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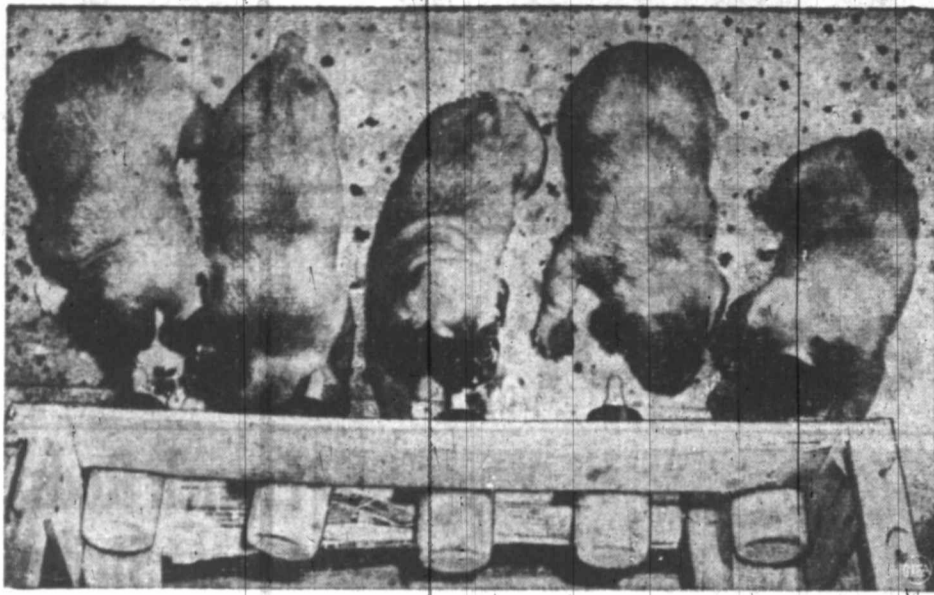

Ana Pauker, Former Stalin Darling, Faces Red Purge

VIENNA, AUSTRIA — (AP) — Romanian Foreign Minister Ana Pauker, onetime tough darling of international communism, seemed destined Wednesday for a Red purge. Her hometown Radio Bucharest accused her of being pro-capitalist and counter-revolutionary.

Western sources expressed belief that hefty, hard-visaged Mrs. Pauker and two former ministers, who also were attacked in the broadcast, were being made scapegoats for Red Romania's current economic woes.

The 59-year-old daughter of a rabbi last week was kicked out of the Romanian Communist Party's

Politburo. For the moment, at least, she still holds the foreign ministry. The Bucharest broadcast accused Mrs. Pauker and two partners in disgrace—former Finance Minister Vasile Luca and former Interior Minister Teohari Georghiu—of reducing the country to a state of anarchy.

It declared Mrs. Pauker's removal from the Politburo was in the interest of the working man. The broadcast gave credit for uncovering Mrs. Pauker's alleged links to George Gheorghiu-Dej, who was named new premier of Romania Monday night. Rumors have persisted that Ana and Gheorghiu-Dej were battling each other for control of the Red regime in Romania.

The broadcast quoted at length from an article in Wednesday's issue of Scanteia, the central organ of the Romanian Workers (Communist) Party. The paper made these charges:

Mrs. Pauker and the two ex-ministers "have proven their anti-Marxist tendency by supporting the capitalist system. They prevented the regular provision of people with food and supported the enriching of the individual household.

"They lowered the standard of the workers and contributed to the rise in prices. At currency revaluation (put through in January) they withheld wages from many workers and employees because they were against the finance plan. "They were counter-revolutionaries and brought about a state of anarchy."

General Clark Pays First Visit To Front

SEOUL — (AP) — Allied fighter-bombers attacked North Korean targets in force Wednesday. Rains Tuesday had cut down air assaults to a few sorties.

Seven B-26's bombed Communist front line positions in early morning darkness after heavy clouds obscured targets farther north. Other B-29's reported 29 supply vehicles destroyed in the night.

The rains muddled the 155-mile ground front. Allied tanks southwest of the Munsan truce camp caught about 75 Chinese in the open Tuesday afternoon and reported killing or wounding about 30. The tanks spotted the Reds near the junction of the Injin and Han Rivers and fired from the opposite bank.

Patrol skirmishing and probing continued Tuesday night and Wednesday morning in the Yonchon area, also on the western front.

Gen. Mark Clark, United Nations commander, and Gen. James A. Van Fleet, Eighth Army chief, left the battlefield Wednesday morning after finishing a tour started Tuesday. It was Clark's first visit to the front.

Pioneer American Watch-Maker Dies

CINCINNATI — (AP) — George J. Gruen, 74, chairman of the board of directors of the Gruen Watch Company, died of a heart attack Tuesday at his home.

Gruen, whose family has made American watch-making history, was the last survivor of three sons of Dietrich Gruen, who founded the firm at Columbus, Ohio, in 1874.

Former New York Taxi Driver Slays Wife In Courtroom

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. — (AP) — A former New York taxi driver was held for murder Wednesday in the courtroom slaying of his 36-year-old divorced wife.

A few minutes after he had been placed under a peace bond Tuesday, David Brecher shot his former wife in the head at close range, then fired three more bullets into her crumpled body.

"I thought he was firing blanks to make a show," said Justice of the Peace Kenneth Oka. "I ducked under the desk until the shooting was over."

Oka had just ordered the 44-year-old laundry truck driver not to molest his former wife, Ann, and their infant daughter.

When the shooting was over, Brecher handed the revolver to Oka and said: "Here, I'm surrendering myself."

Handcuffed to a courtroom chair, Brecher told police he had tried to effect a reconciliation.

"But it had to be her way," he said. "If I say black was black, she'd say black was white. She wouldn't settle for gray."

Britain Joins In Protest Of ROK Political Troubles

PUSAN, KOREA — (AP) — Britain Wednesday joined the United States in protesting to President Syngman Rhee over recent political developments in this temporary South Korean capital.

Alec Adams, charge d'affaires, orally outlined the British position to Rhee, then handed the aging leader a written statement. He told correspondents the statement backed up the policies of the U. S. State Department given Rhee in a note Tuesday.

The American Embassy also handed Rhee a note from President Truman which called recent political developments in Pusan shocking.

Rhee softened his policy Wednesday, apparently as a result of two double-barreled protests from the U. S. and Britain.

A government Public Information Office announcement said Rhee would not dissolve the National Assembly now. Earlier, he was reported on the verge of disbanding it.

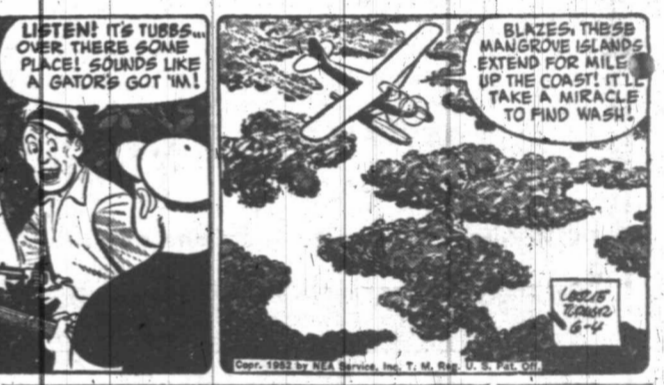

 By his own count, the Rev. J. J. Ivie now has been without food 45 days. His wife has reported for several days that he is weakening steadily and able to sit on the edge of his bed only for short intervals.
 The 57-year-old minister's sister, Mrs. Alma Merchant, came here from her home in Calico Rock, Ark., to be near him. Mrs. Ivie's sister, Mrs. Sarah Holland, also arrived from Palmyra, Ohio.
 They joined the three Ivie sons and a daughter, who have been here several days.

Shooting In Odessa Takes Third Life

ODESSA — Marion A. Gilcrease, Jr., 43, wounded in a shooting May 29, died at 6:05 p.m. Tuesday in Odessa hospital. He died one day after his father, M. A. Gilcrease, Sr., died in Santa Fe, N. M.
 Gilcrease was the third victim of the shooting to die. He and Mrs. Elsie Sanders, 34, were shot by Roy A. Ray, 41, who then put his .38 caliber pistol in his mouth and pulled the trigger. Mrs. Sanders was killed instantly, while Ray died the next day.
 Jealousy apparently was the motive behind the shooting, officers said.

BALTIMORE —(AP)—Senator Estes Kefauver (D-Tenn) Wednesday officially has Maryland's 18 presidential nominating votes on his score board. And he'll have them at least for one roll call at Chicago next month.
 Kefauver officially picked up the votes at Tuesday's Maryland Democratic state convention which also saw Mayor Thomas d'Alesandro elected national committeeman in a party tussle.

 Ivie said he will continue the fast until his prayers for a religious awakening in the world are answered—or until death comes.

Boys State Youths To Operate Texas' Affairs Next Week

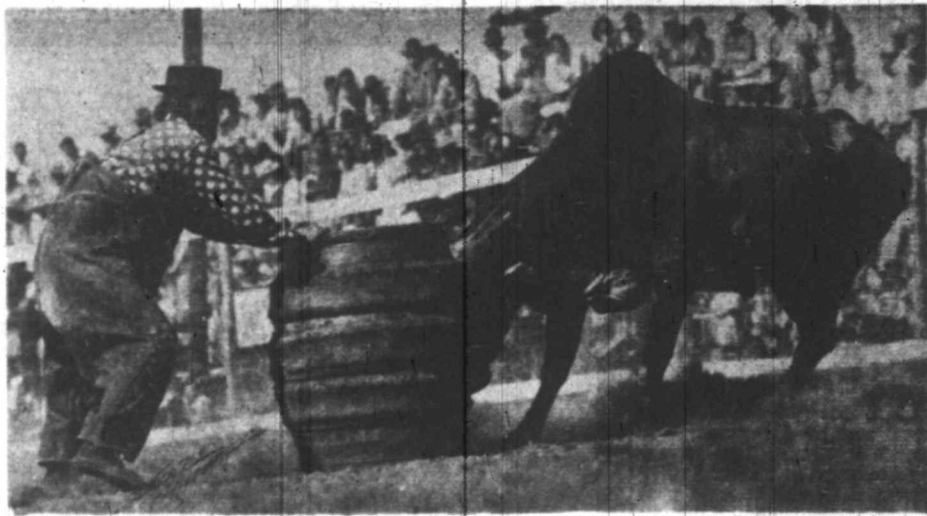
AUSTIN —(P)— Texas will have a new governor, Legislature and a complete set of state officials next week.

Army Officer Called On Missing Massacre Reports

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A top World War Two intelligence officer went before Congress Wednesday to tell how the Army handled information concerning Russia during the years the U. S. and Soviets were allies. Col. Ivan Yeaton, former chief of the Eastern European section, was called by a special committee trying to track down a politically touchy series of documents now officially reported lost. The missing documents are reports on the massacre of 4,000 Polish officers in Katyn Forest, Russia, in early 1940. The committee which has received testimony that the Russians did the killing, is considering charges to avoid embarrassing Moscow. The Russians have accused the Germans of the slaughter. Colonel Yeaton in 1942 was in charge of information concerning Poland and Russia. At that time, the first report on Katyn was filed by an American liaison officer attached to a Polish army being raised to fight with the allies. Maj. Gen. Clayton L. Bissell, retired, told the committee Tuesday he did not know what happened to another report about Katyn which was made to him in May, 1945, by Col. John H. Van Vliet, an American officer who had been captured by the Germans. Nazi officials took Van Vliet to Katyn when mass graves were discovered in 1943 and the colonel later made a full report to Bissell. The general, former chief intelligence officer, said he intended to forward the report to the State Department but could not prove he had done so. An Army Inspector General's report, introduced in the hearing, said there was no proof it had left Bissell's office. Bissell told the committee that intelligence officers kept a wary eye on Russian potentialities and had trouble "keeping them out of our hair."

Taft, Administration Forces Get Rebuffs In California Vote

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—Republican Gov. Earl Warren and Democratic Senator Estes Kefauver captured California's big delegations to the national conventions with better than two to one margins Wednesday. Both victories over uncommitted slates in Tuesday's heavy voting presidential primary came as no surprise. There was possibly wide significance, however, in the double rebuff suffered by Truman Democrats. Warren won all 79 GOP delegates to back his quest for the party's nomination. He defeated a pro-Taft slate technically pledged to Rep. Thomas H. Werple, who quarreled with the governor's espousal of progressive policies. Tennessee's Kefauver bowled over a "free choice" slate of 68 Democratic delegates headed by Attorney General Edmund G. Brown, but originally organized to support President Truman. Returns from 10,221 of the state's 19,730 precincts gave: Warren, 430,896; Werdel, 203,267. Ten thousand seventy Democratic votes gave Kefauver 463,616; Brown 206,204. Republican Senator William F. Knowland delivered what may be taken as another slap at the Administration by sweeping both party nominations for reelection under California's crosslisting system. California's 44-year-old senior senator, an outspoken foe of Truman's foreign and Fair Deal programs, trounced Democratic Rep. Clinton McKinnon of San Diego, a Truman supporter, on both tickets.

Alvin Lane of Dallas, Eisenhower leader and a general counsel for the Texas GOP's, returned Wednesday from Washington, D. C., where he held a conference with leaders from other Southern states to determine strategy for the Eisenhower-Taft fight at the national party July 7. He will leave for Houston Thursday to confer with attorneys Malcolm McCorquodale, Houston, and Lamar Cecil, Beaumont, to draft arguments.

AUSTIN—(AP)—The death sentence of an Anderson County negro, convicted of murder in the shotgun killing of a wild life biologist, was upheld by the Court of Criminal Appeals Wednesday. The court found no reversible error and noted that the condemned man, Alton Paris, had confessed voluntarily to the shooting of Gus Engeling.

Troops Again Raid Red Prisoner Pens

KOJE ISLAND, KOREA—(AP)—U. S. troops and tanks Wednesday raided three Communist prisoner-of-war pens and brought out defiant leaders amid indications authorities were cutting food rations in two of the island's toughest compounds. After the guards knocked down flag poles and burned Russian, Chinese Red and North Korean flags, correspondents learned that bags of sand instead of food were delivered at Compounds 85 and 96. Authorities on this big island prison refused to comment immediately on this development. However, correspondents have heard rumors the last two days that the defiant prisoners in 86 and 96 had been given reduced rations to bring them into line. This method if discipline is allowed under the Geneva Convention for treatment of prisoners. Not a shot was fired when the tanks and troops moved into the three compounds, although the Red prisoners inside boasted they would "fight to the death." Seventeen anti-Communist prisoners, their hands bound, were rescued from one compound. The soldiers marched 75 other POW's out of a second compound. The group included five leaders and possibly some anti-Reds. A few tear gas grenades were thrown as the American soldiers rushed into the barbed wire enclosures. Later they destroyed POW guard huts with flamethrowers. Troops of the U. S. Second Division's 38th Regiment executed the operation. Their commander, Lt. Col. William F. Keenan of San Antonio, commented: "We can go into any of these compounds anytime we want."

Thousands Crowd Into Abilene, Kan., To Welcome General

ABILENE, KAN.—(AP)—Thousands crowded into this little Kansas town Wednesday to welcome Dwight D. Eisenhower to his boyhood home—and the start of a new chapter in his life. Col. Hugh Edwards, superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol, said there would be more than 50,000 people jammed into this town of barley more than 5,000 by parade time Wednesday afternoon. Hundreds took up favored spots along the parade route as early as 9 a.m. There they waited patiently along the flag-draped streets—men, women and children from all over the Midwest. Skies were overcast and showers threatened. The kids were shined up in their Sunday best. Many wore "I Like Ike" shirts and big straw hats with the same favorite slogan. The town had a carnival atmosphere. Concession stands were colorful at almost every downtown corner. A couple of elephants were staked out at the edges of town and they drew scores of delighted youngsters. One little freckle-faced girl was busy lugging bundles of grass to an elephant. She said he was awfully hungry. For Eisenhower, Wednesday's hometown opener in his presidential campaign started shortly after noon—a museum dedication next door to his boyhood home. His major speech will come at 5 p.m. and will be broadcast over nation-wide television and radio hookups.


