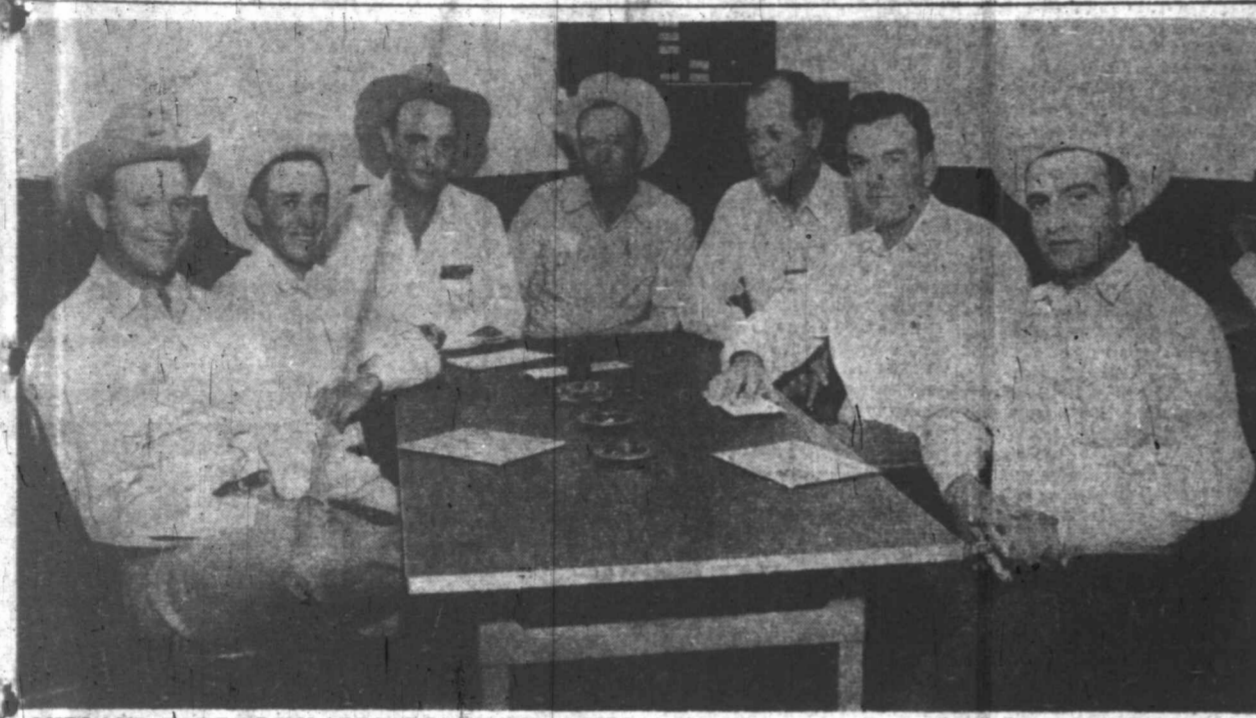


France Mops Up Communist Offices

Eisenhower ended his second "Crusade in Europe" Saturday and flew home for the political wars. The general and Mrs. Eisenhower took off at 2:04 p.m. in his four-engined Constellation, the Columbine. He is due in Washington at 2 p.m. Sunday after getting a night's rest at Stephenville, Newfoundland.

Two Inmates Escape Serious Injury In Stanton Jail Blaze

STANTON—Two prisoners escaped serious injury late Saturday afternoon when a fire broke out in the Martin County Jail on the second floor of the courthouse here. One prisoner, John Brent Fulton, 23, of Snyder, was taken to the Martin County Memorial Hospital for emergency treatment after inhaling the smoke. He had been jailed a short time before the fire on charges of drunkenness. Bill Peppers of Fort Worth occupied a cell adjoining that of Fulton. Peppers was removed to the city jail. The fire started when a mattress blazed in a cell next to those of Peppers and Fulton. Peppers is a car thief suspect.

More Showers Seen For Midland Area

Thunderstorms stepped over the Midland sector Saturday night and CAA observers at the Air Terminal forecast additional light showers for Sunday morning. Saturday showers followed a clear warm day which recorded a maximum temperature of 86 degrees. Cooler weather was expected Sunday. Thunderstorm activity was reported in the vicinity of Stanton, San Angelo, Big Spring and Lubbock as well as closer to Midland. San Angelo had blowing dust with five-mile visibility and wind gusts up to 56 miles an hour.

Paroled Convict, Youth Worker Admits Silk Stocking Holdup Of Amarillo Hotel

AMARILLO—(AP)—Robert J. (Bob) Foight, 38, a paroled convict known here as a tireless youth worker, admitted he pulled a \$1,000 silk stocking robbery of the Herring Hotel here Saturday. Foight, executive director of the City-County Civil Defense Office, was charged with armed robbery and placed in the Potter County jail. He admitted the robbery in a statement to Chief of Police Sid Harper, in the presence of Bill Cox, reporter for the Amarillo Globe-News, and other officers. The hotel auditing office was robbed Saturday morning by a gunman, masked by a black silk stocking pulled over his face. The man herded four women into the cashier's cage, then scooped up the money and fled. Harper said Foight was arrested shortly afterwards in a downtown cafe drinking coffee with Chief of Detectives J. L. King. Officers said they recovered about \$1,200 of the money taken in the robbery. It had been stuffed in a dictation recording machine in the civil defense office. "I was in debt about \$1,000," Foight told Harper and Cox after his arrest. "I owed the bank about \$800. I wanted to get out of debt, so I pulled off my hotel room and got a nice apartment for my daughters when she comes to visit me. "That's why I did it," he said. He said his daughter now is 13 and he had not seen her since she was three years old. He told Harper he got the gun used in the robbery from a friend's house, where he was entertained for dinner several nights ago. Police records show Foight was sent to the Michigan State Prison on Feb. 22, 1938, to serve a 15-year sentence for several robberies. After serving about 10 years he was paroled to several Amarillo citizens who became interested in his case after reading magazine articles he had written. Wins Rotary Orchid Foight came to Amarillo in January, 1948, and was employed by the Amarillo Globe-News. He was assigned to cover youth activities and boys and girls club news in the city. In April, 1950, he received the Rotary Club youth news orchid—an award made in recognition of outstanding work in reporting youth activities. In presenting the award, Floyd Hemphill, Amarillo school principal, said: "He sought no honors. All he wanted to do was help the youth of Amarillo. Bob Foight probably is known to more boys and girls than any other person in Amarillo." Foight left the Globe-News in September, 1951, and worked in Tampa for a brief time. He returned to Amarillo to work for the civil defense office. "I've been going from bad to worse since my wife and I separated last January," Foight told Harper and Cox. He said the divorce would be final in a few days.

debate. Then, with no opportunity for any change to be made—it can be voted up or down. But if a roll call is required this will not be taken until Thursday.

The "take-it-or-leave-it" method of presentation grew out of the only controversial provision in the bill.

The measure provides that education benefits shall be paid directly to the veterans instead of to the colleges, as is the practice presently.

Representative Teague (D-Texas), author of the bill, claim it was written "out of consideration for the veterans and the taxpayers" and as a remedy for abuses discovered in the present veteran training program.

But Representative Springer (R-Ill) claims it discriminates against the private colleges of the nation. Springer's plan to offer an amendment to the bill on the floor was stymied by the committee's decision to ask the House to suspend its rules and pass the bill in one action.

The bill provides an education allowance of \$110 a month for veterans without dependents or \$150 for those with dependents who enroll in a full-time institutional course.

The half-time schooling allowance would be \$50 and \$70.

From these allowances, veterans would have to meet all of their education costs, including subsistence.

For apprenticeships or other on-the-job training, allowances of \$70 and \$95 would be made. On-the-job training allowances would be \$95 and \$120.

Other provisions: Education benefits would be given on the basis of 1 1/2 days of training for each day of service since June 27, 1950, regardless of where it was performed, with the maximum period amounting to 36 calendar months.

Veterans eligible under the World War II program also would be able to use the new program with benefits to run no longer than 48 months.

The education program must be started within two years after discharge from the service and finished within seven years.

## El Pasoan Jailed, Blamed In Murder Of Hatch Sheriff

LAS CRUCES, N. M. — (AP) — A middle-aged El Paso construction worker was in jail without bond Saturday, after pleading innocent to the Memorial Day slaying of Deputy Sheriff Ralph Higginbotham of Hatch.

James Oliver Morgan, 55, was arraigned Saturday before Justice of the Peace Martin Herrera on a first degree murder charge.

Maintaining silence on the shooting—in which Hatch Marshal Guy Dunivan was wounded—Morgan said he was undecided on whether to ask for preliminary hearing. He asked a few days to obtain a defense attorney.

Morgan is charged with shooting Higginbotham and Dunivan early Friday when the officers stopped his car for speeding.

## Armistice Sessions Continue In Stall

MUNSAI, KOREA — (AP) — Allied truce delegates, unfrustrated by the rising crescendo of Communist propaganda protests, told the Reds Saturday that only their stubbornness delayed an armistice.

Both sides agreed to meet at Panmunjom as usual at 11 a.m. Sunday.

The Sunday session lasted thirty minutes and again failed to yield any progress on a truce.

The UN command proposed a recess to allow the Communists time for reconsideration of the Allied final truce offer, but the Red delegation insisted on meeting again Monday as usual.

## Boatner Jails Red Officer Responsible For Koje Riot

KOJE ISLAND — (AP) — Brig. Gen. Haydon L. Boatner Sunday cracked down on the North Korean Communist officer responsible for last Thursday's demonstration in Prison Compound 66.

The Red officer, a lieutenant colonel, was placed in special custody and not permitted to return to his compound. Prisoners there had attempted to cut a hole through a barbed wire fence. The demonstration was broken up by 100 American and British troops with tear gas.

Boatner issued the order when the officer swaggered into the Koje Prison Camp commander's office to report on the demonstration.

A public relations officer said the Red's attitude was so insulting Boatner ordered him jailed "to cool off."

The public relations officer said, "You can say that he has been put in pokey for being insulting to the general in the general's own office this morning."

A prisoner interpreter then was sent back to the compound to spread the word.

Compound 66 is filled with North Korean Communist officers and their orderlies. The group is one of the most truculent on this stormy isle.

Sunday's special jailing of the North Korean officer was the first time Boatner or any previous Koje commander ever clamped down on a prisoner for not showing the deference usually expected of a colonel talking to his warden.

Jailing of the lieutenant colonel left Compound 66 with only "minor league leadership."

## World Petroleum Probe Urged By Missouri Senator

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Jennings (D-Mo) suggested Saturday that President Truman direct the attorney general to investigate what Jennings called domination of the world petroleum industry by a cartel.

The proposal was made in a letter to the President. Jennings said oil industry facts should be presented to a grand jury. He urged oil industry facts should be presented to a grand jury. He urged publication of a federal trade commission staff report on international oil business.

On April 23, FTC Commissioner Stephen J. Spingarn told a Senate Small Business subcommittee, of which Jennings is a member, that the report deals in detail with "cartel-like activities of the big international oil companies."

He said the report had been kept secret because its publication might aggravate the delicate political situation in Iran. Iran has nationalized its British-owned oil industry.

## Four Youths Flee School For Boys France—

GATESVILLE — (AP) — Four youths escaped from the State School for Boys here Saturday, taking with them the money of the school's panel trucks.

They were last seen on a country road about 17 miles north of here, near Turnersville.

School officials identified them as: Coy Mannies, 16, Houston; Horton Johnson, 16, Belton; James Boyd, 17, Amarillo; James Mills, 16, Dallas.

## Red Threat To Cut West-German Traffic Fails To Materialize

BERLIN — (AP) — The Communists tightened their new squeeze on West Berlin, but the Red threat to block West Germany's highway to this city had not materialized early Sunday.

As a possible prelude to worse things to come, the East German Communist People's Police lopped off two little islands of freedom on the outskirts of the city.

West Berlin was gripped by its worst case of jitters since the Russian blockade of 1948-49. The Communist government in the Soviet zone had announced it would inaugurate Sunday new rules requiring special passes for all Germans traveling in the Russian zone.

However, up to almost an hour after midnight, a report from the main East-West checkpoint at Helmsdorf said, trucks and buses continued to cross the border freely in both directions.

The West Germans and West Berliners had feared the Reds might require the new passes of truck drivers who deliver a large part of the vital necessities to West Berlin, 110 miles within the Russian zone.

If this policy were carried out and extended to bargemen and railmen, it would mean another blockade.

The two little outposts of freedom which the Red government absorbed were the hamlets of Buergerablage and Steinsteucken.

For a week the Communists have been creating a trench-scarred no-man's-land, three miles deep, along the zonal border with West Germany from the Baltic to Bavaria, evacuating families and moving in police reinforcements. Now the same tactics have begun around Berlin.

## Thieves Steal Gem-Laden Crowns From Holy Shrine

NEW YORK — (AP) — Nocturnal thieves invaded a two million dollar Roman Catholic shrine in Brooklyn and stole gem-encrusted gold crowns donated by hundreds of women during World War II as an offering to peace.

Church officials, who discovered the theft Saturday, said the two crowns were insured for \$100,000 but their "moral value can not be replaced."

The crowns were embodied in a painting of the Virgin Mary and the Christ Child that hung above and behind the main altar in the Regina Pacis Votive Shrine, which was built and maintained by the St. Rosalia Catholic Church.

Police said the thieves had sawed through a bronze grill surrounding the shrine to reach the glittering crowns, which were hung by hooks over the heads of the Virgin and the child.

Two points of the larger crown, which was hung over the head of Mary, were found inside the grill, apparently broken off as the crown was pulled through the hole.

The two points alone contained 10 diamonds.

Police said the theft apparently occurred between 6:45 p.m. Friday and 9 a.m. Saturday, when a priest celebrating a special high mass discovered the crowns were missing.

Mgr. Angelo R. Cloffi, pastor of St. Rosalia Church, said the thieves were believed to have hidden Friday in the lower chapel under the shrine and emerged during the night.

The crowns were decorated with more than 500 rubies, diamonds, emeralds and sapphires which had been given by the women of the parish and others of the devout.

They were insured before being flown to Rome last January to be blessed by Pope Pius XII.

Some of these critics suggested American "mismanagement" might be blocking the way to a Korean Truce.

Three Laborites introduced a motion in the House of Commons asking that Lord Alexander, defense minister, propose a check of American prisoner screening when Alexander makes his forthcoming visit to Tokyo.

Another laborite MP, Emanuel Shinwell, who was defense minister in Clement Attlee's government, proposed that the whole prisoner problem be dropped into the UN's lap.

The influential Times of London, joining a week-long chorus of criticism of the U.S. on the prisoner question, urged the Allied powers to clean up the Koje Island camps. It said the prisoners should be screened anew, if need be, in the presence of Chinese and North Korean representatives.

Lord Beaverbrook's Conservative and imperialist-minded Evening Standard called for wholesale return of Red prisoners, regardless of their personal wishes.

## British Press, Labor Leaders Lash U. S. Bungling On POW's

LONDON — (AP) — British papers and Laborite members of parliament Saturday lambasted what they called American bungling in handling Communist war prisoners on Koje Island off Korea.

He had oil holdings in several West Texas counties and extensive ranch interests in San Saba County. Funeral services will be held here Monday.

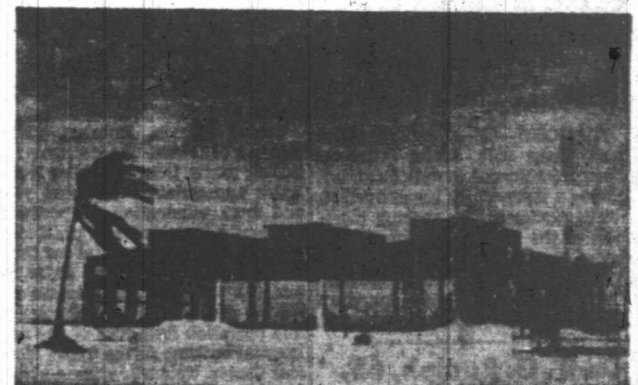
## HE SINKS HOLE IN ONE, BUT—

Regents Vote Pay Boost For Texas, TWC Facilities

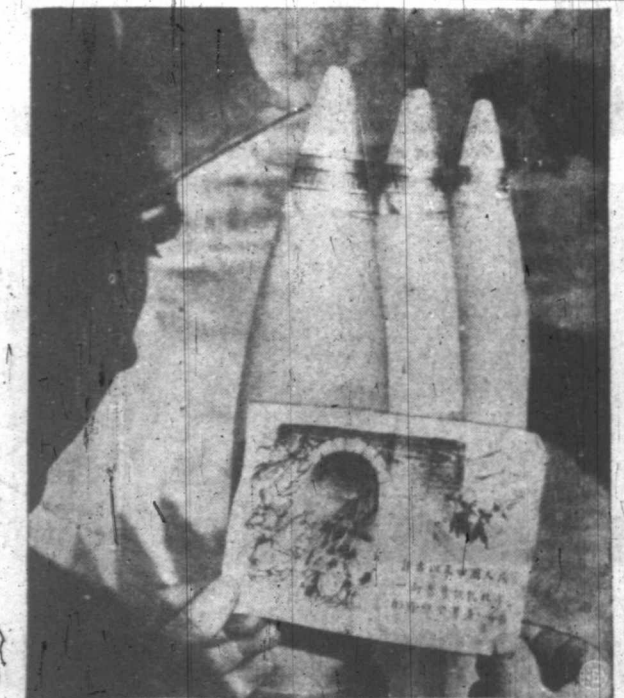
AUSTIN —(P)—A \$300 cost-of-living pay boost was approved for faculty of the University of Texas and Texas Western College by the University Board of Regents Saturday. An approximate five per cent increase was voted for non-teaching employees at both schools. The board voted the increases into 1952-53 operating budgets on the recommendation of administrative officers. Some merit increases also were granted in both academic and non-academic positions. Thirty-nine promotions in rank also were granted teachers at the main university. Budgets for others units of the university contained no general pattern of pay advances, but there were numerous adjustments of individual salaries and promotions in rank for professional and non-professional employees. The main university budget for next year was set at \$9,275,033, compared with a current budget of \$9,118,112. The school will draw \$1,300,000 from the university available fund to go with legislative appropriations to meet the budget. Next Year's Budget Next year's budgets for other units, compared with this year's: Southwestern Medical School, Dallas, \$828,845, and \$775,345; Galveston Medical Branch, \$5,842,285 and \$5,099,330; Dental Branch, Houston, \$791,890 and \$1,154,688, the decrease resulting partly from a smaller legislative appropriation for next year and from elimination of positions previously budgeted but unfilled. M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research, Houston, \$2,195,286 and \$1,885,523, the big increase resulting from expected completion and operation next year of the new hospital building in the Texas Medical Center. This will expand greatly the program of the hospital, which is now in temporary quarters. Postgraduate School of Medicine, with headquarters in Houston and divisions in San Antonio, San Angelo and Temple, \$51,600 and \$43,100, the program being paid for entirely from grants and course fees. Central administration of the entire university system, \$162,125 and \$154,762. Texas Western College, \$1,307,440 and \$1,162,548.

Settlement Ends Oil Walkout In East Texas Field

KILGORE —(P)—Employees of the East Texas Salt Water Disposal Company returned to work Saturday, ending a strike which began April 30. The settlement by striking members of the CIO Oil Workers Union ended the oil strike in the big East Texas oil field. Walkouts of Sinclair, Cities Service and Pan American Pipe-Line employees ended previously.

Dr. T. G. Rumph, 65, Dies At Fort Worth

FORT WORTH —(P)—Dr. T. G. Rumph, 65, a Fort Worth physician since 1913, died Saturday afternoon in his office after suffering a cerebral hemorrhage. Born in Erath County, Dr. Rumph lived a few years in Oklahoma before moving to Fort Worth in June, 1913. He graduated from Stephenville High School and received his doctor's training at the University of Louisville Medical College.

Spectacular Fire Sweeps Iowa Tank Car Loading Area: OMAHA —(P)—A spectacular oilfield fire spewed thick black clouds of smoke and brilliant orange flames high into the air here during the early morning darkness Saturday. ### British Jeep Can Almost Climb A Tree

BIRMINGHAM, ENGLAND—(NEA)—The "land rover"—a variant of the American jeep which can almost climb a tree—is carrying a yeomanlike load in helping to support the British economy and defense programs.

Slightly heavier than a conventional jeep, but otherwise very similar, the land rover was first produced in small quantities in 1948 and was aimed to meet the needs of the farmer.

It did the job admirably, becoming an all-purpose, go-anywhere vehicle that could do almost anything from pulling a tractor to running a threshing machine.

Its rear and center power take-offs made it a mobile power unit,

suitable for driving air compressors for three or plant spraying, chaff cutters, circular saws and countless other machines. It has even been used to power electric milking machines.

#### Many Purposes

Today, however, the land rover serves many others purposes; besides farming. It is an important part of Britain's export drive and defense program.

Some 400 land rovers a week are now coming off the assembly line. About 80 per cent are going overseas—at \$1,400 each.

Those which don't go abroad are being snapped up by the Army and Air Force, which means that the average Briton who wants to buy one for his personal use now

faces a two-year waiting period. About 35 per cent of the machinery making land rovers is American made, acquired through regular commercial channels supplied under the Mutual Security Program.

Much of the export trade is with Belgium, which uses land rovers in its military program. Although the size of the contract with the Belgian Army is described only as "considerable" for security reasons, it is expected that the entire army will be equipped with them.

Last year Belgium decided to begin manufacturing the vehicles herself under a deal arrangement through the European Payments Union, a clearing house for intra-Europe trade.

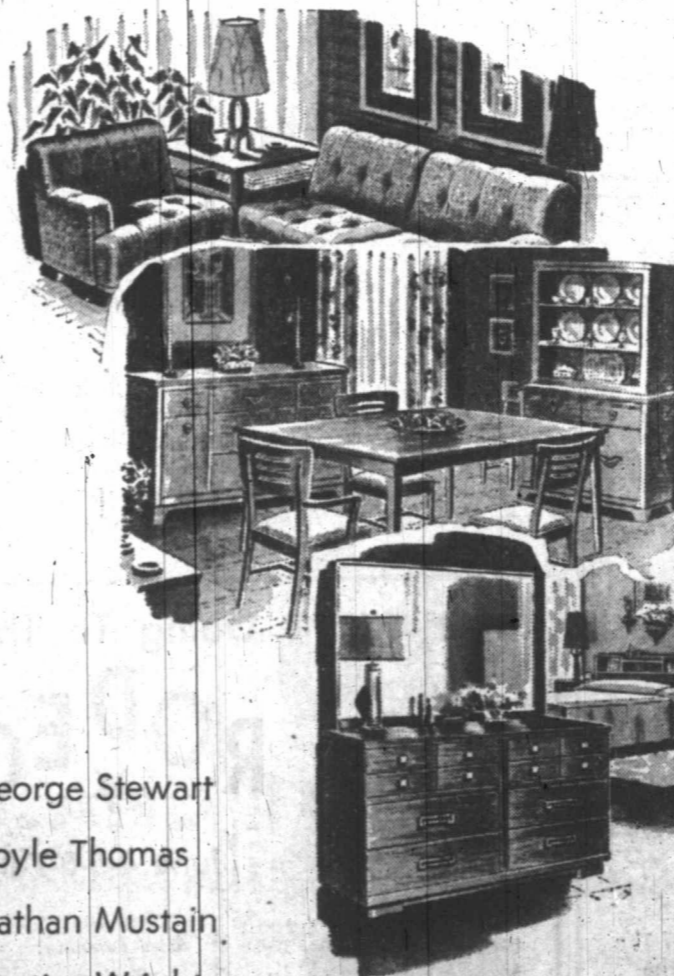

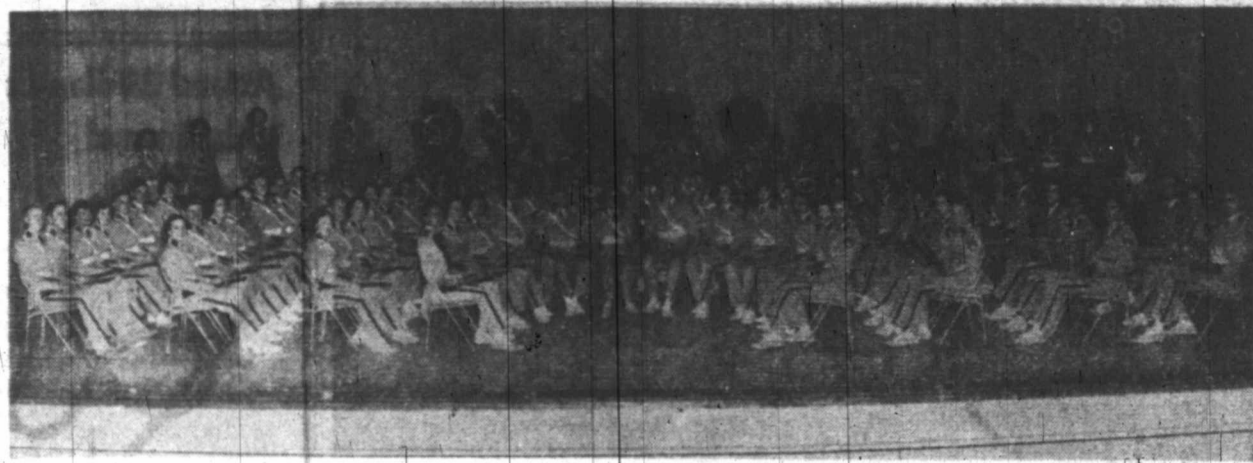

OAKLAND, CALIF. — (AP) — Sheriff H. P. Gleason said the wife of a Navy lieutenant thrust a knife into herself 30 times early Saturday after stabbing her two children to death in their Navy project home 15 miles east of here.

Sheriff Gleason said the woman, Mrs. Mary Glenn, slashed the children to death with a pairing knife after beating them with a baseball bat until they lost consciousness. Dead are Billie, eight, and Bobbie, five and one-half.

Gleason said Mrs. Glenn, taken to Highland Hospital in Oakland, was in "good" condition.

"She offered no reason for the stabbings, just continually muttered, 'My God, Why did I do it,'" the sheriff said.

The husband, Lt. Robert H. Glenn, is stationed at Guam.

**Catholics Ban Books By Noted Frenchman**

VATICAN CITY — (AP) — The Roman Catholic Church placed on its index of forbidden literature Saturday all the books of the late French writer Andre Gide, winner of the 1947 Nobel Prize for Literature.

The action was taken by the Congregation of the Holy Office, which last Monday placed a similar ban on the works of Alberto Moravia, Italian best-selling novelist. It means Roman Catholics are forbidden to read the works of either of these writers.

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# High Taxes Help Uncork Big New Bootlegging Boom

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—Bootlegging, which has been increasing steadily and alarmingly since the end of World War II, now threatens to zoom back to its prohibition-day prominence as the country's No. 1 illicit industry.

New profit incentives and the influx of big-time gangsters into the racket are the causes, according to claims of congressional crime experts, local alcohol law enforcement agencies and spokesmen for the U. S. Alcohol Tax Unit.

Today, according to Ralph T. Heynfield, a representative of the Schenley Industries, Inc., close to half of all the whiskey drunk in the U. S. is bootlegged. He blames it on the high \$10.50 per-gallon federal tax on whiskey. The con-

sumption of legal whiskey has dropped 25 per cent since the tax increase of last year.

"Bootlegging is back as a big business controlled by the syndicates," says Sen. Herbert O'Connor (D-Md.) who served as a member of the Kefauver crime committee and then took over as chairman when Kefauver quit. "It's back because the heat is on gambling and narcotics," he says, "and the racketeers are going to have to substitute income from bootlegging to keep going."

**Backed By Spokesman**

This is backed by a spokesman from the ATU who says there is mounting evidence of highly organized gang techniques recently being introduced into the moonshine business. Where one or two men used to brew up a batch back in the hills, drive it into town

and peddle it themselves, today you are finding big business specialization in the racket.

One group makes the stuff along scientific lines, he explains. Another outfit does nothing but the delivering to the specialized group who handle the final sales.

This is evidence of growing syndicate control. He estimates that within a year the big-time racketeers could have a virtual monopoly of bootlegging. Up until now it has been an over-all big business run by a lot of independents, small-time crooks, and mostly in the southern states. It is rapidly spreading up north.

ATU figures only tell part of the story because they don't include raids by state and local officers. But they do show the increase. Biggest year of bootlegging after prohibition was 1927 when 16,142 stills were seized. In 1943 it dropped to the lowest point with 5,654 seizures. Last year it rocketed to the post-war high of 10,177 seizures, with the expectancy for this year much greater and possibly very near the 1927 figure.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue and head of the ATU John B. Dunlap, in secret testimony to Congress, affirmed Sen. O'Connor's claim that the big syndicate bosses, with sharply curtailed gambling profits, were moving in on the bootlegging racket. He appealed for funds to hire more than the 900 agents now on the job to handle the new menace.

Alcohol law enforcement officers of six eastern states recently organized into the Alcohol Beverage Tax Administrators Conference to fight for lower whiskey taxes, and to cooperate on better methods of law enforcement.

**Indicated By Seizure**

John F. O'Connell, a member of the new ABTAG and chairman of the New York State Liquor Authority, says:

"That illicit distilling has now reached the stage of an industrialized business is indicated by the size of some of the stills seized in New York recently. One raided in Center Moriches, L. I., had a daily capacity of 2,500 gallons. One in the Bronx had a daily capacity of 1,000 gallons.

Reports similar to this are coming from many states. The traditional pattern of local moonshining in the hills is changing rapidly with interstate operations. The sugar is delivered to the various stills in fleets of huge trucks. Sugar is the most important ingredient.

The trucks return loaded with the illicit booze. Some of the booze is handled through chains of dealers. Much of it is showing up in taverns and bars whose owners have connections with the syndicate.

The current price is between \$5.00 and \$10.00 a gallon for the moonshine. The federal tax on legal whiskey is more than that, now \$10.50 per gallon. And then local taxes of from about \$2 to \$5 per gallon are on top of that. High prices on everything else, plus the high tax on whiskey, are credited with making bootlegging so attractive right now.

Since last November, when the federal tax was increased, there has been an actual decline of \$172,000,000 in the amount of excise taxes collected by Uncle Sam.

Spokesmen for the distilling industries claim that if the tax was reduced from \$10.50 per gallon to \$8, a maximum of revenue would be taken by the government. And this, they say, would take the profit out of bootlegging and put the gangsters out of business.

So far none of the big boys who have deserted gambling for bootlegging have been caught, the haven't been in the business long enough for ATU agents to get evidence on them. And because of the specialization those small-time employees of the syndicates who do get caught can only be charged with one count that usually calls for a relatively minor sentence.

### PILGRIMAGE PLANNED

SINGAPORE—(AP)—A total of 5,700 pilgrims from Singapore, Malaya, North Borneo, Sarawak and Brunel are expected to sail for Mecca this year. A spokesman for the Meccan advisory board said strict measures would be carried out prior to sailing to avoid, as far as possible, deaths or births among pilgrims. Mecca pilgrimages from this area in the past have been marked by disease and deaths.

### LIKE U. S. FILMS

BRUSSELS—(AP)—Some 76 per cent of the films shown in Belgium during the first nine months of 1951 were of American origin, recent statistics have revealed. On a total of 55,959 showings during this period, the United States recorded 42,464. France came second with 14 1/2 per cent and Great Britain was third with four per cent.

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## Texas Building Awards Decline

AUSTIN—(AP)—Awards of building contracts took a dive in Texas last week.

The value of contracts for the week totaled \$24,603,330 compared with \$32,744,513 in the previous seven-day period, the Texas Contractor said Saturday.

The authoritative contracting journal has tabulated a total of \$453,196,250 in all types of construction to date this year.

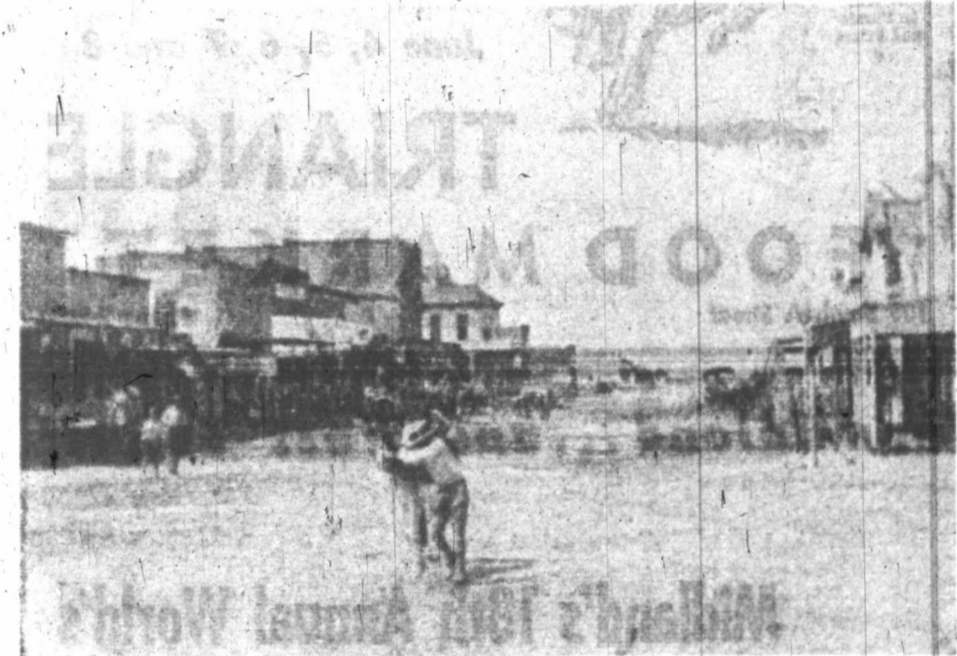
For the week, non-residential building was far in the lead with a total of more than 17 million dollars in contracts.

## New Industries Flow Into Texas

AUSTIN—(AP)—New industry is flowing into Texas at a steady pace, the Texas Employment Commission said Saturday.

Its survey showed 38 new firms located in the state during April, bringing the year's total to 186 to date. That was two short of the total for the same period in 1951.

The new firms employ 1,251 persons. The total workers hired for new industries during the first four months of this year was 5,932.

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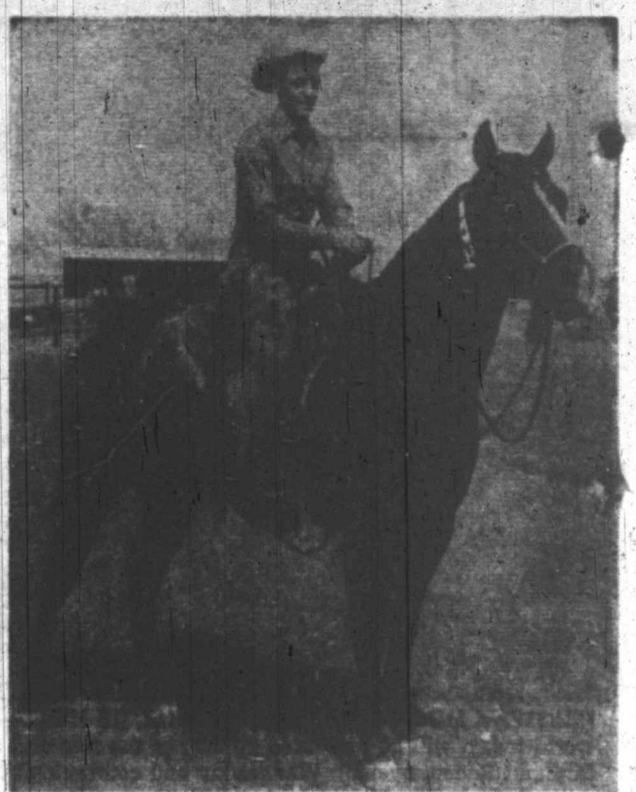

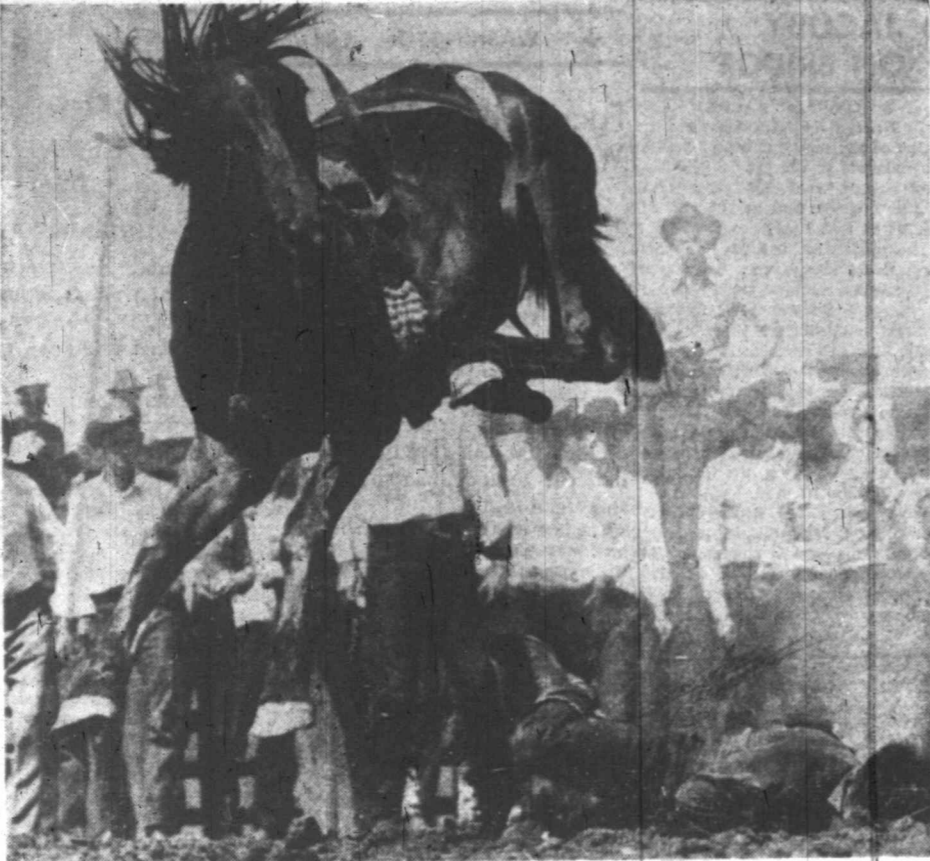
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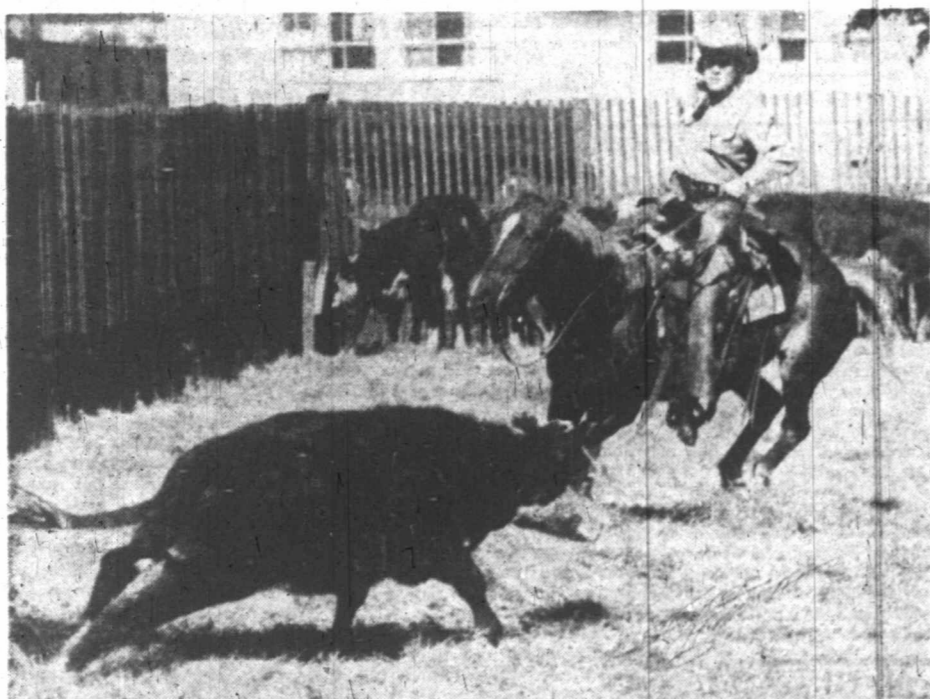

**NEW YORK**—Freeman Chum, a small and smiling man with an unconquerable faith in human nature, is the embodiment of the old American rags-to-riches story. There is, however, one unusual angle. Freeman Chum, born Liu Hoy Chum in Canton province around 1900, is a Chinese. He decided early in his career in America that the way to the nation's heart was through its stomach. Today he is the owner of a Chinese restaurant in midtown Manhattan. Teen-Aged Immigrant

Chum was still in his teens when he emigrated to the new world. He got a job cooking for a chuck-wagon on a ranch in Wyoming.

## Police Start Hunt For Phantom Sniper

**ST. LOUIS**—(AP)—Police here Saturday were called in on the case of the blue phantom sniper who is reported to have fired at motorists from a speeding automobile on an Illinois highway.

Two motorists reported they were fired on Thursday on Route 66 near Joliet, Ill. One of them, William Ehrthel of Plainfield, was wounded in the hand.

He said the bullet was fired from a 1950 blue Ford occurred as the machine passed Ehrthel about 18 miles north of Joliet.

The bullet is being sent here for comparison with one found in downtown St. Louis Wednesday after a Union Electric Company executive was wounded fatally as he prepared to enter his parked automobile.

The man was Raymond C. Raack. A spent .38 caliber bullet was found in the street a few yards from his car. Persons in the vicinity at the time said Raack slumped to the sidewalk as a car passed and that they heard a report like a back-fire.

The troops will be in foxholes about four miles from Ground Zero at the time of the explosion. After the detonation, they will start their maneuvers toward the blast area.

## Retired Deputy U. S. Marshal Dies

**FORT WORTH**—(AP)—Retired U. S. Deputy Marshal E. T. Jenkins, a native of Denton, died Friday of a heart ailment.

Advertise or Be Forgotten

The pay was sensational — \$32 a week. Chum loved his work and also admired the cowboys. One, "Cowboy Charlie," gave him his American first name, Freeman.

"I hung around a gambling house —Chinatown was wide open in those days," Chum recalls, "and got a job in the kitchen. I lived on nothing—in a cold-water flat for \$3 a month. But I saved \$1,600 and quit to go to evening school and learn."

Then a rich Chinese offered him a job managing an upstate restaurant.

"And there was a time not long after that, that I owned three Chinese restaurants, in Syracuse, Schenectady and Rochester and I was worth a quarter of a million dollars," said Chum reflectively.

Unfortunately, the year was 1929. In 1930 he borrowed carfare back to New York, then got a job in Baltimore managing another Chinese restaurant.

**Married Boss' Daughter**  
At this point, Freeman kept up the Alger tradition by marrying the boss' daughter. He saved money and in 1935 opened his own place in New York's Chinatown.

Some years ago he decided on a revolutionary move — uptown—on the theory that Americans were educated in Chinese food, and would enjoy a good meal without the "atmosphere" of Pell Street. He was right — and a number of other Chinese restaurants have followed suit.

Chum recently helped expose a blackmail racket practiced on men and women with relatives in Red China. Chum received a letter that his brother was imprisoned, but could be ransomed.

**Publicized Racket**  
Chum sent \$400 immediately. Later he learned his brother was dead. He publicized the racket and authorities stepped in.

The Chum family lives in a substantial middle-class section of Jamaica. Their oldest boy, Noble, is a student at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. The younger boy, James, and the daughter, Diana, attended public schools.

Recently when authorities were having trouble with street gangs, Chum turned a portion of his property into an equipped playground and invited all the kids in neighborhood to use it.

## Count Jacini Dies

**MILAN, ITALY.**—(AP)—Count Stefano Jacini, 65, Italian senator and leader of the nation's representation in the Council of Europe, died here Saturday. He also was president of the UNESCO Executive Committee.

Faces Still Red From '48 Poll, Writers Pick Ike, Stevenson

WASHINGTON — To know how good Newweek Magazine's poll of 50 Washington political writers is on picking the most likely presidential tickets, the 1952 results must be judged along with predictions made by a similar group in 1948.

Polled on June 7, 1948, all 50 of the correspondents—including this writer—predicted that the Republicans had the best chance to win the election.

The late Senator Arthur Vandenberg was picked by 28 of the 50 writers as the most likely to get the GOP nomination. Governor Dewey of New York was second with 18 votes. Stassen was favorite for Republican vice president with 15 votes.

### Ways To Keep Home Cool In Summer Listed In Report

How cool will your home be this Summer?

Maybe you can't do anything about the weather outdoors, but there are plenty of inexpensive ways of making indoor temperatures pleasant for summertime, points out a Tile Council of America report. Houses overheat for a variety of reasons. Here's a check list of some of the causes, with appropriate remedies:

Sunlight streaming through windows can turn any room into a hot house. Afternoon sun heats the house most, so install awnings for windows of west rooms. They will admit light and at the same time keep the rooms cool.

Air indoors stays hot after temperatures drop in the evening, because of poor ventilation. Be sure that warm air can escape from the attic, and that the door or trap door to it is opened at night. An attic fan will greatly speed up air movement.

Meals outdoors Cooking heats up not only the kitchen but also the dining and living room. Have a small terrace paved with durable clay tile built now, so that you can move meals outdoors on hot evenings. A tiled terrace can be hosed down an hour before meals and the resulting evaporation will make the whole area cooler.

You can't get all the heat out of a kitchen, but a ventilating fan over the range is a great help. In fact, it will be useful the year round, to draw off cooking odors.

A porch is a cool spot for summer-time, but no family will use it if the floor is in poor condition, the furniture shabby and the lighting bad. Good porch furniture, a colorful floor and good reading lights will draw any family out of doors for cool evening breezes. When the house stays hot, although the evening is cool, try placing a fan on a table about three feet from a window and facing it out. Then open windows in rooms to be cooled, and let the fan pull out hot air to let in the cool from outdoors.

### Decorator's Idea Is To Plan Room From Floors Up

The logical starting point in developing a new decorative plan for a room is the floor, according to leading interior decorators. They say that planning a room from the floor up makes sense because the floor serves as a frame for the furnishings.

As such it is a basic feature and commands major attention. Tasteful planning therefore demands not only that a floor be attractive, but also that it harmonize with other elements. Practically should be considered, too. The floor should be one that's easy to keep clean and well groomed.

These fundamentals of successful room planning are executed especially well in the currently popular practice which utilizes the natural beauty of oak floors to fullest advantage. In this styling, a relatively large area of oak flooring is left exposed. Set off with attractive accent rugs, the gleaming oak blends well with traditional or modern furnishings of any color and additionally fulfills the requirement of easy care.

A Fort Worth home builder is providing \$40 per month housing to the \$200-\$300 monthly income group in his area who are willing to do the interior finishing themselves, according to Correlator magazine.

Houses are complete with plumbing and necessary mechanical equipment, but a purchaser finishes the home to his own taste. During the last three years 400 such houses have been sold.

Population experts estimate 40,700 married couples by 1960, as compared with 35,600 for 1950—the family formation rate curving sharply upward when the big wave of World War II babies start reaching marriageable age brackets.

All construction for the first quarter of 1952 now is two per cent ahead of the first quarter of 1951, due largely to gains in public construction.

New construction expenditures for March totaled \$2,247,000,000—an increase of 13 per cent over February.

### Small House With Custom Touches

More and more families are turning to modernization for the answer to their housing problems. New ideas and modern materials, remodeling specialists report, make it easy today for the owner of an old house to increase its comfort, convenience, beauty and value.

Modernized homes, they point out, frequently offer advantages not found in newly built houses. They contain much more space than do new homes of comparable cost, they often are located in well established neighborhoods and they have landscaping features that take years to develop.

The first step in modernization is to check the building for structural defects. If any are found, they should be remedied. Then the work of rehabilitation can begin.

Asbestos Siding Popular Many dilapidated appearing houses can be made to look like new by covering the exterior with modern siding materials. Among the most popular for frame houses are asbestos-cement siding shingles. Besides giving the home a greatly improved appearance, they provide increased protection against weather and fire.

Asbestos-cement siding shingles can be applied over old wood siding or stucco. They are unharmed by extremes of weather and they will never rot. Since they do not require painting for preservation, they keep sidewall maintenance costs to a minimum. Savings in upkeep will pay for this type of improvement.

A few structural changes frequently will take years from the looks of an old house. Judged by today's standards, many older residences are over-ornate. Removing false eaves and "gingerbread" will bring out simple lines more in keeping with today's standards.

Color can work wonders in exterior modernization. Roofs can be made to appear lower if re-shingled in dark shades, while keeping the walls light. Too much color in the trim around eaves, doors and windows usually has a distracting effect. A simple color plan, accepting the horizontal lines, generally is most effective. The addition of a picture window or the enlargement of small windows will give a modern feeling.

Roof Enhances Beauty A good-looking roof will bring out the full beauty of a well modernized home. Roofing materials should be selected for durability and fire-safety as well as appearance.

Other opportunities for modernization will be found inside. An up-to-date kitchen, with new equipment and appliances, will trim years from the age of the house. Old fashioned bathrooms can be given a modern look by refinishing walls with modern enameled or plastic covered wallboards. Removal of unneeded wood trim in other rooms will give them new youth. Attics and basements can be made into recreation rooms and extra living quarters.

Remodeling costs can be spread out over a number of years through FHA-approved modernization loans.

Middle income groups — \$3,000 to \$7,500 — constitute a larger proportion of the new house market in 1952 than in 1951 according to a Federal Reserve survey. There is a continuing strong demand for housing in the \$8,000 to \$18,000 range.

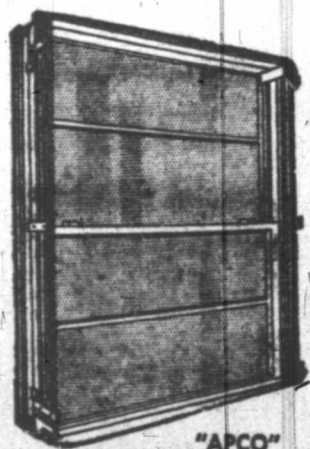

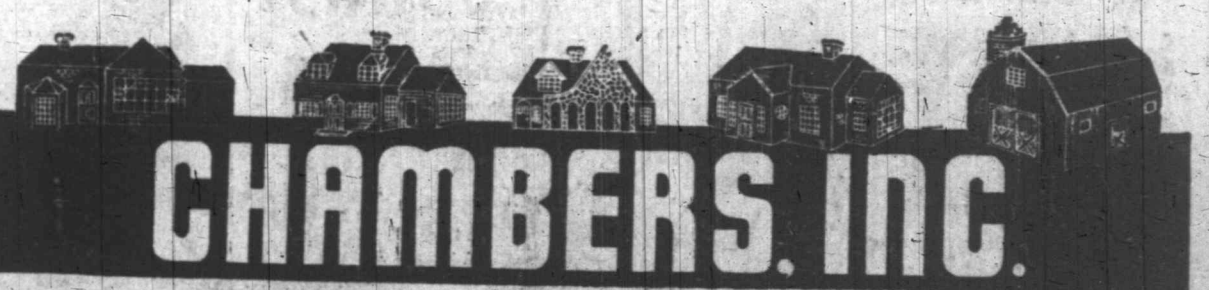

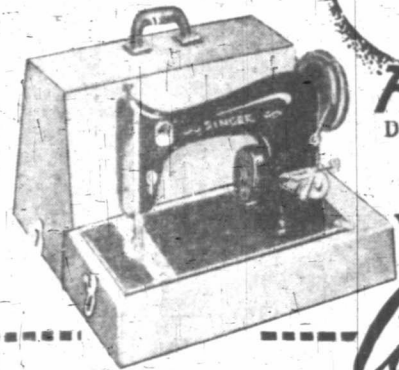

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## SO THIS IS NEW YORK

NEW YORK—Across from me on the subway sat a blind woman and beside her a well-dressed man. Slowly she raised her hand until it touched his arm. He stiffened from the habit of being accosted so often for money. She seemed to sense his feeling and shook her head. As the train came to a stop, she said gently, "I just wanted to ask you sir, if this is 68th Street?" The man gulped, rose to his feet and carefully escorted her off the train, helped her through the turnstile and then bowed to her politely, just as if she could see. "I want to thank you sir," she said, as a tear dropped from those blind eyes. "I have come a long way to New York to see the only doctor in the world who might restore my sight, and am on my way to his office now. But you have already made me see one thing clearly—the sunshine of human kindness. God bless you, sir."

Passing along the lower section of Park Avenue, I paused for a minute before the statue of Cornelius Vanderbilt and reflected on how he had risen from a poor boy on Staten Island to own some ferry boats, then became president of the New York Central Railroad and one of the wealthiest men in the country. His was the day of overnight millionaires when our nation was booming and taxes did not take away all their wealth. In 1865, Cornelius had only ten million dollars, but when he passed away in 1877, he left 112 million.

Soon you will be hearing of a new exercise—the Times Square Dance. Broadway finally has succumbed to the craze, has humbly bowed to the hoe-down. The mountain music has come to Mohammed, so to speak, and do-si-do soon will resound in this modern Babylon. For the Astor Hotel soon will have the Grand Ole Opry in its swanky supper room. Instead of the toot of the flute and the moan of the saxophone, Times Square will

rock to the rhythms of "swing your partner." If grandpappy could walk through this "hick town" and view "sich shindiggin," he'd probably be surprised, but after all, nothing must stand in the way of "progress."

Over near the East River is the rather weather-beaten building where the great Arthur Brisbane held forth as a Hearst editor. Once a new writer brought him an editorial headed "Hygienics and Dietetics in Ancient Times." Brisbane scowled at the title, but discovered that the piece was a very interesting contrast of the old and new. So he told the writer that only a few college professors would read it. Then he crossed out the headline and substituted these words: "Pity Poor Mooes—He Had No Bathtub."

Now and then at some gathering of notables in this city, I have seen a not-unusual-looking man, balding at the forehead and beginning to bulge a little now at the waist. He is Charles A. Lindbergh who just 25 years ago flew solo across the wide Atlantic, the first ever to make it alone. He personified the exultant spirit of American youth. Later, as you know, he was to marry a wealthy girl, lose his son by kidnapping and be criticized for accepting a medal from Hermann Goering. He has paid the penalty of being famous and wealthy. But those who know him best say he quietly does lots of things for government aviation which go unnoticed by the public.

Bertrand Russell who arrived here from England the other day, tells a story about the eminent Cambridge mathematician who at the age of 22 discovered a famous formula which still is called by his name. This done, he felt he had accomplished enough in the way of original work, and devoted the rest of his life to accumulating mathematical books and papers in his study. He covered the walls

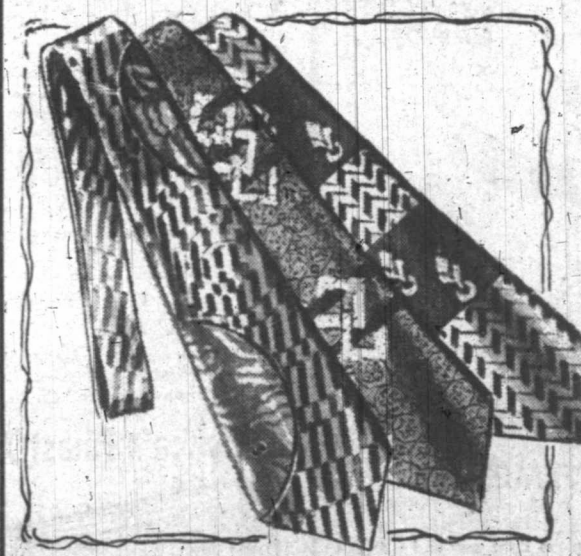

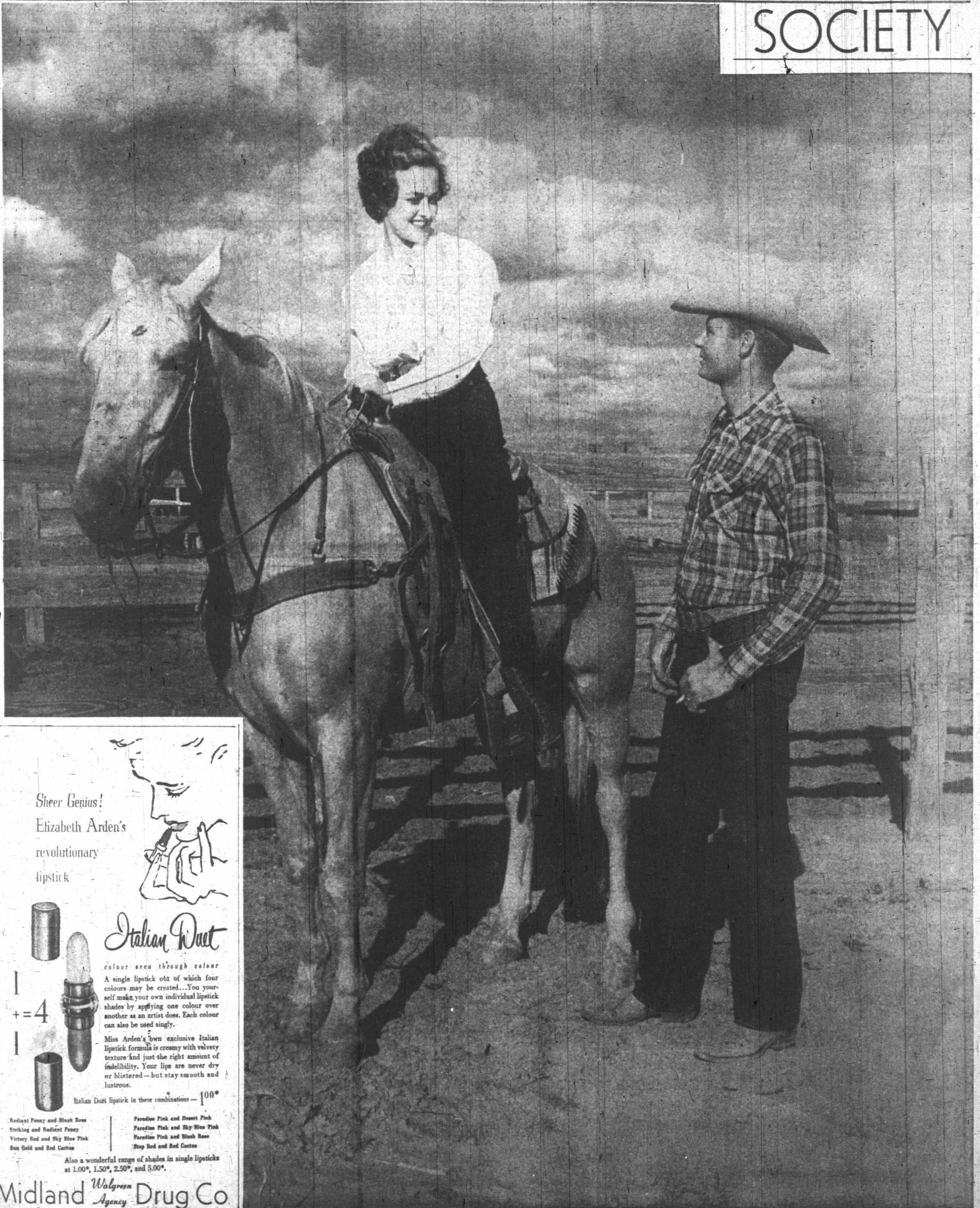

**Gardening Success Depends On Proper Soil Conditioning**

(Seventh in a series of articles on gardening prepared by the Midland Council of Garden Clubs.)

The basis of all gardening is an adequate depth of fertile soil in good condition. Anything that makes up a deficiency is a fertilizer; but are you familiar with the different kinds of material and know what to use when and where?

First there is organic fertilizer. It is decayed animal or vegetable mat-

ter, including decomposed leaves, dried grass, kitchen refuse, peat-moss or woodashes. Barnyard manure is one of the best all around garden fertilizers because it also provides humus. Bonemeal contains nitrogen and phosphoric acid, but no potash. This is a favorite source for roses.

Inorganic fertilizer is one containing mineral nutrients. Buy commercial plant foods with an eye on the analysis. You may see on the bag or container such a combination as 4-12-4; this formula means that in 100 pounds of fertilizer there will be four pounds of nitrogen, 12 pounds of phosphorus and four pounds of potash. If the container states it is a complete fertilizer it also, by law, contains the "trace" elements: Iron, Copper, Manganese, Boron and Zinc which are needed, but in small amounts.

**Nitrogen Is Important**

Nitrogen is important in leaf production; phosphorus aids root development and increases seed and flower production; potash aids stem growth plants need to reach maturity. As a general rule Midland soil is deficient in everything except potash.

Important indeed in commercial fertilizer application is strict attention to the directions supplied by the manufacturer, as plant foods may be different in character.

In the Fall the fertilizer can go in ahead of spading new ground, or in cultivated areas; plant foods may be worked into the soil along the edges. Highly soluble and readily available plant foods often are applied in water solution.

The low nitrogen 5-12-4 formula seems to work better for conditions where cost of water and maintenance are factors. The high nitrogen formula 16-20-0 will give rapid growth to grass; however you may experience the difficulty of summer burning. This can be prevented by applying when the grass is dry using two to three pounds per 100 square feet, then watering thoroughly after application. Some use a combination of high and low nitrogen formulas by using 16-20-0 in April or May for fast growth followed by 4-12-4 in June and July at the rate of four to five pounds per 100 square feet.

**Mixed Formula**

Some nurserymen recommend a mixed formula using 16-20-0 and 4-12-4 plus super phosphate 0-20-0 to result in a 12-20-2 formula. This formula, when applied in May at the rate of six to seven pounds per 100 square feet, seems to give sufficient growth to last throughout the growing season.

Midland is in a highly alkaline soil belt. If you wish to grow acid-loving material add soil sulphur.

## Pointers Given On Writing Congressman

WASHINGTON (AP)—Every congressman gets lots of mail, some of which is propaganda, some from constituents threatening to defeat the legislator if he doesn't go along with them, and some from people calmly expressing their honest convictions.

Rep. Lloyd Beetsen of McAllen offers some pointers about writing your congressman, views which undoubtedly are shared by the rest of his Texas colleagues.

The "do's" include these points:

1. Give concise reasons for your position. Every congressman appreciates first-hand information from people who know what they're talking about.
2. Keep letters as short as possible. Considering some 100 to 1,000 letters a day may pour into an office, a congressman hasn't time to wade through a long drawn-out letter.
3. Give specific name or number of the bill in which you are interested. Some 10,000 assorted bills are introduced in the two-year period of each Congress.

On the other side are:

1. Don't send a form letter or quote someone else's letter. The congressman wants your own thoughts on legislation.
2. Don't ask the congressman to take a stand on a specific bill until the committee in charge of the legislation has had a chance to hear the evidence and dig out all the facts, pro and con.
3. Don't tell the congressman how influential you are in his home district.

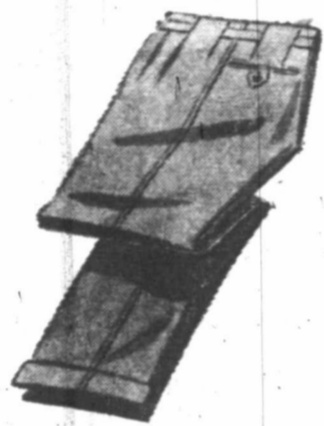

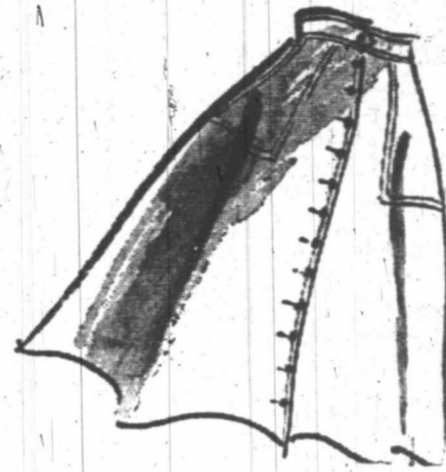

### Association Assures Fans Of Top Show

Rodeo fans are assured of a quality show—one that is tough and rugged—when the event is approved by one of the five major associations in the business of accrediting rodeo performances.

The 18th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo has been approved by the Rodeo Cowboys Association.

Other organizations giving approval to rodeo shows are the Cowboy Association of America; the Northwest Cowboys Association; the International Cowboy Association; and the Girls Rodeo Association.

The Rodeo Cowboys' Association is an organization of rodeo contestants banded together for the purpose of safeguarding the interests of member contestants and to endeavor to make all attractions billed as rodeos competitive for cash prizes and to eliminate wild west exhibitions billed as competitive rodeos and to pass upon the amount of prize money to be awarded at the various rodeos and to pass upon the qualifications of the judges.

Also, to compile and enforce rules governing the work and conduct of the contestants.

The association awards seasonal championship titles, cash prizes and trophies in their own point award system. Results of this Midland Rodeo are included in the points the professional contestants compile during the year to determine the champion of the nation.

The Buckaroo is the official organ of the association and is published monthly.

### Cowboy Is Man With Horse And Intestinal Fortitude

"Well sir, a cowboy is a man with guts and a horse."

This answer was given by a grizzled old veteran of the cow country to an eastern dude who had asked him to define a cowboy.

The grizzled old cowboy could have gone on to say that every cowboy's first love is his horse, closely followed by his saddle, his boots and his hat.

He might have added that a cowboy's deep love and admiration for the four-footed animal is mingled with a desire to prove his supremacy. This is especially true when it comes to breaking horses.

The grizzled old veteran remembered the intelligent rodeo type buckers whose display of vanity and invention are practically unlimited. Their sole intent is to unseat the rider with sudden lunges of a shoulder or hip, miraculous

convulsions of the spine, jumps rearward or sideways, all for the purpose of dividing rodeo performers into two classes—those who stay on—and those who don't.

Spitting on the ground, the old cowpoke may have confided that fate was liberal in dealing out two arms to cowboys the same as to any other hombre but the judges and the men who make the rules proved not quite so liberal. They limit the waddy to using only one arm to stay in the middle of his bronc.

Yep, wonder if that Eastern dude ever heard of an outlaw horse. According to the old timer, they put their heads between their legs, arch their backs and raise all four feet for sensational jumping. Besides being a natural buckner, they have developed an inner hatred at the sight of man.

Midland Rodeo provides the best, and the cowboy contestants have the utmost faith and confidence in Aldredge and Tyson, both of whom are Midland ranchers.

### Midland Rodeo Grounds Among Best In Nation

Under the roof and out in the open under the stars, Midland Fair's all-steel rodeo plant, scene of the 18th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo, seats 5,500 spectators.

The huge plant was erected in 1935 at a cost of \$50,000 (try and replace it for that figure). Experts consider the Midland facility one of the best in the nation. It is one of the few all-steel structures.

The grounds total 100 acres and on this plot are the race track, rodeo arena, steel grandstand, judges stand, stock pens, paddock, and several other buildings. The arena is steel strand enclosed.

The comfortable grandstand seats 5,500 persons, 2,500 of them under the giant roof. All seats offer excellent views of the exciting events going on out in the arena.

### Six Cowboy Events Featured At Each Rodeo Performance

Six thrilling and chilling cowboy events—bronc riding, calf roping, bull riding, steer wrestling, bareback bronc riding and wild cow milking—will be featured at each of the five night performances at the 18th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo.

In these events, top cowhands of the world are pitted against rough and tough stock which commands the performer's best.

The specialty acts by professional performers are good, too, attracting plenty of interest and applause, but it is the cowboy event which really pleases the spectator.

Americans, and West Texans in particular, love a contest. They like to see the skill and nerve of the cowboy as he tackles an ornery animal.

That's why Midland Rodeo is recognized as the big annual entertainment event of the Permian Basin Empire.

### Rope Once Was Weapon Of War

Sorry to discredit any belief you may have in the matter, but the art of lassooing didn't originate in the Wild West.

The rope was used as a weapon of war, according to Herodotus (500 B. C.).

He wrote: "The Sargartians used lassoes made of thongs, plaited together, and trust in these wherever they go to war. When they meet their enemy, they straightway discharge the ropes, which end in a noose. Then whatever the noose encircles, be it man or be it beast, they drag it toward them, and the foe entangled in the coils is forthwith slain."

# Annual Rodeo Sponsored By Association

Midland Fair, Inc., one of the most successful and best-known organizations of its kind in the Southwest, is the sponsor of the 18th Annual World Championship Midland Rodeo, which opens a five-night engagement here Wednesday.

Organized as a non-profit association to sponsor and produce rodeos, ropings, horse races, stock shows, fairs and other typical West Texas entertainments and events, Midland Fair, Inc. has met with remarkable success, and several other fair associations have been patterned after the one here.

Midland Fair, Inc. also is unique in that it never has lost money on a single event sponsored by the association. Officials attribute this notable fact to the fine support extended the organizations by the loyal citizens of Midland and the territory it serves. All profits are used for improvements, maintenance and repair of equipment and facilities at Midland Fair Park.

It was back in 1935 that interested citizens—ranchers, oil men and merchants—gathered in the office of the Midland Chamber of Commerce at the call of the late Dr. W. E. Ryan, then president of the C. of C., to consider the organization of an association to sponsor and stage special events and celebrations in this fast-growing oil and livestock capital of the Permian Basin Empire.

**Mission Accomplished.** Determined to get the job done that very day, those attending the historic session accomplished their mission, and thus Midland Fair, Inc., was brought into being. The first rodeo was held that fall.

Foy Proctor, well-known Midland rancher, was elected the first president of the fair association, serving in that capacity through 1937.

The late Clarence Schaefer, Sr., one of Midland's and West Texas' greatest, and most enthusiastic boosters, was president from 1938 to 1943. He was succeeded by Roy Parks, another prominent rancher, who headed the association through (Continued On Page Four)

## Germans Killed By Dud Bombs

FRANKFURT, GERMANY—(P)—Bombs and shells from the last World War are still killing people in Germany. Rubble left by Allied air raids still hides many dud bombs.

Ten major explosions of wartime bombs or munitions within the last three years have killed 27 and wounded 21 persons. A recent U. S. Army report said its bomb disposal squads had disarmed some 1,400 items of unexploded ammunition during the first three months of this year. In the second half of last year, 122,000 duds were recovered.

For many years to come, peacetime Germany will be fighting bombs.

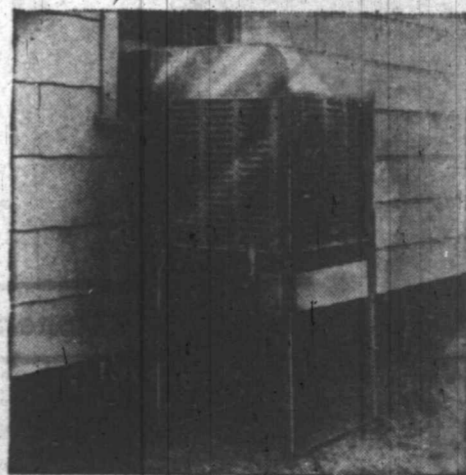

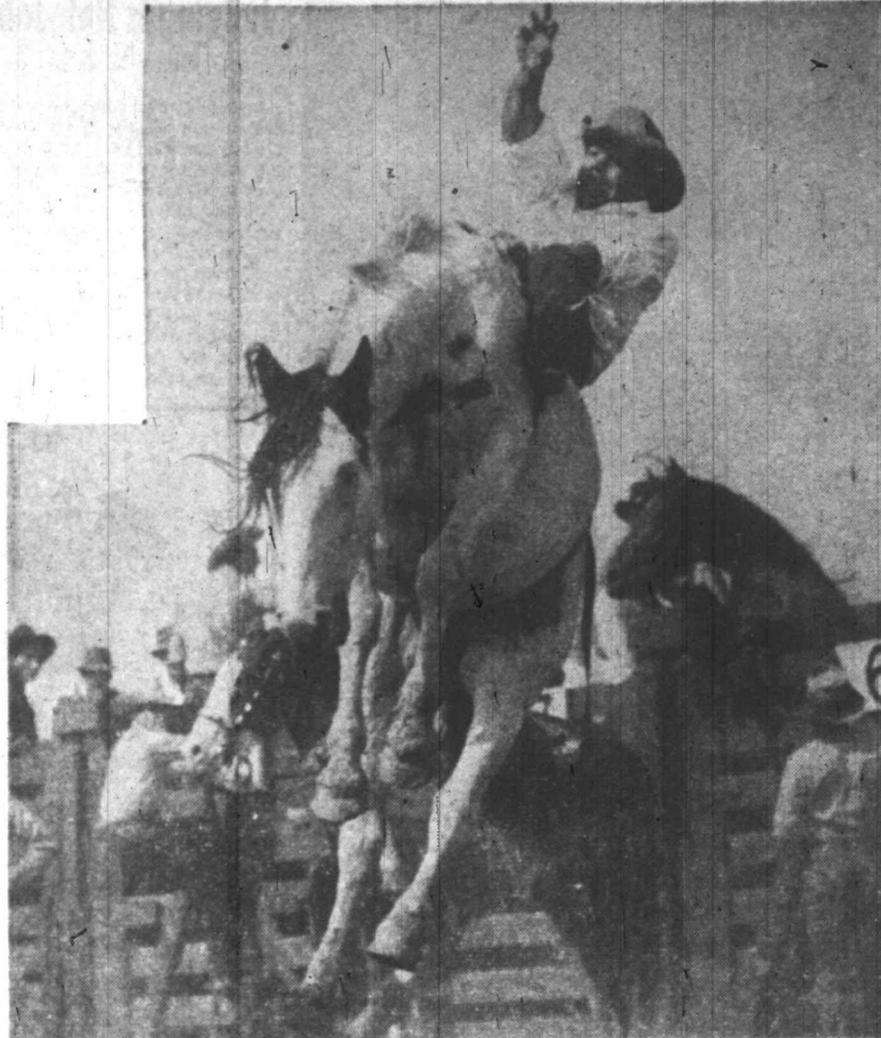

**Cowboy Painter's Works Are Hung In College Center**

Four oil paintings by H. O. Kelly, Texas' cowboy painter from Blanket, now adorn the walls of the Memorial Student Center at A&M College.

The paintings, depicting scenes of the Brush Country of South Texas, were given to the college by the Ford Motor Company, who purchased them from Kelly for publication in an issue of the Lincoln-Mercury Times. They illustrated an article in the trade magazine by another famous Texan, J. Frank Dobie, on the Brush Country.

Kelly, a gray-haired little man with bow-legs and a weather-beaten face, still looks more like a cowhand than an accomplished artist, a role he has attained since taking up the

brush at the age of 64. But the two vocations he has followed during his 67 years are clearly linked in his paintings.

**Keen Memory**  
Only a man who has seen and closely observed life in the range country could paint as Kelly paints. He draws on his own memory for the scenes he paints, and the complete detail of his paintings testify to the keenness of his memory.

The college, interested in obtaining "genuine Texas art by Texas artists" to hang in the picturesque building which is a memorial to the institution's war dead, obtained the Kelly paintings through the efforts of R. Henderson, and Carl Sewell, Lincoln-Mercury dealer of Dallas.

They were presented to the college by W. D. Woods of Houston, district sales manager for the Lincoln-Mercury division of the Ford Motor Company.

Dr. M. T. Harrington, A&M president, accepted the paintings from Woods, then turned to Kelly to thank him for painting such "lovely pictures of Texas."

Replied the bronzed little man, with a twinkle in his eye, "Brother, how could I help it!"

There is one rodeo event that never fails to thrill year after year. It is Brahman bull riding. It's the most spine-tingling performance on the rodeo bill of fare.

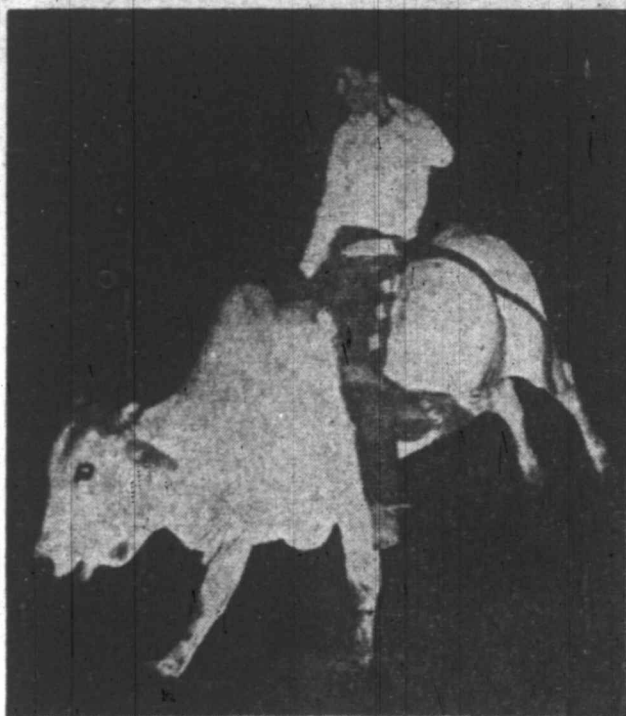
**TV FOR THAILAND**

Certainly, Brahman bull riding is one event where the rider's on his own in trying to stay on an onery critter that will throw the book at him in ridding itself a hated mortal man.  
A loose rope around the bull's shoulders, just behind the hump, with a clanging cowbell attached, is the only equipment allowed the bull rider.  
Contestants must ride with one hand on the rope and the other in the air, and riding must be done with a loose rope.  
It's a rough and rugged sport and only the hardy and brave attempt it. Few can survive the ride of the wildest and meanest of rodeo animals.

# Judging Is Not Job For Amateur

Rodeo judging is no job for an amateur.  
Usually former rodeo contestants, they are familiar with all the "angles" taking place in the fast-moving arena show—and they rate the contestants severely.  
Judges are stationed at various vantage points in the arena, an arrangement that provides a keen-eyed view of every angle of performing by the contestants. They judge by both the point system and the time system.  
From the time a wildly-bucking bronc jet-propels itself out of a chute the rider and his bronc are watched closely by the judges until the ride is ended. It may end with the rider left hard-fast to the dirt and glowering at a victorious bronc, or the rider may be whisked to a pick-up horse when the time-horn blows.  
When a calf rushes out of a gate with a horse-borne roper fast in pursuit the judges tensely await the result. The roper's task, with the aid of a trained roping horse, is to rope, throw and tie the fighting calf as quickly as he can. Three legs have to be secured and every split-second counts.  
When a judge's flag is waved in a circle over his head, the timers click their stop-watches.  
For every dollar won by a contestant at one of the events, a point is added to his season score. The point system applies to bronc and steer riding and the time system is applied to all other main events.  
And because the judges know the rodeo sport inside out, their decisions are rarely questioned by the contestants.  
Playing cards are believed to have come from Asia, but some authorities believe that the Egyptians invented them.

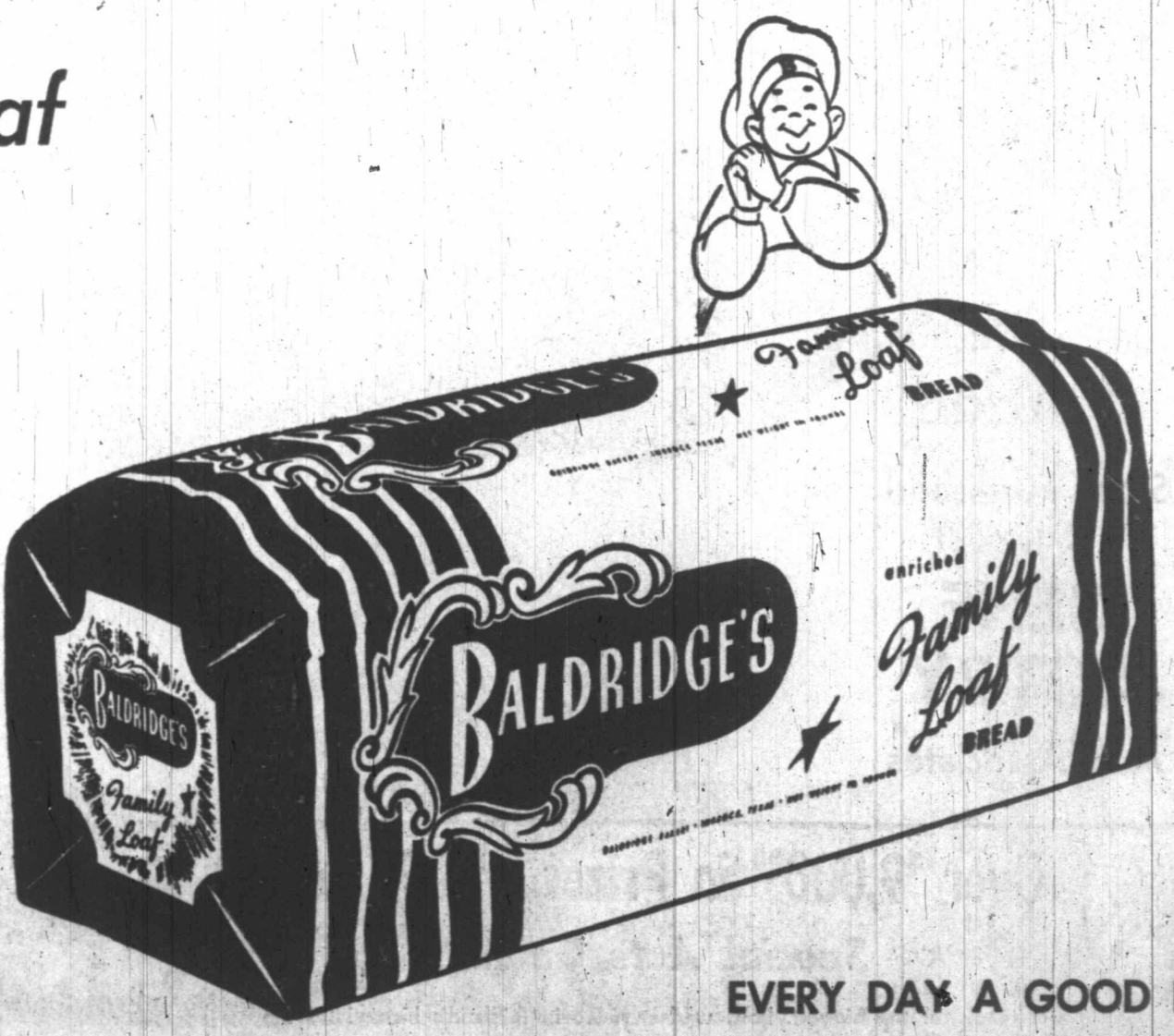

the war years and until 1945. Leonard Proctor, Midland rancher, held the president's office during 1946 and 1947. George W. Glass, rancher and registered Hereford breeder, was president in 1948 and 1949. Clarence Scharbauer, Jr., served as president in 1950 and 1951. Marion Flynt, who now heads the association, was elected early this year. John Dublin, Jr., is vice president. Three Secretaries  
The late Homer Rowe was the first secretary-treasurer of the association, serving one year in that capacity. J. Homer Epley took over as secretary-treasurer in 1936, serving continuously in that important position until last year when illness forced his retirement. Louis A. Bartha was appointed secretary-treasurer of the association at that time.  
Midland Fair, Inc., has more than 150 stockholders.  
The affairs of the association are administered by a Board of Directors, including James N. Allison, T. Paul Barrop, John P. Butler, Buster Cole, Courtney Cowden, Frank Cowden, J. P. (Bum) Gibbins, John B. Mills, Tom Nance, John Nobles, Jr., A. P. Scharbauer, Fred Turner, Jr., and Jack Wicker.  
The living past presidents — Fay Proctor, Parks, Leonard Proctor, George Glass and Scharbauer—and J. E. (Bob) Hill and Epley are honorary vice presidents.  
The all-steel arena and grandstand at the fair plant on East Highway 80 are the largest and best in the Southwest. The huge stand will seat 5,500 persons. The plant has been copied by several other Southwestern cities.  
The first rodeo and stock show was staged by Midland Fair, Inc., in the Fall of 1935. The Labor Day, date then was adopted, and three-day rodeos, ending on Labor Day, were staged from 1936 to 1941, when the war halted temporarily such celebrations.  
**Calf Roping Events**  
The annual one-day calf roping contests were started Labor Day, 1942, with the 1942, 1943 and 1944 events being planned and staged primarily for the entertainment of the soldiers stationed at Midland Army Air Field.  
The early Summer rodeos started in 1944, and since have been staged the first week in June each year.  
Race meets were held at the fair grounds until pari-mutuel betting in Texas was outlawed.  
Rodeos long have been popular in Midland, the first cowboy carnival and rodeo having been staged here in the 1860's. They have been presented off and on—mostly on—since that time.  
**Belongs To Residents**  
Officials stress the fact that Midland Fair, Inc., and Midland Rodeos belong to the residents of Midland and of the Midland area, and they say the support given by citizens of the vast territory largely has been responsible for the remarkable success and growth of the association and of Midland Rodeo.  
The 1952 World Championship Midland Rodeo, fair officials say will be by far the biggest, best and most colorful ever staged in the long history of Midland Rodeos. The eighteenth annual celebration opens Wednesday and continues through next Sunday night.

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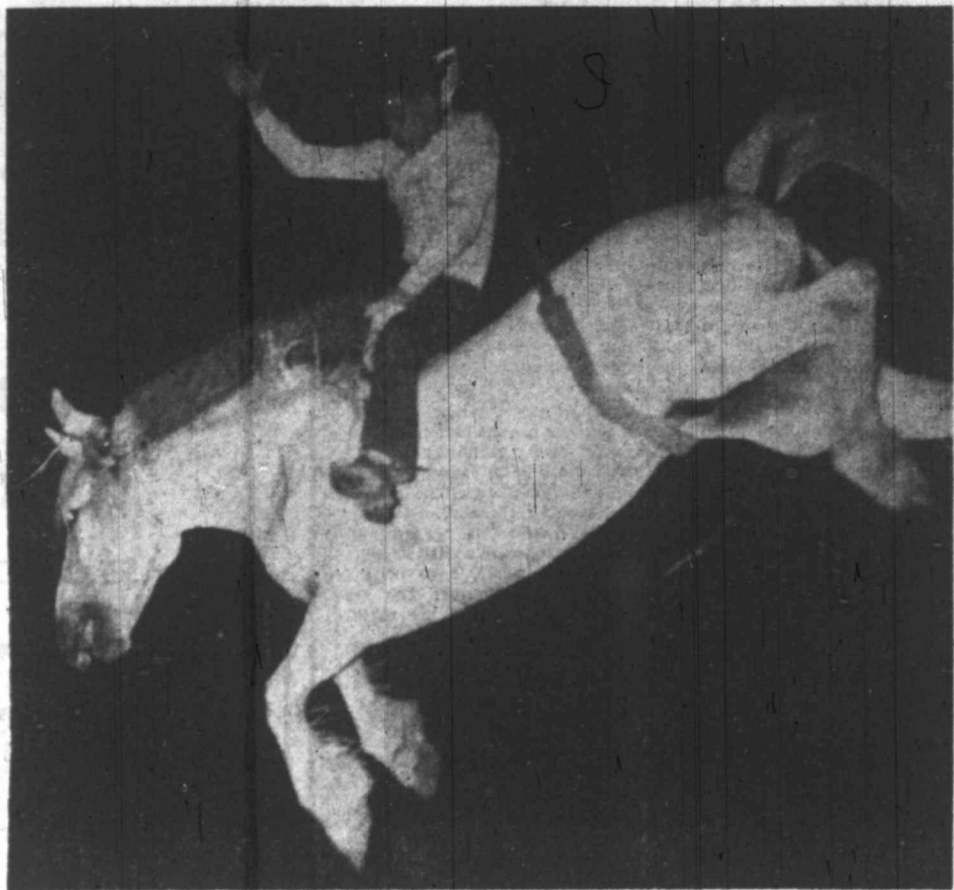

### Steer Roping, Now Banned, Once Very Popular Event

A tough event, hard on the horse and cowboy but harder on the steer himself as he faced the likelihood of a broken leg or neck, was the vanished event from area rodeo arenas of flipping a 1,000 pound steer into the air with a piece of rope and a fine roping horse.

While the steer-roping event is no longer included in the program of the 18th Midland World Championship Rodeo, the programs of the 1910, 1911 and 1912 rodeos featured the steer-roping events and some of the current rules were interesting.

Now, the secret of steer roping was to loop the animal, trip him with the rope and get those legs tied before the animal should scramble to his feet. For once the big steer scrambled to his feet, the cowboy had little chance of pulling him over as he does a calf.

So the cowboy, giving up, would just throw up his hands and would be given the elapsed time plus one minute.

If the steer had been tied, the

judges were required to strike the animal over the head and horns until he made at least one attempt to get up. They were required to see that three feet of the steer were properly crossed and tied sufficiently to guarantee to hold for five minutes. If any person objected the steer was left tied in the arena for the full five minutes.

In those days there was a designated "judge box" and the judges were not allowed to render the decision until they had returned to that spot. If there were no protests, they then would announce their decisions.

In the championship matches, each roper was given three steers and the 15 men with the best averages were given an additional pair of steers. The five-steer average decided the championship.

In those days, too, the roper was informed when time started running by the firing of a pistol shot.

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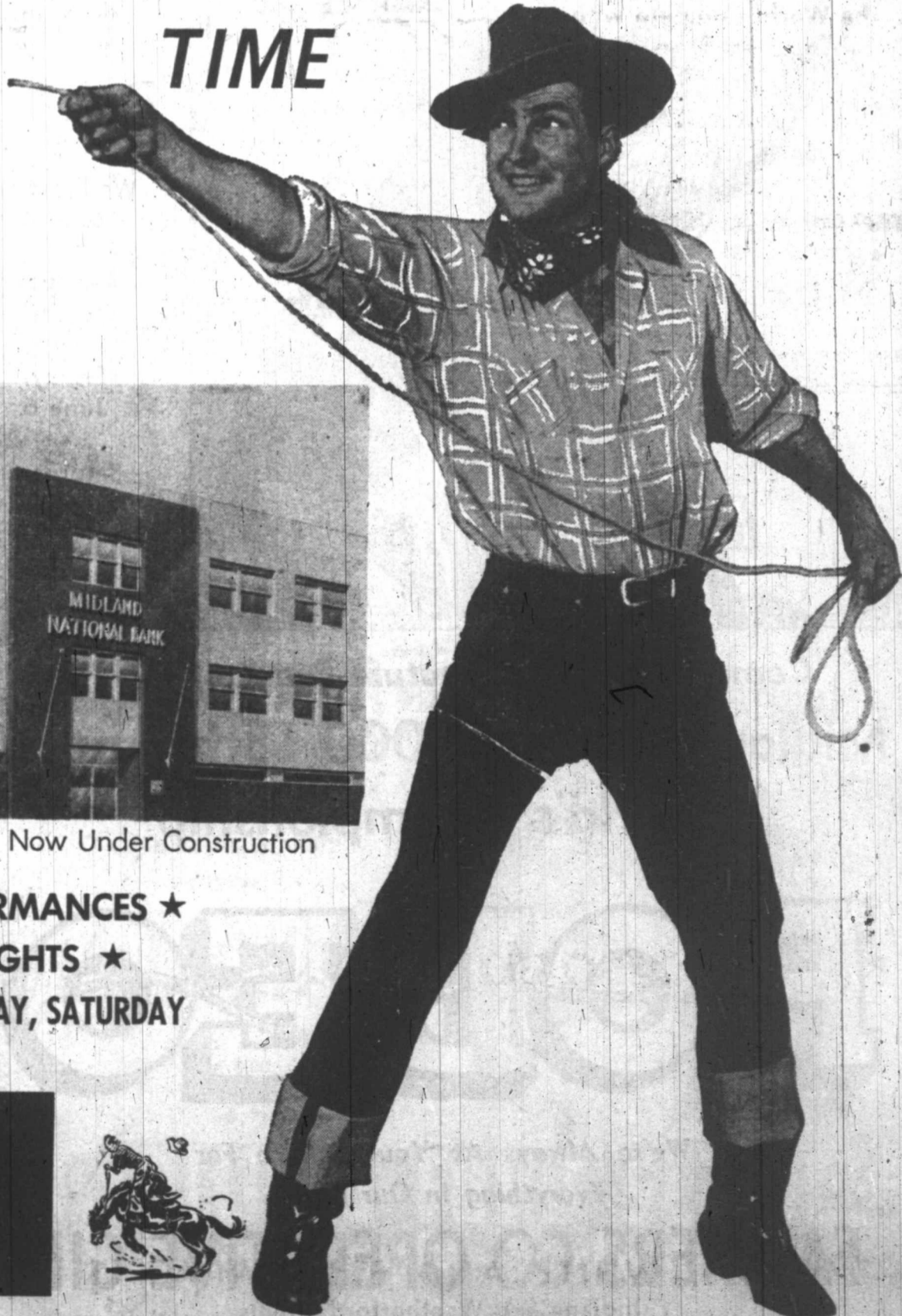


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## Calf Roping Is One Of Top Attractions To Spectators

One of the most highly competitive events with rodeo spectators is the calf roping event.

As the entry fees in the contest usually are the highest in the rodeo, there is real money at stake.

The cowboy's entire outlook in this contest is almost opposite to that of bronc riding. Here he works keenly with his horse instead of trying to prove his mastery over the animal. Many long and patient hours have been spent training the horse in his part of the contest. And the cowboy's chances depend as much on the horse's performance as the rider's. The cowboy and the horse form a kind of partnership based on a typically Western sense of loyalty.

He admires and respects his horse for his intelligence and the part he

plays in the stiff competition. To quote a well-known West Texan: "The cowpuncher is without polish but under a rugged and rough exterior beats a big heart and lives a courageous and generous soul. He is honest because nature, with which he is most closely associated, never misled him or told him a lie."

He is loyal because his existence and happiness depend upon loyalty. One of his first and foremost loyalties is to his horse. Here in the calf roping contest, the cowboy has a chance to show off with pride his well loved and trained horse.

### Trail Owns Horses

Practically all calf ropers trail their own horses from show to show. When a contestant is not fortunate enough to have his own horse the cooperative spirit of the

West is seen again. Those with well trained horses let other riders use them. Custom has built up and the rider pays the owner one-fourth of any prize money he may win, but pays nothing if he fails to win.

If there ever has been a doubt in any tenderfoot's mind as to whether a horse is an animal to be guided or an animal with his own judgment, this contest should dispel those thoughts. For as much depends upon horse as rider and if the horse fails to do his part, the rider is at a loss. A well-trained roping horse is the pride and joy of every cowboy.

The contest begins when the calf crosses the starting line in front of the chute. Horse and rider are keyed to a terrific pitch as they await

the calf. If the horse jumps too soon, the rider is fined 10 seconds. The horse that stays right on the zig-sagging calf's heels gives his rider the best advantage. When the noose lands over the calf's neck the rider begins to dismount before his horse can stop. The rope tightens and the intelligent, well-trained horse keeps the rope taut without dragging the calf.

As the cowboy runs down the rope, he must let the calf get to its feet if it has fallen and throw it by hand. He securely ties three legs and raises his hands to signify that he is through. If the calf gets up or falls to remain tied until the judges signal its release, contestant is disqualified.

If the horse drags the calf, the rider is penalized 20 seconds. The rider has two chances to rope his calf and if he is competing for the grand prize he will be disqualified in all events if he fails to make an honest effort with his second loop after he has missed with his first. If he misses with both he retires from the arena with "no time."

## Miners Operate Their Own Mine

ELDORADO, ILL.—(P)—A brave bunch of miners dug deep for \$10,000 to run an abandoned Southern Illinois coal pit themselves.

Dering Mine—the bread and butter of Eldorado area mine families for 34 years—was closed last fall. The owner said he was losing money and sold the mine for junk.

Eldorado diggers figured there was enough coal for 20 years. One hundred miners chipped in \$100 apiece. Eldorado supporters matched that as a loan and the Eldorado Coal Corporation was formed. Miners pay the salvage firm a royalty on coal mined.

Their working president is Isaac Unthank who was injured in a mine accident and had to hobble around on crutches. All five directors are working miners.

Rudy Walker, a check-weighman, explained why he likes the setup: "We've got three bosses compared with 14 before. Overhead has been cut to the bone. We lack only 400 tons of coal a day of getting out as much as the former owner hoisted with 300 men." The cooperative now produces 900 tons of coal each day it operates.

## Midland Rodeo Grounds Among Best In Nation

Under the roof and out in the open, the all-steel rodeo plant, scene of the Midland World Championship Rodeo, seats 5,500 spectators. At a cost of \$80,000, the plant was erected in 1935, primarily for racing. Some of these events have been held here.

Experts consider the Midland facility one of the best in the nation and it is one of a few all-steel structures.

The grounds total 100 acres and on this plot are the race track, rodeo arena, steel grandstand, judges stand, stock pens, paddock and several other buildings. The arena is steel-strand enclosed.

The comfortable grandstand—with the afternoon sun to its back—seats 5,500 people, 2,500 of them under the giant roof. The seats offer a good view of the exciting events in the arena out front.

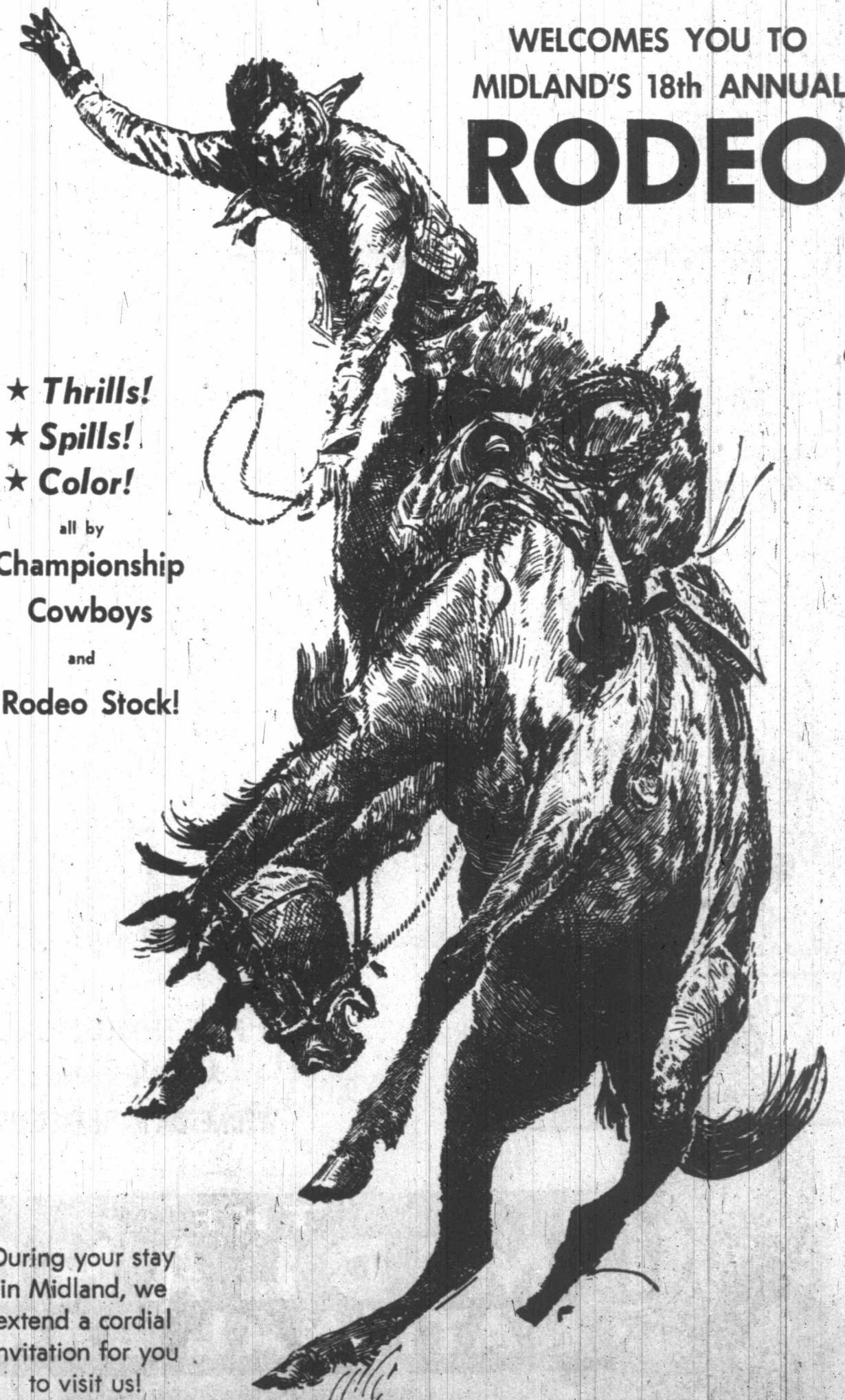

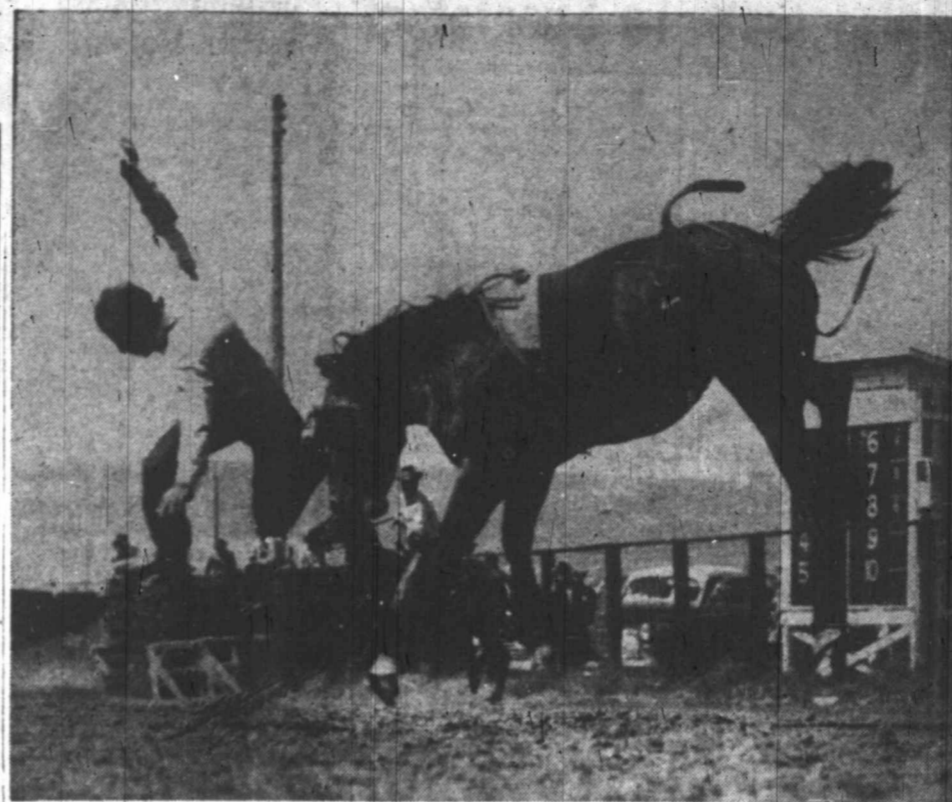

### Coordination, Teamwork Exemplified In Cutting Horse Contest At Rodeo

A pageant of perfect coordination and teamwork is to be found in the cutting horse contest at a rodeo.

Presenting a colorful picture of range work, the stock horses get their big chance to show the fans they can perform equally as well in the arena as on the range.

Staged under the rules of the National Cutting Horse Association, this contest will be one of the best attractions at the Midland World Championship Rodeo.

Here is an event in which the horse must do the thinking.

The contestant starts the act by separating one animal from a herd of cattle and then for the most part leaves it up to the horse to prevent the animal from getting back to the herd.

So the horse has to rely on his "horse sense."

These are the contest rules, as established by the Cutting Horse Association:

1. A horse should have some credit for his ability to enter a herd of cattle and bring out one without too much disturbance to the herd or to the one brought out. If he creates unnecessary disturbance, a penalty is assessed.

2. When an animal is cut from a herd it should be driven toward the men holding the herd, or the hazers. If it goes down the arena fence, it is all right, but the horse should never get ahead of the animal in order to get more play—wait for the hazers to turn it back toward

him.

3. If a horse runs into or scatters the herd while trying to head an animal, he should be penalized.

4. If the horse turns the wrong way with tail toward the animal, he should be disqualified for that go-round without any score.

5. A horse should be penalized each time he has to be reined to the right or left. If he has to be reined several times during a performance, he should be penalized each time. On a light rein, a small penalty may be enough. When a horse has to be picked up hard with a rein, a heavier penalty should be assessed against him.

6. For riding with a tight rein throughout a performance, a penalty should be given: for part time during a performance, less penalty.

7. If a horse allows an animal to return to a herd he may be penalized. If one gets back that is almost impossible to head, he should be penalized very little.

8. When a horse heads an animal and goes on past, as much as a length, he should be assessed a heavier penalty.

### Bucking Horses Important To Success Of Any Rodeo

Success of a rodeo depends just as much on the bucking horses as it does on the riders who try to win their money staying with them.

While the rider who stays astride one of these weaving leaping, sun-fishing animals sees the arena and spectators in almost every angle of topsy-turviness, he's concentrating on the next possible move of his bronc and awaiting the eight-second horn.

The horse has the advantage in that no rules govern his efforts to throw the rider. He can use all four legs and a million muscles. He can double himself up in tortuous contortions, hit the ground with a jarring stroke and even climb the arena fence if he's a mind to. Anything goes, so far as the judges are concerned, in the horse's efforts to win over the rider.

In bareback riding the rider has only a surcingle to hold to and he

can use only one hand for this. His other hand fans the air much like an artist on a high wire in a high wind. From the first jump out of the chute the rider "works" the shoulders of the mount with his spurs.

The spectators usually remain tense until the rider has been safely picked from the wild horse from beginning to end.

Bareback bronc riding goes back to early-day Indians who had no other equipment except a woven halter to ride the horses they captured.

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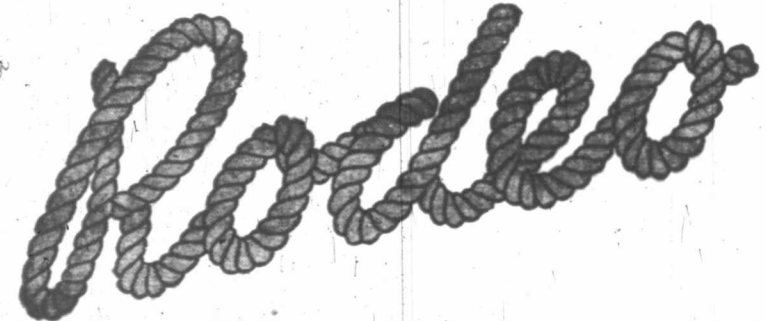

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### Butterfly Flights Will Be Traced

NEW YORK—(AP)—Butterflies as well as birds are flying north this Spring as usual, and scientists are going to do something about it. The big orange and black butterflies known as Monarchs make regular north and south migrations. Natural History Magazine reports that many have been made to trace their movements. Now experts at the Royal Ontario Museum in Toronto have figured out how to mark them by punching a hole in one of their wings and affixing a tiny white label carrying an identification number and reading: Return to the Museum of Toronto, Canada. By noting the times and places where the labels are affixed, and the times and places from which returns are made, the scientists hope to learn much about the flights. The aid of the amateur entomologist is being sought.

Other reasons are his liberal use of chewing tobacco and eating what he pleases. Lucius was the slave of a doctor in Augusta, Ga., until the Civil War freed him. Until three years ago, Lucius planted and tended a watermelon patch each summer. Since then, he contented himself with chopping wood and tending the fires in the home of the people he lives with. He thinks he is 116 but county welfare officials say he is only 110 or 111.

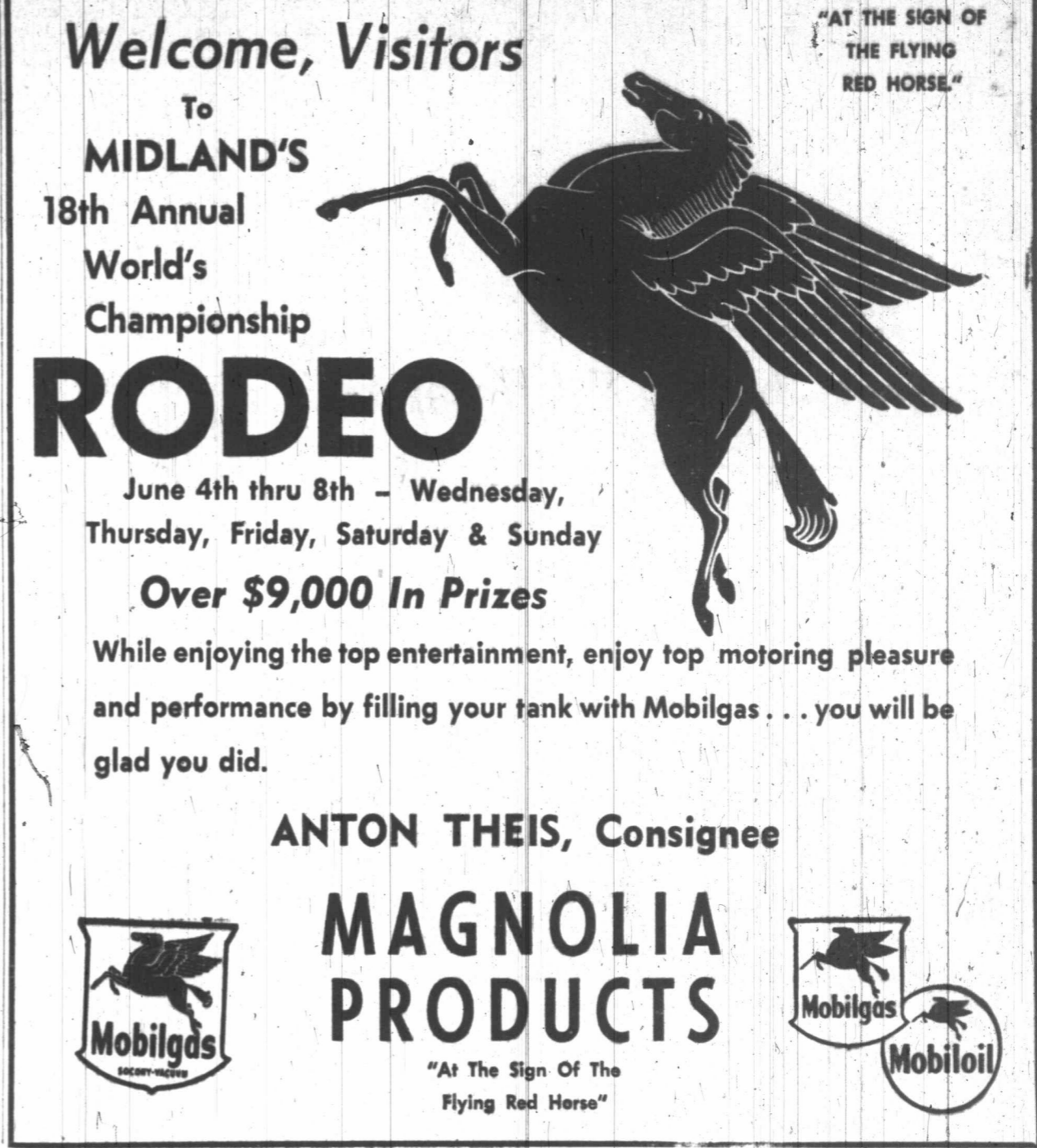

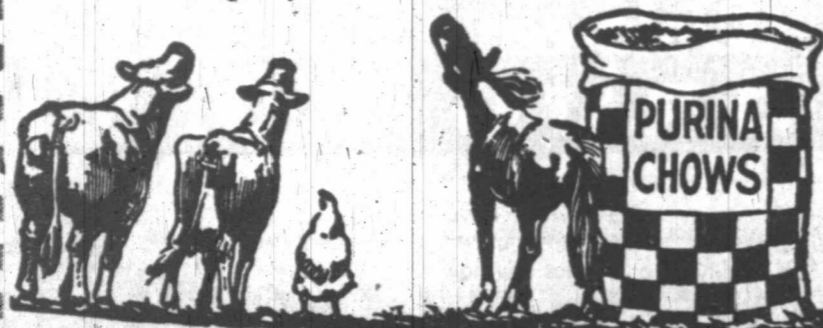

## Stockmen's Utopia Describes Midland Ranges Back In '02

Midland ranges were a stockman's paradise in 1902, according to an old newspaper, *The Midland Livestock Reporter*. The *Livestock Reporter* was a special edition devoted to boosting Midland. "Queen City of the Plains, the Stockmen's Utopia," C. C. Watson was editor. Here are excerpts about the leading stockmen:

"Midland can boast of the most famous herd of registered cattle in Texas. It is the Lone Star herd of Herefords, owned by the Scharbauer Brothers. The herd is kept six miles southeast of town. Since the herd was started, the Scharbauers have sold thousands of bulls to ranchmen all over the western ranges.

"Some ranchers have been steady customers. Among them is Dock Cowden who states that he does not have a range bull that does not wear a cross, which is the brand of the Lone Star herd."

"Elliott & Woolridge are breeders of registered Galloway and Polled Angus cattle. Their ranch is lo-

ated but a few miles northeast of Midland. The cattle is select."

"But few breeders of graded Herefords have been more successful than Mr. W. K. Curtis. His ranch is located 20 miles north of Midland. Each year his steer calves have averaged along with the best on the market."

"The Gardner is well known. His ranch is located about 20 miles north of Midland and he has one of the prettiest herd of shorthorns in the country. He uses registered bulls."

"T. Scharbauer, brother of Chris and John, is a prominent fine-stock breeder. His Crowley Ranch is located six miles northeast of Midland. In the Spring, he will have 225 head of young bulls for sale."

"O. W. Wolcott, whose ranch is located 25 miles northeast of Midland, has one of the smoothest herds of shorthorn and Hereford cattle on this range. This year, everything he sold topped the markets at St. Louis and Chicago. The Lazy K Herd — with that

magnificent bull, Hesiod 30th, the Scharbauer & Aycock partnership is one of the leading breeding firms of the Midland country. A registered Hereford herd is located two miles north of Midland, where they have 12 sections of best in general ranching land. The grade herd of the Lazy K, however, is located 16 miles west of town."

"The late S. E. Townsend was as well known throughout all West Texas as any stockman. He was a lover of pure blood stock. Every range bull was graded."

"A. I. Boyd, ranching 40 miles northwest of Midland, is one of the black mulley enthusiasts of the range. He started his herd with a good grade of Durham and has added nothing but the best. He is a young rancher with a smooth herd."

"Among our popular young breeders is H. O. Purcell, who has a ranch 10 or 12 miles south of Midland. Purcell breeds high-grade Herefords and Durham cattle. His bulls are bought at fancy prices."

"Estes & Watts claim the distinction of having paid the highest price for a herd bull that was ever brought to this vicinity. The foundation for their herd was laid in 1897. They purchased fine stock from H. McClintic, one of the pioneer breeders. Estes & Watts are in the front ranks of breeders in this section."

"Our county judge, L. M. Murphy, is another of our black mulley enthusiasts and has his herd on an eight-section spread, two and one-half miles east of Midland."

McClintic, Pioneer

"H. McClintic was the first, or one of the first, stockmen in this part of country to introduce registered and high-grade cattle. His ranch is located just a few miles south of

Midland. He is principally a Hereford breeder."

"G. L. Davis is one of Midland's young breeders of pure blooded stock. His ranch is located 10 miles south of town. He will display some of his stock at the stockman's convention in El Paso. He has Durham and Herefords. His bull calves found ready sale at \$25 around."

"Mrs. J. M. Riggs is quite often spoken of as the Cattle Queen of the Midland range. Her ranch is 15 miles west of Midland and five miles east of Odessa. She has one of the finest of beef cattle herds and is partial to Herefords. She has

one of the better-improved ranches. Her nephew, S. R. McKinney, is ranch manager."

"T. W. Lanier & Brothers ranch is located seven miles south of Midland. For Spring delivery, they will have for sale 2,300 two-year-old steers, 400 yearling steers and spayed heifers, and about 300 spayed heifers, coming two's."

"Twenty-five miles south of Midland, Garrett & Crowley have one of the best herds of registered shorthorn cattle in the country. The top herd bull is Hobson."

"O. B. Holt's ranch is located 25 miles north of Midland in Martin

County. There he owns 45,000 acres of improved grazing land, which he keeps more than 2,400 head of stock cattle. Dominating are whitefaces. Holt never has spared expense in breeding cattle. His specialty is a high grade of beef stuff. He tops the markets."

## Thumb-Nails Of Events

Here are thumb-nail sketches of the main contest events at the Midland World's Championship Rodeo, with general purposes and regulations listed:

**SADDLE BRONC RIDING**  
Bucking horses are to be ridden only with association saddles. Ordinary halter with but one rein is allowed. It must be only by hand on same side of horse's neck. This rein is either three or four strands of grass or cotton rope, braided and is not more than one inch in diameter. Other hand of the rider must be free at all times. Rider must begin spurring horse up on shoulders while leaving chute and continue to spur throughout the ride. Getting bucked off, changing hands on rein, wrapping rein around hand, pulling leather, blowing stirrup, touching horse or saddle with free hand or falling to spur to suit judge, disqualifies rider.

**CALF ROPING**  
The calf is turned loose and timing starts when it crosses the deadline about 10 or 15 feet in front of the chute. A small rope or sash cord, known as the barrier, is fastened up in front of the roper to the side of the calf chute and released with the drop of the flag. If the roper starts for the calf too soon and breaks the barrier, a 10-second penalty is added to his time. Each roper is allowed a second loop if he misses with his first. If the calf is jerked down when roped it must be allowed to regain its feet and be thrown by hand. With a short piece of light rope known as the little pigging string and three feet must be tied together in a manner to suit the judges.

**BULLDOGGING**  
Contestant and helper or hazer are mounted, one on each side of the chute. Timing starts when steer crosses deadline and contestant must jump from his horse to the steer, catch it by the horns, bring it to a full stop and twist it down on its side with all four feet out from under it. If steer's head is twisted one way and steer should fall the other, which is known as a dog fall, then it must be let up and twisted down again.

**BULL OR STEER RIDING**  
A loose rope is put around the animal like a big noose and held tight with a one-hand hold. A bell is fastened to the rope under the animal's belly and a rope, or flank strap used as on bareback horses. When bulls are used, spurring is not required continually throughout the ride. Rodeo clowns play important parts during this event by attracting enraged bulls from riders when dismounted or bucked off.

**BAREBACK BRONC RIDING**  
Horse is ridden with surstingle or bareback rigging or with only a loose rope around it and held with but one hand. A small rope or strap is tied around horse's flanks just snug enough to annoy it and make it buck harder. Rules are much the same as in saddle bronc riding.

Supersonic refers to a speed faster than that of sound waves, which is about 760 miles per hour in air at sea level.

### Ray Lackland's Voice Again Will Be Heard At Rodeo

The booming voice of Ray Lackland, one of the nation's better known rodeo announcers, again will be heard over the loud speakers at Midland Fair Park as he gives rodeo fans a running account of what is going on down in the arena.

It will be his third time to announce a World Championship Mid-



land Rodeo, and he likely will be in better form than ever before for his 1952 assignment.

Lackland calls Dallas his home town, but having been in the announcing business since he was a youth in New Mexico, he has traveled around a lot. He handles many of the top rodeos of the nation, and is in constant demand because of his ability to keep the shows moving rapidly while giving the audiences a concise, clear account of what is happening in the arena.

**Vivid Descriptions**

He is a show himself while at the microphone—giving forth with some of the most vivid and colorful descriptions ever heard by man.

He knows rodeo from A to Z and is an accomplished calf-roper in his own right.

Lackland was born in Carroll County, Mo., in 1911, and was reared in Lincoln County, N. M., where Billy the Kid once roamed. He announced his first rodeo at Carrizosa when he was 13.

He is a graduate of New Mexico Military Institute at Roswell.

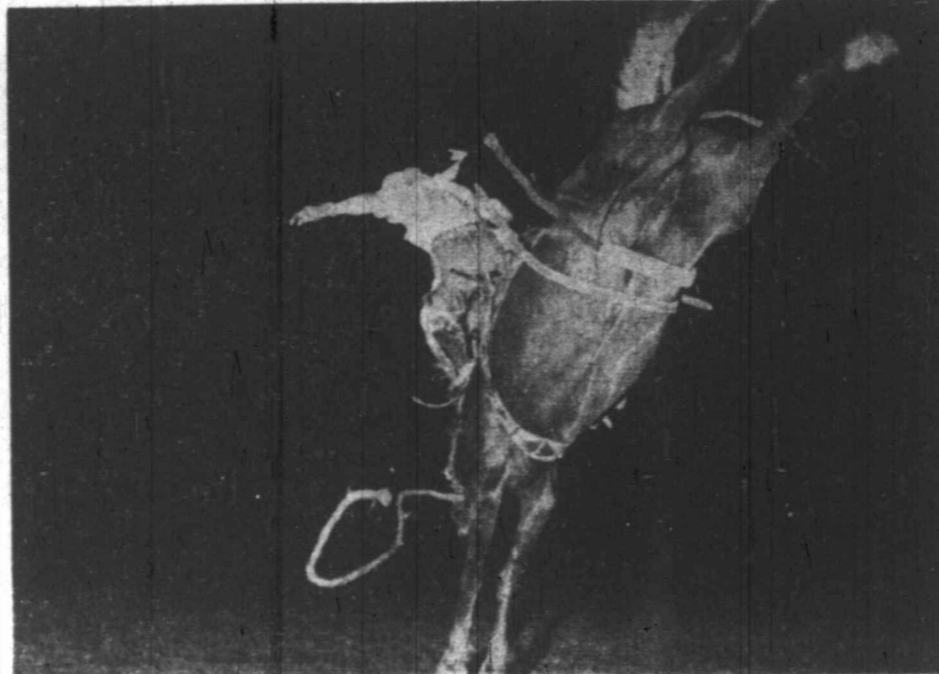

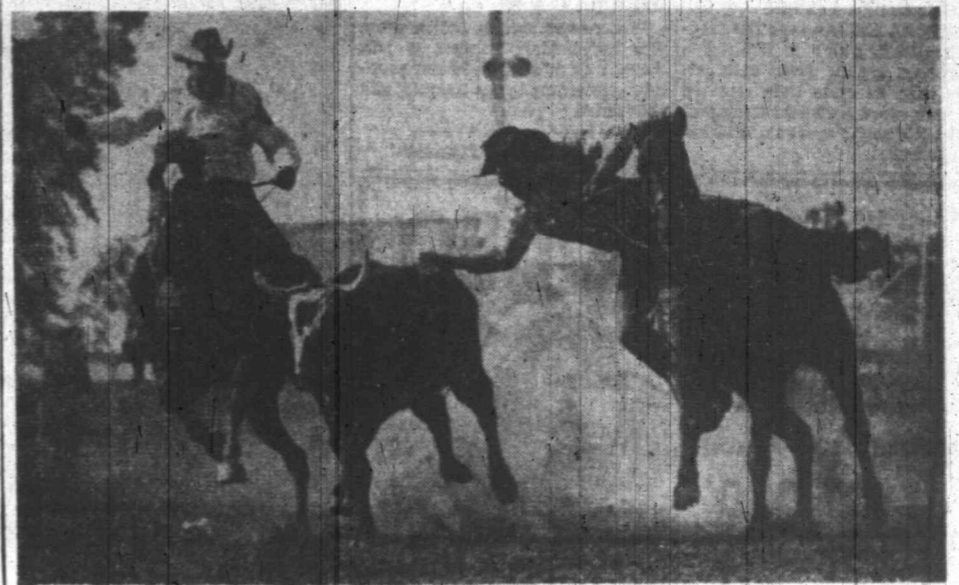

## Many Tough Buckers Have Been Seen In Rodeos Here

Many people, even some West Texans, have the idea that a good bucking horse is one that never has been handled—is wild, untamed. This is not the case, however. Most bucking horses are horses that have been at least partially broken to ride or work, but that have become spoiled and started to buck. Once a horse has bucked off a rider, he wants to do it again. This is born a bucking horse. Certainly the bucking horse knows what he is doing. He grows arena wise. Some nights he is "hell to sit." Other nights he won't buck a bit. A cowboy can make one buck by spurring hard but that still won't get the "maximum" if the horse doesn't want to buck. The bucking string is a rodeo's best asset. The buckers, individually and collectively are pretty valuable. They get a special diet, even vitamins. One of Everett Colborn's largest expense items is purchase of vitamins for the buckers. One of the most famous bucking horses ever to come to the Midland Rodeo was Home Brew, a big black hellion. He started his career during the prohibition days and the cowboys named him for that home-made stuff that really had a kick. Brew, before he was a bucker, belonged to a man at Colfax, Wash. It was impossible to work or ride Home Brew without trouble, plenty of trouble. So the owner took Brew to a rodeo to see if he would "act up."

**HOME BREW DID**  
Home Brew did and how! He became one of the greatest buckers of all times. He tossed many a good cowboy to the floor of the Midland Rodeo arena and many others. The boys up in Idaho still talk about Brew and what a demon he was. In the arena, he was an outlaw. But around the barns, he was gentle and easy to handle with a halter. Y Bar Me was another good bucker to perform at Midland. A little black horse he was, that could really dump 'em. He was about eight hands high and every inch a main spring. Y Bar Me came from the state of Washington and earned a reputation in Canada. No one knows the reason why but a great many of the famous bucking horses of all time have come from the northern sectors of the United States. Perhaps they just grow 'em big or mean up there. High Skip was still another great bucker that Midlanders got to see. He got his name from an arena maneuver of kicking high and skipping. Many buckers derive their name from peculiar habits in bucking. Some of these include: Tangle Toes, Duckin' Dolly, Roly Poly, Dodging Horse, etc., etc. There were two great buckers among the bucking stock for the 1947 Midland Rodeo. They were Alley Cop, a bald-faced boy, and Kickapoo, a big black. Tis said that Alley in the face resembled the comic strip character of the same name and was just about as salty as the man from the past.

**CANNED HEAT**  
Home Brew wasn't the only bucker associated with beverages. There was Hangover, Demon (no rum), Tequilla, Half Pint, Three Feathers, (no Four Roses), Not Much, Whiskey Gap. There was Canned Heat. And there was bootlegger. Even the size of a bucking horse's feet might give him a name such as Big Foot Charlie and Deer Foot. Want to get military about it? Buckers here carried such names as GI Joe, Ranger, P-38, West Point and Leatherneck. For shame, one bucker was named Red Star. Quite a few have been named for celebrities or persons. There were Joe Louis, P. J. McNutt, Caldwell, Jack Pine, Steve Hanningan, Ed Sikes, Harold McConnell, Cappy Lane, Sam River, and ah yes—Walter Winchell. Did we forget Chill Wills? Some of the buckers have awesome names such as Atomic Bomb, Public Enemy, Hell's Kitchen, Revolution, First, Black Eye, Black Dagger, White Ghost, Pink Eye, Typhoon McGoon, Borger Bob perhaps—Alimony. How do you like this one—Benzadrine? The female of the species often is more deadly than the male. All buckers, far from it, are not males. Count off these feminine names: Susie, Ruby, Gravel Gertie, Caroline, Mugs, Lovely Lady, Bridget, Powder Puff. Now we didn't say—War Paint, Surprise or My Weakness. Among buckers seen here have been: a Whistler, a Hired Hand, a City Slicker, a Hay Seed, a Stork, a Stamp, a Speckled Bird, a Hobo, and Old Black Joe. Not to mention a Hell Diver, a Shooting Start and a Wild Cat. Also there has been a Fox Hound, a Gray Eagle.

**INDIAN NAMES**  
On an Indian note were these buckers: Chief Tyhee, Gray Eagle, Teepee, Big Feather, Indian Skull, Indian Sign and Fire Signal. One bucker was named Vacation. That brings to mind: Singing Hills, Sun River, Welcome Creek, Snowy Mountain, Bear Park, Tall Cedars, Stone Mountain, Martin Springs and Dillon Bay, Perhaps China Town. And then there was Gold Rush and there was Jack Pot. A few for good measure include: Red Light, Lazy B, Daredevil, Hang Dog, Rusty, White Bang, Scrap Iron, Anchor, Snow Cone, Diamond T, Shell Hammer, Rim Rocker, Beg Your Pardon, Old John, Duty Bound, Angelo, Luxury, U-ALL, Top Heavy, High Pockets, Chuck Wagon, Long Special, See You, Who Cares, Butterfly, Sheep Mountain, Sage Brush, Cuddle Up, Big Creek and Double

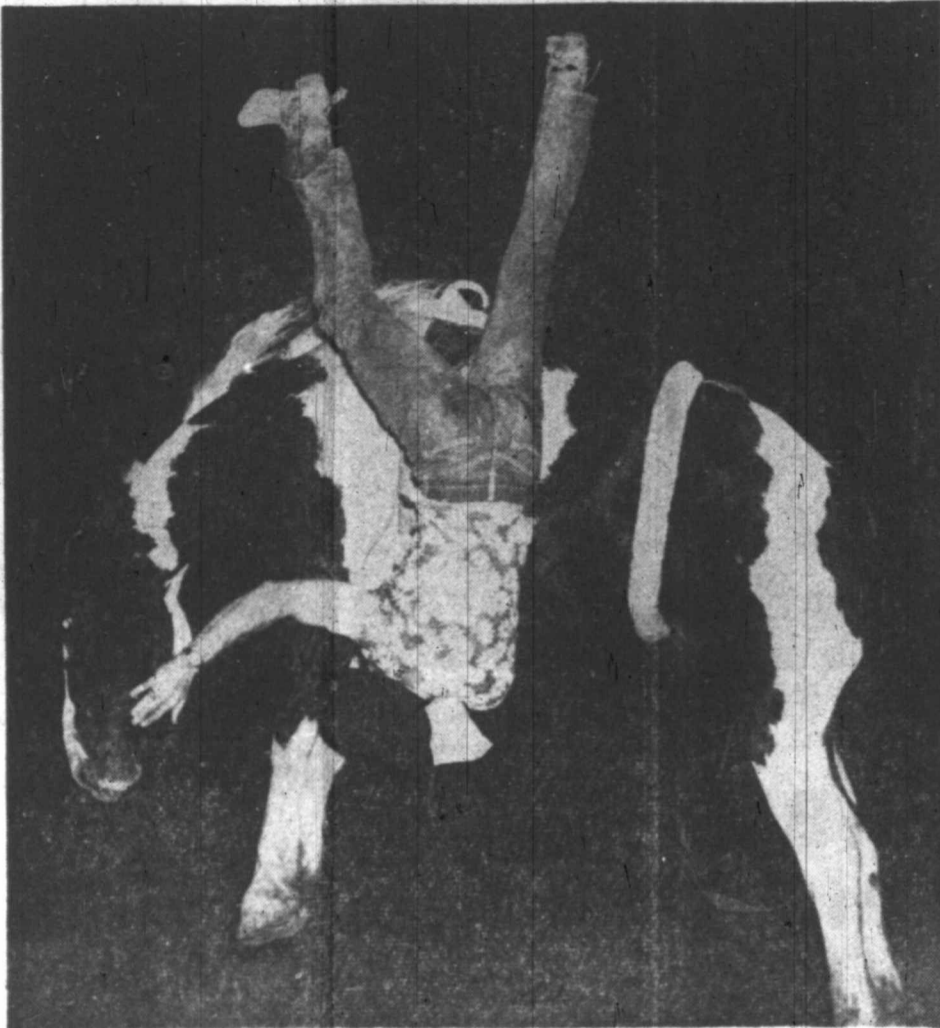

**Jughead**—silly horse.

**Hollinaning** — Leaping onto the horns of a steer and knocking him down without having to wrestle.

**Loggering** — Holding the saddle horn.

**Outfit**—Cowboy's equipment.

**Pegging** — When bulldogger sticks steer's horns into ground.

**Pulling leather** — Holding to saddle.

**Swallowing his tail**—Bucking (by horse).

**College Develops Test For Wheat**

**RALEIGH, N. C.**—(AP)—A test has been developed to see whether wheat is dry enough to combine or store, says John Curtis, marketing specialist for the North Carolina State College extension service.

To make the test, place a sample of the grain in a small glass bottle with some ammonium chloride, make the bottle airtight by closing securely, and shake the bottle 50 times. If the ammonium chloride becomes damp, the grain is too wet to store safely.

The new method was worked out by Prof. S. T. Dexter of Michigan State College.

## Midlander Recounts Varied Experiences With Sorghums; Suggests Improved Handling

(Editor's Note: The following article—a letter written by F. F. Elkin, Midland rancher-farmer, to J. D. Hooten, Austin stockman—appears in the May issue of Texas Livestock Journal. It is reprinted with the special permission of the magazine publishers.)

Mr. J. D. Hooten,  
Austin, Texas.  
Dear Mr. Hooten:

As you requested on your late visit, I will recount some of my experiences with the feed uses of the sorghums (you know there are many of them). My first contact was on a farm and ranch at the mouth of Dead-Man Creek 20 miles north of Abilene where my father

operated a mule factory. That was in 1882, just 60 years ago. I was stable boy and general roustabout on the ranch.

We had only Early Amber. This is a sweet sorghum and was used for hay. We cut it with an ordinary grain binder, there were no row binders then, or else with a mower as you would other hay, raked and forked it into shocks and finally into large stacks near the barn. It was very long and tangled and hard to handle, but mighty good feed if cut at the right stage and cured properly. We cut it out of the stack when feeding with a hay knife made for the business.

### Sorghum Goes To College

About that time the sorghums went to college, and so did I. When I returned a new sorghum had appeared. The original Milo Maize. It grew so tall we had to bend the stalks over to head it, or ride along on the side of the wagon; entirely too large to bind or mow, and no use for the stalks. They were as large as broom handles, but what heads. We soon saw we had something. It was safer and bore more grain, two to one, than corn. Swift & Company proved that it had 96 per cent of the feeding value of corn.

Since then, such a history. By importation, hybridization and selection, we probably have a hundred named varieties; a dozen or more are generally planted; characteristics vary greatly. I will not attempt detail. The main feature of the improvement (so called) has been to breed exclusively for grain with minimum of stalk fodder, combine type, in other words. Like a co-ed who has spent too much time in college, when she comes home cannot wash dishes or use a typewriter, our sorghum has lost half its utility. We have refined all the roughage out of it. Having only grain and no roughage to feed it with, we must find an outside market for it. Let's look at some figures.

### Tremendous Crop

Our annual crop is around 8,000,000 acres. Eighty per cent of this is combine type. We will call it 6,000,000. With types we used to raise for silage and bundle feed, this acreage (which now raises no roughage) has a potential of 2 1/2 tons of dry feed or five tons of silage per acre. This is a very low estimate. I have consistently raised eight to 12 tons of silage per acre. This six million acres, then, is capable of producing 15 million tons of dry feed per year, or twice as much wet. This is enough roughage to winter 7,500,000 head counting two tons per head. This is equal to the carrying capacity of 250 counties of ordinary grazing land. This is counting 30 head per section. The figure is astounding.

How did all this happen? There are several reasons. In our haste to mechanize our farming, we found we could combine maize with an adaptation of the small grain combine, saving labor and time. Hence the creation of the combine type. We lost sight of the roughage we might have had. We had not found a satisfactory way to handle this fodder anyway. Let's look at that. The silo was tried and found unsatisfactory. A daily chore like silage feeding does not suit most Texas farmers and ranchers. A certain volume of use must be maintained to keep the silage fresh, making it impossible to feed just a few head. Much of the grain passed unutilized and undigested. The silo was out. Bundle feed is very wasteful. The twine, the shocking and stacking is expensive and hard work, the leaves are dried and lost, the heads are riddled by the birds and rats, the bundles are full of sand, the stalks get hard and need grinding (another chore). You do well to get to your cow with half the feed value you had in the field to start with. Bundles are out, very definitely out.

### Solution Cited

What then? Harvest your sorghum with a silage cutter; barge it to your storage place; pass it through rollers set close enough to crack at least 90 per cent of the grain; dehydrate to 15 per cent moisture and blow into a stack or hay-shed fixed as a self-feeder. You have your feeding chore done for the year, except to open the gate to let the cattle in. Cost? Not too much. Quantity? Twice the amount you can take from the same land any other way. Quality? You can make it anything you want. No hand labor. No twine. No waste from birds and rats and sand. No rehandling at feeding time. Consume as fast or slow as you please, stop altogether, if you wish, without waste. No moldy grain. No weevil.

What is wanting? Nothing but the roller to condition the clipped feed for dehydrating. The capacity of the pilot plant should balance to carry the output of a forage harvester taking one row at a time, about one acre per hour, or 10 tons of green feed, or five tons of fodder per hour. Now, what do YOU say?

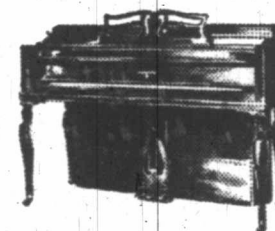

# Slow, Easy, Mystifying Rains Fall Over Area As Dr. Krick Continues 'Seeding Clouds'

Late in the afternoon of May 17, a Midland which had been sweltering only two days before began pulling out its warm jackets as temperatures dropped and a fine mist of moisture began falling from the skies.  
The mist grew heavier through the night and kept falling through the next day.  
It was a funny kind of rain—not like the old-fashioned gully-washers at all—and it looked so dainty as to be almost ineffectual.  
But when the skies finally cleared, farmers and ranchers throughout the area began bringing in excited reports of rain that measured as much as an inch and a half.  
Old-timers couldn't remember a rain just like it.  
"They were more like drizzles,"

said one rancher. "They came down slow and they soaked in easy."  
"It seemed to rain easier and last longer than anything I've ever seen. The ground apparently got the benefit from every drop of it."  
**It Happens Again**  
Ten days later, the same thing happened again, with a third of an inch falling in the city of Midland alone.  
Again it was slow and easy—and mystifying.  
At least, it was mystifying to everyone except Dr. Irving Krick and members of his staff; to them it was the same old story.  
They had seen the stuff fall in Washington, in Colorado, Kansas and other points in the almost billion acres of land covered by their cloud-seeding operations. The pattern was pretty much the same, al-

though the amounts of rainfall may have differed.  
Now, none of these experts will claim unreservedly that Dr. Krick's cloud-seeding operations were responsible.  
"We haven't been carrying on our operations over a long enough time yet to make any positive deductions," one of Dr. Krick's aides told a group of Midland County ranchers and farmers last month.  
"However, there certainly has been definite indications that cloud-seeding operations were successful."  
What, asked the farmers and ranchers, was cloud-seeding?  
**Old, Old Story**  
The story is, in many ways, centuries old but it all was boiled down on a scientific basis in 1946 when General Electric laboratories announced they had produced snow artificially by dropping powdered dry ice into moisture-laden air.  
At this time, Dr. Krick was head of the meteorology department of the California Institute of Technology, a position he had held for 13 years. In those 13 years he already had made a name for himself as a pioneer. He had visited every meteorological center in Europe and bringing back their ideas and adding some of his own, he evolved a successful technique for making long-range weather forecasts.  
Dr. Krick immediately undertook a field scale test of the General Electric experiments. At first they dropped the dry ice from airplanes.  
The range and scope of an airplane operation was so limited that the benefits did not offset the great expense involved so Dr. Krick and

his staff turned to the ground generator method of getting silver iodide crystals—instead of powdered dry ice—into the clouds.  
He developed a generator which burned coke, impregnated with the silver iodide crystals, and sent the invisible crystals at high temperatures into the sky.  
By June of 1950, Dr. Krick and his staff had piled up an impressive record of experimental cloud seeding data and were ready to begin their first commercial-scale application of cloud seeding.  
**Wheat Growers Aided**  
Operating as the Water Resources Development Corporation, they had a chance to begin when wheat growers in eastern Washington reported they were in a desperate plight.  
This group had large plantings of wheat which were in serious need of moisture. The wheat was heading out and to make a good crop it needed this moisture to give its full, plump kernels.  
Dr. Krick moved two generators into the area. His first opportunity to seed clouds came in June. When two seeding operations were concluded, the 100,000 acres of wheat land had received more than four times as much rain as it normally received during the entire month of June. Areas outside the acreage being targeted with silver iodide received as little as six per cent of their normal June moisture.  
Other operations in other areas brought similar results and "Operation Cloud-Seeding" began attracting wide attention.  
Two months ago, groundwork for a project in West Texas was laid and before long the West Texas Weather Improvement Association, of which Midland County is a member, was formed of 11 counties in this area.

**Contract Signed**  
A contract was signed with Dr. Krick and the generators began operating for the first time late in March.  
Nerve-center for the entire operation is Denver, Colo., where Dr. Krick's staff can follow the progress of every weather change throughout the United States.  
His office has four teletypes operated by the Department of Com-

merce network and millions of weather items are received and correlated each year.  
When conditions appear just right in any area in which generators are located, the word is flashed out and the generator operators go into action.

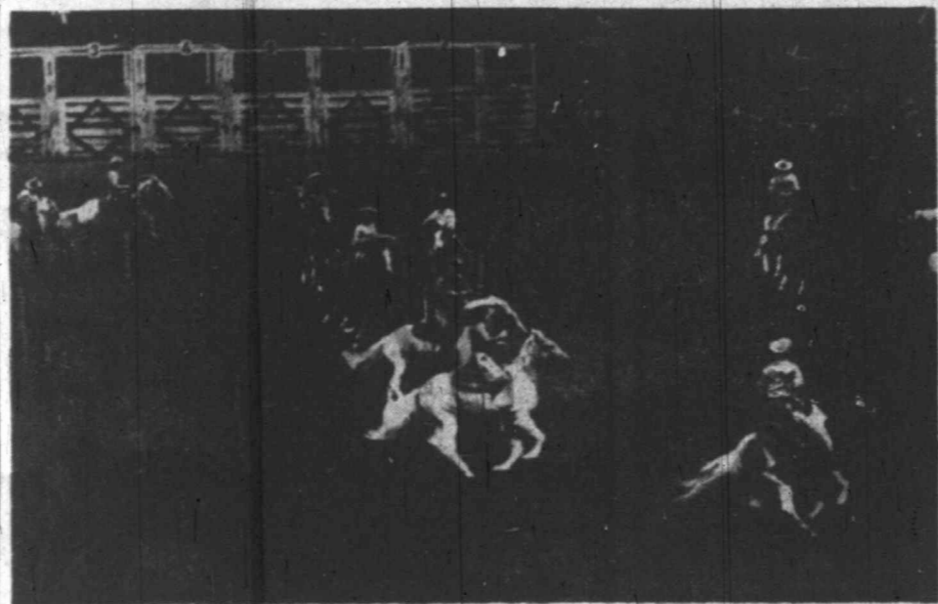

## Lightning C Ranch Horseback Quadrille Is Rodeo Favorite

Not the least spectacular event to  
 be seen at this year's Midland Rodeo  
 is the Lightning C Ranch Horseback  
 Quadrille. This old-fashioned square  
 dance done on speeding pairs of  
 matched horses is the personal pro-  
 ject of the rodeo's able producer,  
 Everett E. Colborn.  
 Colborn has spent considerable  
 time and money searching the coun-  
 try for the perfectly matched pairs  
 of horses that are used in the dance.  
 After these horses are found they  
 must be well trained in the intri-  
 cacies of the dance, for a mistake  
 could mean a bad accident for a  
 horse or rider. Most of the horses  
 in the Quadrille know their parts so  
 well they almost could go through  
 them without their riders.

The cowboys and cowgirls who  
 ride in the Quadrille are seasonal  
 followers of Colborn's shows and  
 many of them have ridden in the  
 event for years. Colborn himself  
 worked out the complicated dance,  
 patterning it after a real old-time  
 square dance and adding an ending  
 in which the riders dash full speed  
 through a thread-the-needle figure  
 eight for extra thrills. The riders  
 are led through their perform-  
 ance by Colborn on his horse Blaze.

The Quadrille is made up of eight  
 couples who wear colorful match-  
 ing satin shirts and chaps decorated  
 with the Lightning C brand. They  
 ride with speed and daring through  
 the do-si-do and a-la-man lefts  
 that make up one of the most ex-  
 citing events of the rodeo.

The Quadrille always is a favor-  
 ite with rodeo fans wherever it  
 shows.

It will be seen in action at each  
 of the five performances of the 18th

 Wednesday through Sunday.

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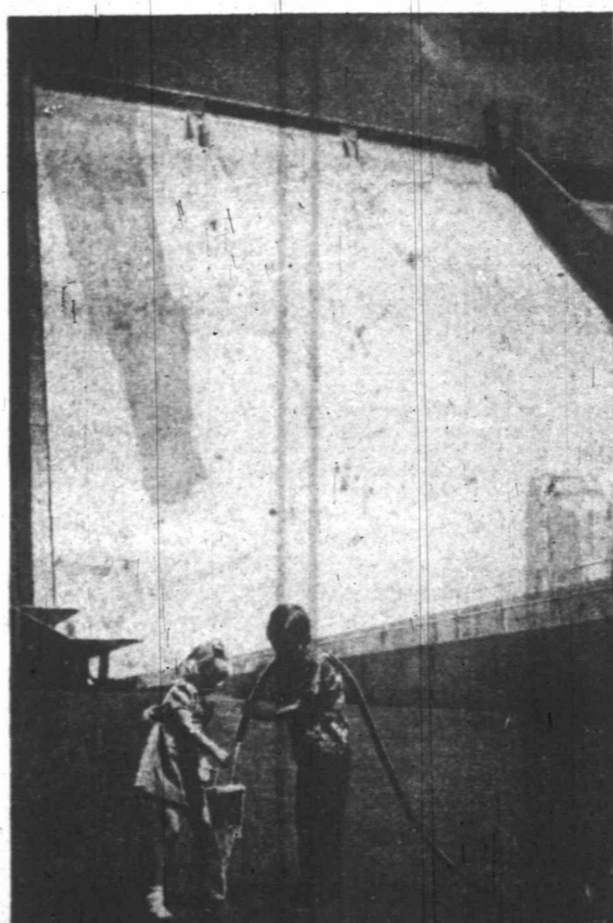
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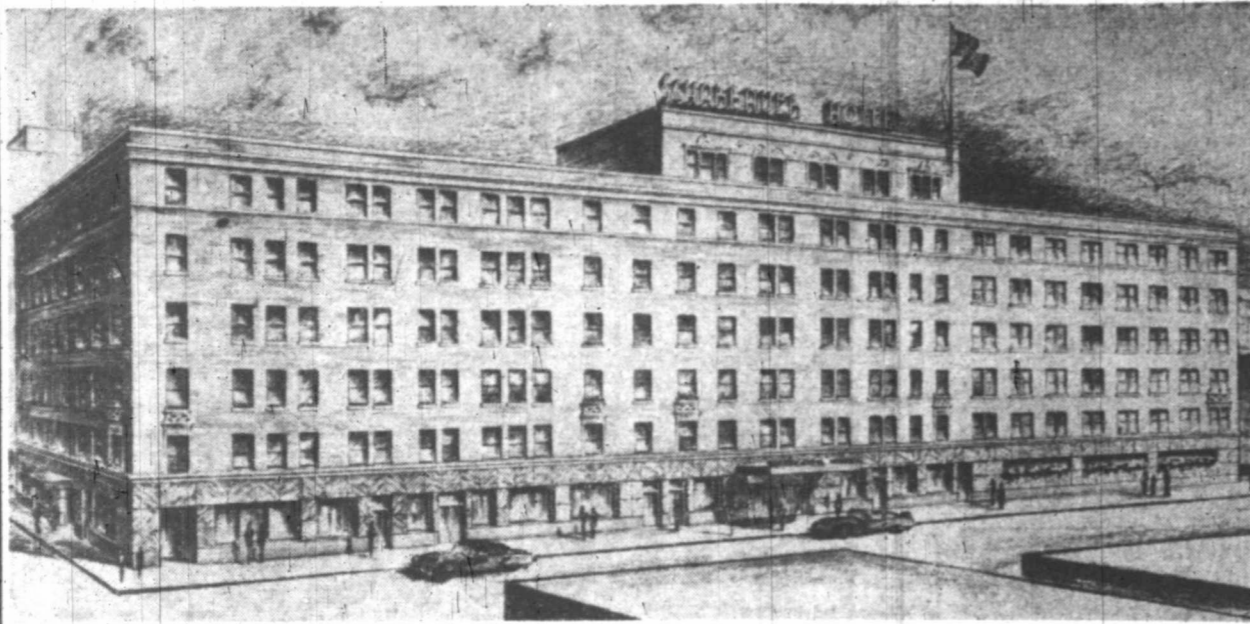
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
