. 1 or 2 spot for four straight weeks. The Jayhawks, incidentally, got only one first place vote.

The first 10 took a real scrambling. In fact, the only school to hold the same spot it held a week ago was St. Bonaventure, No. 5. Illinois, on top of the heap last Saturday, also tasted its first defeat.

Dequesne, which jumped from the No. 10 position, made its record 12-0 Monday night by whipping Villanova, 83-61. The Illini (12-1) trounced Purdue, 84-57, and Kentucky (15-2) defeated Vanderbilt, 86-51, in the only games involving first 10 teams.

Seton Hall jumped to the chief threatening spot this week, holding down the No. 11 post, which was

given up by Holy Cross, now No. 17.

Don't look now, as they always say in spots like this, but a third major league may be growing up out on the West Coast.

It's no secret the Pacific Coast League long has desired to play on an equal basis with the big boys, and it has been refused since the memory of man runneth not to the contrary.

The last bid to gain major league status was a failure too. Or was it? Actually, the majors denied the Pacific loop the right to say "I'm a big boy now," but the PCL daddies are giggling behind their catchers mitts because they finally received some measure of solace from the fact they were advanced to an "open" classification.

What does this mean? Well, for one thing it means the PCL has taken the first, if short and unsteady, toddling step toward eventual big league baseball. It also means a lot of changes will be made in that league's brand of play and in its dealings with the major leagues.

First off, just what is the open classification? It's a league higher than triple A ball and one step below the majors. A league may become eligible for open classification by: six of its eight teams approving; abolishing salary limits; averaging a total attendance of 2,250,000 for five years next preceding application and having cities with an aggregate of 10,000,000 and a combined park capacity of at least 120,000.

Certain benefits may be gained by the open teams. There a player may be retained for five years, instead of four, before being subject to draft and he has the right to waive that selection privilege if he desires. And, if a player is drafted, the drafting club must pay \$15,000 for him instead of \$10,000, and if that player is not kept, the club from which he was drafted pays but \$7,500 to reacquire him. Open classification clubs have first choice in the draft after the American and National Leagues, too.

After being in the open class, the leagues may advance to the majors by showing an aggregate population of 150,000,000; each park must have a potential minimum of 25,000 capacity and the league an average paid attendance of 3,500,000 for three years prior to application. The schedule must be a balanced one of 154 or more games. The same minimum salary agreement now enforced in the major leagues would have to be adopted, as well as other technical requirements.

Thus, it's easy to see the PCL loop can't just decide in a couple of years to declare itself a major league and then do so.

But, baseball veterans say the Pacific League can become a major league within five years. Others say 10 years, but almost everyone is agreed it may be accomplished by at least that time.

Which isn't too bad, considering it has taken the league much longer than that to advance to its present open status.

The PCL expects to "grow" and develop its own talent. Farm clubs will be established where the coming PCL stars will be trained and tutored. That means good baseball, and in turn, that means an advancement. And there's no place to go but up.

Perhaps, in a few years, the PCL team will defeat the very clubs which denied it admittance to major league status.

It's possible, at least. Remember, the National League once scorned the American League, too.

To the good people of McCamey: You'll probably be pleased with the new McCamey football coach, Ray Pope, the old SMU star. We saw Pope's Mineral Wells team play here in 1950, and they put on a good show.

Badly outweighed, the Mineral Wells eleven lost, 20 to 2. But Pope's boys featured a flashy attack which brought victories against teams it could meet on an equal weight and experience footing. He may bring McCamey out of the football doldrums.

So Sweetwater now is set for the 1952 season. For the first time since the Longhorn League was formed, the Swatters figure to contend for the title.

That's good. The loop should be at its best ever this coming season. By the way—got your box seats?

## Skip Alexander Honored By Scribes

PHILADELPHIA—(P)—Stewart (Skip) Alexander thanked "borrowed courage" and the marvels of modern medicine for the privilege of being alive to receive the Philadelphia sports writers accolade as "Most Courageous Athlete of 1951." 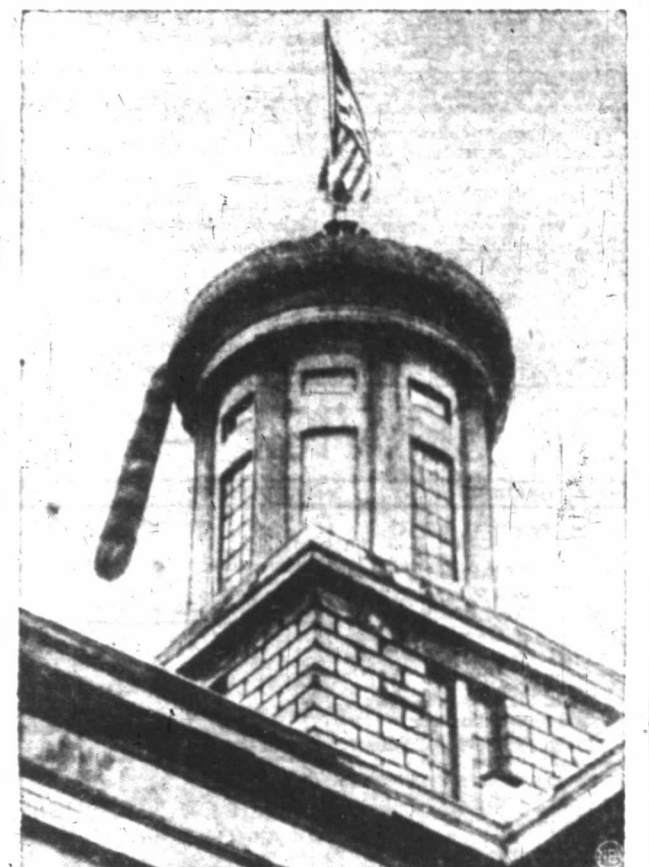

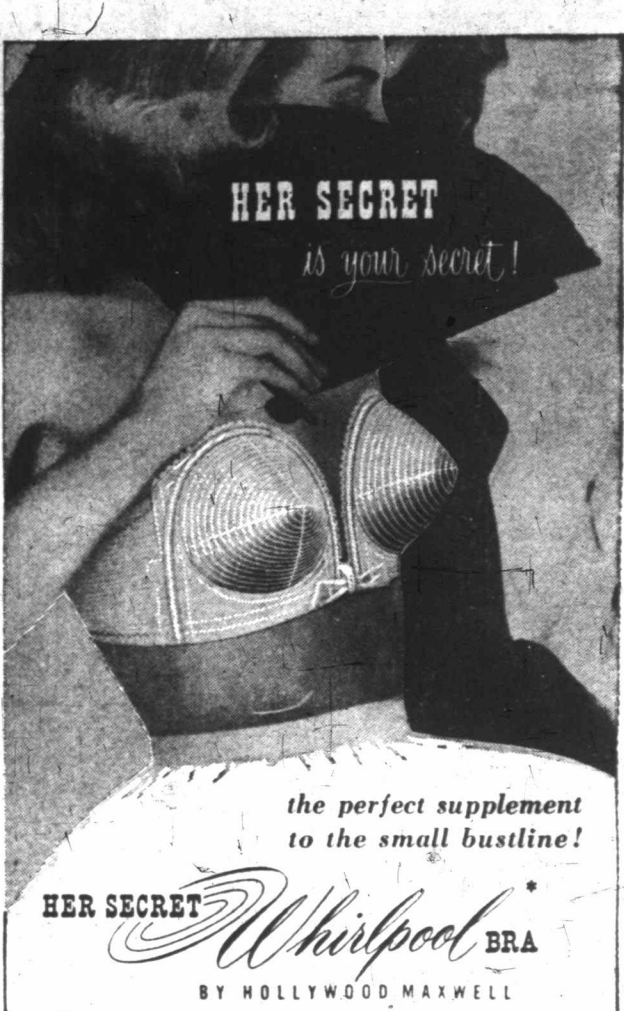

**General Lutes To Retire Wednesday**  
SAN ANTONIO —P— A mammoth spectacle of modern military pageantry Wednesday will end 35 years of soldiering at Fort Sam Houston for Lt. Gen. LeRoy Lutes.

The confidante of cabinet members, military leaders and the expert of supply and logistics will be accorded a 15-gun salute as he steps out of active military service on Arthur MacArthur field.

General Lutes, who has not announced his future plans, will be succeeded by Lt. Gen. William B. Hoge, recent commanding general of the IX Corps in Korea. General Hoge is expected at Fourth Army headquarters about February 10.

Internationally known for his knowledge of supply and logistics, General Lutes was director of plans and operations, Army Service Forces, during World War II.

Later he was deputy chief of staff to General Somervell and then succeeded Somervell as commander of Army Service Forces.

**MacArthur Charged With Back-Handed Slap At Eisenhower**  
WASHINGTON —P— Senator Toby (R-NH) Tuesday labeled remarks by General MacArthur calling for experienced civil leadership a "left-handed slap" at General Eisenhower but said they "won't keep Ike from being elected president."

Senator Brewster (R-Main) interpreted MacArthur's remarks as a strong indication of his support of Senator Taft of Ohio for the Republican presidential nomination.

Toby is backing Eisenhower for the GOP nomination. Brewster is a Taft supporter.

They commented in separate interviews on MacArthur's statement Monday that in selecting a national leader the voters face a demand for a man with demonstrated capability in "the science of civil government."

MacArthur made the statement in a letter to New Hampshire supporters asking that his name be withdrawn from the state's March 11 presidential primary, the first in the nation this year.

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R. B. Cowden was named secretary-treasurer of the company, succeeding Ulmer.
