Mar-Tex Stakes 5,500-Foot Test In Nolan Area

Mar-Tex Realization Corporation of Dallas will start drilling at once on a 5,500-foot wildcat in North-Central Nolan County. It will be drilled as No. 1 Boothe on a 480-acre tract, 330 feet from south and 362 feet from east lines of the southwest quarter of section 76, block 22, T&P survey.

New Depth Slated For Craig Wildcat In Andrews Sector

E. M. Craig, Jr., No. 1 S. Addie Bradford, wildcat in Northwest Andrews County, failed to find shows of production in drilling to 7,000 feet, and has re-contracted for a new destination of 9,500 feet. Operator was preparing to drill ahead below 7,000 feet when it was found that the formation was the new 9,500 foot depth is calculated to take the project into the Devonian. The closest production from that formation is in the Fullerton-multipay field two and one-half miles to the northeast.

Ellenburger Is To Be Tested By Magnolia At No. 1 Klapproth

The producing ability of the Ellenburger is to be tested in North-east-Central Midland County by Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 C. L. Klapproth. This wildcat, two miles south of the southeast side of the city of Midland, is a one location west offset to the opener and lone producer in the Baumann-Pennsylvanian field.

Magnolia No. 1 Klapproth was barren in the zone from which the Baumann well is producing. It is now drilling below 12,900 feet in the Devonian. That formation was topped at 11,818 feet. Elevation is 2,787 feet. It has not logged any shows of oil or gas in the Devonian. Operator has filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting a permit to continue drilling to a possible bottom of 13,000 feet. The project will go to that depth unless it finds and tests the Ellenburger at a higher level. Location is 660 feet from south and 467 feet from east lines of section 14, block 38, T-2-S, T&P survey. Churchill told the House of Commons the whole question was discussed among Britain, the United States and other governments with forces in Korea before he went to visit President Truman.

U. S. Casualties In Korea Reach 105,001

The Defense Department's weekly summary, based on notifications to families through last Friday, reported 219 killed in action, 293 wounded and a decrease of 55 in the number reported missing.

O'Leary, 36, is losing weight because of his restricted diet and the fact that he can retain food only 20 minutes. He thus receives little nourishment from the little he can eat.

His diet: Toast and hot water for breakfast; peas or carrots and hot water for lunch; peas, carrots and toast for dinner.

Two hundred doctors and 20,000 letters suggesting remedies have failed to help him.

Jean Peters Has Had Her Fill Of Those Down-To-Earth Parts

HOLLYWOOD—Guys and Dolls: Jean Peters is groaning over the muddy rut she's wallowing in as Hollywood's most begrimed actress.

She was an untidy girl pirate in "Asses of the Indies," a primitive Mexican woman in "Zazou" and now she's dripping brackish water from her buckskin costume in "Cry of the Swamp."

"People start looking at you coldly, as if you were a piece of beef," Jean told me.

"I get into makeup in the morning. With other actresses it's pin-curls and stuff. With me it's 'dirty up her hair, throw oil on her face and let's go.'"

She admits she asked for a chance to play down-to-earth parts, but "the studio got carried away. A little temperance, please. Sooner or later, they're going to have me swinging vines."

Hollywood's seventh ranking money-making star on the exhibitor poll conducted by the Motion Picture Herald confesses he'd be right happy to put his nag in the stable, and make love to a mighty movie queen again!

"I'm talking about sagebrush favorite Randolph Scott, topped as a boxoffice magnet only by—and in the order named—John Wayne, Martin and Lewis, Betty Grable, Abbott and Costello, Bing Crosby and Bob Hope.

"It's been a long time since Irene Dunne coaxed Randy out of a Zane Grey series at Paramount to play the heir to a fancy gown shop in "Roberta," but he told me on the "Man With a Gun" set. "I enjoy working with movie queens."

"It's a chance to bask in reflected glory. When an actor switches to westerns, it's not always voluntary. I'd have to get a new dress suit, though. The moths got into the one I owned."

Carla Wynn's Patient
Alas and alack. Shapely, dark-eyed Carla Balenda won't be bulldozed with plunging necklines, knives in her hands, or Robert Mitchum gazing at her.

Carla walked out of her RKO contract a few months ago to freelance and explained why she stepped out of the line that would have led her to stardom on the "Outlaw Women" set.

"An actress who isn't given parts is like a typist without her typewriter," she said. "You go crazy. I wanted to work, but I wasn't getting pictures."

"Age is very important to an actress. I don't want to wait around and work 10 years from now. I want to work now."

Faith Domergue, I commented, had waited for years as a Howard Hughes contract player. Snapped Carla.

"I haven't her patience."

Start worrying, Robert Taylor, Errol Flynn and Robert Mitchum. Sheldon Leonard comes in on the lover-boy racket in "Decision."

It's a complete switch for the dark-visaged, glowing actor, who's been giving out with the "dese, dem and dese" lingo in gangster roles for years, and has never uttered anything more affectionate than "dump him in the river," on the screen.

Now Sheldon's crushing Ann Richards in his arms and saying that

"the secret of playing a love scene is really to want the girl. You hypnotize yourself into believing she's the most desirable woman in the world."

"You don't worry how you're going to look on the screen and if she's getting lipstick on you. You just want her. It comes over and the sparks fly."

"Actors wear masks. You unmask them and find talent that hasn't been touched."

So Batami Schneider says, talking about her work in making Olivia De Havilland and Laurence Olivier out of actors.

An actress herself and the wife of famed director Benno Schneider, Batami uses the group system advocated by Stanislavski at her studio but claims: "I'm not a dramatic coach. There isn't a word for what I do."

"It's improvisation," she explains. "I give them the outline of a story and they act it out, making up their own lines."

Her capsule comments on some famous stars:

Diana Lynn—"This experienced actress was petrified at doing improvisations. I told her she wasn't an ingenue. She worked hard and her temperament and warmth came to the surface."

Farley Granger—"He'd be a fine actor if he would work and really be serious."

Virginia Mayo—"She was kind of reserved. She couldn't break down emotionally. Now she knows how."

Piper Laurie—"She came to me knowing nothing. But her talent was a natural one."

Court Wipes Out Second Marriage Of POW's 'Widow'

ATLANTA—(AP)—Pvt. Walter B. Dixon, an "Enoch Arden" of the Korean war, is alive, a judge ruled Tuesday, and annulled the second marriage of his pretty, blonde wife.

Judge E. E. Andrews of Fulton County Superior Court voided Mrs. Agnes Dixon Sasser's marriage to Pfc. William Sasser after deciding that Dixon, first reported killed in Korean fighting, actually is a prisoner of the Chinese Communists.

Mrs. Dixon asked for the annulment after receiving a letter from Dixon January 2. She told the court Defense Department experts confirmed that a letter she exhibited was written by the husband she once believed dead.

The 22-year-old blonde, a civilian employe at Fort McPherson, near Atlanta, last September married Sasser, a soldier stationed at the fort. Dixon was reported killed in May, 1951.

Sasser Steps Aside
Mrs. Dixon received the first word that her husband was alive when the Communists published a prisoner-of-war list shortly before Christmas.

Sasser, who previously said he would step aside if Dixon were found alive, was not in court. Mrs. Dixon, who had refused to discuss her plight after the first shock of learning her husband was a prisoner, offered no comment after the decision.

She gave the court a telegram from the Defense Department which changed her husband's status from "killed in action" to "prisoner of war."

No mention was made in Tuesday's court action of the reason for the original error in reporting Dixon killed in action.

Mrs. Dixon has received \$10,000 insurance on the life of her first husband.
