The 29-year-old actress obtained her interlocutory decree March 25, 1951, on grounds of cruelty, saying Minnelli, 44, secluded himself and would not explain why he left her alone.

The final decree makes Miss Garland free to marry Sid Luft, theatrical agent and producer. She said the ceremony may not take place until mid-summer.

**Society For Crippled Children Aids Thousands Every Year**

Each year, thousands of people buy Easter Seals to support the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults. But few of the generous citizens who each year for the last 30 years have helped to support this voluntary organization really know how their dollars are used.

The society gives direct service to 228,000 crippled children and adults each year. Facilities and services for the handicapped operate in all 48 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico.

Almost 2,000 professional workers are employed to give service to the handicapped, including both children and grown-ups. One hundred and fourteen out-patient treatment training centers are maintained for cerebral palsy and crippled children.

There are 66 evaluation and diagnostic clinics and 25 speech centers maintained. The National Society maintains in whole or in part 81 camps for crippled children in 33 states. One hundred and fifty-eight public school systems receive assistance and special education for crippled children.

This is by no means all. The National Society for Crippled Children and Adults aids in employment and placement services, an activity which helps many handicapped persons to find happy and remunerative positions in society. Rehabilitation centers, physical therapy facilities, and many other services which aid the handicapped to become well enough to help themselves are encouraged and supported.

But your Easter Seal dollar is not devoted alone to the care of children and adults who are already handicapped. In common with the objectives of medicine as a whole, the National Society encourages and

helps to support research into the causes and prevention of crippling conditions, a program which it is hoped eventually will lead to a smaller number of handicapped people. This is the aim, of course; until it can be fully realized we shall have to help in every way possible all those who are handicapped.

For those who are locally-minded, it may be mentioned that 90 cents of every dollar is retained in the state in which the money is raised.

PARIS —(AP)— Premier Antoine Pinay won his no-compromise fight Tuesday night to finance France's 10 billion dollar budget without new taxes. The National Assembly approved his plans in a series of 10 confidence votes.

Final vote on the budget as a whole, which provides almost four billion dollars for France's war in Indochina and her contribution to North Atlantic defense, was 311 to 206. Pinay had said he would resign unless all nine of his proposals and the entire budget were approved.

Write-Ins Finally Ruled Unlawful In Maryland Primary

ANNAPOLIS, MD. —(AP)— Maryland voters won't be permitted a write-in ballot in the May 5 primary election. That's final. Last week a Baltimore judge, ruling on suits filed by supporters of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, said write-ins would be permitted.

But late Tuesday the Court of Appeals—the state's highest—said in a split decision. "There exists under the present election laws of Maryland no right to write in names at the primary election." This means that in the presidential balloting, the Democrats will have two choices—Senator Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn.) or an "un-instructed delegation" to the state convention that selects the 18 national convention delegates.

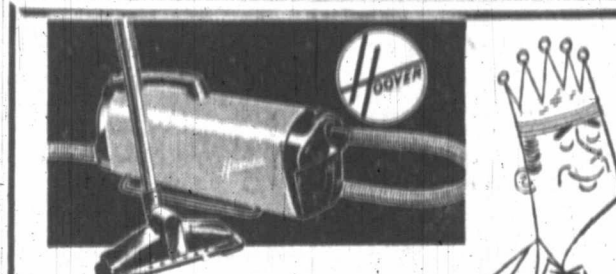

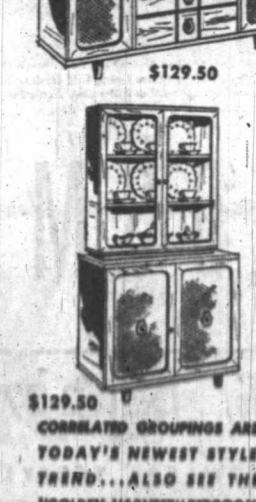

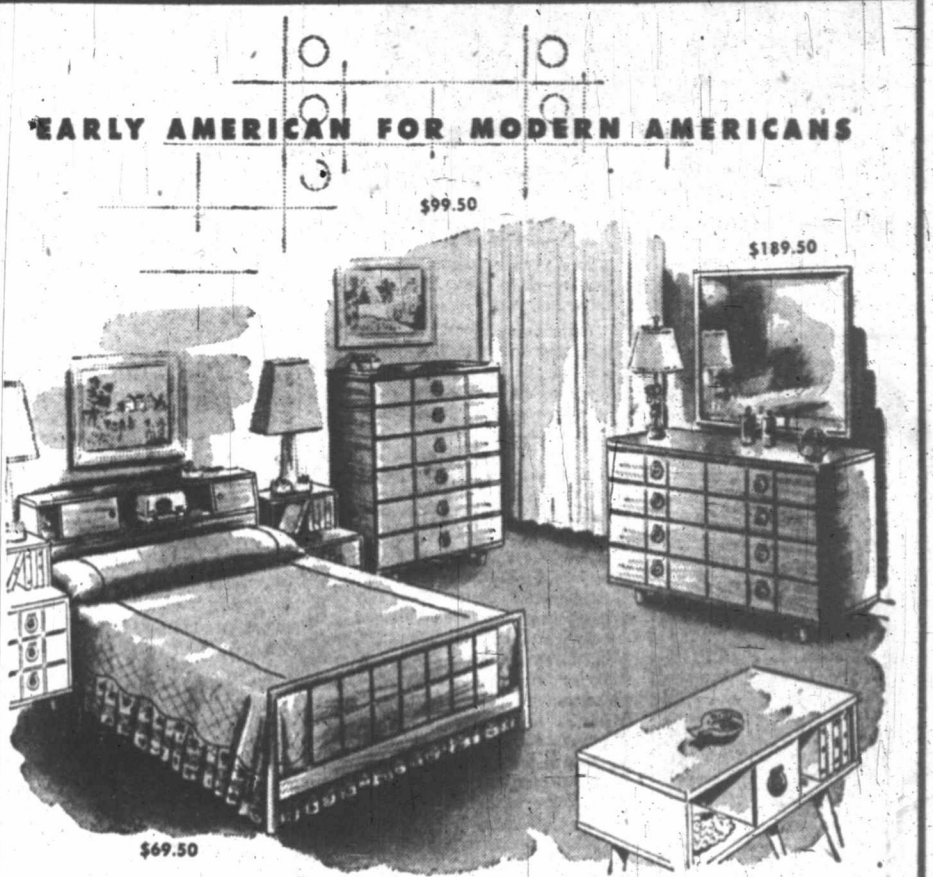

## NOW IT'S GASOLINE— City Prepares For Fresh Conflict With Air Force

The City of Midland, battered but unbending, is ready to bump heads again with the United States Air Force.

This time it's over the matter of who is going to supply the gasoline for Air Force training planes using Airpark.

Hal Rachal and his West Texas Flying Service, which also is based at Airpark, would like to.

But, he told the City Council Tuesday night, he won't be able to submit a satisfactory bid if he has to include a three-cents-a-gallon tax, which he is required to pay the city under all gasoline he sells there.

"Obviously," he said, "it would mean we wouldn't have a chance of getting the contract by outbidding other suppliers."

"But won't any other contractors be in the same position, inasmuch as Airpark still is our airfield, and they will have to pay the three cents just like you do?" asked Councilman R. B. (Bum) Cowden. "We'll have to bump heads."

Rachal didn't know. "While the Air Force is reluctant to pay the city any money," observed City Manager W. H. Oswalt, "it's my personal opinion that we'll have to bump heads with them on this issue, too."

"Anyway, under our contract with you, the city retains the right to sell gasoline to the Army or the Navy."

Rachal asked that his contract be amended so that he "would have the same chance to bid on this business as would a total stranger."

He said the furnishing of the gasoline would mean a lucrative business, with the Air Force using probably 5,000 to 7,500 gallons of gaso-

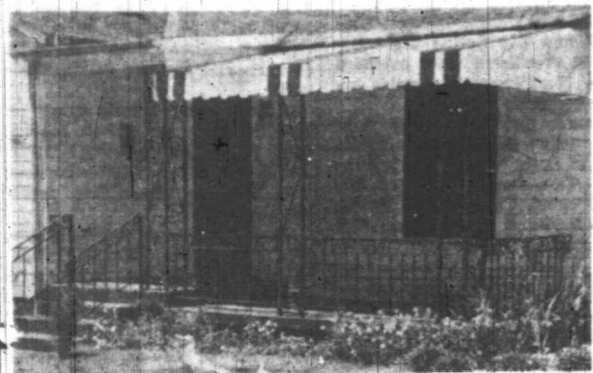

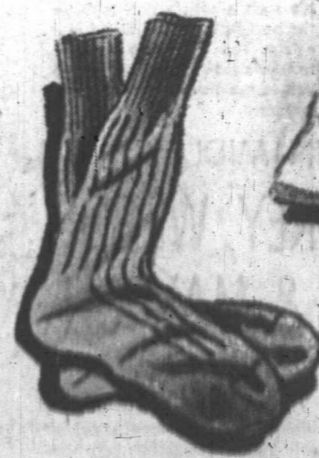

**Two Killed, 221 Injured In  
 Final Long Horn Air Jumps**

**FORT HOOD**—(AP)—A linkup between airborne troops and the 1st Armored Division Wednesday sent Exercise Long Horn toward an anti-climatic finish.

The last spectacular action of the biggest land-air maneuver in U. S. history took place Tuesday. Some of it rizzled.

Two men died as the U. S. forces made their big, concerted effort to drive the aggressor 82nd Division beyond the Colorado River in the 17-day make-believe war.

Two hundred twenty-one men were injured as paratroopers made a jump in high winds.

One was killed near Evant when two fighter planes collided while giving close support to ground troops.

Another was a paratrooper whose chute became entangled with his equipment as he dropped with 3,089 other members of the 508th Regimental Combat Team.

The heralded "recapture" of Lampasas by U. S. forces had to be made by "permission" of the aggressor forces. The 1st Armored still hadn't taken the town by late afternoon and in order to carry out the military government play, Maj. Gen. Bruce Clarke, commanding general of the 1st Armored, went in under a "flag of truce" to deliver his "liberation" talk. When he finished, the troops went back to battling for the little ranching town which had volunteered as a guinea pig for military government training during the maneuver. Late Tuesday, the 1st Armored actually took the city.

The 221 men were bruised and injured as the paratroopers dropped in winds that reached 33 miles an hour in gusts. Helicopters and C-122 power gliders evacuated 196 men to the 24th Evacuation Hospital for treatment and observation. Some of the men were treated for minor hurts and sent back to the regiment, but 25 suffered fractures: three of arms, seven of legs, five of backs, and five of miscellaneous bones, such as ribs, etc.

Line-up between the airborne troops dropped behind the 82nd and the First Armored was scheduled sometime Wednesday. The maneuvers end at noon Thursday.

The two deaths Tuesday brought the total actual fatalities during Long Horn to 10.
