Hill And Hill Set Two Wildcats In Delaware Basin

Hill and Hill of Fort Worth, and associates are to start operations at once on two 3,000-foot cable tool wildcats in the Delaware Basin area of West Texas.

One of the prospectors is in Central-West Reeves County and the other is in Southeast Culberson County.

Hill and Hill No. 1 Jones, et al. will be the Reeves County exploration. It is 20 miles northwest of Toyah and 990 feet from south and 330 feet from east lines of section 46, block 35, pal survey.

Cable tools will be used to drill to 3,000 feet. That is calculated to test the Delaware sand section.

Hill and Hill No. 1 Grisham-Hunter is to be in Culberson County. It is 21 miles west of Toyah and 330 feet from south and east lines of section 2, block C-17, pal survey. It is also to dig to 3,000 feet to explore the Delaware sand and it will use cable tools.

Gulf Will Drill Shallow Wildcat In Ward Sector

Gulf Oil Corporation will drill No. 278 Hutchings Clear Fork wildcat in Southeast Ward County, one and one-half miles northeast of production in the southeast side of the North Ward-Teles field.

It is to be drilled 330 feet from south and 990 feet from east lines of section 82, block N, G&M B&A survey and six miles southwest of Monahans.

Turner Project NE Terrell Gets DST Shows

Fred Turner, Jr. of Midland found some shows of oil and gas in his No. 4 H. C. Noelke, Jr., Northeast Terrell County wildcat in the zone at 10,236-274 feet in an unidentifiable line and shale formation.

That section was drilled and tested for two hours. Recovery was 100 feet of oil and gas out drilling mud. There were no shows of formation water.

The project is now making hole below 10,287 feet in lime and shale. This wildcat is projected to 12,000 feet to test the Ellenburger. The zone covered in the test at 10,236-274 feet was likely in the Pennsylvanian.

Location is 660 feet from south and 654 feet from east lines of section 50, block B-2, CCS&RONG survey. It is 11 miles southwest of Sheffield.

Tide Water Stakes 6,600-Foot Test In NW King Area

Tide Water Associated Oil Company No. 1-E Pritchfork Ranch is to be a 6,600-foot wildcat to test through the Pennsylvanian line in Northwest King County.

It is 11 miles northwest of Guthrie and 660 feet from north and west lines of section 158, B&A survey.

Tide Water has the lease on a large part of the big Pritchfork Ranch and the concern has already drilled several deep wildcat failures on that property.

Operations at the new project are to start soon. Rotary tools will be used.

Pure Wildcat In Schleicher Finds Interesting Shows

The Pure Oil Company No. 1 R. G. Williams, Northwest Schleicher County wildcat, 16 miles northwest of Eldorado found interesting shows of oil and gas in the Ellenburger.

Those shows came in a one and a half hour drillstem test at 7,470-8,905 feet.

Gas surfaced in four minutes and mud and gas started flowing out the top in 35 minutes. The gas mud was flowed to the pits for minutes.

The flow was not gauged or estimated. Some of the cut was cut with oil.

Recovery, when all of the drill pipe had been pulled was 3,003 feet of oil and gas out drilling mud. (Continued on Page 8)

Father Slays Ex-Con Found Looting Home

HOUSTON—(P)—Discharged three days ago from the state prison at Huntsville, where he served a two-year sentence imposed in Frio County, Robert Byron Brown, 25, of Pearsall, was shot to death early Monday in the home of a Houston sales engineer.

For 15 minutes prior to the shooting, he had held James Turner Pinkston, 37, and his wife, 35, in terror in the bedroom of their home, according to police.

Three children slept in upstairs bedrooms as their mother was awakened at 3:30 a.m. by the sound of an intruder moving across the room.

Mrs. Pinkston awakened her husband by pinching him and he reached up to snop on a bed lamp. The man was standing at the foot of the bed. In his hands he held what appeared to be a long-barreled rifle.

"Turn out that light," he barked. Again in darkness, he spoke, informing the couple he was there for money and would not harm them if he got what he wanted. He demanded Mrs. Pinkston's purse and her husband's wallet.

Reentry Home
Pushing through the rear of the house, the burglar left by a rear door and as he did so, Pinkston leaped up, got a .32 caliber rifle from a closet and went in pursuit.

The burglar, meanwhile, reentered the house and stood for an instant silhouetted against an outside window. Pinkston raised his rifle and shot twice. Pulling the trigger a third time, he got a blank click. The gun was empty.

Brown fell across a threshold between the kitchen and dining room. Police arrived with Justice W. C. Ragan, who returned a verdict of justifiable homicide.

**Carrier Boxer Enters Base
With New Tales Of Heroism**

YOKOHAMA, JAPAN—(P)—The fire-scarred U. S. carrier Boxer steamed into this Japanese naval base Monday with a dozen fire-riddled planes and a deck load of heroes.

Nine dead and scores of injured already had been evacuated by air. That most dreaded of all disasters at sea—fire—broke out on the carrier Wednesday as the ship was preparing to launch jet planes against Red North Korea.

Steel plates of the hangar deck—where the jet and propeller-driven planes are parked—were buckled by the intense heat of the fire.

Monday, as the ship steamed into port under its own power, stories were told of incredible heroism among the crewmen.

No one knows how the fire started. But when it started, the men of the Boxer turned out and did fantastic things in the face of a blaze that ignited machine gun and rocket ammunition and finally set a huge bomb off.

Hot lead poured between the decks but men moved into that area to try to beat down the flames that threatened to destroy the ship.

"I'm in the Navy the rest of my life I'll never see anything like it again—the way these men responded to the danger," says Capt. Marshall

Twisters Batter Denton Area As Cool Front Aims At State

Two small twisters wrecked farm outbuildings and killed some livestock in Denton County Sunday afternoon.

There were no injuries and no major damage in population centers, although many television aerials were knocked down in Denton.

Worst hit was a farm area four miles northwest of Lewisville, near the Dallas County line. Numerous barns and sheds were knocked down in that area. The Joe McOee turkey farm reported losing a thousand dollars worth of turkeys.

A few chicken houses and small sheds on the western outskirts of Denton were blown over. A mile and a half west of Denton, minor wind damage was reported.

Three inches of rain fell near Lewisville. Several motorists who had stopped to watch a fire which destroyed a barn on the J. B. Ferguson farm, two miles north of Lewisville, were stalled by the debris.

The heavy rains fell only in the immediate storm area. Denton got only 1/8 inch. It has been 80 days since Denton County has had a general rain.

Meanwhile, a cool front bearing down on Texas from Kansas and other northern points gave some hope for an end to the heat wave.

The Weather Bureau said early Monday the cool front might reach well into the interior "within 48 hours or so." Panhandle and Upper Red River valley points might get benefit of the front before that time.

Meanwhile, however, the deadly heat that has hung over Texas for two weeks continued. It was blamed with one death in Dallas Sunday after three had been hospitalized the day before because of heat stroke. Dallas passed its ninth day of 100-plus temperatures.

The death victim was identified by personal papers as Emmett John Finnegan. He died in a hospital shortly after being found unconscious on a vacant lot.

AUSTIN (P)—The State Democratic Executive Committee Monday ruled against a referendum at the August 23 primary to determine which presidential candidate will go in the Democratic column of the November general election ballot.

LONDON (P)—Seven Communist demonstrators who threw "go home" leaflets at Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway July 9 on his first official visit to Britain drew fines ranging from two to 15 pounds (\$5.60 to \$42) Monday.

LONDON (P)—Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden shortly is to marry Clarissa Spencer-Churchill, niece of Prime Minister Churchill, it was announced officially Monday.

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA (P)—Dave Sands, British Empire middleweight champion, died in a hospital here Monday night from injuries received in an automobile crash at Dundog, Newcastle, New South Wales, earlier Monday.

SHAPE Boss Cites Lag In West Buildup

SUPREME HEADQUARTERS ALLIED POWERS IN EUROPE (P)—Gen. Matthew B. Ridgway said Monday the threat of war is still as big as ever, and there are serious weaknesses in the West's buildup to meet this threat.

The supreme commander of Allied forces in Europe told a news conference there was doubt as to whether the Western Allies could reach their 1952 goal of 50 divisions—25 active and 25 in reserve—and 4,000 planes.

Ridgway also said he favored two year's military service—something European nations are to discuss in Paris Tuesday amid indications they will not adopt it.

Belgium already has been hit by strikes protesting her two-year draft term.

Ridgway, former United Nations commander in Korea, took over the SHAPE command in May from Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

"The most serious deficiency to date," Ridgway said, is the SHAPE buildup in the logistics field.

The problem of building warehouses, troop installations and air fields is broad and complex, he said, and "I haven't had time to go into the almost innumerable details of that program."

On the question of British and French limits they may not be able to reach their rearmament goals because of economic difficulties or failure to receive sufficient United States aid, he said that is "above the question of a governmental level."

He added, however, he felt the question "can and will be adjusted without damage to the SHAPE program."

Under Continuous Study
He said the new superweapons being developed are exceedingly difficult to evaluate and it was very difficult to estimate whether the number of ground troops could be cut down.

"The matter is continuously under study, not only from our point of view but from the point of view of any enemy capabilities," he said.

In a prepared statement opening the news conference he said "some unobscured people are quite prone to overlook the obstacles" in setting up an international command.

For his part, he felt it "incredible that such harmonious ties" had been formed in such a short time.

The general said he found progress had been made in providing troop leadership, but building an efficient officer corps is a long-time project and it is impossible to do the job completely in the short time that many nations have had since the war.

**Fire Sweeps White's
Wichita Falls Store**

WICHITA FALLS—(P)—Fire caused an estimated \$300,000 damage to the White's Auto-Store here Monday.

The store, on a downtown corner, is of two stories and masonry. The fire started on the top floor, which was the furniture department. It was confined to that floor but smoke and water caused some damage to the remainder of the business firm. Adjoining buildings were not threatened seriously.

Fire Chief Thurston Harvick made the damage estimate.

**Planes Obliterate Factory,
Kill MIG, Rake Front Lines**

SEOUL—(P)—Allied fighter-bombers Monday turned a big North Korean chemical plant into a mass of raging flames in a concentrated attack with high explosives and fire bombs.

The Fifth Air Force said 150 planes, including Marine fighter-bombers, heaped destruction on the chemical plant near Namsook, which is about 20 miles northwest of the battered east coast port of Wonsan.

Returning pilots said great clouds of black smoke hung over the building area, which covers a mountain side.

The U. S. Fifth Air Force said Sabre jet pilots Monday probably destroyed one Russian-made MIG-15 and damaged another in the eighth straight day of jet battling over North Korea. This ran the UN MIG tag for the eight days to 19 de-

stroyed, one probably destroyed, and 20 damaged.

In Monday's clash near the Manchurian border, four Sabres fought four MIGs at 35,000 feet.

A U. S. Eighth Army night command said fighting continued Monday for the lonely outpost on Siberia Hill. Enemy casualties through Sunday in the hill fight were estimated at 225 killed and 250 wounded.

UN warplanes flew more than 150 sorties (individual flights) against the hill with flaming gasoline, rockets, bombs and machine gun fire.

Fighting closed to hand-to-hand battles several times since the Reds first captured the hill. The Chinese last captured it at 5 a.m. Monday.

The temperature rose to 104 degrees at times during the furious fighting.

Siberia Hill—source of the soldiers' nickname for the height is obscure—is the latest in a series of scattered and violent battles for lonely outposts.

A front-line battalion officer called the fight the "creeping offensive of the Communists."

He said the Red strategy seemed to be to make a quick thrust to win a hill and then quickly fortify it to make its recapture difficult and costly.

Except for the Western Front, the rest of the battle line was relatively quiet.

UN planes swept up and down the front line smashing Communist targets.

An Eighth Army staff officer said Communist casualties for ground action between August 1-7 included 1,243 killed, 1,268 wounded and seven prisoners.

Jacoby On Bridge

"Our bridge club at Blackburn College, Carlinville, Ill., writes a correspondent, unchartered, and unnamed, meets every noon and evening for a few quick hands of bridge. Its four members have played some unusual hands, but we finally played one so weird we thought you might be amused by it."

"Six clubs was bid as nothing but a sacrifice. And the way the cards were, West would have gone down at five spades, so it wasn't a good sacrifice. What counted, the way the hand was played, was that South made his bid of six clubs."

"West, after his fierce double, began by lawing down his king of diamonds. He surveyed the dummy and led his ace of hearts, reaching

in triumph with an ace and a smile. He crossed to dummy with a diamond, discarded that one and laid down his hand.

"Best hand I've held all year and they make a little slam," West moaned.

"You're lucky we didn't redouble," Zimmer replied.

A very interesting hand, and weird enough for the most jaded taste. But you can't get me to shed any tears for poor West. He brought his fate on himself.

After taking the first trick with the king of diamonds, West should have switched to the king of spades. That would have set the contract at once.

How could West tell that South was going to ruff a heart but not a spade? He couldn't tell any such thing, but he didn't need to.

If South ruffed the king of spades at the second trick, West could sit tight and collect a heart trick later on. (If South had neither hearts nor spades, the defense was doomed to begin with.) But if South ruffed the ace of hearts at the second trick, West might lose his spade trick—and this is exactly what happened.

Senators' Average Age Due To Drop In Future Congress

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The average of senators—which is 59 years and three months now—should drop a few notches about January 3 when the new Congress meets.

Every two years a group of younger men usually replaces a few of the older senators. This reduces the average age.

Already two veteran senators are out—one by defeat in a primary and the other by his own choice of not seeking reelection.

Primaries and nominating conventions are about half completed for the 35 Senate seats at stake and the final November election should produce additional changes.

Defeat of 63-year-old Senator Kenneth D. McKellar last week in the Tennessee Democratic Primary by Rep. Albert Gore, who will be 45 before the year ends, is an example.

That knocks 38 years off the total age of 96 senators and several months from the average age.

Voluntary retirement of Senator Tom Connally (D-Texas) who will be 75 on August 19 is another example.

Weekend Violence In Texas Takes Lives Of 10 Persons

Weekend violence took its usual death toll in Texas.

At a late hour Sunday night the count stood at six deaths by traffic three by gunfire and one from heat—10 in all.

The heat death occurred at Dallas where the temperature has been above 100 degrees for nine consecutive days. A man identified as Emmett John Flanagan was found on a vacant lot in South Dallas early Sunday afternoon. He died shortly afterward in a hospital.

Three other heat victims were reported in a fair condition in Dallas hospitals, as almost always, took the greatest number of lives.

James J. Workman, 20, was killed Sunday night when his car over-

turned south of Ballinger on U. S. Highway 83. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Workman of Hatchell in Runnels County.

A couple identified as Mr. and Mrs. Dan G. Owens of Tyler were killed early Saturday when their car and a truck collided 12 miles south of Texarkana.

Alfred Herrera, 32, jumped out of the path of one automobile directly into the path of another car Friday night. He died shortly afterward.

Gilbert Perry Chunn, 52, Snyder, was killed Friday night when his car collided with a truck and then overturned. The accident occurred near Big Spring.

Keith Klejgovich, 25, a seaman from Bergen, Norway, was killed in Houston Saturday night when he was struck by an automobile.

Near Huntsville, De Walker, 30, was charged with murder after his brother-in-law, Nathan Vaughn, 30, was killed by a charge from a shotgun. Walker said Vaughn threatened to kill him.

The Vaughn shooting occurred in the Phelipe community, six miles east of Huntsville. Walker was released on \$3,000 bond.

A Beaumont city fireman, 37-year-old Guy M. Fletcher, was shot to death Saturday afternoon. A 41-year-old woman—Beaule Fletcher—was charged with murder.

Peron Mans Ship Of State After Interment For Evita

BUENOS AIRES, ARGENTINA—(AP)—Argentine President Juan D. Peron shouldered Monday the burden of duties once shared by his wife, Eva, who was interred Sunday with full presidential pomp.

The elaborate interment ceremony in which Peron participated climaxed an unparalleled period of national grief and mourning since the President's wife died two weeks ago.

Her body rests temporarily in the Central Hall of the six-million-member General Confederation of Labor (CGT), a power which Peron built and which his wife ruled the last years of her life.

The interment hall will be closed to the public for a year while embalmers seek to give the body "corporal permanence." Ultimately it will be placed on view in a huge monument to be built for her in the center of Buenos Aires.

Mrs. Peron's body was carried from the National Congress Building to the CGT Hall Sunday along a 27-block route packed with hundreds of thousands of mourning Argentines. A 21-gun salute sounded as she was laid to rest while the mourners, jammed into all nearby streets, stood motionless.

Peron, dressed in a general's uniform, walked with the nation's great behind a high gun carriage bearing his wife's coffin. Workers drew the carriage, and an honor guard of cadets, workers and nurses marched beside it while Air Force planes roared overhead.

Peron earlier had announced he would take over personally the duties his 30-year-old wife handled before her last illness. His new work schedule, announced to start Monday, devotes four afternoons each week to his wife's social welfare and labor duties.

Sam Houston Soldier Hurt In Bus Mishap

ALTOONA, Pa. —(AP)— A soldier stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, was among 18 passengers injured near here Sunday when a Greyhound bus went out of control.

He was Pfc. James Johnson, injured when the wild bus went through a fence 10 miles north of Tyrone, Pa. Johnson was not hospitalized.

10 Million In Gems Shown To Jewelers

NEW YORK —(AP)— Ten million dollars' worth of jewelry is on display at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in connection with a jewelers' convention which opened Monday.

More than 100 guards, including city police, hotel police, and private agency detectives, have been assigned to watch the nine-floor exhibit. Only members of the trade are admitted to see it.

The convention is the forty-seventh annual trade show of the American National Retail Jewelers Association.

Texas GOP Leaders Talk Politics With General in Denver

DALLAS (AP)—Two Texas Republican leaders were in Denver, Colo., Monday to talk politics with Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Jack Porter of Houston, state GOP National Committeeman, told reporters here he and other Southern Republican leaders would confer with the GOP Presidential nominee over efforts to win the South in the November election.

Ben Guill of Pampa, former Congressman and manager of the state GOP campaign, was to join Porter in Amarillo for the Denver flight.

"I told the general July 31 that the outlook was excellent in Texas and I will tell him that again," Porter said.

Porter said he would urge Eisenhower to come to Texas but he would "have to think about it" before urging acceptance of an invitation to speak October 7 or 9 at the State Fair of Texas.

"I don't want him that early," Porter said. "I think it would be better politics to have him later, but we will take him when we can get him. The campaign would be at a higher pitch later in October."

Porter said he was trying to get Eisenhower to Texas for at least two days but would prefer a three-day visit.

If Eisenhower comes, Porter said, he definitely would visit Houston, San Antonio and Dallas and "probably" Fort Worth, Amarillo, and Lubbock.

National Committee To Play Second Fiddle To Stevenson

SPRINGFIELD, ILL.—(P)—Francis E. McKinney, outgoing national Democratic chairman, proclaimed his party "united 100 per cent for the first time in 12 years," but he has run into a flat contradiction from a top aide of Gov. Adlai Stevenson over who's going to run Stevenson's 1952 presidential campaign.

McKinney told a news conference Sunday, "There can be only one general and he is the chairman of the Democratic National Committee."

But Wilson Wyatt, Stevenson's personal campaign manager, who attended the conference, said "The campaign is under the direction of the governor, and there is only one general."

The disagreement indicated the Democratic National Committee will play a secondary role in the Illinois governor's bid for the presidency as Democratic "standard-bearer."

Stephen A. Mitchell, a Chicago lawyer who is Stevenson's own choice to succeed McKinney as chairman, also attended the meeting. He sided with Wyatt in the apparently good-humored argument, saying, "There is a commander in chief and the others work for him. Governor Stevenson is the commander in chief."

Mitchell said he would resign Monday as chief counsel for the House Judiciary subcommittee investigating the Justice Department and will go to Washington Tuesday. His election to the national party chairmanship is considered a formality, Mitchell said he would keep the National Committee's headquarters in Washington.

But Stevenson's own personal campaign headquarters will remain in Springfield.

It was a reporter's question, calling attention to the two campaign headquarters, that brought about the exchange between McKinney and Wyatt.

McKinney said Stevenson's Springfield headquarters, headed by Wyatt, would co-ordinate its work with the National Committee, which

directs the efforts of all 48 Democratic state committees.

But Wyatt said he and Mitchell would work under the governor's direction.

The governor visited the Illinois State Fair to take part in "Veterans Day" ceremonies and then returned to his office to confer with McKinney, Wyatt and Mitchell. He was scheduled to see Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee Monday in

another of his fence-mending conferences with Southern leaders.

McKinney, who for practical purposes relinquished the party chairmanship Sunday and turned control over to Mitchell, said he would return to private business but would keep his hand in politics. He said he would be "extremely active" in the Stevenson campaign, but didn't say what part he would play.

'Winner Take All' Precinct To Cast Votes By Unit Rule

STRONG STATION, MISS.—(P)—When the nation votes for a President November 4, either Republican Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower or Democrat Adlai Stevenson will win a 29-0 victory in one Mississippi precinct.

That is not an election prediction; it's a cinch. Here's why.

On the morning of the election qualified voters of Strong Station, a tiny farming community in northeast Mississippi, will gather at Dukeminier's post office and general store, on the only main street they have.

Mrs. A. S. Dukeminier will pass each voter a slip of tablet paper and the 28 voters will indicate in writing whether they like Ike or Adlai for President.

Everybody will join in the counting and if Eisenhower has a majority of the "straw" vote, the whole community will mark real ballots for him. If Stevenson emerges the winner, then every voter in the precinct will put the "X" in the Democratic column.

It's winner take all and that goes for every office seeker from constable to President.

LONDON.—(P)—A miniature train jumped its track and crashed into a tree Sunday, killing a year-old baby girl and injuring 19 other joyriding passengers.
