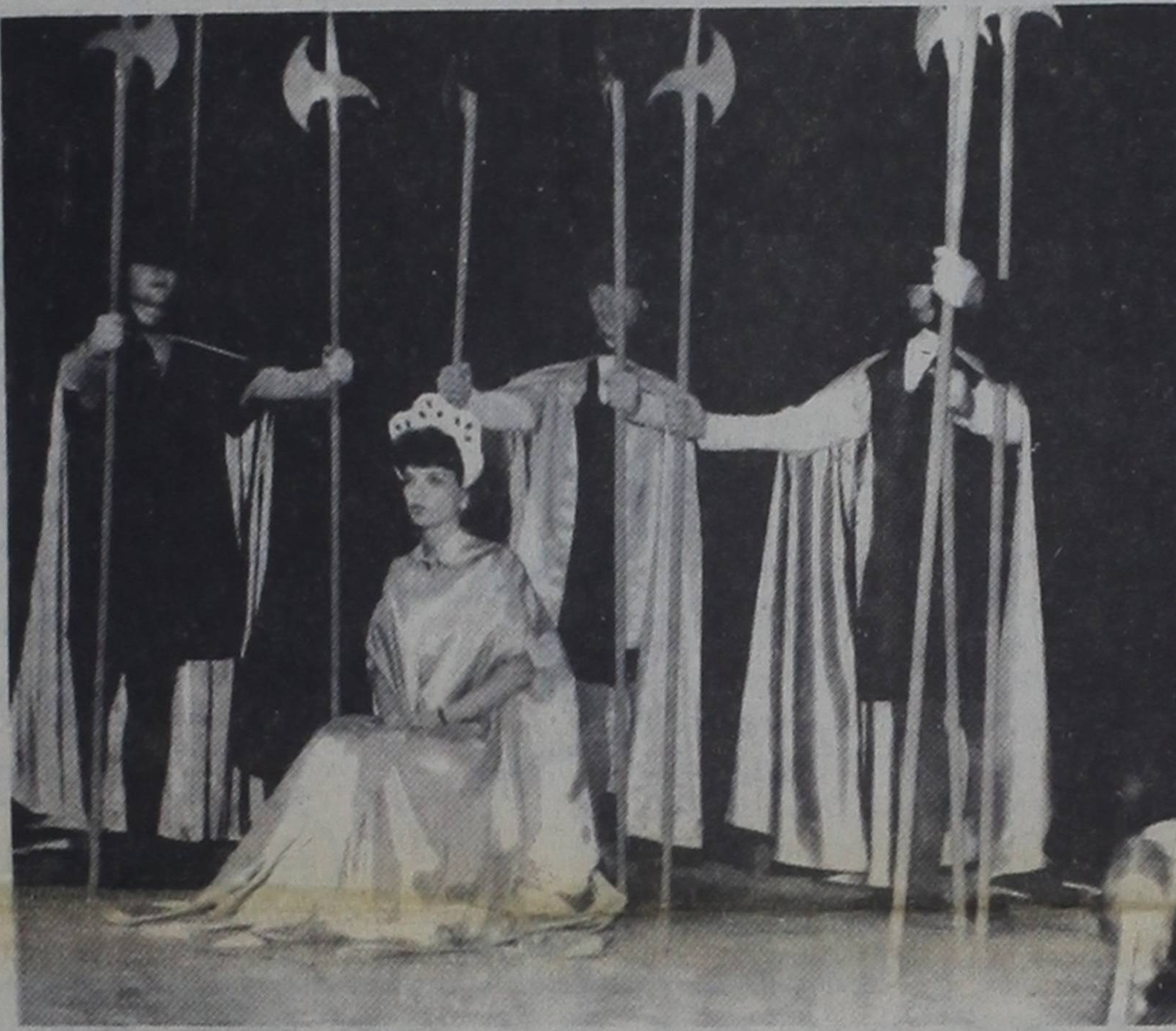
The winner of the regional meet will then advance to the national spelling bee to be held in Washington, D.C.

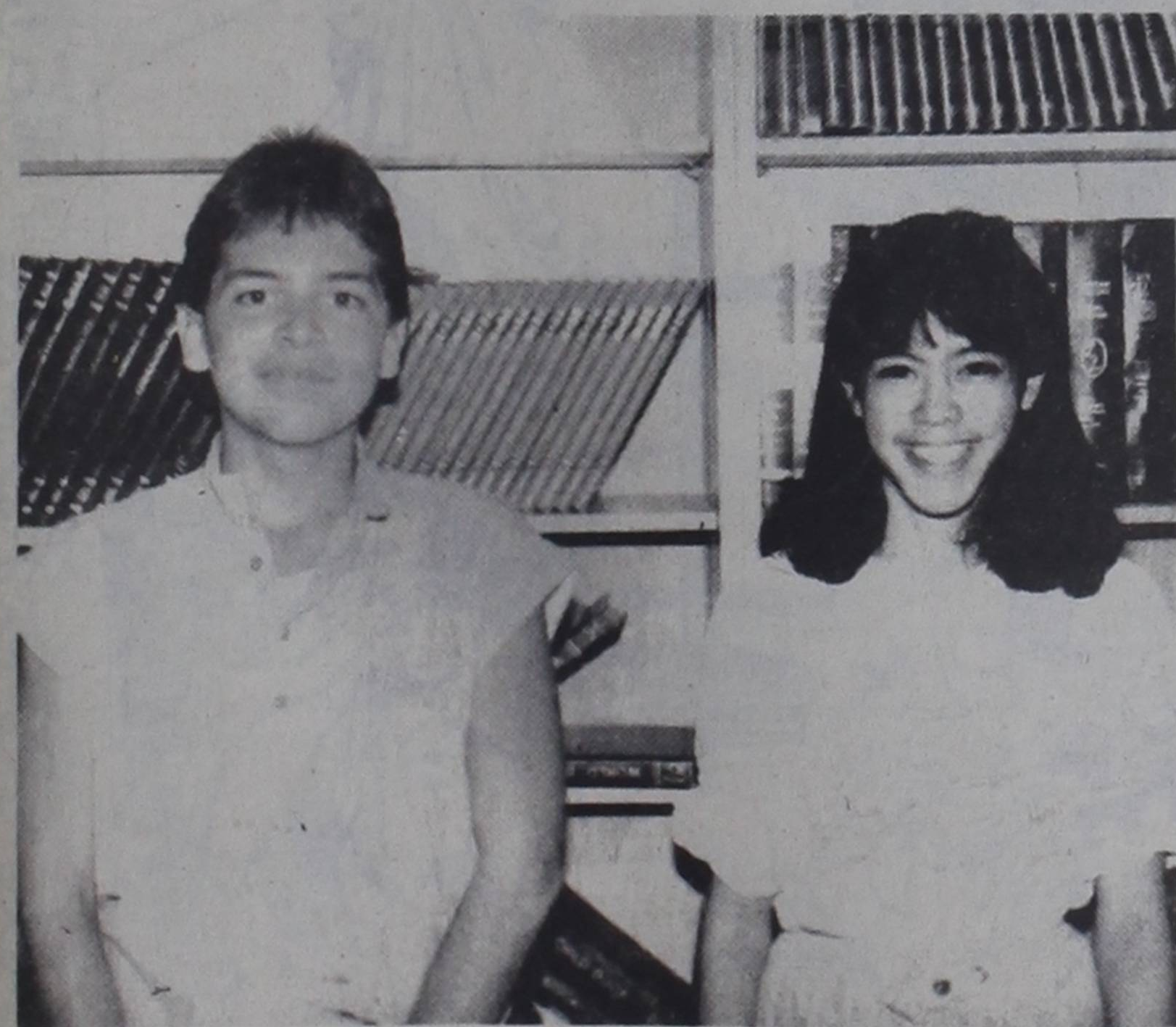

Parmer Descendant Gives Interesting Facts

(Editor's note: Martin Parmer, for whom Parmer County is named, has always been a "mystery man" of sorts for historians.

Prior to publication of "A History of Parmer County, Volume I," in 1974, publisher Nelson Lewis said he had driven "hundreds of miles, written dozens of letters and made phone calls to Virginia, Tennessee and Missouri" in an effort to dig up all the facts he could concerning Parmer.

In this week's mail, an unsolicited "history" about the man came in our mail, submitted by a great-great-grandson of Parmer, a living descendant about whom we had not known. (After all, the man was married four times--or was it five??) The writer of this piece, J.A. Parmer, now lives in Tucumcari, N.M.

Many hundreds of years ago there was a tribe of people that came out of the wilderness into the Babylonian Empire with palm leaves, showing their appreciation for entering into their country, and they were called Palmers.

After America was discovered and states were added to the colonies, some of the Palmers came to the American soil. They settled in the state of Virginia. Among the families that came to America was a young man named Morton Palmer. He grew up there and made friends with another young man named Stephen F. Austin.

Austin came to Texas (or that part of the region which Mexico claimed). When the war broke out between Texas and Mexico, Austin became involved and needed help, so he sent to Virginia to Morton Palmer to come help him in the struggle.

Palmer responded and soon was engaged in battles with the Mexicans. In one of the battles, Palmer was captured and taken to Mexico as a prisoner of war.

Palmer was a very cunning and sly person. One day he got his chance to climb the wall of the prison, under fire. He escaped back to Texas to rejoin the forces against the Mexicans.

When the Texans were victorious over the Mexicans and the Declaration of Independence was signed, Morton Palmer was asked to sign, and he did, being the forty-second signer of that declaration.

What changed somewhat was when he signed his name "Palmer." Now, the Palmers scattered over the southwest are descendants from that Babylonian.

(Editor's note: It is a known fact that Parmer changed his name spelling from Palmer. However, we had never heard his first name given as "Morton" before, and in fact it did start out this way, then the "Ring-Tailed Panther" changed the spelling of both his names!)

After the war was over Morton Parmer was given the land where the city of Waco now stands, tax-free for 100 years. Parmer, thinking the land valueless, moved to West Texas, where he spent the remainder of his days hunting and trapping.

In all his life, he had five wives. He was a very rugged character, according to history.

In about 1915, there was a law firm that came to Wilson Parmer at Nolanville, Texas. Wilson was a grandson to Morton Parmer and was told that he was heir to all the city of Waco. The lawyers wanted to prove it in court for him.

Wilson Parmer told the lawyers that the people of Waco had bought this land in good faith and paid for it and that he did not care

to take any part of it. The lawyers came back several times, but Parmer never yielded to them. This writer is a grandson of Wilson Parmer and was present when the lawyers came.

In 1936, Morton Parmer's remains were picked up in West Texas and taken to Austin for reburial. Today, he lies beside his boyhood friend, Stephen F. Austin, at the Texas State Cemetery in Austin.

There was a notice in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram about the funeral. S.M. Parmer, son of Wilson Parmer, and this writer, went to the funeral in Austin, and it was under the direction of the Daughters of the Confederacy of the State of Texas, who gave the history of the Palmers.

They also stated that Morton, Texas, was named for Morton Palmer.

We were advised that most all the bones of Morton Parmer were in the casket, which was a new one, covered with a U.S. Flag. This was in Texas' 100th year of freedom from Mexico.

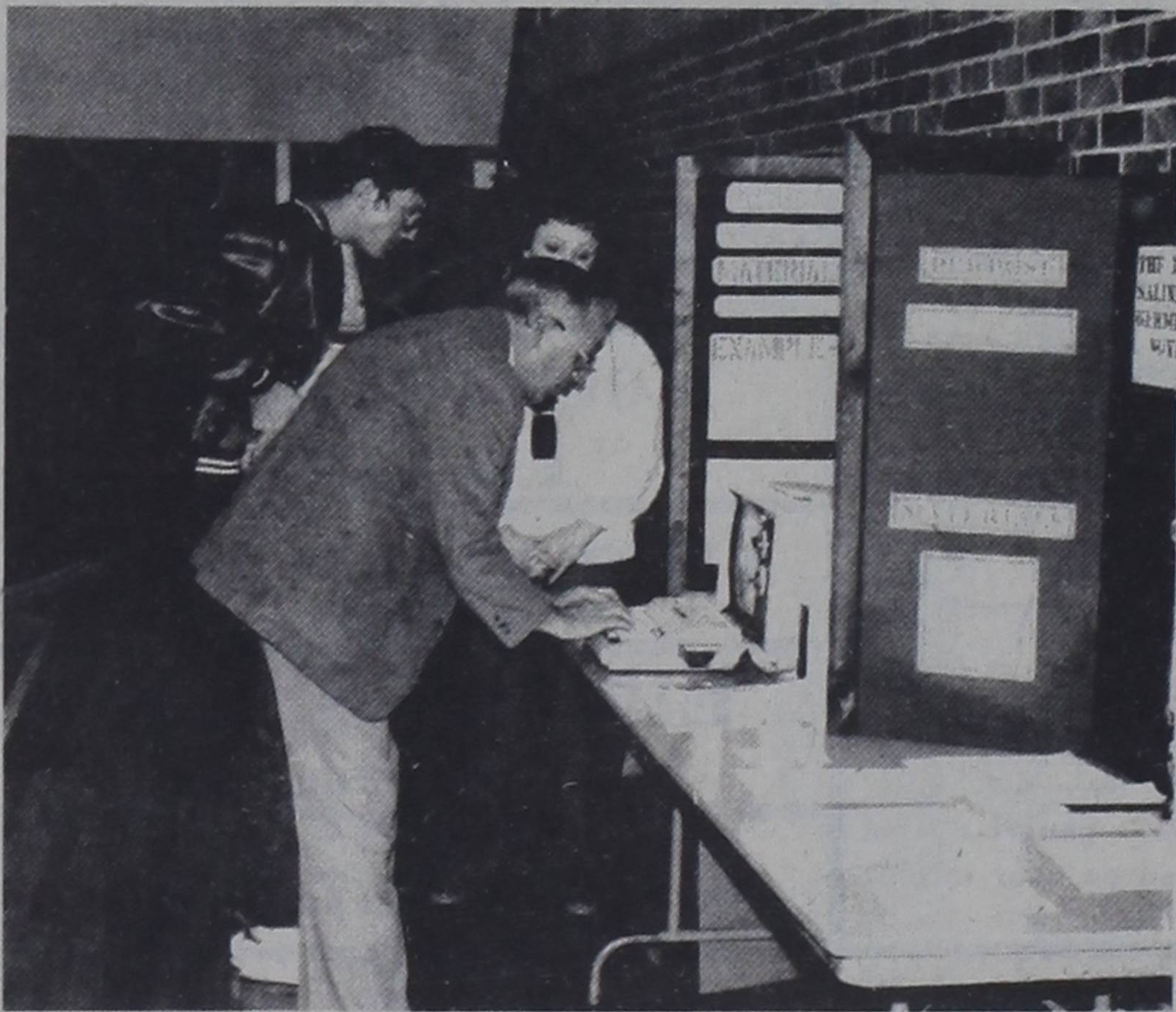

P.S. Omitted was a story about the time he had a hound dog to die, and he went for a Methodist preacher to preach the dog's funeral and was refused. Parmer got a rifle and put him on a horse and made him ride 40 miles to preach the funeral.

(Editor's note--this story about the death of Parmer's "bear dog" is similar to Nelson Lewis' account. In Lewis' version, the preacher rode the 40 miles thinking it was a member of Parmer's family over which he was to say the last rites.)

There was another story, that I believe was a little too ugly for print.

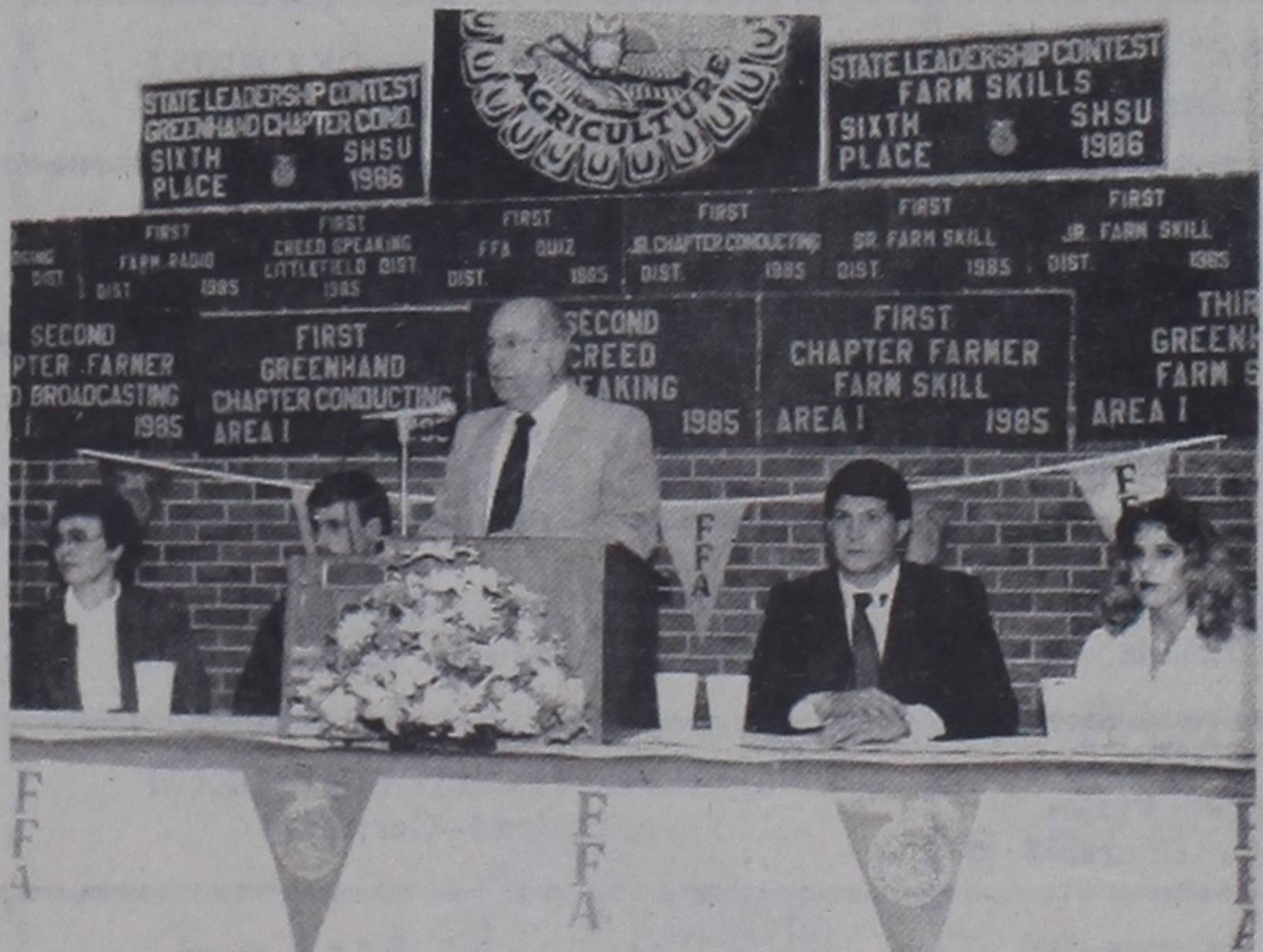

55 YEARS AGO—MARCH 27, 1931

Parmer County is in a very fortunate position regarding the paving of Highway 60, inasmuch as it traverses the entire length of the county, in a diagonal direction, giving us many miles of that highway, and three of the 13 Texas towns on it. The fact alone will bring Parmer County more than the usual county's share of tourist money to be spent by travellers along the highway.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 27, 1936

The fireboys of Friona's Volunteer Fire Company have during the past week removed the rack on which they dried the hose from the Blackwell lot to the lots which the city has purchased on the south side of Sixth Street. They also removed all undesirable objects from the two lots just north of the city jail, which makes the premises look much more desirable than while littered with the many articles on the lots.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 28, 1941

On Sunday afternoon, a car belonging to Mr. and Mrs. Claude C. Boren was totally wrecked by an eastbound freight train, on the Santa Fe tracks near the depot. Mr. and Mrs. Boren got the car stalled crosswise of the tracks and could not get it off before the oncoming freight train arrived. They ran clear of the car prior to the collision.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 28, 1946

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 29, 1951

Unquestionably the most significant event in the local Masonic Lodge history will be the called meeting for next Monday night, at which time the local Friona Lodge will be set to work as the Friona Masonic Lodge U.D. (under dispensation). This will be the first dispensations of a new lodge in this area in over 15 years. Local Masons have heretofore been affiliated with the Farwell Lodge, with meetings in Bovina.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 23, 1956

The recent dust storms in Parmer County have taken their toll in wheat damage, according to Agricultural Agent Joe Jones, who pointed out that reports from scattered sections of the county indicate that here and there some farmers have had their wheat blown out.

25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 23, 1961

A postmaster appointment that didn't materialize after it had been announced had Frionans shaking their heads in wonderment this week. Roy V. Miller, who received word last week that he was to be installed as acting postmaster, received another letter Friday that revoked the first order. In investigating the incident, this writer learned that several Frionans had been asked to write letters to postal authorities asking that Mrs. Roy Clements receive the appointment.

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 24, 1966

Junior Martinez, son of Mrs. Norma Martinez of Friona, was serving aboard the destroyer USS

Mason last Wednesday when the vessel picked up the United States' two latest astronauts. Martinez, who was employed at Gib's Cleaners prior to enlisting in the U.S. Navy, has been in the service about three years.

15 YEARS AGO—MARCH 25, 1971

Parmer County Community Hospital has received its heart monitoring machinery which was financed primarily through last year's Project Christmas Card fund drive. The machine, which is a sophisticated piece of equipment, was installed during the past week, and hospital personnel were instructed as to its use.

10 YEARS AGO—MARCH 21, 1976

The annual all-sports banquet for Friona High School will be held Tuesday, March 23 at the Community Center. Speaker will be Steve Sloan, "boy wonder" head coach at Texas Tech University.

Marion Clark, Conservation Technician, received a 30-year safe driving award from Herb Evans, SCS District Conservationist of Friona.

A meeting of all persons interested in paving the road to Friona Cemetery has been called for Friday, March 26 at the Friona State Bank's Community Room. Glen Herring, chairman of the committee appointed to study the feasibility of paving a route to the cemetery, says there is a good possibility of getting a road paved.

5 YEARS AGO—MARCH 29, 1981

Kelli Mitchell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Larry Mitchell of Bovina, has been chosen as the March of Dimes Poster Child for the South Plains Area.

The Parmer County Division of the American Heart Assn. has received a special award from the national organization. The local organization received the "Heart and Touch" Award, for exceeding all previous fund-raising records during the drive of 1980. The county ranked 48th in the state for its efforts in raising \$3,218.00 during the drive.

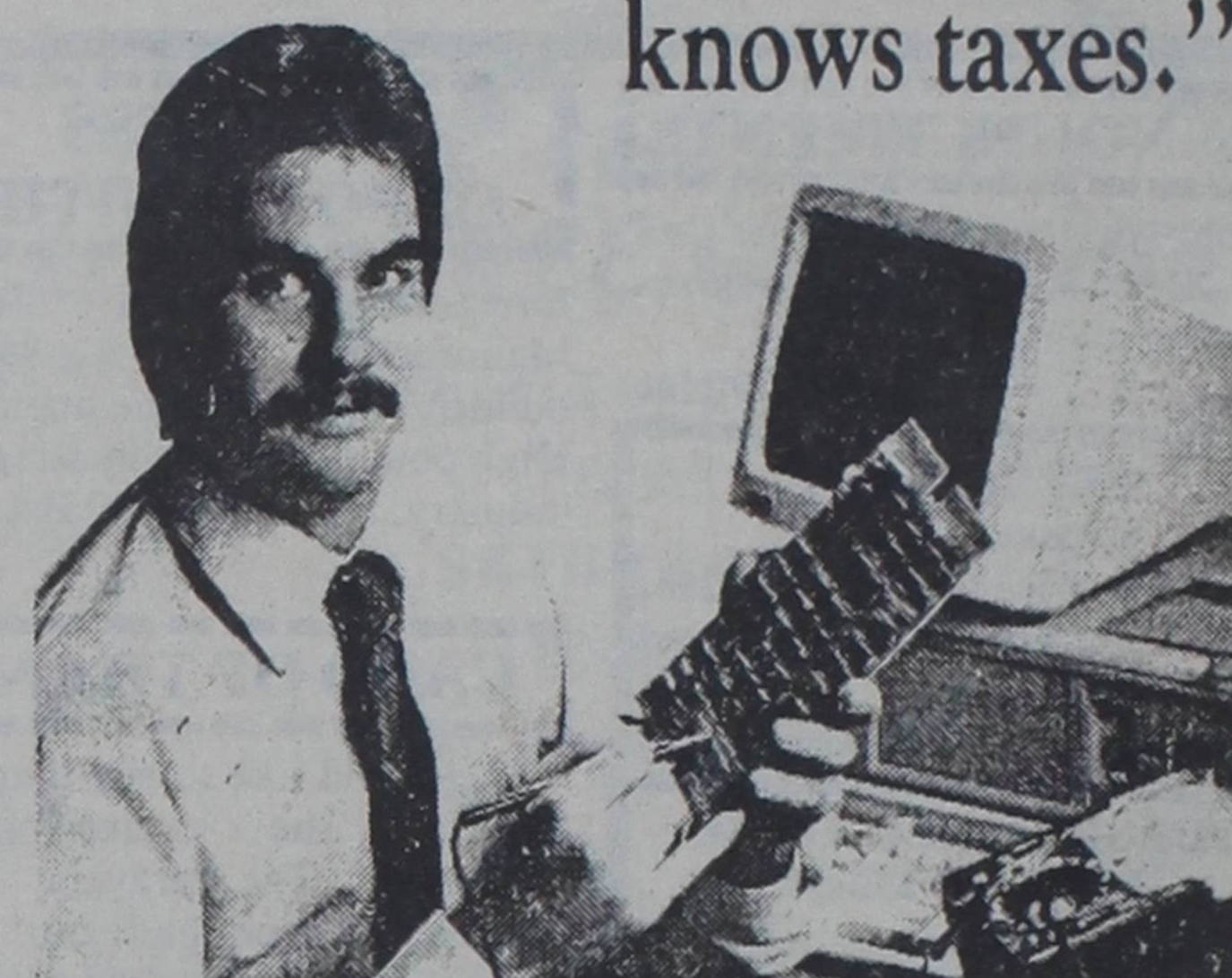

GIRLS WIN TITLE

Ronda Ratcliff Sets High Jump Record

The Friona Squaws got a record-setting performance by jumper Ronda Ratcliff, which helped spark Friona to the team title in a talent-laden Abernathy Invitational Track and Field Meet last Saturday.

There were sixteen teams entered in the meet.

Miss Ratcliff uncorked a jump of five feet, four inches, to shatter the school's high jump record of 5-1, set in 1982 by Sherry O'Brian. The jump also pushes Miss Ratcliff toward the top of the list in the area's high jumpers this year.

"I think I can jump even higher," said the Squaws' junior performer. Prior to Saturday, her best height had been 5-0 at the Friona meet. Miss Ratcliff beat some pretty fair "country" jumpers in the event, including Bovina's outstanding junior, Mindy Neal.

The Squaws also had a pair of stellar performances from their 800-meter relay and 1600-meter relay teams, which happen to be composed of the same four girls. They are Mika Maddox, Miss Ratcliff, Susan Bailey and Lacye Osborn.

The quartet ran a 1:51 in the 800-meter relay to cop that event title. Then, with the meet's overall

title in the balance in the final race, they won the 1600-meter (mile) relay with a time of 4:17.

Going into the mile relay event, the Squaws and Olton's Fillies were tied for first place in the meet with 54 points.

Lacye Osborn scored the other first place for the Squaws, winning the 800-meter race with a time of 2:29.

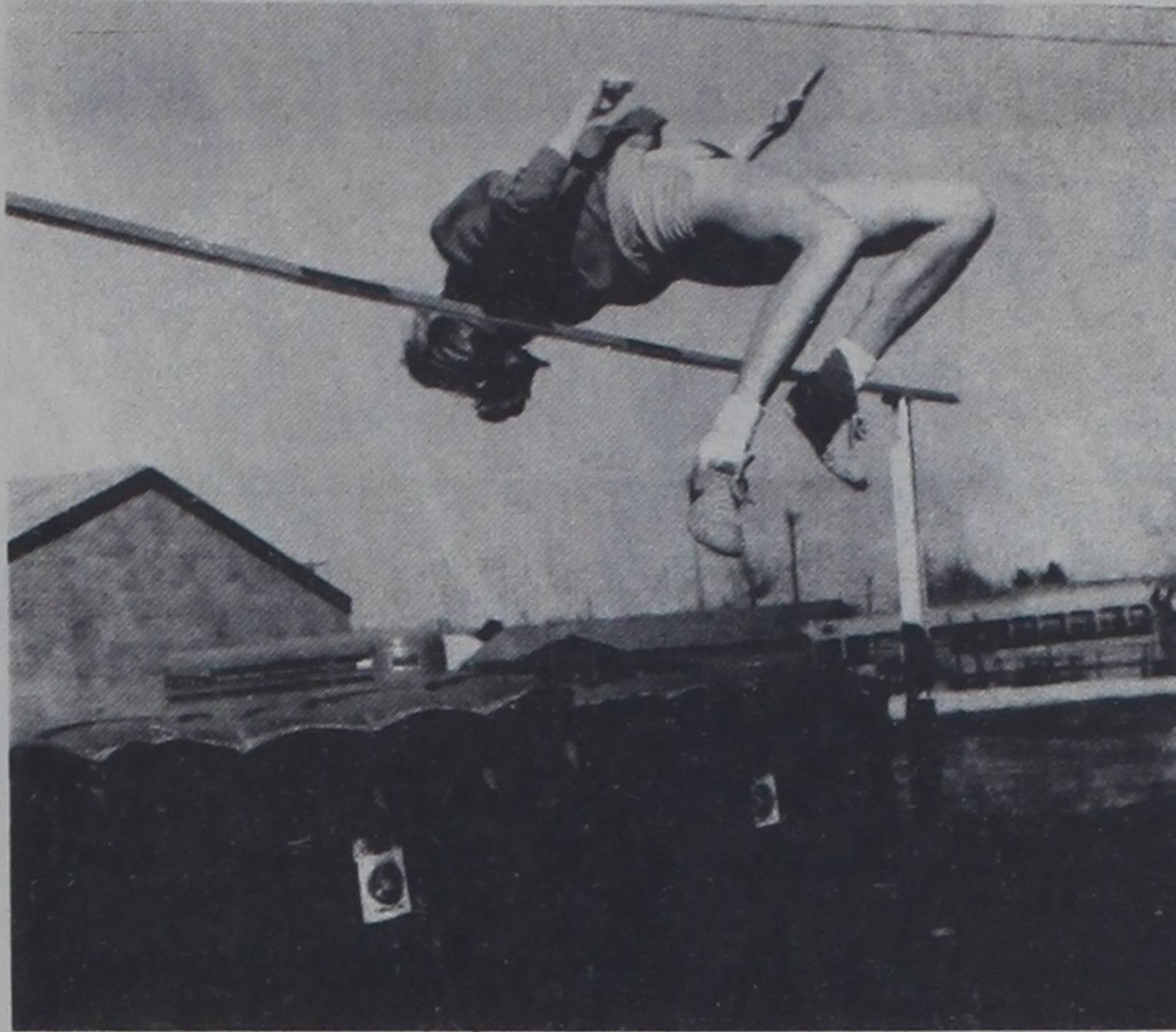
Otherwise, Kerry Cain placed fourth in the discus throw with a 106-8 effort, and fifth in the shot put.

Dara Wells placed fourth in the 400-meter dash. The 400-meter relay team placed fifth. Team members are Shannon Atwell, Sindy Preston, Miss Bailey and Miss Ratcliff.

"We're still improving. I think we're about where we ought to be," commented Coach Vickie Hatton.

The team is entered in the Lubbock Roosevelt meet this Saturday. They again will see some stiff competition, since one of the teams entered is Plainview High School.

This being the Easter weekend, a few of the team members will miss the meet due to trip plans. After this weekend, the team still has two meets remaining prior to their district meet.

Thelma Jones Retires As Friona City Judge

Since Thelma Jones retired from the position of Friona City Judge in December, she has been a full time homemaker for the first time in almost forty years.

She spends most of her time at home at 903 Woodland, where she has lived for many years. She says, "I'm really looking forward to having more time to spend painting and visiting with my friends."

At the time she was elected to her first public office, Justice of the Peace, she had been a full time employee of Parmer County Community Hospital about ten years and always had Mondays off.

Since she needed to spend only one day a week at the office, she was able to continue holding both positions for several years.

She remembers that her opponents in the first election were the late Walter Loveless and E.B. Brannon. After serving in the same capacity for several years, she was appointed Friona's first City Judge, a position she held for nearly fifteen years.

A native of Waxahachie, Texas, Thelma Curry moved with her parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. A.S. Curry, to a farm seven or eight miles northeast of Friona, which they later sold to the Poindexter family, in 1917.

She was twelve years old at the time. She was the oldest of five children. The younger ones, Bonnie, J.D., Juanita and Edna Earl, are all deceased.

Like most children who grew up on farms at the time, Thelma learned to milk cows, feed chickens, gather eggs, slop hogs and do other farm chores at an early age. Her first field work was hoeing and picking cotton and hand heading maize.

She recalls that her first power farming was done with two mules named "Kate" and "Huldie" and a sled go-devil. Later she graduated to the job of driving a ten mule team to pull a drag type combine, which was being

operated by her father.

Following her graduation from Friona High School in 1923, Thelma worked part time for Blackwell Hardware, the forerunner of Plains Hardware, and continued to assist with the operation of the farm.

About that time some farmers were beginning to change from mule and horse power to tractor power and Thelma remembers that the first tractor her dad purchased was a Fordson. Later he purchased a John Deere, which was cranked with a wheel and had a hand operated clutch.

One of Thelma's first tractor driving experiences led to one of her most embarrassing moments. Early one morning her dad and brother hooked two plows onto two tractors and Thelma and J.D. were ready for a long day in the field.

Mr. Curry operated the mechanism of the tractor and Thelma drove to a nearby field. After going a round or two--at that time all wheat ground was plowed from the outside to the inside all the way around the field--Mr. Curry got off the tractor and went elsewhere.

Soon Thelma noticed that her plow wasn't running right, so motioned for her brother to come to her assistance. He came over, stopped the tractor, adjusted the plow, started the tractor again, then went back to his work. Before noon, Thelma saw a car coming to the field and in a few minutes she saw Carol Bowlin, an employee of Blackwell Hardware, walking toward her.

It was then that she realized she didn't know how to stop the tractor.

She says, "I knew that he came out to ask me to come to the store to work, but I had no idea what I was supposed to do to stop."

After she passed Carol standing at the edge of the plowed ground, he realized that she was unable to stop the tractor, so he ran and

caught up with her, climbed up beside her and released the clutch.

Thelma says, "I don't know whether I went in to work that day or not, but I shall never forget the embarrassment I felt."

She and Cayson Jones were married on a Saturday evening in the summer of 1927 at the Methodist Parsonage in Bovina. The late Edith Galloway Hannold and Pearl Singleterry were the couple's attendants.

Thelma reports, "We were probably the first and last newlywed couple who had our wedding supper in Dad's Cafe. It was little more than a hole in the wall and we sat on stools."

Cayson and Thelma lived in Friona all their married life, except for a few months during World War II, when they lived in Clovis. He died in October of 1970.

The couple had three children. Billie, their oldest and only daughter, and her husband, J.O. Wall, have lived in El Paso many years. The second, a son named L.A., was killed in a car wreck southwest of town in 1957. The youngest, also a son, Glendel, and his wife, Charlotte, and daughter, Lisa, live at 806 Woodland.

Other grandchildren are Sherry Jones, Ada, Oklahoma; Becky Jones, Lubbock; Woody Wall, El Paso; Mike Wall, Amarillo; and Brian Jones, Friona. There are also five great-grandchildren, Donnie, Brandon and Chris Wall, El Paso; and Herb and Joe Wall, Amarillo.

In addition to her immediate family, Thelma has one nephew, Donnie Brecht. He and his wife, Cathy, and children, Blakni and Curry, live in Amarillo.

In years past, Thelma has been a member of the Hub Demonstration Club and is presently a member of the Rebekahs and Calvary Baptist Church.

In closing she added, "I'm planning to keep busy with hobbies and helping those in the community who are less fortunate than I am."

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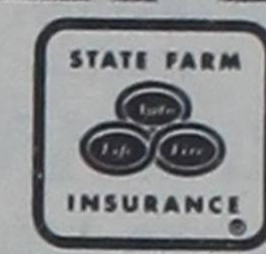
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D. Schueler Elected Dist. Meet Delegate

To the playground of the land called "Lebanon."

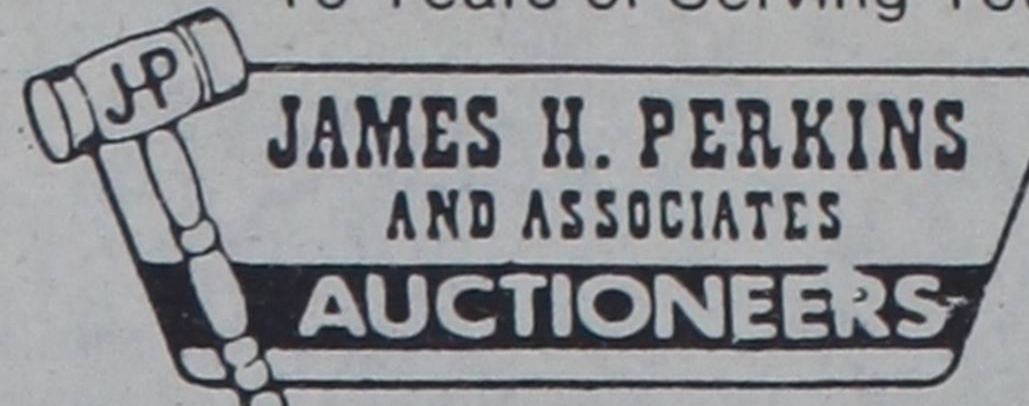

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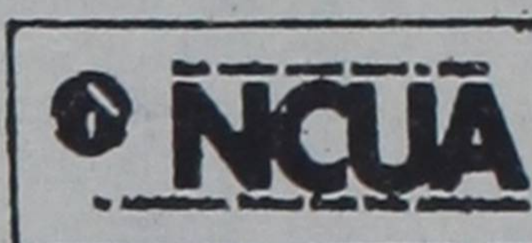
