Deep Rock Gets Flowing Discovery In NW Crockett

Deep Rock Oil Corporation has a flowing discovery from the Wolfcamp-Permian in prospect at its No. 1 Shannon estate, Northwest Crockett County, wildcat.

This development had flowed oil for 11 hours through a 1/4-inch tubing choke at the rate of 75 barrels per day. The production came from perforated section at 5,868-72 feet.

The section making the oil had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid and then had been treated with 1,000 gallons of regular acid.

No water was produced from the pay formation. The project is now shut-in waiting for the tanks to be emptied so that it can run more production tests.

It probably will be completed from the 5,868-72-foot section in a few days.

Midlander's Deal
This development was drilled as a result of a deal worked up by W. D. Anderson & Sons and Eugene E. Nearburg, independent oil operators and traders of Midland.

They secured a farmout of 160 acres from Tide Water Associated Oil Company, a farmout of 160 acres from Amerada Petroleum Corporation and a farmout on 240 acres from Lario Oil & Gas Company.

They also secured dry hole contributions from Amerada and from Sun Oil Company for the drilling of an Ellenburger, wildcat on the spread of leases.

Turned To Deep Rock
The Anderson firm and Nearburg then turned the acreage and the dry hole leases to Deep Rock to drill the well. They retained an override on the acreage.

The wildcat is located 800 feet from south and 780 feet from west lines of the J. Wiley heirs survey No. 2. It drilled to 6,461 feet in the Ellenburger. That formation was dry.

Operators then plugged back to 5,950 feet and set and cemented 7-inch casing at that point to allow testing in the Wolfcamp where some shows of possible production had been developed during drillstem tests.

The flow reported here resulted.

Texaco Completes Pennsylvania Well In Midland Area

The Texas Company has reported flowing potential for its No. 3-A Scharbauer, one and one-quarter mile west extension to the Park-Pennsylvanian field and in Northwest Midland County.

The new well was completed through a 12/64-inch tubing choke and perforations at 10,408-10,518 feet opposite the Pennsylvanian for a daily potential of 32.23 barrels of 47-gravity oil. No water was reported. Gas-oil ratio was 3,880-1. The perforations had been washed with acid.

Location is 1,800 feet from south and west lines of section 24, block 41, T-2-S, R-2-P survey and 12 miles southwest of Midland.

Stanolind Slates New Depths For Two Explorations

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company filed applications with the Railroad Commission of Texas requesting permission to drill two new destinations on two North Permian Basin wildcats.

One of the projects, No. 1-G-Reed, is in South-Central Cochran County, 12 miles southwest of Whiteface. Now drilling below 10,220 feet. It is slated to continue to 12,500 feet or a test of the Devonian.

Location is 800 feet from north and east lines of section 19, Harrison & Brown survey.

The other wildcat, No. 1 Argo, is in Central-North Yoakum County. It presently is drilling below 12,133 feet and is slated to go to 13,700 feet. Location is 2,020 feet from north and 1,979 feet from east lines of section 98, block D, John H. Gibson survey and 12 miles northwest of Plains.

The new depth will take the prospector into the Ellenburger.

One and one-quarter miles southwest of Ellenburger production in the Pegasus-multipay field of Northwest Upson County, The Wilshire Oil Company, Inc., found oil in the Wolfcamp.

Allies, West Germans Sign Treaty

Demos, Republicans Square Off For Scraps

SAN ANTONIO —(AP)—

Tough talk from leaders of rival conservative and liberal factions apparently set the pattern for two days of Democratic meetings here.

Loyal Democrat Chieftain Fagan Dickson started the name-calling by saying Governor Shivers plans a doublecross, that he is a "Democrat in Washington and Dixiecrat in Texas."

Shivers snapped back that Dickson "must have been smoking marijuana or something," that he is a publicity seeker, always dreaming up something. Shivers said he would sacrifice no principle to halt the Loyalist bolt or to guarantee seating if his delegation to the national convention at Chicago.

88 Rival Claims
This exchange came on the eve of Monday's State Executive Committee meeting. The state convention, with a bolt by the Loyalists regarded as a sure thing, starts Tuesday at Municipal Auditorium.

Principal business before the executive committee was settlement of rival claims by 28 county delegations. The Loyalists held rump conventions in those counties and are seeking recognition over the conservatives.

Reports Shivers had made a deal with national party leaders on his recent trip to Washington actually touched off Dickson's charges and the governor's reply.

One of these reports was that Shivers planned to offer the state convention a resolution giving ground of some kind to the national party's leadership to make sure his delegation, rather than that of the Loyalists, would be seated at Chicago. Another was that he would help Speaker Sam Rayburn at the proper time if it appears Rayburn has a chance to win the nomination. Shivers Ducks Question

Shivers answered a reporter's question about possible support for Rayburn by saying he understood the speaker was not a candidate. On the question of other compromise to the national party, he said flatly he would sacrifice no principles to achieve that end.

"I have every right to believe we will be seated at Chicago, unpledged, uncommitted and undaunted, because we represent the majority of Texas Democrats," the governor said.

This is what Dickson had to say about the Shivers' delegation's outlook at Chicago:

"The only chance he has to be seated is to repudiate his New Braunfels speech and agree to take the pledge."

Dickson said he had learned in Washington that the San Antonio convention would take the pledge to support the national convention's nominees. Shivers flatly denied it, saying there would be no loyalty pledge until Texans know what the platform says and who the nominees are.

Conventions At A Glance

Who: Feuding Republicans, one faction backing Senator Taft (R-Ohio), the other backing Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, for the GOP presidential nomination. Feuding Democrats, one faction backing Gov. Allan Shivers' bid for an unopposed Texas delegation to the Democratic National Convention, the other led by Fagan Dickson of San Antonio, asking a delegation instructed to vote for the party's nominee.

When: Both conventions Tuesday.

Where: The Democrats meet in San Antonio; Republicans meet in Mineral Wells.

Why: The Republicans will name 33 delegates to their national convention in Chicago July 7. The Democrats will name 32 delegates to their national convention in Chicago, July 21.

Monday: Both Democrats and Republicans hold meetings of their State Executive Committees in the convention cities. At issue will be seating of county delegates to the state conventions. The GOP has 31 contesting county groups, the Democrats 28.

What they say: Taft Republicans: Most of those Eisenhower folks are just Democrats who switched over to vote for the general.

Eisenhower Republicans: We outnumber those Taft people and the will of the majority should rule.

Fagan Dickson: "Governor Shivers is a Democrat in Washington and a Dixiecrat in Texas."

Governor Shivers: "Dickson must have been smoking marijuana or something."

Connally Says More Aids Cut Would Be Prelude To Disaster

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Senator Connally (D-Texas) told the Senate Monday in advocating approval of a \$6,900,000,000 foreign aid bill that "a policy of timidity is a prelude to disaster."

As chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, Connally said the mutual security measure probably is the last major legislation he will pilot through the Senate before he retires next January.

The Texas senator argued in a prepared Senate address against any further cuts in the authorization measure, trimmed by his committee one billion dollars below President Truman's request. The House has approved a \$6,182,000,000 ceiling.

Before Connally spoke, Senator George (D-Ga) said he will stick by the committee on his motion, although he said he did not believe a cut to the House figure would damage the program much.

A group of Republican senators has proposed additional slashes ranging from 500 millions to one billion dollars.

Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, candidate for the Republican nomination, has urged a cut in aid funds to six billion dollars. General Eisenhower, backing Taft for the GOP nomination, has said any cut beyond the committee's one billion slash might call for drastic revision of the European rearmament program and endanger U. S. security.

MINERAL WELLS —(AP)—

Texas Republicans took their Taft-Eisenhower feud before their State Executive Committee Monday, still throwing rocks at each other.

Eisenhower faction members said they definitely would split Tuesday's state convention if the committee "runs roughshod" over their claims to contested delegations and if the state convention upholds the committee.

The Taft camp retorted with a charge that the Eisenhower supporters were Democrats who had switched to vote for the general and their majorities should not be recognized.

Former Democrats
They are non-Republicans, according to the interpretation of state law, charged Marrs McLean, San Antonio oil man who is a member of the GOP national Finance Committee.

McLean said that according to his interpretation of the state law, a member of the political party is one who has voted previously.

"How can these tens of thousands of former Democrats and former independents, as numbered by Alvin Laine—the Eisenhower leader—qualify as voters of the Republican Party when they had never voted Republican before?" he asked.

McLean's charge was in answer to one made by Hugh Roy Cullen, Houston oil man, Saturday.

Cullen sent a telegram to Taft asking him to prevent any "steamroller tactics" by his supporters at the convention. Cullen said he did not wish to see the will of the majority thwarted.

The committee has the task of settling 31 contested delegations before it makes up the temporary roll of the state convention.

Eisenhower supporters claim they had clear majorities in the counties where contests developed and in such cases the Ike forces should be seated.

Ike Forces May Bolt
Control of the state convention and of the naming of Texas' 32 delegates to the National GOP Convention hinges on settlement of these contests.

The committee can recommend its temporary roll to Tuesday's state convention, then a credentials committee must be appointed to make the final recommendation.

"As long as we think we're getting a fair chance, we're going to stay in the convention," declared Jack Porter, state Eisenhower campaign director.

"But if the State Executive Committee runs roughshod over us and the state convention upholds them, we definitely will bolt."

Porter said they had made no plans for a meeting place for their rump convention if it has to come.

L. J. Benckenstein, member of the State Executive Committee from Beaumont, will be recommended for temporary chairman, said Carlos Watson, Brownsville, committee secretary.

More Scattered Showers Forecast

A morning thunderstorm greeted El Pasoans Monday but elsewhere in Texas the morning was bright and clear.

El Paso's rainstorm was a forerunner of widely scattered thunderstorms forecast for all of Texas late Monday, Monday night and Tuesday, except the extreme east portion.

The only rain reported for the 24-hour period ended at 6:30 a. m. was .08 inch at Galveston.

Early temperatures ranged from 53 at Dalhart to 75 at Brownsville and Laredo. Prestidio had Sunday's highest reported reading — 99 degrees—while Texarkana was the coolest spot with an afternoon maximum of 81 degrees. Most other places reported temperatures in the 80's.

Minesweeper Crew Captures 25 Ko-Reds

TOKYO —(AP)— Night patrolling crews of the U. S. minesweeper Piarmigan recently captured 25 North Koreans and seized their five sampans off the east coast of North Korea, the Navy reported Monday.

The North Koreans were taken aboard the Piarmigan and locked in a compartment.

The minesweeper is commanded by Lt. Cmdr H. D. Durham, Brownwood, Texas.

Telegraph Workers Go Back To Jobs As 52-Day Walkout Ends

WASHINGTON —(AP)— The 52-day-old Western Union strike ended Monday and workers flocked back to telegraph offices across the nation.

Union and company officials expected the flow of messages to return to normal quickly.

The official end of the strike came at 12:01 a. m. after the AFL Commercial Telegraphers Union announced that its Western Union membership had voted, 8,688 to 6,468, to accept a strike settlement.

Pay raises or reduction of working hours provided for under the ratified agreement are dependent on government permission for Western Union to raise its rates.

Union officials said they understood the company may ask the Federal Communications Commission for rate hikes of 10 per cent. Western Union officials have not said how much of a boost in rates they need to meet the proposed pay increases.

New Stories Of Rioting, Torture By Die-Hard, Armed Reds On Koje Bared

KOJE ISLAND, KOREA —(AP)— Informed sources said Monday Communist and anti-Red prisoners of war battled each other for control of barbed wire POW enclosures for five riotous days in what Koje veterans call "bloody September."

The five day struggle—not yet officially announced—caused 100 POW casualties, including 15 killed by prisoners. United Nations guards wounded 14 with gunfire and 22 with bayonets, quelling the riots.

Bloody September was concentrated from September 16 to the night of September 20. Veterans say savage fighting erupted inside the compounds for control of the prisoners.

UN hospital officials say Red POW's treat each other with such barbarity that they have killed more prisoners than have Allied guards in suppressing three POW riots announced this year.

Camp officials concede they do not have control inside the barbed wire enclosures. Red leaders have organized prisoners into a crude but disciplined army, equipped with stone, clubs and weapons fashioned from cans and metal bars.

They also have pistols and rifles seized from guards in riots or bought from civilians.

At least 115 prisoners have died from brutal beatings, hangings or torture in clashes between die-hard Communists and anti-Communists within the barbed wire enclosures, hospital records show.

Guards suppressing three riots in this UN POW camp killed 97.

Lt. Col. S. M. Geleuger, Flint, Mich., head of the hospital, said bodies of prisoners slain within the compounds often are not recovered for days.

Pact Termed Step Toward World Peace

BONN, GERMANY —(AP)— The Allied-West German peace contract to ally West Germany with the free world was signed ceremoniously here Monday by Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and the foreign ministers of the United States, Britain and France.

As a silent crowd of several hundred Germans stood roped off in the rain outside the West German Parliament Building, the four men put their pens to the historic pact in the Bundestrasaal, the chamber of the Upper House. About 500 spectators watched inside the room.

The peace contract, which faces high parliamentary hurdles before ratification can make it effective, gives West Germany near sovereignty, eighty in exchange for German troops in the projected European Army.

Adenauer and the three Western ministers—Dean Acheson of the U. S., Anthony Eden of Britain and Robert Schuman of France—spoke briefly before they signed.

The chancellor hailed the peace contract as a work which will "help preserve the peace and freedom of the whole world" but "only a part of a work which will be completed tomorrow in Paris when we sign the European Defense Community treaty."

"The completed work will secure peace and freedom for Germany," he continued. "And here today we Germans also think of our brothers in the East (Soviet zone). We send them our greetings and our deepest assurances that this work is the first step toward the reunification of all Germany in peace and freedom."

Across the Iron Curtain, Pravda, the Moscow mouthpiece of East Germany's Russian Communist controllers, saluted the pact with another blast at the "fatal, anti-national policy of the Bonn government of Adenauer, which is trying to transform the Germans into cannon fodder for the American imperialists."

Eden was the first to sign the contract, followed by Schuman and Acheson. Last came Adenauer, the

Unclad Body Of Infant Found Here

The unclad body of a tiny 14-month-old infant boy, apparently dead several days, was found Sunday afternoon in the 1000 block of North Lamar Road.

An autopsy was ordered immediately by Justice of the Peace L. C. Stephenson to determine the cause of death.

An unidentified person reported the discovery of the body and Police Lts. Dick Hemingway and Jimmy Joyce-Lee investigated.

Neighbors said the tiny body had been dragged to the scene by dogs. Stephenson said the autopsy had been ordered to determine whether death had come after its birth.

Four Known Dead In Mid-Air Crash

NORFOLK, VA. —(AP)— A four-engine B-45 jet bomber and another plane collided in flight Monday and crashed three miles east of Franklin, about 40 miles southwest of Norfolk.

Wreckage was scattered over a wide area and four bodies were found, state troopers said.

In one compound POW blacksmiths Monday were busy hammering stored metal into knives and spears. Un personnel has been ordered to remain out of the compounds. But correspondents saw an American soldier walking through Compound 91—housing prisoners moved from Camp 10 near Pusan, where one man was killed in a riot last week. Camp officials ordered an immediate investigation. They said they had no knowledge that any Allied personnel had been inside the compound.

There are 689 prisoner graves in Koje Cemetery, but records of POW deaths before July 2 are not available.

Geleuger said almost daily prisoners are treated after being beaten or tortured by other inmates.

In one incident last September, a POW court tried, convicted and executed 15 prisoners. Nine bodies had been burned before camp officials learned of the killings and sent troops to recover the remaining bodies.

Geleuger said a favorite method used by prisoners in killing other inmates was to beat them to death with tent poles.

Other prisoners' throats have been cut with crude knives or the edges of tin cans. Some have been hanged with rope or wire.

The skin of many prisoners who had anti-Communist tattoos was stripped from their bodies by Communists, Geleuger related.

The Reds have their own doctors and medical aides inside many of the compounds and insist on treating their own injured.

Don't Count Truman Out!

A great many Republican leaders acknowledge that it is no cinch to break into a winning Democratic coalition and capture the presidency.

How it is possible to be smug about victory prospects after five straight defeats in national elections is something the disinterested onlooker could not readily explain.

The year 1952 is no exception. There are those who feel that corruption in government, high prices, high taxes and assorted other matters are enough by themselves to produce a Republican triumph.

But the party hard-heads know better. They're aware that despite all the symptoms of disintegration, there is no proof yet that the Democratic coalition is going to fall apart.

Moreover, it is almost axiomatic in politics that a party riding the crest of a prosperity wave, as the Democrats are today, is a stiff adversary.

This time, in addition to all these difficulties, the Republicans have to face not only an opposition nominee, but a rough and tumble campaigner who will be standing beside him throwing his best punches.

The President's recent platform appearances leave no doubt he will be swinging from the floor this year. If anybody thinks his blows don't hurt, he ought to recall 1948.

When he ascends the platform, he very conveniently avoids the topics embarrassing to him. What politician does not? But it should not be thought, therefore, that he is destroying his effectiveness.

Republicans who are not afraid to add up the sum of their obstacles best had include Truman in the list. He is plenty tough to combat, as the record plainly shows in various Novembers dating back to 1934.

If they want to deal with him, they very likely will have to do more than highlight the embarrassing matters he skims over. They'll have to drum up some good answers to the charges he delivers with those damaging punch-lines.

Alibis are reasons that may sound good, but never are a good substitute for good sound reasons.

One big trouble with a bad past is that it's often an ever-present difficulty.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

By Drew Pearson (Copyright, 1952, By The Bell Syndicate, Inc.)

WASHINGTON — The pact for a European army which the foreign ministers are expected to initial today is not a lengthy document. It is quite short. But behind its written pages are thousands of unwritten chapters recording the hopes of the future, the history of the past, and the hurdles in the path of peace.

Historically, today marks the climax of 300 years of warfare, back and forth across the Rhine, back and forth between the French and German armies, back and forth—until the wheat fields and the forest were tangled with barbed wire and drenched with blood.

So this pact, putting the armies of two bitter enemies—France and Germany—under one flag and in one uniform, could be the most significant milestone for peace in the world has ever seen. To those whose souls have gone forth to war year after year, to those who are so weary of war they are suspicious even of us, it could be the millennium.

But because it does carry the hopes of millions, and because the goals of the Kremlin do not flourish in the soil of peace, the European Army Pact faces terrific hurdles.

Moscow is determined that this pact never shall go into full force. So the signing today will mark the beginning of the greatest war of nerves since V-E Day.

Even before the ceremony today, Moscow has been marshaling its forces to scare Western Europe out of this momentous agreement. Here are the moves which will come to a climax in the immediate or near future:

- 1. General Matthew Ridgway's arrival will touch off a vociferous anti-American demonstration. He will be branded the butcher of Korea, held responsible for the highly exaggerated prisoner troubles in Korea, and accused as a user of germ warfare. Communist propaganda regarding germ warfare has been so successful that about half the people of Europe really believe it. As a result, some of our best friends believe Ridgway's appointment to Paris was a mistake.

2. Soviet rearmament of East Germany is increasing. This is probably a psychological move made to worry the French and scare the West Germans away from the European army pact.

3. There's been a heavy Russian build-up around Berlin. Simultaneously Communist civilians are reported planning to shock into West Berlin, stage riots, and give an excuse to Communist troops to enter the city. This time, it's real.

4. The less censorship and less interference with freedom of the press we have, the better off we'll be.—Sen. Blair Moody (D, Mich.).

JACOBY ON BRIDGE

Written for NEA Service "Here's an extremely interesting hand which came up in a duplicate at Henderson's Bridge Studio the other night," writes John D. McGorvey, of Pittsburgh.

"South, my partner, was Milton (Mickey) Steiner. After he redoubled, East turned to him and said, 'Kid, if you make this one I'll buy you a suit of clothes.'"

"After he got these clues my partner proceeded to play East for all the outstanding trumps and made five. One person commented that he should get a hat for the extra trick.

"Of course, East's jaw dropped a foot when the opening club lead

was ruffed. Mickey then led hearts and overruled East on the third round.

"He put East in with the ace and another diamond, and ruffed the diamond return in dummy, after which he continued his plan of pushing hearts through. East's only other trick was an overruff of the dummy on a diamond lead.

"Of course, six hearts is the best spot for North-South. The play there is fairly interesting too. If East opens a spade or a club, West makes one trump trick, period.

"If East gets fancy and leads a diamond, he will soon regret it when North runs his trumps and puts him in a three-suit squeeze for seven.

"This discussion is purely hypothetical, since nobody was permitted to play in that contract; all the other East-West pairs made sacrifice bids in clubs.

"Thus East's double not only located the cards for declarer, but it possibly talked his partner out of a good sacrifice. You might draw a moral from this about the wisdom of doubling opponents who have reached a contract on their own steam.

"Incidentally, Mickey Steiner, playing with Myron Swartz, beat out Paul Schwarz and me for the right to represent the University of Pittsburgh at the finals of the National Intercollegiate Bridge Tournament. This hand might give you an idea how they did it."

CARD Sense

Q—The bidding has been: North 1 Heart, East 1 Spade, South 1 N. T., West Pass.

Q—2 Heart, 2 Diamonds Q-10-9-7-5, Clubs 7-2. What do you do?

A—Pass. Your partner has a near-minimum opening bid, and you have only one king and one queen. Obviously there is no future in the hand, and you may land in a great deal of trouble if you bid again.

You are not fond of no-trump, and you will surely bid your diamonds if your partner is doubled.

Wisconsin Hopefuls Shape Up To Race McCarthy To Senate

WASHINGTON—The general supposition has been that Wisconsin Senator Joseph R. McCarthy is unbeatable in his bid for reelection this fall. But events now are shaping up in the Badger state to give him a run for his money.

With a July 8 deadline for filing as candidates for the September 9 state primary, there now is one avowed Democratic candidate for McCarthy's Senate seat, with another entry or two likely.

Considered still more important, there now is a new Republican star on the Wisconsin horizon on whom the anti-McCarthy GOP hopefuls are making wises.

He is Leonard (Len) Schmitt, 49-year-old war veteran, a former candidate for governor in the 1950 primary and now a lawyer in Merrill, Wis. Incidentally, on his war record, he actually saw service in the Italian campaign and has combat experience to his credit.

Schmitt has just concluded a short visit to Washington to let the Republican big wigs here look him over and to see how much support he might expect from anti-McCarthy elements of the party.

Schmitt's backer on his Washington visit and his supporter at home is William E. Elyue, editor of the Madison, Wis., Capital Times.

Elyue is a crusading editor of the old Fightin' Bob LaFollette progressive school. His paper has cited chapter and verse on McCarthy's record in Wisconsin, before he came to Washington, and never has been challenged on its charges.

German Background Len Schmitt made a favorable impression on his visit to Washington. He is a husky, blond and blue-eyed German Catholic. This is said to be an important factor in his favor.

Wisconsin is about 30 per cent Catholic and it is German to a far greater degree. The Germans far outnumber the Irish—with which faction Senator McCarthy is identified.

Schmitt also counts heavily on being able to attract the old LaFollette progressive faction in the primary. If the Democrats have no strong candidate to run against McCarthy, Schmitt believes the anti-McCarthy Democrats would throw their support to him.

While Senator McCarthy has been backed by the Wisconsin Republican organization under Tom Coleman as a particular favorite, there are some elements in the state on whose support he may not be able to depend this year.

Rep. Alvin O'Koniski, for instance, is bitter against the McCarthy-Coleman leadership for their opposition to his application for a Merrill, Wis., radio station license. O'Koniski is a former director of the World League to Stop Communism and a former president of the American Anti-Communist Association. This indicates that McCarthy's opposition to communism is not a monopoly.

One other paradox in the McCarthy story, according to Schmitt, is that the senator was elected in 1944 with considerable help from Communist factions in the Wisconsin organized labor movement.

This arose because young Senator Bob LaFollette, in disbanding the old Progressive Party, chose to go with the Republicans instead of the Democrats. Communist elements in control of Wisconsin labor organizations at the time thereupon denounced LaFollette and voted for McCarthy.

Unions Back Opponent Today this Communist control of organized labor in Wisconsin largely has been cleaned out, and the unions' official support is expected to go to anyone who will oppose McCarthy.

Until early this year, the anti-McCarthy Republicans had hoped that Gov. Walter Kohler would make the race for the Senate. Instead he got cold feet and decided to run for reelection as governor.

Governor Kohler's withdrawal for a time made it appear that if McCarthy is beaten for reelection, it will have to be by a Democrat. Two possibilities have appeared on the scene, although they have not yet formally announced candidacy.

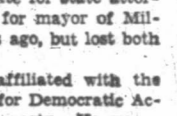
One is Thomas E. Fairchild, former state attorney general, now U. S. district attorney for Wisconsin. The other is state Senator Gaylord Nelson.

The one avowed Democratic candidate who actively is working at it is Henry Reuss, son of a well-to-do Milwaukee family, graduate of Cornell and Harvard Law School. He was a candidate for state attorney general and for mayor of Milwaukee two years ago, but lost both races.

He has been affiliated with the ADA—American for Democratic Action wing of the party. He was a lawyer for OPA during the war and served later in Europe on the Marshall Plan staff.

From the rough and tumble politician's point of view, he is considered too much of an intellectual to have any great popular appeal. And he has a tough handicap to overcome in Senator McCarthy's strong rural and up-state support, outside the Milwaukee and Eastern Wisconsin industrial areas.

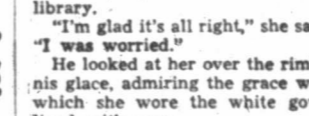

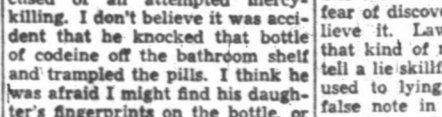

Former Midlander Charged In Burglary Of Pawn Shop Here

A 28-year-old former Midland oil field worker, arrested last week in Lovington, N. M., because he carried too many watches, was charged here Monday with the April 27 burglary of the Midland Pawn Shop.

Bond was set at \$2,000 when the man, William A. Bunyard, was brought before Justice of the Peace L. C. Stephenson.

Bunyard was returned Sunday from New Mexico by Sheriff Ed Darnell and Deputy Guy Fletcher.

He was arrested by Lovington authorities after they heard reports he was offering watches for sale in a poolroom where he worked.

He had several watches on him when arrested, and about 40 watches, 30 rings, two suitcases and some knives were found in his room.

Bunyard told officers he came to Midland in early January from Meridian, Miss., and worked in the oil fields in this area until the burglary.

11 Texas Coast Oil Plants Still Closed

Quick back-to-work orders were expected Monday for some 2,750 oil workers, members of striking Oil Workers International Union (CIO).

It was the twenty-sixth day of the nation-wide strike, being settled on a plant-by-plant basis.

OWIU members in the Pan American Oil Refinery at Galveston will vote Tuesday on a proposed new contract. Tentative agreement was reached Sunday night.

Pan American employs 1,250.

Another tentative agreement was reached at Beaumont between the union and the Pure Oil Company, but the date of the union's membership vote was not disclosed. About 1,500 workers are involved.

Terms of the tentative agreements were not made public at either plant. They presumably follow recommendations of the Wage Stabilization board.

Some nine other Gulf Coast refineries still were closed and no settlements had been reached Monday.

UN Troops Repulse Change-Of-Pace Blow By Chinese

SEOUL, KOREA —(AP)— United Nations troops Monday threw back a change-of-pace assault by two reinforced Chinese companies on the Korean western front. The U. S. Eighth Army said they killed or wounded more than 100 of the attacking Reds in a furious, five-hour fight.

It was the first time in weeks the Reds had struck in greater than platoon strength.

U. S. jet pilots reported they shot down four Communist MIG-15 jets Sunday and damaged another.

In its weekly report, the U. S. Fifth Air Force said Red MIG's shot down five U. S. jets last week and Allied airmen destroyed only four MIG's.

In Washington, Defense authorities announced that Allied plane losses from all causes in the Korean fighting total more than 1,400. Of these, 292 were U. S. jet fighters. No figure was given for the total lost in air combat.

The Air Force said 306 MIG's have been destroyed in the war, 87 probably destroyed and 502 damaged.
