

### **Veteran Dry Agent** Resigns In Disgust At Promotion Policy

WACO -(P)- J. K. Ray, who has been chasing bootleggers more than 23 years, resigned Saturday with a declaration, "The Internal Revenue Bureau cares nothing for efficiency and enforcement of the law."

The big gruff, prohibition agent said he had protested certain pro-motions in the Waco District. He said Dwight E. Avis, deputy bureau director in Washington, replied by letter that "performance has nothing to do with the promotions."

Ray, 55, has been agent for the Alcohol Tax Bureau in the 13county Waco District more than 22 years, including the years of federal prohibition. He declared he raided more than a thousand stills in Freestone County alone from 1930 through 1938 and just about as many

in Somervell County.

Ray said he and J. M. Watson of Waco, his fellow investigator, have "made more cases" than any other district in the alcohol tax region centered at San Antonio.

Representative Teague (D-Texas), author of the bill, claim it was written "out of consideration for the veterans and the taxpayers" and as a remedy for abuses discovered in the present veteran training program. But Representative Springer (R-

III) claims it discriminates against the private colleges of the nation Springer's plan to offer an amendment to the bill on the floor was stymied by the committee's decision to ask the House to suspend its rules and pass the bill in one action.

The hill provides an education allowance of \$110 a month for veterans without dependents or \$150 for those with dependents who enroll in a full-time institutional course. The half-time schooling allowance rould be \$50 and \$70.

From these allowances, veterans would have to meet all of their education costs, including subsistence. For apprenticeships or other onthe-job training, allowances of \$70 and \$95 would be made. On-thefarm training allowances would be \$95 and \$120.

Other provisions Education benefits would be given on the basis of 1 1/2 days of training for each day of service since June 27, 1950, regardless of where it was performed, with the maximum period amounting to 36 calendar

Veterans eligible under the World War II program also would be able to use the new program with bene fits to run no longer than 48 months. The education program must be started within two years after discharge from the service and finished









> Important indeed in commercial fertilizer application is strict attention to the directions supplied by the manufacturer, as plant foods may be different in character.

In the Fall the fertilizer can go in ahead of spading new ground, or in cultivated areas: plant foods may be worked into the soil along the edges. Highly soluable and readily available plant foods often are applied in water solution.

The low nitrogen 5-12-4 formula seems to work better for conditions where cost of water and maintenance are factors. The high nitrogen formula 16-20-0 will give rapid growth to grass; however you may experience the difficulty of Summer burning. This can be prevented by applying when the grass is dry using to three pounds per 100 square feet, then watering thoroughly after application. Some use a combination of high and low nitrogen formulas by using 16-20-0 in April or May for fast growth followed by 4-12-4 in June and July at the rate of four to five pounds per 100 square feet.














COST OF LIVING IN BIG CITIES-Annual cost of a "modest but adequate" level of living for a cost of Living in Big Cities—Annual cost of a "modest but adequate" level of living for a city family of four at October, 1951, prices is shown on newsmap above, based on Department of Labor statistics. Ranging from \$3812 in New Orleans to \$4454 in Washington, D. C., the figures represent goods and services required, and taxes paid, by a family consisting of a father, housewife not gainfully employed and two children under 15 years of age. Highest housing costs, which accounted for big living cost differences between cities, were reported in Washington, Richmond, Houston and Milwauker. 

ELDORADO, ILL.-(P)-A brave bunch of miners dug deep for \$10,000 to run an abandoned Southern Illinois coal pit themselves.

#### College Develops **Test For Wheat**

RALEIGH, N. C .- (A)-A test has een developed to see whether wheat is dry enough to combine or store, says John Curtis, marketing specialist for the North Carolina State

To make the test, place a sample of the grain in a small glass bottle with some ammonium chloride, make the bottle airtight by closing securely, and shake the bottle 50 times. If the ammonium chloride comes damp, the grain is too wet to store safely.



wheat which were in serious need of moisture. The wheat was heading out and to make a good crop it needed this moisture to give its full, plump kernels. Dr. Krick moved two generators

into the area. His first opportunity to seed clouds came in June. When two seeding operations were con-cluded, the 100,000 acres of wheat land had received more than four times as much rain as it normally received during the entire month of June. Areas outside the acreage being targeted with silver iodide received as little as six per cent of their normal June moisture.

Other operations in other areas brought similar results and "Opeation Cloud-Seeding" began attracting wide attention.

Two months ago, groundwork for a project in West Texas was laid and before long the West Texas Weather Improvement Association, of which Midland County is a member, was formed of 11 counties in Contract Signed


