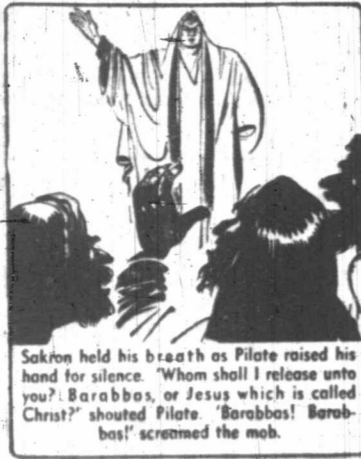




A BOY AT CALVARY

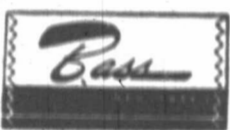

Texaco Completes Prolific Devonian Discovery In Lea

The Texas Company has completed a prolific flowing discovery from the Devonian in Northwest Lea County at its No. 1 J. H. Moore. The project was completed for a calculated daily flowing potential of 2,904 barrels of 48.4-gravity oil from open hole at 10,450-471 feet. The potential was based on an actual six hour flow of 726 barrels of oil. That flow was through a one-inch choke the first three hours and on a one-half-inch choke the last three hours.

Gas-oil ratio was 2.6-1. This wildcat is three and one-half miles northeast of Devonian production in the East Cap Rock area of Lea County.

Location is 660 feet from north and west lines of section 36-11a-32e.

Runnels Scheduled For Two Wildcats; Lindemann Outpost

Clark & Cowden No. 1 J. A. Morrison will be drilled as a 4,000-foot rotary wildcat in Northeast Runnels County, five miles south of Crews. It is one and one-half miles south and slightly east of the oil-well Crews, South-Lower Fry field and 330 feet from north and west lines of tract 23, A. Losoya survey No. 515.

C. B. Cree No. H. A. Stephens is a new wildcat 330 feet from south and west lines of C. A. Parker survey No. 16 and three miles east of Crews. It is two miles southeast of production in the Cree-Sykes, East-Upper Gardner field. Ernest Fletcher No. 1 J. L. Elkins is a three-quarter-mile outpost to the Lindemann-McMillan field. This new test will be drilled to 3,600 feet, 330 feet from north and east lines of tract 19, N. Travis survey No. 533.

The testing which has been done is through perforations in that pipe.

Bishop Oil's Income For 1951 Increased Over Previous Year

SAN FRANCISCO — Bishop Oil Company's 1951 gross income was 31 per cent over that of the preceding year, President William Wallace Mein reported to shareholders in his annual report.

He also disclosed that the company's acreage under lease has increased from 26,825 acres in 1950 to 62,056 acres at the end of 1951.

Bishop's 1951 gross income was \$1,862,084 as against \$1,425,885 in 1950, Mein reported. Net earnings last year were \$407,714 as against \$276,014 in 1950. This was equal to \$1.13 per share in 1951 as against 80 cents per share in 1950, the total number of shares having increased during that period by five per cent.

Red Radio Issues Compromise Feelers On Prisoner Issue

MUNSAN, KOREA —(AP)— Communist radios Monday promised a peaceful welcome home to all Red prisoners returned by the United Nations Command during a truce in Korea, even if the prisoners say they have renounced communism.

The broadcasts may have been an attempt to sound out the UN on a possible compromise on one of the three key issues blocking an armistice—voluntary repatriation of prisoners.

Erig. Gen. William P. Nuckols, UN Command spokesman, said the command had no immediate comment.

Negotiations on the prisoner exchange issue are in recess to give staff officers opportunity to develop additional avenues for agreement.

Sub-delegates considering the two other key issues met only seven minutes Monday but agreed to confer again Tuesday. Each side restated its position on the issues in the brief session.

The issues are: Whether Russia will help supervise a truce and whether the Reds may rebuild military airfields in North Korea during a truce. The UN Command disapproves both.
