Four Or More Die In Hotel Blaze

Guests Claim Alaskan Toll Nearer To 50

FAIRBANKS, ALASKA—(AP)—Four or more persons were believed dead and several were reported missing in an early morning Fairbanks hotel fire that may reach the proportions of a major disaster. Complete confusion made it impossible to get any accurate check on the dead and missing.

Nine persons were in a hospital. Two of them were in critical condition.

The fire was in the crowded Pioneer Hotel where there were approximately 250 occupants.

Federal Act To Hike Home Loan Activity

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman Monday signed an act opening the way for the government to boost its operations in financing home mortgages.

The new law puts up \$1,395,000 for the purchase of federally guaranteed home mortgages. It also provides additional mortgage insurance under the Federal Housing Administration (FHA) and veterans housing programs.

The program includes an additional 500 million dollars of purchasing power for the Federal National Mortgage Association, a government owned corporation which buys mortgages from lending institutions and thus establishes a secondary mortgage market for private home builders.

Man Kills College Co-Ed, Flees With Gun Still In Hand

NEW YORK—(AP)—A pretty, 20-year-old girl was shot to death on the Columbia University campus Monday. Her slayer fled with a gun still in his hand.

Police identified the victim as Eileen Fahy of New York City. The shooting was in the Pupin Building, the university's physics laboratory. Seconds later, a man emerged, a gun still in his hand, and told a passerby:

"I just killed a girl, call the police."

C. R. Skidmore, 44, Drilling Executive, Dies; Rites Monday

C. R. Skidmore, 44, prominent Midland drilling contractor, died at 4 a.m. Sunday in a Midland hospital following a lengthy illness.

He was vice president of the Tri-State Drilling Company and had resided here two and a half years. He formerly lived at Lubbock and Shreveport, where he was associated with the Peterson Drilling Company. Prior to that, Skidmore resided at San Augustine, Texas, Houston, Ark., and Pittsburgh, Pa., where he was connected with the Benedict-Trees Oil Company.

Funeral services were to be held at 2:30 p.m. Monday in the Trinity Episcopal Church, with the Rev. Robert J. Snell, rector, officiating. Interment was to be in Fairview Cemetery, under the direction of the Newell W. Ellis Chapel.

Born Oct. 3, 1907, at Winchester, Tenn., Skidmore was active in Masonic affairs and was a Shriner and a Knight Templar. He belonged to the Episcopal Church and the Midland County Sheriff's posse.

Survivors include the widow, a son, John Don Skidmore, and two daughters, Claude Ann and Bonnie Skidmore, all of Midland; the mother, Mrs. Nancy Skidmore, Knoxville, Tenn.; a brother, Ben Skidmore, Baton Rouge, La.; and a sister, Mrs. Roberta Roy, Knoxville, Tenn.

Palbearers were to be Noble Littlejohn, Carl Neitherrcut, Ed Darnell, Ed Edwards, O. L. Johnson, all of Midland; and Bill Wilson of Hobbs, N. M.

Navy Begins New Carrier; Seas' Biggest

NEWPORT NEWS, VA.—(AP)—The Navy Monday laid the keel of a giant aircraft carrier whose range and planes can bring within reach the "innermost lairs" of any aggressor nation.

Deputy Secretary of Defense William C. Foster described this as one of the capabilities of the 60,000-ton carrier Forrestal, to be the biggest warship of the world's navies when completed.

Behind his words in an address at the keel-laying ceremony was the fact the ultra-modern, flush-deck carrier is designed to launch and recover atom-bomb carrying planes and heavy, swift jet fighters to provide for its own protection against enemy attack.

The ship, first of two of the class which Congress so far has authorized the Navy to build, will cost an estimated 218 million dollars, excluding cost of the 100 or more planes of the carrier.

At normal construction rate, the Forrestal will be ready to join the fleet in late 1954. In an emergency, building can be speeded up.

The Forrestal is being constructed by the Newport News Shipbuilding and Dry Dock Company, builder of the passenger liner United States, which set a transatlantic speed record on her maiden trip to Europe.

Of the Forrestal, Foster said: "The USS Forrestal when completed will be able to carry the Naval air power of the United States in any part of the world to promote security and peace for ourselves and our Allies. Let those misguided leaders of enslaved peoples who may contemplate aggression weigh well the fact that not even in their innermost lairs can they escape the devastating force of this mighty weapon."

"It is our fervent hope that this carrier will prove an added deterrent to the outbreak of another world war. . . . She will carry to the far ends of the earth our championship of peace."

New, long-range bombers are known to be planned or in actual construction for use on the Forrestal.

Operator is now moving out the drilling rig and will follow by installing a pump to make the effort to complete as a commercial producer.

Flowing Discovery in SE Glasscock Is To Complete

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware and Texas Pacific Coal & Oil Company are preparing to complete their No. 1 S. J. Bishop, flowing discovery from a Permian lime in Southeast Glasscock County.

This new field opener flowed 100 barrels of clean oil in 18 hours, naturally, through a 24/64th inch tubing choke.

No Water Developed

No formation water was developed. The production was from open hole at 4,131-4,211 feet. Gravity of the oil and the gas-oil ratio during the latest period of testing has not been reported.

Operator now plans to wash the pay section with acid to clean it and they will then take potential test and complete.

Southeast of Garden City

The wildcat producer is 600 feet from north and east lines of section 21, block 22, T-3-S, T&P survey. It is 14 miles southeast of Garden City.

The section making the oil is in the lower Leonard zone of the Permian. It has been identified as Wichita-Albany by some geologists.

The pay section in No. 1 Bishop is just below the Spraberry.

Swabbing Tests Being Made At Borden Project

Sinclair Oil & Gas Company was swabbing to test through Mississippiam perforations at No. 1 Sterling Williams, indicated producer and discovery from that formation in Northwest Borden County.

Operator treated perforations from 9,815 to 9,866 feet with 3,000 gallons of acid. During the last 24 hours of swabbing, the well made 139 barrels of new oil and two barrels of acid water.

Operator was continuing to swab. Location is 600 feet from north and east lines of section 45, block 32, T-6-N, ELAHR survey and 11 miles northwest of Gail.

Foster Schedules Mile Outpost In SW Garza Sector

Tobe Foster of Lubbock spotted location for a one-mile west outpost to the Dorwan (San Andrew) field of extreme Southeast Garza County.

It will be drilled as No. 1 Doyle Justice, 330 feet from north and west lines of the south half of section 3, block 6, H&ON survey and four miles southeast of Justiceburg. It is slated to 2,700 feet with cable tools.

NW Scurry Test Flows Oil From Mississippian

The Superior Oil Company and Intex Oil Company No. 1-516 Eva F. Laws and others, wildcat in Northwest Scurry County, was flowing lead oil after fracture treatment in Mississippian open hole.

Operator started out drilling from 8,240 feet on new Eilenburger destination. While digging from 8,240

Controls On Vegetables, Fruits Lifted

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The government Monday lifted controls on almost all canned and frozen fruits and vegetables. Price Stabilizer Ellis Arnall predicted this will mean higher prices for a number of items.

Arnall noted in a statement that the Office of Price Stabilization was forced to take the decontrol action under an amendment Congress tacked on to the economic controls law.

The amendment, introduced by Representative Harrison (D-Va.), specifically exempted "fruits and vegetables in fresh or processed form from price control."

The exemption actually became effective earlier but OPS officials had been studying the field to determine how broad the exemption should be.

An OPS official estimated the exemption applies to at least 90 per cent of all processed fruits and vegetables.

He added that the exemption "clearly and unequivocally" applies to fruit and vegetable juices; canned and frozen fruits and vegetables, including baby or junior foods; potato chips and dried fruits.

CAT-RABBIT HOPS, PURRS

OKLAHOMA CITY—(AP)—Nelson Anderson has a cat, or rabbit, or a cat-rabbit—he can't tell which.

Anderson obtained the animal—called Bolo—from a Chippewa Indian while hunting in Minnesota.

Here is what's so confusing: The animal looks like a cat in front but the back end is rabbit; it walks like a cat but hops like a rabbit; purrs like a cat but eats rabbit food including carrots.

Talks Recess Hints At Armistice Progress

MUNSAN, KOREA—(AP)—Secret Korean armistice talks were recessed Monday at Communist request raising speculation that the deadlock over prisoner exchange was nearing a climax.

The Red request for a two-day recess was made two and one-half hours before the truce delegates were to meet at Panmunjon for their eleventh consecutive secret session.

Absentee Balloting Points To Big Turnout On July 26

Fifty absentee ballots had been cast Monday as the July 26 Democratic primary election loomed less than two weeks away.

County Clerk Rosenele Cherry reported 58 absentee ballots already have been sent out, but 48 of them still have not been returned.

The absentee balloting was regarded as heavy this early and some observers believed it indicated a heavy turnout for the election day itself.

Absentee ballots may be cast up to three days before the election.

Meanwhile, J. M. Speed, county tax assessor-collector, reported that many voters are changing their poll tax receipts to conform with any change in address since the time they paid their poll tax.

He pointed out that July 22 will be the deadline for changing from one precinct to another to qualify for the primary.

He urged voters to inspect their receipts to make sure they are listed in the proper precinct.

Using Wall Street and Big Spring Street as the dividing line, Precinct 1 lies to the northeast, Precinct 2 to the southeast, Precinct 3 to the southwest, and Precinct 4 to the northwest.

President Suffers Mild Virus Infection

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman suffered a mild virus infection Monday and had to cancel all his appointments.

The President stayed in his residential quarters and was in bed much of the time, but aides said he kept himself busy working on a number of bills requiring his action. They were passed during the closing days of Congress.

Third Good Rain In Week Ends Midland Area Drouth

A heavy downpour of more than an inch Sunday afternoon brought the Midland area its third rain within a week to help quench the thirst of drouth-parched lands.

The gauge at the City Shop recorded 1.2 inches of rain in Midland itself while varying amounts were reported over the county and heavy showers dotted the rest of West Texas and the Panhandle.

There was the possibility of additional showers Monday as heavy clouds piled up in the skies over Midland.

County Agent Charles Green reported Monday that the heaviest rainfall apparently fell in the southwest section of the county, while only a trace was reported in the extreme southern end.

Two inches of rain were reported southwest of the city, while Walter Anguish reported an inch on his farm two miles north of Airport.

Third Good Rain In Week Ends Midland Area Drouth

"The moisture of the past week," said the county agent, "has put the soil in the best condition it's been in in the last two years."

"The ranch country has a chance to bring out grass now and reseed before the Fall frost hits," Sweeping Torrents

In Midland itself, the one-inch rain of Sunday again turned many streets into sweeping torrents and left water lapping at the doorsteps of homes in some low sections of the city.

City Manager W. H. Oswalt reported he had received numerous complaints on drainage Sunday afternoon and Monday morning.

"The drainage, though, is a city-wide problem," he said, "and must be solved on that basis."

"The city will do the best it can as quickly as it can, but it will require time and considerable expense."

The rain Sunday afternoon halted the grading of many unpaved streets, but the work will be continued, the city manager said, as soon as the streets are dry enough.

The current rainy spell began a week ago and during the seven days ending Sunday, a total of 3.59 inches of moisture was recorded at the City Shop.

The rains here were duplicated in other sections of West Texas and the Panhandle.

South of the Rio Grande, continuing rains along the Rio Concho watershed in Mexico poured flood waters into the Presidio area at the Rio Grande-Rio Concho junction.

Approach to the International Bridge was covered at Presidio and government offices at the port of entry had to be evacuated.

American and Mexican tourists were stranded in Presidio and Ojinaga, across the Rio Grande.

Volunteers, aided by Mexican braceros, worked feverishly Sunday night to brace levees along the Rio Grande, where dikes had broken in at least two places to flood cotton fields.

Elsewhere, rain fell in varying amounts at Victoria, Wink, Wichita Falls, Maria, El Paso, McCamery, Amarillo, Lubbock and Dallas.

Temperatures in Midland reached a top of 87 Sunday afternoon and slumped to 71 during the night.

Unusual Emergency Patient Enters Hospital With Flood

Midland Memorial Hospital attendants have learned to expect just about anything to come through the doors at the emergency entrance.

But Sunday, with its heavy downpour, brought a new kind of patient.

"It was a little frog we found hopping around in the basement mud after the water finally receded," explained Administrator Burton Sears Monday.

Sears explained that the heavy rain overflowed the banks of Illinois Street, running in front of the hospital, and backed into the emergency entrance in the basement of the hospital.

"It was 20 inches deep in the driveway but we kept it down to about a maximum of four inches in the basement itself," explained the hospital chief.

"Halliburton Oil Well Cementing Company and the Midland Fire Department supplied pumping trucks and kept the situation from getting worse inside the building."

"All the water has been pumped out but we'll be cleaning out mud—and frogs—for the next two or three days."

He said most supplies were stacked on shelves so actual damage from the water was slight.

Seven Survivors Of Crash Rescued

ANCHORAGE, ALASKA—(AP)—All seven survivors of a B-17 crash in the mountain wilds near the Alaska-Yukon border were reported by the Air Force Monday to be recovering satisfactorily here.

Names of the seven men and their fellow crewman who died in the Friday morning crash were to be released late Monday.

The B-17 bomber crashed and burned while hunting for a missing Canadian Air Force plane. The survivors were ferried from the crash scene by helicopter.

PAD Approves Start Of Construction On Wink-To-West Coast Oil Pipe Line

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Petroleum Administration for Defense has given full approval for construction of a 24-inch, 953-mile crude oil pipe line between Wink, Texas, and Norwalk, Calif.

L. M. Glasco, president of the West Coast Pipe Line Company, of Dallas, announced Monday.

Arrangements for purchases of line pipe have been completed with Consolidated Western Steel Company and Kaiser Steel Company together with A. O. Smith. The financing, totaling about \$101,000,000, is being arranged by White, Field & Company, and Union Securities Corporation, both of New York, acting on a full report on the project from Ebasco Services, Inc., of New York.

Construction is scheduled to begin in the fourth quarter of this year and the Petroleum Administration for Defense has authorized the purchase of 99,000 tons of pipe in the quarter, enough to permit the laying of approximately 275 miles of line.

The PAD in April recommended rapid tax amortization of 25 per cent of the cost of the line on a finding that the pipe line would contribute to national defense. At that time it delayed full approval of construction until all engineering details on the line could be submitted to it. Final approval and a promise of priorities assistance was granted July 11.

Helpful In Defense

"I am gratified by PAD approval of our construction plan," Glasco said, "since it is a confirmation of our own judgment that this line can be most helpful in the defense of the nation."

"A pipe line map of this country presents an interesting study. There are lines running in all directions to link various areas of the country, but there is none at all from the great oil fields of West Texas to the great consuming area of the West Coast."

"This has been for a long time a situation that made no sense at all. Much of the West Texas production of crude oil has had to be shut in because of the lack of a market, yet California refineries have had to operate at less than capacity because they could not get crude."

"It's an absurd situation in peacetime. It could be catastrophic in time of war when the West Coast might be cut off from its petroleum supplies by enemy submarines."

"I want no misunderstanding."

Glasco said. "We have not gone ahead with our plans on any basis of sheer philanthropy. There really is an extra involved here, though, and I see no reason for understatement. This pipe line can be valuable in firming the nation's defense."

Thankful For Approval

"PAD recognized that fact by approving the line and I think the nation as a whole has reason to be thankful for that approval."

A complete survey of the West Coast pipe line was made by Ebasco Services, acknowledged experts in oil industry evaluation. This survey established the following facts:

1.—There is available in West Texas crude oil production capacity to an extent three to four times the requirements of the West

World Cotton Output Increase Indicated

WASHINGTON—(P)—The International Cotton Advisory Committee estimated Sunday the world production of cotton during the 1951-52 season at 34,800,000 bales. The committee, an intergovernmental group of 27 cotton producing and consuming countries, figured world consumption at about 33 million bales. This means, the committee said, that the world stocks on August 1 should be increased by at least 2,000,000 bales over the stocks a year ago.

Almost every daylight hour counted another case of polio as the daily epidemic pace of the disease continued Monday in Texas.

Two 'Copters Slated To Take Off Tuesday On Trans-Ocean Hop

WESTOVER AIR FORCE BASE, MASS.—(P)—Two Military Air Transport Service (MATS) helicopters manned by war-veteran Air Force fliers are scheduled to take off Tuesday in the first attempted trans-Atlantic flight—4,000 miles to Wiesbaden, Germany.

Westover Air Force Base officials said the craft—the Hop-A-Long and the Whirl-O-Way—will take off at 7 a.m. (CST), weather permitting, on the longest hop ever attempted by helicopters.

Each craft will carry a pilot and co-pilot. Three of the four are veterans of helicopter service.

Six stops are planned enroute—Presque Isle, Me.; Goose Bay, Labrador; Narasrusak, Greenland; Keflavik, Iceland; Preswick, Scotland and Mason, England. The last leg of the hop will be from Mason to Wiesbaden, where the helicopters will be delivered to the 9th Air Rescue Squadron.

The flight is designed to prove the feasibility of delivering helicopters by air to Europe. Officials said it would cost more than \$2,000 including labor, to crate each for shipment abroad.

Flight mechanics who will make the flight in an accompanying C-54, will include S. Sgt. Grady M. Trullit, Waco.

Four possible polio cases entered Fort Worth hospitals Sunday, to bring the two-day weekend total there to 11. None of the Fort Worth cases were classed as critical and definite diagnosis of the cases were to be made Monday.

El Paso reports its fifth polio death of the year and two new cases Sunday. Four-year-old Maureen Turley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Turley of El Paso, became the far West Texas city's fifth victim.

One new polio patient was reported in Dallas Sunday.

Houston's Jeff Davis Hospital said it had no new cases Sunday. Hedgecroft Clinic, however, had no information and said it would give none without authorization from its executive director, who could not be located.

The one Houston case reported was at Hermann Hospital.

Meanwhile, researchers awaited the results of inoculation of 33,000 small children in Houston. Half of the tots, aged one to six years, received shots of gamma globulin, a blood fraction substance doctors hope will tell them the secret of polio. The rest of the children got a harmless substitute.

The researchers hope to prove that injection of gamma globulin will prevent polio from paralyzing its victims. Early next year, the results of the shots can be evaluated.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis will keep a close check on the children inoculated.

An anthracite mine at Summit Hill, Pa., has been burning continuously since 1860.

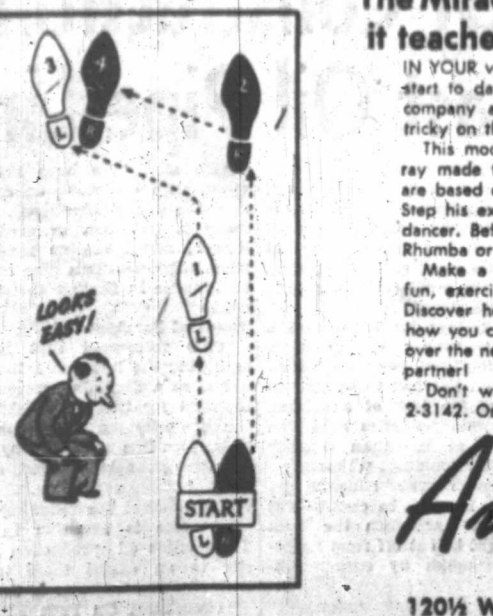

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Time Will Tell

This Spring both Senator Taft and General Eisenhower declared their belief that sharp economies were possible in the nation's defense establishment.

For Congress has approved military appropriations for the new fiscal year which are roughly \$5,000,000,000 less than the \$51,400,000,000 requested by President Truman.

The men in the Pentagon naturally are displeased at this outcome. But their temper is not the measure by which we must go in judging the effect of this reduction in expenditures.

If the Pentagon adjusts to the slash without too much anguish and without serious harm to our defensive picture, then we will know that the cut substantially was justified and that there is indeed room for severe economies in the military budget.

If, on the other hand, the \$5,000,000,000 reduction necessitates a dangerous weakening of the American defenses in the ensuing months, if the so-called stretchout of our preparations becomes an actual thinning out, then we will understand that the budget trimming was a foolish move.

In the nature of military budgets, one can't tell easily where savings may be made safely and where they may not. So it is perhaps unfair to assume that if the cuts turn out badly the blame must fall on a "reckless" Congress.

What will be important to watch is this: if the damage done by the cut is heavy, the Pentagon unquestionably will request supplemental funds to make up the deficiency. The attitude of Congress on that request will be an accurate measure of the sense of responsibility the law-makers have for the nation's real security.

The public should keep a sharp eye out for possible efficiency appropriation requests for another reason. If they are made and granted, that will mean Congress was wrong. It also will mean that in the end Congress did not save the country \$5,000,000,000 on defense, or perhaps anything at all.

You hear a lot about the old Army game, but you don't hear nearly enough about the old congressional game.

That game is to trumpet loudly budget savings made in the Spring, and then quietly restore the cuts later on through deficiency appropriations to which the public customarily pays little attention.

It is a politician's way of taking credit for notable savings without, in the end, actually producing those savings.

Since \$5,000,000,000 is quite a bit of money, the new defense budget reduction provides a good test this year of congressional motives and good sense.

We all ought to know in the months ahead whether Congress was playing the old phony economy game, whether it was taking a grave risk with American security, or whether it really made a wise, shrewdly calculated reduction to ease our staggering burdens.

The Washington Merry-Go-Round

By Drew Pearson (Copyright, 1952, by the Bell Syndicate, Inc.) Drew Pearson says: Truman may throw his hat in ring - under certain circumstances; He's certain to have power of vetoing Democratic nominee he doesn't want; Is convinced strong Democratic ticket can win.

WASHINGTON—While the Republicans were picking their candidates in Chicago, President Truman finally decided on some candidates of his own.

And while he doesn't want to run himself, he has decided that he may change his mind—under certain circumstances.

These circumstances are if any one of the following Democrats appears likely to get the nomination: 1. Senator Russell of Georgia—The President has the highest personal regard for Russell, considers him one of the ablest men in the Senate, has remarked privately that if it wasn't for the race issue he could be the best candidate for the Democratic Party.

2. Governor Stevenson of Illinois—While the President has been slightly misled over the way Stevenson has played coy and tried to divorce himself from any association with Truman, nevertheless, the President thinks he would be a strong liberal candidate with a real chance to win.

3. Vice President Barkley—If it wasn't for his age, the President probably would be for him. Barkley has stuck to the basic liberalism of the Democratic Party more faithfully than any other Southern leader. But Truman is realistic and doesn't think the American people ever would elect a man 74 years old, and, again, the President is determined to win.

4. Speaker Sam Rayburn—The same applies for Rayburn. "Mr. Democrat," as Sam is called in Washington, has authored some of the cornerstones of the New Deal, but, at the age of 70, he simply couldn't get elected.

Therefore, if the Democratic convention meeting in Chicago a week from today begins veering in the direction of any of these four candidates, the President is ready to reverse himself and throw his hat back in the ring. The above probably will be denied, nevertheless it is what the President has discussed with some of his highest party counselors.

What it boils down to is that the President, within limits, will have the veto power over who is to be the Democratic nominee.

These Truman sword supports On the other hand he also has picked three Democrats he will support for the nomination at Chicago. They are:

Jay Becker will turn up as usual to try for all the trophies. At some time a silver he has won every championship worth having, and Jay says that he's due to repeat on a few of them this year.

This could easily happen, as the play of today's hand indicates. Becker was the only player in a

good duplicate to make four spades. The reason was that he is always careful whereas most players (even experts) are sometimes careless.

East won the first trick with the king of diamonds and continued with the ace of diamonds. Everybody else carefully ruffed with the deuce of spades, but Jay Becker knew he could afford to ruff with the six of spades and thought he might have a use for the deuce of spades later on.

After South wins the second trick with a trump the correct play is to lead the king of hearts, knocking out West's ace. West's best return is a club, and South must win with the ace.

Now South leads a trump to the ten, discards a club on the queen of hearts, and ruffs a heart. Dummy is re-entered by means of another trump to the queen, and South ruffs a heart again.

At this point dummy's last heart is good for a trick if declarer can only get to it. If he has saved the deuce of spades up to this moment, he can lead it to dummy's three; and then dummy's last heart enables him to score the game.

If he has carelessly used the deuce of spades, he will be unable to get to dummy—and the game will be lost.

THE DOCTOR SAYS Body Dehydration Dangerous Result Of Several Diseases

By EDWIN F. JORDAN, M.D. Written for NEA Service If a person took water into the body in the form of drinking water, milk or food, an average of only two quarts a day, he or she would have consumed 12,775 gallons by the age of 70.

This is a lot of water, and we take it very much for granted, though the person lost in a desert, the shipwrecked sailor, or the aviator downed at sea has a better idea of the importance of this vital element of life.

Water is lost from the body by evaporation from the skin in the form of perspiration and from the lungs with each outward breath. It is lost also in the urine, in the intestinal waste, and in the saliva.

An average sized man carrying on a light occupation in a temperate climate loses about two and one-half quarts per day. Of this loss about one and one-half quarts is in the urine, one-half quart from evaporation from the skin, and the rest in other ways.

The amount of water lost by way of the skin and lungs depends on the temperature of the atmosphere, the amount of muscular effort and the moisture in the air. With violent exercise, the water loss in perspiration is increased enormously and in hot climates may be around three quarts a day.

Almost three-fourths of the body's weight is water. Fatty tissue and bone are lowest in water content. The liquid part of blood is 92 parts players missed that easy and obvious play.

ABILENE—Haskell County, with \$20,945,000, led all others of the area loosely termed Central West Texas and West Central Texas for total gross farm income in 1951, according to a report prepared by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. The report is based upon the annual survey of buying power of the magazine, Sales Management. The gross total 1951 farm income in all of the 132 counties surveyed by the West Texas Chamber was \$1,065,439,000, just over half the state's total of \$2,049,893,000. Farm income totaled \$239,247,000 in 30 counties lying below the "Cap Rock" and on or just away from watersheds of the Colorado and Brazos rivers. With \$15,729,000, Jones County

ranked second to Haskell in this group. Knox was third with \$11,025,000. Other counties of the group with more than \$10,000,000 income, ranked as follows: Fourth, Runnels, \$14,609,000; fifth, Baylor, \$12,873,000; sixth, Tom Green, \$11,899,000; seventh, Howard, \$11,830,000; eighth, Martin, \$11,539,000; ninth, Fisher, \$10,978,000. Midland County Listed. Less than \$10,000,000 income was reported from the eleven other counties of the group, as follows: Borden, \$3,770,000; Brown, \$6,889,000; Callahan, \$5,200,000; Coke, \$2,781,000; Coleman, \$9,746,000; Concho, \$6,845,000; Dickens, \$9,129,000; Eastland, \$6,204,000; Erath, \$6,594,000; Kent, \$3,891,000; McCulloch, \$6,980,000; Midland, \$7,679,000; Mitchell, \$9,062,000; Nolan, \$7,528,000; Palo Pinto, \$1,890,000; Scurry, \$9,623,000; Shackelford, \$3,702,000; Stonewall, \$4,538,000; Taylor, \$8,321,000; and Throckmorton, \$3,829,000. Lubbock led all West Texas counties with gross income of \$42,533,000. It was second among all the state's 254 counties. Only Cameron County in the lower Rio Grande Valley, with \$50,580,000, exceeded Lubbock.

CANNES, FRANCE—(AP)—The French Monday combined their admiration of Western trappings with gratitude to Texans who liberated them from German occupation in August, 1944.

In a solemn note on a mostly gay celebration of "Texas Week on the Riviera," ceremonies were held commemorating the landings of the 36th Texas Division, which cost 600 casualties.

Maj. Gen. J. E. Dahlquist of Minneapolis, who commanded the division, came here from Frankfurt to take part. He now commands the U. S. Army Fifth Corps. Monday night, the festivities resumed with Jimmy Bradford, an oil man from Abilene, entertaining at his ranch style villa. Regalists of oil wells will gush with champagne and genuine Texas horned toads will be distributed to the ladies as favors. The Duke and Duchess of Windsor and Elsa Maxwell may be among the guests. Sunday night, Nice put on a battle of flowers with a Texas twist for the visitors. Frenchmen sported 10 gallon hats and bandanas. Girls in French folk costumes danced with visitors in boots and blue jeans. The Riviera is getting used to hearing "The Eyes of Texas Are Upon You," but French singers are still having a little trouble with the words of "Lay That Pistol Down, Babe." One casino is serving a menu which features Brownsville delight, a melon; Laredo cucumber salad, Abilene mutton, Greenville beans and Jacksonville raberries.

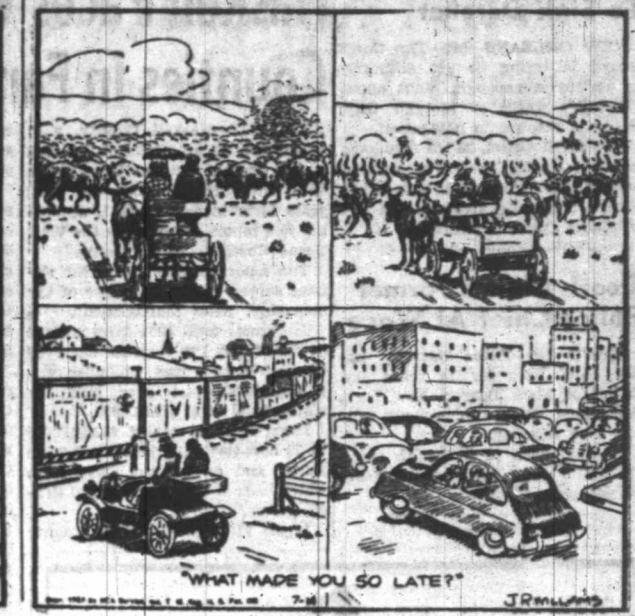

15 Die Violently In Texas Accidents; 10 On Highways

At least 15 persons died in Texas as violence over the weekend and as usual traffic accidents caused the most deaths—10.
Three persons burned to death. One was electrocuted.
One died in a plane crash.
A boy—his leg weakened by polio—drowned.

And there was one fatal stabbing. The worst traffic crash occurred 13 miles east of Fredericksburg on Highway 87 early Sunday. A big sedan collided with a truck, killing three persons and injuring five, one critically.
The dead are Antonio Cervantes, 35; Mrs. Ernestina Carbajal, 51; and Mrs. Maria de Leon.

James Paxton Corder, 15, Dallas, junior high school football player, drowned Sunday in a Rockwall County lake. He was one of four Dallas teenagers who had to abandon a sinking rowboat and try to swim about 100 yards to shore.
Corder suffered a polio attack in August, 1951, that left him with a weakened left leg. His friends said that might have kept him from swimming safely to shore.
Graclano R. Mendoza, 17, was stabbed fatally Sunday in a fight at a San Antonio dance. Officers held a 16-year-old boy for questioning.
Mrs. Gertrude Ann Reed, 46, Corpus Christi, was electrocuted Sunday while cutting grass in her yard with an electrical edge cutter. Dr. Roger Knapp, city physician, said Mrs. Reed was barefooted and walking on wet grass at the time of the accident.

William H. Sisk, 20, stationed at Biggs Air Force Base, El Paso, was killed Sunday when the car in which he was riding overturned near El Paso.
Husband Kills Wife
Will A. Barnett, 53-year-old negro of Spur, was killed Sunday in the collision of a pickup truck and a car about seven miles northeast of Plainview. Three others were injured.

New Car Shortage Threatens Nation

DETROIT—(AP)—Stocks of new automobiles continued to dwindle as the car industry begins to feel the full impact of the steel shortage.
More than a few dealers are predicting there will be, if any, new cars in dealer showrooms by August 1, in manufacturing sources it is being said July production will be the lowest month's output in four years. Yet, there still is a chance for the production of more than two million cars in the year's final half—if steel again starts to flow in full volume from mill to auto factory.
The trade paper Automotive News, in its current issue reports new cars in dealers' hands and enroute from the factory in July 1 numbered only 378,725 compared with 502,036 a month earlier, and 448,306 on July 1, 1951.
New car inventories now would

be even lower, dealers reported but for the fact June sales were made in accordance with some of the strictest trading policies in recent months. This means there have been no price discounts and no high trade-in allowances.
Dealers handling popular low priced lines Automotive News said, reported they were "turning down deals that did not involve a full profit on the new car and a reasonable profit on the trade-in."

"Despite prospects of a new car shortage, today's new car customer still is highly price conscious. In most cases, if he can't get the deal he thinks he should get, he decides to wait. My guess is that he will wait until next year.
"If higher steel prices send new car prices up again, the only backlog this industry may build will be a backlog of price resistance. As it is I don't think we could have continued to sell cars through 1952 at the rate they have been produced for the past few months."
Another dealer was quoted as saying: "The person who seems most calm and collected about the prospects of a new car shortage seems to be the customer."

Coast Pipe Line Company. This capacity is available. Esbaco pointed out, because the Texas Railroad Commission allows for state production are presently far below the maximum efficient rate of production of the Texas wells.

2—The California refineries presently have a demand for crude that cannot be supplied by other areas. West Texas crude would permit a more profitable yield than the California crudes now being used by these refineries.
3—New Mexico presently has available a substantial quantity of crude that can find no refinery outlet. Construction of the proposed pipeline would permit the channeling of this crude to a profitable market.
4—Construction of the pipe line would permit construction of a refinery in Arizona that could meet some of the state's demands for petroleum products.

Additional Markets For Crude
The project should benefit by the civilian economy of Pacific Coast states and Arizona. Esbaco reported: will provide additional markets for West Texas and New Mexico crude oil; and should have important value from a national defense viewpoint.
In the event of an all-out emergency, Glasco pointed out the pipe line could be converted from transportation of crude oil to transportation of products for the West Coast.

The plans for the line call for a 24-inch pipe line with four pumping stations having a capacity of 100,000 barrels a day. The capacity could be increased to 300,000 barrels a day on installation of 12 pumping stations. The route of the line will permit deliveries to a proposed oil refinery at Florence, Ariz., and to El Paso, Texas, refineries as well as those in California. Cost of the project with a capacity of 100,000 barrels a day is estimated at \$75,500,000; with a capacity of 200,000 barrels, \$99,600,000; with a maximum capacity of 300,000 barrels a day, \$108,700,000.
Completion of the line is scheduled for the third quarter of 1953.

CHICAGO—(AP)—The Democrats were streaming into Chicago Monday to nominate a presidential candidate in a convention they forecast will be rough, rugged and wide open.
They open full sessions next Monday. Before then, they hope a large and perplexing question will be settled—what will Adlai Stevenson do, and what will the convention do about Stevenson? The long shadow of the governor of Illinois hangs heavily over the whole party right now.
For months his name has been bandied about as the probable Democratic candidate. He is reported to be—or to have been—President Truman's personal choice for that role.
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Chicago. It will open hearing on the contested delegations from Texas and Mississippi.
Rival factions in both states named delegations split largely on the issue of party loyalty. The group led by Gov. Allan Shivers is unopposed, but is expected to follow Shivers' personal choice which now is and has been Senator Richard Russell of Georgia.
Shivers insisted upon and got an unopposed delegation because he felt it would give Texas more "trading power."
The Shivers group is generally anti-Administration and refused to be pledged nor would their electors be bound to support the national party's nominee.
The other faction, called the Loyal Democrats and headed by Logan Dickson of San Antonio, is pledged to support the party nominee regardless. Dickson has charged that Shivers plans to turn the Texas vote over to the Republicans, or to bolt the party.
Shivers answered that he has never bolted the party, didn't intend to, and that Dickson "must've been smoking marijuana or something."

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Liner United States Slices Atlantic Toward New Honor

ABOARD S. S. UNITED STATES AT SEA—(AP)—The new first lady of American shipping, the liner United States, poured on the steam Monday and raced for a new star in her speed crown.
On the homeward stretch of her maiden round-trip Atlantic crossing, the 53,000-ton American pride looked certain to break the Queen Mary's 14-year record for the Europe-to-

America crossing early Monday night.
The big new U. S. liner on her trip to Europe had cracked the Queen's west-to-east mark. Leaving New York on July 4, the United States made the 2,938-mile crossing in three days, 10 hours and 46 minutes, averaging 35.9 knots.
The American ship was not expected to better this time on the return voyage. For one thing, fog slowed her Sunday to a speed of 33.8 knots. But she appeared certain to reach Ambrose Light, off New York, late Monday afternoon—well ahead of the Queen Mary's 1938 east-to-west record of three days, 21 hours and 45 minutes.

Already, on her trip home, the United States had raked up still another record—the longest day's run ever made by a commercial ship. In the 25-hour period ended Saturday she covered 902 nautical miles, an average speed of 36.08 knots.
New York readied the "most colorful and elaborate" welcome in the port's history for the new American sea queen, her skipper, Commander Harry Manning, and his proud crew. Manning already had announced that he would anchor in the harbor Monday night and bring his 1,800 excited passengers into dock at 9 a.m. Tuesday.

The city's 60-mile waterfront was to be draped in holiday attire. Fire boats were slicked up and prepared for the traditional water salutes.
On Friday a traditional Broadway ticker tape parade will honor Manning, his officers and his crew.

Video Arrives At Midland; Set Picks Up Many Stations

Don Hicks sat down confidently to his television set Monday morning and fiddled around with the knob. On Channel 6, a cooking program came onto the screen from Havana, Cuba, just as clear as you please.
On Channel 8, he picked up another Havana station, this time a broadcast by a symphony orchestra.
He fiddled around some more and tuned in the grinning face of Arthur Godfrey, being televised by a St. Paul, Minn., station.
And all that happened right here in Midland, hundreds of miles away from the nearest television station and so far removed TV reception is supposed to be impossible.
"But I get programs pretty regularly," explained Hicks, who operates the West Texas Communication Service at 807 East Florida Street.

"In the month I've had this set, I picked up from 30 to 30 stations, including Los Angeles, Calif.; Omaha, Neb.; Charlotte, N. C.; and Atlanta, Ga.
"Some times they come in for an hour or so and some times for several days solid."
Hicks uses an all-channel antenna mounted atop a 75-foot aluminum tower with a booster attached to his Motorola set.
"I get the best reception," he explained, "when there is a weather change such as we've been having during the last week or so.
"Ordinarily you can't get reception beyond the line of sight from a transmitter but these waves apparently hit the clouds and then bounce back to earth, where we pick them up."

Panel Says 'Nazis' In German Bureau Should Be Ousted
BONN, GERMANY—(AP)—A special parliamentary committee recommended Monday that two high officials in West Germany's new foreign office be dismissed immediately and six others employed only in limited capacity.
The committee, which was appointed to study charges that the office is packed with Nazis who served Hitler, said the eight officials endanger the democratic development of the Bonn Republic.
The committee said that employment of Werner Van Barga and Herbert Dittman was "intolerable" and that they should be fired. Both Barga and Dittman were suspended by Chancellor Konrad Adenauer before the committee made its report. Adenauer is also foreign minister.
Barga, 54, was a leading member of the legal department of the foreign office and Dittman, 48, was director of personnel.

Draw May Pit U. S. Stars Against Russians In Early Heats Of Olympic Prelims

HELSINKI (AP)—The fifteenth modern Olympics veered sharply from ceremony to preliminary competition Monday, six days before the official opening, and the United States primed Mal Whitfield for a possible iron man triple in the ancient games.

Coach Brutus Hamilton of American track and field forces said he planned to use Whitfield in the 1,600-meter relay if the Ohio state star's leg muscle is healed.

"He is a tireless runner and gets better the more he works," said Hamilton as he watched rain wash out a scheduled Sunday practice.

"He is also a fine competitor and wants to run in everything possible. It's quite a load to carry but if Mal's leg is okay, he'll probably go in the relay. I don't plan to pick the relay teams until after the Olympic sprint."

Whitfield, an Air Force sergeant who has flown numerous missions in the Korean campaign, already is entered in the 400 meters and the 800 meters. He won the 800-meter championship in 1948.

"Whit has to run three 800-meter races and four 400-meter races counting the trials and finals," the coach said. "But he runs fearlessly. I think he can do it."

The important draw for heats in the track and field events was scheduled Monday. It was being watched with particular interest since it may bring an early show of American and Russian strength.

Eliminations also began Monday in basketball, with the knotty Chinese problem still unsettled.

Neither Nationalist China nor Red China was on hand when the first preliminary games began between Hungary and Greece.

Neither Chinese team was listed for action the first three days, leading to speculation they may be bypassed although their cases still are pending before the International Olympic Congress, which convenes Wednesday.

The towering U. S. squad, a heavy favorite and defending Olympic champion, automatically qualified for the championship draw along with Russia's European champions and eight other teams. The preliminary event is to pick six other teams from a bulky over-size field of 15.

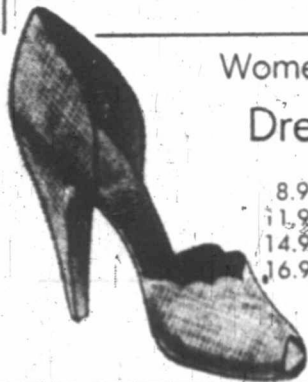
