Spraberry Shows Logged In Upton Wildcat Explorer

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 3-A American Republics, wildcat in Northwest Upton County, two and one-half miles southeast of Ellenburger production in the Pegasus-multipay field, found interesting shows of oil on core from the lower Spraberry.

It was taken from 8,531 to 8,581 feet. The section from 8,538 to 8,543 and the section from 8,576 to 8,580 feet was bleeding oil.

Operator was drilling below 8,617 feet at last report.

The project is operating on a permit to drill to around 10,700 feet for tests of the Pennsylvanian.

Location is 662 feet from south and 689 feet from east lines of section 8, block 40, T-5-S, T&P survey.

Gauge Is Reported On Buffalo Opener In C-W Lea Area

Buffalo Oil Company No. 12-B Balfour, flowing discovery from the Devonian in the shallow Maljamar field of Central-West Lea County, is bottomed at 13,573 feet flowing through open two-inch tubing to test.

During the last three hours gauged, the new pay opener flowed 22 barrels of fluid per hour. It was 91 per cent 48-gravity oil and nine per cent fresh water. Operator believes approximately half of the water lost in the formation while drilling plugs has been recovered.

Operator will continue to flow the discovery until it is cleaned up, then take potential test and put on regular production. The project is not making any gas.

The flow is coming from open hole section at 13,554-13,573 feet. Location is 1,960 feet from south and 880 feet from west lines of section 22-17s-32e.

Murchison, Fikes Take Over Wildcat In Yoakum Sector

J. W. Murchison and Leland Fikes, both of Dallas, will drill to 11,500 feet for a test of the Devonian after taking over the operation of Magnolia No. 1 Mattie Neely, wildcat in South-Central Yoakum County.

Magnolia started out to drill the test to the San Andres. Location is 560 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 604, block D, John H. Gibson survey, that puts it two miles southwest of the West-San Andres field and four miles north of the Wasson pool.

The test has been spudded and surface pipe set at 325 feet.

Book On Midland County Oil Issued

A new reference book for the oil industry, "Midland County Oil," has been published by Petroleum News Corporation, a Midland, Texas, publisher.

Fisher Stepout Gets More Oil Pay In Reef

More pay has been penetrated at the second exploration to enter the reef line in the Claytonville-Canyon field of Southwest Fisher County.

General Crude Oil Company No. 2 Mrs. G. T. Webb tested at 3,471-3,521 feet. The tool was open one hour. Gas surfaced in three and one-half minutes. No oil came to the top while the tool was open.

Recovery was 1,140 feet of clean oil and 300 feet of muddy water.

More Oil Shows

The project then cored at 5,522-72 feet. Recovery was 15 feet of hard lime with slight shows of oil and 13 feet of soft lime with good oil shows. Another drillstem test is to be run.

This development had previously flowed oil in a drillstem test at 5,460-75 feet.

It topped the Canyon reef at 5,460-75 feet.

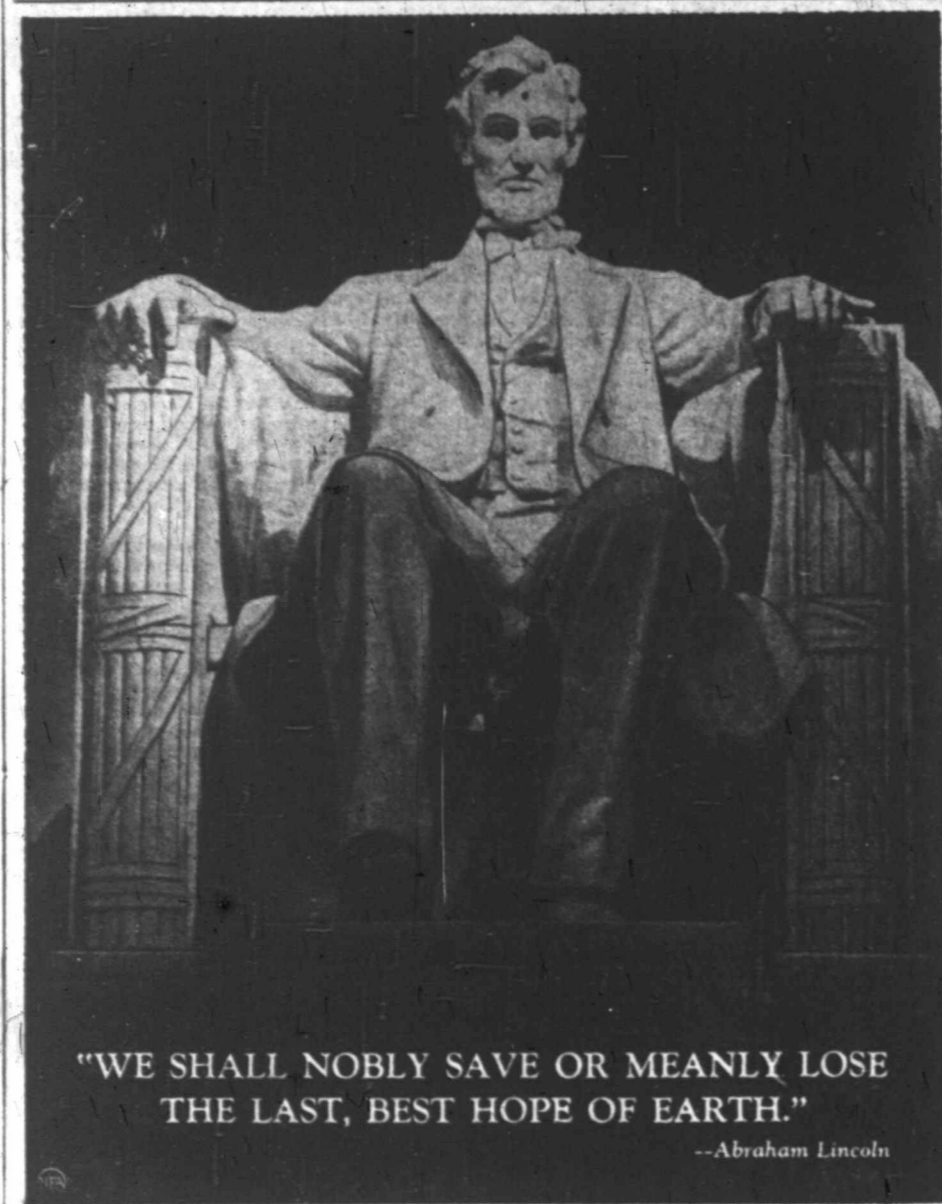

Texas Voters Face Four-Way Squeeze As Precinct Conventions Draw Nearer

AUSTIN —(P)—The Texas voter is in the middle of a four-way pull as the date for precinct conventions draws nearer.

The Shivers Democrats have him by the right arm.

The Loyal Democrats are hauling on his left arm.

The Taft Republicans are clinging to his right leg.

The Eisenhower Republicans have tackled his left leg.

So far this pressure is being exerted equally and many voters are not yet aware of it. This correspondent found a wide variation of the extent of pre-convention organizing on a tour of 32 west, central and northeast counties.

Very few of the 83 persons contacted during this seven-day sving through a vast mid-section of the state had been urged to attend precinct conventions. Most of the "average voters" in that cross-section did not realize, faintly or fully, that these conventions give them their only direct chance to speak their minds in choosing party presidential nominees.

The professional politicians, of course, were highly alert to the meaning this year of the presidential precinct conventions.

They already were compiling lists of precinct chairmen and otherwise

11 Area Men Face Induction In March

Eleven men will be inducted into the Armed Forces from this area in March, according to an announcement made Tuesday by Mrs. Nell Roberts, clerk of Local Board 137.

WASHINGTON—(P)—Representative Sabath (D-Ill) quoted President Truman Tuesday as saying he may be willing to make the "sacrifice" and seek reelection if he feels it will be necessary to speed the peace.

FORT WORTH—(P)—Robert Hugh Barber, Jr., 26, was indicted Tuesday and ordered held without bond on charges of murdering City Detective Henry E. Cleveland Thursday. The grand jury took no action on the murder charge filed against Mrs. Doris Faye Barber, 21, in connection with the slaying.

LUBBOCK—(P)—The Air Force will make a "complete investigation" of the case of Maj. George A. Davis, Jr., Rep. George H. Mahon (D-Texas) told the Lubbock Evening Journal by telephone Tuesday afternoon.

High Winds, Hail Batter State, But Drouth Continues

Dark, heavy clouds that promised good rains brought only damaging hail, high winds and light showers to North Central Texas Monday as the state's drouth-caused problems multiplied.

Wind and hail hit suburban points north of Dallas to cause enough damage to offset any good received from widespread rain showers over Texas.

Damage as high as \$50,000 was estimated for the Carrollton locality when high winds, rain and hail struck. Temporary buildings were toppled, roofs were damaged, and auto tops, window panes and street lights suffered.

Lewisville, in Denton County, had damage from wind and hail that also ripped car tops, tree limbs and television antennae at Richardson and near Garland in Dallas County, Muenster in Cooke County, and in nearby rural communities.

East Texas Gets Rain

A lumber shed was blown down at Muenster.

Muenster had 1.57 inches of rain during a hail, wind and rain storm.

In East Texas, Palestine recorded 1.48 inches. Tyler had .57, Texarkana .32 and Lufkin .91.

A severe electric storm interrupted telephone and light service in scattered Marshall areas and dumped 2.14 inches of rain on the city.

Lightning put radio KMTT's transmitter at Marshall out at 6:45 p.m. Repairs had not been completed by mid-morning Tuesday. The city's drainage system was clogged at several low points, causing some street and road damage.

A hard hailstorm and rain hit Chatfield, near Corsicana, and damaged roofs. A two-inch rain was reported at Embury in Navarro County and one bridge was washed out at Tupelo in the county. (Continued On Page 10)

Vernon Grand Jury No-Bills Stepfather Of Bludgeoned Child

VERNON—(P)—The stepfather of little Tommie Yates, four, beaten unconscious Christmas Eve, has been no-billed by a grand jury and released from jail.

The stepfather, Robert Dale Simpson, 23, had been charged with assault with intent to murder in the beating.

Late Monday afternoon, a 46th District Court grand jury no-billed him, indicating insufficient evidence to warrant an indictment.

Simpson's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Dan Simpson, King City, Mo., were here, and he plans to return to his Missouri home with them.

His wife—Tommie's mother, 21—pleaded guilty to charges of assault with intent to murder in the beating and now is serving a 10-year prison sentence.

Young Tommie was taken to Baylor Hospital in Dallas, where he has undergone brain surgery. Attendants said Tuesday there was "no change" in his condition.

"He's a real dude, now," one official said. "He's gotten a lot of cowboy clothes and gets up in a wheelchair occasionally."

Tommie still is partially paralyzed on his right side and still is unable to talk, although he makes sounds, trying mightily hard to say something.

Sam Baugh Named Associate Coach At Hardin-Simmons

ABILENE—(P)—Sammy Baugh will be associate coach at Hardin-Simmons University here but the veteran pro footballer says his obligations to the Washington Redskins will come first.

Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, Hardin-Simmons president, Tuesday announced the former Texas Christian University star had been hired as associate coach.

At his Rotan ranch, the 36-year-old passer said:

"I'm going to help them with their Spring training. I won't be on salary. Hardin-Simmons is near my home, it's a West Texas school, and I like that."

Baugh said Hardin-Simmons begins Spring training Monday "and I'll be over there maybe Tuesday."

City Council Hopeful Shy, Says Hudman

Where, oh where, are the candidates?

The deadline for filing for the City Council was only 15 days away Tuesday.

And City Secretary J. C. Hudman looked up expectantly at every visitor who entered his office, but none of them were there for that reason.

"It's getting close to the deadline," explained Hudman, "and usually, by this time, the candidates begin showing up."

There are two vacancies to be filled at the April 1 city election with the terms of Councilmen J. W. McMillen and Jack Wilkinson expiring. Both have stated they will not seek reelection.

Candidates for the office must have the following qualifications:

They must be qualified voters. They must be citizens of the United States. They must be property-owning taxpayers. They must not owe the city any money.

Case Of Lost Lubbock Ace Stirs Dispute

FIFTH AIR FORCE, KOREA—(P)—An Air Force spokesman Tuesday defended the policy of keeping all jet pilots—including aces—in Korea until they have finished their normal tour of 100 combat missions.

That was the Air Force stand on the controversy that has raged since Maj. George A. Davis, Jr., was shot down Sunday. Davis had destroyed 11 MIG's and three Red bombers in 59 missions.

The spokesman said Davis was a hero, but that statements that he should have been sent home were likely to make him a figure of controversy instead.

The first three American jet pilots to become aces in the Korean war were returned to the U. S. after their fifth kill. Five kills make a pilot an ace.

The three are Capt. James Jabara of McKinney, Texas; Capt. Ralph D. Gibson of Mount Carmel, Ill., and Capt. Richard D. Becker of Fleetwood, Pa., and Fort Monroe, Va.

"We Lose So Many"

In Lubbock, Texas, Mrs. Davis said her husband should have been sent home the same as the first three.

She said Davis recently wrote her, "Things can't go on like they are. We lose so many planes and so many men. The MIG's are so much better than the Sabres that something must be done."

Mrs. Davis, who is expecting her third child in May, said, "If I could feel that he has lost his life for some good reason I could feel better about it. But this is a war without reason. I would like to ask a full scale investigation of why he was left in Korea."

In Washington, Representative Mahon (D-Texas) asked the Air Force to investigate thoroughly and report to him on circumstances surrounding Davis' death. He said Air Force officers at the Pentagon had promised to look into the matter.

The Fifth Air Force spokesman said policy requires the completion of 100 missions in Korea, but that the first three aces were sent home to instruct other airmen being readied for Korean combat.

"We don't send a ground soldier home when he kills 10 Communists," the spokesman said. "The same principle applies to jet pilots."

Two Other Pilots

He added that fighter-bomber pilots and Sabre jet pilots who do not become aces face the same dangers as aces.

"Getting five MIG's is a happenstance," he said. "It doesn't mean a man has won the war."

Davis became an ace about the same time as two other pilots of (Continued On Page 10)

Council To Discuss Exclusive Midland, County Health Unit

Creation of a Midland City-County Health Unit, with a director concerned exclusively with local sanitation problems, will be discussed Tuesday night at the regular semi-monthly meeting of the City Council.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt said Tuesday he would report to the council on his conversation by telephone Monday with Dr. George Cox, state health officer.

Oswalt conferred with Dr. Cox in connection with the council's action of last Thursday, asking that Dr. F. E. Sadler be replaced as director of the City-County Health Unit by a "more aggressive and vigorous" official.

At the present time, Dr. Sadler is director for Midland, Ector and Howard counties.

Previous to his conversation with Oswalt, Dr. Cox told The Reporter-Telegram his department would be willing to set up a health unit with a full-time director for Midland and Midland County.

He pointed out that Midland and Midland County would have to contribute additional funds, however, and added that qualified doctors for the position were hard to find.

Dr. Sadler, meanwhile, was reported out of the city and not available for comment concerning the situation.

Crude Oil Output In Nation Spurts

TULSA—(P)—Helped by big spurts in Texas and Kansas, American oil production averaged 6,370, 136 barrels daily during the week ended February 9, a gain of 134,500 barrels. The Oil and Gas Journal reported Tuesday.

Texas jumped 120,950 barrels to 2,919,725 barrels, and Kansas added 13,100 to 319,900.

The figures include both crude oil and lease condensate.

C. Of C. Directors Approve Budget, 1952 Work Program

Chamber of Commerce directors, meeting Monday afternoon in Hotel Scharbauer, approved a comprehensive and ambitious program of work and adopted a \$26,719 budget for 1952. Standing committee appointments for the year also were announced by President Jack Wickes.

It was the first meeting of directors since new officers were installed at the annual membership meeting of the organization last week.

The work program contained 44 definite projects, listed under 11 general headings—agriculture, aviation, civic affairs, highways, industrial expansion, membership and finance, publicity, retail trade, conventions and tourist promotion, education, miscellaneous. The projects range from city beautification to highway building.

The budget represents an increase of approximately \$5,000 over that of last year, but Wickes pointed out the \$26,719 figure actually is low and that the Chamber should have at least \$30,000 on which to operate this year.

He said plans already are underway to stage Spring and Fall membership campaigns to meet the budget requirement. One-day drives are scheduled, with scores of volunteer workers taking part.

Stanley M. Erskine, immediate past president, said additional funds must be obtained if the Chamber is to accomplish its objectives for 1952.

The 1952 budget lists the following items: Advertising and publicity, \$1,000; membership, \$300; donations, \$50; dues and subscriptions, \$300; flowers, \$50; office rent and utilities, \$3,000; office expense, \$1,700; postage, \$400; salaries, \$13,000; withholding and social security taxes, \$1,500; telephone and telegraph, \$600; travel expense, \$600; committee activities, \$900; automobile expense, \$1,000; special activities, \$2,250; checks returned, \$60.

It was pointed out that membership revenues have not kept pace with increased activities of the organization and that a reserve built up during the war years has been exhausted.

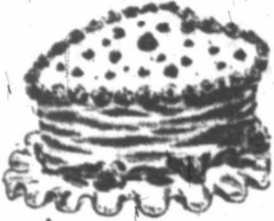

Four Counties Quit Area Of Proposed Milk-Pricing Order

ABILENE—(P)—Four West Texas counties have withdrawn from the original 27 for which marketing cooperative has asked a federal milk-pricing order.

Hearing on the proposed order continued Tuesday after the withdrawal Monday of Stonewall, Haskell, Concho and McCullough counties.

The Central West Texas Cooperative Marketing Association, Inc. which requested the regulation fixing minimum prices to be paid milk producers, asked withdrawal of the four counties.

A request from Tennessee Dairies for postponement of the hearing was rejected. Attorney Hugo Swan said Tennessee had not received a copy of the order from the Department of Agriculture. But Stuart Russell, attorney for the marketing group, said he had mailed a copy to Swan.

Witnesses Monday included Joe R. Shelton, Jr., Brownwood, and J. K. Webb, Shelton is president of the Co-op Marketing Association and Webb is manager of the Miles Cooperative.

Both agreed a minimum pricing order would eliminate friction and tend to stabilize the milk industry.

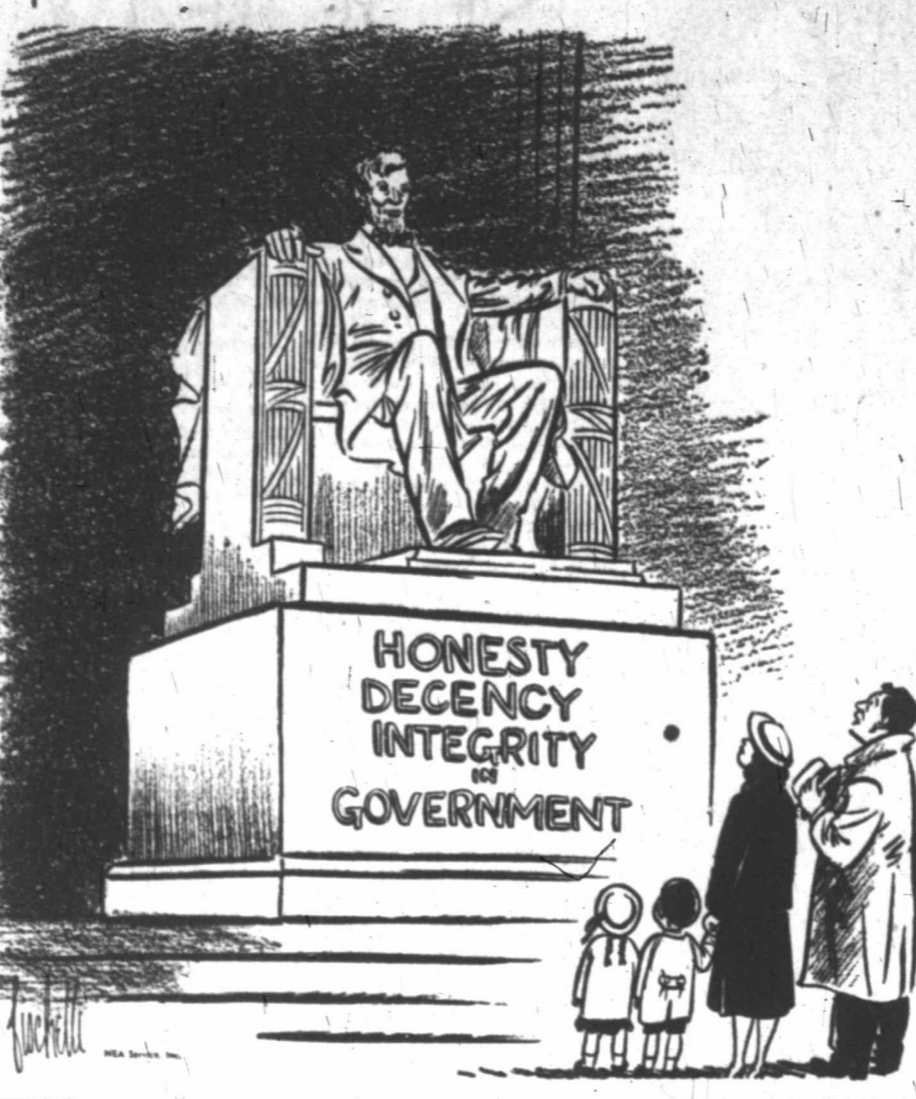

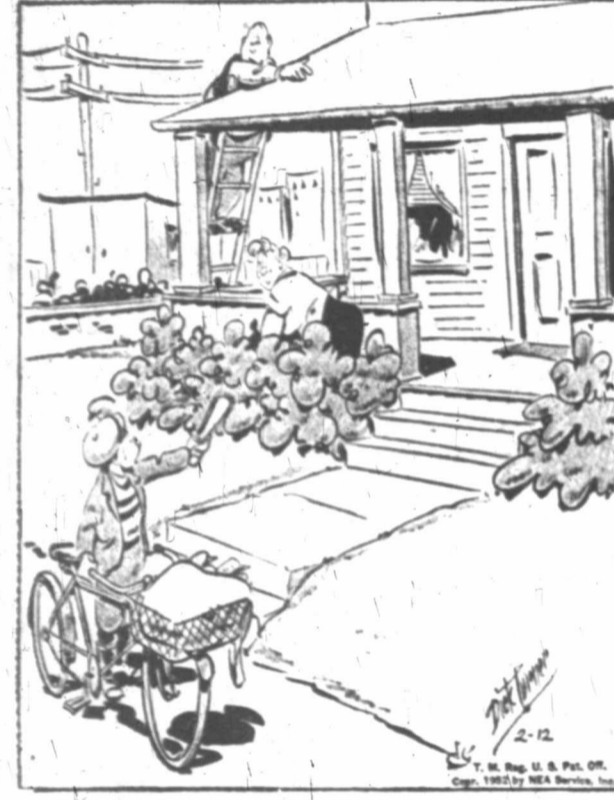

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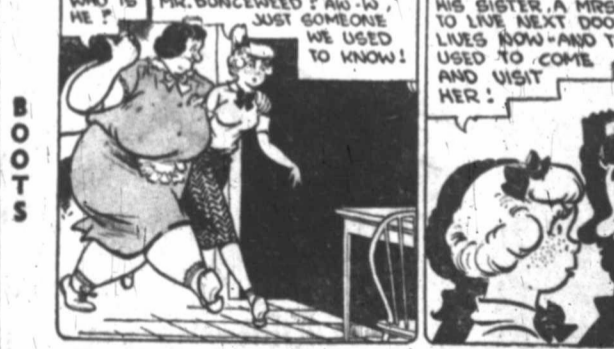

Taft Emerges With Slim Lead Over Ike In Oklahoma Foray

OKLAHOMA CITY —(AP)— The two-man race for the Republican presidential nomination shifted back to the big population centers Tuesday after a foray in Oklahoma gave Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio a small lead over Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Taft apparently could count on the votes of seven of Oklahoma's 18 delegates to the Republican Convention in Chicago as a result of action in the nation's first GOP State Convention here Monday.

He had the promise of secondary support from two other delegates nominally backing Gen. Douglas MacArthur, who has said he isn't a candidate. Against this, Eisenhower was credited with the votes of seven delegates.

All this added up to a result which shed little real light upon a race which former Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota, an active candidate for the nomination, conceded now is a two-man affair.

Stassen, speaker at a Lincoln Day dinner here Monday night, told a news conference he is after "second choice" votes because he does not believe either Taft or Eisenhower will come anyway near getting a majority on the first ballot at Chicago in July.

Contending that the leading runners "tend to cancel each other out," Stassen made it clear in an interview he is pinning most of his hopes of becoming a compromise candidate.

LONDON —(AP)— Through the hushed dignity of great Westminster Hall, the somberly clad people of Britain shuffled softly in reverent homage Tuesday past the body of King George VI.

Silent men bowed before the coffin and passed on. Silent women curtsied to the sovereign in death as they would in life.

For 14 hours a day, from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., until Thursday night, the citizens may pass before the bier while the king's body lies in state. Friday, it will be taken by train to Windsor for interment beside the king's ancestors in St. George's Chapel. The body was brought Monday from the royal estate at Sandringham, where the monarch died in his sleep last Wednesday.

Monday night, members of the royal household, the staffs at Buckingham Palace, Windsor Castle, Clarence House and Marlborough House, and the staffs of both houses of Parliament paid homage before the hall was opened to the general public.

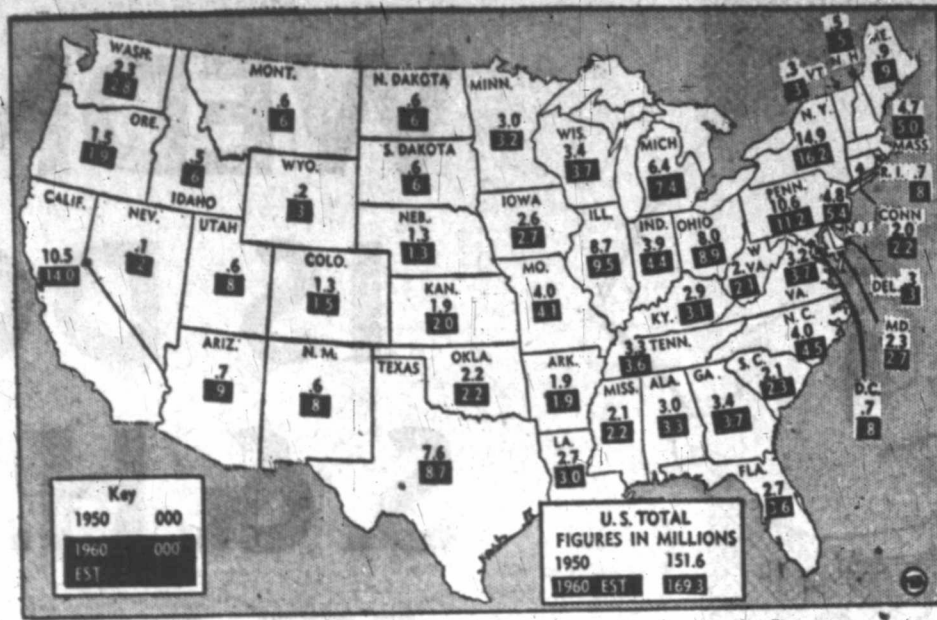

Lincoln Elected President Without Campaign Speech

SPRINGFIELD, ILL. —(AP)— Abraham Lincoln proved almost a century ago a man could win the presidency without making campaign speeches.

An Illinois historian says the man who was to become the great emancipator refused to speak on a day's issues because he was afraid his words would be twisted. Those who pressed him were referred to his previous speeches and letters.

Dr. Harry E. Pratt, Illinois state historian, said in an interview Tuesday Lincoln was unbudging in his resolve to "keep his mouth shut" during the 1860 campaign. Pratt quoted letters attesting.

Pratt said Lincoln even refused to address a political rally in Springfield which was preceded by a procession past his home. He attended, but kept his silence.

Lincoln's campaign was conducted by a corps of speakers while their candidate sat in Gov. John Wood's Statehouse office, which he took over for campaign headquarters, and received hundreds of politicians.

Tot To Be Returned From Polio Center

Little 10-month-old Herlinda Gomez, Midland polio victim, will be returned to her home here Saturday from the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, where she has been under treatment.

The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Refugio Gomez of Midland, the baby girl was stricken with polio here last November.

Youths Eligible For Draft Are Warned To Register With Board

All eligible men in the Midland area who have not registered with the draft board had better do so promptly. Mrs. Nell Roberts, clerk of local Board 137, warned Tuesday.

All men who were born on or after August 30, 1922, are supposed to be registered.

Mrs. Roberts made the announcement after Col. Morris Schwartz, state deputy director of Selective Service, said here Monday registrations were lagging throughout the entire state.

"Any man who does not register is liable to a \$5,000 fine or five years imprisonment," said Mrs. Roberts. "And men have to register regardless of what reserve unit they might belong to," she said.

Duty Of Everyone
Mrs. Roberts also said that it is the duty of all citizens to turn in the names of any potential draftee who has not registered.

Once the draft board learns the names of men who are evading draft registration, the FBI is notified.

"The State Selective Service Board can tell just how many men should register each month," said Mrs. Roberts, "and they know present registrations have fallen off."

Schoolgirls Find Infant's Mangled Body On Street

MCALISTER, OKLA. —(AP)— Chief of Police Roy Anders said the mangled body of an infant found on a downtown street Monday "looked like the work of a maniac."

An intensive search was launched to find the parents of a three-hour old baby boy who was mutilated in an unknown manner and thrown in the street wrapped in two cheap hand towels.

Doctors called into the case by the Police Department established positively that the baby had lived—but only for three hours. It was born, they said, about 6 a.m. Monday and died at 9 a.m.

Two schoolgirls strolling down the street discovered the body. They called their mother, who in turn phoned the police. Doctors said the infant's throat was cut, its stomach slashed, and there was a gash under its arm. A lung was also destroyed.

County Attorney Homer Neece commented: "It's the most gruesome sight I have ever seen. It was a healthy baby, and there's no doubt about how it died."

El Paso County Swings Big Stick In Senator Race

PECOS — El Paso County wields a big stick in the forthcoming battle for state senator from the 29th district, a survey of poll tax payments reveals.

With slightly more than 38,000 poll tax payments and exemptions, El Paso County will have almost one-half of the strength of the entire district, which has about 83,523 paid poll taxes.

Senator Hill D. Hudson of Pecos is going to make a fight to retain his seat in the upper house at Austin, while J. T. Rutherford of Odessa, present state representative, has launched a campaign to unseat Hudson.

There are nine counties in the district, all bordering along the Texas & Pacific Railway, extending from Midland to El Paso.

Counties and their approximate voting strength are: El Paso, 38,000; Ector, 18,258; Midland, 14,000; Ward, 4,394; Reeves, 3,800; Winkler, 3,513; Hudspeth, 766; Ouberson, 692, and Loving, 80.

Pennies Put Pounds On Pint-Size Co-Eds

MEMPHIS, TENN. —(AP)— Two pretty, brown-haired co-eds at Memphis State College, who did not weigh enough to become donors in a Red Cross blood drive, used 17 pounds of pennies and metal between them to make the grade.

Myrtle Essner of Greenbrier, Ark., and Yvonne Ergle of nearby Whitehaven were turned down the first time they went to the bloodmobile. Myrtle needed 13 pounds; her roommate, four. You have to weigh 110 to give blood.

When they went back the next day, they had the pennies and metal in their clothes—and tipped the scales in good shape. Each was accepted.

They explained Tuesday why they were in dead earnest about the blood drive. Myrtle's father is a master sergeant with a medical unit. Yvonne's foster brother was wounded twice in the fighting in Korea.

Latin American Held In Beating Of Valley Couple

SAN BENTO —(AP)— A Latin American was held Tuesday in the fatal beating of W. O. Williams, 77. Williams was killed and his wife left in a critical condition Sunday when burglars apparently entered their home.

The couple's car, taken for a getaway vehicle, was found abandoned Monday on the south bank of the Rio Grande. Sheriff Boynton Fleming said "the driver apparently was unable to get over the bank of the Mexican side."

The 72-year-old widow of the prominent farmer still was in a dangerous condition. Both she and her husband were beaten, Fleming said, with a heavy iron wrench.

Mrs. Williams had been recovering from an operation performed about a week ago.

New Drug Designed To Relieve Angina Sufferers Announced

NEW YORK —(AP)— A drug designed to prevent attacks of angina pectoris, a painful heart ailment, was announced Tuesday.

Fifty to 75 per cent of patients had fewer attacks or less pain when attacks did come, said three reports in the Journal of Angiology. Angiology is the science of blood vessels.

The drug, peritrate, was developed by Chilcott Laboratories, Morris Plains, N. J., from a nitrate long used in explosives.

Angina pectoris is due to lack of blood or oxygen supply, usually from constriction of blood vessels. The new drug relaxes blood vessels.

Drs. Travis Winsor and Patrick Humphreys, University of Southern California, said the drug had beneficial effects in 78 per cent of 128 patients, and was especially useful in treating chest pains. Patients were able to step up daily activities while taking the drug.

Dr. Abraham Periman, in studies directed by Dr. Thomas H. McGavack, New York Medical College, reported relief in 12 out of 27 patients. Drs. Saul S. Samuels and Elias D. Federnacht, Stuyvesant Polyclinic Hospital, New York, found benefit in 20 out of 30 patients.

Jefferson Unions Vote For Oil Strike

Members of the Oil Workers International Union (OIU) at Beaumont and Port Arthur have joined other members in a vote favoring a strike for higher wages.

Two groups of Port Arthur workers voted to strike "if necessary to obtain a requested \$2 daily wage increase," union officials said Monday. They were Atlantic Refining Company workers and the office force of Gulf Oil Corporation plant.

OIUU members at the Magnolia Refinery in Beaumont voted to strike for the same wage increase. Members employed by The Texas Company asphalt plant in Port Neches voted but results had not been announced early Monday.

The main group of Gulf Oil workers at Beaumont started a two-day vote on the strike issue Monday with results expected to be announced Tuesday night. About 4,000 members were reported eligible to vote.

In all, about 15,000 workers are affected by the vote and proposed strike in Jefferson County alone.

Goodrich Chemical Company and Pure Oil refinery workers in Port Neches previously had favored a strike. Votes were due to be taken this week at other Jefferson County oil installations.

Meanwhile, federal mediators were in Beaumont to attempt to arrange meetings between union and company officials in Port Arthur and Beaumont.

Several Kinds Of Heart Disease May Be Treated By Surgery

There are several kinds of heart disease for which in the past little could be done, but which now can be treated effectively in many instances by the use of delicate heart surgery.

Even with the progress in this field of recent years, the end has not yet been reached since investigators still are finding new methods by which they can extend the benefits of heart surgery to more and more people.

One of the most important developments of heart surgery has been that used in the treatment of so-

called "blue babies," or infants born with congenital heart disease. The bluish color of the skin which gives the common name is caused by lack of oxygen attached to the hemoglobin or coloring matter of the blood.

In blue babies the deficiency of oxygen is the result of a malformed heart or of the large blood vessels near it. Such defective structures permit the blood from the veins which contain only a little oxygen to mix with the blood from the arteries.

There are several kinds of malformations of the heart which will permit this mixing of oxygen-containing and non-oxygen containing blood. The various kinds are too numerous and too complicated to describe in detail.

They carry such technical names as coarctation of the aorta, tetralogy of Fallot and pulmonary stenosis with intact ventricular septum. But it does make a difference to the patient because some kinds now can be treated successfully by surgery and others cannot.

In one of these conditions the passageway between the heart and one of the large blood vessels which normally should close before birth fails to do so. This is called a patent or open ductus arteriosus.

This opening can be closed by heart surgery with great success.

Some of the other congenital malformations of the heart, (or results of disease) also can be treated successfully by surgery, but not all of them.

For this reason careful study of each case has to be conducted in order to make a diagnosis and to decide whether or not surgery would offer chances of relief.

For the child with congenital heart disease who cannot be treated by surgery, certain precautions are particularly necessary. Such children must, of course, be carefully examined and every effort must be made to avoid infection and excessive physical strain.

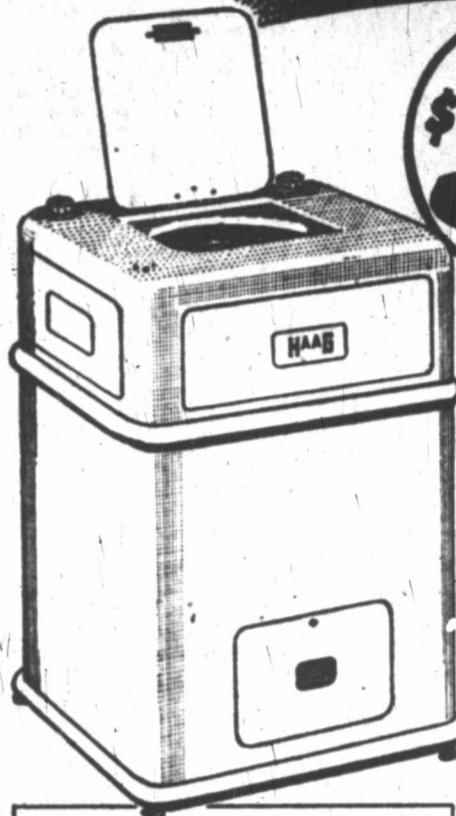

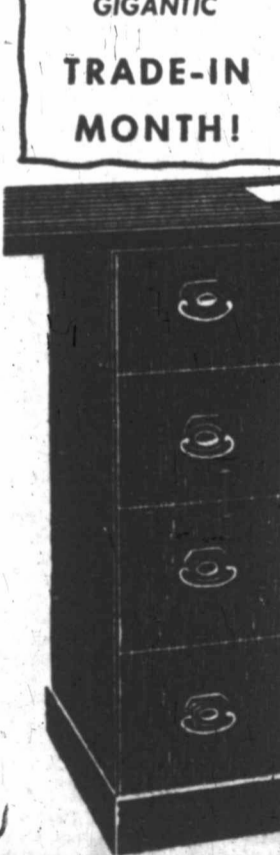

**WTCC Protests
Tidelands Policies**

ARLINGTON—Efforts of the federal government to acquire title to marginal Tidelands are opening the door to eventual nationalization of all basic resources of the United States, it is declared in a statement of policy of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce just sent to members of the Texas congressional delegation.

The organization's policy on the Tidelands issue is expressed in a resolution adopted at its annual convention in Amarillo last November. The resolution re-affirmed the 3,000-member organization's position that "title to the marginal Tidelands is rightfully and lawfully the property of the respective states" and that the federal government has no right to such title. The resolution noted that the WTCC had on numerous occasions voiced its objection to "expropriation" of the Tidelands "under the Supreme Court's new legal doctrine of 'paramount rights.'"

The organization is on record as "protesting the authority of the President of the United States, acting through his agent, the secretary of the Interior, to expropriate the Tidelands of the several states by executive order, since determination of the right and title to these Tidelands is rightfully within the province of the Congress of the United States to determine, and which cannot be done lawfully otherwise."
