1989 News Highlights Given

A look back through the files of the Friona Star revealed these headlines as highlights of the year 1989 locally:

JANUARY

The calendar year of 1988 ended with 19.99 inches of rain, a better than average year for moisture.

Project Christmas Card raised \$5456.71 for the 1988 Christmas season.

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm blasted the European Economic Community (EEC), which has placed a ban on beef imports, during a press conference held at Friona's Excel plant.

The Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon-cutting ceremony at Hurst Real Estate and Insurance.

A crowd of between 500 and 600 people attended the 75th anniversary festivities at Friona's First Baptist Church on January 20-21.

Showmen from Friona and Lubbock divided the four grand champion banners at the 42nd Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show. Jessica Smith, Rusty Simmons, Susan Redwine and Brett Thomas showed the top animals.

FEBRUARY

The temperature never topped the freezing mark in Friona for 164 consecutive hours, almost an entire week, to begin the month.

Sindy Preston and Cody Burney were named Basketball Queen and King at FHS.

A four or five-year battle between the county's schools and the County Commissioners Court over the disposition of the Permanent School Fund culminated last Monday when the court voted in favor of dividing up the nearly \$1 million between the four Parmer County school districts.

Friona got a local office from the Texas Employment Commission beginning February 21.

Gail Thompson is the new District Conservationist for the Parmer County Soil Conservation District.

Jeff Brown, son of Gary and Barbara Brown, was badly injured in a wreck on February 25 when he was thrown from a pickup he was driving in Lubbock.

MARCH

Rick Ellis won the "Best of Show" trophy in high school, and Monty Schueler won the junior high honors in Friona ISD's annual Science Fair.

Illinois State Superintendent of Education Ted Sanders, a 1959 graduate of Friona High School, has been nominated by President Bush to be the U.S. Undersecretary of Education.

Rev. Charles Broadhurst, who first pastored the church in 1971-74, rejoined First Baptist Church as its pastor on March 19.

Floyd Reeve and Kitty Gallman were named "Man and Woman of the Year" at the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet. Mary Ford was named "Most Courteous Employee." Jim Parker was selected as "Teacher of the Year," and Deena Willard and Lon Outland were honored as "Outstanding Young People."

APRIL

A monster whirlwind tore up a barn on the A.L. Black place April 3, and picked up the side of a pickup.

Terron Talley, an eighth grade student at Friona Junior High, is the Parmer County Spelling Bee Champion for 1989.

Friona played host to the Panhandle Assn. of Oddfellows and Rebekah lodges' convention April 22-23.

MAY

Two Friona students represented FHS at the state UIL literary meet in Austin: James Warren in number sense and Holly Snead in informative speaking.

Friona Volunteer Fire Department received a 5,000-gallon tank trailer from the state forestry agency.

Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon ceremony for Suds 'n Scissors on Main Street.

Holly Snead is valedictorian and Lon Outland salutatorian for the 1989 graduation party for the 1989 FHS graduates.

Kristin Holland and Abraham DeLaO were the honor graduates for the FJHS eighth grade class, which consisted of 93 members.

Kendrick Oil Co. was feted with a ribbon event by the C-C.

JUNE

Winds measured at 90 miles per hour blew down yard fences and uprooted trees on June 12. At the Excel plant, a large section of roof was blown off.

Senator Phil Gramm visited Friona to praise local law enforcement officers for their efforts in fighting drug abuse, and to brief them on congressional efforts on the subject.

THE NUMBERS GAME....In my last column, which was written in what seems like ages ago (in the 1980s!), I was discussing a little about the end of the 1980s decade.

As the year 1990 and the 90s decade dawned, I was thinking this week about the subject of decades, and discovered that they can be somewhat misleading.

As everyone knows, a decade consists of a packet that contains ten years--right? Yes, but like I said, this can be a little bit confusing.

Ye editor observed a birthday on the final day of the 1980s decade. On the day that 1990 dawned, although "Ye Ed" is "only" in his early 50s, his life had actually touched seven decades: the 1930s, 1940s, 1950s, 1960s, 1970s, 1980s and now the 1990s.

At first blush, when you make the statement that you had "touched" seven decades, you would think that a person would have to be in his 60s, maybe even pushing 70, in order to make that statement.

But by the same token, a person who is only 20 years of age at the present time may have touched four decades, a person in their early 30s may have seen the light of five decades, and at the other end of the spectrum, someone in their 80s may now have touched ten decades, and not even be close to being 100 years old.

My oldest relative, an aunt who lived in Arkansas, passed away late in 1989 at the ripe old age of 101. Aunt Sis' life had touched 11 decades, and if she had been allowed to live just a few months longer, she would have been alive during 12 decades, which is almost mind-boggling when you stop and think about it.

Nolan Ryan, who at age 42 became the oldest major league pitcher to strike out 300 or more batters in a season, will add to his already-impressive list of achievements when he tosses his first pitch of the 1990 season.

Ryan, who has agreed to pitch at least one more season for the Texas Rangers, will have his major league career span four decades when he makes his first appearance in a game in the 1990 season. That sounds almost impossible when you consider that Ryan is 42 years old.

Then you consider the fact that Ryan's major league career began in the late 1960s, when he was with the New York Mets. That allowed his professional baseball career to be a part of the 1960s, 1970s, 1980s, and this year will add the 1990s to his list.

I used to read Ripley's "Believe it or Not" feature in the daily papers when it was a popular feature, and recall an item that goes along with this discussion.

The feature had a picture of a tombstone with a man's name, and underneath his name, the birth-death years were something like (1799-1901). The "Believe it or Not" angle was that the man's life had touched three centuries.

Since more and more people are living to the age of 100 and beyond, and due to medical advancement the life expectancy of Americans continues to increase. We can probably expect to see numerous cases of the above "rarity" when the 21st century arrives.

We were remarking at the office recently that the number of people who were born in the 1800s is dwindling. But surely there will be at least a few of them left at the end of this decade.

I want to be able to write an obituary that contains a set of "three century" numbers before I turn my trusty typewriter out to pasture. Maybe "Believe it or Not" will have been revived, and we can send them a sequel to their earlier feature.

Summerfield Man Has Panama Role

The son of a Summerfield couple has been stationed in Panama with the U.S. Army, and has had first-hand experience with the invasion that ended this week with the seizure of Panama's strongman Manuel Noriega.

Sgt. Andy McCright, 23, who is the son of Fred and Sandy Lookingbill of Summerfield, had been in Panama on regular assignment since last October.

Sgt. McCright is a medic with the 4th Medical Platoon, 17th Infantry. His platoon has been in Panama on a "four-month rotation," and is due to be back in the U.S. in February. His home base is Fort Ord, California.

"I would like to apologize to these folks for leaving their names off the Christmas Card list. We hope they will forgive our error," said Sondra Nichols, who prepared the list.

In his telephone conversations with his mother, Sgt. McCright has emphasized that the rank and file Panamanians have been overjoyed that the United States sent troops in to overthrow Noriega.

"He indicated that 90 per cent of the people there have been thrilled that the Americans were helping them get rid of Noriega," Mrs. Lookingbill said. She had not talked with her son (as of Thursday) since Noriega had been taken into custody by the U.S., but felt that this would make the U.S. mission complete.

Sgt. McCright had indicated that his platoon had suffered one fatality since the fighting began. During the initial assault, the 17th Infantry's base was destroyed, and the platoon moved to Colon, a large port city that is located just across the isthmus on the canal, opposite Panama City.

"As a medic, he has been taking care of civilians (Panamanians), in addition to the servicemen. The casualties and injuries were apparently very heavy among the civilians," Mrs. Lookingbill said.

Sgt. McCright has been in the Army for the past three and one-half years. He attended grade school in Hereford, but graduated from high school at Morrill High School while living in Minatare, Nebraska.

"I'm sure he has seen some things the past couple of weeks that he never expected to see," said his mother. She said that her son indicated that the weather in the tropical Panama area has been hot and sunny during the activity there.

She said her son called home at 5:30 a.m. the morning of the invasion, to let her know it was happening.

"Since it is hard to get telephone lines, we had some anxious periods at the first, until things leveled off. Now that they have Noriega in custody, I can breathe easy," she concluded.

Sgt. McCright's group has been involved in helping to police the area following the initial invasion.

Product Termed "Help For Earth"

Whatever the reasons, it is an indisputable fact that environmental concerns are more pressing issues today than at any time in our history. And the concern runs much deeper than mere aesthetics. A prominent example of this concern is *Time* magazine's voting of Mother Earth as the Person of the Year this past year. To summarize, it has become painfully evident that if the human race is to continue to grow and prosper, we must become more conscientious stewards of our earth. Not of just the air we breathe, the water we drink or the plants we grow...but the very earth in which we grow those plants...the earth itself. For the relationship between the earth, the atmosphere and our waters is a symbiotic one; therefore, our conservation efforts must be aimed at maintaining that delicate balance.

While the problems of water, forest and air pollution have been at the forefront of environmental efforts since the mid-sixties and earlier, it has only been within the last decade that particular attention has been paid to the preservation and maintenance of the earth itself.

Another example of the attention that is beginning to be directed toward these issues in agriculture is the growing popularity of LISA or Low Input Sustainable Agriculture...similar to a cross between organic farming and conventional farming, leaning toward the use of green manure crops, the rotation of crops, integrated pest management, animal manures and other concepts and procedures that reduce the amount of "inputs." Because this reduction in "inputs" results in improved soil and lower production costs to the farmer, its popularity is gaining almost geometrically. However, it was not always this way.

One man who almost single handedly took on this problem years ago is Wade Dunitent. Through many years' experience in the agricultural chemical/fertilizer and grain brokerage business, Wade became aware of the fact that farmland, over time, requires more and more fertilizer and/or chemical treatment to accomplish the particular job at hand, even taking into account the more concentrated and more effective chemicals and fertilizers on the market today. That fact remains unchanged.

Not unlike the professional athlete who, after taking steroid injection after steroid injection to improve his physical capabilities, soon realizes that the interim "quick fix" has resulted in a variety of debilitating and irreversible conditions. So it is with the precious farm land across the United States and the world. After years of continuous and in many cases unabated use of fertilizers, pesticides and herbicides, the very earth upon which these chemicals have been used has been rendered less able to sustain its own ecological balance. Consequently, soil is less capable of sustaining the healthy plant life necessary to the continued production of both food and non-food crops. Take fertilizers for example. But wait a minute, aren't fertilizers supposed to be good for the soil? Most traditional fertilizers contain salts and acids which cause crusting and hardpan in the soil. Furthermore, usage of chemicals causes many of

the soils' bacteria to go into dormancy. The cumulative effect of these problems is an increasingly less productive soil and, subsequently, crops that are less resistant to all types of stress, whether it be insect, weather or disease-related. While Wade Dunitent may have been a pioneer in his quest for a product that would help combat the aforementioned problems, his ideas are now being shared by many researchers, scientists, environmentalists, farmers and people everywhere. Perhaps the best news though is that his quest was not in vain.

Realizing that a vital piece to the soil preservation jigsaw was the re-activation of the soils' bacteria, Wade Dunitent went about developing a product that would do just that. He also knew that any product that was going to be able to accomplish that task would also have the potential to reduce fungus, disease and insect problems due to the increased vitality in the soil. Furthermore, to fully satisfy Wade, it would have to be 100 per cent environmentally safe. Realizing that the naturally occurring fermentation bioprocess is what normally provides soil bacteria with sustenance, Wade began his search there. A search for something that would enhance or in some way mimic the effects of the natural fermentation bioprocess. That was in 1969.

It was over the course of the next ten years that Wade, through research, patience, persistence, desire, dedication, and commitment, developed N-Fix. Truly a product whose time had come.

The Friona Police Department received 199 calls during the month of December, 1989.

60 YEARS AGO-DEC. 27, 1929

The Star is authorized to announce that the people of the Baptist congregation will hold their first devotional services in their new church at Sixth Street and Summitt Avenue this Sunday. The regular Sunday School services will be held, beginning at 10 a.m., when arrangements have been made to have Santa Claus visit the school and distribute a Christmas treat to each one.

55 YEARS AGO-DEC. 28, 1934

50 YEARS AGO-DEC. 29, 1939

During the past week the intense and prolonged drought from which this territory has suffered for the past two months was broken by two good snowfalls. The first came on Friday night, beginning about 11 o'clock and continuing until near morning in the form of sleet, snow and rain, amounting to about two inches of wet snow and an estimated half inch of moisture. After this melted away on Saturday, and then on Sunday night it began to snow again and continued throughout most of the day Monday, when there was a good seven inches of fairly wet snow, spread evenly over the ground.

45 YEARS AGO-DEC. 29, 1944

Americans, traditionally overfed at Christmas, went back to shorter rations Tuesday morning when most meats which have been point free for several months, were returned to the ration list and point values were again placed on nearly all canned vegetables and canned preserves and jellies.

Christmas Day for 1944 was probably as quiet a day at Friona as the town has ever seen, it even compared to the time in the town's early history when a traveling salesman said that someone had to get out shortly after daylight each morning and chase the jack rabbits out of the streets.

40 YEARS AGO-DEC. 23, 1949

The management of Friona Wheat Growers, Inc. have added to the Christmas spirit at Friona, by the erection on the extreme top of their large elevator, a beautiful electrical display in Yuletide colors. The display features a large five-pointed star beautifully lighted by electricity, and surmounting a border of red and green lights, framing the top of the head house.

35 YEARS AGO-DEC. 31, 1954

Building permits issued by the City of Friona during 1954 totaled \$225,240. This included both new business houses and residences and improvements, city secretary Roy Wilson said. A total of 47 permits were issued.

25 YEARS AGO-DEC. 24, 1964

Brenda Hawker, Friona's exchange student from Australia, is spending her first Christmas away from home, and is hoping to see her first "White Christmas." Being from Australia, she is used to observing Christmas in the middle of the summer, and having it come during the winter is an entirely new experience for her. Brenda is staying with the E.G. Phipps family during her year in Friona.

20 YEARS AGO-DEC. 25, 1969

Four 1969 graduates of Friona High School, who were home from college for the Christmas holidays, were injured Friday evening when the car in which they were riding went out of control and turned over. Charles Hamilton, driver of

the late model Pontiac, Joel Osborn, Ramey Beene and Danny Carthel were returning from Dimmitt, where they had attended a wedding. The accident occurred at a dead end on a country road south of Black. Osborn, who was the least seriously injured, ran to the Joe B. Douglas farm home for assistance. The four were admitted to Parmer County Community Hospital. Osborn was released Saturday morning. Beene was transferred to an Amarillo hospital Monday and the other two are still patients in the local hospital.

15 YEARS AGO-DEC. 22, 1974

Friona Consumers' board of directors announce that longtime manager Thomas (Buddy) Lloyd is retiring as of January 1. Becoming manager on the first of the year will be Elton Wyly. 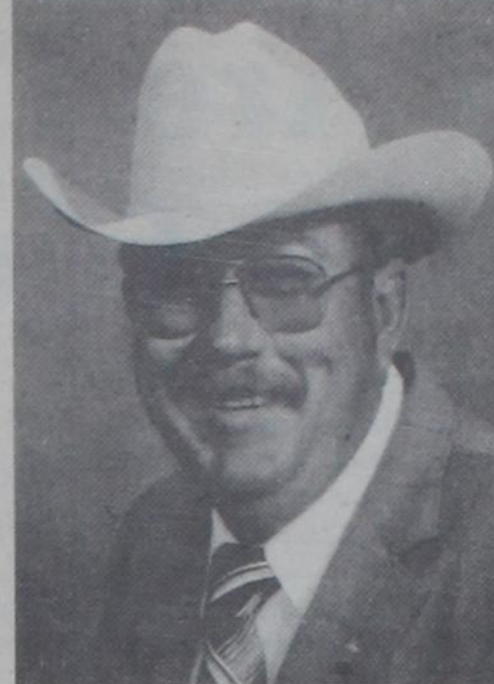

"After high school, I attended Droughn's Business College and received a degree in bookkeeping-accounting. Since that time I have worked at Sherley Grain Co., Parmer County Implement Co. and Herring Implement, in the accounting departments, and was part owner of Clayton Farm Center.

"Currently, I am serving as Justice of the Peace, Precinct 3, in Bovina. I have been certified by the Texas Justice Training Center, Southwest Texas University, San Marcos, in judicial procedures, both in criminal and civil law.

"By attending these training schools, I have kept abreast of the ever-changing laws and how they pertain to us locally on a county level.

"I am married to Dickie Clayton and have two children, a daughter, Holli, 22, and a twenty-year-old son, Chad.

"If elected County Judge, I promise to listen, be informative, fair-minded and responsible to Parmer County residents for my own decisions. "I need your vote Tuesday, March 13 in the Democratic Primary. Your support is appreciated."

Chiefs Are Third In Sudan Tournery

The Friona Chieftains won third place in the Sudan Invitational Tournament after Christmas, losing only to the host Sudan Hornets in the tourney semi-finals.

The Chiefs opened the meet with a 96-72 win over Whitharral, for their tenth win of the season.

Michael Reyes had a hot start for Friona, and Bret Bronniman sank a three-point basket in the first quarter, as the Chieftains took a 21-9 first-quarter lead.

The Chieftains were hot as a firecracker in the second quarter, scoring 30 points. (They were scoring so rapidly that the

scorekeeper didn't write the individual scoring in the scorebook, so we can't tell you who scored what.) At any rate, the Chiefs went to halftime with a 51-31 lead.

Whitharral came back for a 30-point quarter of their own in the third period, outscoring Friona 30-21, but the Panthers never seriously challenged the Chieftains.

Reyes took scoring honors with 23 points. Bronniman and Steven Smith added 15, and Darran Procter 14.

In the semi-finals, the Chieftains tangled with host Sudan, who had only kicked off their basketball season the previous day, due to advancing to the state finals in football.

The Hornets indicated that they may have an all-around group of athletes, by scoring a 62-59 win over Friona.

"We had our chance. We had a

one-point lead with 30 seconds left in the game. Then, we made a turnover, and they wound up with two baskets in the final stages for the win. That type of game situation was good experience for us," said Chieftain Coach Ted Thomas.

Bronniman took scoring honors for Friona with 22 points, and Procter added 14. Bronniman set a Chieftain record with six three-point baskets in the game.

In the battle for third place, the Chieftains met district-mate Muleshoe and emerged with a 76-72 win for the trophy, which is their third in three tournament appearances.

Procter scored a pair of baskets and two free throws to pace the team to a 20-19 first quarter lead.

Muleshoe outscored Friona 24-19, despite Procter's seven-point effort, to take a 42-39 halftime lead.

But the Chieftains came back after intermission, sparked by Bronniman's shooting. He scored in one's, two's and three's, having a seven-point quarter, as Friona went back on top, 59-52.

Muleshoe made another late bid, but the Chieftains held on for the win.

Bronniman, who had three three-pointers, and Procter each scored 19 points, for scoring honors.

Cancer Unit To Visit On Jan. 13

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of every ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime during her lifetime. Every year over 37,000 women die as a result of breast cancer.

According to a spokesman from the Regional Breast Care Center at Women's & Children's Hospital in Odessa, Texas, "The death rate from breast cancer could be drastically reduced if women would have mammograms done before a problem exists."

By using modern state of the art x-ray equipment, breast cancers can be found when they are about the size of a grain of rice and well before the cancer can be felt. A woman who is diagnosed with breast cancer at this early stage has a 90%-97% survival rate.

However, a woman who is not diagnosed until a lump can be felt, has approximately a 50% survival rate in five years.

In an effort to find cancers at the earliest possible stage and prevent unnecessary deaths, a mobile breast cancer detection unit will be made available to local women on Saturday, January 13. The mobile unit will be parked at City Hall in Bovina.
