Sinclair Wildcat In NW Upton Is Running Casing

Sinclair Oil & Gas Company No. 1 TXL wildcat in Northwest Upton County, is at total depth of 11,915 feet in the Devonian with operator preparing to cement 5 1/2-inch casing at 9,810 feet in the Pennsylvania.

The Devonian in No. 1 TXL is 400 feet low geologically to the same formation in Sinclair and Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 Dayta pumping Ellenburger discovery one mile to the northeast. It is 175 feet low to the Pennsylvania in the same well.

The Pennsylvania in No. 1 TXL will be tested through perforations above 10,810 feet. Drilling tests of that formation showed for possible commercial production. The Pennsylvania was not tested in No. 1, Davis, although samples had shows of oil.

No. 1 TXL is 860 feet from north and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 19, block 41, T-5-S, R-2P Survey.

Superior Schedules Ellenburger Tester In NW Scurry Area

The Superior Oil Company and Intex Oil Company staked location for a 9,300-foot Ellenburger wildcat in extreme Northwest Scurry County, one-half mile southeast of the lone Mississippian producer in the Winfield pool.

The new wildcat will be drilled as No. 13-578 R. H. Jordan and others. It will be 600 feet from south and west lines of section 578, block 97, N-2-T-C survey. That puts it two and one-half miles northwest of Pluvanna.

Superior and Intex No. 1 R. H. Jordan was completed on the pump as the Mississippian discovery for 47 barrels of oil daily. It had swabbed clean oil from the upper section of the Ellenburger before developing sulphur water at a deeper depth.

It was plugged back and completed from the Mississippian.

Estimated elevation at No. 13-578 Jordan is 2,790 feet.

Drilling is to start at once.

Shell Sets Site For Ellenburger Wildcat In NW Crane Region

Shell Oil Company has staked location for No. 2 John Edwards and others, wildcat, in extreme Northwest Crane County, 11 miles southwest of Penwell.

It will drill to 8,500 feet for a test of the Ellenburger.

Drill site is 600 feet from south and 661 feet from east lines of section 18, block B-17, ps1 survey. It will be dug on a 644-acre lease.

Operations are to start at once. Location is three and three-quarter miles northwest of the shallow Sand Hills-McKnight field.

S-C Gaines Site For 6,275-Foot Glorieta Tester

One and three-quarter miles northeast of Glorieta production in the Robertson field of South-Central Gaines County, The Texas Company spotted location for No. 19 A. B. Wharton, Jr., and others.

It is slated to drill to 6,275 feet for a test of the Glorieta. Drill site is 330 feet from south and west lines of section 7, block A-21, ps1 survey.

That puts it 5,400 feet northeast of Texaco No. 9 Wharton, now at plugged back total depth of 6,334 feet waiting for cement to harden on seven-inch casing. Operator will drill out plug and perforate casing for production tests of the Glorieta above plugged back total depth.

Columbian Gets Free Oil From Lime Zone In Stonewall Wildcat

Columbian Fuel Corporation No. 1 J. D. Patterson estate, Northwest Stonewall County wildcat, three and one-half miles north of Ftacook has found possibilities of production in a lime stringer in the base of the Pennsylvania reef.

The show came in a four hour and 25 minute drillstem test at 5-758-69 feet. Gas surfaced in 25 minutes. There was no gauge or estimate of the gas volume.

Truman's Cleanup Man Frowns Upon Vaughan, O'Dwyer

NEW YORK (AP)—Newbold Morris, President Truman's corruption cleanup man, doesn't think very much of two of Truman's appointees.

The two: William O'Dwyer, former mayor of New York and now ambassador to Mexico, and Maj. Gen. Harry H. Vaughan, the President's military aide.

Morris said Sunday on NBC's "Meet the Press" that he wouldn't have had either O'Dwyer or Vaughan around if he had his way.

O'Dwyer, who twice defeated Morris for mayor, figured in the Senate crime investigation hearings last year. Vaughan was a key figure in a Senate probe into influence peddling.

Here is how a portion of the questioning went:

Interviewer Lawrence Spivak: "Who has been responsible for keeping O'Dwyer, for example, against whom you ran, against whom corruption of some kind was revealed?"

Morris: "I'm trying to keep myself in an objective state of mind and when you ask me about O'Dwyer, it is like waving a red flag to a bull."

Spivak: "Would you have kept O'Dwyer an ambassador?"

Morris: "He wouldn't have been there."

Spivak: "You wouldn't have appointed him at all?"

Morris: "No."

Spivak: "Who was responsible for appointing him?"

Morris: "Obviously the President appointed him."

The Senate Crime Investigating Committee accused O'Dwyer of contributing to the growth of organized crime in New York City. O'Dwyer denied the charge, saying that a few minor and isolated incidents had "interference" been blown into exaggerated proportions and given "ministerial insinuations."

Vaughan's name came up during the "five per center" investigation which produced testimony that "influence peddlers" gave away deep freezes in return for favors.

Morris was asked if he would have kept Vaughan on as a "presidential aide" in light of the deep freezes in return for favors.

Morris: "I don't think I'd have had General Vaughan there to start with."

Egypt's New Boss Suspends Parliament, Closes College

CAIRO, EGYPT (AP)—Egypt's new Prime Minister Ahmed Naguib Hilaly Pasha announced suspension of Parliament for 30 days and Monday headed into a reform regime dedicated to purging corruption from the government.

He also began preparing for new talks with Britain on control of the Suez Canal Zone and the Sudan.

Announcement of the parliamentary suspension, which his predecessor, Aly Maher Pasha, had refused to approve, was a first major action of the 60-year-old jurist and independent Sunday night following swearing in of his cabinet.

The new government also suspended indefinitely operation of Egypt's biggest school, Fuad University in Cairo, after students began a sitdown strike protesting continued martial law and any agreements with the West. Late Sunday, police cleared out the students and closed the university grounds.

Maher Pasha resigned unexpectedly Saturday. Some political leaders had wanted him to dissolve Parliament and call new elections. This was sought as a move against the strongly nationalist Wafdist Party, which now dominates the legislative body.

Suspension of Parliament first was announced Saturday, but Maher Pasha, after a hurried cabinet meeting, announced his government did not approve the action. Shortly thereafter, he resigned.

Hilaly said he was starting at once to study Egypt's position in relation to Britain but that he would need time before he could begin new talks aimed at settling the Anglo-Egyptian dispute.

Kickoff Breakfast Launches 1952 Red Cross Fund Drive

Midland County's 1952 Red Cross finance campaign was off to a fast start Monday, following the staging of a "kickoff" breakfast in the Crystal Ballroom of Hotel Scharbauer.

Enthusiasm was high at the breakfast-meeting, as optimistic campaign leaders called upon volunteer workers to push the drive "over the top" by March 15.

Gerome Grayum, chairman of the Midland County Red Cross Chapter, presided at the session, and R. L. (Bob) Miller, general campaign chairman, outlined plans for the whirlwind drive.

The Midland County goal this year is \$16,000, which is more than \$1,000 less than 1951 receipts. The national quota is \$85,000,000.

Grayum explained that 70.9 percent of the funds collected will remain in Midland County, while 29.1 percent will go to the national organization. He mentioned the work of the local and national organizations, and said that Midland always has exceeded its Red Cross quota. Returns last year totaled \$17,711.95.

Lands Red Cross Work

Miller lauded the work of the Midland chapter, which, he said, is meeting the needs of the community. He urged workers to complete their assignments as promptly as possible and said that all prospects must be contacted in order for the campaign to be the success it should be.

L. V. Bassham, chairman of the retail division; Paul Osborne, co-chairman of the office building division; and Charles Mathews, public schools chairman, introduced their workers and team captains.

France Still Seeking New Government

PARIS (AP)—Antoine Pinay, 60, a Conservative, said Monday he would see if he could form a new cabinet to get France out of its political and financial jam.

Pinay announced his decision after a half-hour's talk with President Vincent Auriol.

Pinay is expected to try and form another middle-of-the-road government similar to that of Edgar Faure, which collapsed Friday. His chances are regarded as highly doubtful. Paul Reynaud, a former premier, tried it and failed. Former Premier Rene Pleven refused even to try.

Some said Pinay had little interest in forming a cabinet.

Some politicians were looking ahead to a try by ex-premier Henri Queuille. He would have a better chance of getting Socialist, if not De Gaulle, cooperation.

France's financial and ministerial crisis has stalled development of Western European defense and may mean that much of the West's defense planning will have to be re-shaped.

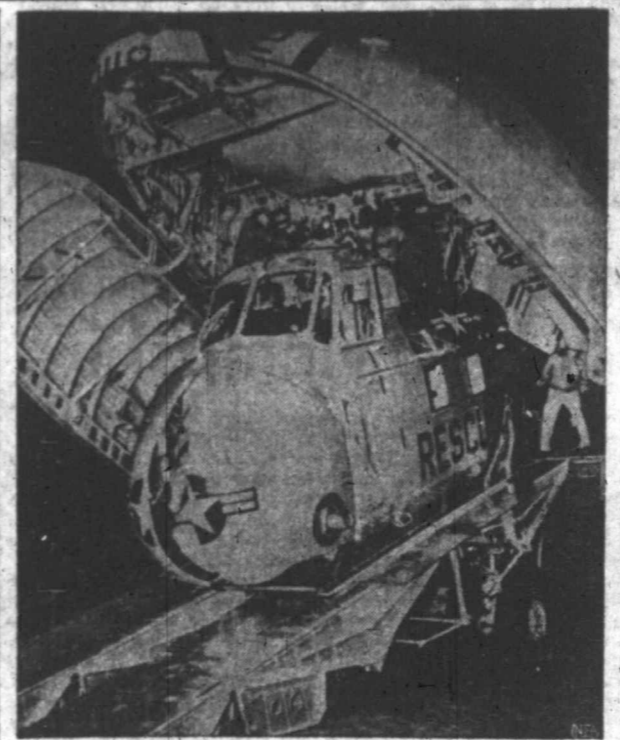
France Must Help Herself, Declares Senator Connally

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Connally (D-Texas) said Monday, "If France does not do her utmost to defend herself, she cannot justify large military and economic aid from the U. S."

Connally made the statement to members after Secretary of State Acheson had conferred almost two hours at a closed meeting with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Connally is chairman of the group.

Connally said his remarks were directly related to the current French government crisis.

Connally refused to discuss what Acheson told the committee, but Senator Sparkman (D-Ala) said the cabinet officer is "certain—he has no misgivings at all—that France will find a way to finance the program."

37 Persons Die As Airliner Dives Into Olive Grove

NICE, FRANCE (AP)—An Air France airliner crashed in an olive grove near this Riviera sun spot Monday, killing 37 persons, including an American ballet dancer and two French actresses. A woman taken alive from the wreckage was reported in critical condition.

Joan Katzman, 21, who danced under the name of Harriet Toby, was the dead American. She appeared Sunday night at Cannes in the Ballet la Muerte, Spanish for death. Her home was New York City.

Mrs. Marguerite Delpy of Paris was taken alive from the wreckage.

Nice Airport employees said pieces of sea gull's wings and feathers had been found in the air intakes of the plane's engines and this might have caused the crash, only a few minutes after the airliner took off for Paris.

In Paris, Air France officials said they could not confirm this.

The plane—a French-built Languedoc with 34 passengers and a crew of four plummeted into an olive grove.

The dead included the wife of the pilot, Theau Farrugia, 28, a veteran of 4,500 hours flying time.

Smashed To Bits

The plane smashed into bits.

On taking off, instead of heading out over the Mediterranean—the normal procedure, the plane turned and headed straight for the City of Nice.

It then turned back to the airport, losing altitude, and plunged into an olive grove only a few feet from a group of houses inhabited by 29 families.

The plane, a type used only in European and North African services, normally carries a crew of five and has a capacity of 33 passengers. Monday there was one more.

Puerto Rico Votes On New Constitution

SAN JUAN, PUERTO RICO (AP)—Voters of this U. S. island possession decide Monday on a new Constitution which will give them home rule and cut most political ties with the U. S.

More than 600,000 of the island's 2,210,000 people were expected to vote.

The U. S. Congress must approve the charter. Final action will make Puerto Rico a "free commonwealth"—a self-governing state freely associated with the U. S. in about the same way that commonwealth countries are linked with Britain.

Winds Blast Waco; Snow In Panhandle

A violent thunderstorm caused an estimated \$100,000 damage at Waco early Monday, shattering plate glass windows, toppling outdoor signs, smashing garages, roofs and small buildings.

No injuries were reported.

Winds that measured up to 65 miles an hour struck around 3 a.m. and damaged downtown Waco and the Bellmead area.

Police Sgt. Olier Chambers estimated damages at \$100,000 after a personal survey of the hardest hit areas.

Hard hail and a deluge of rain that measured from .30 to .50 inch at various spots in Waco poured out of the thunderhead.

Large outdoor billboards were toppled and scattered. Plate glass windows in numerous business houses were smashed.

One garage was blown off its foundation and deposited in a neighbor's driveway. Several chicken houses were destroyed.

Mathews were blown from display windows of several ready-to-wear and department stores and swirled through the street.

Half of the roof of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Roundhouse at Bellmead was blown off and the falling timbers disrupted power and telephone service.

A plate glass window at the First National Bank in the downtown area was shattered and the bank's (Continued On Page Eight)

Sabres Kill Two MIG's, Damage Five

SEOUL, KOREA (AP)—Outnumbered American Sabre jets shot down two Communist MIG-15 jets Monday and damaged five others as an estimated 250 Red fighters swept south of the Yalu.

The Sabres tangled with the MIG's in four separate battles. The two Red jets the Air Force said were shot down, boosted to 200 the number of MIG's destroyed by Fifth Air Force planes in Korea.

Some Communist jets streaked far south of their usual haunts, almost to the battle line. Two MIG's attacked a pair of propeller driven P-51 Mustangs south of the North Korean capital of Pyongyang, but both Mustangs had-opped safely back to base.

Battlefront Quiet

Both kills came in afternoon battles—one a 10-minute dogfight between 23 Sabres and 150 MIG's and the other a five-minute clash between 27 Sabres and more than 60 MIG's.

The five damage claims were scored in two morning battles involving 55 Sabres and more than 90 MIG's.

It was the first time in two days the Red combat planes ventured across the winding Yalu River boundary from their sanctuary in Manchuria.

Along the scarred battlefield, Allied forces restricted action to patrol scouting. Sunday, an Allied tank force muscled a two-prong squeeze on Chinese hill positions northeast and northwest of Chonwon, in Western Korea.

The tankers reported 23 Communist bunkers wiped out and eight damaged. No tanks were reported lost.

Shoppers Deluge Stores In March Dollar Day Event

Shoppers from Midland and area cities got an early start here Monday as this headquarters city observed its March Dollar Day.

Many of the early-morning shoppers lined up in front of stores before the prescribed opening hour in order to get first chance at the hundreds of Dollar Day specials offered by Midland merchants.

And the shopping spree increased in tempo during the morning hours, reaching congested proportions between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. Street and sidewalk traffic was unusually heavy and alert and courteous clerks were hard-pressed to take care of the needs of the scores of customers who crowded most retail stores. Parking space was at a premium.

It appeared the March Dollar Day would be one of the "biggest and best" in recent months.

'Oyster Fork Fox' Called In Military Buying Probe

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vice Adm. Charles Fox got his chance Monday to "debunk" charges that the military is an extravagant buyer.

He went before a House Armed Services subcommittee that has assembled a "chamber of horrors" exhibit to show the various services pay different prices for identical goods.

Fox, chief of Navy materiel, was promised "a clear field" by Chairman Herbert (D-La.), who has labeled the admiral "one Red Orange of the Pentagon." The admiral also has been made the unhappy target of the sobriquet "Oyster Fork Fox," because of an oversupply of these utensils alleged to have been acquired by the Navy.

The officer notified the committee earlier that he could "debunk" its charges of spendthrift buying by the Army, Navy and Air Force. Pentagon Propagandists.

Herbert said the military has been trying to confuse the issue by accusing the committee of using improper press on its exhibits of blankets, tools, and other common-use equipment purchased by all three services.

And, in a move against what he calls "Pentagon propagandists," Herbert has asked Secretary of Defense Lovett for the names of all defense personnel engaged in public relations duties.

There's Something New Down In Dixie: Old Time Religion With A Boogie Beat

THOMASVILLE, GA. —(P)— They have given the old time religion a boogie beat and it's packing them in by the thousands down in Dixie.

Imagine a concert of songs dealing solely with salvation, a concert which lasts eight hours, a concert where you do well to find a single vacant seat, even at four in the morning, in an auditorium seating 2,000.

That's the "all-night sing" which has taken the South by storm even in such sophisticated cities as Miami and Tampa. It evolved out of the singing conventions which once played a big part in Southern rural religious life and still are far from extinct.

The all night events, however, are distinctly commercial enterprises. They are presented with a polish and showmanship which commands admission prices averaging around \$1.50 and draws audiences of persons who think nothing of driving 50 miles to attend.

fire, well-paced repartee of the Joe Miller Joke Book variety. It has nothing to do with religion and the audience eats it up. Then the pianist will crouch low over the keyboard and with flying fingers and stamping feet beat out a rhythm which irresistibly draws the audience into keeping time.

The quartet swings into the kind of music you never hear in church. Swaying, whirling and often leaping in the air in exuberance, the singers put everything they've got into such ditties as "I Got Happy When I Got Saved," "You Gonna Reap Just What You Sow," "Better Get Down on Your Knees and Pray," "I'm gonna Take a Trip on That Old Gospel Ship," and "Rock Me, Lord."

The audience often bursts into applause in the middle of a song, carried away by a particularly infectious rhythm or close bit of harmony.

One worldly young lady was won over completely after the second or third number.

"Boy, could you jitterbug to these things!" she exclaimed ecstatically. Between their appearance on stage, the quartet members mingle with the audience in the lobby. There's a good deal of drifting in and out during the lengthy concert and people leave their seats often to visit with each other.

There's nothing of the prima donna about the quartet members in spite of the several hundred dollars a night each group gets paid. They are genuinely friendly and will fall into conversation with anyone in the audience.

The attitudes of the quartet members toward their work vary. Some

are religiously inclined and look on their calling as a missionary vocation. Others frankly are worldly. They like the life and like the songs.

"But," said one, "I don't go for too much of this religion. I believe in God, of course, but I couldn't get up there on the stage and talk about it."

Promoter McCormick is frank to admit it's a business with him.

There's no doubt that although most of the songs are souped up to jitterbug tempo, they express religious sentiment of the most orthodox variety.

A few older members of the audience would like the quartets to be "a little more spiritual." But the vast weight of opinion—including that of a good many ministers—is on the side of the energetic singers.

Three Presidential Hopefuls Take Off For New Hampshire

An all-star cast of top politicians, including three presidential candidates, Monday were New Hampshire-bound for the home stretch battle for primary election ballots there.

Senator Robert A. Taft and Harold E. Stassen, Republican candidates, and Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee, Democratic candidate, headed for some on-the-spot campaigning in the final week before the New Hampshire's March 11 primary elections.

Also booked for appearances were Paul Hoffman, former economic cooperation administrator; Senators Saltonstall and Lodge of Massachusetts and Carlson of Kansas, Governor Lodge of Connecticut, and Representative Herter, (R-Mass).

The state never has seen so many nationally-known figures all at once. Entered in the primary, first of its kind in the nation, are these men or delegates pledged to them: Taft, Stassen, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower and Gen. Douglas MacArthur, on the GOP ticket; and Kefauver and President Truman on the Democratic slate.

Major interest centered in the Taft-Eisenhower clash. All signs point to a neck-and-neck race, although earlier predictions were that Eisenhower would win in a walk.

However, recent polls shows Taft has gained. Even Eisenhower backers concede this.

And a note from General Mac-

Arthur to a New Hampshire supporter may swing things even further toward Taft. An aide to MacArthur confirmed Sunday night that the general wrote: "I suggest you support Taft."

But there is interest, too, in the New Hampshire race between Truman and Kefauver. The Democratic Party organization, called in to action only last Saturday, opened a vigorous campaign to make Truman look good. A Kefauver victory could hurt him if he decided to run for re-election. He hasn't announced his plans yet.

Taft winds up a three-day tour of Wisconsin Monday with a talk in Burlington. Then he heads for New Hampshire and a three-day campaign. Sunday night he met and shook hands with 200 factory workers and their wives in Milwaukee.

Stassen, in New York, said on a television program that he is not a "stalking horse" for Eisenhower, and he doesn't think the general will return in time to put on a strong campaign.

But he said Taft and Eisenhower might block each other off, in which case he hoped to win the nomination in a GOP convention deadlock.

Kefauver was in Boston Sunday, keeping several speaking dates. He said one of the greatest problems facing the country is the need for a foreign policy that will insure peace. He swings into New Hampshire Tuesday to continue what he described as a "tough uphill fight" in the primary.

In Race To Finish

Russell of Georgia, newest of the Democratic candidates, said in a television interview he is in the race to the finish—but again declined to say whether he would lead a third party if Truman is nominated.

Russell, who announced his candidacy last Thursday, immediately attracted pledges of support from most of the Southern Democratic leaders who are against a renomination for Truman.

Democratic Senator Kerr of Oklahoma, who will be a candidate if Truman does not run, Sunday said he expects "much of the South" to support Russell. But on a radio-TV show he said the Democrats are not going to split just because various groups support different candidates.

A different view was expressed by Senator Ellender of Louisiana, who said in Washington: "There is a definite possibility that the next President will be elected by the House of Representatives."

Under the Constitution, if no candidate for the presidency gets a majority of the 531 electoral college votes, then the House elects them. Each state has one vote in this case.

Ellender said a contest between Truman and Taft might find neither able to gain the necessary 268 electoral college votes. If a third candidate won most of the Southern states, the Louisiana senator said he thinks Russell could carry at least nine Southern states and perhaps more.

Kefauver was in Boston Sunday, keeping several speaking dates. He said one of the greatest problems facing the country is the need for a foreign policy that will insure peace. He swings into New Hampshire Tuesday to continue what he described as a "tough uphill fight" in the primary.

In Race To Finish

Russell of Georgia, newest of the Democratic candidates, said in a television interview he is in the race to the finish—but again declined to say whether he would lead a third party if Truman is nominated.

Russell, who announced his candidacy last Thursday, immediately attracted pledges of support from most of the Southern Democratic leaders who are against a renomination for Truman.

Democratic Senator Kerr of Oklahoma, who will be a candidate if Truman does not run, Sunday said he expects "much of the South" to support Russell. But on a radio-TV show he said the Democrats are not going to split just because various groups support different candidates.

A different view was expressed by Senator Ellender of Louisiana, who said in Washington: "There is a definite possibility that the next President will be elected by the House of Representatives."

Under the Constitution, if no candidate for the presidency gets a majority of the 531 electoral college votes, then the House elects them. Each state has one vote in this case.

Ellender said a contest between Truman and Taft might find neither able to gain the necessary 268 electoral college votes. If a third candidate won most of the Southern states, the Louisiana senator said he thinks Russell could carry at least nine Southern states and perhaps more.

Politics—A Fit Endeavor

Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois may or may not cut a figure in the Democratic presidential race. But we already can be grateful to him for one thing: a willingness to regard politics as a fit endeavor for a man of character and ability.

Stevenson's father told him to stay out of politics. But Adlai changed his mind when he heard of a public opinion poll recording that seven of 10 American parents didn't want their sons in public life.

It was wartime and he was outraged that boys could die in battle but their parents didn't want them to attempt to make a better America.

Stevenson's decision to enter politics was one that many more able Americans ought to be making but do not. They adopt the stock attitude that "politics is a dirty business" and no place for a decent citizen.

Then, of course, they lament the often low level of political morals and achievement.

How could it be otherwise when the men most fitted by native talent and education decline to assume public responsibilities? When the field is thus abandoned, it falls naturally to lesser men.

The same sort of irony is apparent in the attitude of the American citizenry toward last year's disclosures of city corruption by the Senate Kefauver Committee. The response was one of shock and surprise.

But too frequently these same citizens never went within 100 yards of the voting booth on election days, when they had a chance to do something positive about corrupt and incompetent office-seekers.

There is not a politician in this country who can stand up against the aroused indignation of an alert citizenry. That has been proven time and again at the polling place.

If venal or weak men hold office, it is because we who have the power to throw them out do nothing about it. No item in the long catalog of excuses is really impressive.

First we need political recruits from the ranks of men who plainly are marked by brains and experience for public life. This means that many who would prefer to do otherwise must bestir themselves from comfortable jobs and pleasant home surroundings and enlist in the service of their country.

And secondly we need a mature, alive citizenry which will work energetically to elect these qualified men. Again, this calls for effort which constitutes an interference with the well-grooved routines of daily living.

If we as citizens are not prepared to do this, and if our able men are not willing to serve, let us stop prating about corruption and incompetence in politics. We are yielding the field to these evils by default, and have no right to expect anything else.

SAN JUAN — Today, in Puerto Rico, beginning just before noon, the streets will be quite empty. For promptly at 1 o'clock, little groups of Puerto Ricans will be locked up, 160 to a schoolhouse or office building, to vote on one of the most important documents in the Western Hemisphere—the new Puerto Rican constitution.

The voters will be locked in the buildings and schoolhouses in order to prevent their repeating at the polls. They sit quietly waiting their turn to vote while a great calm settles down over the island. This calm is so intense that you almost can hear thousands of pencils scratching across on thousands of ballots in this American plebiscite on self-determination of peoples.

This unique balloting is taking place in the oldest part of America, yet is one of the newest experiments in self-government.

It was just a few miles from here that Christopher Columbus first poked the nose of the Santa Maria into the mysteries of the new world. The turret tower of the Governor's Palace at San Juan, from which this new constitution will be administered, was built only 40 years after Columbus' arrival here.

And, as Columbus pioneered a new world, so Puerto Rico and the United States may be pioneering a new

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By OSWALD JACOBY Written For NEA Service

The approach of the Eastern Championships, which will be held in New York towards the end of this month, reminds me that I'm not quite the youngster I used to be.

Bridge hasn't changed so much in twenty-three years as we sometimes think. For example, consider one of the hands that we played in that first Eastern.

Most pairs got to four spades with the South hand, but many of them found a way to throw the game out of the window.

The careless declarer would ruff the second club, cash two top diamonds and lead a third diamond to ruff it in dummy. This allowed

West to step up with the pack of spades to over-ruff dummy. Now South still had to lose a heart and a trump, for a one-trick set.

When George Reith played the hand, he took the simple precaution of drawing one round of trumps before he began the diamonds. After all, he needed only one of dummy's trumps to ruff a diamond, so it was sound technique to draw the other trump.

This simple safety play removed the jack of spades from the West hand. He couldn't prevent Reith from ruffing a low diamond with dummy's remaining trump, so the same contract was easily made.

In my mind, the lesson taught by this hand is just as clear today as when it was first played.

CARD Sense

Korean War Expansion Seen As Political Campaign Issue

WASHINGTON—Demands for a step-up of the war against Communist China have been causing a great deal of strategic soul-searching in the Pentagon. These demands have been made by such leaders as Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio and Gov. James F. Byrnes of South Carolina.

Both prefaced their remarks with an expression of hope that peace can be concluded in Korea. If it can't, they want a hotter war.

"Our Air Force should be directed to seek out enemy (Chinese) bases and destroy them. Our Navy should blockade the ports of Communist China," declared Governor Byrnes at Williamsburg. And he added, "We should accept the aid of 50,000 fighting men of Nationalist China."

Senator Taft in his Seattle speech declared that a Chinese Nationalist invasion of the mainland was the only chance of stopping a Communist assault on Southeast Asia. Earlier he declared in Washington, "If the Korean peace talks break down completely, unfortunately I don't see any choice except to fight an all-out war against Red China."

One proposal has been to change President Truman's order which placed the U. S. Seventh fleet in the straits between Formosa and the Chinese mainland, to neutralize the Nationalist Chinese-held island base.

All such sentiments, however, follow up on Gen. Douglas MacArthur's advocacy of bombing Chinese bases north of Yalu River, in Manchuria. Democratic Charges

These proposals have drawn sharp counter-charges from such Democratic politicians as Senator Kerr of Oklahoma, Ellender of Louisiana, Sparkman of Alabama, Magnuson of Washington and Moody of Michigan. They charge the Republicans, principally, with wanting to start a "Taft war" against Red China.

What therefore should be considered as a purely military and foreign policy question has become a political campaign issue.

No high military authority approached by this writer has been willing to discuss these things on the record. All want to stay away from any political fight. For background, however, they point out some of the military factors in this argument:

1. Assume the U. S. Seventh fleet is withdrawn from the 80-mile wide Formosa straits and an attack on China mainland is launched by Chinese Nationalist troops. They will have to be carried across the water in American ships. They will have to be supplied with American weapons, ammunition and rations.

2. The growth of Chinese Communist air power must be considered. It was estimated at about 1,000 planes last June. It was zero a year before. Today it is about 1,700 planes, of which 900 are jets.

The point is made that if the U. S. Seventh fleet were withdrawn, Formosa would be a "sitting duck" target for Communist aircraft. The Chinese Nationalist air force would be no match. The only alternative would be to protect the island by American air power.

3. The question of where this extra American air power would come from merits some consideration. The U. S. Air Force expansion pro-

gram now has been cut down—rather stretched out.

Air Aid To Chiang: His present goal is to have a 143-wing air force on hand by 1954, or maybe 1955. This is considered sufficient to provide a counter-offensive striking force in case of enemy attack, plus an adequate U. S. air defense. No reserves are provided for.

If U. S. air power is dissipated in other wars, this build-up of air strength will be destroyed. The alternative here is a much bigger U. S. Air Force, in a hurry, at multi-billion dollar cost.

4. If U. S. bombing of Manchuria and Red China does become necessary and is ordered, considerable damage can be inflicted. Air, bases, ports, railroads and other strategic targets could be attacked.

The Communists' main production centers would not, however, be reached by these attacks. These factories are not in Manchuria, nor in Red China. They are in Russia. It might, therefore, take a bombing attack on the Soviet to destroy Red China's war potential.

5. Finally, there is widespread belief that if any attack is made on Red China, Soviet Russia, automatically would be brought into the Korean War as a full-scale participant. This mutual aid and full military assistance is provided in the Mgo-Stalin pact of 1950. This would mean the start of World War III.

Communist-Run Compound 62 Is Festering Sore In UN Side

By WILLIAM JORDEN
KOJE ISLAND, KOREA—(AP)—Compound 62, a barbed wire enclosure housing some 5,000 Communist-led trouble makers, is a festering sore in the huge United Nations prisoner of war camp on this South Korean Island.

More violence has erupted in 62 than in virtually all the other 28 compounds for Korean civilian prisoners.

Only one other prisoner pen ever comes close to 62 for intrigue, violence and undisguised hatred for the United Nations. That is compound 66—"home" for die-hard Korean Communist officers.

Two weeks ago, the Red-led inmates of 62 attacked American soldiers who had been sent in to prevent trouble while prisoners were interviewed. Wielding clubs, tent poles, homemade blackjacks and barbed wire whips, the occupants of 62 rushed the Americans.

The riot was quelled only by rifle fire. Fifty-five Korean prisoners were killed and 150 wounded. Twenty-three of the wounded died since.

One American soldier was killed and 39 were wounded.

Antagonism was apparent in 62 as long ago as last June.

Information specialists and teachers said the prisoners often were deliberately rude, scornful and insulting.

The education program had to be abandoned entirely in that compound in December.

Violent Hostility
Enmity was not confined to the authorities. Anti-Communist inmates were scorned, tried in mock courts and beaten. Several months ago about 300 inmates were moved out of 62 at their own request.

Camp officials said that three months ago an effort was made to interview the prisoners in 62. It was abandoned quickly in the face of what one senior officer called "violent hostility."

Camp officials have been unable, or unwilling, to explain how the Communist element in compound 62 has been able so successfully to take over control of the internees.

Some observers suggest that by accident or design prisoners with violent Communist affections have been concentrated in 62. Officials deny any such plan.

Other observers expressed amazement at the virtual lack of inspection inside the compound in recent months.

When the inmates attacked American troops February 18, they obviously were well prepared. Minutes after the soldiers entered the compound, they were showered with a rock barrage. Shortly thereafter, prisoners poured from their buildings and tents armed almost to a man with crude but effective weapons.

Not Searched For Weapons
Camp officials admitted the compound had not been searched for weapons since December.

Authorities imply such action was neglected to avoid further trouble. The compound spokesman had warned the UN camp authorities he "could not guarantee the safety" of any unwanted persons who entered the compound.

Officials tacitly admit the internees of Camp 62 virtually are running their own show.

The interviewing was resumed this week only after the men of 62 had proposed it and after their condition that a minimum of armed guards be used was accepted by camp officials.

The general policy of leniency adopted by the United Nations in its handling of prisoners is perhaps the best explanation of compound 62.

That policy has enabled a Communist group—perhaps a minority—to dominate an entire compound.

It has resulted in noisy but harmless demonstrations almost daily. It has led to bloodshed.

It is less easy to describe what the effect of that same policy has been on the prisoners in other compounds, on those who are repelled by Red methods.

Apparently the officials of the Koje stockade which holds about 170,000 Koreans—feel the effect on the others is worth all the confusion and violence generated by the men of compound 62.

Christian Science Lecture Heard In Auditorium Here

"In the writings of that great spiritually-minded woman, Mary Baker Eddy, the beloved Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science, are many references to salvation, including the one which defines salvation as 'Life, Truth, and Love understood and demonstrated as supreme over all; sin, sickness, and death destroyed' (Science and Health p. 593). Being saved, that is, actually experiencing salvation from all discord, all abnormalities, means knowing the truth which Jesus said would make us free. Tom J. Henson, owner of the latter mine, said his watchman had spotted a car at the scene shortly before the fire. He estimated the loss at \$20,000.

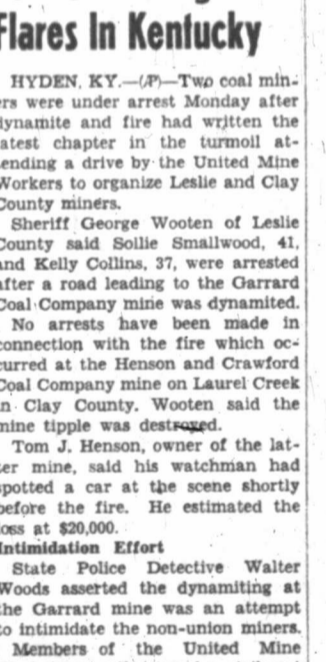
Intimidation Effort

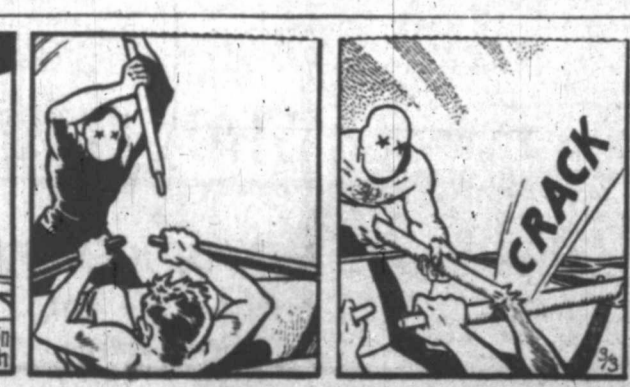

Spivey Ruled Out Of NCAA Tourney By Athletic Board

LEXINGTON, KY.—(AP)—Hopes of Big Bill Spivey to be reinstated as a University of Kentucky basketball player were dashed Sunday night when the athletic board of the university banned him permanently from its eligibility list.

With Spivey's hopes went those of the wildcat cage team that the seven-foot Georgian, an All-America center, would be able to play in the National Collegiate Athletic Association Tournament.

The athletic board said, in the course of a lengthy statement: "We feel compelled to say that it is our unanimous opinion, at this time, that Spivey was implicated in a conspiracy to fix Kentucky basketball games during the 1950-51 season."

The board said there was evidence to indicate this occurred during the Sugar Bowl Tournament at New Orleans in December, 1950.

Spivey has denied repeatedly that he was guilty of any wrongdoing. He was present at the board session but unavailable for comment afterwards.

The board's statement revealed for the first time that Spivey's "voluntary" withdrawal from Kentucky's eligibility list in December followed action by the board suspending him. Sunday night's statement said Spivey was allowed to announce his withdrawal to save him embarrassment.

The lanky basketball star returned last week from New York where he went before the grand jury for questioning on basketball fixes. The jurors also heard testimony from Walter Hirsch, captain of the 1950-51 team, and Jim Lane, another former Kentucky player.

Three other former Kentucky players—Alex Grosa, Ralph Beard and Dale Barnstable—have admitted shaving points in the National Invitational Tournament at Madison Square Garden in 1949. They are scheduled to be sentenced March 28.

The athletic board, commenting on Spivey's insistence upon his innocence, said Dean of Students A. D. Kirwan, who went to New York with Spivey, was given access to the private minutes of the grand jury and the record of the New York district attorney's office.

The board said that last November, after rumors had linked Spivey's name to the basketball scandals, Dean Kirwan interviewed the big cage star. On that occasion, the board said, Spivey denied he ever had been approached by a fixer or had any reason to suspect that any of his teammates had been approached.

Spurned Bribe
Sunday, in the Louisville Courier-Journal, Spivey said he had been approached twice by a fixer, known to him only as "George" but stated he had spurned a bribe.

He said he was sorry now he had not reported the incident but that he remained silent in order not to involve others on the team.

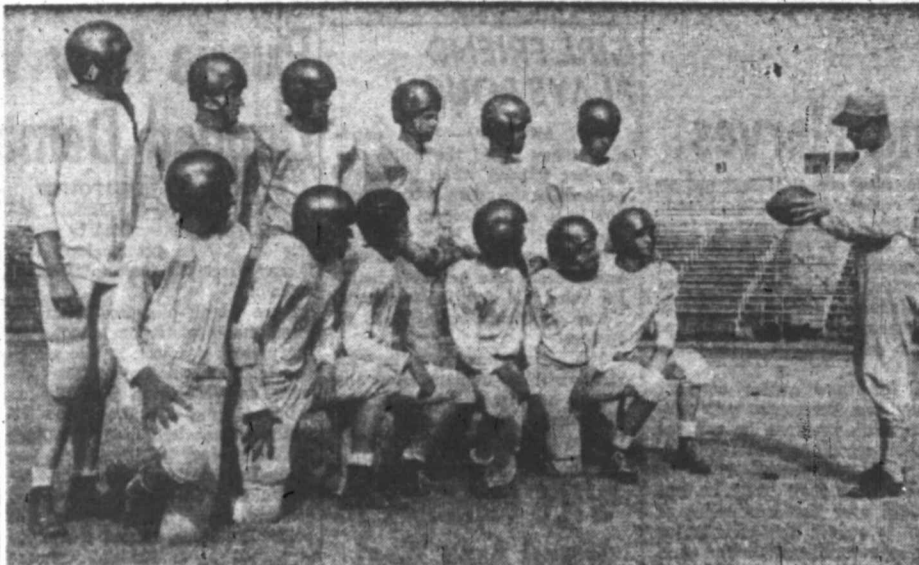

Borger Tops List Of Teams Headed For State Playoff

Borger, Alamo Heights (San Antonio), Bowie, Dimmitt, and Laheville were projected as favorites Monday as 24 teams headed for Austin and the Texas schoolboy basketball tournament which will crown five state champions.

Only one 1951 titlist was in the field that will battle Friday and Saturday for state and divisional crowns.

Bowie, rated by observers as strong enough to compete for any of the championships, will be contending for the Class AA pennant. This team was in Class A last year.

The team with the greatest record, however, is Dimmitt, undefeated in 33 games. Dimmitt is a strong choice for the Class A championship.

Borger takes a fine 27-1 record to the state tournament in Class AAAA. The Bulldogs lost their one test inside the district. Included in their season record is a 60-39 defeat of Poly (Fort Worth), one of the teams that will be playing in the Class AAAA tournament. Poly has a 26-4 record. Others in Class AAAA are Waco (24-6) and Sam Houston (Houston) 25-3.

Borger, paced by Mack Carter who has lopped in about 800 points, had little trouble moving back into the state tournament. Poly eliminated Sunset of Dallas, a team that had won 28 straight before clashing with the Parrots. Waco, headed by Fred Gottlieb, who has flipped in over 500 points, beat Austin two out of three to gain the state tournament. Sam Houston took two out of three from Port Arthur.

In Class AAA, Brownwood, Gladewater, Bryan and Alamo Heights gained the big tournament. Alamo Heights, with a 33-3 record, is a mild choice to win the title.

Bowie has a 28-2 record this season—the best in Class AA. Loveland (30-4), Madisonville (28-5) and French (Beaumont) (23-4) are the other three in this division. Head man of the Bowie attack is Temple Tucker, 6-foot-8. Bowie beat Van 63-49 in winning the regional title. Van took down Gladewater of Class AAA 50-30 during the season.

Dimmitt's opposition in the state tournament will be Plano, Lovelady and Sweeney.

In Class B Laneville rates the favorite's nod mostly because it licked Grayuga, the 1951 state champion, by a whopping 76-56. Laneville, starring C. L. Nix, 6-foot-4 hotshot who scored 116 points in the four games of the regional tournament, could run into plenty of trouble from Samnorwood, which boasts a 34-1 record for the season. Then there's Hawley with 37-3.

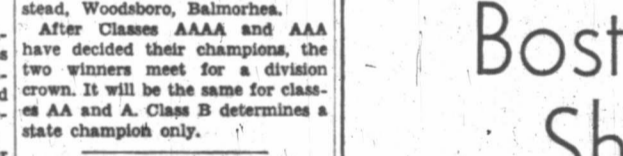

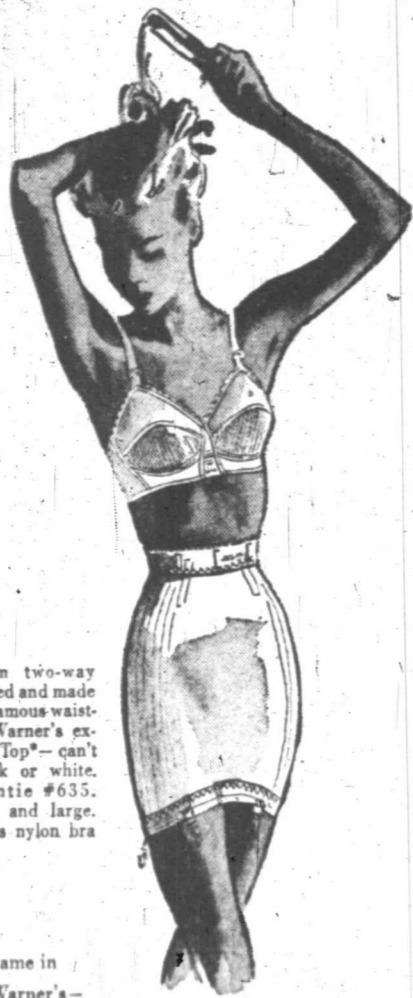

oil and 70 feet of very heavily oil cut drilling mud. There were no signs of formation water.
-Open flowing bottom hole pressure was from 25 to 225 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure after 30 minutes was 1,775 pounds.
The prospector is now making hole below 5,807 feet in shale. The bit went out of the lime which carried the oil soon after it started making hole below 5,799 feet.

"At the present rate of increase, our population should be around 12,300 by the end of the year," he said. Present indications are that the rate of increase will accelerate and we could reach a total of 13,000 by 1953, depending upon our ability to provide housing."

Population here in 1951 was estimated to be 10,223. In 1950, the U. S. Census Bureau gave Pecos two figures. One was 8,054 for the populace within the city limits, while the other was 9,685 which included those living on the outskirts.
In 1940 the population was 4,855. In 1930, it stood at 3,304.

Pacific Greyhound Buses Halted By Drivers' Walkout

SAN FRANCISCO —(P)— Full impact of the Pacific Greyhound Bus strike hit commuters Monday as 3,500 drivers and other employees stayed away from their stations in seven Western states.
The bus line and the striking AFL motor coach employees are deadlocked over the union's demand for a five-day, 40-hour work week. If granted, it would establish a precedent for the nation's interstate transportation industry.
The walkout began at 12:01 a.m. Sunday.
Big population centers like the San Francisco Bay region were particularly hard hit.
Service in California, Arizona, Western Oregon and parts of Nevada, Utah, New Mexico and Texas came to a complete stop. The system carries an average of 100,000 passengers daily.

Leasing Of State Land Set Tuesday

AUSTIN —(P)— Moderate bidding is expected on most of 82 tracts of state school, park and prison farm land to be offered for lease Tuesday.
The leases are for mineral rights to be handled by the board for lease of state lands.
There has been considerable interest in one 230-acre tract in the river bed of the Salt Fork of the Brazos in King and Knox Counties, Land Commissioner Bascom Giles said. It will go to high royalty bidder with a fixed cash bonus of \$10,000.
Giles said there was considerable interest also in a 379-acre tract in the Tyler State Park, requiring a one-sixth royalty and a \$2 per acre annual rental.
