

## Humble Completes Ellenburger Opener In Scurry Sector

Humble Oil & Refining has completed its No. 1 James Davidson as a discovery from the Ellenburger in Southeast Scurry County. The new field opener was finished for a daily flowing potential of 314.38 barrels of 41-gravity oil and no water through a one-quarter-inch tubing choke and through perforations in casing at 7,590-7,608 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 560-1 and tubing pressure was 400 pounds. The completion was natural.

## Pure Schedules Deep Wildcat In NW Schleicher

The Pure Oil Company will drill No. 1 R. S. Williams as an 8,900-foot wildcat in the Ellenburger in Northwest Schleicher County. The prospector will be drilled 690 feet from south and east lines of section 23, block TT, TC survey and 1 1/2 miles northwest of Eldorado. Operator was preparing location and building roads. Pure will start operations as soon as rotary rig can be moved in.

## Gulf, Frost To Test Reeves Wildcat In Zone Which Had Oil

Gulf Oil Corporation and Jack Frost No. 1 P. G. Northrup, and others, East-Central Reeves County wildcat, is preparing to swab and make production tests on the lime and shale section above the present total depth of 9,983 feet in the Permian. This prospector has found some interesting shows of possible production.

## Magnolia Finds More Flowing Oil In Andrews Test

Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1 University, East-Central Andrews County wildcat found more good Ellenburger pay in the section at 13,928-895 feet. That zone was drilled tested for three hours and 15 minutes. A 3/8th-inch bottom hole choke and a one and one-half-inch opening on the drill pipe was used. There was a 2,900-foot water cushion. Gas surfaced in three minutes; the water cushion came to the top in 35 minutes and oil started flowing in 45 minutes. As soon as the oil started flowing the tester was closed for 16 minutes to repair a leak.

## Southward Spread Of Canadian Aftosa Outbreak Endangers U. S. Meat Supply

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Farm officials Monday said the nation's meat supply is in greater danger now than at any time in more than 20 years. Reason: Spreading of the dread foot-and-mouth disease southward toward the U. S.-Canadian border. An outbreak of the disease in this country, Agriculture Department officials said, would reduce the movement of cattle and hogs to market and cause a quick and critical shortage of meat in many areas. Officials say they are concerned greatly over the dangers. The disease, first discovered in Canada in early March, has moved to within 50 miles of the U. S. border. This is the closest threat to U. S. livestock since 1929, when there was an outbreak in California. Should it again appear in this country, officials said, states adjacent to the infected area could be expected to throw up quarantines barring the movement of livestock and livestock products across their borders.

No fireworks is expected at either of them, since the precinct delegates were given definite instructions Saturday.

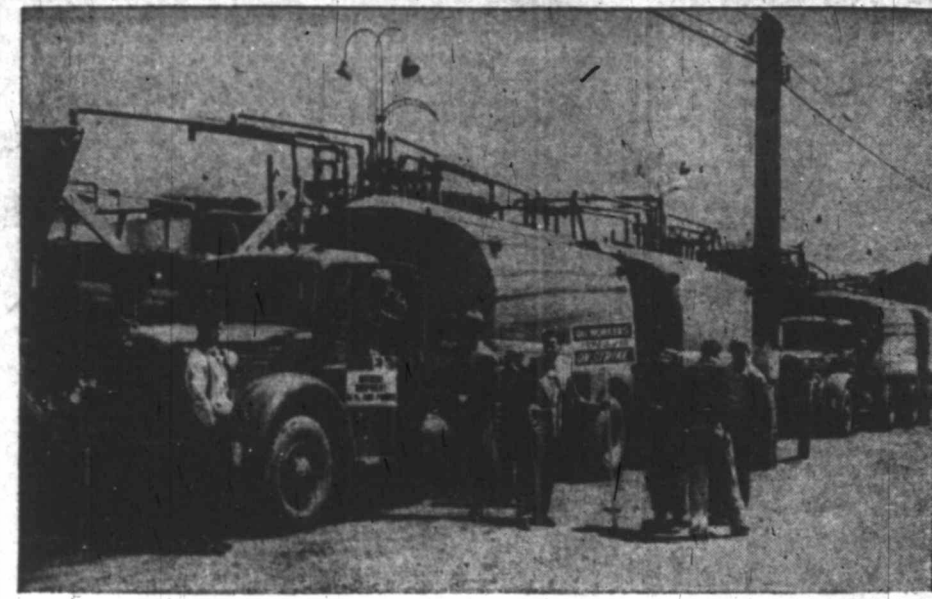

Only four major Midland County officials remained unopposed for reelection Monday as the deadline for filing for the July 26 Democratic primary loomed only a few hours away. Filings will be accepted until midnight Monday, according to Frank Bezon, chairman of the county Democratic executive committee.

## Steel Mills Start Belching Smoke; Wage Talks Collapse

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The White House negotiations started by President Truman over the weekend in another effort to end the steel dispute have collapsed. And Monday, both union and management spokesmen privately said the Supreme Court freeze on wages in industry, pending a final court ruling on government seizure of the mills, played a significant role in the breakdown. The CIO Steelworkers Union and the industry quit trying to settle their conflict over a new work contract late Sunday because, as Presidential Assistant John R. Steelman put it, they were "so far apart that no agreement" could be reached. Smoke started belching from steel mills across the nation Monday despite collapse of the talks. Men in the mills took the news glumly that negotiations had broken off indefinitely. Many were bitter like their silver-haired president, Philip Murray. Some of the workers seemed bewildered by the situation which their chieftain called "deplorable." But they kept on working in hope the government and industry can come up with a peaceful solution. Murray said the union has no intention of ceding the workers out on strike again—against the government. But along the stretch of mills across the country some unrest was reported. In Buffalo, Julian Bruce, a USW international representative, said the men were talking among themselves of "ignoring the government seizure and shutting down the plants." Company officials were not available for comment. Like Merry-Go-Round In Pittsburgh, a president of a big USW local felt more optimistic. Said Walter Kils, president of Local 1373 at Jones and Laughlin: "We'll sit tight until the Supreme Court rules next week on President Truman's seizure of the industry. I don't expect any trouble from the men—they'll stay at work unless the Supreme Court rules 'No' to the seizure. If it does—then out we go. The steelworkers will have a perfectly legal right to strike." Pete Draszewich, a laborer, had a different view: "It looks like a merry-go-round. Most of us guys are sick and tired of this business."

## Midland Selected For Legion Meet

Midland will be the Fall site for the 16th District convention of the American Legion. This city was selected Sunday as the two-day Spring gathering of the Legion ended in Pecos. Dates will be announced later. Maury Alberts of Kermit was named district commander in a closely contested election. He succeeds John Crooks of Odessa. Robert Brown of Poyte was named vice commander; Marshall Denham of Odessa, sergeant-at-arms, and Henry Russell of Pecos, judge advocate. More than 20 Midlanders attended the Pecos meeting. Post No. 19 here will be host at the Fall convention.

## TRAFFIC TICKETS LOSE RED COLOR

Midland's little red traffic ticket is no more. Police began using a new-style ticket Monday—a larger sized model of buff color instead of the traditional red. "We're going to try a little psychology," admitted Lt. Jack Tramm, head of the police department's traffic division. "Maybe if we don't use red on the tickets, a citizen won't be less likely to see red when he gets a ticket."

## Small Break Revealed In Strike Front

DENVER—(AP)—A small settlement in the nationwide oil industry strike may be an important one. The Independent Union of Petroleum Workers, one of 22 unions on strike, announced at Los Angeles Sunday night a wage agreement with the Standard Oil Company of California covering 5,000 workers. The agreement reportedly granted a wage increase of 18 1/2 cents an hour—7.5 per cent retroactive to May 1 and 4.2 per cent retroactive to January 1. Shift differentials will go to six, seven and one-half and 12 cents an hour.

## Texas Crude Flow Slashed By Walkouts

About one-third of the Texas crude oil production was shut down Monday, oil men estimated, and more than half of the state's refining capacity was idle. That means one million barrels of oil daily from which gasoline is made, from which the state gets much tax money, and without which civilian transportation may be hamstrung, was staying in the ground. Pipe lines couldn't carry it because they had no place to deliver it. An estimated 24,000 workers in Texas, with a daily payroll of about \$250,000 were idled six days ago by a nation-wide strike of the Oil Workers International Union (CIO).

## Nationally Known Speaker Selected For Midland Event

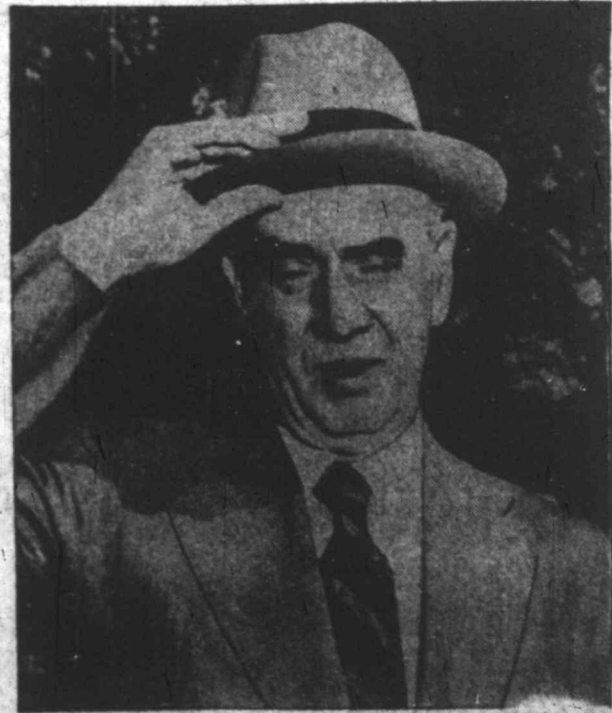
Dr. James I. McCord, professor of theology at the Austin Theological Seminary, will speak at the special Reformation Day Service in Midland. The event will be held at 2 p.m., Sunday, Nov. 2, in the high school auditorium. Appearance of Dr. McCord was confirmed Monday at a breakfast attended by men of various churches in the city. He spoke last year at a Reformation service in St. Louis, Mo., and the previous year in Toronto, Canada. Capacity crowds turned out on both occasions. The Rev. R. Matthew Lynn, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, was the featured speaker at the Monday breakfast in the Methodist Educational Building. First religious liberties, as well as other freedoms, began with the Reformation, Dr. Lynn pointed out. He said the new revised edition of the Bible will be stressed in this year's Reformation observances. A mass choir is planned for the Midland observance. J. Q. Woodward of the First Baptist Church and George DeHarte of the First Methodist Church, musical directors, will be in charge of the choir program. Other meetings will be held periodically to continue Reformation Service plans. The Rev. Robert J. Snell is the general chairman.

## Reserve Board Drops Curbs On Bank Loans

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Federal Reserve Board Monday dropped its voluntary credit restraint program—a program designed to curb lending and help fight inflation. The board said the program is being suspended "in the light of current circumstances" but will be held on a standby basis ready for use again if needed.

## Curtailed Not Seen Immediately

Immediate curtailment of commercial airline service at Midland Air Terminal isn't expected when the nation-wide aviation gasoline cut becomes effective Tuesday. Pioneer Air Lines reported Monday a total of 15,000 gallons on hand here with two additional truckloads due Tuesday. Consumption by Pioneer planes here usually runs about 1,000 gallons a day, depending on (Continued on Page Seven)

Senator Hill Hudson of Pecos formally opens his campaign for a second term in the Texas Senate at 7:15 p.m. Monday when he addresses Midland County citizens over both Midland radio stations.

Hudson said he will discuss his record, and that of his opponent, as it affects Midland County. One of the matters of particular interest to Midland citizens, he said, is the question of Congressional re-districting. The senator said the stand of both candidates and their records on this question will be discussed thoroughly.

## Youthful Father, Speaking From Church Pulpit, Confesses Part In Bank Robbery

TOPEKA, KAN.—(AP)—A youthful father, speaking from a church pulpit, described his part in a bank robbery and said God told him to give himself up.

"I thought about the bank robbery many times," 23-year-old Albert H. Johnson said Sunday. "About five weeks ago if really started bothering me."

"I prayed about it and asked the Lord to give me an answer. It seemed that he would give me only one answer and that was to give myself up."

The \$835 bank robbery occurred May 17, 1948, in Hoyt, Kan.

Saturday, Johnson made a formal statement to County Attorney Donald Sands admitting the robbery. He originally had planned to confess in church, then surrender to authorities. But he was prevailed on to appear before county officials first. Johnson said if he is sent to the

penitentiary, he will "try to convert the men there."

His public confession in the Seventh Avenue Baptist Church was punctuated by frequent cries of "Amen!" and "Bless you, brother!" from the audience of about 100.

His wife and five-month-old son were in the audience. Johnson, a sheet metal worker at the Santa Fe Railway shops here, is a member of the church.

"I fully realize that if I am convicted the penalty may be from 10 to 50 years in the penitentiary," he said. "Naturally, I hope that because of the change that has taken place

in my life, leniency will be shown. x x x

"I am interested in the Youth for Christ movement and as soon as this is straightened out I want to enter the ministry and tell the younger kids what happened to me and how I was saved."

He was arraigned Saturday on charges of bank robbery and armed kidnaping and released on \$5,000 bail pending a preliminary hearing May 12.

Johnson said he had two accomplices, that both still were alive and that he received \$315 as his share of the loot. He said the leader was an older man who borrowed \$100 from a Perry, Kan., bank to buy weapons and ammunition for the robbery.

One person is being questioned by authorities in connection with Johnson's statement.

Orion Williams, the Hoyt, Kan., bank cashier who was held captive for a brief time by the robbers, said Johnson did not resemble any of the three as he remembered them but seemed to be acquainted with details of the holdup. Williams identified two men killed in a car accident shortly after the robbery as participants in it.

The Kansas statute of limitations requires criminal prosecution to start within two years after a crime and since the robbery occurred four years ago, this stands in the way of conviction. Johnson has not indicated whether he will waive the limitation.

The curly-haired Johnson, who is six feet, four inches tall, borrowed \$315 from friends to repay the Hoyt bank.

### Suspected Slayer To Get Mental Test

WICHITA, KAN.—(AP)—Authorities planned a psychiatric examination for 22-year-old William D. Bircher who told police he lived with the sacked body of a woman for four days after killing her.

The nude body, stuffed in a duffel bag, was found Thursday under the porch of his parent's home.

Police said Bircher signed a statement admitting he stabbed to death 36-year-old Mrs. Mary J. Brady during a prolonged drinking bout in his room near the downtown district.

He said the slaying took place February 9 and "on February 14 or 15 I called a cab and took the body in the duffel bag to my father's home and placed it under the porch."

Bircher refused to talk to an attorney or his parents. He is being held on an investigation charge.

Eward Bircher, the father who is a prominent builder, found the body.

DALLAS —(AP)—At least one of those mysterious Dallas County explosions has been cleared up with the arrest of three young men.

Sheriff Bill Decker said Sunday all three are on probation or under suspended sentences. He identified the trio as Lester Ray Walker, 18; Finis Garner, 20, and Dan Stewart Ellis, 20, all of Dallas.

Decker quoted the men as saying they blew up the bridge last February 22 "just to get rid of some dynamite." The blast, which shook a wide area, was one of a series of similar explosions. No one was injured.

The manner in which Midland citizens turned out for the Republican and Democratic precinct conventions Saturday was most encouraging, and surely it is indicative of an aroused interest in government at the grassroots level.

Certainly, congratulations are in order for all Midlanders who attended their precinct conventions and to all individuals and organizations who worked hard to stimulate interest among the voters.

The important thing now is to follow through in every way possible, at county, state and national conventions and particularly in the important elections which are ahead.

An aroused citizenry can accomplish the desired results in government—and it appears citizens of Midland and of Texas are awakening to their responsibilities and duties as citizens of a great and free America.

Yes, it is an encouraging sign, and it all started in our own precinct conventions.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

By Drew Pearson (Copyright, 1952, by the Bell Syndicate, Inc.) Drew Pearson says: Party bosses don't want American people to nominate; Ohio primary delegates threatened with loss of jobs if they bucked Democratic machine; Truman sore at Justice Department attorney in steel case.

WASHINGTON — When Ohio voters go to the polls Tuesday, they will vote under a primary system supposed to be a model for the nation, but which the party bosses have warped and prostituted to a point where it completely substantiates President Truman's statement that primaries are eyewash.

The Ohio primary law is supposed to give the people an ironclad chance to nominate as well as elect. But since the politicians want to do the nominating they put up a docile well-trained stalking horse whose delegates can be switched once they get to the convention.

Thus in 1948, Ohio Democrats chose as their candidate for President 80-year-old William A. Julian, treasurer of the United States, and sent him to Philadelphia as their favorite son.

Next Kefauver backers turned to Sandusky's William Didiel, live-wire Erie County prosecutor who cleaned up gambling in 1949.

At this point, however, Frank Lauche, Democrat, heard what was going on, called a halt to the rough stuff. So, at the last minute, Hollis Matherly, a city councilman of Bellevue, filed as a Kefauver delegate.

First Kefauver leaders lined up Ed Conley, able young city solicitor of Lorain as a delegate. The minute this became known, Democratic bosses reminded Conley that his elderly father held a job with the State of Ohio, which is controlled by organization Democrats, and that he might lose his job just a year before getting his pension.

Another proposed Kefauver delegate was James T. Flynn, prominent Sandusky lawyer. However, Flynn's law partners were subtly advised that the firm might lose some of its practice around the state capital, Columbus, if they did not keep Flynn out of a hot and bitter primary.

What the President apparently didn't remember was that Baldrige was appointed to this key job through the persuasive influence of the President's own ex-counsel, Clark Clifford. While in the White House, Clifford was one of Truman's best advisers. But since leaving the White House, he has become one of the capital's most successful influence-peddlers.

Like most lawyers, who get paid for pulling wires, Clifford is not averse to making a few friends on the other end of the wires, and at first recommended his close friend Baldrige as chief of the Justice Department's anti-trust division.

When this failed, Clifford pushed him to be attorney general in charge of the claims division, and was successful.

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JACOBY ON BRIDGE

By OSWALD JACOBY Written for NEA Service "Please settle a bidding argument on the accompanying hand," requests a Fort Worth reader. "As you can see, North and South climbed all the way up to two spades and then relaxed. South easily won 11 tricks in the play of the cards, and then the fun began."

"North stated that South hadn't bid the hand strongly enough, that the game was unbidable even by experts, and that South had been very lucky in the play of the cards. I probably needn't add that North is a lawyer and that he also pleaded self-defense and produced a witness to show that he was 200 miles away when the hand was bid."

"South is a simple man with a loud simple voice. He made it very clear that he thought North should have bid again."

"Who is right?" "The simple man is right. North should have gone to two no-trump when South bid two spades."

South's hand is limited in many ways. He didn't open the bidding to begin with. He didn't jump to two

spades over one heart, which would be a way of showing a hand that was nearly good enough for an opening bid. He didn't even jump to three spades over two hearts. Nevertheless, he did bid two spades.

The bid of two spades in this situation is a show of strength. South would pass two hearts with any really weak hand. For example, if South held six spades to the queen-jack-ten and a singleton heart (but no other high cards), he would just pass two hearts and let North go down quietly.

If South wants to show strength, North must hope for game and must therefore keep the door open. If North does so by bidding two no-trump, South should then bid three diamonds. North then bids three spades, still staying under game but keeping the door open. South would then bid four spades very happily.

No guarantee goes with the contract, but South would have to be very unlucky to lose two tricks in spades and two tricks also in diamonds. South certainly has a very fine play for game and should be happy to reach the game contract.

Q—The bidding has been: North East South West 1 Spade 2 Diamonds 3 Hearts J-7-3-2, Diamond 5, Clubs A-K-J-5-3. What do you do? A—Bid three clubs. You are headed for game, so you do not mind climbing to the nine-trick level at your first turn. There is no need to jump, of course, since North must keep the bidding open for one round; and you will therefore get

spades over one heart, which would be a way of showing a hand that was nearly good enough for an opening bid. He didn't even jump to three spades over two hearts. Nevertheless, he did bid two spades.

Russell's Backers Upset Him; Make Kefauver Camp Hopeful

WASHINGTON—Georgia Senator Richard B. Russell is in the unique position of having so many friends backing him in the Florida presidential primary May 6 that a few of them actually are embarrassing him. Presidential Candidate Russell is backed by both Florida Senators Holland and Smathers, by all six of the Florida congressmen and by Gov. Fuller Warren.

It now has come to light that Governor Warren has been using state funds to distribute an attack on Senator Russell's rival, the crime-busting Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee. The attack consists of a reprint from "U. S. A. Confidential," Governor Warren's defense is that he cannot be held accountable for money given to him by the state for promoting its best interests.

Next, it was disclosed that Senator Holland had been a beneficiary from the will of Henry Mills. He was the New York marine insurance underwriter whose Washington investigator had been Henry Brunwald, the non-talking witness in the Bureau of Internal Revenue tax-fixing investigations. Holland admitted knowing Brunwald and said he thought him a fine man.

Then the Russell forces arranged for a big political rally, and who should decide to come down and help celebrate but Gov. Herman Talmadge of Georgia.

Finally, two states of Russell delegates to the Chicago nominating convention have been filed for the second, May 27, Florida primary.

One state is made up of Democrats, the other of regular Democrats. If Russell gives his blessing to one it will make the other angry. The senator's main problem while campaigning in Florida will be to try to work out one compromise slate of delegates before the ballots are printed.

All these complications have made Senator Kefauver's camp hopeful. Originally they saw little chance of winning anything in Florida. Now the tall Tennessee thinks he may be able to pull a few chestnuts of his own out of the Florida campaign fires.

Florida primary results will have an important bearing on Democratic battle for the whole Southern block of convention delegates. If Kefauver makes a poor showing, he can't expect much in other Southern states. If he makes a good showing, he has hopes of picking up delegates in Alabama, North Carolina, Arkansas, Texas and Maryland.

He is of course a cinch in his home state of Tennessee. But his managers won't admit that the Solid South is as solid for Russell as has been generally believed.

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# Flooded Utah River Forces 40 Families To Evacuate Homes

SALT LAKE CITY—(P)—The bulging Weber River in Northern Utah kicked out of its banks Sunday and forced 40 families to evacuate.

Temporarily, at least, the Weber took Utah's flood spotlight as the situation moderated slightly in Salt Lake City and Provo.

The Weber sent fresh flood torrents over land in Weber and Morgan Counties and surged across U. S. Highways 30 and 89 in several places.

The Utah Highway Patrol turned back Salt Lake City-bound cars on U. S. 89. The water covered the highway two feet deep in places.

Along the Ogden River, which has been flooding, the situation was about the same.

In Salt Lake City, the blocked-off Jordan River dropped about one foot. This increased the flow of sluggish, dirty water covering a vast west side area, into the Jordan. The river has been blocked near the point where it flows into the surplus canal. This is at the southern edge of the 50-block "controlled flood" area, a region sacrificed by city officials to prevent greater damage.

George W. Carter, Salt Lake County Red Cross Disaster Committee survey chairman, said 1,464 families have been driven from their homes since the flood started. He said there have been 114 minor injuries reported but no serious mishaps or deaths.

**Evacuation Ordered**  
Officials have ordered evacuated the area north of U. S. Highway 40 and west of Salt Lake Municipal Airport to Great Salt Lake. It is estimated less than a dozen families live in the area.

In the vicinity of Provo, the record volume of flood waters continued to flow into the valley.

A log jam also was cleared from a bridge across Highway 91 near Spanish Fork. And crews continued dynamiting swollen Hobbie Creek near Springville in an effort to keep the channel open.

In the Logan area, rivers continued to flood lowlands. Blacksmith Fork River jumped its banks and covered a road near Millville. Five bridges were washed out near Porterville. Two others were removed to prevent them from being carried away.

Some families have been evacuated by boat near Warren where several hundred acres of farm land is under water.

GUAM—(P)—Two girl stowaways who traveled 6,000 miles by plane to this far Pacific Island in search of adventure were on the way back to California Monday. By plane, of course.

For Jerie McDaniel, 26, Walnut Grove, Calif., and Maxine Allen, 23, Tacoma, Wash., it was a relief. They came out with high hopes but couldn't find even a grass shack to live in.

And somehow, this bustling naval base looked a far cry from the Hollywood version of a Pacific Island complete with sleepy lagoons and moonlight and romance.

The two girls, formerly employes at Sacramento's McClellan Air Base, left Sunday aboard an Air Force plane.

They arrived late in April in a sleek B-29 Superfortress, with the help, they said, of two airmen friends. After slipping off the plane undetected, they gave themselves up several days later. Without a roof over their heads, the adventure had waned.

VALLEJO, CALIF.—(P)—The mystery of the church doors that wouldn't stay locked was solved Monday. Police arrested an Air Force lieutenant who said he had lived three weeks in the belfry of Vallejo's Seventh Day Adventist Church.

The officer who turned the bell tower into a penthouse—complete with radio, electric heater, food and blankets—was booked as Lt. Clarence B. Wigley, 23, Wichita Falls, Texas.

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
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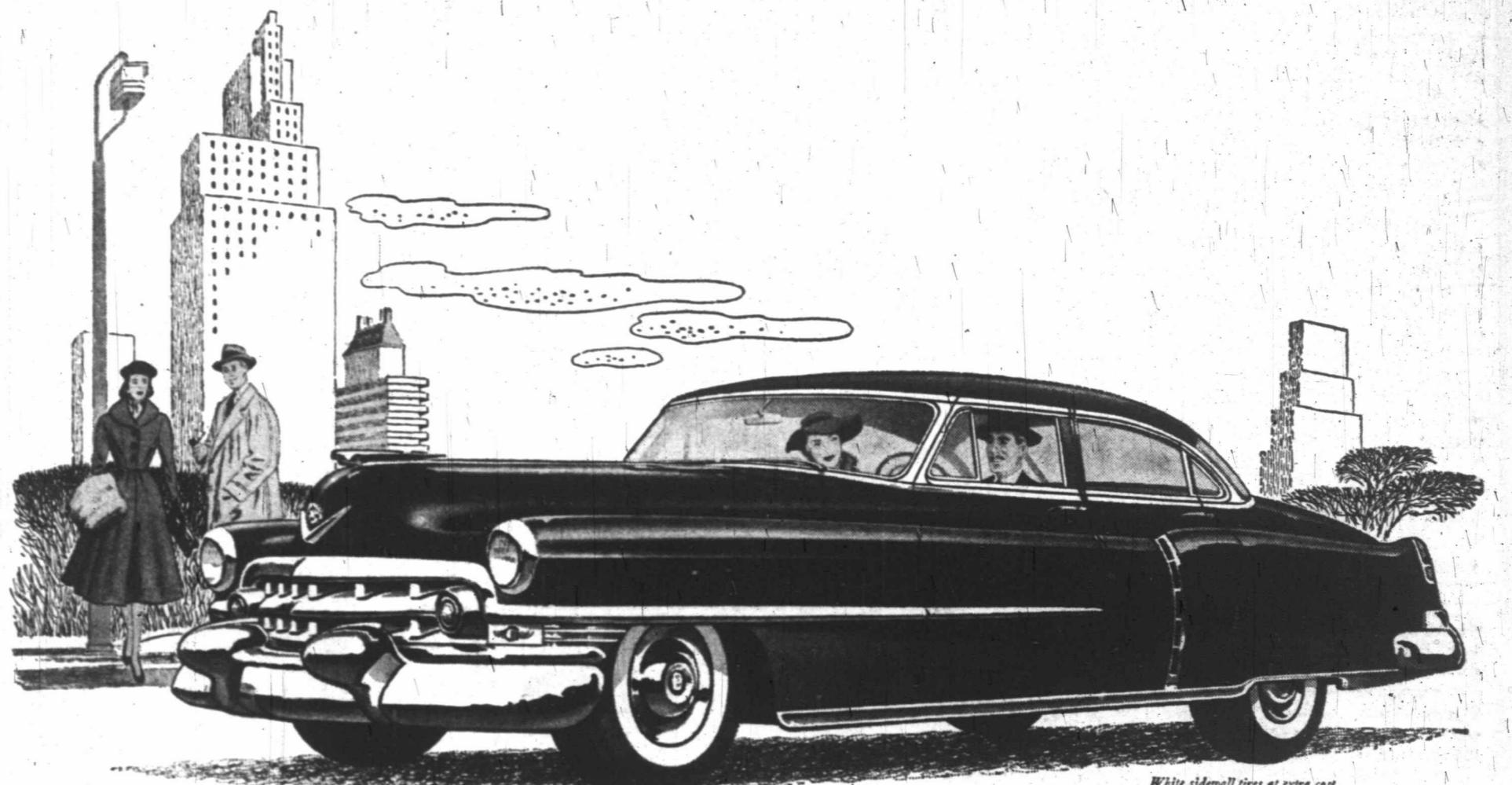

## Daniel, Shivers Endorse Tech For SWC Membership

LUBBOCK—(P)—Texas Tech has the endorsement of two state officials in its quest for membership in the Southwest Conference.

Attorney General Price Daniel declared that "with me it's a matter of long standing. When I was editor of The Lariat, at Baylor 15 years ago I advocated admitting Tech to the conference in an editorial in the paper. Unequivocally I am for Texas Tech getting into the conference."

Gov. Allan Shivers, in a letter to O. B. Ratliff, Lubbock attorney and oil man, expressed a similar attitude.

"It would be pleasing to me to have another great state school in the conference that has earned so much distinction for Texas on athletic fields all over the nation."

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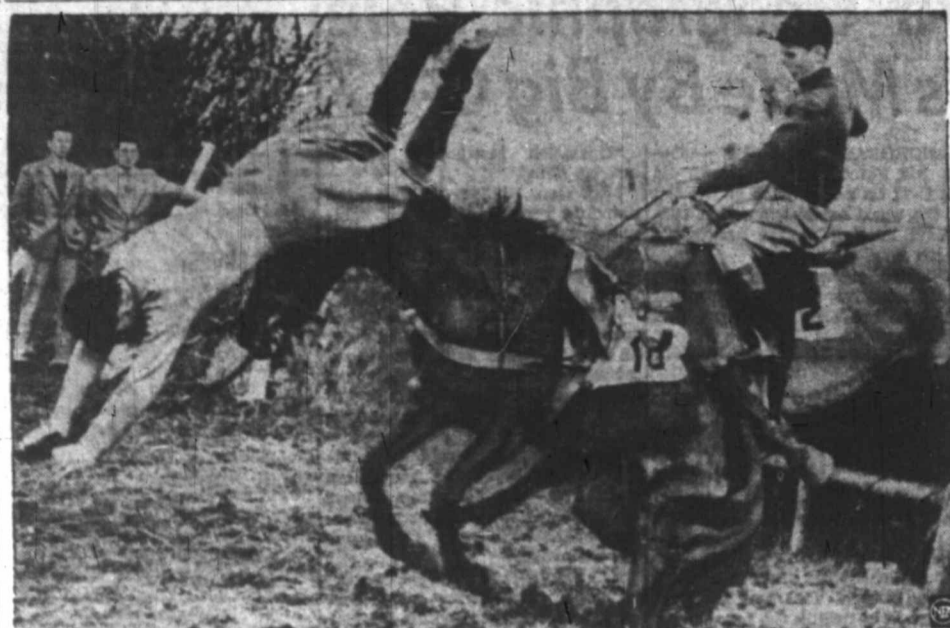

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## Successful Landing At Geographic Pole Is Made By Big C-47

ANCHORAGE, ALASKA—(AP)—An Air Force crew put down its big C-47 on an ice pack at the top of the world for history's first successful landing at the geographic North Pole.

The landing was made Saturday, the Alaska Air Command reported Sunday. The crew sent back this message:

"Operation instructions carried out. No sweat."  
Maj. Gen. William D. Old, commanding general of the air command said a C-47 ski-and-wheel equipped transport flown by Lt. Col. William P. Benedict of Pasadena, Calif., made the landing Saturday.

Air Force officials and scientists spent three hours and 10 minutes on the ice pack taking measurements, then flew back to Fletcher's Island, a floating ice island, 185 miles away to report the historic landing, Olds said.

The air command said the landing was made at the geographic North Pole—"the northernmost part of the earth; the northern extremity of the earth's axis" by dictionary definition.

The magnetic North Pole, "north" on a compass, generally is considered to be located on Boothia peninsula in Northeastern Canada but occasionally shifts by a few degrees, Olds said.

Lt. Col. Joseph Fletcher of Shawnee, Okla., who established a weather station on the ice island carrying his name, was along on the polar flight as co-pilot.

Radio communications with the island are uncertain, the air command said, and other details were not obtained immediately.

"Be Kind To Animals Week" observance opens in Midland.

Educational Program  
The society plans this year to conduct an educational program in the schools to teach students the proper care and training of animals. Special films will be shown in various schools this week.

Citizens are invited to visit the Animal Shelter at 1702 East Wall Street during Be Kind To Animals Week to see the more than 150 animals, all of whom need homes.

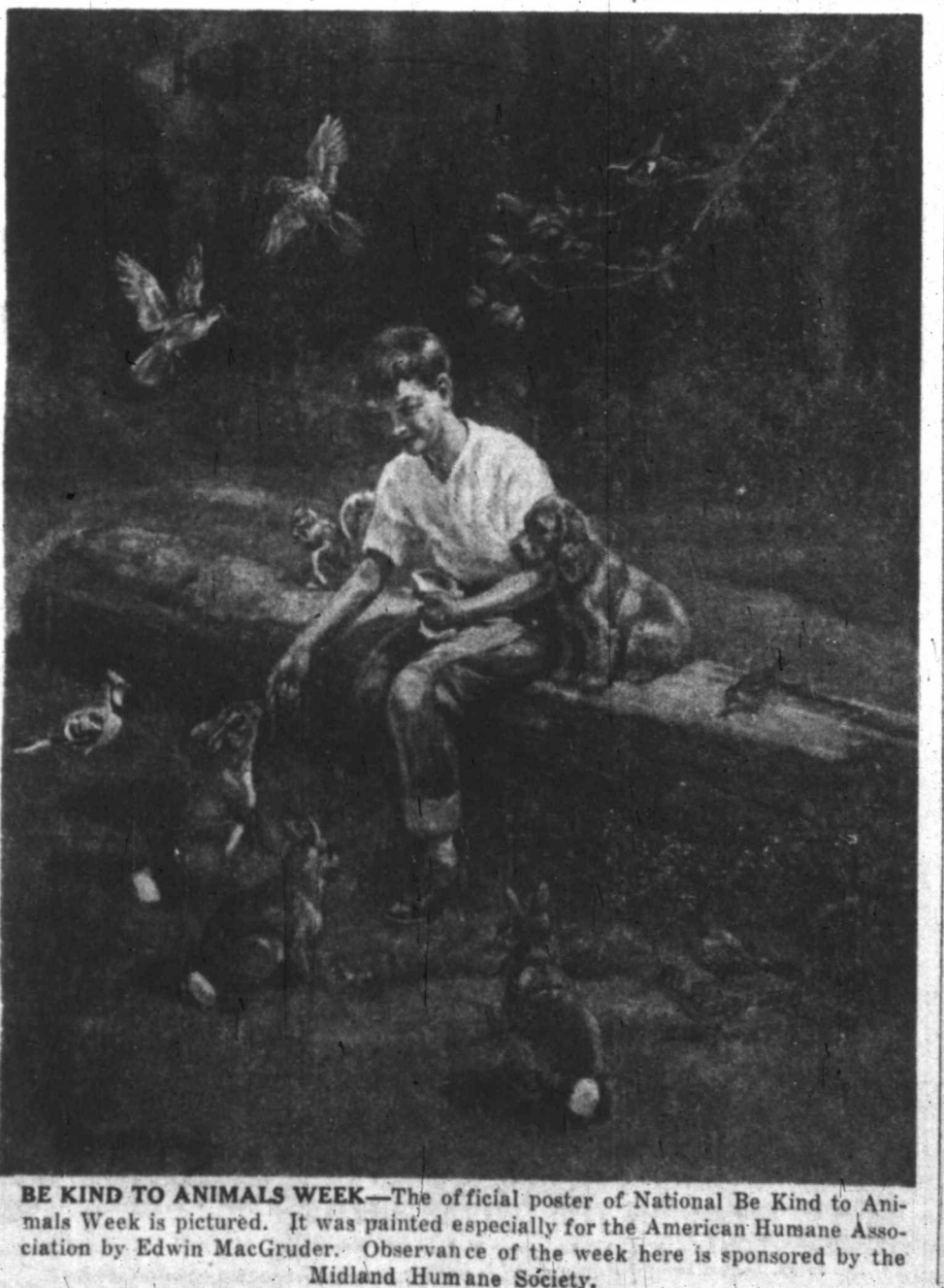

## Warmer Weather Brings Rise In Texas Deaths By Violence

By The Associated Press  
With almost perfect driving conditions, the Texas traffic juggernaut killed eleven of 19 persons who died violently over the weekend.  
Increased speeds and more vehicles on the streets and the highways was the answer, safety experts observed.  
Two drownings and a freak boating accident also could be attributed indirectly to warm Texas weather that brought thousands of Texans to lakes and streams over the state.

Two suicides contributed to the total.  
Latest tragedies reported to The Associated Press included:  
Louis Alonso, 23, of Dallas died Sunday night after his panel truck left the road and rolled over. The accident occurred in Dallas.  
Geneva Mariens King, 18, Fort Worth, was killed Sunday when the car in which she was riding overturned seven miles west of Lake Worth in Parker County.  
Frank Willard Lynch, 27, drowned Friday night in a lake near Dallas

when he reached for a rowboat, lost his balance, and toppled into the water. Witnesses were unable to reach him in time.

Arthur Wayne Jourdan, 11, drowned Saturday while swimming in a pond near Jasper. Companions said he stepped off into deep water and disappeared.

Travis William Terry, 37, of Dallas was killed Sunday when a boat motor exploded and he was hit by a flying piece of metal. The motor's propeller snagged in the mud of Mountain Creek Lake, shearing the prop pin and causing the motor to race at tremendous speed—after which the flywheel burst into several pieces.

Three Fort Hood soldiers were missing and believed drowned Saturday after their jeep was swept off a low water bridge crossing west of the military reservation near Gatesville. The three were identified as Pfc. Archie L. McGill, 19, whose next of kin lives at Detroit, Mich.; Pfc. John R. Hughes, 24, Fulton, Ky., and Cpl. Edgar S. Henson, Jr., 24, of Wellington, Kan.

A man wanted for murder in Michigan chose death to capture Saturday. James D. Foster shot himself with a .38 caliber revolver as he huddled in a broom closet while police pounded through the house in search.

William J. Moody, 40, cut his throat with a knife and bled to death in the Mineral Wells Police Station Saturday night. He had been brought in for fighting.

Patricia Nell Perry, nine, was killed Saturday when she ran across the highway north of Corsicana and was struck by a car. Harold Christy, 15, was killed at Lubbock Saturday when he fell from a truck towing a second truck and was run over by the truck being towed.

Four persons died after a three-car collision Saturday midnight near Dumas. An early morning collision Saturday south of Lamesa took three more lives.

Dead after the Dumas accident were A. J. Peters and Mrs. N. J. Jones, both of Bivins; Margaret Gold of Cactus, and Shirley Barr, Dumas.

Nicholas Montez, 23, of Lubbock, and a young Latin American woman, about 21, died instantly in the Lamesa crash. Wyatt Arnold (Buddy) Robertson, 36, of Midland, died 90 minutes later in a hospital.

"Uncle Johnny," as Mr. Roberts was affectionately called by his hundreds of friends, was a veteran elder of the First Presbyterian Church. He was one of the oldest members of the Midland Masonic Lodge.

### Early Treatment Saves Cancer Victims

The society, in its annual report for 1951, said some 70,000 lives were saved last year. It said a higher recovery rate now is possible "without a lot of further knowledge" if the disease is caught early.
