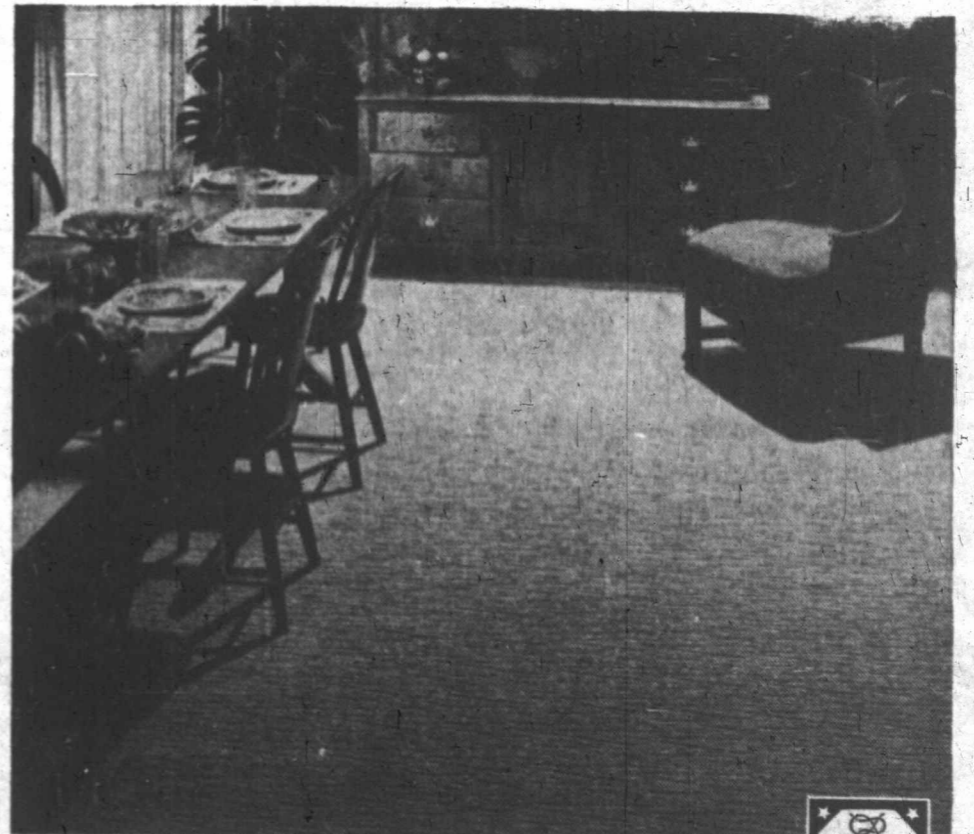

Militant Action Needed

Whittaker Chambers, in his story running in the Saturday Evening Post, tries to explain the mysterious quality of communism which has given it such driving force throughout the world.

This puts them at a definite disadvantage in any contest with Communists, to whom militancy is a way of life. In the Communist world, there is no room for relaxation.

Perhaps it is in the nature of freedom that it cannot be best used in an atmosphere of self-conscious militancy. In any event, men who have their liberty seem bent most upon enjoying it—not defending it.

In an ideal condition, it may be possible for free men thus to indulge themselves in the fruits of liberty without submitting to the limitations which follow from its active and constant defense.

The defenses the free nations now are throwing up are a response to a threat they see as serious and relatively close. They must be credited with defining and meeting the menace with more speed and fuller energies than they heretofore have applied in critical moments.

Whether or not it is the natural inclination of free men to do so, they must act upon their faith constantly and energetically in today's world. Otherwise they may awake one day to find it gone—before they saw and recognized the peril it was in.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

(Drew Pearson says: Livestock representatives hold secret Chicago meeting to kill price controls; Association aims to influence press, radio against OPS; Kentucky senator confuses graves.)

WASHINGTON—A secret meeting in which every housewife will be interested will be held at 10 a.m. Thursday in the Crystal Room of the Sherman Hotel in Chicago.

The first confidential letter calling the meeting was mailed by the Corn Belt Livestock Feeders on January 31, stating: "Your association wants to get rid of OPS and price controls. Our association wants to get rid of OPS and price controls."

"Various groups within industries, such as the National Livestock and Meat Industry Conference are doing most excellent work. But this is much bigger than livestock. All branches of business should work together in a well-planned fight."

"If you are willing to work with other organizations, then please attend a meeting at Chicago on February 28. This will be a confidential meeting without publicity."

The Livestock Feeders Association enclosed a plan of strategy headlined "OPS Must Go," which contained highly significant tips for influencing radio programs and newspapers against price controls.

"Those with radio time would be asked to invite in the representatives of other organizations when some startling bit of information could be broadcast that would bring resentment against OPS," the memo advised.

Note 1—It's important to remember that there are no ceiling prices on cattle, only on meat—although this, in turn, is supposed to hold down cattle prices. Under this system during World War II, OPS kept the ceiling on cattle at 12 cents a pound.

When North bid three hearts and then four hearts it was obvious that he had a good hand. It was also clear that South had a good diamond suit and a fair hand.

Long-Range Program Starts For Red Men's Independence

WASHINGTON—For the first time in American history, there now is a possibility that the U. S. government eventually will be able to get out of the business of taking care of the American Indian.

This may not transpire for another 25 or 50 years. But as of today a start has been made.

Indian affairs in Western Oregon may be turned over to that state within a year or two, if a few pending legislative matters can be put through. In California there is hope that Indian affairs can be liquidated within three to five years. Utah has a three-year transition program under way.

Fourteen other states are somewhat farther behind, but working on the problem. All this did not just happen. It is the result of a deliberately planned policy, encouraged and supported by Congress.

Its aim is to quit considering the down-beaten descendants of the red man as perpetually poverty-stricken wards of the government in Washington. The aim now is to make the Indian stand on his own feet like any other independent, respectable, native-born citizen.

This program has received considerable impetus since Dillon S. Myer became commissioner of Indian Affairs in the Department of Interior, two years ago. Myer has had unique experience in the last 10 years dealing with minority group problems and underdeveloped problem children.

He was head of the War Relocation Authority, which handled the American Japanese so well during the war. Then he was made president of Institute of Inter-American Affairs.

Under this policy, the Indians for generations were exploited out of everything except their copper. The vulnerable overall shows a strong heart suit of five or more cards, and a pretty good hand. Good players don't make vulnerable overcalls on weak hands.

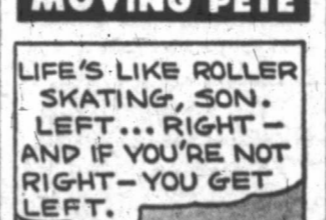

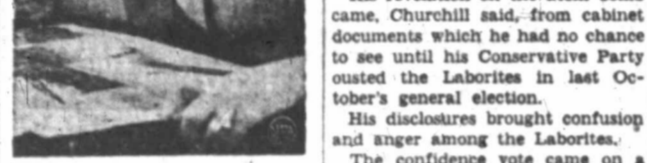

Farwell Mayor Held In Jail At El Paso

Churchill Winner In Confidence Vote On Foreign Policy

LONDON — Prime Minister Churchill won a House of Commons confidence vote on his foreign policy Tuesday night after asserting his pledge of "prompt, resolute and effective" action in Korea.
He disclosed also that the Labor regime of Prime Minister Attlee secretly set up a plant for regular production of atomic bombs and had produced an atom bomb.
Churchill won the confidence vote, 218 to 285, a margin of 33 votes. Liberal Party backing swelled his nominal Conservative edge of 14 votes.
His revelation on the atom bomb came, Churchill said, from cabinet documents which he had no chance to see until his Conservative Party ousted the Laborites in last October's general election.
His disclosures brought confusion and anger among the Laborites.
The confidence vote came on a Labor censure motion accusing Churchill of making secret military pledges to President Truman. Socialist critics charged these pledges were hinted at when Churchill promised in a speech to Congress last month that Britain would take action if a Korea truce were reached, then broken by the Communists.
Churchill denied any secret agreement with the President.

Two Die As Snow Covers Southland

A February storm that cost two lives Tuesday piled deep snow on widespread areas of the South, and even greater depths were forecast for some sections Wednesday.
Thick blankets covered many parts of Georgia, the Carolinas and Virginia—and the weatherman said the worst was yet to come for North Carolina.
Lighter falls swirled across sections of Alabama and Mississippi, and a trace was reported deep in Louisiana.
Temperatures generally were above freezing, however, though sub-freezing weather was reported early Wednesday in North Carolina and in the Virginia mountains.

Gold Odyssey To Mexico Thwarted By Detectives

BEVERLY HILLS, CALIF. — Beverly Hills gold export-importer Glenn Spaulding, 24, Los Angeles, a man with a long police record including confidence game operations; Lee E. Moore, 30, of Pasadena, and David Hutton, 23, the latter seized in Las Vegas.
They are accused of three jewel robberies, totalling \$20,000, on February 16, 17 and 18 at homes of Mrs. Isabel Wolf, Mrs. Betty Noble and Clifford Souze. Detectives said the gems were sold for a mere \$300 to an undisclosed party, and have been recovered.
Detective Tella St. R. W. Borders, who himself became a part of the gang, told the fantastic story.
He said Spaulding convinced Lord that he knew where a ton of gold was located in Southern Sochra, Mexico. A scheme was devised to finance the expedition by jewel thefts at homes of wealthy persons and later this week by holding up three diamond salesmen. The diamond holdups would yield more than \$600,000. The gang would then buy a surplus plane, arm it, fly to Mexico, snatch the gold, return and sell it for a huge profit. Moore and Hutton were enlisted by Spaulding.
But investigation of the three house robberies showed that all three families were friends of Lord. Lord told newsmen he was involved only in a legitimate deal. He denied knowing about or having anything to do with the house robberies.
It was to be a \$600,000 enterprise, financed by gem robberies, with a return of \$1,900,000 on the pirated gold.
Practically, however, the police jailed three men here and a fourth in Las Vegas, Nev., on suspicion of robbery.

The smugglers fled, apparently across the border into Mexico, and left behind in a brush patch \$25,000 grains of marthana and 2,037 grains of heroin.
The agents, Joe Ray of Brownsville and Herbert F. Scott and Lake Rymer of McAllen, were not hurt. They said the smugglers escaped before it could be determined whether any of them had been hit in the exchange of gunfire.

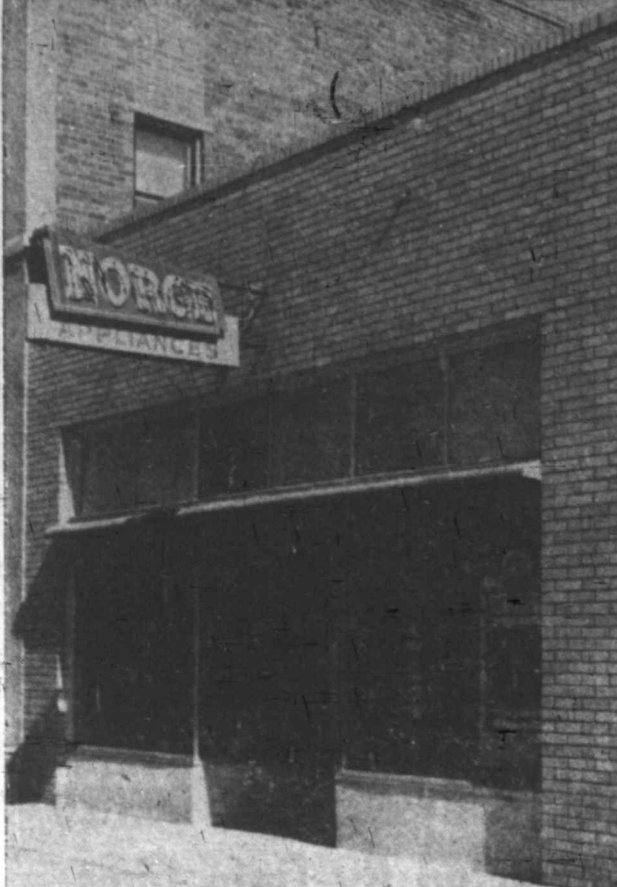

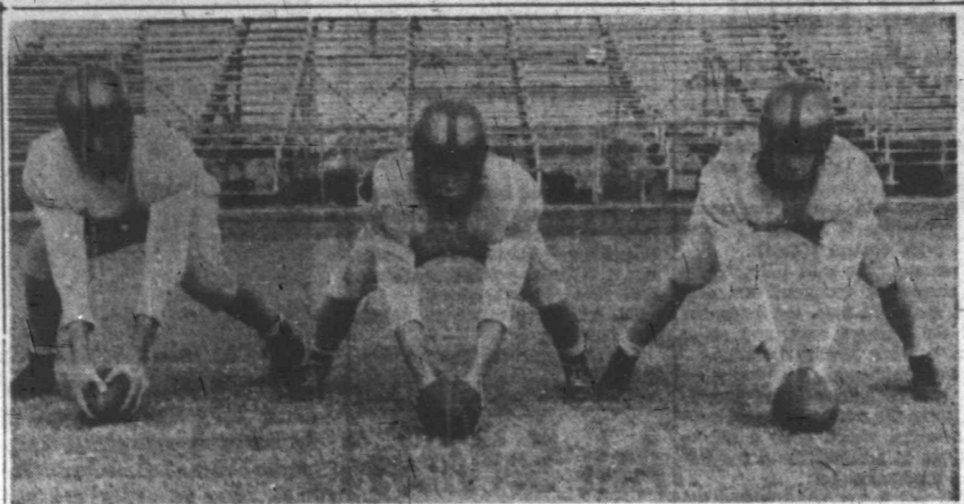

COLUMBUS, MISS.—(AP)—A posse hunting the slayer of a white plantation owner shot and killed a 29-year-old negro convict near this Northeast Mississippi town. Sheriff's deputy Tom Glover said Robert Cobb was shot down as he fled at a group of about eight posse members while he fled across a field Tuesday. The field was four miles west of the plantation where John Allison Hardy, Sr. was killed early Tuesday.

Hardy, prominent in New Orleans as well as here, was shot fatally as he sought to stop an argument at the house of his negro cook, Sheriff C. E. Farmer said the cook told him Cobb had been there and had told her he would never be taken alive. As soon as the death of the 62-year-old planter was noted about, between 75 and 100 neighbors assembled at his home and were deputized to hunt Cobb. Other Columbus Countymen joined the hunt under authority of a Mississippi law which authorizes any citizen to arrest any person known to be wanted for a felony.

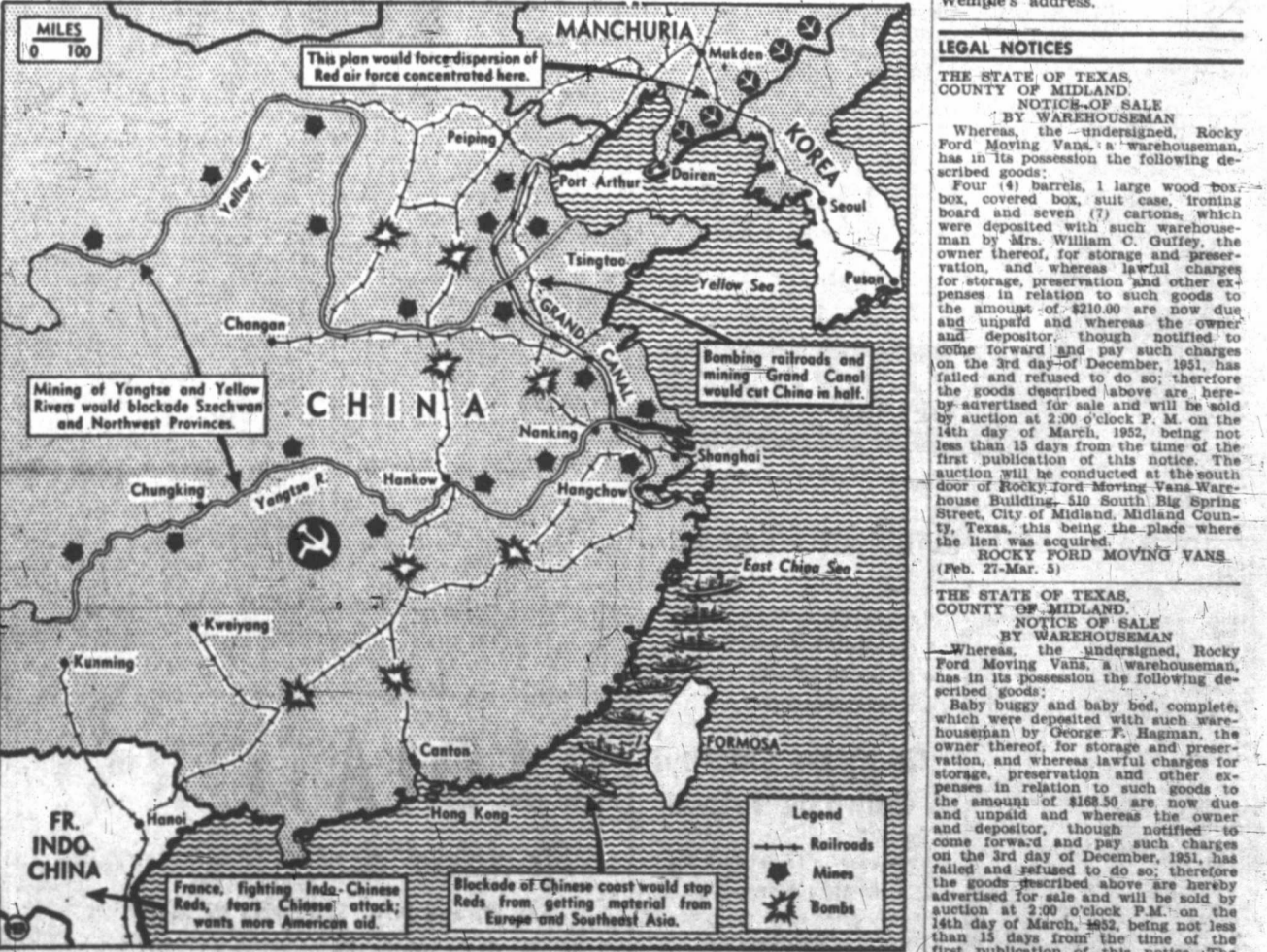

NEW ORLEANS—(P)—The "widest main street in the world" was almost empty Wednesday as New Orleans marked the end of carnival season with Ash Wednesday observances of the beginning of the 40 fast days of Lent.

Thousands who Tuesday enjoyed the madness of Mardi Gras wended their quiet ways to church to have their foreheads anointed with the ashes of last Palm Sunday's palms.

About 130 worried over police charges filed against them during Tuesday's fun and frolic that was replete with parades, dancing, masking and general fun-making. Most of the charges were misdemeanors. Those picked up for drunkenness were turned loose after about six hours in a police house "cooler."

Police said it was an unusually orderly celebration; usually about 300 persons are arrested on Mardi Gras.

Canal Street, which the Chamber of Commerce publicizes as the widest main street in the world, had little traffic. Many celebrators slept late; others already had left, shoppers were few.

Participants, as usual, agreed it was a grand Mardi Gras—despite cloudy, chilly, windy weather. Maskers, many of them girls in brief costumes, braved the inclement weather to elbow their way along the routes of the two main parades—those of Rex, lord of misrule, and Comus.

For hours throngs jammed Canal Street, barring all vehicular traffic. French Quarter night clubs were sardine-packed.

British Conductor Is Wary Of Wrangles With Women

LOS ANGELES—(P)—To the sensitive ear of Sir Thomas Beecham, the crusty British symphony conductor, moyle mood music is "just noise—ridiculous and distracting."

"It is even more painful than my sciatica," he told a press conference Tuesday.

The 73-year-old baronet, leader of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra of London, is here for two guest performances as conductor of the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra.

"Most film music," he said, "has nothing to do with the story. It's just noise, loud, silly . . . We seem to have trouble deciding whether the music is to accompany the picture—or the picture to accompany the music."

Pressed to comment on music and other subjects, Beecham said: "I'm not going to have you bring a lot of musicians and composers down on my neck. I definitely will not express any opinion on anything American. I will not make more enemies than I already have."

On a previous visit, Beecham declared the United States had "no elements of culture." For this he was denounced by women's groups.

"I will not," he snapped, "incur the wrath of women in my present sciatic condition."

Blasts From Diving Jet Fighters Shake Dallas County Areas

DALLAS—(P)—Shock wave blasts from three high-diving jet fighter planes rocked Dallas County residents Tuesday.

Chance Vought aircraft officials said the blasts, sounding like thunder, came from shock waves created by planes diving at high speeds.

Col. Fred J. Ascani, 34, Rockford, Ill., capped the first blast about 12:40 p.m. when he dived a Chance Vought P7U Cutlass from an altitude "exceeding 40,000 feet, or about seven miles."

Colonel Ascani holds the international speed record for 100 kilometers (62.1 miles) at 635.686 MPH. The speed of sound is about 760 MPH at sea level.

Lt. Col. Richard L. Johnson, 34, Cooperstown N. D., and Lt. Col. Pete Everest, Jr., Fairman, W. Va., followed with similar high speed dives that resulted in blasts at 4:05 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. Johnson flew a two-engine jet Cutlass and Everest flew an Air Force P86E Sabre jet.

Chance Vought officials termed the performances "familiarization flights to evaluate the Cutlass." A former Air Force pilot said the air force "apparently is evaluating the P7U for possible use as an interceptor and comparing its performance with the Sabre."

Sounding like bombs exploding in the distance, the blasts made residents of the area jittery because of a recent series of mysterious dynamite or nitroglycerine explosions in Dallas County.

Pioneer Air Lines Reports On Profit

DALLAS—Pioneer Air Lines has reported a net profit of \$194,078.69 after taxes or \$2.16 per share of outstanding stock for its 1951 operations, according to Eugene W. Bailey, secretary-treasurer.

The previous year's profit, after adjustment for over-assessment of income taxes of \$29,963.59, amounted to \$165,374.76 or \$1.84 per share on the 90,000 shares of outstanding stock.

Bailey pointed out the increase in net earnings was accomplished despite a 11.86 per cent increase in operating costs and 68 per cent increase in federal income taxes.

Passenger revenues in 1951 increased 28 per cent from \$1,763,060.06 in 1950 to \$2,287,053.06 while payments to Pioneer from the government for transporting the mail decreased 16 per cent from \$1,279,847.81 in 1950 to \$1,080,985.94 in 1951.

At the same time, Pioneer transported 108,428 ton miles of mail, an increase of nine per cent over the previous year. This reduced the cost per ton mile of mail carried from \$12.88 in 1950 to \$9.97 in 1951, a decrease of 23 per cent, Bailey said.

Revenue for transporting air express increased 14 per cent in 1951 to \$20,072.28 in comparison to \$17,672.33 for the previous year. For the same comparative periods, air freight revenues increased from \$41,240.50 to \$46,331.23, a gain of 12 per cent.

Charter or non-scheduled flight revenues increased 86 per cent in 1951 from \$42,131.44 in the previous year to \$78,347.55.

Negro GI Assessed Life Term For Rape Of German Woman

FRANKFURT, GERMANY.—(P)—A U. S. court martial Wednesday sentenced Pvt. Walter Brown, 19-year-old negro soldier, of raping and robbing a German woman, and sentenced him to life imprisonment.

Brown told the court written confessions presented by the prosecution were untrue and said Army criminal investigation agents tricked him into writing them.

The Philadelphia, Pa., soldier was a member of the U. S. Fourth Division. His sentence included dishonorable discharge and forfeiture of pay. It is subject to review by higher military authorities.
